Dr. Hollar Speaks On Soldier Vote

Dr. E. C. Hollar of East Carolina Teachers College spoke last night to the Rotary Club on the soldiers' vote which he described as another wave of unrest concerning the voice of the people.

He outlined the history of voting from the adoption of our Constitution through the Women's Suffrage Amendment. All the national movements heretofore had been left to the states to administer. Dr. Hollar posed two major problems: 1. Can Congress enact a law extending the ballot to absentee voters for congressmen and senators? He explained that Congress has the power to enact such legislation; however, it was questionable whether Congress could enact legislation affecting the election of the president through the electoral college. 2. Can Congress lower the age for voters to 18 years? This cannot be done without Constitutional Amendment. The danger of enacting the present proposed legislation is that it will interfere with states' motions of legislative elections which could result in stalemate in presidential elections and throw the election into the House of Representatives, where states have one vote each. Absentee interference in the election of congressmen could result in a disputed election.

Dr. Hollar stated a better thing now would be: 1. Let Congress propose Amendments to the Constitution that would remove all questions of constitutionality. 2. Let the state legislatures adopt such amendments early next year. 3. Let Congress enact suitable legislation by the 1946 election.

all the reports made by the Japanese were returned to this country on the Grapenhaus first expedition.

The Japanese action in publishing the reports was in line with the Japanese government's new policy of releasing information on the basis of the truth. It emphasizes the fact that the lot of prisoners of war is not one of improvement or diplomacy and that publicity may help, especially as the war goes on, to bring about a change in the Japanese mind.

The State Department record books were burned on January 13, 1945, and the United States and Japan exchange names of war prisoners and civilian internees in accordance with the Geneva convention.

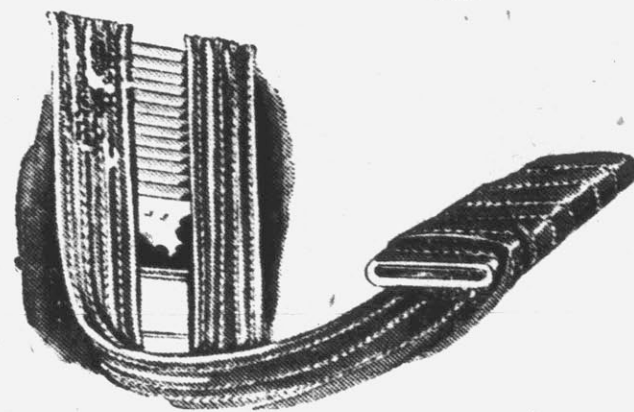

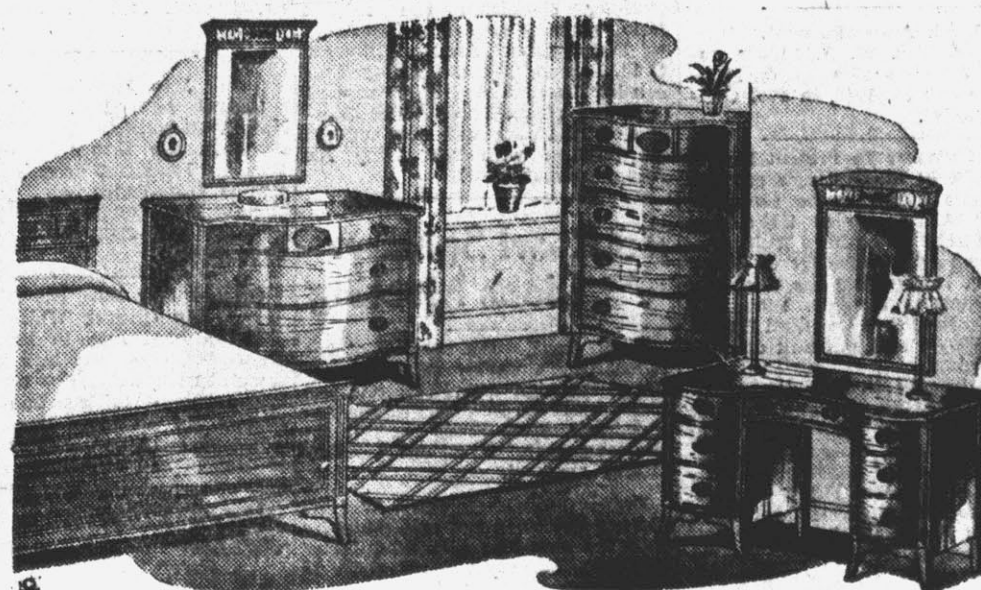

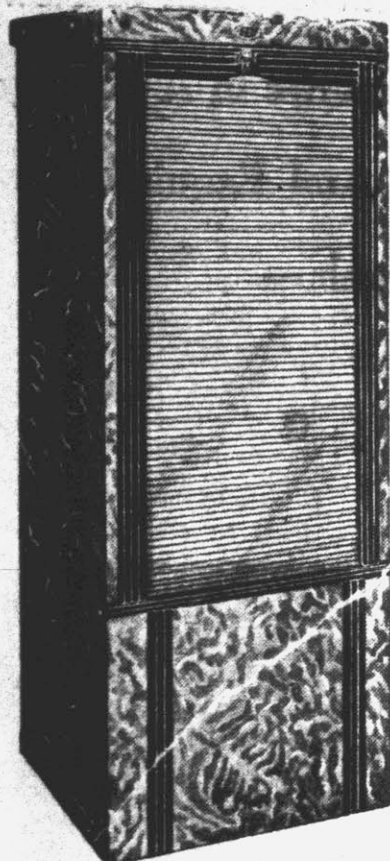
