

Allied Forces Continue Score New Gains Over Nazis On Italian Front

**Garigliano River
Bridgeheads Extended;
Germans Evacuate
Minturne; American
Artillery Shelling
Cassino; Landings
Behind German
Lines Reported**

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The American Fifth Army in Italy captured its bridgeheads above the Garigliano river to a depth of two miles in places today after capturing three villages. In addition the Germans broadcast that they had abandoned Minturno, stronghold alongside the Apennine Way.

(A German news agency broadcast from Berlin said Allied planes raided the outer suburbs of Rome this morning.)

(The Berlin correspondent of the Swedish newspaper Aftonbladet said today that American forces were being landed at a number of points along the Gulf of Gaeta, behind the German line on the west coast of Italy.)

A headquarters announcement said that British troops of the Fifth Army had enveloped the villages of Argentino, Tufo and Sulo—the capture of Tufo carrying the thrust across the Apennine Way itself—and that the battle for Minturno was under way. Later Berlin said the town had been evacuated.

Minturno lies 76 air miles from Rome, near the ancient highway that leads into the capital city.

German opposition was reported severe all along the front at least seven miles where the British began their drive with a night attack Monday.

In the area north of Cassino, now under fire of American artillery, Yank patrol again crossed the Rapido river to probe out German defenses there. Still farther inland French troops of the Fifth Army made contact with the enemy, but no details were announced.

The British crossing of the Garigliano, the first action on this sector in two months, was achieved under cover of a smoke screen, and was supported by an amphibious operation in which some troops were moved by sea to a point on the Tyrrhenian coast just above the river's mouth.

Some troops moved across the stream on rafts and small boats while others swam the river. The river averages 70 yards in width in its lower reaches.

Suto, seven miles inland from the coast, and Argentino, almost on the coast itself, lie just beyond the stream. Two of the three bridgeheads won in the British advance early Monday night were forced across the river at these points.

Today's communiqué reported patrol actions elsewhere on the Fifth and Eighth Army fronts.

New Delhi, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Allied forces holding new advance positions on the Arakan front of western Burma have fought off Japanese counter-attacks again, a southeast Asia communiqué said today.

In northern Burma, Lt. General Joseph W. Stilwell, American-trained Chinese troops continued their eastward advance along the route of the new Leda highway by capturing the enemy-held village of Gungma, in the Hukawng valley, and pushing on across the Tanai river.

PAY BILL NOW IN CONFERENCE

**Compromise Sought
On Mustering-Out
Payments**

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Senate and House Military committees undertook today to compromise a two-billion dollar difference of opinion over discharge payments to members of the armed forces.

The house cut senate allowances by approximately that total yesterday in a noisy session in which advocates of even higher payments were shouted down at every turn. Despite the uproar, the final house action was unanimous, 387 to 0.

Where the senate previously voted discharge pay running from \$200 to \$500, the house voted \$100 for men and women with less than 60 days service, and \$300 for those discharged after a longer period. It also eliminated payments for officers with more than \$200 monthly base pay, (limiting allowances to the rank of captain), where the senate had approved payments through the rank of full colonel.

Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military committee estimated the senate's version would cost \$5,500,000,000 compared with a house total of \$3,600,000,000.

Senate Majority Leader Barkley told reporters he thought the house minimum allowance was "too low," but another senator, who asked that his name not be used at this time, said he thought "the house has a better bill."

"I think there will be strong support for the lower allowances in view of the fact that the higher payments might imperil later attempts at adjusted compensation or bonus legislation in the postwar period," this senator said.

Despite his protest that even the higher senate allowances were "niggardly," Representative Lemke (R-ND) saw his proposal for a \$100 to \$700 graduated scale of payments, shouted down by voice vote.

The house bill would deny discharge pay to students in service schools and to men and women discharged from the service at their own request in order to take war plant jobs. An effort to include merchant seamen under the bill's benefits also was shouted down.

U. S. Airmen Attack French Indo-China

Chuncking, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Mitchell bombers of the 14th U. S. Air Force attacked targets in French Indo-China Tuesday and Wednesday, hitting at the dock and railway areas of the port of Campha and bombing and strafing Japanese barracks at Mon Kay.

Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's communiqué said heavy black smoke sprilling from one of the buildings struck at Campha indicated that oil stores had been hit. Smoke was visible for 10 miles as the result of the Mon Kay attack.

All aircraft returned safely.

To Sell Bonds To Purchase Fighter

In coordination with the Fourth War Loan drive the students of Greenville High School are making an effort to sell \$50,000 worth of War Bonds as soon as possible. The students have set as their goal for this year \$75,000 of war bonds to buy a Mustang pursuit plane. On this plane will be placed a metal plaque reading: "Bought by the students of Greenville High School, Greenville, N. C."

Prizes will be given to the three boys and three girls in high school selling the largest number of war bonds between now and February 15. The two first prizes will be six week passes to the local theaters. Second prizes will be four week passes and third prizes will be two week passes.

Students will take applications for the bonds and deliver them. If parents or friends of the high school students have bought bonds and would like the school to have credit for the bonds they may do so by filling out a blank.

The Treasury Department has given the high school permission to use the \$30,000 of bonds that the students have already purchased this year as part of the \$75,000 in bonds needed to buy the pursuit plane.

PREPARE FOR SUBSIDY FIGHT

Senate Debate On Issue Set For Tomorrow

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Administration forces girded for a last-ditch fight to save President Roosevelt's \$1,500,000,000 food price subsidy program today with the opening of Senate debate set tentatively for tomorrow.

The administration absorbed a preliminary setback yesterday when the Banking Committee approved a bill by Senator Bankhead (D-Ala.) yesterday, 10 to 9, to liquidate the present subsidy system by June 30, but the measure faces a flood of amendments from the floor to cancel and modify the ban.

Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky.) said the start of the debate on the legislation is contingent on disposing of the revenue bill by tomorrow.

Prospects were that the administration leaders would throw their weight behind an amendment by Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) to strike out the subsidy repeal section of the Bankhead bill—similar to the ban voted overwhelmingly by the House two months ago—and substitute a provision giving the Commodity Credit Corporation and other federal agencies authority to spend up to \$1,500,000,000 for food price stabilization in 1944.

This amendment was defeated 10 to 9 by the Banking Committee, but Maloney announced he would offer it without change in the Senate.

The \$1,500,000,000 figure represents the estimate of Price Administrator Chester A. Bowles and other stabilization officials of the cost of maintaining consumer food prices at present levels through 1944.

Among amendments waiting to be offered are measures that would limit subsidy payments by abolishing "rollback" type payments on beef and butter, and subsidize only the food bills of low income groups through a stamp plan.

Spanish Generalissimo Franco's policy of playing both ends against the middle, in his relations with Hitler and the Allies, has landed him in another jam with Britain, this adding to the problems which are complicating his increasingly difficult fight to maintain his dictatorship.

This time British Foreign Secretary Eden has indicted Spain in two counts. He told the House of Commons that Sir Samuel Hoare, England's ambassador to Spain, had been instructed to make further strong representations over the fact that Spanish volunteers still are fighting with the Nazis against Russia. Britain also has renewed her support of the Italian government's request for the release of all Italian ships in Spanish ports.

This only adds one more to the long string of Allied protests against Franco's attitude. He felt he owed a debt to Hitler and Mussolini for the support they gave him during the Spanish civil war of 1936-39, and perhaps more to the point, Germany looked like a certain winner.

However, this changed and by the end of 1942 the non-interference, pro-monarchist army officers became the dominant force in the regime in place of the fiercely pro-Nazi party of the Falange party. That really turned the Franco government in the direction of neutrality.

With passing time the Falange party has lost ground in Spain, and there has been a corresponding swing to the right in the direction of a monarchy and the old form of government. Naturally this has weakened Franco's position on the home front, and he is under heavy pressure from both the Allies and Hitler as the belligerent powers line up for the last big battle.

Like King Alfonso in the last war, he wants to bask in the favor of both Germany and the Allies now and after the war and yet he knows in his heart that he can't pursue such a course and get reward from the winners.

The Generalissimo's dilemma is complicated by Spain's explosive internal situation. The Leftists and the Rightists are pulling against each other so heavily that they are rocking his dictatorial chair uncomfortably.

RAYBURN FOR POSTWAR PLAN

**Speaker To Appoint
Bi-Partisan Group
To Make Study**

Chicago, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Admonishing that "if we bungle the post-war job" some people will renew demands for centralization of government, Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) announced to the United States Conference of Mayors today he would appoint next week a bi-partisan committee of the House to frame legislation for peacetime prosperity.

The speaker, mentioned prominently by his Democratic colleagues for the party's vice-presidential nomination, declared:

"If we allow the spectre of depression to rise once more, then the people will eventually turn again to a strong centralized government. We might as well face it; that is what they will demand. It may be five years from now; it may be 10 years hence, but it will happen."

"What then? Will the American people be so fortunate to find another man as great, as democratic-minded, as Franklin D. Roosevelt to lead them through the crisis? Or will the 'man of the hour' be the 'Man with the Iron Fist,' seize control?"

The committee he is appointing Rayburn said, will draw into one common pool information on these vital postwar factors:

1. Conversion speeds, unemployment, and rate of re-employment.
2. Allocation of materials; selection of categories to which critical materials should go first.
3. Public works, federal, state and local.

4. New fields of enterprise; the speed at which they can be put in operation; and their labor-absorbing quotient.
5. Resumption of foreign trade; the possibility of new world markets; coordination with the rehabilitation efforts of the United Nations.

6. The release of surplus war commodities by the government; the channeling of their sale to minimize the economic impact, while protecting the public interest.
7. Examination of federal statutes to learn which will retard, and which will aid successful post-war conversion.

"It should be the goal of the federal government, cooperating with state and local units," he said, "to make possible the achievement of maximum private employment producing the most useful things in the shortest period of time."

"Never again should men and women be unemployed."

Exchange Fire Across Channel

London, Jan. 20.—(AP)—British coastal batteries opened up on a German convoy in Dover strait shortly after dawn today, touching off a duel with Nazi long range guns on the French coast which continued sporadically for almost three hours.

Shells fell in the Dover area during the exchange, which was the heaviest in weeks, and residents in that area huddled in basement shelters for nearly four hours before the alert was lifted.

It was believed the British bombardment was directed against a convoy which had been sheltering in a French channel port for several days and had tried to slip under cover of the mist. The British guns fired a total of about 80 rounds. They sank a vessel near Cap Gris Nez.

Earthquake Toll Still Increasing

San Juan, Argentina, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Authorities announced today that 3,500 bodies have been cremated since the devastating earthquake last Saturday.

This toll was expected to be increased by the finding of additional victims as the work of clearing away debris continues and by weaths among 300 persons known to have been critically injured.

War Worker

The German communiqué announced that Nazi forces had evacuated Novgorod.

The Red army units, which carried through one of the best maneuvers of the war, drove to within 13 miles of the east-west railway from Tallin in the Baltic state of Estonia to Volodga, a junction on the Moscow-Leningrad line.

Except for one highway this railway was the only communication line available to the Germans holding the German salient reaching to within a few miles of Lake Ladoga, east of Leningrad.

Capture of the line would practically isolate the Germans holding positions east of the Moscow-Leningrad railway, and also those east of Leningrad.

(Formerly Gatchina), a junction of the Leningrad-Petrov and Reval-Vologda railroads.

The Russians were driving toward the line from captured Krasnoye Selo, the former Tsarskoye Selo or "Czar's Village," 15 miles southwest of Leningrad, and from Krasnoye, seven miles west, and were within 13 miles of the Artery.

Pouring through 26 mile gaps blasted by Gorkov's guns and Storkov's planes, for gains up to 12 miles, the Soviet hammerheads were pounding toward Krasnoye Selo, and Krasnoye.

Secret Meeting Of Green And Lewis Revealed

Miami, Fla., Jan. 20.—(AP)—After an eight-year estrangement, John L. Lewis and AFL President William Green have met secretly on the question of readmitting Lewis' United Mine workers to the AFL. It can be revealed today.

Green and Lewis parted company when Lewis founded the CIO in 1935. The break was confirmed a year or so later when Lewis had Green expelled from the miners' union. After that, their speaking terms were epithets at long range.

The ultimate results, and the details of their meeting remain to be disclosed. It can't be called a reconciliation, at least not yet, Green refuses to discuss it. This much is known: The meeting was held in Washington recently, strictly on an off-the-record basis. The conference was not sought by Green. It was proposed either by Lewis or by an AFL intermediary who was interested in expediting the return of Lewis to the federation. It is but (Continued on Page Two)

Fire Destroys Ordnance Plant

Atlanta, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the Fourth Service Command Ordnance Base shop and a warehouse at the Atlanta Ordnance depot early today with the loss estimated at \$2,000,000 and \$2,500,000, public relations announced.

There were no casualties. The first alarm sounded at 2:43 a. m. and both buildings were still smoldering at 9 a. m.

The depot is at Forest Park on the Jonesboro road, ten miles from Atlanta.

Industrial Accidents Big Manpower Problem

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Effective safety programs. Wartime industrial accidents killed 7,000 more persons than battle wounds up to January 1.

Workmen's injuries since Pearl Harbor are responsible for the loss of four times as many man-hours of production as strikes.

The damage and destruction of equipment in workers' accidents "far exceeds the value" of American cargoes that have been sunk.

Last work time from on-the-job accidents totals 450,000,000 man-hours, enough to have built 7,500 average size merchant ships.

The OWI, in presenting these figures today, declared accidents in war plants as a "major production and manpower problem," with the wartime safety program lagging far behind the needs of expanded production lines.

Under the tight delivery problem exacted by the war, OWI said it is literally true that "the death or disability of a skilled war worker can mean the death of several fighting men overseas."

OWI quoted Verne A. Zimmer, Labor Department director of labor standards, as declaring that "a majority of the nation's 100,000 war plants are operating without realistic (Continued on Page Two)

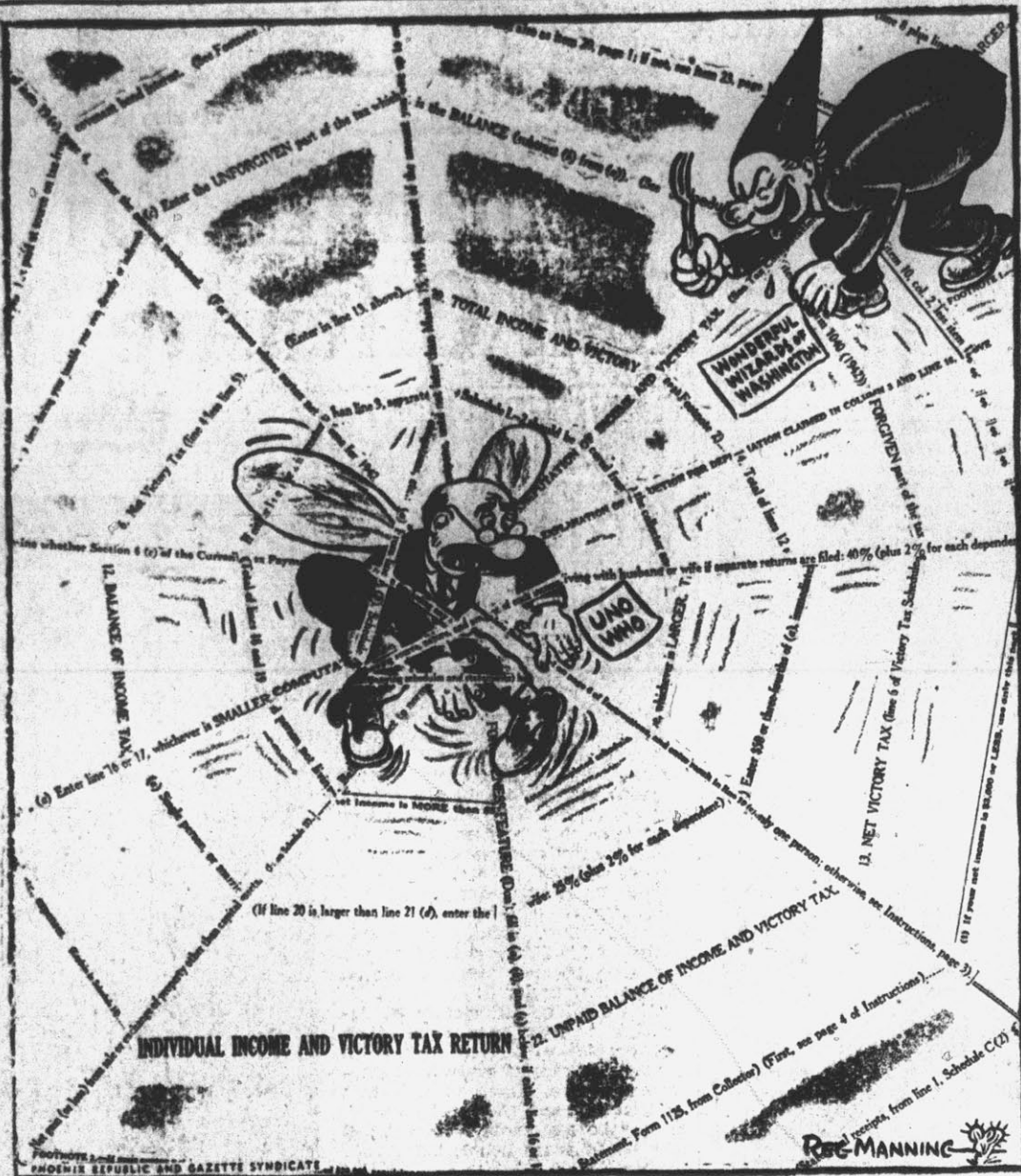
Night bombers in strong force attacked rail yards Tuesday night at Pontassieve, 10 miles east of Florence.

For a year Hitler's troops have been trying to re-forge the ring, but Governor's guns kept them away. To hold their narrow salient the Germans had massed a huge army in the finger and turned their positions into a solid mass of emplacements, trenches, dugouts and traps. A quarter of a million men may be in this area.

One of Gorov's strongest blows was struck through the hills to Pulkovo, 10 miles south of Leningrad, which an Ivestia dispatch called the "key" to the Germans' Leningrad line.

Down the slopes from Pulkovo, Red army units swarmed westward and joined the forces rolling southward from Oranienbaum, Peterhof, the site of the former Czar's palace.

Ivestia said the battle had moved so far from Leningrad that people in the southern and southwestern sections of the city for the first time in two years could not hear the sound of the guns.

Some 40 miles south of Governor's spearheads, Gen. Kirill A. Meretskov's Volkov army punched north and northwest of Novgorod through broken German defenses, having cut the railway both northeast and southwest of the ancient city and isolating it except for a few secondary highways.

Red Star said the city's buildings were burned or in flames, the woods destroyed, parks cut into trenches and "every inhabitant" forcibly removed by the Germans.

North of the city the Russians were about 27 miles east of the trunk line running southward from Leningrad through Dno, Nevel and Vitebsk.

The Russian communiqué estimated that 20,000 Germans have been killed in the great northern offensive, now in its sixth day, and that more than 1,000 Nazis have been captured, together with 195 guns, including the 86 heavy siege

pieces which bombarded Russia's second city.
(The Moscow radio said last night that warships of the Soviet Baltic fleet had shelled German positions on the Leningrad front.)
Three hundred miles below Leningrad, the Soviet communiqué announced capture of several more villages north of Novosokolniki, a continuing offensive, while on the first Ukraine front, Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's forces captured Goshcha, 18 miles east of the key rail center of Rovno, and other smaller towns.

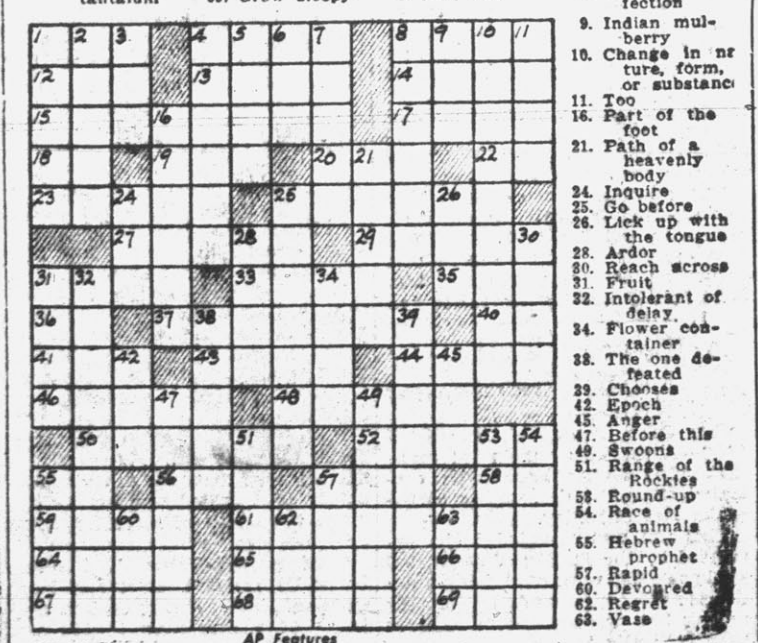

From that point forward, reliance on the spirit of American cooperation and American ingenuity is the only recourse."

Rayburn said "Sometimes I feel ashamed when some Americans despair the future of America," and he declared: "We can create an unparalleled period of prosperity and happiness."
