Triumph of Red Armies Driving Toward Poland

New Blows Dealt Disorganized Germans Along Berezina River Where Napoleon Met Defeat; 300,000 Germans Face Entrapment By New Russian Pincer Movement

Moscow, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The army newspaper Red Star said today that the Russians had crossed the Berezina river, inflicting a new blow on the disorganized German army along the stream where Napoleon's legions met final defeat during the retreat from Moscow.

Following up his smashing victory at Gomel, Gen. Constantine Rokossovsky pushed through White Russia west of the Dnieper river, outflanking the German base at Zhitobin, 50 miles northwest of captured Gomel, the army newspaper reported. The railroad running southwest from Zhitobin to Kalinkovichi was cut in yesterday's westward surge when Soviet spearheads captured the town of Shatsk, where the railway crosses the Berezina.

Kokossovsky's White Russian army reached the Berezina by a northward push along the west bank of the Dnieper, while other forces enveloped and stormed the fortress city of Gomel east of the river.

Red Star said a heavy artillery barrage and repeated raves by the Red army drove the enemy from the right bank of the Berezina, which flows southward into the Dnieper, 20 miles below Zhitobin.

Fast-moving advance spearheads stormed into the towns of Mzhish and Olba, forming the strongest knot of German resistance in this sector. Then they fanned out along both banks of the Berezina, striking north and northwest to sever the Zhitobin-Kalinkovichi railroad.

Red Star said the Germans still were holding out in strongly fortified bases along the Berezina to the northwest and were offering stiff resistance to the advancing Red army.

Rokossovsky's triumph at Gomel opened the way for a possible general advance toward Pinsk and Brest-Litovsk, chief cities of the former Polish province of Polesie.

Gomel, last German-held bastion east of the Dnieper, fell yesterday after a siege which began Oct. 13, three weeks after Rokossovsky's troops fought their way into the Sator and crossed the Sozh river above the strongly fortified Nazi base.

Held up for more than two months, the Red army troops, avoiding costly frontal attacks against the strategic stronghold, pushed west from the Sozh in outflanking maneuvers to the north and south. Wednesday's breakthrough at Propoisk, 60 miles north of Gomel, completed the isolation of the beleaguered German garrison and decided the outcome of the battle.

Today Kokossovsky's troops were pouring through the Gomel gap, and extending their control on the east bank of the upper Dnieper. Red army advance guards already were reported far west of the river south of Gomel. The Russian communists early today said other Soviet spearheads had reached the railway town of Kostivukha, eight miles to the northwest on the line where the Germans were fleeing toward Zhitobin, Brobrusk and the White Russian town of Minsk.

SUBSIDY FIGHT STILL GOES ON

Senate Committee To Open Hearings Next Week

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Denouncing administration arguments that food prices would soar upward if Congress bans government subsidies, Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) said today this contention "sounds like a threat to let consumer prices skyrocket and then to blame Congress unless the President is permitted to have his way in all respects."

Aiken declared "there is no general demand for an increase in all farm prices."

As the Senate Banking Committee prepared to open hearings next week on the House-passed bill to halt the \$399,000,000 federal subsidy program at the end of this year, Aiken made these assertions in a statement.

That the administration seeks to save the program by creating the "false impression that consumer prices could not be controlled if subsidies were repealed."

That existing subsidies have benefited middle-men and food processors principally failing to prevent decreases in prices paid to the farmer for his products in some cases.

U. S. FLEET IS NOW LARGEST IN THE WORLD

Knox Reveals That Size Of Navy Has Been Doubled In Past 11 Months

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The United States fleet—largest in the world—has been doubled in 11 months and now bristles with 417 fighting ships, including more than 40 aircraft carriers.

Navy Secretary Knox, disclosing the size of the fleet, voiced a prayer that the Japanese fleet soon may be drawn into action and wiped out.

Knox announced yesterday construction of 419 new ships in the last 11 months—more than a ship a day. The 21 American warships lost since January 1 will be made up "within the next two weeks," boosting the total combat strength of 838 vessels he said.

Aircraft carriers, playing an ever more important role in the drive on Japan, made up a large share of the new construction—40 new carriers of all types have been completed in 1943.

In addition, approximately 230 of the scrappy little destroyer escorts have gone into action, primarily for anti-submarine work although they can do a full sized job in any battle.

The first of this type was completed last February with a goal then fixed at 260. Knox said that the quota has been filled 90 percent—approximately 234 ships—and will be exceeded by the end of the year. He added that the DES "now are being turned out at a rate in excess of 40 per month."

He noted also "gratifying results" in steady increases in the size of the submarine fleet, and said that new submarines completed this year would approximate 20 percent of the submarine fleet in existence on January 1, 1943.

The Navy secretary also said heavy combat planes will more than double in number "with several hundred planes to spare." The naval aircraft construction program originally called for 27,000 planes, but Knox said that total now has

New Chapter Of Heroism Added To Marine Record

Pearl Harbor, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Lt. Carl Evans F. Carlson, Marine hero of Guadalcanal, Makin and Guadalcanal, explained in three words, "determination, tenacity, courage," how a few battalions of leathernecks were able to annihilate nearly 4,000 Japanese imperial marines and capture Tarawa main air base in the Gilberts, in 76 hours.

"Those boys really did the job," said Carlson, who as an observer landed November 20 with the Marines at Tarawa and made daily trips through machinegun and mortar fire to report to the flashship.

"The Japs might have exterminated them with an organized counter-offensive the first night, but they couldn't have even an off."

Secretary of Navy Knox said at Washington American losses were heavy but that the enemy's were much heavier.

"The chief difference in Waco for 17 days against heavy Jap bombardment and Tarawa was the determination, tenacity and courage of the defenders. It was by far the toughest job I've ever seen. It was one of the toughest battles ever fought in the Marine Corps' (168 year) history."

Cooperation of warships, in shell-jacking Japan's installations on Tarawa and the Army and Navy aerial bombardment played a big part in its capture, Carlson said in an interview. He particularly praised two destroyers which pushed into a lagoon and fired on enemy strong-points from 700 to 900 yards off shore.

"The Japs still had five-inch guns. The destroyers were practically belly-to-belly fight with them. Before we went in with mine sweepers they went in to clean out mines and barbed wire from the

NEW GAINS IN SOUTH PACIFIC

Important New Guinea Position Captured By Allies

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Nov. 27.—(AP)—A menacing 2,400-foot-high jungle plateau from which Japanese had overlooked the New Guinea sector was the most important invasion of the southwest Pacific war is possible was in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's hands today.

British Eighth Extends Bridgehead Over Sangro

Clark's Forces Repulse Two German Counter-Thrusts; Axis Bombers Attack Convoy

Alfred Headquarters, Salerno, Nov. 27.—(AP)—British Eighth army troops have slashed forward to extend their bridgehead across the Sangro river which has risen over two feet and in some places is now a thousand feet wide, it was announced today.

American troops of Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth army smashed two enemy thrusts west of Venafro as the weather improved in that sector of the Italian front.

In the air war American heavy bombers pounded rail facilities on two sides of the Italian peninsula, hitting at Reggio near Genoa and at Rimini on the Adriatic coast. Meanwhile it was announced that at least 10 German bombers, including some Heinkel 177s, were blasted out of the sky early last night when a force of about 30 Naziz planes attacked an Allied convoy in the Mediterranean. The convoy suffered only slight damage.

Enemy infantry formations for an attack at the Mignano region of the Fifth Army front was broken up by heavy artillery fire from American batteries.

The Germans were reported to be installing new field fortifications on the slopes of Mount Campino and likewise entrenching themselves more deeply along both sides of the Via Salaria, the most direct road to Rome.

Strong forces of light and medium bombers pounded the enemy's front-line positions throughout the day yesterday, especially on the Eighth Army sector.

A coastal force was the target of Flying Fortress at Reggio and photographic showed the span probably was hit three times and rendered unserviceable for the present.

Fortress also attacked carloads at Rimini while Liberators bombed four railway bridges on the Adriatic coast.

German air attacks struck at railway yards, warehouses and docks at Ancona and last night RAF Wellingtons bombed railway bridges at Civitavecchia while fighter bombers, by day and night, attacked a small freighter north-west of Rome.

Without escort American bombers launched a heavy concentration of bombs in the center of Cassino, an important base for German troops retreating the main road to Rome.

PATTON CASE IS NOT CLOSED

Senate Committee Demands Fuller Explanations

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Soured by letters from aroused parents, the Senate Military Committee demanded today that the War Department explain an official invocation of the Patton soldier's name and release the details of any similar occurrences.

The committee had before it a report from Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, however, that he had expressed his "extreme displeasure" to Lt. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr. for upbraiding hospitalized soldier victims of battle nerves in "an unseemingly and unbecomingly" manner, ordered apologies which were made, and withheld a decision on relieving Patton from command of the seventh army.

Eisenhower gave every indication that he considered the case closed, as did Secretary of War Stimson in submitting the report, but committee members had different ideas.

One senator who declined use of his name said the group had asked for a full explanation of a statement issued by a military spokesman at Allied headquarters in Algiers last Monday, in which it was said Eisenhower had not reprimanded Patton, that no soldier had declined to carry out Patton's orders, and that the general still was in command of the seventh army.

HINTS TO TAXPAYERS

Babson Advises Readers To Analyze Tax Situation

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 27.—First, let me say a word to young business men who claim that they have not the opportunity of making a fortune which their elders had. They claim that at their age the money which their elders were permitted to save for a business nest egg is now taken by the government in the form of taxes. Let me say this is merely an alibi for laziness, inefficiency and extravagant ideas.

Severe Tax Benefit Young People Let us assume a man with a salary of \$3,000 who has a wife and two children. His Federal tax would be about \$350. It is true that he has this much less money to save or invest toward buying an interest in some business. On the other hand, although the net income, after taxes of the young executive is reduced by a tax of about 12 per cent, his employer would probably be obliged to pay a tax of 50 per cent to 75 per cent of his net income. This reduces the value of the business to the employer and causes him to sell it much cheaper than if these heavy taxes did not exist.

Before these federal taxes went into effect a man could die and leave his business outright to his family as the death taxes were very small. Today, however, in a great many cases the family is compelled to sell a part interest in the business in order to secure funds to pay the death taxes. This gives an excellent opportunity to young executives employed in the business to secure an interest at a very low price.

Low Money Rates Help the Young The present federal ceiling on interest rates enables young people today to buy a home or business and pay for it with an interest rate of perhaps only half what they would be obliged to pay before these taxes went into effect. I, myself, am a director of a bank which has today voted to loan a young man money at 3 per cent in order to buy an interest in a department store. This same money would have cost him 6 per cent 15 years ago.

Business success is not a matter of legislation; but rather of heredity, industry, integrity and vision. Whatever our system of government (Continued on Page Four)

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Peace talk is going around again. The Pope is reported acting as go-between for the Allies and Germany. Senator Downey of California says he has from unusually well-informed sources that influential Germans are seeking a way out. A member of Parliament suggests the German people be told just what they can expect from an armistice. Brendan Bracken, British Minister of Information, takes cognizance with a warning against misplaced optimism. Many reports so wild that they have not obtained publication have been current for some days.

There are reports of prospective conferences between Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin and possibly Chiang. Hitler's armies are relaying in Russia, and his Italian front more and more resembles a hopeless holding action. Allied observers estimate that three or four more raids like the recent big ones will wipe out Berlin, and Louis P. Lochner, who

spent many years there as an Associated Press correspondent, says elimination of Berlin will probably eliminate Germany as a belligerent.

There are bound to be a number of non-official Germans who seek a way out. Paul Kohn, an AP correspondent familiar with Franz von Papen, says in Ankara that a very shrewd diplomat can be expected to try to pull a Badoglio anytime he is in Germany—and he went there recently.

Careful observers were agreed long before it was voted with the announcement of Lord Halifax that anything can happen now. They are agreed with Senator Downey's "many leaders of Allied governments" that Germany's end could come by, or shortly after, Christmas.

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—For the first time a step toward streamlining Congress has been taken when the folks on Capitol Hill think has a chance of getting somewhere.

It's the Maloney-Monroe bill, simultaneously introduced in the Senate by Senator Francis Maloney, of Connecticut, and in the House by Rep. A. S. Mike Monroney of Oklahoma.

Briefly it would establish an absolutely bipartisan committee (three Democrats and three Republicans) to study ways and means and suggest legislation for overhauling the creaky congressional machinery. Broadly, the objectives would be to whittle the unwieldy committee system into an effective legislative instrument and to establish a better working relationship between Congress and the executive departments and bureaus.

Ever since we entered this war there has been growing alarm on the hill at the ineffectiveness of the legislative branch. Frequently, Congress has stumbled over its own big feet and it has been pretty apparent that the reason was because it is wound up in the red tape of outmoded customs, rules and self-regulations.

Nearly every member of the House and Senate has recognized this state of affairs, but every effort to improve it has been tossed into the discard by Congressional leaders who are afraid reorganization would jack off the privileges and prestige they enjoy now.

For example, what members of the Military and Naval Affairs Committees would be willing to see their present rickety box cars made over into tear-drop streamliners in which only a few of them could ride?

How far in the wrong direction our government has gone is pointed out by Congressman Monroney in the fact that the American people pay only half as much for maintaining Congress, which makes all our laws and is the people's main check on the executive and judicial branches, as they pay for maintaining the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The annual appropriation for Congress, including salaries, clerical hire and all other expenditures is about \$13,000,000. This is, Monroney says, no slap at the Indian Bureau.

Another example is the hard working House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, which handles all our laws regulating transportation and trade. It has to deal every year with thousands of attorneys, yet doesn't have one on its staff. Only rarely do the committees have funds to hire.

Whether the present bill will get anywhere remains to be seen, but Monroney, who has been studying the matter for a year and a half, and Senator Maloney who, Monroney says, really wrote the bill, think it will especially since it's bipartisan.

The authors already have anticipated opponents by saying that somebody will probably dub it the Maloney-Monroney-Baloney bill but already a lot of serious minded members of Congress think it's far from that.

German people might respond to individuals.

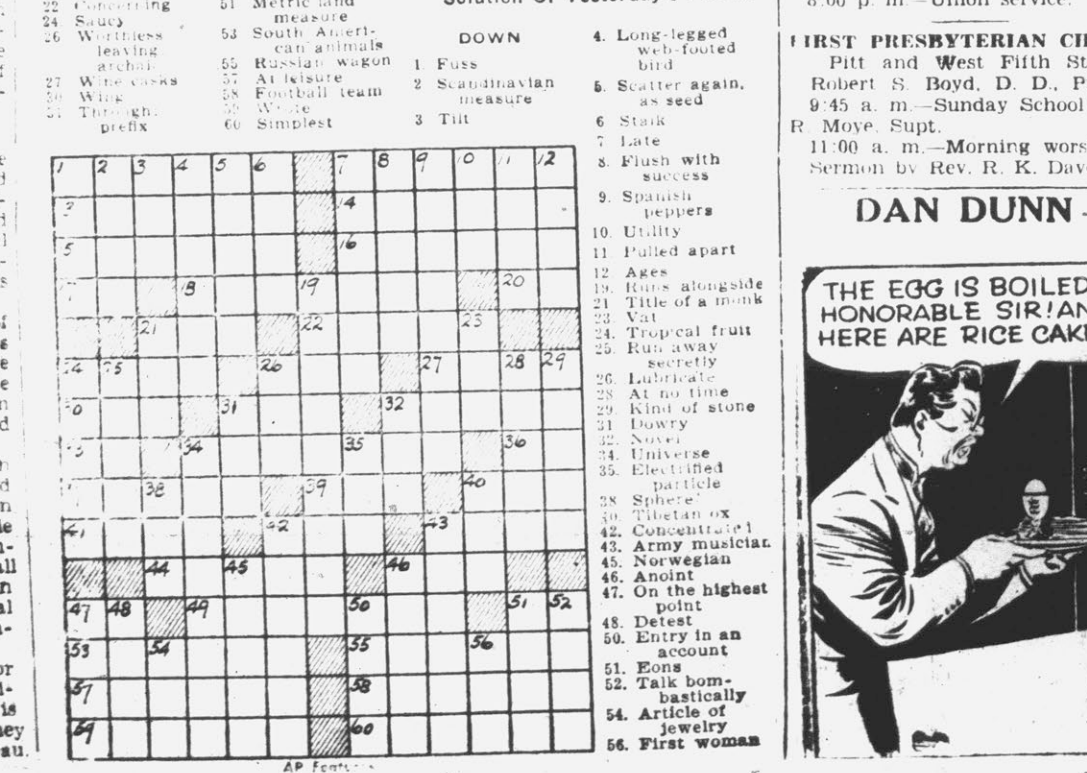

asked also for information as to any other incidents of this nature in which Patton might have been involved or in which any other staff officer might have been guilty of the same conduct. Eisenhower's report was the first official disclosure that Patton had upbraided two nerve patients, instead of one.

His investigation convinced him, Eisenhower said, that the men themselves felt that Patton had done "a splendid overall job" in his driving direction of the victorious army in Sicily and that "no great harm had been done" by his outbursts of temper.

Asserting that Patton had been greeted with "thunderous applause" by his men on subsequent appearance, Eisenhower indicated plainly that he could not afford to lose a map of "unquestioned value as commander of an assault force."

Chairman Reynolds (D-N.C.) said the committee will meet next week to consider the Eisenhower report, which he added "by no means closes this matter," a view with which Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) agreed.

The Army and Navy Journal, unofficial but authoritative service publication, praised Patton's accomplishments but declared that any officers guilty of undermining a "state of discipline based on mutual respect" should be relieved instantly of command.

The Army and Navy Register, another unofficial service publication, said in an editorial:

"Another regrettable affair in the army must be attributed to the desire to suppress news. If the incident . . . had promptly been disposed of and a truthful statement issued from the headquarters of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Allied command, it probably would have been passed by as a happening following the difficult campaign in Sicily when nerves of officers and men had been severely strained. Instead, an effort was made to suppress the story although it was known to a number of people."

through an escape corridor narrowed to 50 miles.

Two other Red armies were reported moving in for the kill. One, thrusting toward Zhitobin from the southwest, had reached Davidovka, the war bulletin said, and another was surging down from the north from the Propiska area to complete a pincer which threatened to cut the escape railway at Zhitobin junction.

Other Soviet forces were cleaning up in the Rechitsa area, west of Gomel.

(Moscow dispatches to London said that 20 German divisions—possibly 300,000 men—faced entrapment.)

Kokosovskiy's armies today were advancing on a wide front behind the retreating Germans. His vanguards were less than 150 miles from the old Polish border, 300 miles from Pusk and 400 miles from Erast-Litovsk. Warsaw lay 115 miles further west on the road to Berlin. His forces to the north were within 120 miles of Minsk, principal city on the Moscow-Warsaw main rail route.

"But we'll improve our technique," Carlson said. "We learned a lot."

"Our naval guns and aerial bombardment was not more effective because of the excellent engineering job done by the Japs. They had raid shelters built from coconut logs filled with coral sand and pilberes and block houses made of concrete. They went inside and were perfectly safe during bombings unless it was a direct hit."

((This explains why the 7th Army Air Force bomber pilots reported Betio appeared lightly manned but the Marines found the island heavily defended by 4,000 first line Jap Marines.)

"It was difficult to see where our assault troops were," Carlson explained. "They actually mingled with the Japs at some places. They suffered heavy casualties and were rather disorganized in some places. They'd get a toehold and just hang on. Those boys were mostly buck privates. Because officers led the assault casualties among officers were very high and the boys were on their own."

"It was a terrifying sight and raised the admiration of those boys to a peak. They deployed in the water. They were under heavy mortar fire. Yet they moved right on. We couldn't have the supporting fire of our ships at this point because it was impossible to keep them informed where our boys were."

"At the end of the first day we had a small beachhead at three points of a depth of not more than 150 yards."

"The crisis was passed the second night but the going was still tough," he added. The capture of the island was effected after three days.

Asked how it was possible for the Marines to secure beachheads against such firepower, the colonel said:

"It boils down to this—determination. Determination and understanding by the men of the need to do the job and what is necessary to do the job."
