ALLIES GIVE UP TWO HILLS NEAR CASSINO

Troops Withdrawn After Strategic Importance Of Positions Lost; Rail Communications To Battle Lines Cut; Aurora Man Downs Nazi Plane

Allied Headquarters, Naples, Mar. 29.—(AP)—Indian Gurkha troops who had clung stubbornly to Hangman's hill, an exposed knob just below the peak of Monastery hill overlooking Cassino, have been withdrawn, headquarters disclosed today as violent artillery and mortar duels thundered in and around the town.

At the same time Allied photographic interpreters reported that medium bombers had cut all the rail lines from northern Italy to the German front line area.

Hangman's hill had been occupied by the Gurkha troops for nearly two weeks, and they could be fed and supplied sufficiently only by air. Withdrawal of New Zealanders from Hill 202 on the slopes of Monastery hill also was disclosed.

The strategic importance of the two features was lost when the general offensive against Cassino failed to dislodge the Germans, it was explained.

This, plus the difficulties of removing the wounded and bringing airborne supplies made continued retention of the high ground valueless, headquarters officers said.

Allied heavy guns laid down a barrage on German positions in the vicinity of the strongly defended Continental hotel, hitting a German troop concentration forming up near the ruins of the hostelry. German multi-barrel guns, with tank artillery supporting, hammered at Hill 193.

French troops also smashed another small assault on Hill 914, which they are holding.

Allied artillery scattered a German infantry formation taking positions for an attack three miles west of Cassino in the beachhead below Rome. Anti-aircraft batteries downed four out of 25 air raiders and Spitfire patrols destroyed three more. All of the Germans' bombs fell into the sea without hitting any ships.

Fire-Bug Being Sought By Police

San Francisco, March 29.—(AP)—A fire-bug, believed by police to be the same man who yesterday sent 22 persons to their death in the flaming New Amsterdam hotel, struck early today at an apartment house in another part of the city.

Quick action by a woman, coming in late from work, prevented the flames from doing more than slight damage.

"It was the same type of work as that of the man who set the other blazes," said Inspector Arthur Finnegan of the fire marshal's office.

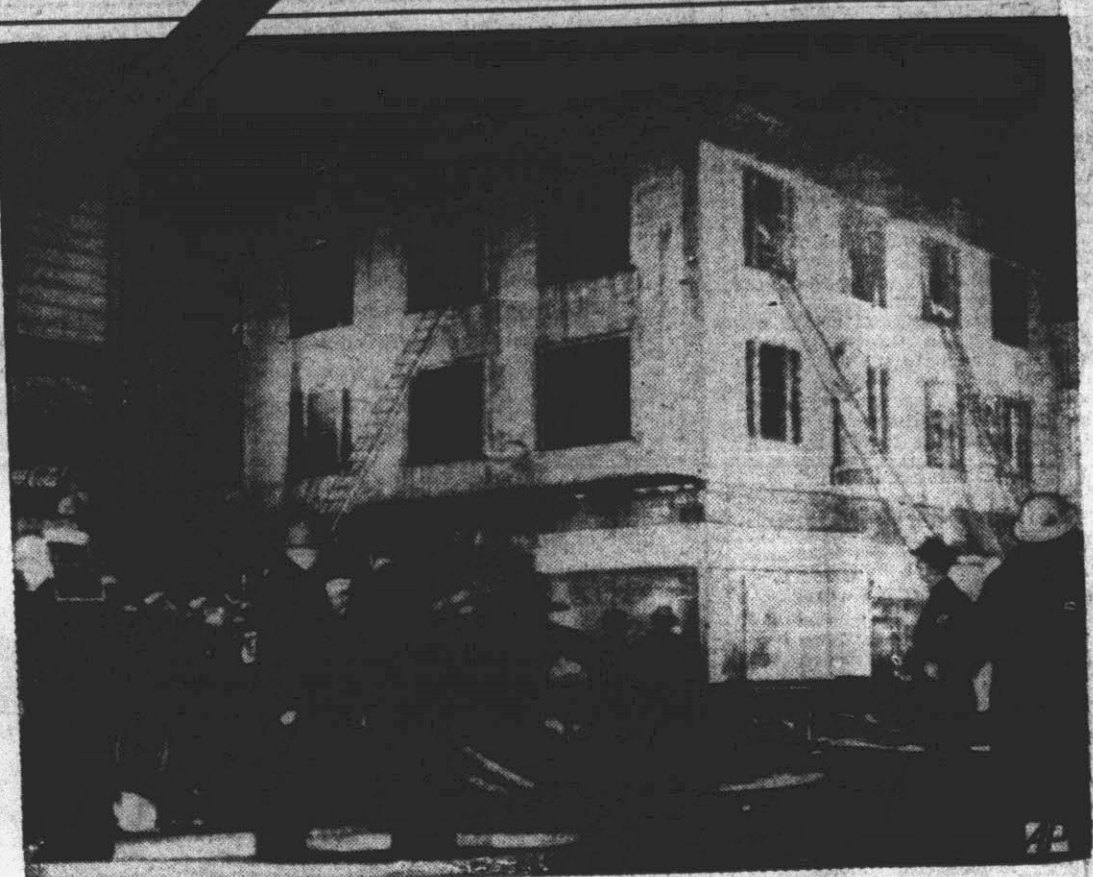
There had been 11 other incendiary fires here in two days, climaxed by the New Amsterdam hotel blaze early Tuesday in which 22 persons were killed and 30 injured—the city's heaviest toll of life by fire since 1906.

Doubled police patrols cruised the city's streets overnight. An appeal was made to all hotel and apartment house operators to be on the alert.

JAP POSITIONS BLASTED AGAIN

Series Of Raids Over Wide Area In South Pacific

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, March 29.—(AP)—American and Australian bombers in far-ranging sweeps, punished the Japanese at more than a dozen points ranging from 1,500 miles from Dutch New Guinea to the northern Solomon Islands.

They dumped 292 tons of bombs on such Japanese holdings as Bougainville, Rabaul on New Britain, Kavieng on New Ireland, and Wewak and Hansa Bay, New Guinea. About the only deviation from a strictly air war was another shelling by American destroyers of Japanese on Pitcairn Island, north-west in the Admiralty group, north of the American base at Lorengau on Big Manus Island.

The same day, Sunday, 18 more buildings were wiped out at Rabaul by 46 tons of bombs dropped by Dauntless dive bombers and Avenger torpedo bombers from the Solomon Islands.

Operating from Solomon bases, Dauntlesses, Avengers, Mitchells and Liberators plastered Kavieng with 30 tons, rendering an airfield runway unserviceable.

On Monday, fifth air force bombers covered the Wewak sector with smoke and dust stirred up by 74 (Continued on page four)

Says Yesterday's Action On Education Bill Must Be Rescinded

London, March 29.—(AP)—To the cheers of the House of Commons Prime Minister Churchill today bluntly demanded its support all down the line for the government's program and called for a vote of confidence, stating his war leadership on the single issue of an amendment to an education bill.

Taking up the challenge posed by a one-vote defeat last night, the grim-faced Prime Minister declined to distinguish between a domestic problem and the basic issue of the government's leadership.

At the next sitting of commons, he said, an amendment providing for equal pay for men and women teachers—written in over the government's objection—will be struck out by the government and "this act of deletion will be regarded as a vote of confidence in the present administration. If the government does not secure an adequate majority (supporting deletion of the amendment) it will entail the usual constitutional consequences."

These are the resignation of the government and the formation of a new cabinet (British censorship does not permit correspondents to tell when Commons will meet next but it may be tomorrow.)

To suggestions that the amendment in no way involved lack of confidence, Churchill declared: "I cannot attempt to control the activities of members. I can merely offer them some suggestions as to the consequences which may attend their actions. Certainly we cannot go on to the present basis of a government which has been defeated after the language used from this bench, and into the very great tasks that lie immediately in front of us."

He was interrupted often by cheers and once—when he declared "it really is impossible to distinguish between a vote on domestic policy and a vote on the general policy of the war in this country"—by some cries of "rubbish."

SMASH ENEMY AIR ASSAULT

Japs Lose 24 Planes Over Burma; Precede Ahead In India

New Delhi, March 29.—(AP)—Allied fighter planes have smashed a big bomber thrust made in support of the Japanese invasion of India, downing 24 planes, but enemy ground forces are pressing hard northeast of Imphal and "our troops have taken up new positions" the southeast Asia command announced today.

The Japanese invasion column in the Imphal area 32 miles northeast of Imphal in India is maintaining pressure despite "heavy casualties in these attacks," the communique from Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters said.

Allied fighters fought a running battle, one of the greatest in theater, over northern Burma Monday with the enemy downing 11 bombers and 13 fighters and probably bagging six others.

The Japanese, apparently aiming at the Chabaw and Ledo areas of upper Assam, were forced to turn back without dropping their bombs. A recapitulation showed the Japanese had lost 133 planes with 41 more probably destroyed and 41 damaged, in the air and ground against Allied losses of 33 ships between March 1 and March 28.

Backers Say Roosevelt Certain Of Nomination

Washington, March 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt apparently has been taken by party leaders in 11 of the 17 states to line up solid delegations for a fourth term. These include Pennsylvania with 72 votes, California with 52 Illinois with 58, Ohio with 52, New Jersey with 34, Wisconsin with 26, West Virginia 22, Nebraska 12 and Vermont six.

In six states where the delegate selecting machinery is only now beginning to function, the fourth term supporters are confident they can get another 108 votes. These include Tennessee 26, Alabama 24, Iowa 20, Washington's 18, Colorado 12 and Wyoming's eight.

Even some outspoken opponents of the fourth term occurred in these estimates. For instance, Senator Johnson (D-Colo.), who said a fourth term would be a period of defeat and disintegration for the party, told a reporter he had no doubt Colorado's delegates would support Mr. Roosevelt on the first ballot. Senator Gillette (D-Iowa), a fourth term critic, said Iowa's group undoubtedly would be for the President, might even be so instructed by the state convention.

U. S. BOMBERS BLAST NAZIS AGAIN TODAY

Fortresses Hit Central Germany; Liberators Pound Pas-de-Calais Coastal Area Of France

London, March 29.—(AP)—American Flying Fortresses plunged deep into central Germany today and Liberators pounded the Pas-de-Calais coastal area of France in the campaign described officially as "aimed primarily against the Luftwaffe on the ground and in the air."

It was this month's 24th great assault by the U. S. bombers, a new monthly record in the offensive which Lieut. Gen. James H. Doolittle announced last night had destroyed more than 2,100 German planes in the last eight weeks. This toll was taken by American airmen flying from Britain alone.

Fighter escorts accompanied the Fortresses into central Germany.

The double-barreled strike against Germany and France followed a lashing of four airdromes in France Tuesday by 250 to 500 American heavy bombers.

The German targets were not identified, but the preliminary announcement from U. S. headquarters said "today's attacks followed two days of bombings of Luftwaffe airfields in France where the Germans did not put up serious aerial defense."

Berlin asserted that violent air combats were being fought over northwestern Germany by midday.

"German anti-aircraft defenses from the outset of the intrusion were constantly harassing the enemy," one broadcast declared. "Several enemy aircraft were brought down shortly after the enemy had flown over the Reich frontier. Particularly violent air battles are reported from the region of the Teutoburg forest—in the same sector of Westphalia as Münster, Osnabrück and Bielefeld."

Berlin first reported bombers over central Germany, and said they were over northwest Germany on their flight outward.

In the House of Commons, meanwhile, Sir Archibald Sinclair, Secretary of State for Air, said the enemy fighter force in western Europe still is formidable, and that undoubtedly many hard battles lie ahead.

Holland Is Being Flooded By Nazis

London, March 29.—(AP)—The Germans have started flooding lowlands in the Netherlands, the Netherlands Information Bureau declared today, as part of a plan to combat the expected Allied invasion of western Europe.

Moreover, except for one or two small towns, the island group known as south Holland and Zeeland Island has been evacuated preparatory to flooding, the Bureau said.

Evacuation of the civilian population as a preliminary to flooding the area in the vicinity of Amsterdam has been carried out in strips about 15 miles wide north and south of the city, the information bureau declared.

A strip from Rotterdam to the Zuider Zee also is being prepared for evacuation, the bureau added. About five per cent of the Netherlands already is flooded, one Dutch official estimated. He explained the chief worry is that the enemy may destroy 20 vital electrical pumping plants spread throughout the western half of the country to keep out sea water.

The Dutch government already has tried without success in several countries to order new pumping equipment for delivery immediately after the war.

Governor Recommends Meadows' Retirement

Comments Dr. Meadows For Making Request; Alumnae Chapter Votes Approval

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—The Board of Trustees of East Carolina Teachers College will meet here on April 7 to consider a request by Dr. Leon R. Meadows, president, for retirement on August 31.

This was disclosed yesterday by Gov. J. Melville Broughton, who said he had recommended to Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, chairman of the board, that the request be granted. Dr. Erwin said he agreed with the Governor.

Broughton commended Dr. Meadows for "terminating his connection with the college rather than to subject the institution to the detriment that might follow prolonged divisions and controversies."

A state auditor's report recently said Dr. Meadows had not satisfactorily accounted for more than \$18,000 of college and student funds. The board, after hearing Dr. Meadows and other witnesses, voted 8-4 for vindication of the president.

The governor said he had "publicly condemned" the method of handling the funds as "unbusinesslike and not in the interest of sound public policy" but added that "I have at no time expressed any opinion that Dr. Meadows misappropriated any of these funds."

Today On The Home Front

Russian Forces Driving Ahead To New Victories On All Fronts; Stalin Announces Capture Of Kolomea, 30 Miles From Czechoslovakian Border

Moscow, March 29.—(AP)—With the Red army poised on the Rumanian border, the Soviet government organ Izvestia today called on Rumania and Bulgaria to join the "democratic countries" of the world and protect their sovereignty or face the alternative of German occupation and having their lands turned into gigantic battlefields.

The editorial, citing foreign press reports that Rumania possesses 13 divisions and Bulgaria 20, declared that both nations have forces strong enough to resist the Germans.

Thus it appeared the Soviet union was giving Rumania a last chance to turn against the Germans, before ordering an advance across the Prut. There still was no indication here that the Russians have launched operations into Rumania.

London, March 29.—(AP)—Russian troops have captured Kolomea on the Lwow-Czernowitz railway in an 11-mile advance southeast toward Czechoslovakia. Premier-Marshal Stalin announced tonight in an order of the day, Kolomea is 30 miles northeast of the Czechoslovakian border.

Kolomea, in old Poland on the north bank of the Prut river, fell to a column of the First Ukrainian army stabbing into the Carpathian foothills.

The town fell in a "bold maneuver" by tank formations and infantry," Stalin said, describing it as an "important stronghold in the German defenses at the foothills of the Carpathians."

Meanwhile to the southeast, other Red army forces were driving across the southern Carpathians, from fallen Nikolayev in a push upon the great Black Sea port of Odessa.

The Russians were advancing on Odessa along a curving 175-mile front. Further west in Bessarabia, a Soviet communique said, units of Marshal Ivan S. Konev's Second Ukrainian army were within eight miles of the Odessa-Transilvania railroad—last principal escape artery from the port.

Spearsheads of Malinovsky's forces which captured Nikolayev at the mouth of the Bug already were reported across the Bug estuary, driving along the coastal roads that lead to Odessa, 75 miles to the west. AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

British Prime Minister Churchill's expression of disappointment in the progress of the Italian campaign, and his refusal to debate the subject in the House of Commons, invites discussion of a politico-military situation which has been regarded as belonging to the hush-hush variety.

What are the facts about the Italian show?

The operations in their present stage are subsidiary to the main assault on the continent proper. It was essential at the outset that the Allies conquer the lower part of the Italian peninsula. It was vital that we possess the great port of Naples and the thirteen airfields of Poggia from which the Allied bombers can rove over the Balkans and Hitler's eastern domains.

However, the subsequent offensive which has had Rome as its objective would seem to have been more for its moral effect than for military reasons, although there obviously would be military advantages in possessing the Eternal City. The point is that we don't have to take

Progress in the winter campaign has been slow for several reasons. The Germans have been holding mountain positions which are so strong that they could have withstood the attack of far greater forces than have been sent against them. The Allied position has been made more difficult by the winter weather and mud which have been on the defenders' side.

Probably the real key to Allied difficulties lies in the fact that the vast preparations for the invasion of Western Europe have prevented the high command from devoting more men and equipment to the Italian campaign. Apparently somebody underestimated the difficulties of an offensive up the peninsula to Rome.

And who can say how much the operations have missed the skill and driving power of Britain's General Montgomery and America's Blood and Guts Patton—two of the greatest field leaders the war has produced? These two would have been a strong addition to the undoubtedly good generals already in the (Continued on page two)

red on by a near-victory in 1942 after more than two decades of Democratic supremacy, viewed the result as inconclusive from the standpoint of detecting any shift in popular sentiment. They blamed rainy weather for holding down a rural vote which they said was predominantly anti-Roosevelt.

The Democratic candidate, William G. Stigler, attorney and former state senator, took an early lead and never was headed, beating E. O. Clark, a Republican attorney, by a margin of about 11 to nine.

Total vote was 38,000, compared with more than 45,000 in the presidential year of 1940 and 45,000 in 1942. Stigler fills a vacancy left by the resignation of Jack Nichols, a Democrat who won by only 385 votes two years ago.

Senate Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky was called in to campaign for Stigler during the final hours. He asked for a verdict on the conduct of the national government.

Senator Ed H. Moore (R-Okla.) who led the campaign for Clark on a "trial and test of the New Deal" premise, declared when the votes were in:

"Both the federal and state New Deal machines were in the district plugging every minute. The organization got the job done."

In Washington, Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan said Stigler's victory "exploded, completely and decisively the myth of a nationwide Republican trend."

He referred to Republican claims based on eight wins out of 11 special congressional elections since 1942. The Democrats have retained two seats, including the second Oklahoma district, and captured one from the Republicans. The Republicans have taken three away from the Democrats and held five of their own, giving them a present House lineup of 210 against 217 Democrats.

nounced that 5,423 Japanese troops had been killed in northern Burma since last Oct. 26.
