Russians Renew Assault On Nazis

Axis Sources Say New Offensive Begun On Front Extending From Carpathians to Black Sea; Russians Declare They Will Carry War Into Germany-Itself

London, April 26. — (AP) — The Red army has launched an attack on a broad front in southern Russia from the Carpathians to the Black Sea, German and Romanian reports said today.

A German communique said the Nazis had scored "a complete defensive victory after heavy battles" when the Red army attacked in the lower Dnieper yesterday with strong artillery and air strength. The Nazis asserted they had sealed off Soviet breakthroughs.

Since last Saturday the Russian communiques have omitted mention of any large-scale land fighting. The Germans said their forces, along with Romanian troops, had driven into Russian lines northwest of last yesterday and "smashed enemy offensive preparations," and added that Hungarian troops had frustrated Soviet counter-thrusts supported by tanks in an area between the Carpathian mountains and the upper Dnieper.

The Red army intends to drive into Germany in a mighty continuation of its 1944 offensive to finish off Adolf Hitler's legions and bring about the Nazis' final capitulation in close collaboration with the Allies, an authoritative Soviet war review said last night.

The review, broadcast by the Moscow radio, declared that 500,000 Axis troops had been slain or captured and enormous booty swept up in less than two months on the lower Russian front, without counting the Crimea. Since last summer the Red army has liberated more than 100,000 square miles of territory, the review added.

By its victories the Red army has widely facilitated for our Allies the possibility of opening military (Continued on page three)

NEW GAINS ON BURMA FRONT

Allied Troops Drive Japs Back In Northern India

Southeast Asia Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, April 26. — (AP) — Japanese jungle troops are desperately attacking road and rail blocks established in central Burma by Allied "Chindits," air-borne troops, and are "coming in to the attack like a boxer with his head down" and dying in droves, an Allied observer said today.

At the same time British forces continue to tighten their grip on the Imphal-Kohima area which had been threatened by a Japanese invasion of India designed to cut the Bengal-Assam railroad. Allied supply line to China and north Burma, a communique from Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten announced.

The communique said British forces yesterday captured the Imphal plain, inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy.

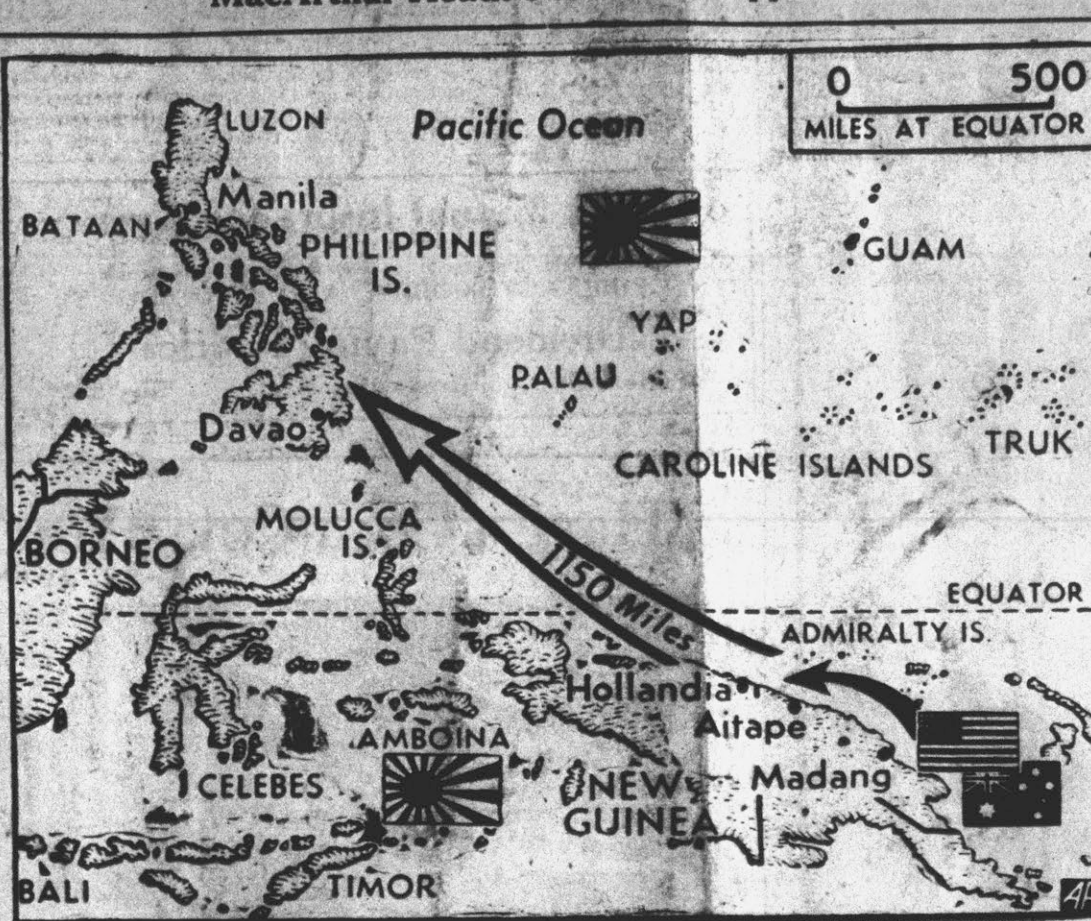
The Japanese know they must seek to dislodge the obstructions the Chindits have placed on their communications 240 miles inside Burma, the official observer declared, especially because of the aid such blocks give to Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's forces driving down upon them through the Mogaung valley in the north.

At present the Chindits are astride more than 100 miles of Japanese communications serving the enemy in northern Burma.

The Japanese are throwing waves of intensity against the perimeter of one Chindit road block established a month ago and are "perishing in droves," the commentator said.

The Japanese blow begs blunts, and even shatters, while creating deadly confusion. They employ all sorts of weapons, including light tanks, howitzers, "coal (Continued on page two)

PUT SQUEEZE ON NEUTRALS

Aid To Nazis Now Means No Aid From Allies After War

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, April 26. — (AP) — Covered by warplanes operating on the captured airfield near Aitape, a spearhead of the American and Dutch invaders of northern New Guinea was virtually within sight of the airfield at Hollandia, today's reports indicated.

Opposition still was negligible, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported, and the only real molestation was from a lone Japanese plane which bombed one of the Hollandia beachheads, causing moderate damage and light casualties.

The three-runway Tadji airfield, 150 miles southeast of Hollandia, was captured by the first invasion wave after the landings at Aitape. Australian engineers went to work with bulldozers and graders while troops chased the Japanese into the hills and jungle.

Captured enemy guns were set up as defense weapons and ground crews worked even at night by floodlight to whip the bomb-pocked field into shape.

Fifth airforce and Australian planes based at Tadji then were put to work in the campaign of annihilation against 60,000 isolated New Guinea Japanese.

Gen. MacArthur said the Aitape perimeter had been cleared of Japanese but made no mention of Aitape village, five miles northwest of the airfield.

Prison Sentences For Liquor Ring

In Superior Court this afternoon Judge Clawson L. Williams sentenced six members of an alleged "liquor ring" to from three to five years at hard labor in State Prison. They are Clarence Salter, foreman and contractor of New Bern, white, and John Morris, Negro, his foreman receiving liquor stolen from the Bethel ABC store in Pitt County some weeks ago, and Johnny Columbus Jones, Samana Hill, Robert Lee Workman and Leroy Lewis, Negroes, who pleaded guilty to breaking and entering the Bethel ABC store and larceny of liquor and larceny of an automobile there.

Salter gave notice of appeal and was placed under \$7,500 bond. Trials of others of the alleged "liquor ring" will be held in seven other counties.

Other cases today were W. M. Currie in Farmville, who was found guilty of driving drunk, and Oswald Gardner, who was convicted of driving drunk, was given six months on the roads, judgment suspended provided he pay a fine of \$500 and costs and not drink or drive for a year.

Vote To Extend Lend-Lease Law

Pitt Grand Jury Indicts Meadows

True Bills Returned In Embezzlement And False Pretense Indictments

The Pitt County Grand Jury this afternoon returned true bills against Dr. L. R. Meadows, president of East Carolina Teachers College, on charges of false pretense and embezzlement growing out of the handling of college and student funds through his personal bank account. The indictment included 16 counts totaling approximately \$12,000 while the false pretense indictment included one count based on one of the embezzlement charges.

While there was no definite announcement immediately following the return of the indictments it is expected that a special term of court will be requested for the trial. Judge Clawson L. Williams ordered that bond in the sum of \$5,000 be posted.

The grand jury began its investigation of the cases Monday afternoon following presentation of the bills by Solicitor D. M. Clark, and after hearing a number of witnesses, completed its deliberations about one o'clock this afternoon. The indictments were returned in open court when it reconvened at 2:30 following the lunch hour recess.

The indictments were an outgrowth of earlier charges by members of the state auditing department that the college president had failed to satisfactorily explain disposition of college and student funds handled through his personal bank accounts. Talk here is to the effect that probably Dr. H. J. McGinnis, registrar of the college, or Dr. R. J. Slay, head of the science department, will be the choice for acting president.

Dr. Meadows has been connected with the college for 34 years and has served as its president the past 10 years.

War Loan Drive To Start On June 12

The Fifth War Loan Drive will start on June 12 and run to July 8, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., has announced. The goal this time will be 16 billion dollars, and six billion dollars of this is to come from sales of War Bonds to individuals.

The government needs money and more money to pay the expenses of the war, which is now approaching a climax in the announced invasion of Europe. Since January 1, 1944, the direct costs of the war have exceeded 23 billion dollars. With the critical phases of the war still ahead of us, certainly no decline in expenditures is now in prospect.

During the period from June 12 to June 26 on sales to individuals will be reported by the Treasury Department, although subscriptions will be received from all non-banking investors during the entire period of the War Bond Drive, it was stated.

"The folks at home must back up the money the boys with the guns on the battlefronts," a banker who has done great work selling War Bonds, said today.

Greenville's Good Credit Fine Asset

The City of Greenville, maintaining its record for gilt-edged credit, yesterday mailed checks to New York bankers for \$19,352.99 as principal and interest on bonds which fall due on May 1. City Clerk J. O. Duval reported today.

One check \$3,173.25 was in payment of principal on \$5,000 of city bonds and \$3,173.25 for interest. The other check, for \$11,178.84 was in payment of \$5,000 of Greenville Utilities bonds for water and lights and \$2,600 of water bonds and \$1,178.84 for interest.

The city has never been delinquent in meeting its bond and interest payments during the 21 years I have served as city clerk, Duval stated today.

Report Attack On Nazi Convoy

London, April 26. — (AP) — The Berlin radio announced today that 25 or 30 carrier-based planes had attacked a German convoy today off the northern Norwegian coast and acknowledged that two of the Nazi vessels had been set ablaze.

The broadcast asserted, however, that the fires were extinguished and maintained that three of the attacking planes had been downed.

There was no immediate report on any such engagement from Allied sources.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, April 26. — (AP) — Your coal next winter is being weighed in the draft scales now. The armed forces say they will take 45,000 coal miners in 1944. Some coal experts had figured only half that number would be drafted.

When they think of 45,000 leaving the pits, they gloom up over the prospects of coming close to estimated coal requirements this year.

The armed services and the Solid Fuels Administration have been going over the manpower figures.

The SFA has worked out what it considers a tight list of men it thinks must be deferred.

It is asking deferment for no men under 22 and for no men over 37 who have had less than three years' experience.

The manpower punch is being felt already. Some miners have dropped from three shifts a day to two.

But what the exact effect of the draft will be is only guesswork until the SFA comes out in black and white with a forecast.

The average miner produces 1,400 tons of coal a year. Then, 1,400 tons multiplied by the 22,500 expected to be drafted, gives 31,500,000 tons.

That would, therefore, be 31,500,000 tons unmined. Subtract that from the 686 million-ton requirement, and the expected production of approximately 655 million tons is arrived at.

But suppose the armed forces carry out what they say and draft 45,000 men. That would be 73 million tons unmined and bring production down from the required 686 million tons to 613 for 1944.

That of course, would not be the actual figure, it would be higher since the draft is progressive and not all the 45,000 miners would have been taken until the year's end, thus giving the miners the benefit of their output and raising the total output for the year.

So the result would be above 613 million tons but still, it seems, well below the 649 million tons produced last year when coal was none too plentiful.

Meanwhile, the War Manpower Commission is making a nationwide drive to get retired miners and miners who have shifted to war plants to go back to the mines.

IN THE FRONT ROW

We attended the opera recently and sat in the front row. By the time the performance was over, we realized that we had been in a position to see much more than was good for us. The stage manager pulled aside the curtain and whistled to the orchestra leader to start the overture to the second act. We were close enough to observe that the medieval monks had slipped on their clogs. We could see that anxious looks on the faces of the singers, as they watched the prompter and glanced apprehensively into the wings. Occasionally, above the singing, we could hear the proper-ty-men shouting orders to the stage hands.

Life requires for its relief a slight veil of illusion cast over its circumstances. When life loses its mystery, it loses its charm. We become bored with people when their personalities become too apparent. No one should live in a fool's paradise, of course, but these moderns who want to drag everything out into the open, and view even the ugliest things of life in stark realism are doing their generation a gross disservice. We can see so much of life and people that we feel disgusted with both. Interest in life, when nothing is left to the imagination, we can sit so close to the stage that the whole performance loses its appeal. A seat in the front row is not always what it cracked up to be.

not have in unlimited quantity the things Sweden will need and many other nations also will require them—nations liberated from German control and nations which have co-operated with the Allies.

The moral obligation of the United Nations, it was said, will be to make available the supplies they have as equitably as possible with first consideration being given to those countries which have co-operated with the Allied effort.

A total of 83 per cent of Sweden's wartime imports originate in Germany or German dominated countries. Allied sources supply 17 per cent through their blockade of Europe. The imports from Germany include coal, coke and industrial chemicals. Those from the United States and Britain include petroleum products, cotton, coffee, fats and oils.

Thus Sweden gets from Germany the things she most needs, and from Anglo-American sources the things she can most readily dispense with, although not without some economic inconveniences. Diplomats as equitably as possible with first consideration being given to those countries which have co-operated with the Allied effort.

The American argument, and doubtless the British also, is based on a longer-range estimate of the situation, however. By that view, it is felt, the Swedes can afford to tighten their belts and make adjustment now in order to secure their postwar position.

The same principle may be applied to other neutrals of which the United States and its allies have made requests—Turkey, Spain and Ireland.

In the circumstances, attention focused on point number 4 of the order as released by the White House, which raised the possibility that the army would be directed to enforce the President's decision.

This point said:

"Upon the request of the secretary of commerce, the secretary of war shall take any action that may be necessary to enable the secretary of commerce to carry out the provisions and purposes of this order."

Should armed force be resorted to, it seemed probable that a token group of officers and men would be dispatched to the Montgomery Ward headquarters and properties. That is the system that has been used in various instances in the past, where no violence was anticipated.

Governor Bricker made his first international policy speech of his nationwide campaign last night before the Ohio Society of New York. He criticized the Roosevelt Administration on the ground it had allowed the country to be caught "shamefully unprepared" for war. More than 1,000 Allied planes flew out from Britain yesterday, and the Mediterranean air force sent heavy bombers against an aircraft factory at Turin and rail yards at Ferrara.

important junction connecting the Gulf of Venice with the interior of northern Italy. Thirteen big bombers were lost, along with three other planes in all operations from Italian bases.

In 11 days of this mightiest of sky offensives has lambasted the Germans with over 50,000 tons of explosives and thousands of incendiaries—and cost the Americans and British probably more than 2,300 airmen and 389 planes.

Most of the 2,300 men aboard these lost aircraft are believed to be safe as prisoners, but that personnel cost does not include the dead and wounded on planes that returned home after sky battles.

The material cost includes about \$50,000,000 in aircraft, probably as much in education of fliers and crewmen, and tremendous amounts for bombs, fuel, maintenance, wages and dozens of other items involved in hitting the enemy with huge air strength.

The 389 planes, however, are only slightly more than one per cent of the total of 33,000 used in the 11 days, and the Allied command rates this as reasonable cost.

The Germans have suffered a tremendous toll and the results may curtail the length of the war by months, air experts say.

More than 700 of Germany's fighter planes have been reported wrecked—with replacement an ever harder problem—and heavy destruction has been caused in German cities, war factories, airfields, other

communication lines and anti-aircraft defenses.

actions on a large scale in the west and south that are being expected with impatience by the "whole world," declared the article, written by Dimitry Manulsky, a member of the Central Committee of the Communist party.

"Basing itself on the victories it has achieved," the review said, "the Red army sees its task today in the complete expulsion of the enemy from the Soviet Union, in pursuing and finishing off his armed forces, not only on the territory of his vassals and the states subjugated by him, but also on the territory of Germany itself, and in achieving in close collaboration with our Allies the rout of the German Fascist army and the capitulation of Fascist Germany."

The review came as a Soviet communiqué told of the killing of several hundred Germans southeast of Stanislawow in old Poland in a powerful flanking attack which drove the Nazis back. Except for this action, however, a general lull continued on all land sectors of the front, dispatches said.

SALE BURNING.
Montreal, April 26.—(AP)—Smoke still rose today from the shattered block of tenement houses in downtown Montreal where a Liberator bomber crashed yesterday, killing at least 15 persons. The RAF plane had just taken off for a trans-Atlantic flight.

Witnesses said that one of the plane's wings dropped off just before it plunged into the buildings and exploded.

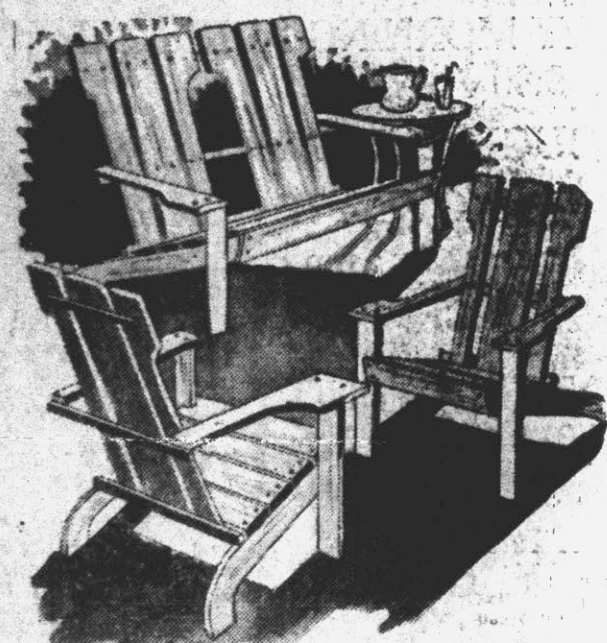

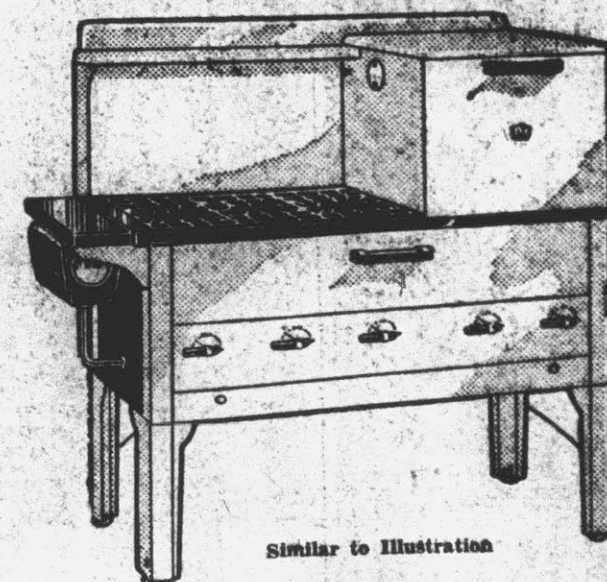

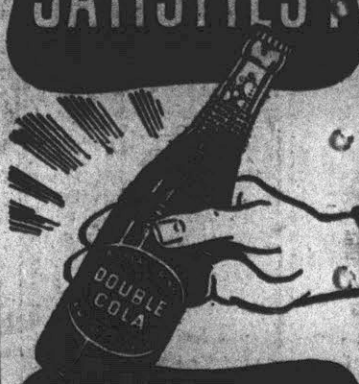
