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## MUD SLOWING ACTIVITY ON ITALIAN FRONT

Ground Action Limited To Patrols; Air Force Gets In New Blows On Enemy; Nazi Prisoners Taken In Italy Now Total 15,000

Allied Headquarters, Naples, Mar. 10.—(AP)—Activity on all battle fronts in Italy dwindled to minor patrol operations yesterday in the face of severe weather. Allied headquarters announced today.

Allied aircraft managed to get into the air, however, for 900 sorties. Medium bombers again attacked shipping and other targets at Santo Stefano and Montalto Di Castro northwest of Rome. Light bombers hit enemy gun positions at Campobello and the railway at Capranica.

Approximately 30 enemy aircraft were sighted over the battle area during the day, the announcement said. Two Allied planes are missing.

Headquarters announced that the total of Germans captured on all fronts in Italy since the Salerno landings last September has now passed 15,000. Three thousand of these were taken on the beachhead and 1,500 in and around Cassino.

Skirmishing occurred between patrols at various points yesterday on the beachhead, one of them in the ravines of the Moletta river southwest of Carroccio. In another area British soldiers shot down an enemy fighter plane with small arms fire.

A delayed dispatch released last night quoted Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, Allied commander in Italy, as telling war correspondents on a visit to the beachhead March 4 that the situation there now is "very much better" than three weeks before.

Yesterday's air war brought the first announcement of P-39 Airacobras carrying bombs. They blasted a fuel-carrying train at Montalto Di Castro and the airfield at Mariana Di Pisa, a few miles up the coast from Leghorn.

## Driving Ban May Be Renewed Soon

Baltimore, March 10.—(AP)—Possible renewal of the eastern pleasure driving ban and still more reductions in gasoline rations were forecast today by a Maryland Office of Price Administration spokesman.

The official declared there are definite indications that such may be taken, although he pointed out that any action would be entirely a matter for the national OPA.

The spokesman cited among the indications Petroleum Administration Harold L. Jakes' recent statement that "petroleum stocks are tight and will become tighter," the planned reduction of gasoline coupon values in the west, and European invasion plans.

In Washington, however, OPA officials said revival of the ban was not under consideration. The same sources stated it could not be determined whether any cut in present rations will be necessary until the Petroleum Administration for War sets second quarter gasoline allocations, probably next week.

## Italian Fleet To Stay In The Mediterranean

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—More than a dozen British and American surface warships plus a score of other naval craft may be assigned to Russia under the deal now pending for dispersal of the Italian fleet.

The present plan, it was learned today, is to transfer British and American naval units to Russian operation for the duration of the war and leave the Italian fleet relatively intact in the Mediterranean where it has performed well under American and British direction.

Once the Russians have been instructed in the handling of vessels they get, strategic factors indicate they will be put in service on the northern supply route to Murmansk. They can not be moved into the Black sea because of German control, through island-based aircraft, of the Mediterranean approaches to the Dardanelles. Eventually, if Russia goes to war with Japan they might be employed in the Pacific.

The full story of Italian fleet distribution indicates that most of the confusion and particularly the concern expressed by Premier Badoglio in Italy over what was to happen arose from the way in which the news was first made public.

At his press conference a week ago today President Roosevelt told questioners that roughly about one-third of the fleet or its equivalent was due Russia and that problems of arranging a transfer according to that formula were only about

## Allied Forces Driving Ahead On Burma Front

Fighting Pace Set By Stilwell's Forces Indicate Major Crisis For Japanese

New Delhi, March 10.—(AP)—The rapid mopping up of 2,000 Japanese caught in the Maingwan area of the Hukawng valley in northern Burma was announced today by a southeast Asia communiqué which said 1,200 to 1,300 enemy troops had been killed by American and Chinese troops.

The Chinese 38th division continued to push southward on the east edge of the valley while to the west the 22nd Chinese division contacted the Americans and advanced southward on a motor road.

Mopping up the trapped Japanese, Chinese units fought a series of engagements along the Namyin river to the north of the American positions, wiping out 450 at one place and 150 near Ningku Ga, six miles southeast of Maingwan.

To the south in Arakan, British units made further head about a mile north of Butheung. Butheung is about 50 miles north of Akyab.

British and American aircraft carried out a series of furious operations against airfields in central Burma in which 46 Japanese planes were destroyed against two losses in northern Burma where 50 tons of bombs were dropped, and Japanese headquarters in the Arakan area where a heavy explosion was caused.

American heavy bombers hit an airfield on the Malay peninsula in southernmost Burma. So fast is Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell forcing the fighting pace in northern Burma that a crisis which will make or break this year's Burma campaign is rapidly approaching.

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## RAF CONTINUES AIR OFFENSIVE

Aircraft Plants In France Bombed Last Night

London, March 10.—(AP)—British four-engine bombers, striking again at Germany's aircraft production, reached far into southern France last night and bombed the large factory at Marignane near Marseille, the Air Ministry announced today.

The RAF strike kept Allied blows going around the clock following yesterday's bombing of Berlin through dense clouds by the American eighth air force.

Already a shakeup of the top men of the German air force had been precipitated by the series of heavy assaults on Berlin in which at least 324 Nazi planes were destroyed, Swedish press dispatches reported.

The Air Ministry communique telling of the night operation said the large aircraft factory at Marignane was attacked in bright moonlight and first reports indicated the bombing as accurate and concentrated.

At the same time Mosquitos, giving western Germany no ease, struck objectives in that area. The Air Ministry said none of its planes was missing.

The Lancaster raid was the RAF's third night precision attack on German aircraft factories in France in a month.

On Feb. 8 a similar force using the new six-ton "factory-buster" bomb, hit the Gnome-Rhone airplane engine factory at Limoges, and on March 2 smashed at plants near Paris and Albert in northern France.

## Reds Cross Drive Starts March 20

Reports from all sections of the country to national headquarters indicate satisfactory results for the first week of the \$200,000,000 war fund campaign for the Red Cross during the month of March. Pitt county's objective in this campaign is \$31,000.

Instead of a long drawn out campaign for four weeks, the strategy employed in Pitt county is for a short, sharp and decisive action to attain the desired objective within one week. This will insure fewer casualties among the forces engaged and less wear and tear upon the morale of civilians throughout the county.

The schedule for attack has been set for March 20, zero hour is known only to the command officers of the various fronts, and 14 simultaneous advances will be made on that date.

The campaign will be waged by a task force of 14 regiments of Commandos, volunteers from all branches of the service, and this force will be led into action by competent and experienced officers consisting of one colonel and two lieutenant-colonels for each sector for this important advance on March 20.

## Charges Against Meadows Studied By College Board

Auditors' Report Reveals Shortage of Over \$18,000 in Student Funds; Delegation Expresses Full Confidence in President Meadows; Friction Among Faculty Members Charged

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—Trustees of East Carolina Teachers College, at Greenville, received today a state auditor's report purporting to show that Dr. Leon Meadows, college president, had not satisfactorily accounted for receipts totaling \$18,636.34.

The report, based on months of study by the auditor's bureau of institutional and departmental auditing, and the State Bureau of Investigation, was turned over to the trustees at a special meeting.

Dr. Meadows was invited to meet with the bureau, of which the chairman is Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, state superintendent of public instruction.

The funds in question, handled by Dr. Meadows as president, were from special accounts, such as the Paul T. Ricks Tours, the stationery store, paying, and other activities connected with the college.

The report said Dr. Meadows was accountable for \$26,000.42. Disbursements made by Dr. Meadows "for which we are reasonably satisfied the college or students received benefit," totaled \$7,430.06, the auditors reported.

M. L. Widenhouse, certified public accountant, and W. A. Allen, senior auditor, both attached to the auditing bureau, signed the report. They were aided by W. I. Galling, chief agent of the SBI.

In a letter today to Chairman Erwin, Governor Broughton, expressed "the view that in any aspect of the matter as revealed by this audit, the manner in which these funds have been handled has been shockingly unbusinesslike and highly irregular. It is my view with respect to this institution and all other state institutions, that funds, whether arising from student activities or otherwise in connection with the operation of such institutions, should be handled by a bonded and duly authorized official and kept in a separate and official bank account, and duly and regularly audited by the state auditor."

Governor Broughton explained that the state auditor, George Ross Pou, and his examiners told him in January, 1943, that certain funds were handled by the president through his personal account. He then called a meeting of the trustees, who appointed a special committee to study the matter. It was the unanimous opinion of the board, the governor said, that the state auditor should audit the funds.

Such action was taken, Pou explained today that after certain facts were uncovered, the governor asked the SBI to work on the matter.

A large delegation of faculty members, townspeople and alumni appeared before the board in behalf of Dr. Meadows. Many of them spoke of dissonance of the faculty and one said that a certain member of the faculty wanted the president. Full confidence in Dr. Meadows was expressed.

Among those who spoke were Mrs. Clem Garner of Greenville, state president of the college alumnae; Dr. J. Y. Joyner of LaGrange, former state superintendent of public instruction; Mrs. J. C. Holland, J. Clay Williams, both of Raleigh; Mrs. B. M. Bennett of Forest City; Miss Bessie Hunt of Wilmington; Mayor Bruce Sugg and Mrs. S. J. Everett, both of Greenville; and Dr. A. D. Frank and Miss Louise Williams of the college faculty.

"This," said Miss Williams, "is the culmination of things that have been going on for a long time. Always, where disaffection has been sown, the same people have been quoted."

Dr. Frank, too, said he had known that a fight by certain members of the faculty against Meadows had been going on for several years, although the faculty was functioning smoothly.

Twenty-one transactions were brought to the board's attention. But, said the auditors, "due to the lack of proper records and supporting data, our investigation consisted largely of interviews with employees, former employees, vendors and others whom we had reason to believe had information regarding the transactions involved."

In general, the investigation covered the period from July 1, 1934, when Meadows became president, to June 30, 1943.

"We call your attention to the fact that, prior to our examination entitled 'Report on Examination of Special Funds, December 11, 1942,' the state auditor's office, to the best of our knowledge, had never been advised that there were any college or student funds being handled through the personal account of Dr. L. R. Meadows. The auditors said in the report, which formally was made to State Auditor George Ross Pou.

The investigation included a study of two personal memo books of Meadows, in which the handling of school money was noted. A number of persons interviewed were quoted as saying they received less than the notations of Dr. Meadows showed. For instance: "The college treasurer's records show that Henry Freeman was paid \$50 on August 22, 1942, and \$75 on August 25, 1942, for 'pouring concrete—now building.' Since Henry Freeman said he did not do this job for the college in 1942, the \$125 payment by the college treasurer would be for the same work for which Dr. Meadows claims \$324 was paid to Freeman."

"We had Henry Freeman show Mr. Pollock, the state engineer, the work he did in 1942 for the college. Mr. Pollock estimated that the work shown him by Henry Freeman had a fair value of \$128.68."

"Henry Freeman told us that he received \$50 in cash from Dr. Meadows for doing this work in addition to what was paid him by the college treasurer, or a total of \$175."

The report went on to say that last January 26, Dr. Meadows asserted he had received \$1,091.30 from the Town of Greenville and two individuals for their share in a paving project. Dr. Meadows was quoted as saying that he had a record somewhere of how the money was spent and two days later turned over a letter to the auditors dated December 20, 1943, purportedly from Cocoa, Fla., and signed by J. W. Clark, showing that he, Clark, had received \$1,095 for work and materials.

On February 8, 1944, a representative of the state auditor's office interviewed J. W. Clark at Rockledge, Fla., and quoted Clark as saying that the letter was not written on December 20, 1943, in Cocoa, Fla., as shown on the face of the letter, but that it was written while he was in Greenville around Christmas, 1943.

"Mr. Clark," the report said, "stated that the letter was written from information contained in a letter from Dr. Meadows to him bearing the date of September, 1937. Mr. Clark stated that while this letter from Dr. Meadows bore the date of September, 1937, that it was handed to him by Dr. Meadows while he was in Greenville around Christmas, 1943."

"Mr. Clark stated that he did not have any record whatsoever showing what he had received from Dr. Meadows."

A plumping bill of \$393.50 also was brought into question. The work was alleged to have been done in Wilson and Jarvis halls and the plumber said he believed he was

London, March 10.—(AP)—The Berlin radio today said that British and American commandos under the command of a British general with the name of Churchill had landed on Lissa island off the Dalmatian coast of Yugoslavia.

There was no confirmation of the landing, but it was widely believed in London that the German broadcast was talking about Capt. Randolph Churchill, son of Prime Minister Churchill, who is reported to have gone to Yugoslavia presumably dropping by parachute.

The broadcast said Churchill, son of the British Prime Minister, had taken command of Allied troops on the island, but it remained to be seen whether his forces would include 2,000 followers of Marshal Tito (Josip Broz) there.

Young Churchill recently conferred with Marshal Tito, presumably after he parachuted into Yugoslavia. The Berlin broadcast identified

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## Asked To Close Axis Embassies

Belfast, Northern Ireland, March 10.—(AP)—The United States has asked neutral Eire to close the German legation and the Japanese consulate as an anti-espionage measure to protect Allied troop movements in Northern Ireland.

Although a note presented late in February by David Gray, U. S. minister to Eire, contained no ultimatum and no demand for southern Ireland bases, rumors arose that such demands had been made. A "stand to" by Eire's army was ordered along the Ulster border from February 25 to February 28.

One account said that following a conference with Gray at which the note was presented, Prime Minister Eamon De Valera immediately had the Irish minister to Washington, Robert Brennan, contact President Roosevelt.

The President was reported to have assured Brennan there was no question of force and that the note simply was a request as a matter of urgency that something be done against the activities of Axis establishments in Eire.

## Cold Wave Strikes Eastern Territory

The mercury dropped to 25.1 degrees at the Airways observation station here last night. It was rising shortly before noon, with promise of warmer weather. The cold snap, coming at this time, before the fruit blossoms are completely open, slowed up the buds and may benefit the crop. Freezing weather after the blossoms are fully opened is disastrous. Peach, plum and pear trees are showing color as a result of recent mild weather.

Tobacco plant beds have not been damaged in this section, farmers said.

Nazi Ace Killed.  
London, March 10.—(AP)—The Paris radio said today that Lt.-Col. Mayer, a German fighter ace credited with 102 air victories, had been killed in combat.

## NAZIS SUFFER NEW REVERSES ON RED FRONT

Admit Evacuation Of Uman, Strong Hinge Position Between Russian Drive Toward Kikalaev And Thrust Toward Old Poland

London, March 10.—(AP)—The German radio announced today that Nazi troops had abandoned Uman, one of their strong bases in the western Ukraine.

Uman, a rail head, lies about mid-way between Vinnitsa and Kirovograd and about five miles east of the Bug river. It is at the hinge between the Russian drive toward Nikolayev and the other Soviet southern Ukrainian drive into old Poland on the west.

The entire southern Ukrainian front blazed today with a great Russian offensive which Moscow said has resulted in the capture of Staro-Konstantinov, storming of the inner defenses of Tarnopol and the breaching of the German lines guarding the Black Sea ports of Nikolayev and Kherson.

Most spectacular of the day's development was the disclosure by Premier Stalin of a new Russian drive launched by Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky southwest of Kriyoi Roz. Here, in four days of intensive fighting, the Third Ukrainian army, driving westward across the Ingulets river, routed nine German divisions and captured Novi Bug and Grozny, respectively 53 and 40 miles north Nikolayev, and Kazanka, 17 miles northeast of Novi Bug.

Eight thousand Germans were killed and 1,000 captured in this advance, the Russian communique asserted. Nazi forces were driven back from 19 to 37 miles, abandoning huge stocks of war materiel, including 57 tanks, 175 guns and more than 2,000 trucks. More than 250 localities were liberated by Malinovsky's troops, the bulletin added.

Besides attacking the Black Sea ports of Nikolayev and Kherson, Malinovsky's advance was a direct thrust to the several hundred thousand Nazi troops still in the lower Ukraine and along the coast of the Black Sea toward Odessa. Front dis-

## Resignation Of Ramirez Brings New Difficulties

Buenos Aires, March 10.—(AP)—The Argentine supreme court met today, presumably to consider a resignation of the presidency by Pedro Ramirez, whose administration broke relations with the Axis only to be confronted with a palace coup in which Edelmo J. Farrell became acting president.

Justices hurried here from vacation spots to convene a special session of the court.

Ramirez already had vacated the presidential palace and taken a private villa in Buenos Aires. It was learned authoritatively that Ramirez had advised the court he had sent his resignation to Farrell together with a manifesto to the nation giving his reasons for the action. It was believed the court probably would limit its action to taking note of the communication without expressing an attitude.

(Dispatches from Montevideo, Uruguay, said it was reported from Buenos Aires that Ramirez' resignation had placed the Farrell regime in a difficult position.)

(The Farrell government has taken the position that Ramirez had merely delegated his authority to his successor on account of ill health, and that consequently no new issue was raised concerning his recognition by other nations.)

(The United States and Britain, however, have withheld formal diplomatic recognition with the Farrell government, pending clarification of its purposes with respect to hemisphere defense and protection against Axis agents. Chile and Bolivia have recognized the Farrell

government.)

No information regarding the Ramirez resignation was made available by official quarters yesterday, however.

During a press interview, Col. Gregorio Tauber, presidential secretary, disclosed that Farrell and his entire cabinet would meet today.

The Supreme court recognized Ramirez as the head of the de facto government after the military revolution against President Ramon Castillo last June 4, and the withdrawal of Gen. Arturo Rawson who held the office for two days.

Ramirez' action in delegating his presidential mandate to Vice President Farrell on February 25 followed the government's decision to rupture relations with the Axis.

Although Farrell announced almost immediately his government would continue both the domestic and international policies established by Ramirez, the sudden change in the presidential office led Edward R. Stebbins, Jr., U. S. under secretary of state, to declare that the American ambassador at Buenos Aires had been directed to refrain from establishing official relations with the Farrell regime pending developments.

### WHEREIN LIES FAILURE?

All through the confusion one sees the grey tree-moss clinging to trees, sometimes from crest to root. The prevailing opinion is that the tree is killed by such moss. Tree experts, however, tell us that this is not so. What really happens is that this moss adheres to trees that are already dying.

This is what is known in logic as a non sequitur. Because one state of affairs follows another does not necessarily mean that the first is the cause of the second.

Apply this to everyday life. We fail in many things, and we say that the fault is not in us but in this circumstance. The failure has followed the circumstance, therefore the circumstance has been the cause of the failure. But look a little closer. Has not the failure been due to some weakness in our character? We say the moss killed the tree. But the moss did not kill the tree; it chose for its arbor a tree that was already dying. We insist that some particular circumstance caused our failure. But it was not the circumstance. That circumstance would be present in the life of anyone who had our weakness. Like the moss, it adhered to a tree that was already dying.

Don't blame failure on things, persons, hard luck—on the stupidity of your associates, on your relatives, on your lack of opportunity. These factors accompanied the failure of your enterprise but they did not cause it. They were the kind of factors which would adhere to such a person as yourself. The moss only clings to trees already dying. Something else from within is killing the tree, and some latent weakness of our character—not the circumstance or person we blame—has made us fail.

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## WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—The political wheel is really rolling here now. Almost everything that happens is being interpreted in terms of its effect on the national elections.

Two important speculations recently are:

1. Whether Vice President Henry A. Wallace has hurt or improved his chances for renomination by his recent speech-making swing around the country.

2. Whether House minority leader Rep. "Joe" Martin will give the nod to those many Republicans who are urging that he accept permanent chairmanship of the Republican national convention at Chicago in July.

Observers here are pretty confused and confusing about Wallace's chances. But broadly there are two schools of thought. One holds that second place on the Democratic ticket is unimportant and that no matter what Wallace says or does as long as he continues loyal to the President and Administration policies, the President won't dump him for members of the "right wing." Wallace would be just as important a running mate as any one else and that while President Roosevelt makes his appeal to conservatism and a simple win-the-war-and-the-peace program, Wallace would hold in line the party's "liberals" and leaving New Dealers.

The second school feels Wallace already has been tossed overboard and that his recent speeches are merely efforts to keep afloat. Wallace's statement at his press conference the other day, that his renomination "is in the lap of the gods" certainly is an indication that he hasn't given up hope of seeing his name on the Democratic ticket. It has been taken also as a clue that he hasn't been given any hint as to whether he will be.

Probably no decision has been made about a vice presidential candidate and won't be until after the Republican convention.

The importance of Martin's again taking over permanent chairmanship of the Republican convention shouldn't be underestimated. A permanent chairman with a knowledge of convention strategy and parlia-

mentary rules can throw an awful lot of weight into convention decisions. Furthermore, the selection of Martin would probably be the most harmonious move the Republicans could make. Observers here are certain that both the Willie and stop-Wilkie factions would be willing to give Martin the chair.

Martin is one of the most widely respected Republican stalwarts there weren't any complaints about how he fought for Wilkie in the 1916 election campaign, and there aren't any complaints about the way he handles party leadership in the "house." He comes through nearly all internal scraps without being fazed by the brush of any faction.

As permanent convention chairman, he might go far in healing the ruptures that many observers think are certain to develop when the G. O. P. gets together in July.

paid by check. Meadows said payment was made August 28, 1939. However, the former plant engineer at the college, H. I. West, said he did not remember the work "and he did not see how it would be possible for \$393.50 of plumbing work to be done without his knowing about it." The college record indicated West worked for the college from July 22, 1934, to October 8, 1939.

Also mentioned in the auditors' report were the purchase of typewriters, the purchase of a refrigerator, and the sale of kitchen garbage. The items were fully detailed and inventoried.

We showed the college voucher dated September 30, 1937, to Dr. Meadows on January 26, 1944, and asked him if he considered the Kelvinator belongs to himself personally or to the college," the report said.

he paid \$95.45 with his personal check on the Kelvinator, and then listed that \$95.45 as a disbursement in his memo book; also, why the entire invoice for the Carolina Sales Corporation was not paid by the college check. Dr. Meadows did not give us any explanation of this.

"In a conversation with Mr. H. I. West, who was the college engineer at the time this transaction occurred, Mr. West told us that he understood that the purchase of the Kelvinator had not been approved by the Division of Purchase and Contract. Mr. West also said that Dr. Meadows had told him that the Kelvinator belonged to him personally."

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters Pearl Harbor, March 10—(AP)—For only the second time since the American invasion of the Marshalls more than a month ago, Japanese planes have dealt a counterblow at the invaders.

Fleet headquarters announced that several formations of Japanese bombers struck Wednesday at Eniwetok and a spokesman said the target was Engebi islet, an air

base. The Japanese planes were shot down by American fighters.

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American forces completed occupation of Eniwetok, in the western Marshalls, Feb. 22.

The first enemy counterblow was dealt the night of Feb. 11 against Roi and Namur islands, air bases on the north end of Kwajalein atoll.

Headquarters said tersely concerning Wednesday's raid:

"On March 8 enemy planes raided our positions in Eniwetok atoll, causing small damage."

Where the planes came from was not stated but the announcement added that on the day before the raid a navy search plane shot down a Japanese naval medium bomber "between Eniwetok and Truk." Truk is 750 miles southwest of Eniwetok and there are other enemy bases in the Carolines still closer to the Marshalls.

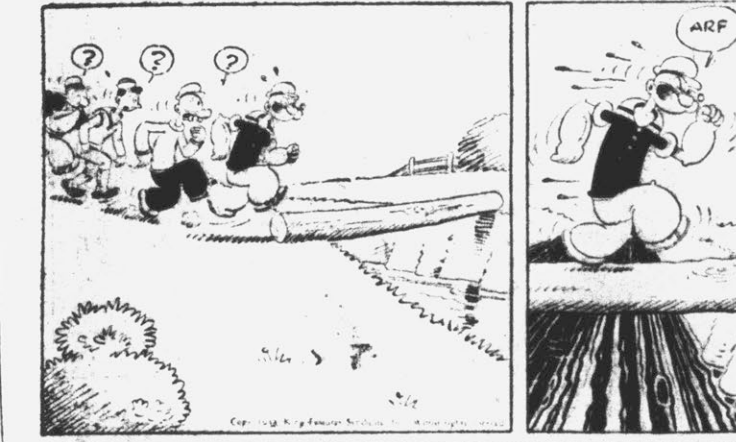

(Continued From Page One) year have begun to show surprise and real interest in the fact that "Vinegar Joe" has forced his way approximately 100 miles into north Burma.

He is rapidly confronting the Japanese with a new decision—they must draw forces from other Burma fronts to halt Stilwell's Chinese and American columns, or permit him to accomplish his objective relatively unhindered. His aim is to clear the Japanese from north Burma so he can build a new link to the Burma road which can carry supplies to fighting forces in China.

Stilwell has been advancing much faster than the southeast Asian high command thought possible. So far as seizing territory is concerned, Stilwell's show is the biggest operation going on against the Japanese this side of Japanese-held zones.

"Vinegar Joe's" action in diverting his American infantry column into operations in direct cooperation with his American-trained Chinese is a drastic revision of the first plan to have the column led by Brig. Gen. Frank Merrill merely make a long-range harassing penetration of Burma.

Instead Merrill's Marauders made a big left loop around the Japanese and came in 10 miles behind their ranks to spread confusion. Originally, it evidently was planned to make Gen. Stilwell deputy commander under Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten, southeast Asia commander in chief, and an official announcement to this effect.

His operations, however, are based on India and supplied from there, and come under Mountbatten's command. Despite reinforcements to the Japanese forces in Burma during the past several months, "Vinegar Joe" is going a long way toward taking north Burma away from the Japanese.

(Continued From Page One) best results would be had by keeping all the fleet in the Mediterranean and transferring to Russia an equivalent amount of British-American ships. Because of American productive capacity, it appears that most of the transferred ships will be of American origin.

Finally about two weeks ago the Russian ambassador Andrei Gromyko called on the President and asked again about the Russian share of the fleet. It was in connection on this diplomatic inquiry that the President last Friday broke the news that under the surrender terms Russia had a right to her share of the Italian naval tonnage.

Publicly released figures on the exact number of Italian warships surrendered are vague at best; but they show approximately five battleships, some of them old and damaged eight cruisers, 27 destroyers and one aircraft carrier. In addition the Italians probably surrendered about 60 submarines and a number of torpedo boats and other small craft.

him as "a British general with the name of Churchill," but there was no doubt here that Berlin was talking about the Prime Minister's son. There was no immediate confirmation, however, of the landing report.

Churchill, 32, was the first member of Parliament to become a paratrooper. The Allies have been giving aid to Tito's partisans, but there has been no official announcement of the presence of British Commando or American Ranger troops in Yugoslavia.

The Berlin radio said: "Events taking place at Lissa are of major interest. A British general with the name of Churchill arrived there a few days ago and has taken over command of Allied island troops."

"Whether these troops also include the Tito followers of whom there are about 2,000 on the island remains to be seen. At any rate, there are several American and British Commandos under the com-

mand of General Churchill, comprising a total strength of about 1,500 men.

"These detachments are probably designed to secure the island as a supply base and to guard American and British supplies located on the island on behalf of the Tito bands in southeast Europe.

"As these troops are solely comprised of single formations, so-called Commando raids must be expected at some points on the Dalmatian coast and on Dalmatian islands.

"These raids are of only small military value, but can well be exploited for reasons of propaganda, particularly towards Tito bands which, during the last few weeks, have complained about the lack of British and American support."

Lissa, an island about 10 miles long and five miles wide, is in the Adriatic 30 miles off the important port of Split. It is 120 miles east of Italy's mainland.

Tito's broadcast communique today said his forces were pressing a determined offensive in Slovenia, in northern Yugoslavia, inflicting severe casualties, an dare continuing a steady advance.

Sharp fighting also was reported in Macedonia, where the partisans said they were carrying the battle to German and Bulgarian troops.
