Heavy German Attack On Allied Troophead Repelled

Rommel Reported Back In Italy To Direct Nazi Strategy; Berlin Claims Netuno Bridgehead Encircled; Fierce Battle Raging For Possession Of Cassino

Allied Headquarters in Italy, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Marshal Erwin Rommel, master of "don't get trapped" tactics, was reported back in Italy directing Nazi strategy today and Allied headquarters disclosed that the Germans have launched their expected big offensive against the Anzio landing head below Rome, supporting their assaults with terrific firepower and tank charges.

The German high command said today that Allied forces have been encircled in the Nettuno bridgehead of Italy.

"On the enemy landing beach-head of Nettuno major enemy forces are encircled by counterattacks," the communique broadcast by Berlin said. "Relief attacks were repulsed."

On the main Fifth army front Americans were fighting fiercely in the outskirts of Cassino, fighting with tanks against Germans who had to be cleaned out of rubber-cushioned dugouts and cellars in methodical and in fashion.

The offensive aimed at driving the British and Americans back into the sea from their beachhead and the tough house-to-house resistance offered at Cassino appeared to be the twin prongs of a German strategy to fight off the Allied threat aimed at trapping a large part of the German 10th army.

On the Eighth army front there was vigorous patrolling and the British occupied Torricola, southwest of Orsogna and 20 miles inland, where the Germans withdrew from a considerable mountain wedge and left the Allied line running almost straight from Casoli to Sant' Angelo.

The Germans, reinforced along the perimeter of the Anzio bridgehead, struck four times against the British and Americans who are reported to have poured more than six divisions ashore. The German army force, almost absent from Italian skies for several days, returned to support the thrusts.

In each case, Allied headquarters said, the Germans were repulsed with heavy losses and the Allies improved their positions slightly.

The enemy opened his offensive with three successive thrusts north of Padiiglione, eight miles northwest of Anzio. They also lunged out at the Americans in the area west of Cisterna where the Americans had driven to the outskirts of that Apennine Way town 14 miles northeast of Anzio.

President Signs Service Pay Bill

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed today legislation providing mustering-out pay of \$100 to \$300 for members of the armed services.

At the same time, he called for action on additional portions of his program to "ease the period of transition from military to civilian life."

Mr. Roosevelt mentioned specifically measures to let servicemen continue their education, to provide social security credits for the period of military service, and to set up machinery for unemployment allowances.

The Governor spoke at the annual Founder's day exercise at Meredith college.

Declaring that "institutions of higher learning must reexamine themselves in the light of experience gained in this war," he said that the question would have to be answered as to whether colleges with millions of dollars invested in buildings and equipment "shall permit such facilities to go unused during the three months of summer, or 25 per cent of the calendar year."

Woodring Says "Palace Guard" Has Usurped Leadership In Administration

Chicago, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Harry H. Woodring, former secretary of war, proposed today that the Democrats nominate someone like Secretary of State Hull for president, and announced he would call a national convention of "loyal" party members to consolidate their forces.

In a speech denunciating what he termed "the palace guard," the one-time Kansas governor also suggested that Hull—if elected—could appoint President Roosevelt chief of the American delegation to the peace conference.

The erstwhile Roosevelt cabinet member defined his views in an address prepared for delivery before the executives club.

He said a "determined bloc" of loyal Democrats could approach the forthcoming campaign with a spirit of cooperation, might hold the balance of power, and could join "any movement that has for its purpose the repudiation of the palace guard and its philosophy of government."

Woodring proposed that the party unite "in presenting to the nation as its nominee for the presidency such a candidate as the honorable Cordell Hull." He asserted Hull's candidacy would be approved by "every loyal Democrat," and that it would "regain" support particularly in the south and west. He added:

With Senator Wheeler, James A. Farley, governor "Mac" McNutt or Senator Gillette as his running mate, constitutional government—America is secure.

Navy Bombers Raid Kuriles

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Flying out from the Aleutian islands, two navy bombers pounded the two Japanese naval bases at Paramushiro in the north Pacific Kuriles. The navy announced today.

The raid on the enemy's largest base in the north Pacific was the tenth carried out since late in December.

Results of the bombing were not observed, possibly due to the heavy weather which ordinarily shrouds that region.

The navy reported that no enemy planes were encountered by the two Japanese naval bases at Paramushiro in the north Pacific Kuriles. The attack was aimed at the southeastern coast of Paramushiro which is just south of the Russian Kamchatka peninsula and the northernmost of the chain of islands in which the Japanese homeland is located.

CONTINUE AIR OFFENSIVE ON NAZI EUROPE

Americans Batter Objectives In Western Germany; Naval Base At Toulon, France Bombed

London, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The Vichy radio said that Toulon, naval base on the southern coast of France, was raided at 2 p. m. today.

A Berlin broadcast said that "American bombers carried out heavy terror raids against the towns of Trieste, Rimini, Albano, Foggia and Porto Recanati."

Thiester is the large Italian port on the northern Adriatic. Rimini also is on the Adriatic. Albano lies about a mile and a half from Castel Gandolfo, just below Rome. Foggia is near the Fifth army front in western Italy and Porto Recanati lies on the Adriatic below Ancona.

Describing the Toulon raid, the Vichy radio said that two waves of planes flew over, bombing several quarters of the city.

"The number of victims and the damage appear to be even higher than caused in the raid of Nov. 24," it continued.

London, Feb. 4.—Great forces of American heavy bombers lashed out at Nazi Europe for the seventh time in eight days today, battering objectives in western Germany after RAF Mosquitoes struck at the same area last night.

The preliminary announcement gave no indication of the targets, but it was obvious that another cog in the Nazi war machine was blasted by a saturation of explosives such as the American pilots have tossed over Frankfurt, Brunswick, Hannover and Wilhelmshaven in the massive daylight offensive which began last week-end.

Long-range American and Allied fighters escorted the big bombers as they did yesterday when the attackers of Wilhelmshaven were given such air-tight protection that only four bombers failed to return.

RAF fighters also were credited to the ground-to-clock A-10 aerial offensive last night with forays over northern France. The Nazis, feebly striking back at the shattering blows from the west, staged a "pocket blitz" on London.

Nazis Will Wage Fight For Rome

London, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A thinly-veiled warning that the Germans intend to defend Rome step by step, whatever the destruction entailed, is reported to have been conveyed to Pope Pius XII by the Nazis who apparently have been trying for some time to persuade the Pontiff to come to Germany.

The Ankara radio said the warning had been handed the Pope by Baron Ernest von Weizsaecker, German ambassador to the Vatican, in the form of a statement from Field Marshal Albert Kesselring declaring that the ultimate fate of Rome necessarily will be "subject to military considerations."

At the same time the Vatican radio made it plain that the Pope has no intention of leaving Rome, come what may.

The Nazi commander probably is bent on protecting the Bessarabia gateway to the Balkans. Veritas, the British commentator, leans to that view, although characterizing Von Manstein's campaign as one of the enigmas of the war.

Should Von Manstein's Dnieper bend force be pocketed or compelled to retreat into the Balkans, it would precipitate a political and military upheaval on that peninsula thereby jeopardizing Hitler's remaining Russian front and making an opening for the Allies through the Balkans.

The pinching off of the Smela Salient is only an incident in the greater conflict of the Dnieper bend.

TAX REVENUES HIT NEW HIGH

Collections Last Year Nearly 32 Billions

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Tax collections last year of \$31,924,500,000 were nearly double the \$16,744,000,000 figure for 1942 on the basis of internal revenue reports made public today.

Individual income taxes accounted for \$13,082,000,000, compared with \$4,062,000,000 a year ago, with the victory tax deductions during the first half of the year totaling \$1,468,000 and the 20 per cent pay-as-you-go withholding in the last six months aggregating \$2,109,000,000.

Corporate income taxes climbed from \$3,983,000,000 in 1942 to \$5,153,000,000, while excess profits collections jumped from \$3,049,000,000 to \$7,990,000,000.

Liquor taxes increased from \$1,215,000,000 to \$1,454,000,000 as sharp increases in the cigarette and tobacco taxes, similarly reflecting an increase in the cigarette rate. (Continued on Page Three)

Main Red Forces Sweep Westward on Front Extending From Ukraine To Baltic

Moscow, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Systematic extermination by the Red armies of ten encircled German divisions in the upper Dnieper bend was well under way today, the army newspaper Red Star said, while the main Soviet forces continued to forge westward from the Ukraine to the Baltic.

The midnight communique indicated nearly 10,000 of the trapped Germans already were killed.

The situation west of Cherkassy, where nine infantry and one tank division have been trapped by a great five-day offensive, presented "the same picture as Stalingrad," Maj. Pavel Orendar said in a Red Star dispatch.

Thousands of German units have become "groups of wanderers" within the ring which the troops of Generals Nikolai Vatutin and Ivan S. Konev are tightening around them, Orendar asserted.

The Germans were said to be in an exhausted condition, although dispatches said nothing of their surrounding in any large numbers. Generally the Nazis were trying to congregate on the banks of swollen streams and in swamps.

No dispatches estimated the number of surrounded Germans, but it was safe to assume that the total was in the neighborhood of 100,000 and maybe higher.

The weather was springlike, correspondents said.

An Investia dispatch said the Russians were capturing tremendous numbers of prisoners. (Continued on Page Three)

NAZIBLOCKADE RUNNERS SUNK

Three Ships Were Loaded With War Goods from Japan

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Three German blockade runners laden with war materials from Japanese-held Pacific ports have been sunk by American destroyers in the south Atlantic.

The navy, announcing this today, said that the holds of the enemy ships were filled to capacity with thousands of tons of rubber, tin, fats and strategic ores. Some of those materials, particularly hundreds of tons of baled rubber, were salvaged and many prisoners were taken.

Seeking to sneak through the American blockade, the three ships—the Burgenland, Rio Grand and Weserland—were sighted and sunk within a 48-hour period "early in January," the navy reported. (Continued on Page Two)

Directors for the nine federation districts were also elected.

Defeat Soldier Vote Substitute

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Rallying from a smashing House defeat, the administration won a crucial Senate test for its federal war ballot plan today by beating down a "state's rights" substitute offered by a coalition of southern Democrats and Republicans.

By a vote of 46 to 42, the Senate rejected a proposal to scrap the Green-Lucas federal war ballot bill and supplant it with a plan to provide state absentee ballots for those in uniform.

The administration victory pointed toward a possible stalemate between the Senate and House, since the latter rejected the federal war ballot proposal in passing a state absentee ballot measure last night.

The vote was a decisive Senate test because the opposition to the administration bill was united behind the substitute.

However, it means little unless the overwhelming House determination to stick with a "state's rights" bill can be reversed.

The defeated Senate substitute would have retained a semblance of the federal war ballot but it could have been used only in cases where states failed to set up their own absentee voting system for military absences.

Men, Tanks and Guns Pour Ashore To Smash Remaining Jap Resistance; Fall of Core of Marshalls Defense System Imminent; U. S. Casualties Continue Light

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Fighting men, tanks and guns, pouring ashore to annihilate the dwindling forces of Japanese defenders, appeared today to be on the verge of conquering all Kwajalein, largest atoll in the Marshalls, largest and core of that enemy defense system.

As the momentous invasion moved through its fifth day, preliminary reports told of amazingly light American losses during the achievement of a strong entering wedge into mid-Pacific positions Japan has held for 25 years.

"Rear Adm. Richmond K. Turner, commander of the amphibious operations—as he was last November during the bloody investment of the Gilberts—said our assault losses were far under what had been expected."

U. S. seventh division reinforcements and mechanized equipment in great force moved against tottering Nipponese resistance at the south end of the atoll where 1,250 of an estimated garrison of 2,000 had been wiped out by Wednesday night.

American casualties were placed at 27 dead, nine missing and 190 wounded.

The north end of the atoll, with the airfield and dispersal base of Namur, were entirely in the hands of fourth division Marines. Roi was quickly overrun Tuesday and the slaughter of bitter-end defenders of Namur was announced yesterday.

Preliminary estimates of American losses at Roi and Namur were less than 100 killed and 400 wounded.

(On this basis, it seemed unlikely that the full report would show Marine losses anything comparable with the casualties of approximately 3,000 suffered in capturing the air base of Tarawa in the Gilberts, costliest battle in Marine history.)

The bulk of Kwajalein's more than 32 islets now are in American hands.

The only remaining enemy opposition of consequence appeared to be on Kwajalein island at the southern end of the atoll. There, where an airfield and a deep anchorage are the prizes, army troops which landed Tuesday pushed the Japanese against the northeastern (Continued on Page Six)

Inter Se Club.
"Robert Anthony Eden is endowed with qualities of courage, vision and sacrifice which fit him for leadership today," said Mrs. Marvin Blount at the Inter Se Club meeting Tuesday afternoon. "Eden, Foreign Secretary to Prime Minister Churchill, is known as Britain's number two man. Handsome and charming, he has had to spend half his life living down his silly reputation as a playboy—another Beau Brummel. Actually, he is serious, direct, and hard working."

In reviewing Eden's life, Mrs. Blount explained, "Anthony Eden is of the old English breed; born in 1897 at Wendstone Hall, his early life followed the pattern of most well-bred English boys—preparatory school followed by work at Eton. Here he received no great eminence either as a scholar or as an athlete. The first world war brought Eden into the service at the age of 17, and he received the military cross for bravery. His fame grew in the army and in 1917 he was promoted to the rank of brigade major. His first attempt to secure a seat in Parliament met with defeat, but very soon afterward he obtained the seat which he holds today."

Speaking of comparisons so often made between Churchill and Eden, Mrs. Blount remarked, "No two men could be less alike, so far as personality, manner of approach or method of getting things done are concerned, yet underneath, they both have the same essential beliefs. Both have adhered to a set of principles, both have refused to change them to fit events, and both have triumphed when events changed to fit their principles."

Today the Community Art Center gallery opens its 1944 series of exhibitions with a show of gelatone prints of paintings by modern American artists, assembled and circulated by Associated American Artists in New York City. This is our first show from the galleries of the Associated American Artists group, but another is scheduled for a showing here in May. Included in the current one are 15 large color reproductions of water colors, oils, and pastels done by American artists of today, most of whom are still living and actively at work. Some of the pictures, and several of the artists, are already a familiar and accepted part of American life of this generation. Grant Wood's "Woman with Plants" is one of these—a portrait much more typical of American motherhood of today than the long familiar "Whistler's Mother." Brief biographies of each of the 15 artists are presented along with their paintings, adding greatly to the general interest of the show. And all of the prints are for sale, at a very low price made possible by the recent development of the gelatone process of color reproduction. Two of the prints are to be retained as part of the permanent print collection of the Art Center. These are to be chosen by popular vote of visitors to the show, provision being made for each visitor to cast a ballot for the two pictures he considers most appealing.

The gallery, on the second floor of Sheppard Memorial library, will be open each week-day afternoon from 3 to 6, and Tuesday evenings from 7 to 9. Members of the Woman's Club, with Mrs. Harvey Ward as chairman, will serve as volunteer gallery attendants.

Madrid, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The Spanish cabinet, its way prepared by a host of editorials accusing the British of trying to high-pressure Spain into abandoning her neutrality, reaffirmed this country's position of "strict neutrality" last night after a special meeting at which it reviewed the international situation.

The cabinet, meeting at the urgent call of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, also announced it had studied means of making this neutrality respected and that it planned to make all foreigners in Spain as well as Spanish nationalists conform.

"The government is prepared to submit to no pressure under any circumstances whatever against its right to maintain firmly such a position of neutrality," the communiqué said. "Every country is obliged to respect this attitude as an act of indisputable sovereignty."

(The Spanish reaffirmation of neutrality provoked speculation in London as to whether Franco had made a deal with Germany to obtain oil which the Allies now are withholding. The United States took the lead in this economic move.

Recent British press attacks on Franco were given strength yesterday.

day, by Parliamentary Secretary Dingle M. Foot's disclosure of German penetration in Spanish industry. The Laborite weekly Tribune hinted that British leaders have further steps in mind in an action "only one degree less momentous than that which launched our country on the war against Nazism."

In the flood of editorials in the Spanish press in the past week in connection with Spain's position not one attacked the United States. All criticized Britain.

The nearest thing to a reference to the United States was a brief Washington dispatch saying the United States in accord with Britain had agreed to suspend oil shipments to Spain.

The communique, of course, mentioned no names, but coming on top of the press comments there was no doubt what inspire it and to what it referred.

In a letter addressed to the senate's presiding officer and read by a clerk, the 41-year-old Lodge, who holds a reserve commission as a major, said he felt that in view of impending "large scale ground fighting" and his age, he could best serve his country as "a combat soldier overseas."

President Has Minor Operation

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today that he had undergone a minor operation for removal of a wen from the back of his head.

He told a news conference that he had had the growth for 20 years and that it had increased in size a bit lately. So he had very good surgeons, with what he termed knives and God knows what, to remove it under local anesthesia. Altogether he said he spent a half hour in the naval hospital and then veiled for a cigarette when the operation was over.

Finland Now In Tough Spot

Moscow, Feb. 4.—(AP)—There is good reason to believe here that unless the Finns act soon to abandon their German alliance and get out of the war they must feel the might of a Red army offensive again shortly.

With Leningrad freed and far northern communications improving daily, the Russians are known to be in a position to hurl large army, navy and air units against the Finnish mainland.

It is difficult to say just what the Russians would expect from Finland, but it is certain the far northern republic would have to agree to drop Germany and pull out of the war quickly.

Jap Report U. S. Cruiser Damaged

The Tokyo radio said today that Japanese air units scored several direct hits on an Allied cruiser yesterday off Mono island in the Solomon group, heavily damaging the vessel.

The enemy report had no Allied confirmation.

Nor was there confirmation for another Tokyo radio claim, that a large U. S. transport was sunk by Japanese planes Monday off Finkhafen. A broadcast heard by NBC said the transport was sailing in convoy.

over Folkestone for an hour, some thundering toward the enemy coast and others returning from the attack.

RAF Spitfire squadrons also took to the air over the channel during the afternoon, streaming toward the continent one after the other.

No planes were lost in the sweeps over western Germany and northern France in the wake of the 1,000 plane operation by the Americans against Wilhelmshaven yesterday.

One enemy aircraft was shot down by intruders, the Air Ministry announced. Mineclearers also invaded enemy waters in last night's operations in which specific targets were not announced.

Striking in two waves for the first time since Jan. 21, the Germans sent about 70 planes in their attacks against London, but only about 20 reached the London area.

The first wave came in from the south about 9 p. m. and fanned out over three counties. Eight hours later a slightly larger force concentrated on the Thames estuary district, touched off a thunderous anti-aircraft barrage and dropped bombs haphazardly in some district causing an undisclosed number of casualties.

This second group scattered hundreds of incendiaries in a London district and started several fires. All but one of these fires was extinguished by fireguards, however, before the fire engines arrived.

British ground defenses shot down three Dornier 217s and a Junker 188.

dous amounts of guns, tanks and machine-guns. Photographs from the front showed big artillery pieces apparently in perfect condition taken by Konev's troops.

There were no Russian reports from the sector farthest west where Vautin's First Army of the Ukraine was last reported closing in on Rovno from three sides, but there was reason to believe that this front was active again.

(The German high command announced yesterday that Rovno and Lutsk, 50 miles from the Bug river, had been abandoned by Nazi troops.)

At the Baltic end of the 1,200-mile front the Red army commanded by Gen. Leonid A. Govorov bypassed Narva on both the north and the south and indications were that the Germans had waited too long to evacuate the city. There may be another large loss in lives and equipment, since the Soviets hold at least five villages in the Estonian republic and that number should be increased by nightfall.

German resistance was fierce in places, but the commanders appeared unable to execute any clear plan of defense.

A Red Star dispatch from the Volkhov front said units of Spanish battalions had suffered another heavy defeat and that one captive testified his battalion of the "blue" division had lost about 850 men killed and captured. Stores and equipment had been abandoned, he said.

Between Lake Ilmen and Lake Peipus the Germans were being rolled back, but fought stubbornly, especially striving to protect the Leningrad-Pskov railway from being cut below Luga.

The navy publication Red Fleet said the Germans were making preparations to evacuate the Crimea, if necessary. A dispatch related that the Nazis, "remembering Stalingrad," were concentrating Junkers-52 transport planes in the Crimea with experienced pilots. The large Black Sea peninsula was isolated months ago by the Russian advance past Perekop to the mouth of the Dnieper river.

SKEPTICISM IS CONTAGIOUS

One skeptic in a household will have a damming effect on the religious faith of every other member of the family. One skeptic in a social group may — if he be intelligent — shake the spiritual security of a number of people. There have been some great skeptics who have shaken the faith of whole generations. The writer remembers, as a small boy, the unsettling effect that the lectures of Bob Ingersoll appeared to have had on a number of older people who had listened to them some years before.

If you have doubts about religious matters, keep them to yourself. It does no good to peddle them about. You may think you are talking in the interest of enlightenment; but the chances are that your unbelief had its origin in some unfortunate childhood experience, in a lack of early religious training, or in the fact that you have some sort of complex which manifests itself in that way. This does not mean that there are not very intelligent doubters and agnostics; but the intelligent doubter and agnostic are about as scarce as intelligent people in other fields. Most skepticism arises not from the fact that people have thought too much, but that they have very limited capacities to think at all.

If the only thing you have to say is that you don't believe something, perhaps it would be better to remain silent.

One of the best bargains of this war was the Tommy gun your War Bond bought for Lieut. David C. Waybur of Piedmont, California.

Lieut. Waybur, a former grocery clerk, volunteered to lead a patrol into enemy territory during the Sicily invasion. Moving forward in three jeeps, he and his little band found themselves trapped in the bright moonlight between a blown-out bridge and four Italian light tanks. He ordered his patrol, armed only with one .30-caliber and two .50-caliber machine guns, to open fire. Soon their ammunition was exhausted. Three of the men were seriously injured. He, himself, was also badly hit. He directed his wounded comrades to take cover in a cactus patch while he stood with his Tommy gun directly in the line of fire of the leading tank. At a range of 30 yards he engaged the tank and shot the two enemy soldiers making up its crew. He held the other tanks at bay and finally he and his men were saved by the arrival of reinforcements.

ing to be more full of sound and fury, signifying less, than any session since the Democrats came to power nearly 11 years ago.

The reasons they give are two: First: Lack of leadership. It became apparent last session that the administration had completely and irrevocably lost control of Congress. The best that it can hope for now on any controversial measure (and some that shouldn't be) is a compromise. On the other hand there is no leadership in Congress itself. The Democrats are divided into three camps, the pros, the antis and the indifferent. The Republicans are divided roughly into liberals and conservatives, both jockeying for power in the coming elections.

It's a situation that makes happy hunting for both big and little pressure groups; utter confusion for the layman trying to figure out what the sam hill Congress is driving at; and in the end produces a minimum of vigorous, constructive legislation.

Which brings us to the second reason: General election year. This always makes for a lot of that sound and fury, etc., but is likely to produce more so as time goes on this year. (1) because the Democrats are worried; (2) because the Republicans have a Wilkieite, anti-Republican battle on their hands. Except for the solidly planted Southern Democrats in Congress, the Democratic members are worried. They would be foolish not to be in view of the G. O. P. trend in the last few years which has given the latter virtual control of the House, cut the Democratic control of the Senate dangerously and swept many Republican governors into seats formerly warmed by good Democratic brothers.

A few, though not many, are worried with wonder if President Roosevelt is going to run again and, if not, what colors will be in the standard that the unknown nomi-

nee bears. For the most part, even those who lay no claim to being in the know consider the Administration's failure to groom an alternate as positive proof that the President intends to bid for the fourth term.

On the other hand, the Republicans, marking time until the inner turmoil in their own party takes some definite line, occupy their days with blocking any and all legislation that is suspect of Administration sponsorship or clipping it with leg-breaking riders.

Unlike similar tactics on the grid-iron, such methods in Congress merely result in freezing the legislative football in midfield.

That, say the Capitol observers, is the picture. It hasn't much to do with winning the war, but political disunity never has.

tional instability cases in rejection statistics," he added that "there must be in the future in all our institutions a more carefully prepared and thorough program of physical training and medical examination and treatment."

America has its limitations in manpower, he said, and for the first time in history women have been called into active service in the army and navy. Women have learned their capacity for skillful and remunerative participation in the business and industrial life of the nation, he added.

"The college of the future must have a program broad enough to attract and train women whose ambitions will transcend the traditional fields of teaching, domestic science, art and purely cultural pursuits," he said.

TO FILE SUIT AGAINST CITY

Aldermen Advised C. D. Holmes Will Seek \$7,500 Damages

Mayor Bruce Suggs and members of the Board of Aldermen were shocked at a meeting at the City Hall last night when Attorney Arthur B. Corey notified them that he had arranged to institute suit against the city for \$7,500 for Cecil Dudley Holmes, alleging injuries from struck by one of the city's trucks last August. The matter was referred to City Attorney R. B. Lee.

Roland Mayo filed a complaint against the city, charging that Patrolman Corbett shot his dog on the street. This was referred to the Police Committee.

The Aldermen rescinded their recent action about closing the skating rink on East Fifth street on Sundays. Servicemen are the largest patrons of the rink on Sunday.

City Engineer Henry L. Rivers reported on construction work at the airport and stated that it may be necessary to move several small buildings under condemnation proceedings to make clearance for Marine planes using the field. Additional trees in the river lowgrounds are being cut down in compliance with a government request.

Dr. J. L. Winstead, representing the Pitt County Medical Society, requested the aldermen to write the Procurement Division of the U. S. Army and ask for the release of Major W. M. B. Brown, Greenville eye, ear and nose specialist, now on duty with the Army Medical Corps. More physicians and surgeons are needed here, it was stated.

An appropriation was authorized for the purchase of a part time demonstrator in the summer time canning project. The federal government pays the expense of the project, the city and county bearing only incidental expenses, Miss Verona Lee Joyner, home demonstration agent, stated.

A letter was read from A. L. Dittmer, former instructor at the college, complaining of chickens being raised on the premises next to his house on Harding street. There is no law against raising chickens in the city and the aldermen took no action.

Approval was given the Police Committee for not granting licenses to taxicab drivers who had been convicted of law violations. The board registered surprise when it was stated that hundreds of motor vehicles in the city have not bought city license tags. They are only a dollar each. Last year the city sold about 1,800 of the tags. So far this year only 1,000 have been sold. The police were instructed to report all city owned vehicles without the 1944 tags.

Routine business transacted included reports from City Sanitarian J. T. Welch and C. T. Bass of George E. Scott & Co., certified public accountants, who is auditing the city's books. Welch's report was approved. The auditor's are making satisfactory progress. Purchase of a new mechanical street sweeper was authorized. W. C. Eagles applied for use of a tract of land adjoining Greenwood cemetery as a garden next summer. This was referred to the cemetery committee. Summer uniforms were authorized for firemen and police.

All of the aldermen were present last night, including A. E. Hobgood, who has recovered from a long illness.

GAME MUST GO ON SAYS COBB

Former Detroit Tiger Says League Baseball Should Continue

San Francisco, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Somewhat bold and going on 58, the man who was once the equivalent of spiked lightning in baseball and a mean hombre on or off the field, lives the mellow life of a country squire at suburban Atherton, Calif. Now, you'll remember him as Ty Cobb, one of the immortals of the game.

It is a far cry from the old time Georgia Peach, who contributed amazing chapters to the record books during a stretch of 24 years to the bulky gent who putters in the garden, hunts, fishes, plays golf and appreciates his greatest love, baseball, from the outlook of a spectator.

Ty Cobb still is the hotspur but to a far lesser degree than when he was fighting with rival players, umpires, his own teammates and the fans. He'll play as hard today for a dollar stake on the links as when he was battling over 300 for 23 years and putting together the greatest number of major league records ever held by an individual.

What is baseball's future in these war times? Necessarily Cobb has no more knowledge than the next man. Frankly, he is a bit worried but is optimistic to believe the sport will endure.

"Baseball is in a pretty tough position and the war requirements will continue to take its toll," Cobb said. "It may become increasingly difficult to carry on but those in charge must and will see it through. Of that I am certain. The time to bear down is when the going is the hardest."

"Until the highest authority tells them to close down, the baseball men should take the attitude they have a mission to perform. I mean by that the obligation to furnish healthy entertainment for the country at large, which after all sums up in part as a boost for morale."

"People just can't hold their breath until the war is over. My personal belief is that the service men will want the sport continued in some fashion short of an extreme national emergency."

"I hope that league baseball, even if it is played by old men, will receive some official recognition that it is essential to morale. If worst came to worst, I'd get back into harness myself to help preserve it."

of the British who had approached to within 16 miles of Rome. Allied headquarters announcements that the German attacks had been repulsed indicated, however, that the British had not been thrown back that distance. The German attack may have been aimed at the British flank.)
Some of the fiercest fighting ever seen in the Mediterranean theater was taking place at Cassino where the Germans held on grimly in the

face of the fury of the American attacks and the storm of artillery shells. American patrols once penetrated toward the center of the town but were forced to fall back to the outskirts when they encountered anti-tank guns and strong posts.

The Germans also put in two unsuccessful counterattacks in the Mt. Castellone area three miles northwest of Cassino. Farther north the Americans found the Germans had been reinforced in the Terelle area and were buried in strong concrete pillboxes.

Again Allied naval power, this time French and Dutch warships, supported the British near the coast below Cassino with heavy shelling of the area around Formia. In this sector the British made some local advances and took a few prisoners.

Allied planes again ripped into German lifelines behind the fronts despite adverse weather, with Liberators of the 15th air force attacking a railroad about 25 miles above Rome on the railroad to Florence, and the German mountain stronghold of Sulmona, facing the Eighth army front about 15 miles west of Torricella.

Members of the 12th air force had a field day strafing German motor transport on all the main and secondary roads from the Fifth army front to Rome.

Communication targets at the

edge of the Pontine marshes and at Fondi, northwest of Gaeta, as well as gun positions 27 miles up the Via Cassina from Cassino, were bombed.

part of the island. "We have landed (more) troops and mechanized equipment in force and are proceeding with the annihilation of the enemy," Adm. Chester W. Nimitz communique referred confidently to the situation.

The surprising light losses among the invaders were accounted for in large part by the devastation of the intensive, preparatory naval and air assaults. Concrete and steel defenses were ripped open by battleships firing their 16-inch guns at point blank range and by 1,000 and 2,000 pound bombs of raiding planes.

Last night, Admiral Nimitz announced that the overall objective of the invasion, the entire system of more than 32 Marshall bases spreading over an 800 mile square ocean area, continues to feel the neutralizing power of American bombers.

The announcement, covering raids Tuesday and Wednesday, extended the offensive to two atolls never previously mentioned as targets. Rongelap, northwest of Kwajalein, was pounded Wednesday by Liberators which damaged ground instal-

tations with nearly eight tons of bombs. Southeast of Kwajalein, navy search planes hit a small beached cargo vessel at Namu atoll Tuesday.

These latest bombings, which also included a 13-ton blasting of the often-raided airfield on Mili nad one-ton strikes at Wotje and Tarao on Maloelap, extended an aerial campaign of land-based planes which has been uninterrupted since early in January.

Carrier-based planes joined in the attack as the invasion opened.
