Meats With Except Of Certain Beef Cuts To Become Ration Free

Beef Steaks And Roasts Not Included In New Order Effective At Midnight; Hereafter 30 Red Points Must Last Four Weeks Instead Of Two

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—The Office of Price Administration today made all meats except beefsteaks and beef roasts ration free, effective at midnight.

The removal of ration points, announced by OPA Administrator Bowles at a surprise press conference, covers all cuts of pork, veal, lamb and mutton; all beef except steaks and roasts; beef hamburger, beef steaks, all kinds of variety meats, sausage, ready-to-eat meats, canned meats and canned fish.

The action was taken, Bowles said, because lend-lease pork buying had been halted for the time being; also because of reduced army and navy demand, the crowding of storage space and the hope that the action will bring more meat to market this summer.

Because of the wide variety of meats now becoming available without the spending of red points, OPA announced that housewives would have to make their red points last twice as long—stretching over the four-week period instead of the present two-week period.

In the past, OPA has validated 30 red points every two weeks. Starting next Sunday, OPA will validate 30 points every four weeks. Red stamps R8, S8 and T8 became valid Sunday for the purchase of butter. (Continued on page two)

WILL OBSERVE INVASION DAY

Local Churches To Be Open For Day Of Prayer

After conference with the mayor and the fire chief arrangements have been made to have a signal given by the city siren at 9 a. m. following the announcement of the invasion. The fire chief will see that about 25 slow blasts of the siren is given at 9 a. m. following the hour that the European invasion has started. This will be a call to prayer for all Christians throughout the city. At 11 a. m. of that day every church, both for white and colored people, will be open for prayer all day, and the minister of the church will be in the church from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. for prayer and to respond to requests for "special prayer" that may be made to him by parents or wives of men overseas.

A request is going to the merchants of the city asking them to close their places of business from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. on "D Day" and people be urged to go to the church of their choice for prayer. Simultaneous with the fire siren, we are requesting that all churches that have bells see that they are rung at 9 a. m. and that all manufacturing plants that have up steam enough, blow their whistles at the same hour. All of which will be "a call to prayer" for Greenville, said Dr. Robert S. Boyd, president of Greenville Ministerial Association.

Allied Advances On Burma Front

Bombay, May 3.—(AP)—Allied troops have captured several additional enemy strongpoints north of Kohima in assaults designed to lessen Japanese pressure on that Indian frontier base. Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters announced today.

At the same time, however, a communiqué said, Allied forces on the southern end of the Burma front evacuated the village of Palewa "in readjusting" their positions in that area.

Palewa is situated on the Kalamau river about 100 miles north of the Japanese-held port of Akyab and about 35 miles northeast of Buthaigang.

In northern Burma, the communiqué said, Allied forces have destroyed more enemy strongpoints and Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's American-Chinese troops are continuing to advance south and west of Warang.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

We've been told that D-day for the great invasion of western Europe has been set, and British Labor Minister Ernest Bevin confided to war-workers at the week-end that he even knew the precise moment, though he dared not reveal it.

It will seem strange to most folk that an unprecedented amphibious attack—an operation which literally is an adventure into the unknown—can be planned down with such exactness. Still, it is because of its very magnitude and uniqueness that there must be as much exactness as is humanly possible.

However, we can take it for granted that, despite an exact date, the time can be altered to meet an unforeseen emergency. It's obvious that a date which depends to considerable degree on untested elements must be conditional to that extent.

This point was illustrated at the time of our Sicilian invasion. The day before D-day a freak 33-knot wind developed suddenly, whipping up waves that made hundreds of soldiers sick and worried their officers. Vice Admiral H. K. Hewitt, commander in chief of the U. S. naval forces in North Africa, was called in commander Richard S. Steere, the weather man who always gives the right answer. Steere said the wind would die down and advised no change in plans. But the time of the invasion presumably would have been altered if his report had been adverse.

Having this qualification as to flexibility, we can be sure that plans have been worked out exactly. While the zero hour can't be guaranteed weeks in advance, what can be fairly well guaranteed is that things will follow a certain course after the zero hour has been reached. In the matter of ordinary land offensives, operations are worked out to a fineness that's uncanny.

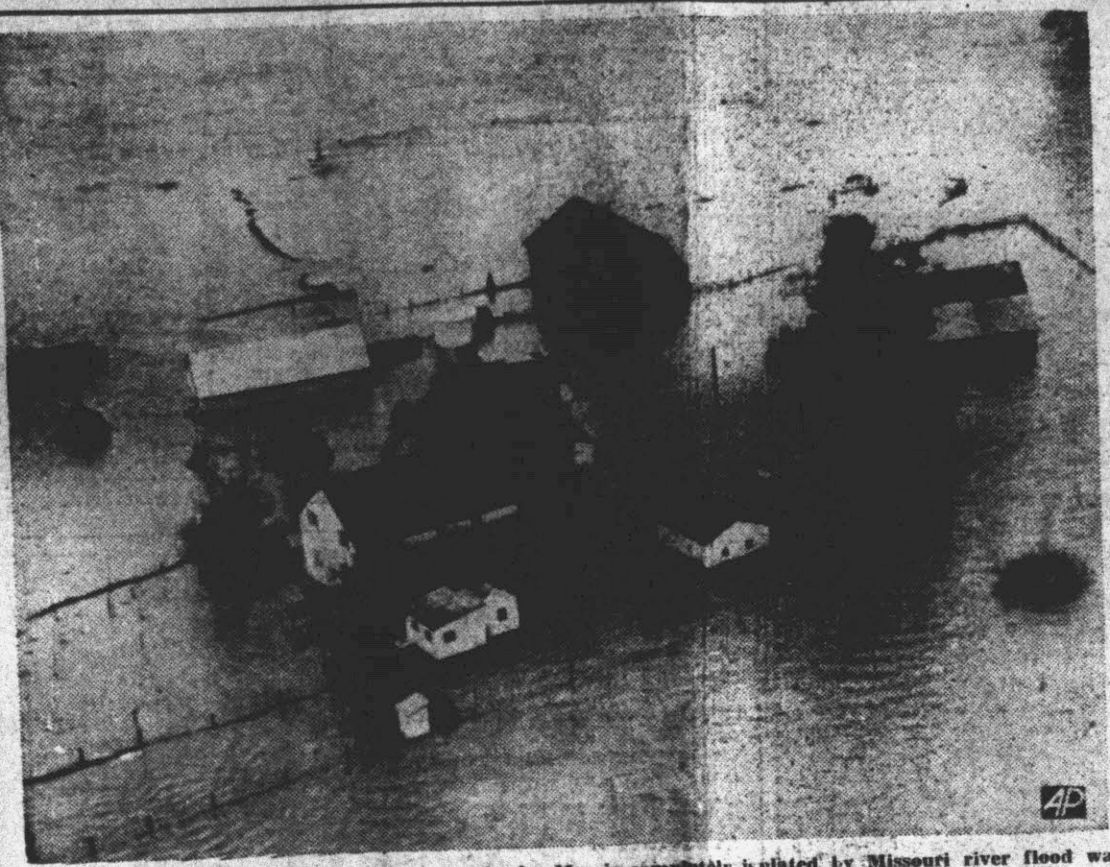
Days before a big drive the whole thing has been reduced to decimal point exactness. The maps show just where attacking troops will be at precise times as the line advances. Everything corresponds to this precision. Only in that way can the all-important coordination be achieved along the whole front.

Of course, the best planned of offensives are likely to have local upsets, such as some unit being held up by fierce opposition. However, these can be compensated for, because the precision of the operation as a whole.

Naturally there's a great difference between the orthodox land offensive and the forthcoming invasion which involves land, air and water to an extent that in some respects is outside the experience of man. There will, for instance, probably be a use of paratroopers and other airborne forces on a scale heretofore only a strategist's dream. Indications are that a huge army will be dropped from the skies into areas behind the main enemy lines.

However, there will be nothing haphazard about it. Every body of troops planned long in advance. Thus where there are upsets, the Allied command will be able to compensate, just as in the case of the orthodox offensive. I dare say the invasion plans in Commander-in-Chief Eisenhower's hands run literally into volumes of detail. There's one situation we overlookers must be prepared for. Many confusing things are likely to happen after the invasion starts—things which only the Allied command can understand. Indeed some of these mysteries will be deliberately perpetrated by our command to fool the enemy. At a time of great tension, events which aren't understandable are bound to cause worry, but in the forthcoming invasion there's no need to let them get us down in the mouth.

NAZIS FACE NEW CRISIS

Allied-Neutral Agreements Body Blow To The Reich

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—The German armament industry was faced today with a critical choice in production policy involving the Nazi high command's estimate of how long the war can be continued. As a result of Allied moves cutting off Turkish chrome and reducing Spanish wolfram, Washington experts on enemy industrial resources say the Germans either must begin now to taper off their production of super-alloy steels or face the fact that in a year or so they will be virtually devoid of alloy metals.

If they expect to end the war in a hurry they can follow the latter course but if they hope for prolonged fighting and a negotiated peace they will have to make every pound of alloy material go the limit. For alloys make possible the airplane engines, armor plate, piercing shells, high-speed machine tools and other equipment essential to modern war.

In fact, economic warfare experts are saying that the belt tightening process for Germany is just beginning to pinch. In the next few weeks, possibly the next few days, it will pinch more severely for Britain and the United States still have extra pressure to put on the neutrals trading with Germany.

One immediate objective is to have Portugal cease supplying wolfram to Germany. This is primarily a job for Britain, with which Portugal trades. (Continued on page two)

Japs Suffering Heavy Losses Over Wide Area

Giant Naval Task Force Again Deals Staggering Blow To Jap Base At Truk

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, May 3.—(AP)—Staggering blows, dealt more than 1,000 miles apart at Hollandia and Truk during an almost leisurely cruise of battleships, cruisers and aircraft carriers, focused today to the sustained striking power of the Pacific fleet far from its home base.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz just has disclosed that the task forces which supported the Hollandia invasion spent Saturday, Sunday and Monday off the Japanese-held Carolines, overwhelming Truk with 800 tons of carrier plane bombs, destroying 126 enemy aircraft and even shelling some of the Carolines for the first time in the war.

For one week, the same powerful fleet stood unchallenged off the Dutch New Guinea coast, wiping out 106 Japanese planes and leveling the defenses, through which Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Sixth Army moved, with such ease to invade Hollandia.

Not a warship was damaged in the Carolines expedition. Plane losses were described as light. Approximately 30 flight personnel were listed as missing.

Carrier planes, opening the second such task force assault on Truk—the first was last February—shot down 100 enemy fighters. (Continued on page two)

More Than 5,000 Vessels and Barges Sunk Or Damaged In The Southwest Pacific

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, May 3.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters in a special statement today claimed 1,727 Japanese coastal vessels, barges and schooners have been sunk and 3,548 damaged since April, 1942.

A comprehensive review of the Allied anti-barge campaign said this destruction has had the effect of "paralyzing enemy efforts to supply, reinforce or evacuate the 17th and 18th (Japanese) armies cut off and surrounded in New Guinea, New Britain, New Ireland and the Solomons."

The Japanese have been driven to the use of barges and other small craft by heavy losses of cargo ships and transports early in the war and by the proved inefficiency of submarines as supply agents.

The small craft, ranging in length up to 100 feet and capable of carrying as many as 60 soldiers or 20 tons of supplies, had been gathered in large numbers in Japan, the Philippines and the China coast and hundreds more had been built in Japan and in captured islands.

The headquarters statement estimated that the 1,727 small boats destroyed could move a 50,000-man army. "Several thousand" of their crews were killed. (Continued on page two)

ASKS SUPPORT NEW TAX PLAN

Streamlined Measure Expected to be Passed By Friday

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—Chairman Doughton (D-NC) of the Ways and Means committee today called on the House for unanimous approval of legislation to simplify and streamline income tax laws for 50,000,000 taxpayers.

Both Republicans and Democrats in the House conceded the measure, which goes into two days of debate today, would pass overwhelmingly Friday.

"It's too popular with the people for it to have much opposition," Doughton said. Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) Ways and Means Republican leader, declared it should pass without a vote against it.

The measure is designed to relieve 30,000,000 taxpayers from the necessity of ever computing another tax return, by adjustment of the withholding levy to take the full tax liability from the wages and salaries of persons earning \$5,000 or less a year.

It also would provide simplified procedures for the 20,000,000 who still would have to file returns.

In his speech, prepared for the opening of the debate, Doughton said he does not "share the fears" that a flat deduction of 10 per cent of income for the new computation of the withholdings levy—in lieu of contributions, other taxes and interest paid—would have an adverse effect on taxpayers' contributions to charitable organizations. "I do not believe that the great mass of contributors donate for the purpose of securing tax reductions, but because of the worthy causes such contributions advance," he remarked.

He noted that unless a taxpayer wants to claim more than 10 per cent in deductions for contributions, other taxes and interest paid, under the simplification legislation he would file no return if his wage or salary is \$5,000 or less.

Further studies are being given not only with respect to still greater simplification of individual income tax, he added, but also to the corporate tax provision of existing law.

Gandhi Worse
Bombay, May 3.—(AP)—A government communiqué said today that the anemic condition from which Mohandas K. Gandhi is suffering has grown worse and that his blood pressure has fallen, "giving rise to some anxiety."

The elderly Indian nationalist leader has been interned in the Aga Khan's palace at Poona for almost two years.

Fine Group Of Men Enlist State Guard

Thirteen recruits enlisted in the Greenville State Guard company during the drill period at the armory last night and this brought the membership up to 35. Capt. Jasper L. Jones, commanding officer, stated that the men who volunteered last night represent various lines of business.

The guard still needs 15 more men to fill its ranks to the required minimum quota of 50. Draftees who were turned down at Fort Bragg for physical reasons are especially invited to join. Captain Jones will receive applications at the Fire Department any day or night.

The State Guard organized as a military unit on the home front to be prepared to take care of riots or attacks by the enemy until the regular army could take over, is well drilled, has plenty of equipment and can assemble and arm and be ready for duty in half an hour on signal from the fire siren.

The Chamber of Commerce, civic and other clubs are cooperating with Captain Jones to secure enough volunteers to fill the company quota. The members serve without pay. The company drills weekly. It has a two-week training period with pay at Fort Bragg each summer. There are plenty of men from 28 to 30 who could give a few hours a week to the State Guard, it is understood.

At recent battalion maneuvers the Greenville company outmaneuvered and outdrilled all of the companies participating.

SAYS RULING A DIRTY DEAL

Spokesman Flays Order For Ward Employee Election

Chicago, May 3.—(AP)—A spokesman for the CIO United Mail Order, Warehouse and Retail Employees today denounced the decision by the National Labor Relations Board to conduct an election among employees at the government-controlled Montgomery Ward and Company within seven days as "a dirty deal."

"This is the dirtiest deal the NLRB ever dished out to labor," declared Miss Myrna Siegel, publicity director for Local 20, the union, involved in a dispute with Ward's and its chairman, Sewell L. Avery, which led to army-supported workers.

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—Men in 4-F (physically incapable of military service) and those in 1-C (disqualified for military service) are concerned about a notice sent to draft boards this week by selective service.

This notice called for a "revision in the procedure to be followed in the reclassification" of 4-Fs and 1-Cs. Before explaining the notice, this should be made clear:

Draft boards continually have been going over their lists of 4-Fs and 1-Cs, trying to reclassify them for military service where possible. At SS headquarters it was said that 60,000 men in 4-F were reclassified in February. It is likely the number of such reclassifications is running about 60,000 monthly.

For instance: A year ago a man was examined and found physically fit except for a hernia. Because of the hernia he was placed in 4-F. Since then he has been operated on, recovered, and apparently is physically fit.

So what would happen to such a man? Would the draft board ship him off to the induction center for army examination? No. Until last Saturday the regular procedure was to have him examined by one of the specialists on the state's medical advisory board. This kind of procedure was mandatory.

If the specialist recommended that the 4-F be reclassified as fit for military duty, that is what the board generally did although it still could leave him in 4-F if it wished.

But there were problems in the plan. The board usually was made up of seven specialists, one expert on the heart; another on the nervous system; and so on. They were scattered around the state. So a 4-F whose heart had improved might have to be shipped

American Bombers Smash At Invasion Coast Again Today; Italy-Based Bombers Continue To Hammer Northern Italy And Southern French Coast

London, May 3.—(AP)—Rail targets in western Europe have been bombed so effectively for the last two months that the lines in northern France and Belgium are no longer capable of bearing the peak load necessary for the Germans to repel invasion. A Ministry of Economic Warfare spokesman said today.

American Liberators bombed Pas-De-Calais area of France for the fourth consecutive day today, hammering Nazi installations blocking the shortest invasion route to the continent. The assault carried the mighty two-directional air offensive through the 19th consecutive day.

Italy-based planes struck heavily at Genoa and other harbors and at rail lines in northern and central Italy last night as Mosquitos from Britain sprayed the German chemical center of Leverkusen with two-ton bombs in a half hour attack.

The ministry spokesman said no freight yard between Cologne and the Bay of Biscay in a zone 100 miles deep was capable of forming trains, and that only military and coast troops could be handled.

He said 14-year-old boys, women and one-armed former soldiers were being used by the Germans to run the trains.

The 400-mile-an-hour Mosquitos dropped many 4,000-pound blockbusters on Leverkusen, which lies just north of Cologne and is the home of one of the largest chemical works in Europe, employing 20,000 workers.

More Fighting At Sevastopol

Moscow, May 3.—(AP)—The Germans have raised a thick curtain of artillery fire around besieged Sevastopol with all the artillery they were able to save in their retreat through the Crimea. Pravda reported from that front today.

Numerous anti-aircraft guns were reported assembled there by the enemy.

The dispatch described the Sevastopol night sky as a "vast light with millions of flares over the bays and flames from burning German transports rising from the sea."

Pravda said the Red air force was pounding enemy positions steadily with small biplanes from low altitude. The dispatch said the Germans planned an attack on the southern tip of the peninsula, where they have been probing for soft spots for several days. Russian lines were reported stable there and on the rest of the front.

clear across the state to the board member who was a heart specialist. Examinations by board members began to pile up.

On Saturday SS changed this procedure. Now the draft board can send a 4-F to the board members or the local board's examining physician.

The state's SS medical director can also take a hand. For example: By approving a certificate from a doctor who says he has cured a 4-F of hernia by operation. In such a case an actual examination of the man would not be necessary and the board could reclassify him.

But SS also told the local draft boards this:

When a man who still remains 4-F is found to be in an essential industry, he is to be reclassified as 2-A or 2-B on his own card which he carries around with him.

The board will also carry him as 2-A or 2-B but with this: 2-A (F) 2-B (F). This has a bookkeeping value and may make the 4-F feel better.

Some boards have been doing this. Now SS suggests all do it.

But a 4-F who, after another look by the board still was found to be 4-F but engaged in non-essential work, would retain that classification and would not be changed to 2-A or 2-B until he got into essential work.

THE LAST MINUTE IMPORTANT

Everyone is familiar with the Biblical story of Lot's wife. Led from the city of destruction by the strong hand of an angel who would save her from ruin. Lot's wife looked back and became a pillar of salt.

The Greeks have a story which corresponds to this. Orpheus, plunged into dreadful grief over the death of Eurydice, besought the gods to restore her to life. It was finally granted that he should lead her back to the light, provided he went before and dared not to look even once behind him until the upper air was reached. down 50 Japanese planes in combat Saturday and destroyed 60 more on the ground. Guns of the warships accounted for five more. The next day, while the bombing of the big naval base was pressed home, Truk was able to send up only one plane and it was shot down.

Sunday, during the second day's pounding of Truk, the airbase island of Satawan, more than 100 miles to the southeast, was shelled by cruisers of Rear Adm. J. B. O'Donnell. Monday, big battleships of Vice Adm. W. A. Lee poured their shells on Ponape, the often-raided island in the western Carolines, 400 miles from Truk. Carrier planes also attacked the base.

Admiral Nimitz in yesterday's communiqué also retorted that the warships shot down five Japanese search planes on April 26 "during the retirement from the Hollandia area." That date would be April 27 east longitude or Dutch New Guinea time. It previously had been announced that the task forces destroyed 101 planes in softening up attacks prior to the Hollandia invasion which MacArthur opened April 22.

Wake Island, enemy-held U. S. possession 1200 miles to the northeast, took its heaviest raid of the war when land-based heavy bombers poured 95 tons of explosives on Japanese installations Sunday. There was no air interception.

soldiers have been killed, drowned or wounded in these attacks.

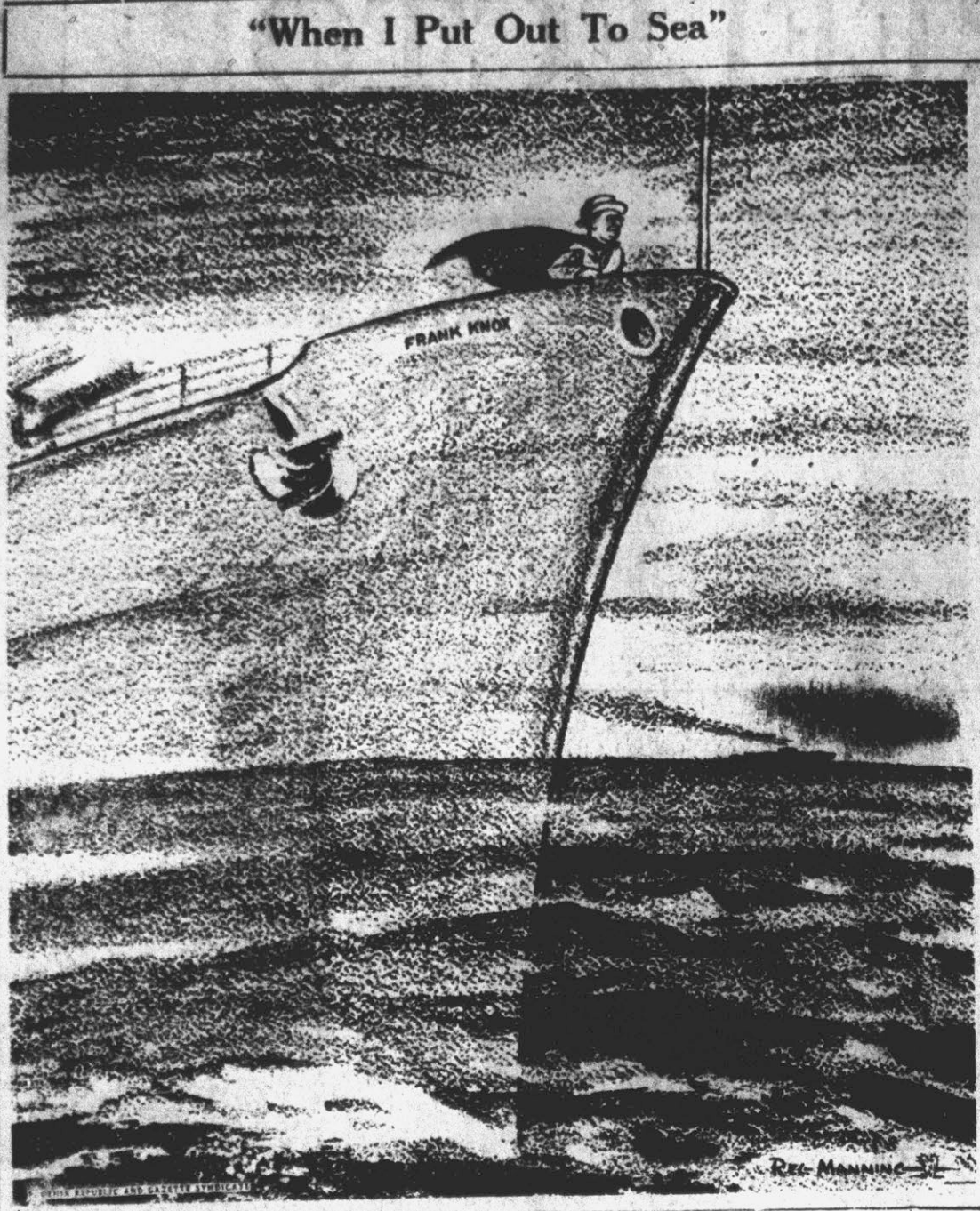
"Such a vast amount of cargo has been sunk that thousands of trapped enemy troops already are on short rations and are faced with dwindling supplies of ammunition, equipment and medical supplies," the statement said.

Allied planes, swift patrol torpedo boats and ground forces systematically are liquidating bypassed Japanese groups in north New Guinea while bombers range westward to neutralize enemy reinforcement points.

Allied headquarters today announced 20 Japanese barges laden with supplies and troops were sunk or damaged between Wewak and Aitape on New Guinea, an area in which 60,000 enemy troops were bypassed in the recent invasion of Hollandia.

A fairly large number of enemy soldiers were encountered by patrolling in the Aitape area southeast of Hollandia. On April 28 one patrol met 200 Japanese at Kanti village eight miles south of Aitape and killed 59. The others fled.

Australian patrols, headquarters said, were pushing westward from

Alexishafen and passed Rempi, five miles out, without meeting opposition. Fifty-eight booty traps were found buried on the Alexishafen airstrip.

Liberator bombers dropped 150 tons of bombs on Rabaul, New Britain, and Woleai in the Caroline Islands, and air patrols damaged a freighter off Biak Island in the Schoutens north of Geelvink Bay, Dutch New Guinea.

Headquarters said that Liberators were jumped by from 15 to 18 Zeros during another attack in the Schoutens and that six of the enemy were shot down. Two of the bombers were damaged.

government seizure of the Chicago properties last week.

Mother Greenville Businessman Died

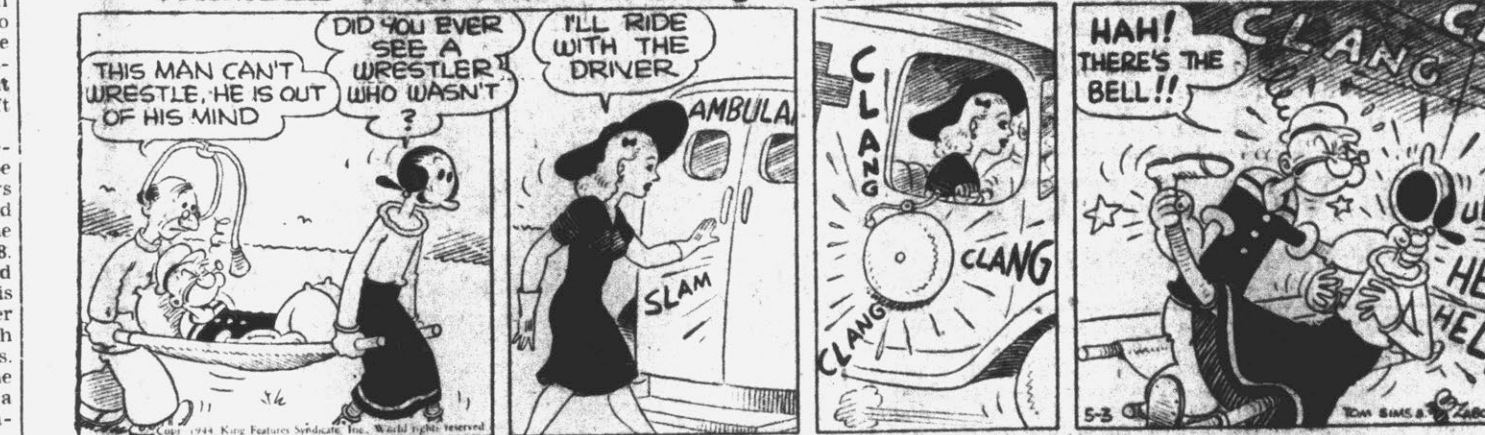

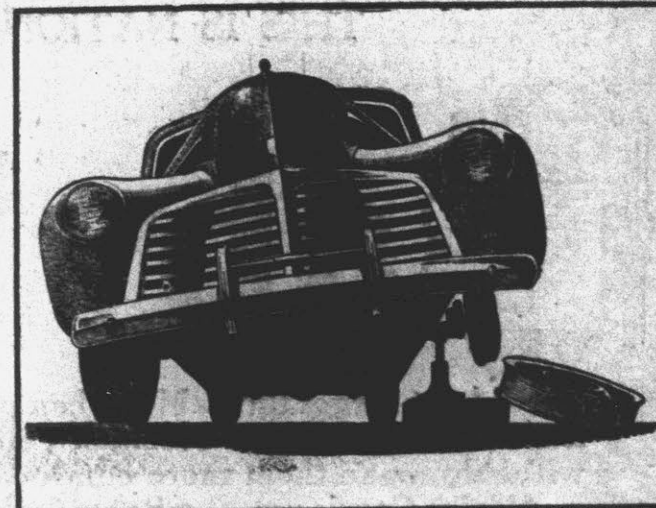
