Nazis Hurl New Troops Into Flaming Battle In Effort Recapture Kiev

**Soviets Intensify New
Offensive 200 Miles
Southeast Of Kiev
Threatening To En-
gulf Kirovograd and
Krivoi Rog and Cut
Off Nazi Escape
Route**

London, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Nazi Field Marshal von Manstein's armored divisions were within 55 miles of Kiev today after rolling through the highway junction of Radomysl, but 200 miles to the southeast Russian armies under Gen. Ivan S. Konev were on the march in a new and important offensive which threatened to engulf the industrial centers of Kirovograd and Krivoi Rog.

Russian armies driving from Cherkassy and Kremenchuk in the upper Dnieper bulge have established contact along the Dnieper, Reuters dispatch from Moscow today declared. The Russians announced capture of Cherkassy, midway between Kiev and Kremenchuk, yesterday.

Konev was in command of 32 Red army divisions—perhaps 300,000 men—who yesterday overcame stubborn enemy resistance and captured the highly-organized middle Dnieper city of Cherkassy, guarding the strategic rail network in the southwestern Ukraine. Today they began to close a pincer on the escape route for Germans in the Tassin river area and the rail junction of Smela west of Cherkassy.

Other Red army columns were spreading west and southwest toward Kirovograd and Krivoi Rog, supported by tanks and self-propelled artillery, and spearheaded by (Continued on Page Four)

Famed Physician Died Last Night

Battle Creek, Mich., Dec. 15.—(AP)—Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, famed physician, health authority and head of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, died during the night at the age of 91.

Dr. Kellogg had been in failing health for about six months and had not been at his office for about five months. He died at 11:30 p. m. at his residence.

He was a leader of a health movement that has been the basis of the diet emphasizing the value of grains, fruits and vegetables.

His brother, W. K. Kellogg, heads the W. K. Kellogg Company, cereal manufacturer.

A native of Tyrone, N. Y., Dr. Kellogg had made his home in Battle Creek since moving here with his parents when he was a child. He was educated in Battle Creek schools and attended Michigan State Normal and the University of Michigan.

He was a practicing surgeon while still in his seventies and was the author of several books on dietetics. Dr. Kellogg's wife died in 1920. They had no children.

Committee Urges More Transport Equipment

Washington, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Warning that a "break down" or even a diminution in transportation service would have "incalculable repercussions on our war effort," the Senate Transportation Committee demanded today increased production of railroad, truck, barge and airline equipment.

With the railroad industry's transportation burden growing constantly, its equipment deteriorating and its manpower problem acute, the committee declared, "it is folly to assume that there is no limit to the strain it can withstand."

The committee praised the railroad for a "remarkable record" but said heavier loads and shortages of essential materials "are tending to wear out the equipment faster than replacements are being provided."

The committee, headed by Senator Truman (D-Mo.), blamed past "confusion" among government agencies for delaying construction of railroad equipment, and said army, navy, lend-lease and other agencies have retarded replacements of essential civilian trucks and parts.

While construction of only 7,500 civilian trucks had been approved for 1943 and 1944 for the first six months of 1944, military and other demands threatened to retard their manufacture, Senator Mead (D-N.Y.) declared in presenting the report.

The War Department, for its army and those of our allies, requested 742,000 trucks for 1944, in addition

WINTER GRIPS THIS SECTION

Season's Lowest Temperatures Predicted Tonight

Snow which began to fall here early this morning had reached a depth of nearly two inches at 2 o'clock this afternoon and was still falling. A brisk north wind early today shifted to northeast and slush and melted snow froze hard, impeding pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

C. E. Maiden, assistant airways weather observer, at the Greenville Machine Works, reported the official thermometer at 31.4 degrees at 2 o'clock this morning, 25.2 degrees at 8 a. m., and 22 degrees (10 degrees below freezing) at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

State Highway patrolmen had no reports of accidents on the highways this afternoon. They had been warning drivers of motor vehicles to drive with caution.

The city street department this morning spread sand at street intersections of the business district to avoid skidding.

Several minor accidents occurred when cars skidded on the ice. Mrs. Noah G. Raynor, driving onto Dickson avenue from 16 street, about 1 o'clock this afternoon, skidded into a car driven by Clarence Tripp, Route 2, Greenville, and Tripp's car bumped into a car driven by Wendell Dixon of Ayden. Mrs. Raynor was slightly hurt. Tripp's car received the most damage, police said.

(By The Associated Press) The south shivered today from the Mississippi valley to the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, before the season's coldest blast and braced itself for an even more frigid onslaught tomorrow.

Coldest southern spot was in the Arkansas Ozarks, near Rogers, where the thermometer dropped to three below.

The freeze was forecast to last until Friday with sprinkling rain giving way to clearing skies. New Orleans had its first snow flurry since 1935 this morning.

Snow fell over most of Arkansas last night and a white blanket covered northern Georgia and most of the Carolinas. More rain or snow was due along the eastern tier of states with clearing and much colder weather promised tomorrow.

Temperature forecasts for tonight ranged from a low of zero to five above for Nashville, Tenn., to 20 to 25 degrees in the eastern area.

Mayor Awards Prizes Members State Guard

Mayor Bruce Sugg awarded cash prizes to three members of the Greenville company of the North Carolina State Guard at the annual meeting of the organization held last night.

Sixteen Killed In Plane Crash

Cornell Bluffs, Iowa, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Sixteen men were killed last night when a bomber, on a routine combat training flight from its base at the Fort Worth, Texas, army air field, crashed into the rugged cliffs five miles north of here, the public relations officer of the Lincoln, Neb., army air base said today.

The public relations officer said there were 10 survivors and that a board of officers from the Lincoln base is investigating. Names of the dead are being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

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Airmen Paving Way For Invasion Of New Britain

Allied Invasion Would Be Death Blow To Japanese Defenses In Southwest Pacific Area

New Britain, the southwest Pacific island whose invasion would constitute easily the most important ground move to date in westward operations against Japan, now has passed through the second straight month of the most sustained air offensive of the Pacific war.

Possibly presaging momentous developments, Allied air forces in the Solomon Islands and New Guinea have devastated that keystone of Japanese defenses with more than 3,000 tons of explosives between Oct. 12 and Dec. 12.

In communications of Gen. Douglas MacArthur covering those 62 days, only seven have failed to mention New Britain raids, with tropical storms largely responsible for the exceptions.

The period embraces the second 350-ton bombardment of Rabaul on Oct. 12 on through the latest pounding with 248 tons of explosives given Gasmata on Dec. 12 and announced only today by Gen. MacArthur.

New Britain's role in the as yet preliminary stages of the Pacific war is great. Its capture would burst open the sea lanes to the Philippines, with Manila 2,500 miles away. It would put the Allies within 800 miles of Truk, the great ene-

my naval base to the north—closer to that vital spot than they stand at any other point by 200 miles.

The constant aerial bombardment appears to have adhered to a definite pattern. First the massed weight fell on the eastern end of the 300-mile-long island at the big air and naval fortress of Rabaul. Then it switched in late November to the western end where, with mounting fury, it still is devastating the very sector which MacArthur's New Guinea forces could invade at any time he gives the "go" signal.

Rabaul, to all intents and purposes, was knocked out by the latest punch. Smashed both by the land-based bombers of MacArthur and the aircraft carrier power of Adm. William F. Halsey in the Solomons, (Continued on Page Four)

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons yesterday that complete post-war cooperation of Britain, Russia and the United States is essential, adding that "the recurrent threat of war can only be met if there is an international order firmer in strength and unity than any enemy could seek to challenge."

"We three can work together," said Mr. Eden. He didn't attempt to be more specific about a method of maintaining peace.

There probably are few people of the United Nations who don't hope earnestly that war's end will produce some sort of organization that will insure peace and generally promote the welfare of mankind.

Because so many millions are eager to see this ideal achieved, it's reasonable to believe that success will be attained in due course.

I think we may save ourselves much disappointment, however, if we figure that it will take a long time to reach the ideal. We aren't going to step into a ready-made

DELAY ACTION ON SUBSIDIES

Senate Group Deadlocked On Compromise Measure

Washington, Dec. 15.—(AP)—The Senate Banking Committee, deadlocked on a measure to end food subsidies, postponed a vote on the legislation in an executive session today but may ballot on it tomorrow.

The postponement came after a subcommittee headed by Majority Leader Barkley reported that it had been unable to find a basis for compromise.

In response to questions of reporters after today's 90-minute meeting, Senator Barkley said a compromise plan offered by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) was discussed at length but not put to a vote. He added that his own hopes for a committee agreement on a bill that would retain at least part of the subsidy program were no higher than before the session started.

Later Taft filed in the senate his proposed compromise which would abolish rollback subsidies to reduce consumer prices, but retain a support price system of foodcost controls.

The compromise contains these major provisions:

1. The War Food Administrator would fix such support prices "to farmers as he finds necessary to obtain adequate production and would maintain such prices in the open market" either by regulations fixing prices or by actual purchases "through government agencies."

2. To control retail prices, the War Food Administrator could authorize government payments to processors and distributors of foodstuffs from price-supported commodities. These subsidies would be for the purpose of reducing the margin between the producer and the consumer. The subsidies would be limited to \$600,000,000 annually against the \$1,000,000,000 estimated (Continued on Page Six)

New Air Attacks On The Marshalls

Pearl Harbor, Dec. 15.—(AP)—American army and navy bombers have struck again at Japanese fortifications on Wotje and Jaluit atolls in the Marshall Islands, Pacific fleet headquarters announced. Wotje, principal enemy base in the mid-Pacific group, was hit by Seventh army air force heavy bombers Monday. Anti-aircraft fire damaged one bomber, but the personnel escaped injury.

Jaluit was the target of two navy Liberators bombers Sunday. Both planes were damaged by machine-gun fire and one pilot was wounded. Japanese planes staged light night attacks Saturday and Sunday on Tarawa, the newly won American base in the Gilberts, 300 miles south of the Marshalls, headquarters said. The raiders failed to inflict damage or casualties.

Schools Operate On Schedule Tomorrow

The city schools will operate on regular schedule tomorrow, June H. Rose, superintendent of schools, stated today. He urged parents to give the children lunches or money to buy lunch so they will not have to go out in the weather.

Children at the Training School should take lunches because there is no cafeteria there.

Christmas Shopping Beginning In City

Christmas shopping is expected to get into full swing by the last of this week. Stores will begin to remain open evenings Friday and Santa Claus will start making his rounds in stores and on downtown streets. Shortage of toys and novelties due to the war will result in the giving of useful gifts, merchants believe. There will be very little decorating of streets for this Christmas. Fireworks are forbidden by law and there is a penalty for exploding them. The Service League, civic clubs, Salvation Army and others are planning to provide Christmas cheer for unfortunate families and persons.

One sign of good cheer is found in grocery stores, where stocks appear to be more ample than in a long time. Florida fruits are on the market in abundance but apples are not so plentiful as in past years. There was a bumper local crop of pecans this fall. The nuts are of excellent quality and fairly ready.

Incidentally, a paper shell pecan tree will produce as much profit from the ground as anything which might be planted.

Rommel Given Supreme Command Of Nazi Army

London, Dec. 15.—(AP)—High Nazi leaders were understood today to be considering vesting supreme command of the German army in Field Marshal Erwin Rommel in an effort to tighten anti-invasion defenses as well as to forestall any anti-Hitler coup by the professional generals of the Junker caste.

Rommel recently has been reported touring northwest Europe as a kind of anti-invasion chief and there are indications that Field Marshal Karl von Rundstedt may soon be removed from command of western defenses, a post he has held for nearly two years.

Strictly a Nazi general, who has risen from the ranks under Hitler's aegis, Rommel has the confidence not only of the Fuehrer but of his party chiefs.

You Rundstedt, a leader among the military aristocracy, repeatedly has been waiting for the opportune moment to attempt an anti-Nazi coup and extend a peace bid to the Allies in the hope of winning terms which would permit salvaging of enough of Germany's war machine to set in motion another try at world domination in the future.

There have been recurrent reports in London that the Junker clique already has unsuccessfully approached the Allies with just such terms, which fell far short of the unconditional surrender formula.

'FLU' SWEEPS OVER NATION

More than a million sufferers of respiratory ailments were reported throughout the nation today and it appeared that the figure might rise as health officials generally agreed that colder weather would not abate the spread of illnesses.

Absenteeism from schools, offices and war plants continued to mount, but deaths were few.

Numerous schools were reported closed and in the hardest-hit sections an average of one person in 10 was ill. Many war plants were operating with reduced manpower.

Health authorities said the illnesses were mild and usually lasted only about five days. They disagreed, however, on the type of the (Continued on Page Six)

Twelve Die In Crash Of Plane

New Delhi, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Lucien Adolphe Labaudt, 65, life magazine artist of San Francisco, Calif., was among 12 persons killed in an American plane crash in Assam near the Burma border Sunday.

Labaudt, who recently arrived in the China-Burma-India theater, was the first war correspondent killed in this theater. He was making his first plane trip when the craft crashed at dusk during an attempted landing.

The names of the other victims, an army personnel, were not released immediately.

Get Ready

London, Dec. 15.—(AP)—The British Broadcasting Company told the Belgians today to "get ready to help when the Allied armies arrive."

All Belgians were instructed to acquire an intimate knowledge of the countryside in order to be able to give Allied advance units exact information to note the location of German land mines, and to distrust any rumors put out by the Germans.

Firemen Did Good Work

Fire about 1 o'clock today gutted the Winston Mutual Life Insurance Company's office building, 102 East Second Street. Origin of the fire is unknown. The fire department did good work preventing the fire from spreading to adjoining frame buildings during a high wind. The company is owned by Negroes.

Also that their information indicated the Germans feel certain that the Allies will launch a major invasion of Denmark and Norway almost any day.

The Germans in Denmark have been plagued by continued threat and sabotage, despite the strict discipline they enforce over the country on August 29 after a Danish military and naval revolt.

While the Nazis were reported to fear an Allied Baltic thrust, speculation that a blow might also come in the Balkans was enlivened by the appearance in Cairo of Lt. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., commander of the U. S. Seventh army, the activities of which have been kept secret since the Sicilian campaign. There was talk that he is slated for a new command.

As German broadcasts said the Nazis had rushed strong reinforcements to the Balkans, apparently in an effort to smash guerrilla resistance and to keep wavering Axis satellites in line, a political crisis was reported continuing in Bulgaria, with the government desperately trying to hold down the pro-Russian masses.

A Cairo dispatch to the New York Times said Bulgaria has reportedly communicated peace feelers to the Allies, which were rejected.

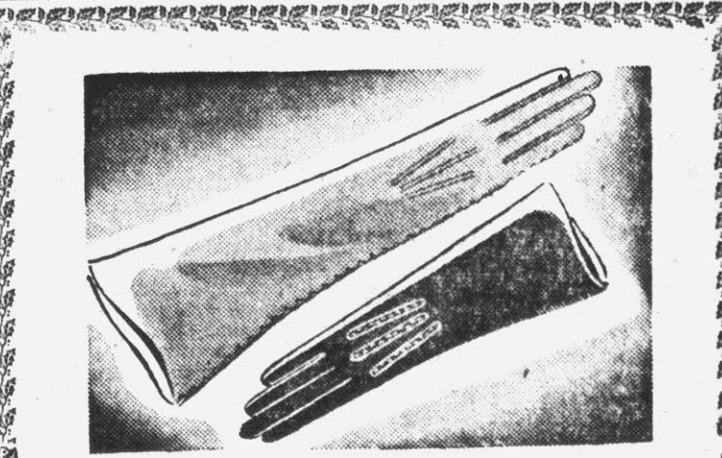

THE LURE OF SECURITY

Great flocks of wild duck were flying south, silhouetted against the autumn sky. Suddenly one duck broke formation and descended to the earth. He had observed a group of the domesticated variety pecking at the earth and joined them. Perhaps he cast a wistful eye at his former companions as they winged southward, but in a short while he was perfectly at home in his new surroundings. He had given up the adventure of the sky for the security of the barnyard.

There is probably much to be said for his philosophy of life. Security is a very comforting reality. To know that our job is safe, our income however meager assured, our future provided for, is something that every man might well regard with wholesome longing. But as a matter of fact, there is no real security in the world. As the season rolled on, the day would certainly come when the barnyard duck would be prepared for the roasting pan. He need have no fear any longer of the hunter but he could certainly entertain a wholesome fear of the farmer. In the meantime he would be well fed, with little effort on his part, but his sense of security would be a vain dream.

There is something immensely stimulating in adventure. The noble soul loves it and looks with scorn on security. There is something lacking in us when we forsake the possibility of high adventure and flutter down to the barnyard, with no greater ambition than that of being well fed.

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IS DEBT HARMLESS?

A leading exponent of the public debt without limit philosophy reiterates that, "If the national debt is all internal, as ours is, the nation can hardly go bankrupt."

This philosophy will require more and more explaining as time goes on. People whose earnings and savings are reeling under the double impact of taxes and inflation, are going to ask some questions that will be hard to answer. Not being accomplished economists, they will inquire why, if the size of the debt is unimportant, should they be asked to pay heavier taxes as the debt increases? And why, if it is merely a matter of owing the debt to ourselves, should the tax collector be so merciless in collecting to the last penny?

The "owe ourselves" theorists have always claimed that as the debt grew, the affairs of the country could be so arranged that the debt would actually be beneficial. They call it a managed economy. Today we have a huge and growing debt plus a managed economy more complete than the believers in harmless debt ever hoped for. We also have confiscatory taxation, uncontrolled strikes, rising prices, and shortages of everything from shoe laces to locomotives. The people are nearly convinced that the managed economy is a flop, and they are beginning to wonder just how harmless is debt. At any rate, they are demanding that government economize

wherever possible; that is something tangible which they can understand.

The people in their collective wisdom may save the nation.

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—A new actor has made his appearance on the Republican presidential candidate scene. He is Rep. Everett McKinley Dirksen, of Pekin, Ill.

Under ordinary circumstances, it would hardly be worth mentioning that a congressman had tossed his hat in the ring. But these aren't ordinary circumstances.

"Ev" Dirksen is no catch-as-catch-can politician. He is going into his 12th year as a member of the House. He's a lawyer. He's a veteran of World War I, with a record of 12 months overseas. He's ranking Republican member of the House appropriations committee.

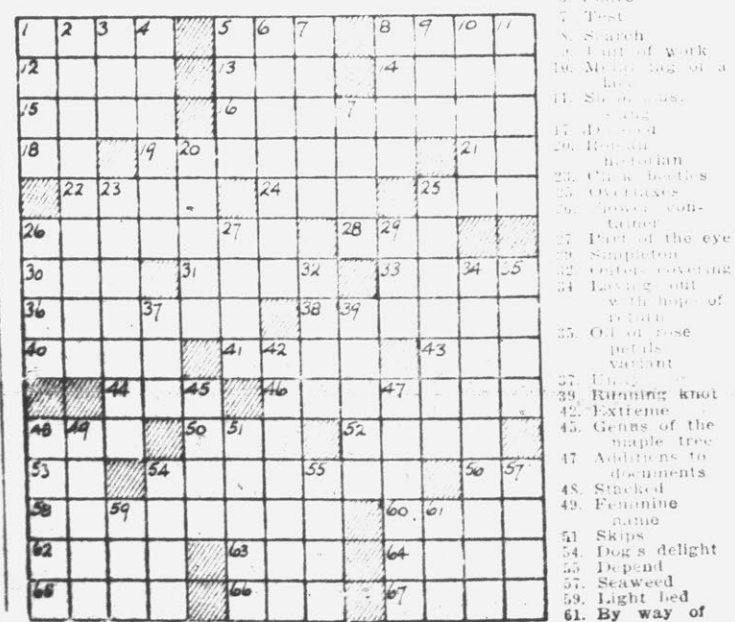
That isn't all. Dirksen is one of the most highly respected members of Congress. A tall, bulky fellow with a shock of curly black hair, he commands both physical and political respect whenever he takes the House floor. He never does unless he has something to say—and his colleagues invariably listen.

He has often blasted the New Deal, but he has never been identified with the so-called isolationists and is one of a group who insisted that the Mackinac Island Charter should open the door to Republican participation in a postwar collaboration of nations to maintain world peace.

of the world, standing together they represent a power which is invincible.

This trio could maintain peace so long as it remained intact. And that arrangement wouldn't preclude the creation of an organization which would handle other matters of mutual concern to the members. You can put it this way: If the United States, Britain and Russia don't stand together after this war, then no organization of lesser nations, no matter how large, could insure peace.

We can't gauge the situation now as we did after the last war. We mustn't forget that three first class powers are being smashed—Germany, Italy and Japan—and that the recovery of France may be protracted even more important, the new-born empire of mighty Russia is emerging as the dominant power of the eastern hemisphere. There must be a wholesale readjustment of values among the world's nations.

Whatever way you look at it, circumstances are placing the responsibility for world peace on the big three. They couldn't shift the trust if they wanted to.

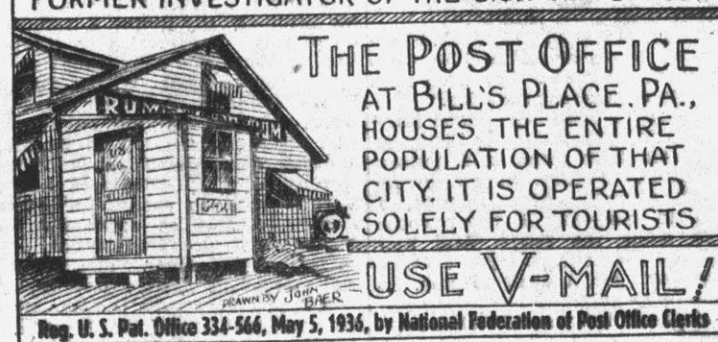

Gasmata is only 160 miles northwest of Allied fighter fields on islands off New Guinea's coast which provide cover for invasion forces. It also faces a sea area now open to the southwest Pacific naval forces of Vice Admiral Thomas C. Kinkaid. Last Nov. 29, Admiral Kinkaid's destroyers shelled New Britain for the first time—at Gasmata.

Stormovik bombing formations. Another Russian offensive, this one in the far north near Nevel, was reported by the Berlin radio. Here the Germans said Gen. Andrei Yeremenko, defender of Stalingrad, was moving westward with six infantry divisions and two tank corps. The Latvian border was barely 70 miles away and Berlin admitted loss of

successive days. Russian batteries appeared to be firmly established between Tseretev and Klev, however, and from commanding sites were raking the rolling lands over which the German tank attacks were being launched. Russian advisers described the complex terrain of snow-covered and wind-swept hills, ravines and gulleys as difficult to defend, but determined holding battle against repeated frontal and flank assaults by von Mannstein's armor.

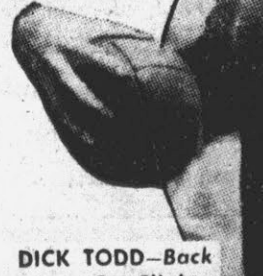
