Last German Stronghold On Middle Dnieper Falls

Stalin Announces Capture Of Cherkassy In Order Of The Day; Soviet Forces Holding Initiative Along Entire Front From Kiev to Kremenchug

London, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Cherkassy, the last remaining German stronghold on the middle Dnieper river between Kremenchug and Kiev, fell today to the charging Red army.

Marshal Joseph Stalin announced the victory in an order of the day broadcast by Moscow radio.

The new Soviet triumph of arms came as Gen. Nikolai (Lightning) Vatutin's first Ukrainian army turned the die against Field Marshal Fritz von Manstein in the bloody battle of the Kiev bulge.

Cherkassy is a strategic river port on the main railway linking Minsk and Gomel with Odessa on the Black Sea. Its capture paves the way for the junction of Russian forces operating out of the Kremenchug bridgehead with those on the southern edge of the Kiev salient.

The reluctance of the Germans to evacuate Cherkassy was emphasized by the desperate and extremely costly battle they fought to cling to this Dnieper port of 50,000 population, the outskirts of which were reached and by-passed on Nov. 19 by the Red army.

After several weeks of bitter fighting in the Cherkassy area, which was successfully sustained against many times superior tank and infantry formations, the German command last night withdrew German garrison forces from Cherkassy to shortened and more favorable positions," said the broadcast.

Other Red army forces continue to advance toward the important German-held base of Korovograd, beating off fierce tank assaults, capturing several towns and killing 600 German officers and men, the Russian communiqué said.

Powerful Russian guerrilla forces operating behind the German lines in the Kiev bulge have captured two railway stations near Zhitomir 40 miles southwest of the Marlin sector, the bulletin declared.

The guerrillas also forced four German military trains loaded with troops and supplies, presumably reserved for Marshal Fritz von Manstein's army, and killed more than 400 Nazi troops. The guerrillas are still holding the stations, the bulletin added.

Field dispatches said the Russians were holding the initiative at virtually every point along the 200-mile long Kiev-Kremenchug front and German counter blows in the Kiev bulge apparently were ebbing.

Von Manstein reportedly had hurled as many as 2,000 tanks into the battle and in less than four weeks he had driven more than 30 miles from Korosten to within 55 miles of Kiev itself. Vatutin's lines held, however, and Saturday he launched his counter offensive.

Front dispatches to the newspaper Pravda indicated that Soviet Storm-ovik bombers, in the air again after weeks of bad weather, were playing a decisive part in turning the tide in favor of Vatutin's army.

Belgians Executed
London, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The Germans have announced the execution of nine Belgians and two Frenchmen for sheltering Allied airmen. The Belgian news agency said today. Ten Belgians were hanged at Antwerp on charges of sabotage and assault with explosives and firearms.

Promises Hard Blows Against The Japs Soon
Washington, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Secretary of the Navy Knox predicted today "hard blows" against the Japanese in the Pacific in the near future.

"We are getting stronger and stronger," he told a news conference. "The preliminaries are out of the way. We are getting ready to drive home some hard blows."

He gave no indication of where the might of the United States fleet could be expected to strike.

CHINESE GAIN NEW VICTORIES

Smashing Successes In Rice Bowl Region

Chungking, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Smashing Chinese successes in the nation's rice bowl region were claimed today by the high command which announced the recapture of the important highway town of Linli, 25 miles north of Chungking, and a number of villages.

Earlier press dispatches which said the Chinese had re-taken Shihmen, 40 miles northwest of Chungking, were confirmed and the communiqué added that a Japanese detachment had been destroyed.

"I am shocked and grieved to learn of the death of your distinguished husband, whose warm friendship I have cherished through so many years and whose life of service as physician, citizen and public-spirited leader has won for him a great host of friends throughout the state. His death is a great loss to North Carolina and I regret that illness will prevent my coming to Greenville. Mrs. Broughton joins with me in expressing to you and the members of your family our heartfelt sympathy."

The meeting was largely attended and the food handlers readily offered their cooperation.

SWARTZ TALKS TO ROTARIANS

Reviews Accomplishments Of Local Utilities

Martin Swartz, superintendent of Greenville Utilities, Inc., guest speaker at the Rotary Club's weekly supper meeting last night, gave an interesting narrative history of Greenville and the establishment of municipal public utilities in 1901.

When bonds were sold for putting into operation systems of water works, sewerage and electric facilities. He told of the incorporation of the commission in 1905.

Greenville had a population of 3,000 when water works and sewage disposal plants were established. Discontinuance of the use of surface water, elimination of privies, and installation of water mains and plumbing facilities and drainage did much to eliminate typhoid and malaria.

From this time Greenville grew in population and in a business way and has an excellent record with the State Board of Health. The city of Greenville bought the gas plant and mains from the Carolina Gas and Electric Company in 1931.

In 1925 Greenville built its first electric power line outside the city to supply the County Home, Sam White, then a county commissioner, was one of the main sponsors of extending electric lines into rural sections. The Utilities Commission now has 500 miles of rural electric lines in Pitt, Craven, Beaufort and Martin counties and wholesales current to C. L. Hardy of Maury for his 250 miles of electric lines in Greene and Lenoir counties. Extension of rural lines is to providing all modern conveniences in the country.

All of Greenville's utilities, water, gas and electricity, are operated at a substantial profit and this enables the city to have the unusually low tax rate of 90 cents.

In concluding his interesting talk, Supt. Swartz said: "Your utilities up to 1920 did not earn enough revenue to take care of operation, interest on bonds and the retirement of bonds as they came due, and the difference was supplemented by taxation. Since 1920 the Utilities Commission has taken care of all its obligations including improvements, interest on bonds and retirement of its bonds. Up to June of this year, the commission has turned over to the General Fund \$601,300 and the bonded indebtedness is \$618,000."

"This year we are turning over \$72,500 to the General Fund, which should this sum be raised by taxation the city's tax rate would be \$1.62 instead of 90 cents on the hundred dollar valuation. This will give some idea of what Greenville's utilities are worth to the taxpayers."

Committee Votes Freeze Social Security Levies

Senate Group Acts On Several Provisions Of New Tax Bill; Hope To Complete Work Tomorrow

Washington, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The Senate Finance Committee voted today to freeze social security taxes through 1944 at the present rate of 1 per cent each on employers and employees.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), who twice before has succeeded in blocking an automatic doubling of the rate, led today's movement. Present reserves, he declared, are far larger than are required by law.

In other important actions, the committee: 1. Ratified by a vote of 11 to 10 the house decision to require labor unions and other non-profit organizations to file informational financial returns.

2. Approved an increase in the excess profits tax rate on corporations from 90 to 95 per cent.

3. Retained the present 90 per cent over-all ceiling with respect to corporate normal, surtax and excess profits taxes.

Abandoning hope of completing work on the tax bill today, Chairman George (D-Ga.) announced that action on proposed changes in individual income tax rates, principally to integrate the victory tax with the regular levy, had been put off until tomorrow.

In that connection, he released a report drawn by Colin Stam, chief of the joint congressional committee on taxation, declaring that the Treasury Department had made "an unfair and unwarranted attack upon the method of integration" voted by the House Ways and Means committee.

"Although the first victory tax return is not due until March 15, 1944, a great deal of criticism, largely inspired, was directed against the tax," Stam's report said.

"The treasury, although having jurisdiction of the administration and enforcement of the tax, opened a speaking campaign against the tax almost immediately after its enactment."

Stam asserted that "the treasury apparently preferred to defeat the minimum tax (proposed) by the House in connection with the integration" than to make it workable in their estimation."

The house bill would wipe out the victory tax as such and in its stead would lower regular income tax exemptions enough to reach people paying the victory tax but not the regular income levy.

The House plan drew sharp fire from the Treasury Department which denounced it as a "monstrous confusion to get a little mill of revenue."

AIR ACTIVITY AGAINST JAPS

New Blows Reported In Marshalls And Solomons

Pearl Harbor, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Latest war reports along a 1,700-mile Pacific chain of outpost Japanese defenses told today of new air blows against the enemy in the Marshalls and Solomons and slow, steady progress of Australian soldiers in the jungles of New Guinea's Huon peninsula.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz reported a 50-ton bombing by Seventh American army air force Liberators of a Japanese cargo ship and shore installations at Emidi in Jaluit atoll of the mid-Pacific Marshalls Saturday. Jaluit is one of several Japanese air bases in the Marshalls which American bombers began pounding prior to the successful invasion of the Gilberts, 300 miles to the south, last month.

Adm. William F. Halsey reported that his Solomons airforce made 175 sorties the same day as the Jaluit raid on Bougainville island in the northern Solomons. These were the first in four days but, despite the opportunity afforded by bad weather, Japanese engineers had not succeeded in restoring a single one of Bougainville's bombed-out airfields and the new raids heaped on more damage.

At Empress Augusta Bay on Bougainville's west-central coast and now have a bomber-fighter field in operation there.

On Huon peninsula, the portion of New Guinea which is nearest Japan's important holdings on New Britain island in the southwest Pacific, Australian soldiers were reported by Gen. Douglas MacArthur to have advanced to a point nearly 12 miles north of Finschhafen which was captured last Oct. 2.

The Aussies, who have utilized planes, tanks, mortars and cavalry in a campaign fought over difficult terrain, still are less than halfway up the 60-mile-long Huon peninsula shore.

Cold Wave Here Sent Mercury Down To 27

The official Weather Bureau thermometer went down to 27 degrees last night; five degrees below freezing, to provide the second cold wave of the winter. The mercury dropped to 27 degrees early in November. To a cold wave and blizzard which ranged from the Dakotas to the southeast. The sky was overcast this morning.

Farmers in many sections got busy yesterday after the Weather Bureau announced the approach of the cold wave and started killing hogs. A long warm period had considerably delayed the slaughtering of hogs and a few days of cold weather and backbone, spareribs, tenderloin, country sausage, etc., will be available.

NEW GAINS BY EIGHTH ARMY

Indian Troops Crash Through Nazi Defenses

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Indian troops attacking in the center of the British Eighth Army front in Italy crashed through German defenses and captured a number of prisoners, headquarters announced today, while Canadians along the Adriatic coast hurled back Nazi armored attacks, wrecking tanks and inflicting casualties.

Activity of the Fifth Army front was confined to artillery duels and patrols.

British guns knocked out a number of tanks which tried to break through in counterattacks and inflicted casualties on the attackers. The Eighth then resumed its advance. (Continued on Page Two)

Draft Policy Being Followed In State

Raleigh, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The North Carolina selective service system has been following the policy outlined in the recently-enacted father draft deferment law since October 1, when drafting of fathers began, and consequently, the law will have little effect in this state.

This was the statement of state selective service officials yesterday, who said they had, in fact, followed the policy of putting fathers at the bottom of the list since the selective service act became effective in 1940.

The officials said boards now calling up fathers had exhausted all other available classes.

Vinson Offers Plan To Increase Civilian Goods

Washington, Dec. 14.—(AP)—A drastic overhauling of the consumer goods field—affecting both pricing and production—was projected today by Economic Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson.

A directive sent jointly to the War Production Board and the Office of Price Administration outlined two principal objectives: To avoid further shortages of low-priced civilian-use products, and to adjust the price structure for such goods as a stimulant to production.

The plan would require joint action by the two agencies addressed, and ranged from proposed orders to manufacturers with what are regarded as excessive recent profit margins to produce essential civilian goods for sale at cost, to authorizations for price increases in excess of present legal maximums to maintain production by producers who are now losing money.

Declares Britain To Remain In War Until Both Germany And Japan Crushed; Says Nations Must Stand Together To Maintain Peace In Post-War World

London, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, reporting to Commons on the Teheran-Cairo conferences, declared today "the war will be shortened" by decisions reached with Premier Stalin, and again pledged Britain's battle to the final destruction of Japan.

He told cheering House that Prime Minister Churchill has "still more work to do in the sphere where he is now." Churchill had stayed on in Cairo, meeting last week with leaders of smaller powers.

Quicker defeat of the Axis was insured by the "close cooperation of our military plans" at the Teheran meeting of President Roosevelt, Premier Stalin, and Churchill, Eden declared.

"Every plan is now agreed upon. The timing is now agreed upon, and in due course the decision of Teheran will be unrolled on the field of battle."

"The military mission agreed in Cairo" at the British-American-Chinese meeting "on future military operations against Japan."

Eden termed Japan as much a menace to Britain as to the United States and China, and said Britain still was "in the principal in the Far Eastern war" because "to destroy Germany and then make a compromise peace with Japan would only sow the seeds of a third world war."

Other highlights of the foreign secretary's report:

Turkey: The conference with President Ismet Inonu gave "good hopes" for a "sound basis for future cooperation between ourselves, Soviet Russia, American and Turkey," and was "encouraging. Further than that I cannot go today."

Post-war: Complete cooperation of Britain, Russia, and the United States is assured. "We three can work together." Eden said, "the recurrent threat of war can only be met if there is an international order firmer in strength and unity than any enemy could seek to challenge."

Balkans: A British military mission has been with the forces of Marshal Josip Broz (Tito) in Yugoslavia since last spring, and Britain is doing everything to supply them with munitions and other help. Politically, the Allies are working to unite dissident groups in Yugoslavia, and both King Peter and the government of Tito have agreed to let the country choose its own form of government after the war.

Continue Raids On Nazi Targets

London, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The RAF's fleet of mosquito bombers started at western Germany last night for the fourth successive night, the ministry announced today, skipping through the Nazi defenses to return to their bases without loss.

The raid followed up a daylight assault on unspecified objectives in western Germany yesterday by formations of U. S. Liberators and Flying Fortresses, during which American airmen shot down 15 Nazi fighters to bring to 187 the total number of German planes downed by the Eighth Air Force this month.

powered to revise price schedules to maintain production and regulate profits under a strict formula laid down by Vinson.

Under this formula, the producer whose current profits from all operations are more than double those earned in the 1936-1939 base period, or who is operating at a loss, may be authorized by OPA to increase his selling price for an essential item to a figure not to exceed the unit production cost plus two per cent.

Manufacturers whose profits from all operations are more than double those earned in the 1936-1939 base period may be ordered under the Vinson plan to manufacture essential civilian goods for sale at cost.

The Vinson order is designed to resolve a long-standing source of friction between the WPA and OPA. The production agency has been exerting pressure for price increases for manufacturers, claiming that present OPA price lids prevent adequate production of certain civilian goods.

This falling off in production has been particularly noticeable in the textile output, where manufacturers have abandoned low-priced lines to produce higher-priced goods whose profit margins are greater, WPA sources said.

to which we have set our hands will
call for immense effort. . . . We have
set ourselves a hard task in the
determination to achieve victory at
the earliest possible moment. Great
battles are impending, and for this
we shall need all our strength, all
our courage, all our unity, in greater
measure perhaps than ever be-
fore.
"Italy: The campaign has been
slow due to tremendous difficulties
of terrain and weather, but all the
more important hill features are in
our hands, and it seems the Ger-
mans may be forced to withdraw
farther."
Eden's speech opened two days
of debate on progress of the war
and foreign affairs.
At Teheran, he said, the founda-
tion was laid among the three major
powers for "close interplay in every
move" against the Axis, and "we
have not had that until now."
While he spoke guardedly of the
conference with Turkey, he made it
clear that Russia was included in
the expressed hopes for four-power
cooperation. The Soviet envoy, An-
drei Vishinskiy, had intended to be
present in Cairo, but was visiting
in Italy and could not get to Egypt
until after the meeting with Inonu.
As for Japan, he declared that
ever since Pearl Harbor "we have
been committed to the objectives
set out for the first time interna-
tionally in the Cairo agreement."
Those objectives are to crush Japan
and strip her of all her territorial
gains of 50 years.
"We should be utterly unworthy
of our heritage and our tradition if
we did not at the earliest possible
moment deploy all our resources
for the purpose of establishing the
security of the dominions on a firm
basis," Eden continued. "For that
we have to fight Japan to the bitter
end whatever the cost, and however
long it takes."
"If we are compelled for the

time being to devote the greater
part of our human and material
resources to the task of defeating
Germany, we are still principals in
the Far Eastern war," he asserted,
adding that Churchill and General-
issimo Chiang Kai-Shek "speak just
the same language of determina-
tion."

Speaking of the peace, he said
that "more than once before Allies
have stood together in war, and
fallen apart in peace. That cer-
tainly will be Germany's game once
again. She will play it with all
she knows from the moment the
last shot is fired, and then pre-
pare for the next challenge."
