A-26's delivered a heavy attack on
the airport and railroad yards at
Grosseto, 80 miles north of Rome,
and American Mitchell's laid out a
pattern bombing of roads, railways
and bridges at a communications
center on the Adriatic coast.

A few hours earlier RAF bombers
made a night attack on harbor in-
stallations at Pescara, hitting a
railway junction and starting sev-
eral fires.
The German airforce, which had
been much in evidence over the bat-
tle lines and had opposed Allied
bombing raids for behind the front
over the week-end, failed to appear
in strength yesterday.

Intense flak was reported around
Orlando.

more southern of Dnepropetrovsk
and below Kremenchuk, inflicting
heavy manpower losses on the ene-
my material. Red army armen-
my and capturing much valuable
shot down 34 German planes and
bombed concentrations of troops
and trains at Apostolovo, the com-
munications said.

In the bitterly contested Kiev
bulge, Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's first
Ukrainian army buried back heavy
new German attacks north and east
of Zhitomir, in the Chernyakhov
and Brulov areas. The Soviet
communications reported 800 Nazis
killed and 56 tanks destroyed.

Germany and Interim missions on
Nazi airfields in France and Hol-
land were carried out without a
loss.

A communiqué also disclosed
yesterday that American, Australian
medium bombers and RAF Typhoons
hammered Nazi airbases in Bel-
gium while British Mosquitos at-
tacked an uncompleted railway cen-
ter in northwest Germany. RAF
airmen also blasted enemy shipping
off Brest.

Allied losses in all these operations
were listed officially as 13 heavy
bombers—Flying Fortresses—and 14
fighters, of which 16 were American.
A total of 45 enemy aircraft were
reported destroyed—35 during the
assault on Bremen.

Flying Fortresses which made the
800-mile round trip to Bremen en-
countered temperatures of 65 de-
grees below in the stratosphere.
It was the coldest weather the
American bomber crews have en-
dured in this theater and returning
airmen described the extreme icing
conditions which they encountered
as more of a hazard than the few
German planes which challenged
them.

The bomber crews were enthusi-
astic about the protection afforded
by the swarms of American fighters
which accompanied them.
"I never saw so many P-47s and
P-38s as were with us today," said
Capt. Rodney E. Snow of James-
town, N. C., pilot of the Fortress
"Holy Terror."

mum food production, and that they
had fostered inflationary trends by
absorbing part of the "normal" in-
creases in retail food prices that
consumers should have been called
upon to bear out of increased war-

A proposal to limit government
food subsidy outlays to \$1,250,000-
000 a year and to predicate their
continuance on retention of the
Little Steel wage formula was de-
bated by Senator Ellender (D-La.)
as the first congressional bid for a
compromise with the administration
on the subsidy battle.

Ellender put forward his peace
plan as a mix-up over procedure
threatened for a time to delay the
Senate Banking Committee hear-
ings on the bill to abolish subsidies.
He announced he would offer his
\$1,250,000,000 subsidy limitation plan
as an amendment to the bill which
the House passed extending the life
of the Commodity Credit Corpora-

east to make up for the slack in an-

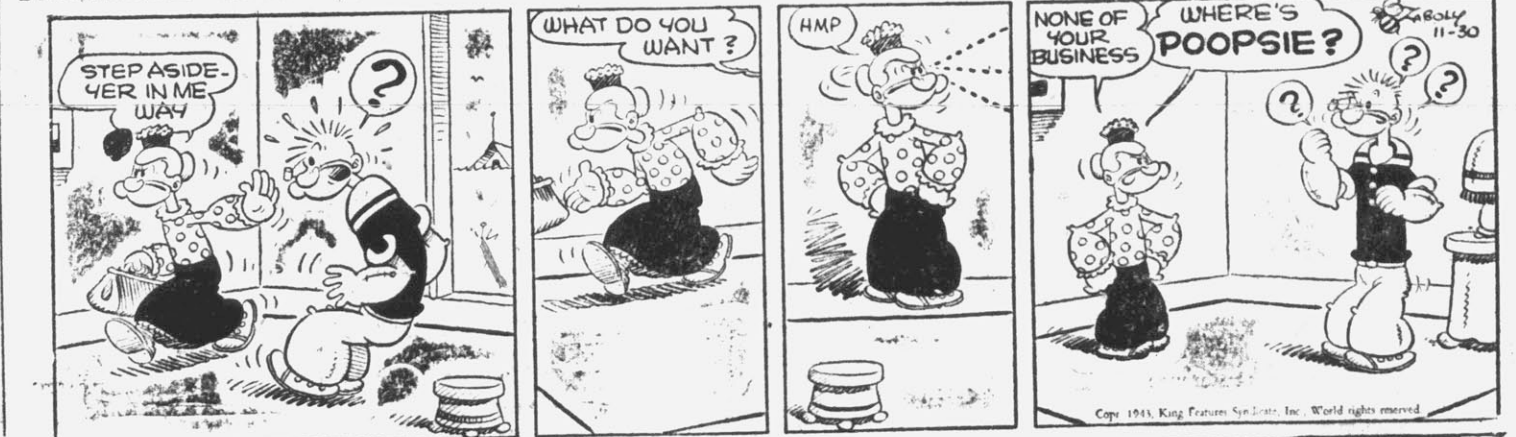

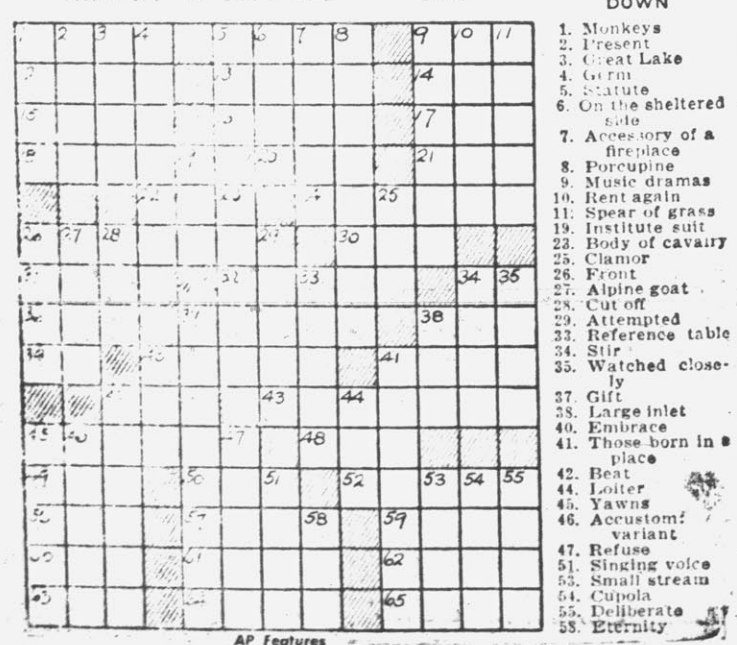
Crossword Puzzle

PRESIDENT MEADOWS SPEAKS AT ASSEMBLY

President Leon R. Meadows, speaking this morning at the college assembly on "Education for Victory and Peace," said that since this is, by Hitler's most recent declaration, a war to end only with the total defeat of the German people or their absolute victory, the country cannot afford to let up now, but must consider its education, along with its other activities, in the light of its contribution to victory and the peace to follow.

In discussing several things that need to be striven toward now by the person who wishes to be educated, Dr. Meadows emphasized the sacrifices which are necessary for the war effort, and said that people must school themselves to make cheerfully the little sacrifices of material goods, as well as the greater ones needed.

Discipline, he said, particularly self-discipline, is badly needed in both war and peace. The truly educated person has learned to make himself do what he needs to even when he does not want to.

He spoke of conservation, particularly in the field of health, as one important part of education, citing figures to show that the nation lost 13 million work days last year from one common illness alone, and conservation in time, saying that each person now has a double task to

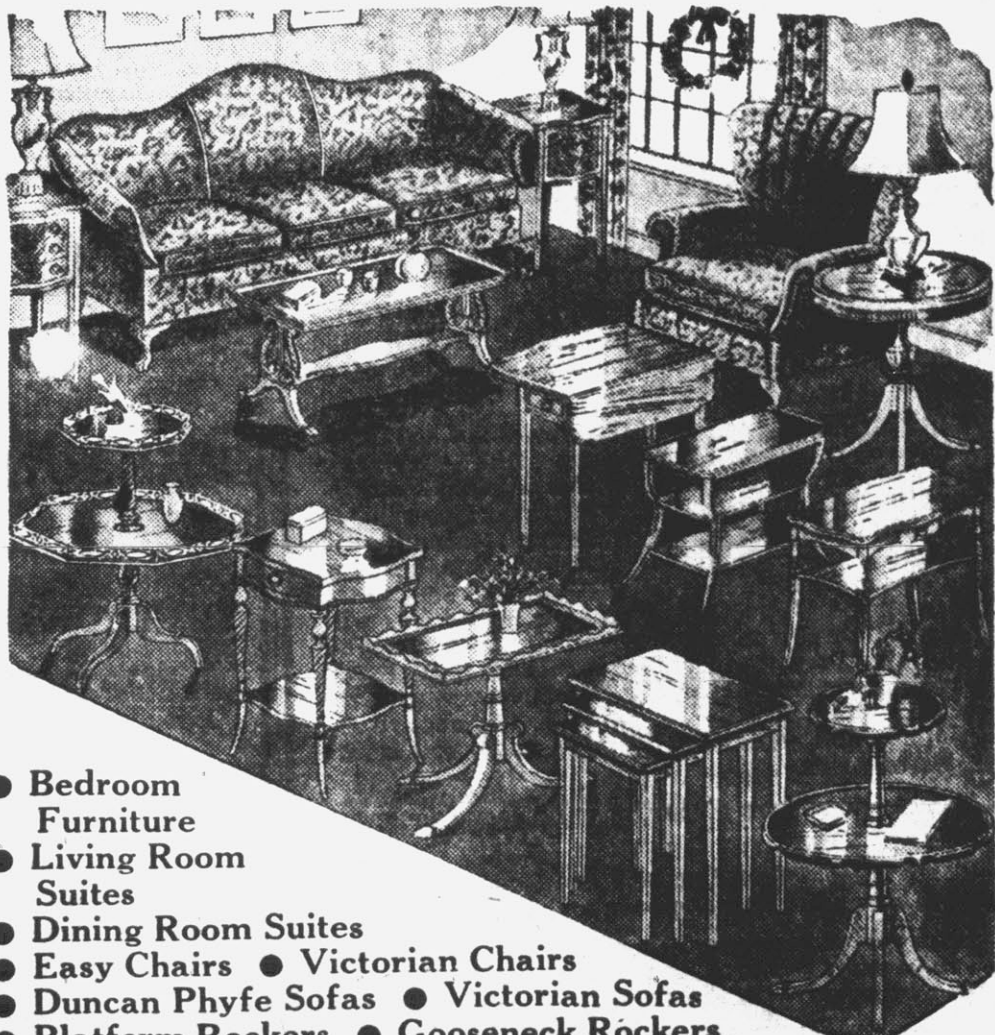
