Allied Ships Sink Nippon Warships

Americans Sink Light Cruiser, Two Jap Destroyers and Nine Other Vessels; British Account For Jap Destroyer And Four Other Ships

Washington, May 2.—(AP)—The sinking of a Japanese light cruiser and two Japanese destroyers by American submarines operating deep in enemy controlled waters was announced by the navy today.

In addition, the navy reported, the American submarines destroyed seven Japanese cargo vessels, one large tanker, and a large naval auxiliary on their patrols carried out in enemy territory.

The sinkings brought to 695 the number of Japanese vessels of all types sunk, probably sunk or damaged by the submarines.

That total includes 544 sent to the bottom.

A breakdown of the sinkings and damage shows that of the total 69 of the Japanese vessels have been warships.

They include 45 sunk, 10 probably sunk and 14 damaged.

The light cruiser destroyed in an unidentified area was the fourth of that classification sunk by American submarines. The submarines also have listed in their battle efforts five Japanese cruisers probably sunk and six damaged.

The two destroyers brought to 25 the number of Japanese warcraft sent to the bottom by American submarines.

London, May 2.—(AP)—British submarines have sunk a Japanese destroyer and four other vessels in recent attacks on enemy supply lines in Asiatic waters, the Admiralty announced today.

In addition, a communiqué said, two supply ships and an escort vessel were damaged by the submarines.

One of which also was credited with bombing military installations at Port Blair in the Andaman Islands in the Indian ocean.

The destroyer was attacked and sunk south of the Andaman Islands while escorting a supply ship, which also was torpedoed, the Admiralty said. Another supply ship was reported sunk in the same area while traveling under escort.

The other vessels reported sunk included a medium-sized motor ship with a deck cargo of supply transport and two smaller vessels which were destroyed in Malacca Strait between Malaya and Sumatra.

The submarine which bombed enemy positions at Port Blair engaged in a brisk duel with shore batteries and escaped unscathed, the communiqué said. Hits on a small escort vessel were scored on the raider during the action.

JAP ATTACKS HURLED BACK

Allies Strengthen Hold on Jap Supply Lines In Burma

Kandy, Ceylon, May 2.—(AP)—Allied air-borne troops have decisively defeated a strong Japanese attempt to break a rail and road block 65 miles southwest of Mogaung in northern Burma after a three-day battle in which heavy casualties were inflicted upon an attacking enemy force of 2,000 men.

It was the fourth Japanese attempt to wipe out the roadblock established on the enemy's main supply route from southern Burma to the Mogaung valley front, where Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's Chinese-American forces are fighting their way toward Mogaung and Myittha.

Field dispatches said the Japanese had succeeded in breaking through barbed wire entanglements fronting the Allied positions but had been driven back after bitter fighting.

Col. Philip Cochran's air commandos joined in the battle, bombing and strafing the enemy close to the perimeter of the Allied defenses.

An Allied spokesman said that on a conservative estimate the Japanese have lost at least 1,000 men killed in their unsuccessful attempts to smash the road block.

This figure, he said, does not include losses from air action.

The road block was likened by a senior British officer to "an irritating hair shirt which the Japanese are trying hard to remove." Casualties, he said, have been at least 10 to one in favor of the Allies.

An Allied communiqué indicated that Stilwell's forces were making steady progress in their drive down the Mogaung valley and announced capture of an enemy stronghold west of the Mogaung river and south of Warazup. At last reports Allied spearheads were within 30 miles of Mogaung.

In northern India, meanwhile, the communiqué noted a marked increase in activity in the Papet area, 25 miles south of the Allied base of Imphal. No important change was reported in the Kohima sector 60 miles north of Imphal.

Kohima, which is scattered over a ridge about 5,000 feet high, is composed of Kohima town, Kohima bazaar and Kohima village. The Japanese have been in the village, which lies about a mile from the town, for several days. They occupied the bazaar section north of the town some time ago. They have not been able to penetrate the main box-like defenses of the town, although fighting recently was reported in the outskirts.

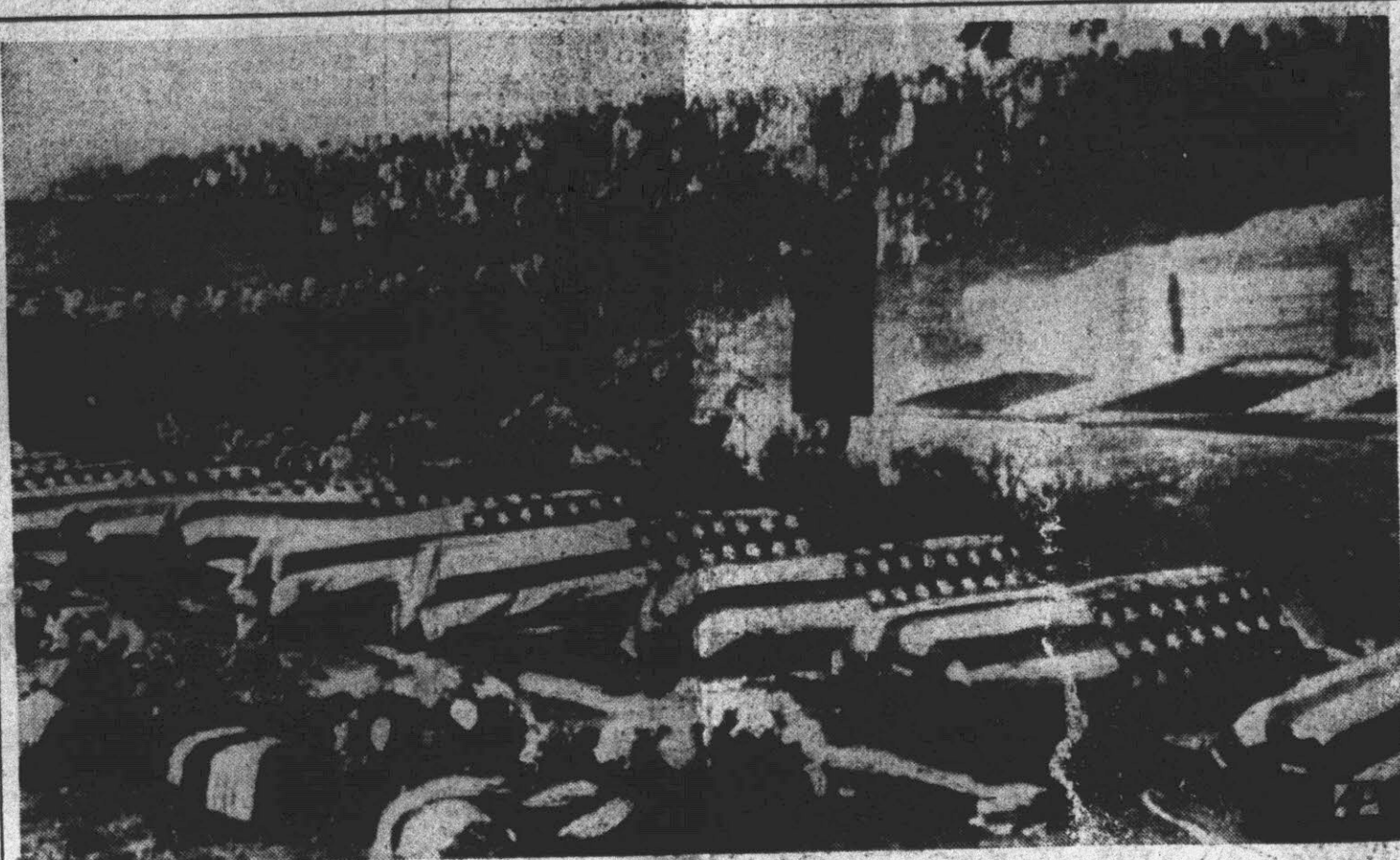

WARD CASE IS BEFORE COURT

Attorney Challenges Wartime Powers Of President

Chicago, May 2.—(AP)—Montgomery Ward and Company today challenged President Roosevelt's right to place the huge concerns' Chicago plants under federal control.

Harold Smith, attorney for the huge mail order and mercantile firm, told Federal Judge William H. Holly.

"The substance of the government's case is this—The President has the power to confiscate Ward's private property because of the existence of a national emergency which invests him, as commander-in-chief of the armed forces, with extraordinary and terrifying power of seizure."

"This position is fallacious and no law or constitutional provision confers such a power or authorizes its exercise."

State Guard Needs Men To Fill Ranks

The Greenville company of the State Guard will hold its weekly drill at the armory tonight at 8 o'clock. Capt. Jasper L. Jones, commanding officer, will be ready to receive applications from men between 28 and 50 years old for enlistment in the company.

The company, The American Legion, and other clubs are working now to secure enough members of the guard to bring its enlistment up to the full quota of 50. Greenville men must enlist in the company if it is to be kept here. There are many other county seat towns that want the company and will offer inducements to get it.

The State Guard was organized at the beginning of the war to train soldiers on the home front to take care of any emergency, riot or attack by the enemy until the regular army could take over. The company, on signal, can assemble at the armory, arm and be ready for duty in half an hour, with rifles, tommy guns, hand grenades, tear gas, bombs, etc.

Members of the guard serve without pay. They drill weekly. The company attends camp at Fort Bragg once a year with pay. Arrangements are now being worked out to have at least 60 per cent of the members attend the camp and prepare themselves for duty on the home front while the other boys are fighting the battles overseas.

Compromise Agreement With Spain Is Reached

Shipments Of Wolfram To Germany To Be Cut To Tenth Quantity

Washington, May 2.—(AP)—The State Department today announced a compromise agreement with Spain cutting Spanish wolfram shipments to the Nazis to virtual token supplies, which it was implied, may soon be blocked completely by Allied invasion forces in France.

The United States accepted the compromise at the insistence of the British, who were said to rely on Spain for certain essential war supplies.

Points agreed to were:

1. In May and June Spain may export not more than 20 tons of the vital tungsten ore to Germany monthly.

2. For the rest of 1944, not more than 40 tons monthly may be sent.

3. Allied-designated Axis agents are to be expelled from Spain, Spanish Morocco and Tangier.

4. The German consulate and other Axis agencies in Tangier are to be closed.

5. Five of seven Italian merchant ships now interned by Spain are to be released immediately; disposition of the two others and of Italian warships in Spanish waters is to be submitted to arbitration.

6. All Spanish forces have already been withdrawn from the Russian front.

7. The Anglo-American oil embargo on Spain is to be lifted immediately, with resumption of oil quotas of 48,000 tons of bulk oil (Continued on page two)

Administration Faces Primary Tests Today

The Roosevelt administration underwent a test by proxy in the Florida and Alabama Democratic senatorial primaries today. It also featured a side issue in voting by South Dakota Republicans.

With plenty of personalities involved, Senator Claude Pepper, Florida Democrat, carried the New Deal banner into a five-day contest for renomination that had found his chief opponent, County Judge Olin Edmunds of Jacksonville, hammering away at the administration's domestic policies and at their support by Pepper.

In Alabama, Senator Hill, the Democratic whip and strong supporter of the President, fought out a challenge by James A. Simpson, Birmingham attorney, who urged the voters to reject Hill as a Roosevelt man.

A Republicanized version of the administration issue played a part in the South Dakota GOP senatorial primary, where Senator Gurney is seeking reelection with a plea that he was one of the first to recognize the need for preparedness before this country entered the war.

His opponent, Lieut. Gov. A. C. Miller, based his appeal on the contention that Gurney followed the President too closely and "adopted much of the New Deal philosophy."

The support-the-President plea apparently had little effect in Maryland, where Senator Tydings won renomination yesterday by nearly five to one over Willis E. Jones of Baltimore, his principal Democratic opponent in a five-way race.

NO CHANGE ON RUSSIAN FRONT

Reds Report 1,500 Nazis Killed In Local Engagements

London, May 2.—(AP)—A Soviet communiqué said today that apparently 1,500 Axis troops were slain yesterday in local fighting in Romania and old Poland, but the bulletin reported no essential changes on the long eastern front where the Red army has been reported massing for a new offensive.

The communiqué said that 600 Germans were killed in attempts to gain ground north of Iasi, Romanian oil center, and that a battalion of 800 to 1,000 attacking Axis troops was wiped out southeast of Stanislawow in old Poland.

The Germans have been reporting bitter fighting southeast of Stanislawow and also southwest of Kovel, which is 170 miles southeast of Warsaw. On the basis of the Nazi accounts, the fighting in the Kovel sector was raging only about four miles from the Kovel-Lwow railway connecting two vital German wineries in former Poland.

The Russians announced yesterday that long-range Soviet bombers started nearly a score of fires Sunday night in an attack on Brest-day (Continued on page two)

DOCTORS HOLD ANNUAL MEET

Express Opposition to Socialization Of Medicine

Pinchurst, May 2.—(AP)—Expressing unalterable opposition to the socialization of medicine, both the outgoing and the incoming presidents of the Medical Society of North Carolina urged the profession today to develop ways and means to forestall it.

Dr. Paul F. Whitaker of Kingston, who will be installed as the society's new president tomorrow afternoon, told the society's annual meeting here the challenge to the medical world is to broaden the effectiveness of medical care in accordance with public need and demand. A similar note was sounded by the retiring president, Dr. James W. Vernon of Morganton.

Judge L. R. Varner of Lumberton, former justice of the State Supreme Court, discussing the Wagner-Murray-Dingell bill from a layman's viewpoint, said it "substitutes for medicine, as we now have it, a completely socialized regime that abolishes private medical practice." It goes far beyond any similar legislation proposed in any other country save Russia," he said.

The bill, he added, would put in bureaucratic hands the power to:

(1) hire doctors and establish rates of pay, possibly for all doctors; (2) establish qualifications for specialists; (3) establish fee schedules for services; (4) determine the number of individuals for whom any physician may provide service; and (5) determine arbitrarily what hospitals or clinics may provide service for patients.

"This bill," he said, "takes from the individual all his rights with respect to medical care for himself and his family." It would, he said, lower medical standards and knowledge.

Dr. Vernon expressed the belief that the benefits promised by those who would bring about federalized medicine can be achieved through "more democratic and less harmful methods" if the medical mind will "exert itself and formulate a plan of sympathetic cooperation that will convince the public it wishes to put within the reach of persons in all income brackets."

The Morganton physician commended recent proposals of Gov. J. M. Broughton that the present two-year medical school at the University of North Carolina be increased (Continued on page two)

Day Of Prayer

Raleigh, May 2.—(AP)—Assessing that nearly 300,000 North Carolina men are in the armed services, Governor Broughton says he hopes every church in the state will arrange to be open all day on the day the invasion of Europe starts.

In a statement yesterday he urged those who have planned prayers and other observances of the event, the governor expressed the hope that the people would be invited to turn aside from their duties and spend at least a few moments in prayer at the places of worship.

Opening Road To Philippines

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, May 2.—(AP)—American foot soldiers and Allied airmen are neutralizing Japanese strongholds barring the way from New Guinea to the Philippines, a southwest Pacific Headquarters communiqué indicated today.

Patrols scoured the jungles north of Lake Sentani near Hollandia in search of Japanese troops. Isolated during the invasion of Dutch New Guinea.

Between the landings April 22 and operations through April 30 the Americans counted 677 dead Japanese. The patrol action was designed to insure firm control of the four airfields in the Hollandia vicinity.

Allied airmen hammered at enemy bases west of Hollandia. Their westernmost strike was at a village on the island of Ambon, directly north of Darwin, Australia and off the tip of New Guinea.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Marshal Stalin has the knack of imparting grim finality to his orders of the day, and the already raw nerves of the Hitlerites must have been raked anew by his May Day announcement which presaged the concerted Allied action that will pursue the "wounded German beast" to its lair and "finish it off."

While the Soviet chief was issuing this call to united action, the Red air force was administering a pointed reminder of the retribution to come. Brest-Litovsk, ancient and strategic city of many war calamities, was heavily bombed. It was there that the new-born Soviet in 1918 accepted harsh German peace terms "dictated to her by Germany, sword in hand." Moscow has never forgotten that.

Just as there is no doubt that the western allies are on the verge of delivering the mightiest amphibious attack of history, so it is equally sure that the Red armies are girding themselves for fresh onslaughts.

There has been a lull in most sectors of the Russian front, the exception being in the Crimea where the Red siege of the great naval base Sevastopol continues. There are several reasons for this slackening off. For one thing the Red forces had

Americans Bomb German Installations In France Today Following Night RAF Attacks On Nazi Targets In France, Belgium And Germany

London, May 2.—(AP)—Springing into the most widespread attack on German rail transport thus far, Allied air forces late today brought to more than 25 the number of heavy smashes made in a period of about 24 hours against these centers of enemy defense.

Earlier, American Liberators bombed German installations in northern France, carrying the huge pre-invasion air offensive into its 18th consecutive day after 1,000 or more heavy bombers last night assailed targets in France, Belgium, Italy and Germany.

Late announcements disclosed that American Marauders medium bombers and lighter Havocs had assailed railway yards in Busigny, Valenciennes and Blanc-Misseron, while RAF Mitchells and Spitfires were scouring other and as yet unidentified railway targets in France and Belgium.

Up to 750 heavy British and Canadian bombers flew from England through a cloudless night against German aircraft, chemical, auto and explosive factories and against the rail targets on which the enemy must depend to meet invasion, the British Air Ministry announced. The others rose from Italian bases.

Formations of Allied medium bombers and fighters crossed at the recrossed the channel skies in the early afternoon, after the Liberators had returned from their mission.

The Liberators encountered no German fighters and an unusually small amount of flak.

"It was one of the best missions of the 13 I've been on," commented Lt. John Northridge, 220 W. John St., Freeport, Ill., a pilot, "when you looked out, you saw flak everywhere. There was no flak anywhere against our group."

A communiqué identified the Liberators' target as the Pas-de-Calais area and said all planes returned.

THERE IS ALWAYS A REASON

An agnostic was arguing one day with Joseph Parker, the famous preacher. He had heard Dr. Parker preach on the stoning of Stephen first of the Christian martyrs to confront the cruel wrath of his persecutors. "And what," asked the agnostic, "did God do for this young man?"

"What did God do for him?" cried Parker. "Why, in that moment of suffering and helplessness, God enabled Stephen to say, 'Lord, lay not this sin to their charge.' That was what the Almighty did, and in working this miracle of forgiveness in the spirit of the martyred man, God did more for Stephen than if He had sent a legion of angels to protect him from the ruffianism which wrought his death."

"His death was indeed painful, and the sentence which the world mob passed upon him was hideously unjust, but Stephen's death was not a miserable death. It was glorious. It would be better for a man to die like that than to live a thousand ordinary lives."

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—Ralph K. Davies, deputy petroleum administrator for war, Harold L. Ickes, No. 1 oil man, is a walking example of the platitudes that look like deception, but are pleasant enough to be any No. 1 oil man, or banker, or merchant. Of medium stature, rather slight build, with clear blue eyes, a mat of dark hair shot with gray, and immaculate in attire that's as restrained as his demeanor, he hardly gives the impression of being stormy Ickes' right-hand man in the bitter battle of petroleum.

He gives the impression rather of being a mild, almost humorless, kindly man who has mounted rather easily to the top of the ladder. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

Associates tell me that he's a hard-headed business man, who won't give an inch once his mind is made up.

An example is that early in 1942 when oil tankers were being sunk by subs almost as fast as they could be loaded, experts in PAW told Davies that railroad tank cars could probably supply the eastern seaboard with 300,000 barrels a day. He set the goal so much higher that the experts ranted, roared and called him crazy. He merely informed them that that was the goal and they had to meet it. Within a few months, the exasperated experts were amazed to discover that tank cars were supplying the eastern states with 1,000,000 barrels a day.

Davies was born in Cherrydale, Va. There is a story lacking about that he rowed across the Potomac daily to attend high school in Georgetown. He couldn't have done that very many years, because in 17 he was a clerk in the office of the Standard Oil Co. of California. Step by tedious step he climbed to senior vice president and in the process became active in international affairs as well as American oil circles.

Far from being humorless, Davies has a type of dry, deadpan wit which slips out almost unnoticed. Not only that, but when the mood strikes him, he's a practical joker.

Getting Davies to talk about himself is like trying to pluck the molars of a mastodon. You can find out that he has a wife and three children, that his home is Menlo Park, just down the bay from San Francisco, but before you can find

out if he has a swimming pool or just two bath tubs, you'll find yourself telling Davies your life story.

He's a constant bar under the saddle of his own public relations department. He won't allow himself to be publicized, and insists that all releases from his department be purely factual and non-editorial. In government circles, that's revolutionary.

Davies expects nothing more out of his wartime job than Ickes promised him when he came to Washington three years ago.

"Ralph," Ickes said then, "if you'll take this job and work hard, you'll make a success of it. You won't get any glory, but in the end you will be rewarded. You'll be rewarded with a senatorial investigation."

But this is speculation. Until some classification is forthcoming from some source, policemen and district attorneys may have to figure it out for themselves.

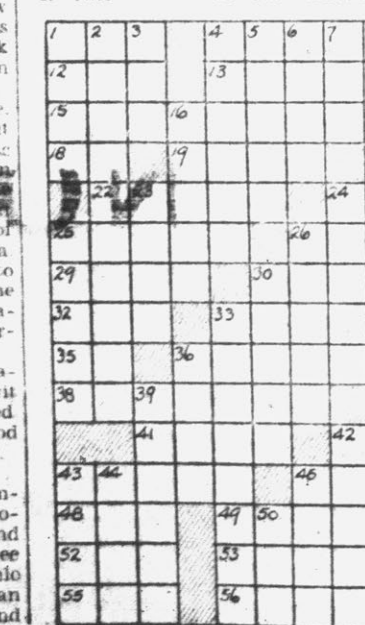

Although the outcome of the latter two economic campaigns remains uncertain, there is guarded optimism here that the Allied demands may be met at least in part within the next few weeks. Portugal, which actually has been shipping more wolfram than Spain, has been following the Spanish negotiations closely.

Lemans is one of the most important junctions in western France, a funnel for traffic between Paris and big western ports such as St. Nazaire and Brest.

The fighter-bombers' sweep raised to 21 the number of railroad objectives attacked in the last 24 hours, nearly as many as were hit all last week.

At 4 p. m., the German radio asserted that "enemy fighter formations are over western Germany," indicating that one of the Allied fighter strafing expeditions was against Nazi airfields.

The night operations, probably the most far-flung although not the heaviest conducted by the RAF, came while Allied heavy and medium bombers in the Mediterranean theater shot a four-ply blow at key German-held cities in Italy. They also followed attacks by Britain-based daylight raiders, of which 2,000 were American, which chewed up 17 rail junctions through which supplies and men move to Hitler's Atlantic wall.

The night attacks capped 17 straight days of uninterrupted large scale raids on the Germans' European fortress from both Britain and Italy.

The operational record from Britain yesterday was around 4,000 sorties (individual plane flights) while Allied planes based in Italy added 1,300 more sorties to the pre-invasion aerial crescendo. Ten planes from the RAF British-based fleet failed to return, while two Allied aircraft were reported missing from all daylight and night operations yesterday in the Italian theater. Two enemy planes were destroyed in the Italian theater.

The RAF planes from Britain, which also were joined by RCAP bombers, hit an auto works at Lyons, an airplane repair plant at Tours, an airplane factory and explosive works at Toulouse and rail installations in Chabany near Paris.

In addition to these French targets, the night raiders hit two Belgian rail targets—at Mechelen, northeast of Brussels, and at St. Ghislain, near Mons. They also struck the German chemical center of Ludwigshafen in the upper Rhine-land in what evidently was a diversionary operation.

In the Mediterranean theater, Wellingtons last night hit the harbors of La Spezia and Livorno (Leghorn), while German installations at Genoa were given their fourth consecutive pounding by Liberators. Wellingtons and Halifaxes hammered at targets in Alessandria, 50 miles southwest of Milan. A factory and a dump near Popoli and a dump near Moricone also were bombed.

On the Arakan front, the bulletin said that minor Japanese thrusts in the foothills of the Mayu range west of Buthedaung were repulsed. Concentrated air attacks were carried out yesterday on Japanese positions in that area.

The Berlin radio reported this morning there had been a flareup of action on the Murmansk front in the Arctic, where it said Soviet attacks in battalion strength had been "partially repelled" after fighting in close quarters.

Strong Russian attacks in old Poland southwest of Kovel were reported smashed today in the German communique. The Nazis asserted also that Red army thrusts had been beaten off in besieged Sevastopol, between the Dnepr estuary and the Carpathian mountains, and on both sides of Vitebsk in White Russia.

Strike Delays War Shipments

Memphis, May 2—(AP)—Some 4,000,000 pounds of freight—most of it connected with the war effort—was tied up today by a walkout of teamsters and warehousemen of Gordons Transport, Inc., James W. Wrape, company general counsel, said.

About 500 men and 150 trucks were out, stopping operations throughout the line which extends from Chicago, through St. Louis and Memphis, to New Orleans, Mobile and Birmingham.

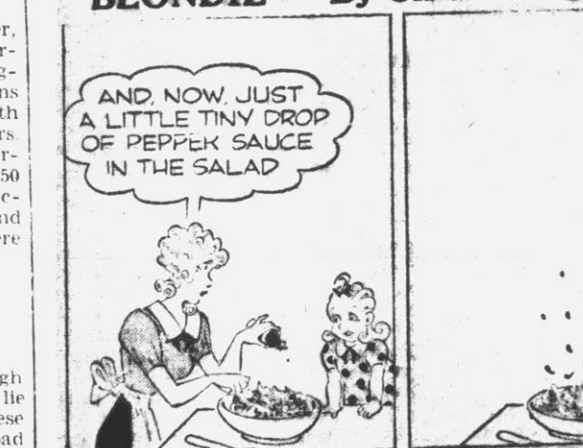

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Slight Nazi Gain On Italian Front

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 2.—(AP)—The Germans have thrust forward against Fifth Army positions on the Anzio beachhead and made a slight gain three miles southwest of Corroto, it was announced today.

Enemy shelling also increased in the long-dormant Cassino area of the Fifth army's main front and strong enemy patrols were driven

off in that sector, headquarters said. The enemy attack on the beachhead came while an Allied raiding party was stabbing at Cerreto Alto. The results of the latter raid were not immediately available.

An attempt by the German air force to raid the beachhead Sunday night was broken up by anti-aircraft fire. Twelve of 15 attacking planes were compelled to jettison their bombs. Four of the raiders were shot down and two others probably destroyed, increasing the score of the beachhead gunners to 190 destroyed and 130 probables.
