Budapest Blasted By U. S. Bombers

American Heavies Attack Hungarian Capital For First Time Today; Italy-Based Bombers Pounded Nazi Industries In Austria Yesterday

London, April 3.—(AP)—A great formation of American heavy bombers attacked Budapest today, carrying out the first U. S. attack on the Hungarian capital.

The bombers flew from bases in Italy, and the Berlin radio told of violent battles between American and German planes over Hungary.

The Budapest railway center and an important aircraft factory, just south of the capital were the targets of the 15th airforce, a Naples announcement said.

Budapest, one of Europe's most beautiful cities, lies on both sides of the Danube. American and British planes had not bombed it previously, but the Russian airforce attacked it in September, 1942.

As a result of the bombing of German's industrial centers, the Reich has been reported moving factories into Hungary and also to be relying on the production of established Hungarian factories.

Budapest is a key point on railroad networks linking Germany with the Balkans.

Details of the attack were not immediately announced, but it was known to be a very big one, with Flying Fortresses and Liberators participating.

It followed Sunday's heavy bomber raid on Steyr, Austria, in which more than 500 Italy-based bombers were escorted by Thunderbolt and Lightning fighters. More than 300 German planes attacked the Steyr raiders, and more than 100 of the attacking aircraft were shot down, the U. S. airforce announced.

The Soviet airforce bombed Budapest anew a week ago.

Budapest is 450 miles northeast of the Allied airbase at Foggia, Italy.

Other Liberators and Porters formations today bombed several Yugoslavian railroad yards at Knin, junction of the main line from Fiume to Sibenik and Split, Yugoslavia; at Brod, which forms a junction of lines from Zagreb to Belgrade and Sarajevo; and at Drnis, halfway between Sibenik and Knin.

First fragmentary reports from the enemy said 14 U. S. planes were downed over the Hungarian capital, only recently occupied by the Germans. The Nazi DNB agency said "American escort bombers" had been engaged over Hungary by German fighters.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The big news of the day is that Red troops are on Rumanian soil, not only because of its military importance, but because it provides strong evidence to refute the German-inspired report that when the Russians had evicted the enemy from their territory they would halt on the borders and let the rest of the Allies fight it out with the Axis.

The Soviet government has made a shrewd move in announcing that it has no intention of annexing any Rumanian territory but is impelled merely by military necessity. This is calculated to inspire the Rumanians to lay down their arms, and it will have a salutary effect on a population which for weeks has been panicky.

The same thing can be said of Bulgaria. Both these countries long have been held in the war only through fear inspired by the presence of German troops on their soil. They are likely to slip from under Hitler's domination as soon as he is forced to relax his military grip on their throats.

The Russians appear to be driving to block the Carpathian passes on the right wing of their advance, making their main thrust towards Jassi (Jassy), an important railway junction on the route towards the

JAPANESE CUT IMPHAL ROADS

Advance Units Reported To Have Isolated City

New Delhi, April 3.—(AP)—Japanese patrols, filtering through the jungles of eastern India into the Manipur plain, have cut the roads around Imphal, Manipur capital, in an offensive obviously aimed at Dimapur on the Assam-Burma railway line to Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's forces.

The question whether air-borne supplies might be dropped to the Imphal garrison was answered here, by the statement that that would not be necessary as the crisis would be overcome before such action was needed.

Dimapur is 44 miles across the Naga hills of the head hunters from Kohima, 60 miles north of Imphal. Pierce fighting in the wild hill country east of Kohima in India and repulse of a determined Japanese drive to reach the Tiddim road below Imphal to the south was announced today by Allied headquarters in the showdown battle for Allied communication centers and bases along the Burma border.

Another Japanese column thrusting toward Imphal from the Chindwin river area to the east was stopped by Allied forces as it attempted to reach the Imphal plain from the rolling foothill country of the Chin hills, the communique said.

Enemy artillery continued to shell the Tamu-Palel road southeast of Imphal.

Further south on the Arakan front only minor patrol activity was reported. Near Butheading Allied detachments were said to have inflicted casualties on enemy units attempting to infiltrate British positions.

(A Tokyo broadcast last night declared the British 26th division had been ordered to withdraw from around Maungdaw and Butheading on the Arakan front, but this report lacked Allied confirmation.)

Older-borne Allied commands have cut all north and south communication arteries to Myitkyna, main Japanese base in northern Burma, and have smashed enemy efforts to crash their airstrip far behind Japanese lines, front dispatches reported.

The commands are now holding a considerable portion of the railroad from Myitkyna to Katha, more than 100 miles to the south. They are also harassing the extension.

War Loan Drive Begins June 12

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—The \$16,000,000 Fifth War Loan will open June 12 with individual Americans assigned a \$6,000,000,000 quota "to keep the war going."

The drive, largest yet undertaken by the treasury, will close July 8.

Individuals at that time failed by \$191,000,000 to meet their \$5,500,000,000 quota, but Secretary Morgenthau said that "with the critical phases of the war still ahead" the additional money "is urgently needed."

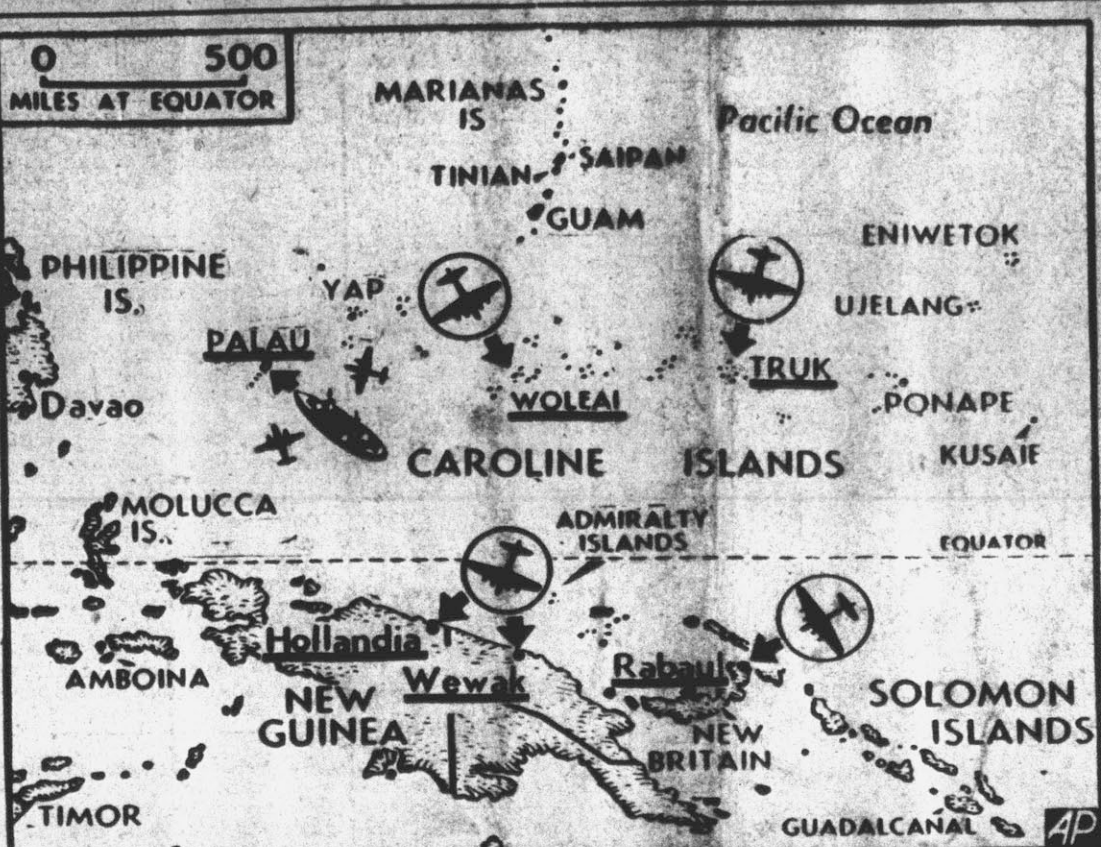
Danubian delta and the Ploesti oil fields. If the Germans and Rumanians intend to make a fight of it, their resistance will be shown almost immediately.

One of the great dramas of the war is unfolding in the Odessa area of the southern Ukraine. The onrushing Reds are almost within sight of that important Black Sea port. Meantime the Axis forces are reported to be carrying out demolitions there. This means the Nazis are preparing for evacuation. However, it doesn't necessarily signify that they won't defend the town stubbornly.

Another event of vast importance is reported from the north. Finland is said in Stockholm to be considering an offer of peace terms from Russia. Unofficial dispatches say Moscow is offering to let the Finns keep the Hangoe peninsula and the city of Viborg. Withdrawal of Finland from the war at this crucial juncture would be a boon to the Allies.

This is one of the tense moments of the war, as we hang on the unfolding of the great Russian onslaught, and await the coming of the Allied invasion of western Europe. Fuehrer Hitler and his people must be enduring a strain comparable with that under which the Allies labored during the awful hours of Dunkerque.

U. S. Offensive Moves Closer To Japan



Adm. Chester W. Nimitz has announced that American warships attacked the Japanese naval base of Palau (ship and plane symbols) within 600 miles of the Philippines while Navy Catalina planes hit the Japanese base at Woleai Island, 400 miles west of Truk. Truk also was blasted by Liberator bombers from South Pacific airmen and other Allied smashers were registered against Hollandia and Dewak, in New Guinea; and against Rabaul, New Britain. ALLIED GAINS AGAINST JAPS

Airmen Continue Raids As Ground Forces Advance

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The Admiralty's announcement of multiple hits indicated a heavy attack on the biggest surviving unit of Hitler's all but vanquished battlefleet. The attack presumably was carried out by carrier-based planes of the fleet air arm, possibly American-built.

Last previous reports on the Tirpitz said the Germans had been able to make only temporary repairs to the torpedo damage inflicted by the British midget submarines which stole into her hideaway last fall. The torpedo-carrying midgets, three of which were lost, were credited with causing underwater damage to the Tirpitz.

The brief Admiralty communique did not give the date or other details of the plane attack.

The Tirpitz was the one great capital ship remaining in the German navy after the sinking of the 26,000-ton Scharnhorst last December.

While listed officially at 35,000 tons, the battleship is believed to be much heavier, perhaps 45,000. Jane's Fighting Ships says the actual figure may be about 41,000 tons. She is 791 feet long, has a normal complement of 1,500 men and carries eight 15-inch guns, twelve 5.9 inch guns, and sixteen 4.1 inch guns.

But the Tirpitz has seen little action, with its main value to the Germans lying in its grave potential threat to Allied supply lines and to Allied naval craft. Admiral Sir William James, chief of British naval information, last fall wrote both the Tirpitz and the 26,000-ton Gneisenau, sister-ship of the Scharnhorst, off the active list for months to come. The Gneisenau was so badly hit by RAF bombs in July that she was reported to have been

transformed into a training ship for German Marines.

Only recently an informant with good underground connections reported the Germans had tried to send their biggest repair ship to Alten Fjord to help get the Tirpitz seaworthy for an attempted dash for home, but the vessel was badly damaged in a storm and had to hole up herself for repairs.

The Tirpitz likely still was unseaworthy when the Germans sent her to have occupied 3,600-foot Mt. Castelnuovo, just to the northeast of Mt. Marone, 15 miles northeast of Cassino, without opposition.

Precision fire by Fifth army artillery, including 240-millimeter guns, have destroyed at least 13 bridges behind the main front, observers reported. Shelling of the bridges continued as the Germans attempted to repair them. Allied military bridges across the Rapido and Grigolingo rivers are covered with a smoke-screen throughout the daylight hours to screen them from enemy artillery fire.

Proclamation On Cancer Control

Mayor B. B. Suggs has issued the following proclamation in connection with the national observance of cancer control month:

"Whereas, cancer is the second highest cause of death in the United States; and

"Whereas, authorities in the public health field declare that from half to two-thirds of these deaths are needless; and

"Whereas, it is especially necessary during this war to conserve manpower to the fullest extent; and

"Whereas, one of the vital factors in morale among our armed forces is concern about the well-being of relatives at home; and

"Whereas, approximately 100,000 lives could be saved from cancer each year if everyone knew the early signs of this disease and realized the importance of consulting a physician promptly; and

"Whereas, the Women's Field Army of the American Society for the Control of Cancer has as its objectives the preservation of morale among the armed forces, and the raising of the public health level of the nation;

"Now, therefore, I, B. B. Suggs, Mayor of Greenville, North Carolina, do hereby designate the month of April as Cancer Control Month.

"And, comment to all citizens of Greenville the invitation of the Women's Field Army to enlist in their program during this month and to participate in their work during the coming year."

Russian Forces Smashing Across Rumanian Border

NAZI ATTACKS THROWN BACK

Allies Score Slight Gains On Italian Front

Allied Headquarters, Naples, April 3.—(AP)—Allied troops have smashed an attack by German flame-throwers on the left flank of the beachhead below Rome, headquarters announced today, while Italian troops fighting with the Allies occupied a third peak in the center of the main Fifth army front.

Flame throwers spearheaded the attack of about 150 German infantrymen against the beachhead, which began an hour before dusk Friday after a heavy mortar barrage. It was launched in the same vicinity as the raid of the previous day in which the Germans forced a slight withdrawal by the Allies from a position about a mile and a half southwest of Carroceto, 21 miles below Rome.

Although the mortar fire continued to thunder throughout the night, the infantry attackers were either dead or routed by midnight.

On the same night the Germans opened a concentrated artillery bombardment of a sector some distance away held by a battalion of American infantry, laying 900 shells of various sizes around the positions.

German tanks moved forward at a point about four miles west of Cisterna, on the eastern edge of the beachhead, but were driven back by artillery fire.

An Allied patrol went out in the coastal sector in the southern extremity of the beachhead and engaged the Germans in a series of clashes.

The new peak seized by the Italians was identified as point 1,344 and it was not stated whether the Germans had opposed the advance.

Yesterday the Italians were disclosed to have occupied 3,600-foot Mt. Castelnuovo, just to the northeast of Mt. Marone, 15 miles northeast of Cassino, without opposition.

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Convoy Wiped Out

Allied Headquarters, Naples, April 3.—(AP)—French warships have scored another marked success in action against an enemy convoy and its escort in the Adriatic. Allied headquarters announced today.

Both enemy freighters and warships were sunk by the light French forces which then withdrew without damage or casualties.

No details were given as to the time or place of the attack, but presumably it was a continuation of the Allied plan to sever German communications with their forces in the Balkans.

It was the second report within two weeks of French forces smashing a convoy in that area.

Congress Faces Many Problems After Easter

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—Home-front issues that may bear heavily on the reelection chances of most of the members this year dominate the agenda that will face congress when it returns on April 12 from its Easter recess.

How the people back home feel about such matters as taxes, veterans' benefits, subsidies, price control and military draft policies is bound to be reflected in votes to be cast during the next few months.

One of the first measures likely to be taken up is the "G-I" veterans' benefits bill, under which returning service men would receive unemployment compensation, job priorities, educational opportunities and financial assistance from the government. Already approved by the senate, it is one of four bills dealing with veterans. Two, authorizing pay and absentee voting, have been disposed of, but a fourth, bonus legislation, likely will be sidetracked until after the expected summer vacation.

Also to be acted on, but of a less controversial nature, are 1944-1945 appropriation bills for half a dozen government agencies, including the army and the navy. OPA, OWI and lend-lease program, and legislation to force millions of 4-F's and over-age non-fathers to take war or essential civilian jobs under threat of induction into service labor battalions.

classification although the draft board will keep the record of his physical condition.

But suppose he leaves the essential 2-A or 2-B job for non-essential work? Then the draft will change his classification thus:

1. If the physical examination showed he was 4-F, although he was listed 2A or 2B so long as he was in essential work, now he will be listed as 4-F.

2. If the physical examination showed he was capable of only limited military service, although he was listed 2-A or 2-B so long as he was in essential work, now he will be listed 1-A.

Here are the reasons:

The army takes a certain percentage of 1-A's for limited service. Anyone in that classification is liable to be drafted. Thus it would benefit any physically limited man, who wanted to stay out of the army, to keep working at an essential job.

As to the 4-F, Congress may authorize forcing 4-F's into essential work, even if it means drafting them into an army labor battalion.

There is another factor in the current pre-induction physical examinations for the 18-26 group in 2-A and 2-B. It will show how many of them are physically capable of soldiering.

PLANE OUTPUT HITS NEW HIGH

Previous Production Records Broken Last Month

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—Record-smashing war plane production in March, with 9,118 planes delivered and previous weight records eclipsed by nine per cent, was reported today by Charles E. Wilson, executive vice chairman of the War Production Board.

"The month of March as far as we can see, may be the peak month of the war in numbers of planes produced," Wilson told a press conference. April aircraft schedules of the army and navy call for fewer planes, he said.

"We have gone over the 9,000 mark for the first time and have exceeded the 100,000,000—pound mark in terms of airplane weight for the first time," said Wilson, who is chairman of the Aircraft Production Board.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—This is what the government is doing through the War Relocation Authority for war and war jobs.

Terrific emphasis has been placed on drafting all available men between 18 and 26.

But draft boards have been instructed not to let this interfere with a full review of all deferred men between 18 and 38 in industry and agriculture.

Draft boards, however, have been instructed to concentrate first on those between 18 and 26.

In the 18-26 age group the real crackdown is on those with non-agricultural deferments. Less emphasis has been placed on the farm-deferred.

The pre-induction physicals for the 18-26 group in 2-A and 2-B do not mean they will be moved right into the army. The draft boards can leave them in 2-A and 2-B until their deferments are cancelled.

Great chunks of deferment for that industrially-deferred age group are being—and will continue to be—wiped out and the examinations now will speed up their induction later.

Moscow Describes Action As Pursuit Of Enemy And Denies Any Aim Of Annexing Territory; Other Red Units Smashing Way To Odessa

London, April 3.—(AP)—Red army troops, having smashed across the Prut river in their first invasion of Axis soil were reported driving across eastern Rumania toward the Danube river delta and the Carpathian mountains today as Moscow announced that other Russian forces had struck to within 19 miles of the great Black sea port of Odessa, 150 miles to the southeast.

Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov, in announcing the invasion of Rumania, said it was dictated by military necessity and not with the aim of seizing "any part of Rumanian territory"—a statement that was warmly welcomed in official British circles.

The Russian communique failed to identify the exact location of the several announced crossings of the Prut, but Berlin said the main Soviet drive into Rumania was in the Iasi sector, less than 200 miles northeast of Bucharest and the valuable Ploesti oil fields. Berlin added that "all the Rumanian army has joined battle with the Russians." Martial law already has been proclaimed in Bucharest, Moscow dispatches reported.

Iasi, apparent immediate objective of Marshal Ivan S. Konev's second Ukrainian army, is 10 miles west of the Prut, and is a key Rumanian railway center where lines branch southwestward to Bucharest and northwestward to captured Czernowitz, 115 miles away. Gerst, 20 miles southeast of Czernowitz on the north Rumanian border, was taken by troops of Marshal Gregory Zhukov's First Ukrainian army yesterday, Moscow said, and it was believed likely that Soviet spearheads had also crossed into Rumania at this point.

A Rumanian high command communique broadcast by the Berlin radio and recorded here by the Associated Press, acknowledged the Red army's drive into Rumania proper, but said that "north of Iasi at almost every point the enemy was pushed back over the Jimia river."

The Jimia, north of Iasi, runs parallel to the Prut five miles to the west, and the Rumanian bulletin gave the first indication that the Red troops had advanced that far into Rumania. The communique also declared that Russian thrusts (Continued on page two)

American Barges Sunk By Accident

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—A Pacific fleet announcement has disclosed that three American landing craft were shelled accidentally by a U. S. destroyer at Eniwetok atoll February 22, killing 13 men and wounding 48.

The navy, in its announcement on the report of an investigation board, said the mishap resulted from the fact that both the destroyer and landing vessels were slightly out of scheduled positions and visibility was restricted.

BE SURE TO STAY AWAKE

A little boy fell out of bed one night. His mother asked him how it happened, and his reply was, "I guess I went to sleep too close to the place where I got in."

The New Testament has considerable to say about sleeping Christians—the foolish virgins who tell asleep while the bridegroom tarried; the disciples who, on the Mount of Transfiguration and in Gethsemane, dropped off to sleep while their Master struggled in prayer.

The weakness of the Church today is not due to the lack of its members but to their unpreparedness to drop off to sleep—not just during the sermon, but unfortunately during all the rest of the week—and to let the world and its needs go by unheeded. Every year the Church receives thousands of new members, especially during the Easter season; and many of these fall asleep, as the little boy did, so close to the place they got in that they soon fall out.

So if you intend to join a church this year, do so with the firm resolve that you will be a faithful and useful member. It will be easy to fall out, if you drop off to sleep too close to the place where you got in.

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—Your capital in war time:

Rep. Bertrand W. Gearhart, California Republican, has introduced a bill, which on the surface appears silly, but may not be at all. What the congressman wants to do is to make all Japanese in this country sign a pledge renouncing allegiance to Japan and declaring support of the United States.

The immediate question arises: Wouldn't the Japs just sign a lie, declare their faithfulness and so merely waste their business of sabotage, spying, etc.? Some would, there's no doubt about it. But according to Rep. Gearhart, there already are 8,000 Japs in this country who have asked deportation to Japan and 20,000 more who have refused to take any pledge of loyalty to the United States.

At present, there's no punishment for these Japs except keeping them in detention camps, where most of them are better clothed and fed than they were before the war. The congressman's bill would put them on the dotted line, with some assurance that something could be done about it if they eventually proved to be liars.

Paul Porter, new press relations director for the Democratic National Committee, paid a pretty tribute to his predecessor, Charles Michelson, when he held his first press conference.

"I feel," Porter said, "as if I were on the stage at Carnegie Hall and someone said, 'Here, Paul, is Kreisler's violin. Now play it!'"

Political observers here are betting that former Vice President John N. Garner will break political silence this year not from any interest in the presidential election, but because Senator W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel has declared open season on all his Texas colleagues in Congress who have served more than six years.

Garner already has made a move, through a letter which he permitted to be made public, to defend the congressional tenure of office. Senator Tom Connally is the 14th ranking member of the Senate. Of the first 15 ranking members of the House, four are Texans. As long as committee assignment and congressional prestige operates on a seniority basis, Texas has an edge on the rest of the country in authority and influence in the national legislature. Garner will argue, it's reported here, that to throw away that influence would be a bit of the old proverbial biting off one's own nose.

Since O'Daniel himself will have served eight years at the expiration

tion of his term in 1940, politicians here are wondering just what "Pappy" is up to and why.

It hasn't been publicized at all, but the increase in airmail in the last three years is one of the really staggering things on the government books. ative river transport serving Myittha to the south; with highways all so blocked, all north-south communication routes have been severed, the dispatches said.

American fighter planes destroyed 12 Japanese aircraft yesterday in operations over the front. Last night medium bombers shattered enemy installations at Kwatung and Akaba on the Arakan coast.

Air commando planes which attacked an ammunition dump west of the Irrawaddy river in central Burma, reported the objective practically wiped out, with "fires and numerous explosions all over the target area."

At present, there's no punishment for these Japs except keeping them in detention camps, where most of them are better clothed and fed than they were before the war. The congressman's bill would put them on the dotted line, with some assurance that something could be done about it if they eventually proved to be liars.

man destroyer and fighter formations.

Earlier the Frankfurt and Calais radios went silent and the Nazis said "single enemy planes were flying over central and northwest Germany."

Bombs were dropped on some sections of Budapest, causing damage, the German broadcast added. German single and twin-engine fighters attacked the escorted bomber formation, it said.

British-based planes were inactive over the week-end except for RAP Mosquito blows Saturday night against Hannover, Krefeld and Aachen.

Thirty-three Allied planes were lost in yesterday's operations, most of them presumably falling on the Steyr mission.

The air forces said that the raid was extremely successful. Photographs showed three of the five main factory buildings were shattered and that many workers were scored on others as fires gushed up from the wreckage.

toward the East-Kisimney railway had been repulsed by German troops, and that "no important event occurred in the Crimea or on the Black sea shore."

Other divisions of Zhukov's army, meanwhile, swept nearer to the Carpathian mountain passes leading into Hungary, inflicting heavy losses on Axis troops, taking many prisoners and capturing enormous stores of military booty, Moscow declared.

The important strongholds of Kuzov and Kutzy, 37 miles southwest of Czernowitzy and not far from the famous Tartar Pass, fell to Zhukov's troops, and Berlin broadcasts indicated that Tarnopol and Kovel further north in old Poland were about to capitulate to the Russians.

The fate of upwards of 200,000 Germans and Rumanians in the Odessa area hung in the balance as Gen. Rodio V. Malinovsky's third Ukrainian army converged on that great Black sea port, which field dispatches to Moscow newspapers said was burning fiercely as the result of German demolitions.

Russian columns captured Alexandrovka, 19 miles east of the blazing city; seized Maximovsk, 26 miles to the northeast; Lyubotesska, 37 miles to the north; and Evgenievka, 39 miles northwest, in their relentless drive to clear southern Russia of Axis troops.

Red Star said that Germans and Rumanians were fighting each other in the streets of Odessa amid scenes of "terrible pillage."

While the Russian drive imperils about 40 per cent of Germany's petroleum supply—about 6,000,000 tons annually—in Rumania, Poland and Estonia, the Petroleum Press Bureau said today that even if the Germans lose it, "it would be unwise to look for paralysis of the German war effort."

German army strategy would "obviously be severely hampered," the bureau pointed out, but at the same time it would be defending less territory or shorter lines of communications and would not need as much oil as heretofore.

March rate was not contemplated as a regular output rate, last month's production was at a rate of 104,416 planes a year.

Virtually all companies turning out combat planes not only met their schedules, Wilson said, "but in notable instances have exceeded them."

In four-engine, long-range bombers alone, schedules were exceeded by about five per cent, while the entire schedule for all aircraft was topped by approximately one and one-half per cent.

However, Wilson asserted that probable losses of engineers and designers under 26 to the armed forces may make it difficult to meet future schedules in view of constant engineering changes necessitated by combat requirements.

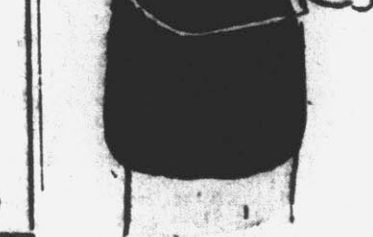

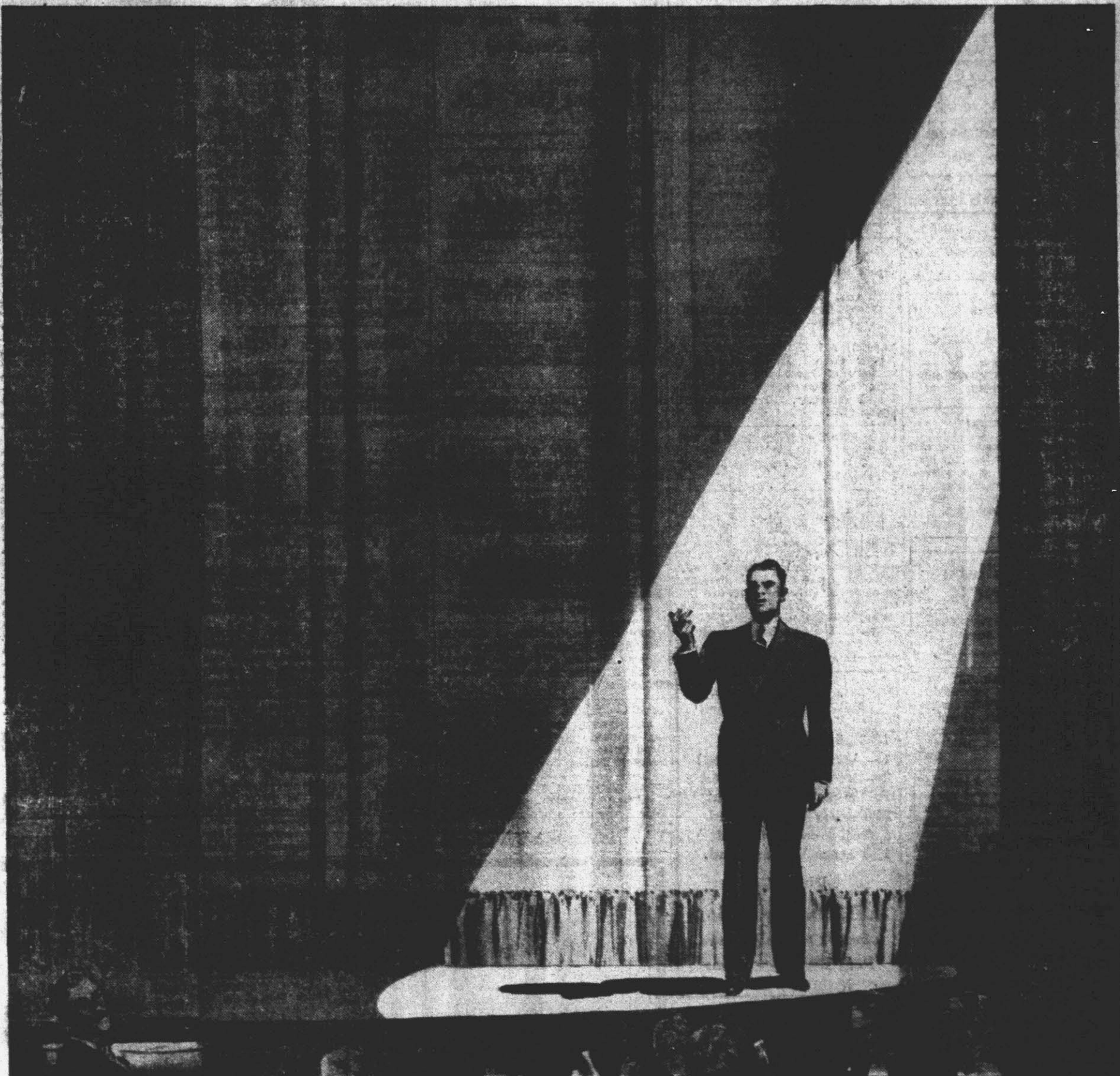
