

Fierce Assaults On Italian Front

New Allied Attack on Cassino, Accompanied By Six Hour Barrage, Begun At Dawn Today; Nazi Assaults Against Allied Bridgehead Thrown Back

Allied Headquarters, Naples, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Allied troops, moving under cover of a thundering six-hour barrage from hundreds of guns—one of the most intense of the Mediterranean war—began an attack on the town of Cassino and the slopes of Mt. Cassino before dawn this morning.

At the same time Allied headquarters announced that American and British troops on the beachhead below Rome, with the aid of one of the greatest air umbrellas ever raised in the Mediterranean, had beaten back the head-on attacks made by the Germans in an effort to drive the Allies into the sea at any cost.

The attack on Cassino and the attack on the beachhead below Rome were part of a deadly hail of steel which switched like a whip from the town to the mountain and back again where the Germans were holding out in pillboxes in the town and battle-blackened houses and around the ruined monastery of Monte Cassino.

The fire from these pillboxes prevented the initial attempts to occupy the crest of the monastery hill just after a terrific bombing by flying fortresses and other aircraft which leveled the ancient abbey on Tuesday.

Just before the barrage ended shortly before dawn, the Allied troops went into the attack against the town where they have been inching forward for nearly two weeks in close-quarter combat in the streets and where they already held approximately one-third of the city.

On the Anzio beachhead the Allies still were firmly holding their perimeter, although the Germans yesterday twice broke through in bitter battle in one sector near Cassino and were twice driven back.

The German attempt to break through the Allied line on the 10-mile stretch of road from Carroceto to Anzio, apparently willing to take enormous losses to carry out Hitler's demand that the British and Americans be driven off the springboard.

But they were met by a terrific smash from Allied air might including hundreds of flying fortresses.

Baruch Postwar Plan Report Expected Soon

Washington, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Bernard M. Baruch's blueprint for restoring the peacetime economy is expected to be unveiled within a few days, possibly tomorrow.

Baruch has been working for weeks preparing his report and recommendations, which are said to run to 10,000 words and to "cover the field" of postwar problems.

Prior to its presentation to the White House, a draft of the document reportedly was circulated for comment among the highest administration officials. Few officials, however, are expected to be acquainted with it and Baruch is mum.

An assertion was made last week by an unquoted government source that Baruch was weighing the creation of an "office of economic adjustment," operating as an over-all postwar policy-making agency but leaving management of the transition to existing federal agencies.

Baruch, it was said, had in mind William L. Clayton, assistant secretary of commerce and director of the Defense Supplies Corporation, as a candidate to head the agency. It was thought unlikely that his report would name any individuals, however.

The report has been awaited with some apprehension by officials of wartime agencies, each of which has its own plans for shifting its segment of the economy back into peacetime operation.

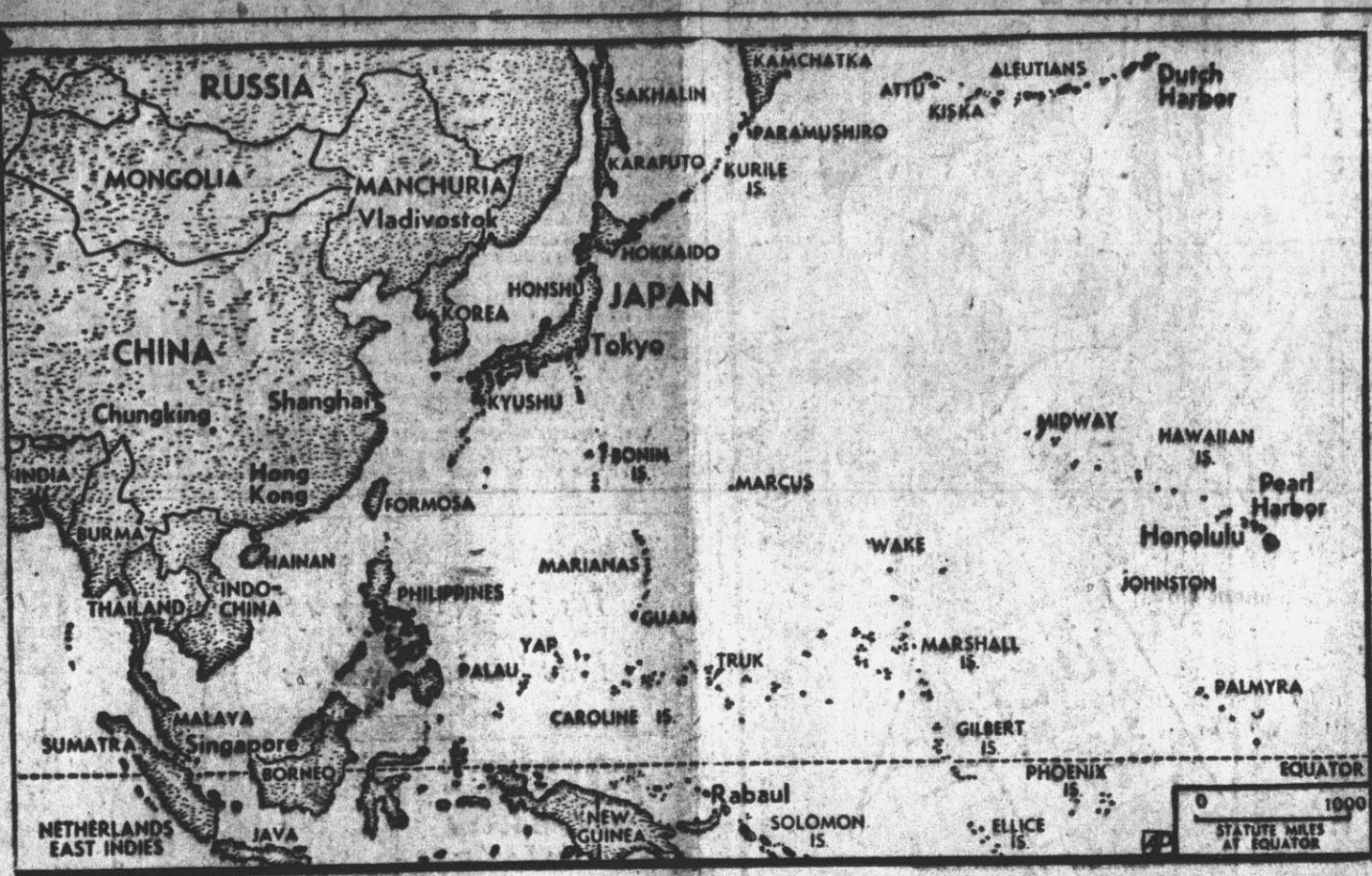
Baruch's recommendations could have no force until translated into law, executive order, or directive by the proper authorities, but the prestige of the aging industrialist is much weight.

The new report is expected to cover such questions as the government's settlement with war producers whose orders are canceled before completion; disposal of the huge federal investment in plants and machinery; the sale of goods and equipment made for troops but left over at the war's end; the treatment of sub-contractors; the extent to which price and production controls should be continued after the war; and other problems.

In planning for the actual reversion of industry, the War Production Board has been working in close contact with the War Relocation Authority.

Jap Outer Defenses Crumbling Before Allied Assaults



Since the early stages of the war in the Pacific when quick Japanese thrusts extended their operations to the very door of Australia and to island bases that threatened the supply lines to that continent, the tide has turned to the side of the Allies. The Japs suffered major naval defeat at Midway and in the Coral Sea, they have been driven from the Solomons, the Allies now occupy strategic positions on New Guinea, and the marauding Jap base at Rabaul has been rendered practically useless. The Gilbert Islands and the Marshall Islands have been seized by United States forces and according to latest announcements, the full details of which are not yet known, American naval forces have brought the important Jap naval base at Truk under assault.

American Planes And Warships Strike Heavy Blow On Jap Naval Base At Truk

Few Details Included In First Official Announcements of Daring Assaults

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Japan's mighty naval base of Truk, crowded with warships, was attacked for the first time in the war Wednesday. Today official silence left open the possibility that the powerful American aircraft carrier task forces had prolonged the heavy assault.

(The Tokyo radio, in a broadcast recorded by the U. S. foreign broadcast intelligence service, today quoted the Imperial headquarters as saying an enemy task force "raided our positions on the Truk islands since yesterday morning," and that "fierce fighting is now going on between our forces and the enemy.")

The carriers, protected by battleships, cruisers and destroyers, sent several hundred planes at dawn Feb. 16 against Truk, the mid-Pacific guardian of Japan, 2,100 statute miles to its northwest.

One reconnaissance pilot brought back reports of sighting more warships in Truk's 40-mile-wide lagoon than "I ever saw at one time in Pearl Harbor," 3,200 miles to the northeast.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz used the significant words, "commenced an attack," in disclosing that the offensive wrath of the United States navy had fallen upon the long secretly fortified bastion—some 300 volcanic formations, bristling with guns, dotted with airfields, guarded by a reef and encircled by a protective reef with few entrances.

This blow fell less than two weeks after the American conquest of Kwajalein atoll, keystone of the Marshalls more than 1,000 miles east of Truk, a conquest which afforded a launch base for the most powerful United States fleet ever amassed in the Pacific.

Admiral Nimitz' cryptic announcement stated the attack was begun by "powerful naval task forces."

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Our skipper of the Pacific fleet, Admiral Nimitz, finally has reached into the great naval base of Truk, the back at Pearl Harbor crippled America in the Pacific. Today our ships again are masters of the waves—a mighty achievement.

As this is written we lack details of what apparently started out as a major raid on Truk at dawn Wednesday. The attack was opened by hundreds of warplanes based on carriers. A big naval fleet supported the expedition.

Such a raid, if highly successful in shattering enemy defenses, might be followed by naval action. However, the original design of the expedition seems to have been to give Truk a merciless bombing. We have here, incidentally, a striking illustration of what can be done in the way of launching a huge aerial attack against an enemy from air-planes.

Truk normally is an absolute power-house of warships, warplanes and land defenses.

Loss of Truk would be a strategic blow to the Japs.

One to the Mikado. It would leave a vast and fatal gap in his eastern defenses.

Despite the importance of the base, there's no indication thus far that the Japanese fleet has come out to answer Nimitz' challenge and defend this prize. Certainly the enemy fleet must have been on the alert for an attack, since only two weeks ago a couple of our bombers flew over Truk and photographed the stronghold.

This attack on Truk, coming so quickly after our great success in the Marshall Islands, is a display of strength which indicates that we finally have the power to maintain the offensive leading straight for the Japanese mainland.

Truk is supposed to be as close to invulnerability as any base in the world. It isn't just one island, but comprises some 245 islands and its lagoon is forty miles in diameter. It has unlimited facilities for a naval fleet, and on land can support a big army and air force.

There is a reef across the mouth of Truk's huge harbor, and this affords natural protection against invasion by water. Certainly any attack would have to be spear-headed by heavy aerial bombardment. Undoubtedly the base is defended with much heavy artillery, and this would be a terrific menace to any naval force.

Because of this, the assumption is that our naval fleet staging the present raid, stood well off from Truk so as to be out of range of the land guns.

SUBSIDY BILL VETO UPHELD

House Sustains President By Vote Of 151 To 226

Washington, Feb. 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt fired the anti-subsidy bill back to congress with a veto today and promptly won his battle for subsidies when opponents failed to muster enough strength to override the veto in the house.

The house voted 226 to 151 to pass the bill over the veto, 25 votes short of the necessary two-thirds majority. Thus the veto was sustained.

Mr. Roosevelt, in his veto message, called the subsidy repealer "an inflation measure, a high cost of living measure, a food shortage measure"—the same language he used in rejecting similar legislation last summer. His veto was sustained on that occasion also.

Republicans voted preponderantly to override the President today and were joined by a number of Democrats from farming areas.

The house action provoked the necessity of the senate's voting on the veto.

The subsidy repealer was attached as a rider to a bill extending the life of the Commodity Credit Corporation, which expired yesterday. Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) said the corporation would be continued by new legislation.

The legislation proposed to end government subsidy payments for food after June 30. In addition, it would extend the life of the Commodity Credit Corporation until June 30, 1945.

Mr. Roosevelt said that it, in effect, would reverse a congressional policy and repeal the Economic Stabilization act.

He said no major war-time nation had been able to stabilize living costs without subsidies and that he did not see how the wage line could be held if the bill became law.

Once that line was broken, he asserted, food costs will rise still further and all other costs will go up, including those of munitions and supplies for the armed forces.

Another 1,000 Soldiers Rescued As U. S. Vessel Went To Bottom In European Waters As Result Of Enemy Action. Date Of Disaster Unannounced

Washington, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The army has announced the loss of 1,000 American soldiers in the sinking, "due to enemy action," of an Allied troopship in European waters. Approximately 1,000 men were saved but the toll was the greatest suffered by Allied convoy forces.

The brief announcement gave few other details but word from London that none of the survivors had been landed in Britain indicated that the ship may have been bound for the Mediterranean, although there is a possibility that the survivors may have been landed in Iceland, or returned to the western hemisphere.

The army statement, which said the ship was struck at night, pointed out that the enemy probably does not know fully of the success of the attack, and that for this reason the date of the sinking was not disclosed.

A number of Allied transports have been lost but never before with such a heavy death toll. The navy disclosed the sinking of two cargo-passenger vessels in the Atlantic about a year ago, in which 600 of the 900 on one ship were lost and about half of the 500 aboard the other. Only five lives were lost and between 4,500 and 6,000 saved when the President Coolidge struck a mine in the South Pacific October 26, 1942.

Four transports—two of them British—carrying American troops were torpedoed in World War I with a total loss of 323 lives.

Seven Navy Planes Crashed Yesterday

Washington, Feb. 18.—(AP)—A fresh series of air accidents, seven navy planes crashed yesterday in the general vicinity of the national capital, four of which were part of a six-plane squadron. Personnel involved and the total number of casualties was not disclosed.

The first accident reported was that of a naval twin-engine transport which crashed near Calverton, Md., killing two and injuring four crew members.

Three planes of a six-plane squadron crashed near Montross, Va., a fourth near Quantico. The two other planes in the squadron landed safely.

In two other accidents, one navy plane crashed at Elkins, W. Va., and another at Millington, Md.

No Charter Rights For Axis Nations

London, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Germany and other enemy nations can expect to be dismembered after their defeat, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden indicated in Commons today.

"The Atlantic Charter clause which opposes territorial changes not in accord with freely expressed wishes of the peoples concerned, is not regarded as applying to enemy countries," he said in reply to a question.

Meanwhile, Russia's proposals for handling a defeated Germany were reported to have been presented to the European Advisory Commission. British and American views have already been given the commission, which acts merely in an advisory capacity to the big three Allied governments.

A tight lid of censorship has been placed on all proceedings of the commission.

Polish Cabinet To Bow To Demands Of Russia

London, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The Poles said today that the exiled Polish cabinet may bow to Moscow's demands and resign, thereby enabling Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk to form a new government acceptable to and capable of dealing with Russia.

Resignation reports came in official channels in close touch with the exiled government admit privately that cabinet changes are possible to meet Soviet demands for removal of some of the members Moscow has accused of being anti-Russian.

Other reports said, meanwhile, that the cabinet's decision on Moscow's newest boundary proposals were being transmitted to Premier Joseph Stalin by Prime Minister Churchill. The British Prime Minister is said to have sent one message to Stalin earlier in the week and is now preparing a second message, possibly telling Stalin that the Poles might be prepared to accept the boundary terms and order the Polish underground to take up arms against the Germans alongside the Russians.

George K. Beach, American Red Cross field director at Cherry Point, paid a business visit to the Greenville Red Cross office yesterday, at which time he appointed Mrs. Walter Taylor, executive secretary of the local chapter, as acting field director for the Greenville air base.

The local Red Cross chapter, through its home service program, offers the following services to the families of the armed forces: (1) If they need to get in touch with you in case of serious illness or death at home; (2) If they need help in time of trouble—the kind of help you would give if you were there; (3) If they need advice about allowances, allotments, and government benefits for dependents; (4) If they need help in preparing claims for government benefits; (5) If they are worried about you and want reports on your welfare.

The local office is open from 9 to 12 a. m., and from 2 to 5 p. m. every day except Saturday, when the hours are from 9 a. m. to 12:30 p. m., with either Mrs. Taylor or one of her staff assistants in charge, and eager to be of service.

HE LOVED THEORY

There was a great theologian in this country some years ago who profoundly influenced the thought of thousands of people. Only a few, however, were aware of the fact that in addition to being a great theologian he was one of the best versed men in the United States on baseball. But the singular aspect of the matter was this—he never attended baseball games.

Theoretically, he knew all about the game. He could give the batting averages of all the prominent players, keep a box-score, prophesy with accuracy regarding the outcome of the World Series. But he would not have crossed the street to see the most exciting game on record. The few games he had witnessed years ago had bored him almost to extinction. But baseball as a scientific study—ah, that was a different matter.

Now curiously enough those who knew him well realized that the attitude the learned professor maintained toward baseball was precisely the attitude he maintained toward theology. To him theology was a science. He had little interest in the relation it bore to life. He loved to discuss theology, to spin theories, to dwell on distinctions without a difference. But he was frankly bored by the insistence of certain fanatical folk that religion should make a difference in the way a man lived. It made little difference in the way he lived. He had many superb qualities, but he was also selfish, vain and implacable toward his enemies. He was fascinated by Christianity as a sound theory. He was impatient with those who insisted too earnestly that the theory must be applied.

forces... with several hundred of our planes participating." Although there was no elaboration, there was nothing whatever to indicate that the escorting battleships, cruisers and destroyers had risked the concentrated fire of Japanese fleet units and shore batteries as well as defending planes to move in and shell Truk.

Until Truk's airfields were neu-

tralized and any carriers inside the lagoon were knocked out, a ship bombardment would be a doubly dangerous venture.

But the assault did carry the American offensive on past such Japanese-held bases as Eniwetok in the western Marshalls and Kusaie and Ponape in the eastern Carolines, the latter hit only last Monday by 55 tons of bombs dropped by land-based planes.

The initial onslaught against Truk vital supply base for such crumbling enemy bases as Rabaul and Kavieng in the south Pacific, was thus briefly sketched by Admiral Nimitz.

"At daylight yesterday morning (16 Feb. west longitude date) powerful naval task forces of the U. S. Pacific fleet commenced an attack on the Japanese naval base at Truk with several hundred of our planes participating. No further details are available."

The latter phrase, it was explained, meant that Admiral Nimitz himself was without more complete word, due to the tightness of the radio silence for such a daring undertaking.

of 221 tons of bombs. The Japanese stepped up their air activity, sending 15 dive-bombers to attack shipping and the beaches at the Green Islands, which American and New Zealand troops occupied Tuesday. Six of the raiders were downed. No damage was done to troops or equipment, headquarters spokesmen said.

Allied shipping off Empress Augusta Bay, on the west coast of Bougainville island in the Solomons, was attacked by Japanese aircraft. Some damage and casualties resulted. Two enemy planes were downed.

On New Britain Island, American

marines were finding many abandoned enemy dead as they pushed eastward from Cape Gloucester on the northwest coast. The marines have reached Rottock bay, about 27 miles east of the cape.

Contact with Japanese troops has been made by Allied troops along Mot river, about seven miles west of Sador, on the northeast New Guinea coast. It was southeast of Sador that Australian troops recently joined American soldiers who invaded Sador from the sea Jan. 2. The contact at Point Iris on the Mot river may mean the Allies are moving toward Madang, the enemy base about 50 miles up the coast.

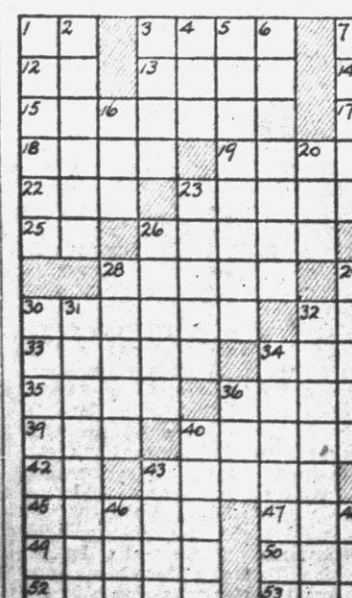

March 1 effective date for the long list of increased federal excise taxes carried in the bill, which could only be effective then if the law had been entered on the statute books ten days before the first of next month. The new excises are estimated to yield approximately \$87,000,000 a month.

A veto would set aside the decision of Congress to freeze the Social Security payroll taxes at the present levels of one per cent on employers and employees, inasmuch as a temporary freeze measure expires March 1 and in the absence of the new proposed law, the rates will automatically rise to two per cent on employers and employees at the end of February. Such a rise, it is estimated, will provide an additional 1,300,000,000 in annual revenue. Congressional leaders have expressed doubt that congress will enact another revenue measure this year, if there is a veto for this one—which finally emerged after months of hearings and debate. Thus, if there is no overriding action by Congress (and attempts to override a veto are considered unlikely), general federal tax rates would remain at the levels under which collections are currently being made.

resses and Liberators which made the greatest heavy bomber effort ever waged in the Mediterranean area in support of ground troops.

Showering the enemy with thousands of anti-personnel and fragmentation bombs and other missiles, the big bombers attacked all along just behind the Germans' front.

Clearing weather permitting the air forces to take off in strength also saw swarms of medium and light bombers roaming the battle area and plastering the enemy almost at will.

Allied airmen carried out 1,500 sorties, one of the biggest days they have had.

Although this had the effect of pinning down German armor and infantry, bitter fighting still was raging along the beachhead. Besides making his main effort down the Via Anziate toward Anzio, the enemy also struck in the Cisterna area. Two regiments penetrated into Allied lines, but Allied headquarters said the American-British position was re-established by prompt counter-attacks.

As in launching their offensive Wednesday morning, the Germans supported their drives with intense artillery fire, and sent larger than usual formations of their airforce

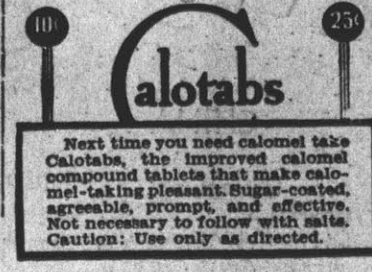
to support the drive, sending out 183 sorties.

In some cases these German airmen broke through the Allied sky patrols and bombed and shot up Allied troops.

Allied warships contributed to the battle on both fronts, the British cruiser Mauritius blasting the German road bottleneck at Formia, just in front of the main Fifth army front to the south, while other warships took shots at German long-range guns which have been shelling Anzio shipping.

A German shell passed through the bridge of one American warship without exploding during this exchange of blows.

D. A. R. Chapter House Will Be State Shrine

Farmville, Feb. 18.—With gifts of additional land and substantial donations already received in connection with recent plans of the Major Benjamin May Chapter, D. A. R., for perpetuating the memory of pioneer families of Eastern North Carolina, and their descendants who are continuing their vision of progress and reputation for prominent citizenship, the chapter will launch out in full force on February 22, a movement designed to further enhance the beauty and historical significance of the Chapter House, the only one of its kind in the state.

Since 1926, when the ideal of a cultural and social center of discriminating taste and grace had its inception and the building erected, it has been the heartfelt desire of the chapter membership to make it a shrine of glorious tradition and a sanctuary as well, and to have it stand out in Eastern Carolina as a beautiful and living memorial to its progressive citizenship.

And so, in this spirit, the design of a memorial place has been accepted by the chapter with space for 50 names, which will be cast in bronze and placed in a position to overlook the gallery of the colonial drawing room.

A historical volume to be compiled, will contain sketches of all the families memorialized in the building, of which there are already a large number.

The recent financial gifts will relieve the chapter from the present indebtedness on the building, and the additional land offered will give ample space for laying out colonial gardens, making appropriate gate entrances and transforming this site into a beauty spot for the state.

These gifts, already pledged, have provided incentive and given assurance of the immediate success of the objective stated at the beginning of this article, and which will include the establishment of a foundation fund to take care of current needs in relation to the upkeep of the building. Furnishings downstairs will proceed with the drawing room idea in colonial style and the upstairs will be an American banquet room.

The chapter house will be a fitting repository for historical books and documents to be used as a research library, and it is proposed to memorialize the Pitt County Resolves in an appropriate manner. Since its organization, the chapter has consistently promoted events that have been epochal in their nature.

and have called national attention to the history of Eastern North Carolina.

It has been suggested that the service men of this community, who are engaged in the present conflict, have some special place in the memorial plans, and this will doubtless be achieved.

Members of the family of the late Grigg Tyson, one of the most prominent citizens of this section, will have the distinction of being the first to respond to the proposed plan for the tablet memorialization, and it is noteworthy in that Mr. Tyson knew and loved the history of the State of North Carolina and was well informed on the genealogy of the pioneer citizenship.

From time to time sketches will appear in the local papers, relative to historical truths and treasured traditions associated with people and events of this section, as the committees in charge of the memorial movement unearth facts and figures in their contacts with descendants of the pioneer citizens. In this connection a diary has already been discovered in the possession of a grandson of one of the best known and most beloved personages in this section and may offer an untold wealth of information in the entries.

Jones Tuesday evening to make final plans for the memorial movement, to be launched Feb. 22 and declared ended when the goal of 50 names is reached.

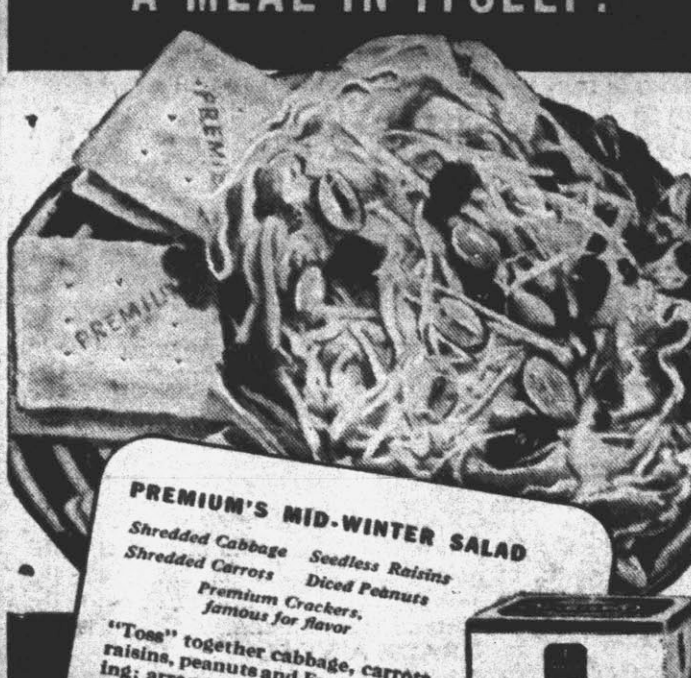
