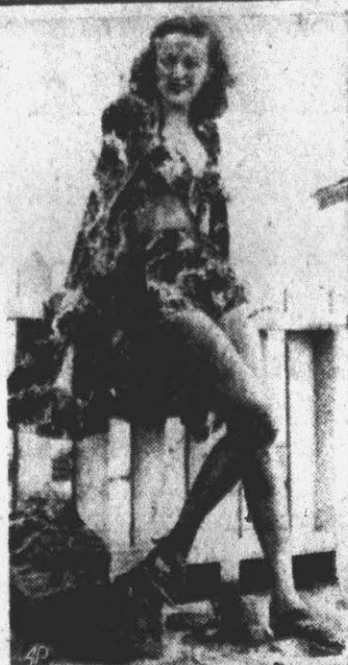

NEW WEAPONS FOR INVASION

Allied Arms Said To Be Superior to Anything Yet Used

London, May 5.—(AP)—An American announcement of the development of battle equipment superior to the enemy's and a German claim of a "hidden host of unknown preparations" behind Hitler's European west wall were thrown today into the invasion war of nerves.

"If you want to call those secret weapons, you can," declared Brig. Gen. Henry Saylor, chief ordnance officer of the U. S. army in the European theater, in revealing something of American arms improvements.

The German claim came direct from the pen of Hitler's ace propagandist, Propaganda Minister Jaul Joseph Goebbels. His article in this week's edition of the German magazine "Das Reich," broadcast by the Berlin radio, said "there exists innumerable defense measures and weapons so far unknown."

Gen. Saylor said American troops advancing into Europe will have "the finest artillery, small arms with performance better than anything the enemy has used and ammunition with higher explosive charges."

Writing yesterday in the army newspaper Stars and Stripes, Saylor said his report was "no pep talk to boost morale" and added:

"When the day of the forthcoming operations arrives every American soldier taking part may be assured his weapons, ammunition, tanks and vehicles will be superior, or at least equal, to those of the enemy... some ordnance will be used for the first time after being developed and tested thoroughly at proving grounds in America."

In a simultaneous report, Col. Joel Holmes, deputy ordnance chief, said:

"Enemy weapons are good, but they still haven't anything to match the American M-1 rifle, carbine, light and medium tanks, 105 mm howitzer, 155 mm. Long Tom artillery piece, aerial artillery, the bazooka and the 50-caliber Browning machinegun."

Other developments in the invasion picture yesterday included a visit by King George to "secret RAF invasion headquarters" of the second tactical airforce, commanded by Air Marshal Sir Arthur Coningham, and an announcement by the Netherlands news agency that the Germans had declared the entire North sea province of Zealand in Holland "forbidden territory."

Mrs. Roper is native of Hyde county, lived in Bath many years and was postmaster there for a long time. He was a lifelong member of the Episcopal church. He was a valued member of St. Thomas' parish. His loyalty and devotion to the church and Sunday school was outstanding.

He had been in declining health the past six months. During that time he made his home with his children in Newport News, Va.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Nancy Brooks Roper; a daughter, Mrs. C. Reynolds of Newport News; four sons, Jack Roper of Greenville, Henry N. Roper of New Bern, Lt. Richard Roper, N. S. Army, stationed in Panama, and Ensign Randolph Roper, U. S. Navy; two sisters, Miss Mattie Roper and Mrs. Elizabeth Sawyer of Ransonville; two brothers, Bueron C. Roper and Lon W. Roper of Ransonville.

REFLECTIONS ON THE PAST

A great deal is written today about the insane egotism of Hitler and his associates. We look upon them as wicked corrupters of the race, who have set themselves up as idols to be worshipped by the masses.

But we should remember that a similar phenomenon has occurred a number of times in history. Caesar Augustus allowed his subjects to erect temples and show him divine honor. The insane Caligula had his name inscribed on a shield of gold, and on an appointed day directed that it be carried through the streets of Rome and into the capitol with hymn-singing and prayers. He ordered the statues of the gods to be replaced by statues of himself. In one place he had erected a golden image of himself, and each day this image was robed in garments similar to those he himself wore. He required the people, under penalty of death, to fall down before this statue and worship.

It appears that now and again maniacs come to places of power and compel men everywhere to do them service. Our present world situation teaches us how necessary it is to watch our liberties, to keep national and international life free from injustices, so that these pathological creatures cannot arise and drag masses of men after the slime of a deifying cult. When life is healthy, religious faith strong, and patriotism alert against every incursion upon liberty, leaders of this variety do not climb to power.

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—Probably not one person in 100 of those who made out April 15 income tax declarations paid any attention to Specific Instruction 16.

It reads: "Special deduction for blind individuals. A person who is blind as defined in the taxable year will be entitled to a special deduction of \$500 in computing the income tax, but not the Victory tax."

In loss of revenue to the United States, this is perhaps the most infinitesimal deduction in the income tax law. Lawrence Q. Lewis, executive director of the National Society for the Blind, estimates that less than 10,000 of the nation's 270,000 blind persons will be affected by it—perhaps no more than two or three thousand.

But there the unimportance of this "special deduction" ends. What is important is that for the first time in the history of the income tax law, Congress has recognized a physical handicap as a basis for special consideration on income tax exemptions.

What is more important is the precedent which might well be extended to all of the nation's physically handicapped—a small item in the nation's annual revenue, but a vital one to the afflicted.

There is no specific evidence here of any association campaign to extend the exemption to other afflicted persons. But there is talk of aiding the war wounded, who are still able to find gainful employment that puts them into the income tax brackets.

When the National Society for the Blind went before Congress last year to argue its case, no representative of any other groups appeared to ask similar consideration.

The basis on which the society argued its case may be the pattern for additional arguments.

There wasn't one word of appeal on a basis of charity. The claim was that blind persons have expenses which normal persons are able to avoid—guides, house servants and special transportation.

Heretofore, the Bureau of Internal Revenue has considered these "personal expenses" and not deductible.

What has the Society for the Blind worried is that the tax simplification bill wipes out all this for persons earning less than \$5,000 a year.

Treasury officials point out that it has been considered for spe-



cial hardship cases since the law was first passed in 1913 that has complicated the law. Groups, now specially favored, may soon be screaming for the old complicated form.

We saw more of what the Wehrmacht had not wanted us to see, barbed wire entanglement and a blockhouse—such was the Atlantic wall.

Our impression was that the Atlantic wall was being deliberately played up for propaganda purposes at home and abroad. What then does the Wehrmacht count on to save Germany? Goebbels has almost hinted at it in his latest propaganda—defensive fighting or fighting behind walls, at which the Germans do not feel at home, but their own specialty: a violent, offensive attack after the landing.

We found they were gathering troops for this purpose. While 17-year-olds were being mobilized, the age brackets in the death notices of soldiers killed in Russia became steadily higher as older reserves were thrown into action.

The eastern army was left to retire as best it could while troops were stored up for the west. And planes are being saved also. Of the two dozen raids we saw, only once did we see German fighters go up to meet the raiders.

The Luftwaffe is getting ready for a kamikaze and dive-bombing, not a defensive one. Somewhere be-

tween the Atlantic wall and the old Siegfried line, they seem to be preparing for a violent battle in which both sides will be on the offensive.

raiders headed for the continent later in the forenoon.

The U. S. planes went out so early they passed homeward bound British Mosquitos which last night attacked objectives in western Germany. Other British planes laid mines in enemy waters without loss.

Southeast England coastal residents were awakened at dawn by the roar of engines of the out-going and in-coming aerial fleets.

The blow against targets in Budapest, the capital of Hungary, was the second successive night stab into the Balkans for Allied heavy and medium bombers from Italy. On the previous night the raiders hit rail yards in Bucharest, capital of Romania.

Although hampered by bad visibility, Allied medium bombers in daylight yesterday attacked rail bridges at Grosseto, Albino, Torre and Fa, all in Italy, and fighter-bombers hit rail communications at Terni, Sulmona and in the areas northeast and south of Rome. Allied headquarters in Naples announced.

In all about 1,100 sorties were flown by Italian-based Allied aircraft. Four Allied planes were reported missing, and one enemy plane was destroyed.

Today's operations were the fifth in six days that Liberators have battered enemy emplacements just across the channel from Britain.

Mitchells and Bostons of the RAF, second tactical airforce, also operating unusually early, struck today at railway yards at Cambrai in

northern France. They flew under a Spitfire escort, heaping new destruction on the already heavily pounded supply routes of Nazi forces behind the Atlantic wall.

The German communiqué identified the Mosquito targets last night as Cologne and Mannheim. The Budapest attack was termed "minor."

Before reaching head of the combined fleet Koga had served as commander of the Yokosuka naval station and before that as commander of the Japanese fleet in Chinese waters. He also had been vice-chief of the naval staff from 1934-37 and was naval attaché at the Japanese embassy in Paris in 1926.

He already has been succeeded as commander of the combined fleet, Tokyo said, by 58-year-old Admiral Soemu Toyoda, commander of the Yokosuka naval station. Admiral Zengo Yoshida, heretofore in command of the Japanese fleet in Chinese waters, has taken over the Yokosuka command, the broadcast said.

Koga has been honored posthumously by Emperor Hirohito, who has promoted him to the honorary rank of fleet admiral and awarded him "the first class order of the Golden Kite and the Grand Cordon of the Rising Sun with Paulownia Flowers," Tokyo said.

earning up to \$5,000. Thus, the withholding levy would become in 1945 the actual tax for these millions of persons, and they would owe no more at the end of the tax year.

There would be no change in the amounts held from pay envelopes and salary checks this year, but the government itself would compute the taxes on 1944 income for those with wages and salaries under \$5,000.

The measure reshuffles the whole income tax structure, scrapping the victory tax and setting new normal and surtax rates and exemptions—while keeping actual tax burdens near their present levels.

To provide relief from 30,000,000 persons this year, all those with wages and salaries up to \$5,000 and receiving no more than \$100 from sources not subject to withholding

will be permitted to file a copy of a withholding receipt, furnished by the employer, in place of the regular tax return.

These taxpayers will list their dependents on the reverse side of this receipt and enter the amounts of "other income" if any.

They then will sign the receipt and mail it to the local tax collector, without any payment. The collector will compute the tax and where necessary either bill the taxpayer or an additional payment or issue a refund check.

Peach Crop Short

Atlanta, May 5—(AP)—All varieties of peaches in Georgia probably will not exceed more than 4,800 carloads this season.

That is the belief of William C. Bewley of the Fruit Exchange, who said the normal state fruit crop is about 10,000 carloads. He added that the Georgia peach crop is expected to start moving about May 10.

MUDDY TRACK FOR THE DERBY

Eighteen Horses Entered For Annual Track Classic

Louisville, Ky., May 5.—(AP)—While a light rain kept intact a string of 34 hours of moisture that turned Churchill Downs' racing strip into a sea of slop and mud, 18 horses were entered today for the 70th running of the Kentucky Derby tomorrow.

How many of the owners will risk paying the final \$500 to start will depend upon the condition of the track 45 minutes before post time tomorrow.

Only two of the 17 trainers who hope to saddle their prize three-year-olds in tomorrow's mile and a quarter race looked upon track conditions with discouragement. B. R. Patton, owner of Valley Flares, said his horse would not start if conditions were unfavorable. A. J. "Whitey" Abel, owner of Cramme Image, said his thoroughbred did not care too much for mud, but would start regardless.

John Caver, trainer of Mrs. Payne Whitney's favored St. Up, said rain or mud would make no difference. "It can come down in buckets up to Derby time, so far as I am concerned," Caver said. "St. Up will be at home in any kind of going."

Ben Jones, trainer of the Calumet Farms' Pensive, also said he didn't care about the conditions.

Although horse lovers and betting men alike are all-struck up over the prospects of a stand-out triumph by St. Up, there is plenty of interest in Challenge Me, Oktyavere, Broadcloth, Autocrat, Alorier, Bell Buzzer, Gay Bit and others, all good mud-dogs.

If 16 go to the post, the winning owner will collect the largest purse in the history of the race, \$64,675. Hitherto the largest purse was \$64,225 handed down by Shut Out in his 1922 triumph.

With the prospects of a 70,000 attendance, the size of tomorrow's crowd will be a striking tribute to the popularity of the event which Col. Matt Winn, the 83-year-old guiding genius of the Derby, has built up to a national institution.

Senator Taft of Ohio, Republican member of the committee, had suggested 18 months to provide a calendar-year end.

Seaman Pleads For Part In Invasion

London, May 5.—(AP)—A large number of American merchant seamen assigned to homebound bound vessels are pleading daily with War Shipping Administration officials to allow them to transfer to craft scheduled to take part in the invasion and some even are jumping ship to remain here.

"An awful lot of the boys have been pleading with us to take them off the ships bound for home," declared Charles A. Hogan of San

Francisco, United Kingdom representative of the recruitment and manning organization of the WSA.

"The average seaman doesn't want to miss the greatest show of all."

Hogan said some sailors jumped ship when their pleas were not heeded, while others feigned illness to keep from sailing.

The difficulty of granting their requests, he explained, is that not only are men needed to take employment home for more supplies but ships are going to be used in the invasion.

Hitler Calls Envoys Home

London, May 5.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler has called to his headquarters the German envoys in neutral capitals, the Moscow radio said today. Franz von Papen already is home from Turkey, which has cut off chrome shipments to Germany. Moscow said the envoy to Spain, which is reducing wolfram shipments, had been summoned while the minister to Stockholm, where the Allies are seeking reductions of ball-bearing exports, was also to be called.

Woman's Body Found In Trunk

Los Angeles, May 5.—(AP)—The body of a woman, police said, was found today in a trunk shipped from Chicago to the Railway Express Company office here. The trunk was taken to the morgue where the torso was to be examined.

Investigators said they had not yet determined to whom the trunk had been shipped. Capt. Leroy Sanderson of the police homicide squad reported that the trunk was sent from Chicago April 30 by a man giving his name as John Lopez. The discovery was made by a repair clerk at the express company office.

The body was encased in some subject, evidently salt, police said.

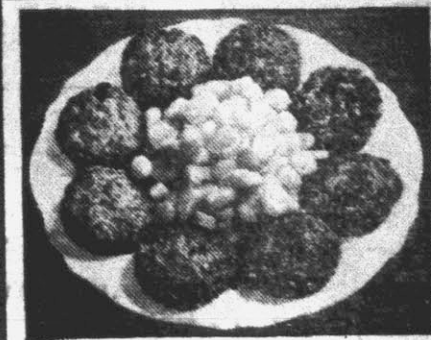

PORK LIVER PATTIES

1 lb. pork liver
1/2 cup chopped onions
1 Egg - Fat
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3/4 cup dry bread crumbs

Put liver through coarse grinder of food chopper. Mix with onion, egg, salt and bread crumbs. Form into 8 small patties, about 3/4 inch thick. Brown in fat. Cook for about 6 minutes per side. Too long cooking will develop a strong flavor. Patties may be wrapped in bacon and broiled. 6 patties.
