Allies Thrust Ahead On Central Italian Front Occupying Hill Position

Two German raiding parties beaten back in vicinity of Cassino Railway Station; Allied Air Assaults On German Communications Continue

Allied Headquarters, Naples, April 1.—(AP)—Allied troops have made a sudden thrust in the ruggedly mountainous and long-static central sector of the Italian front, advancing a mile and occupying Mt. Marrone, a mile-high peak about 13 miles northeast of Cassino, headquarters announced today.

The height was seized by troops of unidentified nationality who smashed forward under powerful artillery support.

In Cassino, meanwhile, Allied heavy guns again shelled the monastery overlooking the contested town and observers saw the walls collapsing around the German positions. Two German raiding parties—one about 40 strong—were beaten back from the vicinity of the railway station.

Two American destroyers hammered the German positions near Carroccio on the Anzio beachhead and Allied infantry repelled a small but sharp attack on their left flank.

Artillery exchanges and patrol clashes marked the snowbound eighth army front. Small enemy parties were dispersed.

Allied air forces in Italy were forced by the weather to reduce their activities to about 650 sorties, but the systematic campaign to smash German communications continued with fighter-bomber attacks against bridges along the east coast of Italy.

Mt. Marrone—"Chestnut Mountain"—lies six miles southeast of Alfedena and dominates a large part of the Velletri valley. The advance tends to straighten out the line between the salients which the Allies drove in reaching Cassino and Alfedena during the slow progress of the past months.

Although details of the fighting are not yet fully available, it was disclosed that the attack was supported by assaults on San Michele and Pizzone, about two miles northeast of the mountain. In the last reported fighting in that area over two months ago French troops were employed.

Allied planes struck at a bridge at Pedaso on the east coast rail line and also blasted bridges at Pescara, Montesilvano and Roseto on the same line, and the station at San Benedetto, 45 miles southeast of Ancona.

Enemy shipping along the Dalmatian coast also came under attack. (Continued on page four)

Will Support Potato Prices

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—The War Food Administration announced today that it will support grower prices of early and intermediate crop potatoes at rates ranging from \$2.05 to \$3.50 and late crop potatoes at rates ranging from \$1.65 to \$2.45 per hundred pounds.

The levels at which prices will be supported vary by regions, grades and varieties and, in the case of late potatoes suitable for storage, by the month when placed under storage.

Officials said this year's support prices range from 5 to 15 cents above those in effect under a somewhat similar program last year.

Salute to Britain's Major General Orde Wingate who has been killed in action with his famous jungle fighters in Burma! He was one of the war's romantic figures—a fearless and adventurous soldier who loved the thrill of primitive combat. He was more than that, for he was an inspiring leader and the creator of jungle tactics which now are being put into use. His death is a great loss to the Allied cause.

Two points stand out as highly significant in connection with Moscow's move in forcing Japan to surrender petroleum and coal leases on northern Sakhalin islands: (1) Moscow finally has used the big stick to Tokyo with a strong arm, and made the Japanese like it; (2) On the face of it the Allies at war with Japan gain vastly through her loss of irreplaceable necessities.

The inference would seem to be that Japan is anxious not to start an argument with Russia. London interprets it as a possible sign of weakness on Tokyo's part, a conclusion which has substantiation in Premier Tojo's numerous warnings to his people recently that Nippon's position is grave.

AIRMEN BLAST NAZIS TODAY

Americans In New Raids Over Southwest Germany

London, April 1.—(AP)—American Liberators began a new month of operations with an attack on southwestern Germany today, U. S. headquarters announced.

Simultaneously with the American announcement, a Swiss government communiqué said that American bombers had loosed incendiaries on the railway city of Schaffhausen near the German border, setting numerous fires.

In what apparently was a mistake bombing of neutral territory, the broadcast Swiss communiqué said about 30 American planes had loosed the fire bombs. Dispatches from Switzerland said the bombers appeared over the rail city at 10:30 a. m.

A later statement from the director of Swiss railways said that all rail lines leading into Schaffhausen had been "suspended temporarily."

Coastal watchers said a "considerable force" of Allied planes began streaking out across the channel today shortly after RAF Mosquitos returned from raids on western Germany last night without loss. The German radio system quickly went off the air after announcing the planes had penetrated into the middle Rhine area.

Despite Thursday night's record loss of 94 planes by the RAF, announcements last night showed that March remained a month of victory for British and American air power. According to reliable estimates, the RAF made 5,500 individual bomber flights over Germany during the month with a loss of 4.6 per cent.

A new peak was attained in March by the American air forces with 23 major heavy bomber attacks. The bombers and their fighter escort destroyed at least 734 enemy aircraft.

The month's American losses totaled 293 heavy bombers and 134 fighters. Including the Thursday night loss, 279 British planes failed to return.

Army Plane Crashed Oak City Yesterday

Two army planes with student pilots at the controls crashed near Oak City yesterday. One of the pilots parachuted to safety about a mile from where his plane crashed and burned.

The other pilot landed his ship not far from Windsor, considerably damaging it. A report here today stated.

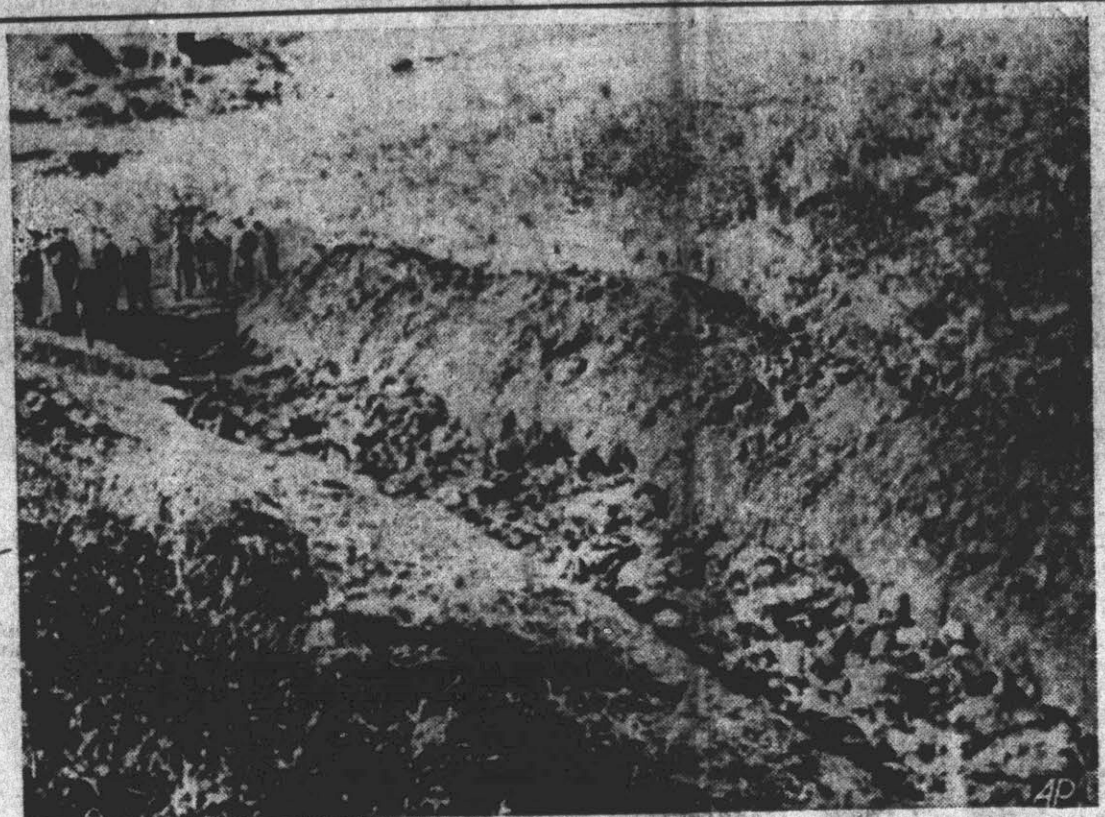
and coal she has above ground in the leased territory, and agrees to furnish her with 50,000 tons of oil a year for five years, after the European war. Still that's not a great boon. The amount of oil in store isn't known, but it isn't likely to be large, since Japan depended almost entirely on oil for aviation gasoline and Sakhalin didn't provide enough for her needs. Furthermore, 50,000 tons is only about 350,000 barrels of oil—a mere drop in the bucket in comparison with Nippon's needs.

In short, Japan has suffered a nasty blow, since her principal remaining source of petroleum is Indonesia, which is a long haul from Japan proper. And modern war can't be waged without oil.

Thus Russia indirectly has given the American-British-Chinese team most welcome assistance. In this connection a broadcast from Moscow quotes the newspaper Ivestia as saying that Russia, in driving this deal, gave "consideration to the special circumstances in the military situation prevailing in the Pacific for our Allies."

However, the Soviet has tempered concession to Japan in granting a renewal of fishing rights in Russian waters for five years. From the (Continued on page two)

ITALIAN KING MAY ABDICATE

Rumors Say Prince Umberto To Take Throne

Naples, April 1.—(AP)—Unconfirmed rumors that King Vittorio Emanuele is about to abdicate in favor of Crown Prince Umberto were widely circulated in southern Italy today.

The Prince was absent from his villa, having visited his father yesterday, and an aide to the Prince said he knew nothing tending to confirm the rumor.

Members of the King's household were not immediately available. A close associate of Premier Badoglio said yesterday that the government had heard nothing from the King to indicate any change in his intention to remain on the throne at least until the Allied armies reach Rome.

The King's abdication, however, would remove virtually the only obstacle to the "democratizing" of the Badoglio government for which the Soviet government newspaper Ivestia has called.

Up to now, six parties in the Committee of National Liberation ranging from the Communists to the Christian Democrats on the right, have refused to collaborate with the Badoglio government unless the King abdicated.

An associate of Badoglio said yesterday in the absence of the Premier, on a trip to Sicily, that Badoglio would gladly take representation. (Continued on page four)

Announce Increase In Liquor Ration

Raleigh, April 1.—(AP)—The April ration of liquor in the 25 wet counties will be two quarts per person.

Chairman Carl Williamson of the State ABC Board announced that under present plans coupons 17 and 18 will be valid during the month for one quart or two pints or one fifth of domestic whiskey, scotch, domestic gin or domestic brandy. Coupons 19 and 20 will be valid any time during the month for the same amount of rum, cordials or imported brandy.

Invasion Plans Closely Guarded

London, April 1.—(AP)—The approach of the western invasion day finds the British Isles locked up tighter than a pair of button shoes—both inside and out—to prevent the leakage of information to the enemy.

The most drastic of a series of security steps became effective today. Visitors were excluded from a restricted area 10 miles deep and more than 700 miles long on the southern and eastern coast of England facing the Nazi-occupied continent.

This was just one of recent controls clamped on by the United States and Britain to guard against any breakdown in launching the western front invasion, but it was emphasized that the measures do not indicate that the attack is imminent.

Record Collections
Greensboro, April 1.—(AP)—Chalking up the largest single month's collections in history, North Carolina revenue collections for March totaled \$107,008,236. An increase of nearly \$5,000,000 over last March's record collections, according to figures released today by Charles H. Robertson, collector of internal revenue for the district of North Carolina.

Allied Forces Closing In On Japs At Madang

Radio Silence Cloaks Moves Of Naval Task Force That Struck At Jap Bastion Of Palau

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, April 1.—(AP)—American and Australian troops are closing the pincers of their movement on Bogadjim in the campaign to take the Japanese coastal base at Madang, New Guinea.

Positions mentioned in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communique today put the Australians 10 miles south of Bogadjim, while American patrols of the 2nd division were 13 miles east of the town. Bogadjim is 20 miles south of Madang, which has been heavily pounded by Allied aircraft but still holds supply dumps and artillery defenses.

The communique also told of other raids on the enemy naval base at Truk and air base at Woleai, both in the Caroline Islands, by United States Navy Liberators and Catalina bombers flying from south and southwest Pacific airfields.

The attack on Truk by Liberators heavy bombers was centered on Dublon island in the atoll. It was a light raid Wednesday morning, preceding the heavy noon-time assault by other south Pacific Liberators which struck Eniwetok. The latter attack, announced in yesterday's communique, did heavy damage to installations and smashed 49 planes on the ground.

The Catalinas hit Woleai island at midnight Wednesday and Liberators followed the next morning, bombing the airfield despite heavy antiaircraft fire. It was the second (Continued on page two)

DEFYING GOD'S PLAN

Pleads For Nature's Ways Of Living

Babson Park, Florida, April 1.—It is very interesting to note the relative number of letters coming to me as the result of different subjects on which I write. Some time will get very few "fan" letters; while others, written quickly, will pull large mails. It is of further interest that my biggest mails will come when I mention birds, children, national parks, religion or other subjects not of an economic nature.

Birds and Trees
My recent reference to the Williston Bird Sanctuary at Babson Park, Massachusetts, has brought a very large mail from bird lovers. They emphasize that the hundreds of millions of dollars now being spent to spray fruit, vegetables and trees could be wholly saved if we would protect the birds.

Other readers constantly urge me to condemn forest fires and the cutting of any trees without systematic reforestation. Protecting our forests would prevent floods and soil erosion. This would greatly reduce the need of buying fertilizer and prevent the terrific waste in crops from poor top soil. There is a strong sentiment to prevent speculation in natural resources—such as oil, metals and timber and having them owned by the government.

Bad Legislation
There is great danger in interfering with nature's plans. This includes scores of very important things from birth control to price-fixing; including the ruthless cutting of timber and drilling for oil. In fact, it appears that the Old Deal has interfered with God's plans as much as the New Deal. It temporarily would cause hardships to repeal 1,000 or more of our laws; but the result, in the end, would benefit every honest employer, wage worker and investor. DRIVE DEEPER INTO INDIA

Jap Forces Continue Westward Push Toward Imphal

New Delhi, April 1.—(AP)—Strong Japanese forces drove further westward in India toward the British base of Imphal on the plains of Manipur, an Allied communique acknowledged today. Dispatches from the front said that enemy patrols had stabbed to within a dozen miles of the jungle communications center.

The Japanese advance was reported from the Uthul area, 32 miles northeast of Imphal, while British Indian troops were engaged in fierce combat with another strong Japanese column in the hills east of Kohima, 60 miles north of Imphal.

Japanese losses were heavy, the communique said, especially in the battle near Uthul. Southeast of Imphal, Japanese troops ambushed a small British detachment on the Palel-Tamu road Thursday night, but Allied artillery went into action yesterday to blast a road block the enemy had thrown across the road midway between the two towns.

Little activity was reported in the direction of Tiddim, British forward base 100 miles below Imphal in Burma. The capture of Tiddim by the Japanese was disclosed yesterday.

(The Japanese controlled Singapore last night that the Japanese had captured the Masha road junction between Imphal and Kohima, "virtually isolating" the British Indian Fourth army, which now "faces imminent destruction." There was no confirmation of this report in the Allied communique and large-scale maps do not show Masha.)

Vanguards of the American-trained Chinese forces in northern Burma continued their drive south from Shadup in the Mogaing valley where they are gradually encircling a force of 1,000 Japanese near Laban.

With not a single Japanese plane rising to challenge Allied air supremacy since last Tuesday, the Allies were dealing death and destruction from the air on a scale unprecedented in this theater. Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck, Allied commander in India, told the Indian legislative assembly that the Japanese were fighting for a quick decision before the monsoon, attempting to establish themselves in (Continued on page four)

Finns Consider Russian Terms

Stockholm, April 1.—(AP)—Reports reaching here through the strictest censorship yet imposed in Helsinki indicated today that the Finnish cabinet was considering a new communication from Moscow that may open the way for an armistice between the two countries.

There were indications that the reported cabinet session may decide Finland's withdrawal from the war. Juhani Paasikivi, Finland's peace ambassador, has re-established contact with the Russians, it was learned Wednesday, following Finland's rejection of Moscow's original armistice terms. Today's cabinet deliberations, it was presumed, are a result of the latest contacts.

(Bjorn Bjornson, NBC broadcaster from Stockholm, said the Finnish Parliament will meet Monday when "a significant announcement" will be made.

(While Paasikivi may not be in Moscow, Bjornson said it is known that Finnish leaders are meeting with the Russians.

Lonergan Convicted Murder Pretty Wife

New York, April 1.—(AP)—A glittering road which Wayne Lonergan traveled from modest circumstances into a world of wealth and luxurious living came to an abrupt end today with prison walls its terminus.

The glitter ended on a gray morning last October when his attractive, estranged wife, Patricia, 23-year-old heiress to a \$7,000,000 brewery fortune, was bludgeoned and strangled in her triplex apartment.

The terminus burst suddenly into view last night when, after a two-week trial, a jury of 12 middle-aged business men convicted the 26-year-old Canadian airman of second degree murder.

Judge James Garrett Wallace fixed April 17 for imposing a 30-year-to-life sentence which the verdict demands.

Nazis Claim Many Allied Ships Sunk

London, April 1.—(AP)—The German high command said today that 22 Allied destroyers and escort craft, 29 merchant ships totaling 176,000 tons, two submarines and 12 torpedo boats were sunk in March by the German navy and Luftwaffe.

The broadcast communique said that 11 other Allied merchant ships totaling 176,000 tons had been damaged along with four destroyers and 15 torpedo boats.

A subsequent Berlin broadcast said German torpedo planes sank or damaged 11 transports totaling 47,000 tons in an attack on an Allied convoy off the Algerian coast early today. The report was without Allied confirmation.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—This isn't April fool, and we don't want to complicate things, but how good is Mr. McNutt's figure? We mean his figure on 4-F's.

Is the figure he's using—to show what 4-F's are doing now—17 months old and away out of date? This week the House Military Subcommittee quizzed a parade of top government officials, including Chairman McNutt of the War Manpower Commission, on what they thought should be done with 4-F's.

Even if it meant drafting them, should 4-F's in non-essential jobs be forced into industry and agriculture to replace the able-bodied men taken by the army?

The armed forces expect to draft 1,600,000 sound citizens by July 1. So, it's pretty important to know how much of that dent in manpower can be made up by forcing 4-F's out of non-essential jobs.

McNutt told the committee there are 500,000 men in 4-F wholesale and retail trade, another 300,000 in service trades, and 50,000 selling insurance and real estate. That's a total of 850,000.

McNutt's WMC office told us that the "vast majority" of that total is in non-essential jobs. But how does McNutt know they're in those jobs? WMC said McNutt got his figures

Massed Russian Forces Sweeping Forward Toward Odessa, Tiraspol And Kishinev; Berlin Radio Admits Reds Nearing Czechoslovakia

Moscow, April 1.—(AP)—German and Rumanian resistance in southwestern Russia was beginning to crumble today as masses of Red army infantry, mobile units of tanks, and Stormovik bombers swept on toward three major objectives—Odessa, Tiraspol and Kishinev.

Front line Soviet dispatches said that one intermediate line after another was cracking.

These reports said many Rumanians were willingly surrendering as the Russians drove through middle Bessarabia toward Kishinev.

Wild confusion was reported in Odessa as Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky's third Ukrainian army and Marshal Ivan S. Konev's second Ukrainian army closed on the Black sea port from the east and northeast, and other units rushed for the Tiraspol railway junction on the lower Dniester where they could cut off the enemy.

The Soviets have captured the main outposts of Odessa and the Nazis were said to be hurriedly throwing up a middle defense. A dispatch from Moscow's correspondents said a group of Moldavian peasants approached the Russians and told them 600 Rumanians wished to surrender.

"Their commander says it would be treason to surrender so he asks you to come and surround them," a peasant was quoted. "Then they'll surrender honorably."

The Red army men complied. At another place, several hundred Rumanian cavalrymen, and mounted and commenced the chase toward the front.

Other dispatches said disorganized German in exhausted groups were running down steep slopes without boots as the Russians closed in from captured Ochakov, which since 1942 has been known as the "Shield of Odessa."

At the northern end of the Rumanian front, Marshal Gregory G. Zhukov's troops threw up before the Rumanian and Czechoslovak frontiers.

Soviet dispatches gave no news of any thrusts across the borders. Apparently Zhukov was consolidating his position as Konev did when he reached the front.

A Soviet communique said Marshal Konev's army was driving deep (Continued on page four)

New Surprises For The Japs

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—New tactical surprises were promised the Japanese today by Lt. Gen. Alexander A. Vandegrift, commander of the Marine Corps.

"In the ship-to-shore offensive to come, participated by all branches of the armed services, as we drive westward, northward or southward toward our major goals, we shall continue to make the most of all those accumulated factors on which we have capitalized in the past," he said in an address prepared for the Federal Bar Association.

"There will be many times, as we strike, when the enemy will discover that, once again, something new from our profile department of tactical surprises."

But selective service told us it didn't know how 4-F's are doing in jobs now. It said further it's just starting a survey to find out that very thing.

From the total, some comparisons were made on 4-F's but those figures are now out of date, otherwise a survey on 4-F's alone would not be necessary now.

Selective service added this: All it knows of 4-F's is that there were 3,620,000 of them on March 1. It doesn't know anything about their occupations.

It is not so much the monarchy that the six parties oppose as it is Vittorio Emanuele, whom they ac- cuse of collaboration with Fascism for 20 years.
