Soviets Massing For Drive Toward Berlin

Germans Report Great Concentrations Of Russian Strength In Old Poland; Red Siege Of Sevastopol Slowly Annihilating Entrapped Nazis; Escape Ships Sunk

London, May 6.—(AP)—German reports relayed through Stockholm said today that the Russians had massed men and equipment "on an enormous" scale in old Poland for a new drive on the path to Berlin.

The reports said the Red army was concentrated in great strength in the vicinity of Kovel, 170 miles southeast of Warsaw, and also was gathering near Kolomyja, 30 miles southeast of Stanislaw near the old Czech border.

A Russian Tass agency military commentator said, meanwhile, that the sectional struggles which have been going on near Stanislaw since mid-April were significant because of strategic railways in that part of former Poland. A Soviet communiqué said 300 Germans were slain in a two-hour battle in that area yesterday.

The Bulletin also said that Russian air and sea units had sunk five more German and Romanian escape ships off Sevastopol in support of the Red army's siege of the big Crimean port.

Of the siege itself, a correspondent with the Red army said the Russians were "burning and squeezing the enemy out of nearly impenetrable stone nests."

The German communiqué said the Russians were attacking at Sevastopol with heavy artillery and warplane support, but that all blows had been repelled and 34 Soviet airplanes had been shot down.

"Major Soviet attacks" also were thrown back east of the Siret river in Romania, the bulletin added.

British Open Drive On Japs

Southeast Asia Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, May 6.—(AP)—British and Indian forces striking in a general offensive in the Kohima area of eastern India have cleared the Japanese from a number of important positions and are continuing to advance, headquarters announced today.

A communiqué said Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's Chinese troops were forging ahead south of Imphal, highly contested Mogaung valley village in northern Burma, and also had overcome Japanese defenses near the Lakhraw river in the Mogaung valley.

(A Reuters correspondent cabled that the Kohima battle "may prove the biggest so far on this front. It may decide the fate of the present Japanese offensive in Assam.")

The communiqué said U. S. fighters destroyed two Japanese planes while damaging airfields, and that four more were destroyed and 12 damaged in an unsuccessful Japanese raid on an Allied landing strip in central Burma.

PRESSURE ON SWITZERLAND

Nation Urged To Cease Trading With Germany

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—The United States has taken another step toward plugging the channels of vital war goods flowing to Germany; negotiations are in progress to reduce Switzerland's exports to the Nazis.

The talks are being held in London between delegations from Switzerland and this country, and have already been underway for several weeks.

Expected result is a new trade agreement with Switzerland, to take the place of an interim pact signed last December.

Switzerland sends the Nazis fuses, chronometers, precision instruments and a small quantity of ball-bearings. The strategic importance of these products is quite disproportionate.

NEW BLOWS ON JAP POSITIONS

Thousands Of Japs In South Pacific Facing Death

Advanced Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, May 6.—(AP)—Relentless extermination raids by land and sea today were forcing more and more of some 140,000 Japanese troops in New Guinea, New Britain and New Ireland toward surrender or death-inviting barge flight.

Ahead of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Philippines-pointed spearhead, poised in the Hollandia area of Dutch New Guinea, bombers are pounding the Schouten islands, where the enemy is attempting to mass aviation for counterblows, and Wakde island and Sarmi on the coast.

Behind Hollandia, darting motor-torpedo boats team up with planes to hammer by-passed Japanese garrisons enclosed in a huge geographical fishhook, outlined by Wewak and Hansa Bay on the British New Guinea coast, Rabaul in New Britain, and coming to a point at Kavieng on New Ireland.

Headquarters spokesmen announced today that new air-sea blows sank six, probably seven, supply-laden barges and damaged eight others near Wewak where bombers dumped 105 tons of explosives Thursday on the airfield. Prowling PT's sank three, probably four, barges and damaged another in the Wakde-Sarmi area. Blasted Rabaul received another 97 tons of bombs Wednesday.

MacArthur's extermination tactics were telling on the enemy. Dejected Japanese, many of them starving, surrendered in comparatively greater numbers than in any previous campaign.

Bigger Bomb Loads For American Planes

A U. S. Army Air Base in Britain, May 6.—(AP)—American planes of all types now are using an invention which increases their loads of small and medium bombs by 75 per cent, the ordnance section of the air service command announced today.

The simple device consists of a loop of thin cable wire and a snap fastener hook. With it bomb-loading crews now sling two and three bombs from a single rack. This "cluster adapter" was invented by Capt. Leo H. Vanderhove, 29, of Taylorville, Calif., who began experimenting on it nine months ago.

The device works with every type of bomb except the 2,000 and 4,000-pound blockbusters.

Air Bombardment Stops Nazi Trains

Mediterranean Allied Air Force Headquarters, Italy, May 6.—(AP)—Relentless air bombardment has prevented the Germans from moving a single train since April 24 from the Pisa-Rimini line, 140 miles north of Rome, to the fighting front area, Maj. Gen. John K. Cannon, U. S. 12th air group commander, said today.

He said that tactical air force attacks had knocked out all the Nazi freight yards in central Italy, and although the Germans were able to repair single lines rapidly, American planes had kept cutting them to destroy bridges and tunnels so regularly that there was no through rail traffic.

In the present battle line, the Germans, by shifting carjoes by truck across the cut lines and by employing coastal and road transportation could keep their front going on limited supplies, but when Allied forces strike again, results of the strangling air campaign should show, Cannon said.

Nazis Evacuate Towns In Italy

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 6.—(AP)—The Germans are reportedly evacuating all Italian civilians beyond the Fifth army's main front for a depth of 50 miles. Allied headquarters announced today.

It was explained that this meant the evacuation of several sizable towns within the 20-mile belt.

In the lower Garigliano sector of this front, an increase in infantry action was reported and in the upper river valley an enemy patrol attempted to cross the stream in rubber boats was repulsed, it was announced.

On the beachhead and the Eighth army front several minor clashes occurred. On the beachhead three German tanks and several buildings were knocked out by direct hits. At besieged Cassino, several enemy mortars and machine guns were silenced by Allied artillery and machine guns.

War Of Nerves Continues As Invasion Time Nears

Rommel Says Invasion Imminent; British Official Says Airmen Have Already Begun Invasion

London, May 6.—(AP)—Field Marshal Erwin Rommel added his voice today to the invasion guessing din, declaring the attack "must be reckoned as imminent" and asserting that the German soldier, "armed with new weapons, is ready for the utmost."

The Allies, he declared in a German broadcast monitored by the Ministry of Information, "will come up against many great surprises."

"This is particularly true of the enemy formations which may try to land by parachute or from aircraft behind the coastal front," Rommel declared.

The broadcast said he addressed his commanders after completing a tour of Mediterranean coast defenses and quoted him as saying: "My inspection of the interior of the country has shown the existence of an interesting system of tactical measures which can be described as a complete novelty."

Rommel, whose forces were driven from Africa by the triumphant eighth army troops of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, made a reference to that experience.

"Before the attack on El Alamein," Rommel said, "Montgomery asked his men to kill Germans wherever they meet them. On account of this order wounded and captured soldiers were murdered at El Alamein."

Some Postwar Markets

Babson Sees Heavy Family Spending

Babson Park, Mass., May 6.—There are more than 35,000,000 families in the United States. Statisticians believe that some 65 per cent of these families will be heavy spenders as soon as the German phase of the war is over. People have accumulated the funds with which to make very substantial purchases. Most articles will be bought to replace present equipment.

Automobile Outlook

Just when the automobile companies will be able to again manufacture passenger cars is not known. The chairman of the board of one of the largest companies in the industry recently said that his company originally based its plans on the assumption that the German war would end in November. Recently, however, the directors of this company have revised their time schedule. They do not now believe the war will be over in November.

Customers for new cars should constitute what would have been the 1942 models plus a few refinements. Trucks for civilian use will be available before passenger cars. I anticipate that at least 3,600,000 families will be in the market for new automobiles. This does not include cars sold for export, used car sales or cars purchased on a wholesale basis for sales forces. These families will spend at least \$3,300,000,000 for new cars just as soon as they can be delivered.

Household Appliances

This market includes all of the varieties of household equipment commonly in use, such as electric irons, sewing machines, vacuum cleaners, washing machines, stoves, radios, refrigerators, fans, garbage disposal units, lamps, carpet sweepers, mangles, electric toasters, etc. Thirteen million seven hundred fifty thousand families will want one or more household appliances. Many of these will buy some kind of mechanical refrigerator and possibly 2,500,000 radios will be purchased.

A potential market, in excess of \$1,200,000,000, therefore exists for household appliances.

Some 40 per cent of the families will be able to spend more than \$5,000 on a new house. At the moment, the big real estate market is in homes costing less than \$10,000. After the war before inflation sets in a good deal of house should be possible at around this figure. The trend is away from the larger type of house. More household conveniences.

JAPS EXTEND GAINS IN CHINA

Chinese Hold On Important Railway Cut To 40 Miles

Chungking, May 6.—(AP)—Japanese forces pushing up the Peiping-Hankow railway have narrowed the Chinese hold on that vital north-south artery to about 40 miles, field dispatches said today.

The dispatches declared that other Japanese troops striking from the south had reached a point within 10 miles of the east-west Lung-hai railway junction of Loyang, 65 miles west of the Peiping-Hankow road.

(A Tokyo broadcast said today that Japanese forces operating southeast of Loyang captured Yuh-shien Thursday.)

A Chinese communiqué also announced that a third enemy column was pushing toward the southeastern corner of Honan through Anhwei province after capturing Poyang, on the Yellow river about 50 miles from the provincial border, April 29.

The Japanese operations in Honan were described as the most extensive since the drive on Hankow in 1938. There was a general feeling here that the enemy was bent on making at least one grand attempt to knock the Chinese out of the war, principally to prevent China from being used as a base by the Allies.

The fall of Loyang might possibly be a forerunner to a westward drive to Sian, from which the Japanese might take the historic invasion route to Szechwan. This threat, however, was still far removed. It would inevitably entail a battle with the flower of the Chinese army.

The Japanese ground forces, heavily supported from the air, now are heading down upon Loyang from the three directions. One column is (Continued on page two)

Hellcat Pilots Outfight Japs

Aboard a Carrier Flagship in the Carolines, May 1.—(Delayed)—(AP)

Eight Hellcat fighters broke up a 15-plane Japanese attack on this raiding United States fleet force today.

How they did it was told by Ensign Marvin R. Odum, 21, 681 Green St., Rocky Mount, N. C., who was rescued after a crash landing at sea.

Odum and three other Hellcat pilots from another carrier took on the Japanese Zero fighters at high level. Four other Hellcats, also from Odum's ship, went after the enemy dive and torpedo bombers at low altitude.

With one plane on his tail, Odum went into a rolling dive to escape. He "blacked out" for a moment.

"As soon as I could see again, there was a Zero right in front of me heading into a cloud. He never knew I was there. All I had to do was shoot. He blew up."

Odum started back to the American task group but saw the sky full of flak and decided "it wasn't such a good idea right then."

He returned to the goddard but finally was forced down when his plane was damaged. He was picked up by a destroyer.

Goon, brought to this flagship by the destroyer, said the Japanese pilots were "very aggressive—although" perhaps this was because they had us outnumbered.

Siamese Twins Died Early Today

Phoenixville, Pa., May 6.—(AP)—To Joyce and Sandra Stierly, tiny blonde girls doomed never to have a separate existence, death came as a release today from the bonds that joined them at their birth six days ago.

Joyce, the larger and apparently stronger, ceased her labored breathing shortly after midnight and Sandra, whose circulatory weakness foretold an early end to the struggle for life, died a few minutes later.

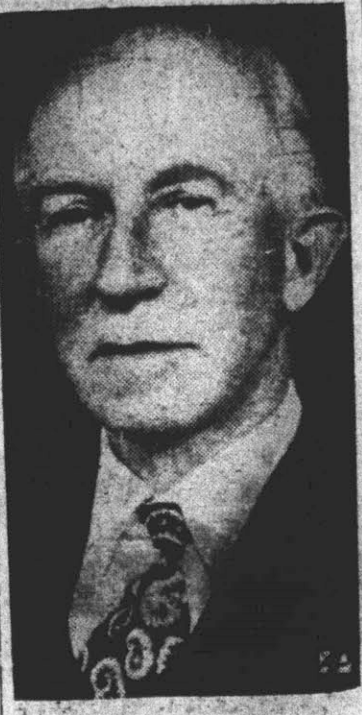
Their parents, who were joined at the chest, were joined by the umbilical cords at opposite ends of the crabs.

Enough Young Men For Army's Needs

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of selective service, was responsible today for relieving plenty of pre-inductive headaches—he indicated that there are enough available men under 26 to fill draft quotas until fall.

Gen. Hershey, in an interview at Baltimore yesterday, said that draft calls had been decreasing during the last few months, intimating that the army is gaining its personnel strength.

He added, too, that while selective service had been fixing its calls on the theory that the supply of men under 26 would be exhausted shortly, the army's needs apparently had dropped. In other selective service quarters spokesmen said that any deficit in the armed forces' manpower needs, outside of youths reaching 18, could be called from the 26-29 age group.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—OPA experts huddled today around the scales of justice to decide on groans or grays for meat cheats.

OPA on Wednesday took ration points off all meats except steaks and roasts. Those who had been caught and suspended from getting any meat.

For OPA ruled that the suspended cheats could do business again in all meats except those still rationed, steaks and roasts.

This would seem to leave them only a little in the red. But would it? And how much? That's where OPA at the same time cut the value of meat points in half.

Until Wednesday a certain number of red points had to last a week. Now the same number has to last two weeks. But how does this affect the meat dealer whose suspension was lifted? Take a look:

Jones had a restaurant. OPA allowed him 1,000 points a month for meat. He deposited those points in a ration bank, writing checks against them for the meat he bought. But he cheated.

Instead of staying within his 1,000-point limit, he overdraw his account by writing checks that totaled 2,000. Thus he got meat worth 2,000 points but was able to pay only 1,000.

American Bombers Blast French Invasion Coast Again Today; Italy-Based Bombers Smashed At Romanian Oil Fields Again Last Night; Dam In Italy Demolished

London, May 6.—(AP)—American Liberators dumped bomb loads into German installations in the Pas-de-Calais area of France today as the Allies' pre-invasion air offensive continued for the twenty-second day, despite miserable flying weather over the English channel.

It was the twelfth consecutive day of heavy bomber operations from British bases, but once more it was only a small force, probably less than 250 bombers with an equal number of escorting Lightnings.

Thunderbolts and Mustangs, which hopped the channel to hand Hitler's Atlantic wall emplacements their sixth blow by heavy bombers in seven days.

The daylight blow followed a night in which British planes laid mines in enemy waters without loss and Canadian-managed Mosquito bombers on an offensive patrol over northern France attacked and severely damaged several parked enemy aircraft.

From the south, the Mediterranean Allied air force capped its dramatic three-day delight smash Friday at Ploesti and Turnu-Severin in Romania and the Pescara dam in Italy by night blows on the Romanian oil city of Campina and targets in northern Italy.

The dam, 19 miles up the Pescara river from the port of the same name, had penned up a huge lake. At last reports a great wall of flood waters was moving downstream toward Pescara. The Germans had depended on the dam for electric power.

The stroke against the dam ranked with the RAF's successful attack last year on the Mohne dam in Germany. The iron slide gates were ripped apart by underwater explosions from bombs planted on the upper side of the structure.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Mahatma Gandhi's release from internment by the government of India, on the grounds of his serious illness, is bound to be widely interpreted as calculated to deprive him of the martyrdom which would come from dying while imprisoned. Certainly, without attempting to read the government's mind, we can say that Gandhi's liberation is an act of wisdom, for when his death does come it will sweep India with emotion like a prairie fire. One handles sentiment like that with discretion.

The little Mahatma is by far the most influential individual among the four hundred millions of that vast sub-continent. To understand this you must know that his chief hold on his people rests in his spiritual leadership, apart from his political dominance of the all India congress.

It is with reluctance that one discusses the cold print the death of a man who still lives. However, I'm well enough acquainted with Gandhi to know that if he were informed that his passing was under discussion he would merely smile and crack one of his dry jokes. The Mahatma, veteran of many hunger strikes, has walked with death too many times to let the final call worry him.

The great question in most minds, and especially in the calculations of the New Delhi government, is what effect Gandhi's death will have (1) on the general population and (2) on the grave political crisis growing out of the battle for independence from England. We know that living

he has been so powerful that he might have inspired revolution, had he so willed and had non-violence not been one of his cardinal principles. What then will his death mean to India when it comes?

Of course there will be mourning throughout the land. And one seems to see a long line of weeping thousands following the Mahatma's bier. If his people abide by his teachings there will be no demonstration of violence, though there's always danger that passions may get out of hand.

Gandhi's death will remove one of the great leaders of the masses through the ages. It will take away an influence which, despite its mistakes, has worked wonders for the social and moral uplift of his people.

I should say that his successor in political leadership will be his great friend and disciple, Jawaharlal Nehru. This 56 year old Brahmin (the highest Hindu caste) is one of the most brilliant of the Indian leaders and next to Gandhi is the most powerful political figure in the country. Nehru is popular and is highly respected by the British.

Another nationalist leader of whom we should hear much is Rajagopalachari. He is one of the moderates and is one of the best liked men in India, not only by his own people but by the British. He stands for compromise among the warring Indian factions and with the British government.

I am sure many British officials feel that the chances of a settlement of the Indian political crisis will be better with the removal of (Continued on page two)

day attacked five points in Roma-
nia.

The targets were the railway
and an aircraft plant at Brasov. 75
miles north of Bucharest. Pitești 60
miles northwest of that capital.
Carlova 95 miles to the east. Campina

The British-based U. S. Libera-
tors did all their bombing in the

overcast so thick the German ground
troops did not even bother to
shoot at some of the attacks. The

On Dover cliffs it was impossible
to stand against the bitter wind and
driving rain. The temperature also
dropped.

Meanwhile the Allied expedi-
tionary air force announced that
railway yards at Hazenbrouck and
the junction at Motteville, both in
northern France, were attacked by
RAF Mitchels and Postons and
Typhoon fighter-bombers yesterday
along with Ombra.

Some returning crewmen on the

Senate Finance Committee Monday.

Chairman George (D-Ga) said he and other Democrats on the committee were disposed to go along with the house version of the bill, which is expected to relieve 30,000,000 taxpayers of the irksome job of making out a complicated federal return.

"I don't think the exemptions that have been placed in the measure are equitable in all cases, but they represent the best that can be done in order to get simplification," George said.

Republicans also predicted swift approval.

The measure would scrap the two-year old "victory" tax, setting new normal and surtax rates that would keep payments at about their present level.

It would make the payroll withholding levy the total tax collection for salary earners up to \$5,000 yearly, effective next January. Of the 20,000,000 still required to file returns, about half could use a simplified table which would compute their tax quickly.

The simplified plan sets up a new system of normal and surtaxes which may be computed as follows:

Normal—3 per cent of income after one exemption of \$500 and a deduction of 10 per cent of income, the 10 per cent being in lieu of the usual deduction for contributions to religious, educational and charitable causes, for other taxes and interest paid. The latter deduction cannot exceed \$500.

Thus a person making \$3,500, regardless of the number of dependents would subtract \$500, and \$350 from \$3,500; and his normal tax would be 3 per cent of \$2,650, or \$79.50.

Surtaxes—computed by a graduated table on taxable income arrived at by making exemptions of \$500 for the taxpayer and \$500 for each dependent, and a 10 per cent of income deduction in lieu of contributions, other taxes and interest paid.

Thus the man making \$3,500, assuming he is married and has one child, would have exemptions totaling \$1,500, and a flat deduction of \$350. By subtracting \$1,500 and \$350 from \$3,500 the remaining \$1,650 would come within the first bracket surtax of the table below, and his surtax would be 20 per cent of \$1,650 or \$330. The total of his normal and surtax (\$79.50 plus \$330) would be \$409.50.

The new surtax rates start at 20 per cent, and progress upward in accordance with increased brackets of income.

Asks More Funds For Lend-Lease

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked Congress today to appropriate \$3,450,570,000 to carry forward the lend-lease program for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945.

He also requested that any unexpended balances of previous lend-lease appropriations be made available, which would make the aggregate for the new year \$7,168,893,000.

The President's recommendations were forwarded a few hours after Senator Ellender (D-La.) had urged that the United States fix now a policy on final lend-lease settlements.

"Unless we do," Ellender said, "we may find ourselves owing our allies at the end of the war instead of their owing us."

Montgomery-Ward Ruling Delayed

Chicago, May 6.—(AP)—Federal Judge William H. Hilly today extended his order restraining officials of Montgomery Ward and Company from interfering with government control of the huge mail order firm's Chicago plants.

The judge said he would rule at 10 a. m. Wednesday on the company's motion to dissolve the restraining order and the government's plea to have it replaced by a temporary injunction.

Raleigh, May 6.—(AP)—Attorney General Harry McMillan said today that under state election laws persons who reach their 21st birthday before the November elections may vote in both the primary May 27 and in the general elections.

McMillan said he would issue shortly a digest of opinions on state election laws.

New RAF Ace.
London, May 6.—(AP)—Wing Commander J. E. (Johnny) Johnson downed his 28th Nazi plane over France yesterday, becoming the leading ace among RAF pilots still flying.

Wing Commanders J. R. D. Braham and J. H. Lacey are tied for second place, with 27 planes each.

Flight Lt. George Buerling, Canadian, also destroyed 31 planes, recently was transferred from the RAF to the RGAF and now is in Canada on flying training duty.

Dog Saves Several Lives.
Somerville, Mass., May 6.—(AP)—A mongrel dog, "Bud," barked a warning today which possibly saved the lives of several persons who fled from their burning home, and then the canine collapsed and died of smoke inhalation.

CIO-AFL Deal.
Philadelphia, May 6.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor is still ready to welcome home John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers but not on his terms.

More than a year after he applied for readmission, Lewis and the federation leadership appeared to be deadlocked as tight as ever over the question of jurisdictional lines.

Escaped Convicts Caught.
Washington, May 6.—(AP)—Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters here announced the arrest early today at Washington, N. C., of three escaped Virginia convicts who allegedly kidnapped and robbed a farmer in their flight.

All three are negroes. One of them was wounded critically when he attempted to resist arrest.
