Officials, nor by present officers or banks or insurance companies. I will repeat the suggestions of three of these boys:

Suggestion No. 1: "I believe that the government debt of all nations should be reorganized as would be the debt of a railroad which has become too unwieldy. The holder of a \$1,000 government bond could be given \$250 in a new 2½ per cent thirty-year coupon bond; \$500 in a renewed income bond, the interest on which could be payable at various rates according to the receipts from a new sales tax levied for this purpose; and \$250 in non-interest-bearing script which could be used for the payment of certain taxes. This would immediately cut the fixed interest payment down 75 per cent and every bondholder should eventually get his principal back with interest depending upon the prosperity of the country."

Suggestion No. 2: "Let other countries readjust their debts in the above manner, but I shall never wish to have the United States do anything which could be called repudiation in the slightest degree. I believe a debt of \$300,000,000,000 can be supported and should be supported so that every one will get his full interest and some day his principal. All we need do is to revalue the dollar by printing more currency and thus cause an increase in national incomes proportionate to the increase in our national debt. Instead of cutting down the war debt, let us inflate prices, wages, land values, etc. Then it will be just as easy to pay interest on \$300,000,000,000 as it was to pay interest on 25 per cent of this amount a few years ago."

Suggestion No. 3: "I have a better idea than either of you other men," said the third soldier. "I propose either a reorganization of the debt or inflation. Both ideas are wrong. I recommend refunding the entire debt of \$300,000,000,000 for 100 years—with a 1 per cent coupon. Then I should allow these bonds to be used at par for the payment of taxes and I should support them with a federal sales tax, the income from which could be used to call bonds by lot at a premium of 10 per cent. A small sales tax will easily give the government \$2,500,000,000 a year which would repay the entire debt within 100 years. It is true that these bonds might at times sell at less than par; but the fact that \$300,000,000,000 would be called each year by lot at 110—should hold prices pretty close to par. This means that taxes could be greatly reduced, inflation avoided and everyone could receive par for his bonds plus as much interest as the big banks of

What About Russia?
Do not quote me as making any of these recommendations. I merely give these illustrations to show how modern youths are thinking and to urge readers to give more attention to the "crazy" ideas of our young people. They are the ones that will determine what will happen to the national debt and to every stock and bond. I do not say that youths have better judgment than their parents; nor that they are less likely to change their minds. All I say is that our return service men should be better able to forecast the future.

Many people worry as to what extent the Russian shadow is to fall upon this country, especially during the next depression. They see Russia becoming such a world power that they fear she will Russiaize Europe and England, and that the effects of this will ultimately be felt in America. This certainly seems reasonable; but a 22-year old flier, returned from delivering airplanes to Russia, said to me: "Don't worry about Russia. She will have her own postwar troubles. Sixteen Russian generals are already planning to get Stalin's berth."

exerted by the Japanese in their offensive with the Allies threat against Myitkya would be misleading. It is impossible to compare the relative degree of a threat based on operational strategy with one based on long-range strategy.

"4. Will this force postponement of large scale land operations beyond next autumn?"

"Answer. Obviously for security reasons a direct reply cannot be given to this question."

"5. About the Allied forces now

behind the Japanese lines—will their supply be hampered?"

"Answer. No. The airfields from which the aircraft fly to supply the Allied forces now behind the Japanese lines are firmly in our hands and we have air superiority."

"6. Supposing the Assam lines of communication were cut would that compel withdrawal of these troops?"

"Answer. No."

The general statement follows: "In considering the Allied campaign in Burma it must be remembered the front stretches 300 miles from Arakan through Chindwin and Hukawng valley to Yunnan. It is dense jungle country and conditions make it impossible, with the number of troops available, to prevent the enemy with interior lines of communications and with minimum maintenance requirements from undertaking deep penetrations. We ourselves have effected much deeper penetration in another way by the use of airborne forces."

"A penetration recently was effected by the Japanese on the Imphal front. It was not unexpected and its aim is partly for its value as political propaganda. Its military aim is probably to establish Japanese forces in a tactically favorable position afforded by the Imphal plain and from there to interrupt the Assam lines."

"It must be remembered such deep penetrations by the enemy give us opportunities also and we took very successful advantage of this type of enemy maneuver in Arakan when Japanese forces were destroyed."

"Allied operations are taking the form initially of locating and pinning down the Japanese and of preventing them from gaining full use of the roads, thereby making it difficult for them to bring up heavy war equipment and motor transport."

"Later we intend to attack and

destroy the enemy."

"Owing to the nature of the terrain and the difficulty of definitely locating Japanese forces in such close country it is unlikely the battle will be brought to a successful conclusion in several weeks. There already are indications, however, that the Japanese are finding it difficult to live off the country."

"It may occur that parties of Japanese may reach lines of communication, but that possibility has been foreseen."

"Meanwhile, Allied forces have cut Japanese communications in the heart of Burma. Operations of the forces launched by the late Maj. Gen. (Ordee) Wingate and now under command of Maj. Gen. (W. D. A.) Lenthaigne are still continuing. Flying is a necessary preliminary phase. One effect of these operations will be to greatly assist our forces advancing south from Leda."

"It is difficult yet to predict how the Japanese offensive will react on future operations in Burma. If as we confidently expect our counteroffensive leads to liquidation of the Japanese divisions at present in action our prospects vis-a-vis Burma will be enhanced. Major operations are restricted once the Monsoon starts, but the important object of advancing the Leda road will be pursued relentlessly."

"Since the formation of the Southeast Asia Command, Japanese strength in this theater has been increased considerably. The enemy has strong land forces in Burma—stronger than the general public probably thinks—and since they have the advantage of interior lines of communication we must always expect some offensive action, on their part on one or the other sectors of the front. Hard fighting lies before us in Burma. The true picture has not been hidden, and there is every reason to believe that the outcome of the present Allied operations will be successful."

The Greenville chapter of the Association for Childhood Education held its regular meeting Wednesday afternoon in the auditorium of the library.

from Viehy, tense with an eleventh hour expectancy, urged Frenchmen to "keep a loyal and correct attitude to the occupation troops." He asked particularly that Frenchmen ignore calls to revolt.

Stockholm advices said that not even official calls were being accepted this morning as the German occupying forces in Denmark suspended telephone communications between Stockholm and Copenhagen for the second time in a week.

Danes who reached Sweden after the Nazis isolated Denmark Monday at the beginning of a campaign to stamp out underground activities were quoted by the newspaper Da-gens Nyheter as saying 40,000 Danes were armed and ready to help Allied invasion forces.

There was no satisfactory explanation as to why telephone service had been interrupted again.

A new guess concerning the hour of invasion came from Arriba. Generalissimo Franco's mouthpiece in Madrid, El picked 4:41 a. m. today as its first choice, but said, if the attack did not come, then the Germans should be ready at 4:39 a. m. Sunday.

German aircraft, possibly reconnaissance planes, feinted at England's southeast coast during the night at about the same time a Berlin broadcast asserted that "another huge Allied fleet is forming in the ports of that section."

Another German broadcast said that 200,000 mines had been laid in the Bay of Biscay, guarding the approaches to southern France, and said an "impenetrable system" of human and tank traps had been built along that coast.

ties developed "all over Berlin and were continued when the enemy left."

Germany's capital was last raided by American sky fleets on April 18, when large formations of heavy bombers and fighters hit the city downing at least 34 German planes and destroying some 21 others on the ground to the loss of 19 bombers and six fighters.

Three waves of Flying Fortresses and Liberators, staging the first triple-header strike of the U. S. Eighth Air Force, hammered French objectives Friday during a day of 2,800 sorties from Britain in the grinding campaign.

Yesterday's attacks cost the U. S. strategic air forces four bombers and three fighters, and poured some 4,800 tons of bombs on prime targets.

One wave of Flying Fortresses some 250 strong, hammered the Avord airdrome 130 miles south of Paris, and another of equal strength struck at coastal fortifications in the Cherbourg area. Later about 250 Liberators bombed the Pas-de-Calais area.

The heavily-escorted Fortresses bombing the Avord air base met some German fighters, which fled before the escorts could engage them. This was "the only encounter with the enemy during the day," a communique said.

The U. S. Ninth tactical air force disclosed that P-38 Lightnings now had been converted into fighter-bombers and had joined the aerial armada carrying out this "eve of invasion" offensive "designed to neutralize German air power, disrupt traffic and troops and supplies, and smash Nazi defense points in France and Belgium."

The Lightning has a speed of over 400 miles per hour and a 600-mile operating range.

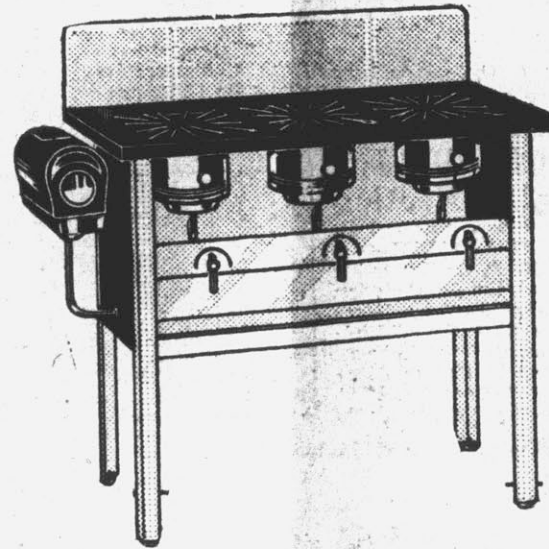

Axis Ships Hit By British Subs

London, April 29.—(AP)—Six British submarines scored heavily recently, sinking one enemy ship, torpedoing two others, causing one to be beached and damaging six others in the tightening of the pre-invasion squeeze in northern European waters, the Admiralty announced today.

A tanker was sunk, a large tanker and a large supply ship were severely damaged and believed sunk, the 8,000-ton German catapult ship Schwabenland was torpedoed and beached, and six other vessels received hits as the British raiders struck at convoys.
