Fierce Nazi Attacks To Restore Tumbling Dnieper River Lines

Germans Recapture Important Rail Junction Of Korosten; Massed Nazi Counter- Attacks In White Russia And Ukraine Sectors Reported

Moscow, Dec. 1.—(AP)—

German forces, struggling to restore their shattered Dnieper river lines, have intensified their counter-attacks in the Ukraine and have stiffened their resistance in White Russia, advances from the front indicated today.

By capturing Korosten, which the Red army evacuated Tuesday under orders to accept a more favorable line of defense, the Germans scored their second major success in the Ukraine since they began their heavy counter-attacks early in November.

Despite the German recapture of the strategic railway junction of Zhitomir and Korosten, the important lateral railway line connecting Leningrad and Odessa still is cut at Ovruch and Yelk, both firmly in Russian hands.

In the north, the Germans fought back fiercely on both banks of the Dnieper south of Zhitomir, attempting to maintain a bridgehead in the Gomei region, but exact for the loss of Korosten, the Red army continued its gradual progress on all active sectors along the 600-mile-long front.

(The German) communists said the Nazis were attacking at Kherston at the mouth of the Dnieper and in the Cherkassy area of the great bend, Russian attacks northeast of Krivoi Rog and southwest of Kremenich were reported repelled.

The strongly reinforced German army appeared intent upon restoring lost lines of communication, particularly the Odessa-Leningrad railroad. Reserves were reported coming to the front from the west over railroads through Germany and Poland and they have been deployed over large sections of the front.

Some of the greatest battles of the war now are in progress in the Korosten and Zhitomir sectors west of Kiev. Both sides are expending great numbers of men and machines and fighting in some of the year's worst mud.

Bad weather has diminished air support over the whole front, just at a time when the Red army had achieved and was exploiting air superiority.

Government Will Hold Southern Coal Mines

Washington, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes has promised John L. Lewis that the government will not restore southern coal mines to their owners until they join in a general wage contract containing the Ickes-Lewis agreement under which miners now are paid.

Lewis, on the strength of the promise, set down today with northern and western soft coal operators to write such a contract.

Ickes asked them to finish the job within two or three days. The operators, when the contract is signed, expect to get their seized properties back from the government.

The southerners—from West Virginia, Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee and Alabama—now are outside the conference doors because they refused to accept the present arrangement whereby miners are paid at a special rate for underground travel time, assumed to be 45 minutes a day.

MEAT POINTS ARE REDUCED

New Schedule To Go
Into Effect
Sunday

Washington, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The OPA today announced a substantial cut in beef point values. The new schedule is effective Sunday.

The entire list of rationed beef items, ranging from Porterhouse steak to hamburger, will be cut from two to three ration points.

Many pork cuts remain at the reduced value set by OPA in mid-November. The new schedule is effective Sunday.

Both butter and margarine remain at their present point values, 16 points and six points a pound, respectively.

Numerous beef cuts are listed in the new table at or near the relatively low point values of last spring. Porterhouse steak will cost nine points a pound under the new schedule, as against 12 at present; top round, ten points, as compared with 13; the ten-inch rib roast, six against nine; rump, five against eight.

Hamburger will cost six points, a reduction of one point.

The schedule effects fairly sharp increases in point values for all types of cheeses and major canned fish items.

American cheese is raised two points to ten a pound, while cream cheese is boosted three points to eight points a pound. Such types as Munster and Brie will cost eight points up two from the November table.

With the exception of oysters, all rationed canned fish is raised four points to a total of 16 a pound. Oysters are dropped one point to four a pound.

Lard is reduced one point to two points a pound. Shortening and salad and cooking oils remain unchanged at five points a pound.

Four-Point Plan Urged By Wilkie

Cheverne Wyo., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Wendell L. Wilkie's four-point program, which he urged Republicans last night to consider for the 1944 campaign.

1. Modification of income taxes "so the ordinary fellow may have enough seed corn to plant the corn of tomorrow."

2. A regulatory system that will limit the flow of capital.

3. Changing the relationship of government to the people, "so people will feel responsibility toward the government, rather than think of it as a grab bag for what they can get out of it."

4. Restoration of "the moral aspects of American life and government."

U.S. BOMBERS BLAST NAZIS

Western Germany
And France Fortress
Targets Today

London, Dec. 1.—(AP)—American heavy bombers in their third assault in three days, bombed western Germany again today while Marauder mediums made the operation an American double-header by battering airfields in northern France.

The daylight attacks made it the fourth day of uninterrupted round-the-clock bombing of Germany itself. Monday it was Bremen, Tuesday it was Cologne, and today it was the Ruhr. The daylight raids came in conjunction with both day and night attacks by RAF Mosquitos on Germany.

The heavy bombers were supported by United States and RAF fighters and the mediums were escorted by RAF Dominions and Allied fighters.

Specific targets were not announced immediately. The new peak of intensity in the aerial warfare across the channel reflected the German inability to break up daylight bombing with their new rocket guns or any other means.

It was the second raid by the mediums in three days.

Today's attacks topped off the Allies' best air offensive month with 21 major USAF and RAF raids from Britain pouring down a record month's bomb weight, including 13,000 tons by the RAF on Germany alone.

Believe New Blows At Axis Being Discussed

Momentous Decisions Expected From Reported Conferences Of Heads Of United Nations

Washington, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Mighty new blows against the enemy, as well as physical blows—are confidently expected from the epochal conversations now reported in progress among the highest Allied leaders.

Washington authorities, in guarded speculation on what such talks might accomplish, emphasized today that the primary concern of President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill, Marshal Stalin and Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek must be agreement on measures for winning the war.

Above and beyond this lie the intangible benefits which political observers here believe are to be gained from close personal relationships among the Allied government chiefs and their ranking staff officers.

Such relations, they say, frequently have reconciled highly divergent views on strategy and policy.

That the meetings are under way was reported in a Reuters dispatch from Lisbon yesterday which said Roosevelt, Churchill and Chiang Kai-Shek already had concluded a long session in Cairo preliminary to a meeting with Stalin in Iran.

Another dispatch from Stockholm reported that the U. S. ambassador to Turkey, Laurence A. Steinhardt, had left Ankara by air to Tehran, capital of Iran.

The first three-way discussions among the British, Soviet and American leaders are expected to lead to closest coordination of strategy in the final drives to smash Germany as well as for the solution of postwar international problems underlined by the recent Moscow conference of foreign ministers.

Similar results it is believed here may be expected from any discussions in which Chiang Kai-Shek and his staff men participate.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

If the Allies could for a moment understand the German mind, they would have the solution of the world problem.

That question is of special interest at this time because of the flood of peace speculation and the rumors in London that Messrs. Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin may give the Hitlerites an ultimatum which will include a demand for capitulation.

An immediate termination of the war would in many ways be a good thing. But would it actually save lives and suffering in the long run?

I think we must stop here to consider whether peace before the German Reich has been grounded in the mill of war, would merely result in another world conflagration which would be even more destructive than this one.

One of the chief reasons we are saddled with world war number two is because Germany suffered no physical hurt in the last one.

In this war the Reich is getting a taste of the battle-field, thanks to the Allied air force. Still, while there has been heavy loss to civilian life in the bombings, and the devastation has been great, Germany has not received the punishment necessary to her reform.

We must not forget that when we have performed the task of crushing Hitlerism and Prussian militarism, we have only started on the reform of Germany—the trouble-maker of Europe. We still have to change the mentality of the Prussian race.

Many military and political problems which have had to be solved by joint action of the Allies in Europe are only now coming into focus in the Pacific. In this connection it is significant that conference between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill in the past have resulted ultimately in considerable action.

One point on which all the Allies involved in the Pacific war seem agreed is that when Japan finally is defeated she must be reduced to a minor island power. This was made clear in President Roosevelt's September 17 speech to Congress in which he declared that the United Nations will deprive her of authority over the mandated islands of the Pacific and the same thing holds good in the case of the vast territories which Japan has stolen from China starting long before this war began.

The President also laid down in that speech the military principle that the "forces operating against Japan are just as much interrelated and dependent on each other as are the forces pouncing against Germany in Europe."

The weak link in the chain of interdependence is China because her huge resources in manpower are cut off from anything more than a trickle of supplies from the United States and Great Britain. It seems certain, therefore, that strategic considerations of the three powers are able jointly to defeat Japan must be concerned first with ways of clearing a supply route into China.

December Liquor Quota Increased

Raleigh, Dec. 1.—(AP)—A half pint increase in the value of the first four coupons in the new liquor ration book has been ordered by the State Board of Alcoholic Control.

This was announced yesterday by Chairman Carl Williamson, who said the increase was made possible by the recent acquisition of extra merchandise.

Consumers will receive two pints, one quart or one fifth of Scotch or domestic liquor for the first two coupons. Coupons three and four will get the consumer two pints, two tenths or one quart of whiskey, or one fifth of brandy, rum, gin or cordials.

Williamson said whether the increased ration would be in effect in January and subsequently would depend upon the condition of ABC stocks and the ability to continue purchasing increased amounts of merchandise.

The ration recently had been reduced to one half pint per coupon.

Hongkong Raided

New York, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The Tokyo radio, in a broadcast received by U. S. government monitors, asserted that more than 10 Allied bombers and fighter planes raided Hong Kong today. "Only negligible damage" was caused, the broadcast added.

That brings us back to our original question—whether an immediate peace would be a good thing, it could be had. Naturally our first thought is that we desire peace as soon as we can force unconditional surrender. We want our soldier boys back home.

Still, I think most of us will hope that, pending the inevitable surrender of the enemy, we shall find the time to blast Berlin and many other German cities to dust.

Many of us will hope to see Allied armies criss-crossing the Reich and our tanks grinding through fields which have bred generations of German soldiers but have never experienced war in modern times.

Allied Forces Advance At Both Ends Italian Front

NEW LANDING BY AMERICANS

Japs Claim Several
More U. S. War-
ships Sunk

London, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The Tokyo radio announced today that American forces had made a new landing at Cape Torking on the west coast of Bougainville island, some distance north of Empress Augusta Bay where the original bridgehead was established.

The broadcast, recorded by Reuters, said the troops came ashore in six large landing barges under cover of a bombardment by cruisers and destroyers.

The landing apparently was carried out near the mouth of the Laruma river.

The Japanese said their defenses had "annihilated two companies" of the landing forces. There was no immediate confirmation of the reported landings from Allied sources.

Another Tokyo broadcast, recorded by the Associated Press in New York, quoted an imperial headquarters communiqué as saying that Japanese naval aircraft had sunk two Allied aircraft carriers and another unidentified warship east of the Gilbert islands on the night of Nov. 29. A large cruiser also was sunk, the communiqué said.

It was wholly unconfirmed by any Allied reports on shipping losses. The Japanese acknowledged the loss of six planes.

It was announced from Allied headquarters in the southwest Pacific Nov. 26 that additional Allied troops had established a new beachhead on Bougainville near the mouth of the Piva river, three miles from the original landing point.

It was not clear whether the Japanese broadcast today referred to the same action.

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The fall of Bouza, a small town on the main Japanese supply line on Huon Peninsula, New Guinea, to Australian troops was announced today by General Douglas MacArthur.

The Australians, moving up the northeastern corner of the peninsula from Minschhafen, occupied Bouza Nov. 29 without opposition and also took the village of Guskia and established positions at the mouth of the Kallang river on the south bank.

They were obliged, however, to wipe out enemy opposition before reaching the river.

The coastal advance developed into one of a pincer movement with the capture of Bouza moving westward along the south bank of the Kallang river toward Waro, which is the objective of another Allied force pushing northward from Sattelberg in the interior.

Groups Inside Germany Put Out Peace Feelers

London, Dec. 1.—(AP)—A junta of old-line professional German soldiers, supported by many Junker industrialists, agrarians and diplomats, is understood to be awaiting the opportune moment to overthrow Hitler's government in hopes of wrangling peace terms which would leave enough of German militarism to form the core of a new world conquest.

This group, according to reports from inside Germany, already has made informal armistice overtures, which were not regarded by the Allies as tenders at all and which were dismissed without discussion because they did not originate formally with the German government and because they fell far short of the United Nations unconditional surrender formula.

Warnings against Germany's peace balloons have been given by Secretary of State Cordell Hull, British Minister of Information Brendan Bracken and others, and it is highly questionable that the

CHINESE GAIN NEW VICTORY

Japs Driven From
Gateway City Of
Changteh

Chungking, Dec. 1.—(AP)—American and Chinese planes, providing brilliant air cover, helped Chinese troops drive the Japanese from Changteh, the gateway to Changsha and the nations vital "rice bowl" region. Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's headquarters announced tonight. Japanese forces had entered the city Monday.

The Chinese also claimed the recapture of Teshan on the highway between Changteh and Changsha in Hunan province and wiped out most of the Japanese troops in two nearby villages.

Two Chinese columns, by-passing Changteh with the evident intention of surrounding the invading forces around the city meanwhile, converged on the highway north of Linli, little more than 20 miles north of Changteh. A major portion of the Japanese troops there was withdrawn.

Gen. Yu Cheng-wan, latest Chinese hero of the Asiatic war, personally directed the bloody fighting (Continued on Page Six)

British Eighth Army Smashes Eastern Anchor Of German Winter Line In Drive Beyond Sangro River; Fifth Army Advances Three Miles

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The British Eighth Army slashed forward beyond captured Sangro ridge with the heaviest air support of the Italian campaign. Allied headquarters announced today, and marked up advances all along the line of one to three miles in fierce hand-to-hand fighting.

(The Algiers radio said the Eighth army had captured Lanciano, six miles beyond the Sangro and only about 18 miles from Pescara.

Castel Frignano and Casoli, the latter at the southwestern end of Sangro ridge, also were captured, the Algiers station said in a broadcast heard by Reuters.

In the central sector American troops of the Fifth army dashed forward three miles west of Montaquila through dense mine fields and great twisted masses of barbed wire. It was the first time in the Mediterranean warfare that barbed wire had been used so extensively by the Germans in the manner of the first World War.

"It is apparent that the Germans are not overlooking any trick, old or new," a military commentator said.

Liberators of the 15th air force swung into action in a raid to the northern tip of the Adriatic which hit Fiume its first aerial blow of the year.

by the Germans from Yugoslav partisans in a violent battle soon after the Italian armistice, has been transformed by Marshal Erwin Rommel into one of his most important bases for Balkan operations.

The advance by Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's warriors was made with the support of the British destroyers Quilliam and Loyal which shelled Nazi positions from the sea as well as by waves of planes which made the otherwise solid German positions shake with detonations of explosives.

which asked these concessions in return for the overthrow of Hitler:

- 1—Guarantees that Germany would be occupied by forces from the west or United Nations under a joint American-British command—precaution against Russian occupation.
- 2—Guarantees that Germany would be permitted to retain a re-

3—Guarantees that Germany would be allowed the right of economic rehabilitation.

Hitler, aware of the existence of this group but unable to wipe it out because of its strength, is said to be playing it off against the Nazi party and generals like Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, General Alfred Jodl, General Kurt Zeitzler and Admiral Karl Doenitz, chief of the German fleet.

One peace offer is said to have come from a group supported by some of Hitler's own tools. Directed at certain circles in Russia, it proposed an end to the war on the

eastern front, with the Germans withdrawing to the 1939 frontier line in Poland and concluding economic-military agreements with Russia, to keep Britain out of Europe. This same group is also said to have made an armistice proposal to Britain, which would allow Germany to concentrate on Russia.

BIG SOULS FOR BIG DAYS

We are living in the midst of great days, and we must meet them in a great spirit. History is being made in the weeks and months through which we are passing and note their importance. It may well be that boys and girls in school five hundred years from now may have to learn, as assigned dates in history, quite a few dates through which we have passed, or through which we will pass in the coming year.

An old order is passing, and a new order is being born. We shall never go back to the pre-war world again. This does not mean that the kingdom of heaven lies just across the threshold. We shall have to pass through tremendous chaos and suffering before we can get to a better one. But nations of the world are not passing through and not be changed internally and externally.

Changed methods of transportation always have a prodigious effect upon the life of mankind. We are only sixty hours from the farthest place on earth today, and engineers promise that we will be only thirty hours in a few years hence. Much of the old physical structure of society has been destroyed by battles and bombings. In the midst of war, science, under the spur of necessity, has jumped ahead immeasurably.

Shall we have souls big enough to meet these new conditions? Nothing is so terrible as for unworthy people to inherit great responsibilities. Shall we prove big enough to face them intelligently?

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—Unless you are on the ground, it is difficult to understand the intensity of the battle over subsidies.

I doubt if there has been present in Washington in recent years any larger or more active lobby than that fighting subsidies. One exhausted Congressman who had been in the thick of the subsidy scrap told me he believed there were "at least several hundred" anti-subsidy group representatives in the capital.

Mostly they are speaking for farm organizations, dairy men and cattle raisers. From the outset, subsidy proponents in Congress admitted their defeat on passage of the bill which would end all Commodity Credit Corporation financed subsidies Dec. 3. Their objective is simply to marshal enough strength to sustain the President's veto of the bill, which also is considered a certainty. If that happens, Congress will merely be going over the same ground it did earlier in the year.

In view of all this some Congressmen are surprised that the public generally has shown so little interest in the subsidy battle. "I don't believe that it is so difficult to understand. In the first place, it's a rather dull subject. In the second, it's one of those economic matters, any discussion of which almost immediately flies off into the realm of theory."

In Canada particularly and in England too, subsidies have been applied to hold the inflation line.

A subsidy is a payment by the government of a portion of the cost of any article. If for example the price of butter to the dairy is to be 45 cents a pound, yet the price has to be held to that level to the consumer, then the government steps in and pays the distributor enough, say five cents, to make it possible for him to meet both prices.

Those figures are, of course, hypothetical and the actual administration of subsidies is much more complicated. The objectives primarily are (1) to hold down the cost of living and thus head off demands for higher wages in other words, preventing inflation; (2) to stimulate production of needed products; and (3) in some instances to roll back prices which have gotten out of line.

interior force as it crossed the Song river in its drive toward Wareo, the western terminus of the supply trail to Bonga.

Allied naval and air units helped the ground forces in the Bonga occupation, the planes bombing Japanese aviation facilities at Cape Gloucester, western-most point of New Britain island which is east of Huon peninsula, and light warships bombarding the Sio enemy plane and barge area to the north of Bonga.

Twenty-nine Mitchell and Marauder medium bombers with an escort of 12 Airacobra fighters dropped 46 tons of bombs on the Cape Gloucester airstrip and supply dumps, setting fires and pinning potential aerial aid to the Huon Japanese to the ground.

It was the first time that light warships in this case probably destroyed, had ventured up the Vitiaz strait to Sio. The attack was staged the night of Nov. 29.

Another force composed of six Liberator bombers made a Nov. 29 foray on Manokwari on the northern coast of Dutch New Guinea. They met anti-aircraft fire but damaged shipping in the harbor and bombed the Nabire airdrome.

Japanese forward positions around Empress Augusta bay at Bougainville island, in the northern Solomons, were pestered by six Mitchell bombers as an aid to Marines and soldiers whose efforts to widen the beachhead established there Nov. 1 have met stiff opposition from the jungle-hidden enemy.

Sports Roundup

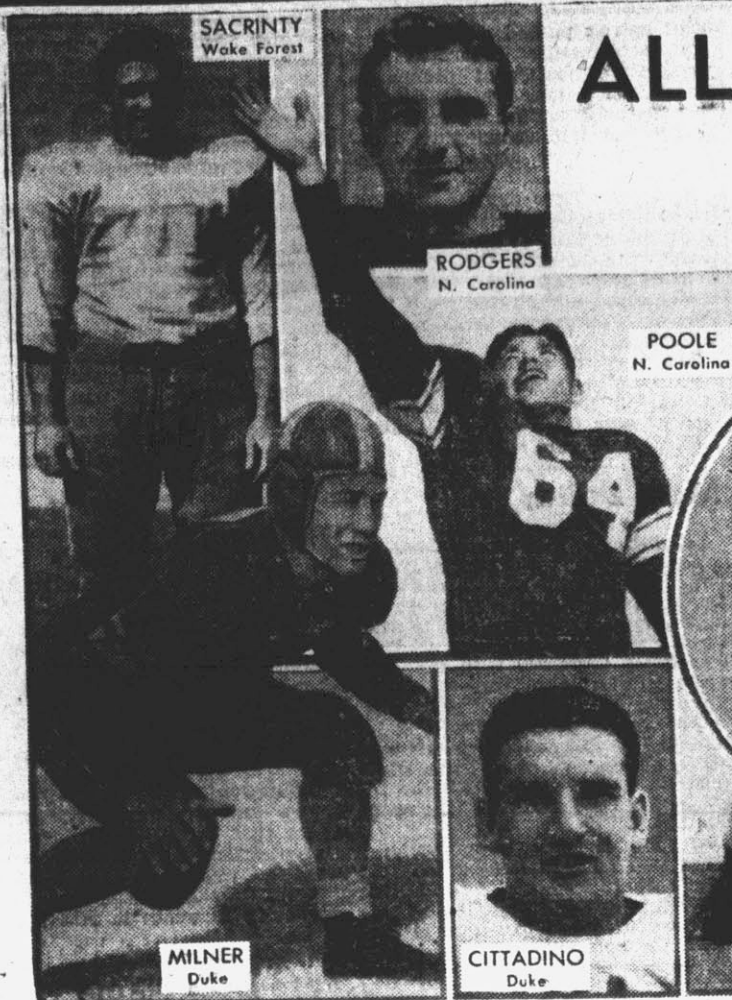

The U. S. Eighth Airforce cut October's average loss by two-thirds—to eight bombers per raid—against weakening German resistance. Its total November loss was 39 bombers.

Air Minister Sir Archibald Sinclair told the House of Commons today that since the beginning of the year the USAF has lost 289 bombers over Europe compared with the RAF's loss of 2,083 at night and 106 by day.

The morning foray followed close on the heels of another night attack on western Germany by the RAF's fleet Mosquito bombers.

Beaufighters of the Royal Canadian Airforce also attacked an enemy convoy off the Norwegian coast last night, damaging two merchant vessels, and mines were laid in enemy waters, an Air Ministry communiqué said.

The overnight forays were carried out without the loss of a single plane, the announcement declared.

In man-to-man fighting many a bitterly resisting German pocket that had been left isolated by the Eighth army tide was mopped up by British, Indian and New Zealand patrols.
