American Bombers Blast Western Germany Again

Today's Operations Set New High Record For Single Month; Airfields In France Also Attacked; RAF Smashed At Strategic Centers in France Last Night

London, March 24.—(AP)—American heavy bombers drove into Germany for the third straight day today, bombing military targets in western Germany, a United States communiqué announced, following strong RAF night blows at objectives in France.

While Flying Fortresses smashed into Germany to the accompaniment of the German warning service, "Achtung, (attention) achung!" Strong enemy bomber formations flying over western Germany. Liberators bombed enemy airfields in northeastern France.

These attacks raised to 19—a new high record—the number of attacks in a single month. The previous high for operational missions was 18 in February.

As on yesterday when a six-prong assault was made on railroad yards, aircraft stations and other objectives in western Germany, the heavy bombers today were escorted by strong formations of Lightning, Thunderbolt and Mustang fighters.

RAF heavies, bombing objectives around the industrial city of Lyon in southern France and the railroad yards of Daon, 80 miles northeast of Paris, last night brought the total Allied air forces over Germany and occupied territory in 36 hours to between 5,000 and 6,000 planes, it was estimated. Bomb tonnage for that period was boosted to around 7,000.

Two RAF planes were lost last night in operations which included Mosquito strikes at the Rhineland communications center of Dortmund, and minelaying missions.

The United States air forces announced that 21 enemy aircraft were knocked down in yesterday's blasting of six targets in Germany, while losing 27 heavy bombers and six fighters.

The absence of any German aerial battle reports accompanying their broadcast "Achtung" warnings of raiders again over the Reich hinted that the German fighter defense may not have taken to the air to give combat as it did in some sectors yesterday.

The RAF's assault on the Laon yards, 45 miles south of Paris, was the 90-mile deep French department which the Allies have (Continued on page two)

ODT Arranges For Full Load Trucks

A new program designed to gain full utilization of heavy duty over the road trucks by requiring empty and partially loaded trucks to register with the Office of Defense Transportation in order to get a full load before making a trip, has been launched by the ODT. The new plan goes into effect next Monday, March 27.

Under the new program, registration facilities will be established at all ODT district offices, of which there are 24 in the southeast and 142 throughout the nation. Five such offices are located in North Carolina: Raleigh, Asheville, Charlotte, Winston-Salem, and Winston-Salem.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Japan's General Tojo is straining hard to make capital out of the Japanese victory in the northeast border of India from Burma, and it's of interest to find him trying to build a political sensation out of it with the claim that the so-called Indian national army, with headquarters in Burma, is participating with the idea of liberating India.

There is thus far no major threat, either military or political, against India. Allied headquarters minimize the importance of the attack. But we cannot forget that this great sub-continent is the chief Allied base for the final smash against Japan. It's complete security is vital.

Chungking is shocked by the development. Unofficially the feeling is expressed in the Chinese capital that the invasion is supplying the Japanese propaganda guns with the best ammunition they've had in months.

The attack has come in the Chinwin river area of western Burma, where the enemy has driven two or more columns across the border into the Indian state of Manipur. The invaders apparently are headed for Imphal, capital of Manipur and terminus of a good highway which connects in the north with the main Allied supply line—highway, railway, water, air—from India to China.

General Auchinleck, British commander in chief for India, sums up the position with the declaration that "no real threat can materialize unless and until the Japanese manage to penetrate points where they can attack our main rail and river communications or our airfields in Assam. He says the Manipur drive is to divert Allied forces and relieve the pressure on the Japanese to the south where the Allies are driving for the big Japanese airbase at Akyab.

JAP COLUMN IS ATTACKED

Allies Make Contact With Japs Across Indian Border

New Delhi, March 24.—(AP)—Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters announced today that Allied troops had attacked a Japanese column advancing from the south on the important road junction of Imphal in India's Manipur river valley and had driven the enemy from three positions covering the Tiddim-Imphal road.

Advances last night said the Japanese forces were within 30 miles of Imphal, having advanced 60 miles into India after crossing the border from the Tiddim area in northern Burma in a surprise thrust.

Another Japanese column, which crossed the Indian frontier earlier after pushing over the upper Chindwin river near Thangudon, was last reported some 30 miles east of Imphal.

The communiqué said this column had attempted to approach the road running from Tamu on the border to Palel, 24 miles southeast of Imphal, and that one enemy detachment had been dispersed.

Another enemy column in the Kabaw valley along India's border was ambushed southeast of Tamu and some of its tanks destroyed.

STUDENT BODY STANDS FIRM

Refuses To Rescind Resolution to Governor

Raleigh, March 24.—(AP)—Governor Broughton said today he had received a resolution passed Wednesday night by students of East Carolina Teachers College, at Greenville, asking that further investigation be made of a state auditor's report that President Leon R. Meadows had not satisfactorily accounted for \$18,000 in school and student funds.

Trustees, by an 8 to 4 vote, held Tuesday that President Meadows had satisfactorily accounted for the money, and complimented him on his record at the college.

Governor Broughton said he had no comment.

Students of East Carolina Teachers College in a mass meeting last night stood firmly by their resolution to Governor Broughton, adopted the night before, and by a vote of 332 to 218 defeated a counter-resolution that would have rescinded the former action. The meeting highlighted by a talk by President L. R. Meadows, who appeared upon invitation, lasted for nearly five hours.

This second mass meeting was called by petition from students who did not take part in, or opposed the action of the previous night when the resolution to Gov. Broughton, expressing dissatisfaction at the findings of the board of trustees and requesting him to "refer the matter to a body of state officials of higher rank than the Board of Trustees and, if necessary, to the state courts for a just decision," was adopted.

After the meeting was called to order by Miss Dorothy Lewis, student government president, a motion that it be open to the public was adopted.

Dr. Meadows, in his talk, went over carefully the records of his expenditures of student funds on the campus and buildings and emphasized the many improvements brought about in the past 10 years as a result of these expenditures. He paid high tribute to his predecessor Dr. Robert H. Wright and expressed great pleasure at the progress the college had made from its very beginning up to the present time.

Calling attention to rumors to the effect that large amounts of appropriations had been returned to the state each year instead of being spent for the benefit of the college, he pointed out that, with the exception of funds especially earmarked for items that could not be purchased, no large amounts had ever been returned to the state.

To emphasize this point he related that in one recent year an appropriation of \$8,500 had been made for the purchase of an additional generator for the power plant but that the generator could not be purchased because no large amount had been returned to the state.

Churchill Infers Day Of Invasion Is Near

Tells Sky-Troopers They Will Soon Have Opportunity Of Landing On Nazi-Held Soil

London, March 23.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill paid a surprise visit to American air-borne troops in the English countryside today and a voice of deep feeling told them they "soon will have the opportunity of landing upon the soil of Nazi-occupied Europe."

In company with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, senior commander of American ground forces in the United Kingdom; and Major Gen. Lewis H. Brereton, commander of the U. S. Ninth Air Force, the Prime Minister witnessed the colorful spectacle of many hundreds of American skytroopers leaping from swift-rolling waves of planes on to the green English fields a few hundred yards from the reviewing stand.

"You have a great part to play," Churchill told them. "You are the most modern expression of war."

"It is with feelings of profound encouragement that I have the honor to review you here today. In these weeks which are passing so swiftly I see gathered here on England's soil these soldiers, specially trained, of our great American ally preparing themselves to strike a blow for a greater cause than either of our two countries have ever fought for in bygone days."

Churchill continued as the masses of eager, battle-helmeted paratroopers gathered around him.

"It is a world cause because, although no one can tell how the future of the world will shape itself, we are determined that the dark tyrannies which have overclouded our lives and drawn our people from their homes shall be broken and battered down, and that an example shall be made of the guilty which will prevent such tyrannies from being erected again."

The business of the meeting then got under way with presentation of a resolution to rescind the action of the night before, and for more than four hours the matter was debated before the final vote was taken. The meeting was orderly in every respect but was long drawn out as a result of much cross questioning of the speakers and many parliamentary questions.

STALEMATE ON CASSINO FRONT

Heavy Fighting Continues But Positions Unchanged

Allied Headquarters, Naples, March 24.—(AP)—Two new bomber blows against enemy supply lines in northern Italy—at Florence and Padua—were announced by Allied headquarters today as heavy fighting continued in Cassino with no material change in the situation.

American Marauders, out in force yesterday, blasted the Campo di Marte freight yard, largest in the Florence area and the only one not hit in the war's first attack on that Italian city March 11. Reconnaissance showed great destruction to warehouses and tracks.

Heavy bombers attacked railroad targets last night at Padua, important junction point west of Venice.

Inside Cassino, New Zealand troops still beat savagely against stubbornly-defended German strong points with the support of tanks and a heavy screen of artillery and mortar fire. The Nazi defenders were supported by both air attacks and increased artillery fire.

Official reports said the latest phase of the relentless struggle for the town's ruins began shortly after noon, Wednesday, with enemy movements observed near the hotel Des Roses, which still is in German hands. Allied tanks engaged the Germans there.

Meanwhile the New Zealanders again worked forward in the ruins and attacked the Germans on the western edge of the town. A spokesman said "some little progress was made and it is believed the enemy suffered severe casualties."

The latest report the Nazis still held the Continental hotel. Other enemy strongpoints listed as holding out included the Ducal palace and Roman amphitheater south of the town.

There has been little enemy activity north of the town since failure of their attack early Wednesday on Castel Hill, near which New Zealanders returned to the attack yesterday. German guns have stepped up the tempo of their fire north of the town.

Forty to 50 German planes shot up Highway 6 behind the Allied lines east of Cassino after bombing Teano with what was officially called "little effect" on the preceding day. Seven of the enemy planes were brought down by anti-aircraft batteries.

An increase in the volume of enemy shelling against Allied rear areas on the Anzio beachhead was reported. A German raid against the left flank of the beachhead reported.

Need \$9,014 End Red Cross Drive

Chairman J. Nat Harrison's small army of hard driving workers continues to bring in contributions and as a result of yesterday's work the Pitt County Red Cross War Fund is well past the two-thirds mark.

Figures released by Harrison at noon today show a total of \$21,986 collected to date with a balance of \$9,014 needed to eke out the \$31,000 set as a quota for this county.

Sector by sector totals are as follows: Ayden, \$925; Bethel, \$900; Bellair, \$250; Belvoir, \$327; Chicod, \$325; Falkland, \$300; Fountain, \$450; Farmville, \$3,200; Grifton, \$600; Grimesland, \$640; Pactus, \$485; Stokes, \$615; Winterville, \$700; and the city of Greenville, \$12,369.

Only three sectors have reached their quotas, Belvoir, Pactus and Stokes. Greenville still lacks \$16,000, is still \$6,321 short of its quota. Rainy weather and muddy roads have handicapped rural workers to some extent. With a better break from the weather many of the county divisions will reach and probably exceed their quotas.

Chairman Harrison stated today that he fully expected Greenville to subscribe the \$3,631 lacking on its quota; that there were a number of people the workers had not been able to reach and that others will want to make additional contributions and when these are heard from the amount needed will be realized. Harrison is requesting those who have not been seen to make use of the telephone to call Red Cross headquarters, Dial 4222, instead of waiting for the workers to call on them.

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Jap Ships Sunk

Washington, March 24.—(AP)—Destruction of 11 more Japanese ships by wide ranging American submarines was announced today by the Navy Department.

The new haul brought to 26 the number of sinkings reported by the navy this week, and boosted to 653 the number of enemy vessels sunk, probably sunk or damaged by submarine action.

Two tankers, one of them large, were included in the new haul, cutting still further into the enemy's rapidly dwindling fleet of fuel carrying vessels.

Also sunk, the navy said, were three transports, five freighters and one converted mine layer.

In accordance with policy, no indication was given of where the Japanese ships were intercepted and sent to the bottom. However, submarines are known to have operated along the coast lines of Japan.

London, March 24.—(AP)—British Admiralty announced today that submarines of the eastern fleet have sunk a Japanese cruiser of the Kuma class, a 7,000-ton, aircraft carrier, eight supply ships and several small naval craft since the first of the year.

A second cruiser was torpedoed, and a small supply ship and one large supply ship were damaged, the announcement said.

Kuma class cruisers, according to Jane's Fighting Ships, have a displacement of 5,100 tons, and carry a crew of 450 officers and men.

AIRMEN POUND WEAK AGAIN

Jap Base Blasted By 2,000 Tons of Bombs This Month

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, March 24.—(AP)—More than 2,000 tons of bombs concentrated so far this month on the Wewak sector of New Guinea have done this much damage: wiped out Japanese air resistance; sunk thousands of tons of supply ships, and blew up fuel and ammunition dumps gun positions and supply stores.

The great weight of bombs, focusing attention on an enemy base more than 200 miles northwest of the closest Allied ground positions below Madang, passed the 2,000-ton mark for March on the strength of a 200-ton blow dealt Wednesday and reported today by Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

It was the 19th air punch dealt the Wewak sector over a period of 22 days covered by the reports. Wednesday's attack was the 12th day of unbroken strikes by Lt. Gen. George C. Kenney's bombers.

The consecutive series opened on March 11. After the first five, during which more than 80 enemy planes were shot out of action, Wewak's four airbases ceased to (Continued on page two)

fer interception.

Allied conquest of the Admiralty
islands, 225 miles east of Newak,
has severed Japan's supply route
from Truk to New Guinea and left
Newak as the base upon which the
Japanese at Bogia, Alexishafen and
Madang must rely completely for
whatever supplies can be shipped
in by sea from the general direc-
tion of the Philippines.

Significantly, convoys have been
spotted and successfully attacked
recently off Aitape, 90 miles north-
west of Newak, and near Hollandia,
250 miles away. Within the past
six days, six enemy warships and
nine merchantmen or transports of
sizes ranging up to 6,000 tons have
been destroyed or damaged in wa-
ters northwest of Newak.

Wednesday's raiders—Liberators,
Mitchells, Bostons and escorting
fighters—found shipping near is-
lands lying off Newak, and sank a
1,000-ton freighter, a 1,500-ton
freighter, seven lugger type vessels
and 23 barges.

Headquarters reports today also
told of a 36-ton bombing of Rabaul
on Tuesday by torpedo and dive
bombers from the Solomons.

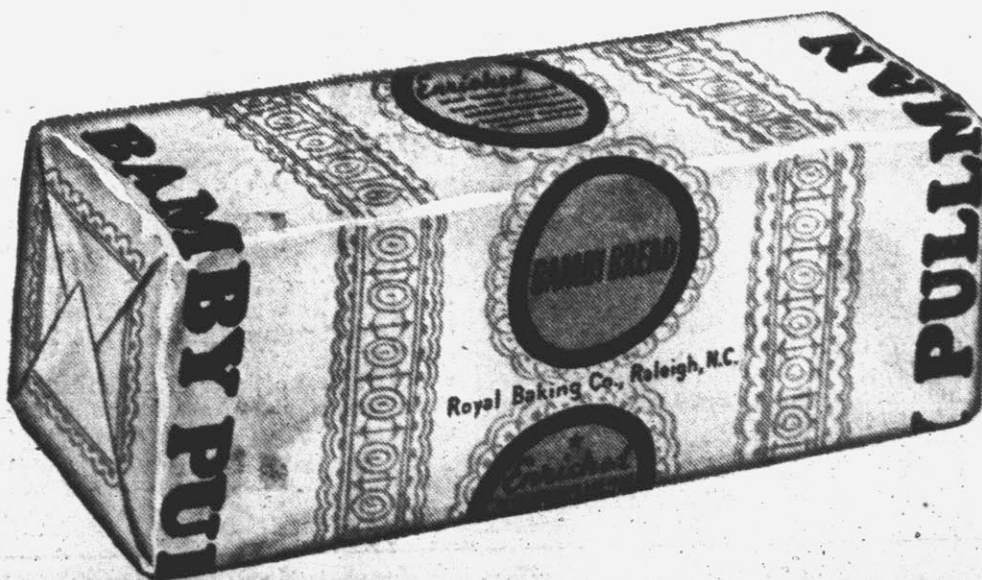
