Soviets Renew Assaults On Besieged Sevastopol

Germans Report New Russian Drive To Wipe Out Nazi-Ro- manian Garrison; Red Bombers Lash At Nazi Escape Ves- sels And Harbor In- stallations

London, May 8.—(AP)—Soviet bombers and fighters lashed at Sevastopol in intense week-end assaults, Moscow announced today, and Axis broadcasts asserted that "extraordinarily powerful" Red army forces were assaulting the beleaguered Crimean port in an effort to overwhelm the German-Romanian garrison.

The Russians were silent about land operations at Sevastopol, but Moscow customarily refrains from preliminary announcements when the Red army launches major drives. The German high command, hinting that the Russians had cracked Axis lines, spoke of a "fluctuating battle" around the fortress.

Today's German communiqué said the Soviets attacked with strong forces after heavy artillery fire and succeeded in effecting a "salient" in the southern sector of the Sevastopol battle area. Attacks on the northern sector were repulsed, it added.

In Romania, the Germans said, Nazi troops captured a hill position east of the Siret river and the Red army failed in a prolonged attempt to break through between the Prut and Moldavia rivers.

A Soviet communiqué said that Russian warplanes, swooping on Sevastopol from dawn to dusk, inflicted heavy losses on German and Romanian troops, blew up ammunition dumps, wrecked artillery batteries and damaged several ships.

The Axis garrison, estimated at 25,000 men, has been holding out in Sevastopol since mid-April under fire from Soviet siege guns commanding the heights overlooking the city. The Soviet Black Sea fleet and air arm have reported sinking scores of escape vessels trying to reach Romania.

A German military analyst, commenting on the reported land assault, said that "evidently the Soviet high command is staking everything on annihilating the Sevastopol garrison with one smashing blow in order to release the divisions engaged for other sectors of a summer offensive."

Ground and Naval Action In Italy

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 8.—(AP)—Strong German patrols stabbed through Allied advance positions in the upper Garigliano valley of the main Fifth army front Saturday night, but were driven off two hours later after being heavily shelled, headquarters announced today.

The action took place about three miles south of Sant' Andrea, which is about eight miles southeast of Cassino, where, headquarters said, German harassing fire had increased and Nazi transport movements were heard west and south of the ruined town during the night.

Fierce artillery fire took place in the lower Garigliano valley and an American patrol clashed with German patrols. The Anzio beachhead front was reported "extremely quiet" except for heavy enemy shelling in the vicinity of Carano in the center of the beachhead.

German bombers near the beachhead were bombed by American destroyers Saturday night with "good results" and British destroyers obtained similar results in shelling German traffic on an Albanian coastal road south of Valona on the night of May 2.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Even the thunder of Allied bombs on invasion-tense Europe can't drown out the news from India that with Mahatma Gandhi's release from internment the Indian leaders are hoping to bring him together with the British viceroy in an effort to heal the dangerous political crisis which has gripped the country for two years.

A solution of the Indian problem, which is the outgrowth of the nationalist fight for independence from England, would represent one of the major victories of the war of this generation, for that matter. Upon a settlement of this bloody quarrel depends the degree of willing support the Indians will give the Allies in the final all-out drive on Japan. Upon it, too, may hinge the post-war attitude of this vast sub-continent of 400,000,000 people and its neighbors towards the western world. That is to say, the old question of east versus west is deeply involved.

AGREE TO CUT IN DEBT LIMIT

Committee Approves Measure Placing Limit at 240 Billion

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—The House Ways and Means committee approved today a bill boosting the public debt ceiling from 210 billion dollars to 240 billion dollars after the administration, confronted by vigorous Republican opposition, receded from an original request for a 260 billion dollar limit.

Daniel W. Bell, under secretary of the treasury, told the House Ways and Means committee "it would be all right with us" to make the cut back, with the understanding that the administration will make a request for a still higher ceiling early next year.

The administration originally asked that the limit be boosted from 210 billion dollars to 260 billion dollars on an assumption the debt would reach \$258,000,000,000 by June 30, 1945.

However, when Republican members of the committee insisted on a cut back and Representative Dewey (R-N.Y.) asked Bell if a limit of 240 billion dollars wouldn't be sufficient until next March, when the new congress is in session, the treasury official replied "we would be perfectly willing to do that."

Before the hearing opened, Knutson (R-Minn.) said he and some other minority members would seek an intermediate figure. "On every side we see waste and extravagance that run into hundreds of millions if not into billions of dollars," Knutson declared.

He said the public debt still was some \$19,000,000,000 under the present limit, but Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) said the limitation would (Continued on Page Four)

Japs Make Progress In Drive Against Chinese

Advance To Within Six Miles Of Gate- way To Heart To China

Chungking, May 8.—(AP)—Missings over the military situation in northwestern Honan province grew more pronounced today as Chinese field dispatches declared that Japanese troops have advanced another three and one-half miles toward Loyang and now are only six miles south of the ancient city, gateway for a possible thrust into the very heart of China.

Fierce fighting was reported in all sectors of the Honan front, and it was generally admitted here that the situation is growing serious and that the Chinese can no longer follow their usual strategy of trading space for time without facing possible dire consequences.

The Japanese were reported making rapid progress to clear the important north-south Peiping-Hankow railway and field dispatches said they had narrowed to 14 miles the stretch of line held by the Chinese. A spearhead of the enemy column driving southward down the railway from Chungking was reported to have captured Siping while another moving up from the south was reported at Chumatin.

American Bombers Smash At Berlin Again Today

More Than 2,000 Air- craft Pour Destruction On Berlin And Brunswick; Fliers Report Heavy Nazi Resistance; Italy- Based Bombers Con- tinue Raids On Ro- mania

London, May 8.—(AP)—Nearly 2,000 U. S. bombers and fighters blasted the Berlin and Brunswick areas today, with a great fleet of Flying Fortresses pounding for the second straight day on Berlin—the battered capital that the Germans now called "condemned to death."

Another armada composed entirely of Liberators hammered Brunswick 125 west of Berlin.

The powerful force—almost equal to that pounding Berlin by daylight Sunday—followed night assaults from west and south upon France, Germany, and the Romanian capital of Bucharest.

The Liberators and Fortresses today numbered close to 1,000, with about as many escorting Lightnings, Thunderbolts, and Mustangs.

The fortresses dropped perhaps 2,000 tons of explosives on Berlin today.

Bucharest was hit last night for the third time in 24 hours in operations marking the seventh day-night coordinated operation from Britain and the Mediterranean since Thursday night against Germany, France, and the Balkans. Six of those consecutive Mediterranean blows fell on Romania.

After the big fellows carried out what the German communiqué called "terror attacks" on Bucharest and Berlin, approximately 200 Ninth air force Mustangs struck today at military objectives in northern France and a railroad bridge on the outskirts of Rouen.

Against the Liberators bombing Brunswick, returning German said, and some German fighters at least as 150 Messerschmitts engaged in battle at one time. The Germans attacked in waves for half an hour.

American fliers said it was the first German fighter defense in strength since the April 29 raid on Berlin. A heavy overcast forested the clouds. Flak was described as light.

At least three crewmen told of seeing German fighters ram or collide with American bombers in the Brunswick fight.

"There were fighters and bombers colliding all over the sky," said Lt. L. Houston, 488 South American Squadron, 488 South American Squadron, 488 South American Squadron. "My ship flew through the wreckage of a couple of them."

"One Focke-Phul came in so close to us that I figured he was out of control and going to ram us. I nosed down and he did too. Then he nosed up at the same time as I did. I don't know how we missed each other."

Follows Face Grave Decisions Following Landing of Allies

CRISIS FOR BOTH SIDES To Come Within Six Or Eight Days After

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—German strategy makers are expected here to face their most fateful hour of decision about a week—perhaps a day or so either way—from the time a full-scaled Allied invasion hits western Europe.

Their choice, as authorities here see it, will be that of gambling for real victory by committing all they have to an effort to throw the invaders into the sea, or attempting to stabilize surrounding lines for a stalemate.

Despite the difficulties of amphibious attack, the chances for accomplishing the actual landings and establishing the beachheads at reasonable cost are considered good.

Frenchmen Sink German Vessel

London, May 8.—(AP)—Light coastal forces manned by French crews battled a strongly-escorted German convoy in the English channel early today and probably sank a supply ship and a trawler, the Admiralty announced.

Allied vessels damaged other enemy boats in the close-range battle, the communiqué said, and returned to harbor with only superficial damage.

Motorist Killed Near Rocky Mount

Rocky Mount, May 8.—(AP)—One person was killed instantly and five others injured about 3:15 this morning when an automobile struck a truck and trailer with 20,000 pounds of cotton seed meal on U. S. highway 301 just north of Rocky Mount, state highway patrolmen reported.

Buck Percy Bell of this city, driver of the car, was instantly killed. The five other occupants of the Bell car were taken to local hospitals, the report said.

Investigating patrolmen said the truck exploded with the impact and was completely burned for an estimated loss of \$3,500, in spite of the efforts of the local fire department during a 3-hour battle with the blaze.

self. Under house rules no member can talk more than one hour on any legislative proposition. But the senate has no such rule and permits endless debate which can be stopped only by cloture.

Cloture can be imposed only by a two-thirds vote for the anti-poll tax bill, probably not even a majority—much less two thirds—of whom would vote for cloture. A majority voted against cloture in 1941.

There are two reasons for that: Some day other senators might gang up and impose cloture on them; or, they think it democratic to permit endless debate.

Only the optimists think the bill has a chance. Southern senators have promised to use the filibuster—short for non-stop oratory—to talk it to death. They did it in 1941 when the house had passed a similar bill.

Possibly the majority of senators would vote for the bill if they ever had a chance to vote on the bill itself.

Sheffield, Eng., May 8.—(AP)—First Lord of the Admiralty, A. V. Alexander said yesterday that the United States, Britain and the rest of the British empire turned out 127,000 planes in 1943—or 141-2 planes every hour.

He declared that collectively they produced nine army guns, nearly 106 rounds of army gun ammunition and nearly 3,000,000 rounds of small

arms ammunition every 60 minutes.

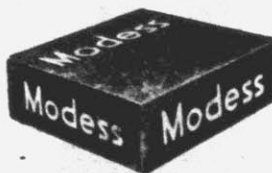

We smile at the verdict people of-
ten pass on their contemporaries.
When Nathaniel Hawthorne began
to rise to a place of some distinc-
tion in the world of letters, the
elect ladies of Salem, Massachu-
setts, smiled over their tea cups and
said: "Who ever heard of the
Hawthornes? Thomas Carlyle, af-
ter he had become famous through-
out the English-speaking world for
his writings, went back to his home
town and wandered about the
streets. Only one man spoke to him
and shook hands with him and said
he was proud to meet him. The rest
remembered that Tom Carlyle was
the son of a stone mason and snort-
ed in contempt at his growing fame.
When Jesus went back to preach in
the synagogue in His home town,
Nazareth, the people listened to
Him in a spirit of bitter suspicion,
and when He had finished His ser-
mon they tried to cast Him over a
precipice.

Most of the world's great musical
masterpieces were received with the
utmost hostility when first played.
Bach was dead for over a hundred
years before the world realized the
full measure of his greatness. Little
musicians have often been the rage,
while the great masters languished
in obscurity. Poets and novelists
destined to be outstanding in the
history of literature have often been
compelled to sell their works for a
piece of stale bread.

True greatness is generally drab
looking when viewed at close range.
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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—Although the source
must remain anonymous, I can as-
sure you that there is none better in
Washington for this: There isn't
the remotest possibility of general
relief soon from the gasoline and
fuel oil rationing program.

It is a very secret that the army
and navy are building up tremendous
reserves of fuel for the engines of war.
If you know your army and navy in
wartime, it's a natural conclusion that
these reserves will continue to be greater
than ever will be needed. Military
forces can operate on a narrow
margin of reserves. They must have
enough for any emergency, whether
it's food, arms and ammunition,
gasoline or men.

The only way to reach those goals
is to over-buy and over-draft. To
fail to meet minimum requirements
on any front could be and probably
would be fatal.

That's why you hear stories that
the military forces are dumping
certain articles on the civilian mar-
ket. In most instances, these are
surplus articles which can no
longer be held in the reserve stocks.
That's why you hear the storage
tanks along the seaboard are filled
to overflowing with gasoline and oil.
That may very well be true.

It is true, though barely men-
tioned, that we haven't yet been able
to build our oil tanker strength to
the point where fuel can be moved
as fast as we would like. Merely be-
cause reserves pile up at the ports
or in nearby storage tanks doesn't
mean that the day of plenty in gaso-
line and oil is approaching.

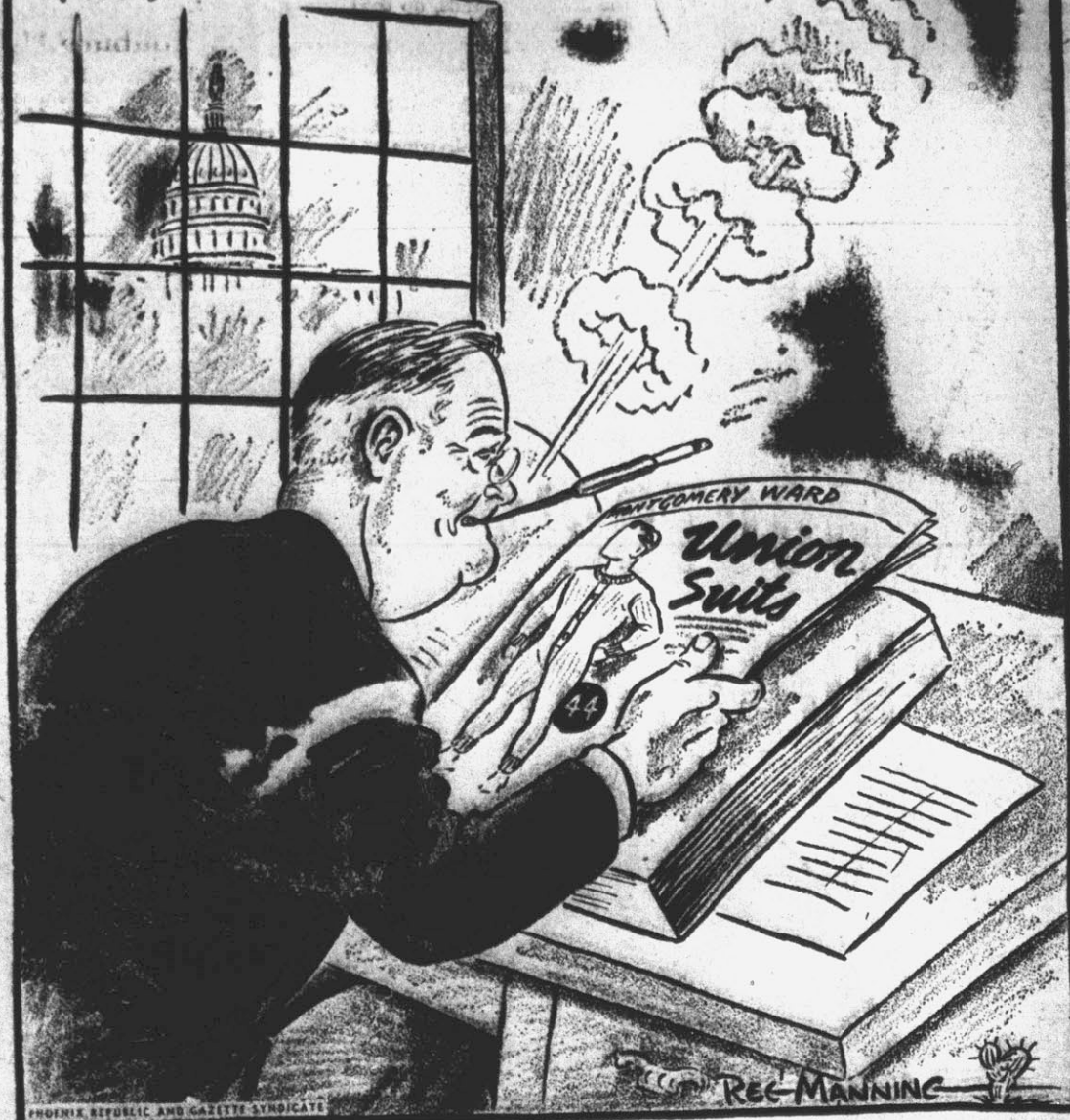
The greatest chance for relief now
lies in whipping out the black mar-
ket. Experts here estimated that 2-
3,000,000 gallons of gasoline daily are
being moved through black markets.
If this could be stopped or material-
ly reduced, it would mean relief for
essential drivers OPA has recog-
nized the fact that many B-card
holders don't get enough gasoline
to do their essential driving. If any
"extra" gas can be found, it will go
to them first.

Some progress has been made in
curtailing the black marketers,
but not much. Steps are being taken
to eliminate the counterfeiting
or ration coupons. Enforcement au-
thorities are working on black mar-
ket rings all over the country. All
this helps, not just as in Prohibi-
tion, no great strides can be made
without the complete cooperation of
the public.

lief to holders of A cards. However,
the greatest latitude possible will
be given them in using their small
quotas as they see fit. There will be
no ban on pleasure driving this
summer as there was last, and if
a card holder wish to "save up" for
a little recreational junket, they are
welcome to do so.

Destroyer Set Afire By Airmen

Cairo, May 8.—(AP)—Middle East
aircraft set fire to a destroyer in
the eastern Mediterranean and
worked over enemy installations on
Crete and other islands and south-
ern Greece, an Allied communique
said today.

The Castell and Meleme airfields
on Crete were bombed. A fuel dump
on Paros was exploded and smoke
curled 2,000 feet high. Installations
on Kythira and southern Greece
were attacked but not identified.
Two Allied planes were lost.

Lend-Lease Passes Senate

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—The
Senate passed today legislation ex-
tending the \$22,500,000,000 lend-
lease program for another year af-
ter hearing proposals that the United
States seek permanent title to
Caribbean air bases leased from
Britain in the 50-destroyer deal of
1940.

The vote was 63 to 1, with Senator
Langer (R-ND) casting the only
dissenting vote.

Arrives in Stockholm

Stockholm, May 8.—(AP)—Stan-
ton Grifflis, representative of the U.
S. Foreign Economic Administration,
arrived in Stockholm today. Grifflis
said he had nothing to say about
the lend-lease program, but was specu-
lating that the ship was connected with
Allied efforts to have Sweden halt
the shipment of ball-bearings to
Germany.

home of Senator Buck, who was
chosen chairman of the delegation.

Sign Agreement

London, May 8.—(AP)—The Rus-
sian and Czech governments have
signed an agreement for the admin-
istration of areas of Czechoslovakia
liberated by the Red army, commu-
niqués issued simultaneously in
London and Moscow announced to-
day.

The Red army reached the Czech
border in the Carpathians several
weeks ago.

as well as for Gen. Dwight D. Eisen-
hower's forces, is expected in about
six or eight days when the Germans
have had time to assess the power
and main striking position of the
Allies.

Should the Nazis believe it pos-
sible to smash the beachhead or
beachheads completely they may
be expected to use all their strength
to do it.

London dispatches apparently
based on authoritative information
place enemy reserve strength be-
hind the western coast at 54 to 67
divisions. These should be able to
move swiftly with or without rail-
roads, since the Germans have made
provision against aerial destruction
of their rail centers.

The same considerations that ap-
ply to the ultimate German use of
land forces apply as well to their
air fleet. Despite the recent poor
showing of the Luftwaffe against
the Allied aerial offensive, authori-
ties here believe it still is capable
of putting up a terrific fight.

The best-backed opinion is that
the Nazis are hoarding fighter
plane strength against two alterna-
tives. If they see a chance for na-
tional liberation they will throw it
into action without restraint; otherwise
they may seek to preserve it as long
as possible as a threat, using the
"fleet in being" strategy that the
Japanese now apply to their navy.

One crewman said a Messer-
schmitt, its tail shot off, went down
out of control "then nosed up" hit-
ting a bomber-head-on.

Today's daylight operations
pressed the tremendous pre-inva-
sion air offensive into its 24th con-
secutive day and capped a 24-hour
period in which probably 6,000 Al-
lied planes, thundering from bases
in Britain and Italy, rained some
thing like 10,000 tons of explosives
on installations with which Hitler

hoped to combat the Allies' western
invasion and stem the Russian drive
into the Balkans.

The main blow of yesterday's
great daylight raids, perhaps the
heaviest two-day assault thus far,
was a terrific American raid on
Berlin.

The RAF's home based fleet last
night hit Remes air field north of
Nantes and other targets in Nantes,
Tours, Salbris, 35 miles south of Or-
leans, and military installations on
the Normandy coast as well as the
great Nazi chemical center, Lever-
kusen, just north of Cologne. Nine
planes were lost in the RAF night
operations, which included the
sowing of mines in enemy waters.

Remes, in Brittany about 40 miles
inland from the channel coast, is
an important rail center through
which supplies are routed for sub-
marines and vessels in French At-
lantic ports. Blows at an ammu-
nition dump there and at Salbris last
night were in line with the new
campaign begun recently in an ob-
vious effort to destroy as much of
Germany's anti-invasion firepower
as possible before the Allied inva-
sion forces sweep across the contin-
ent.

which the Indians would unite with
the British in an all-out war effort.
Disputed political claims could be
shelved with the understanding
that this was without prejudice to
their being raised later.

Of course the first requisite is a
willingness by all hands to com-
promise. The next and most difficult
step would be to get the Hindus and
the Moslems to call a truce. Such a
reconciliation lies in the hands of
the All-India congress which is
made up largely of Hindus although
it claims to be non-sectarian, and
Mahomed Ali Jinnah, brilliant leader
of the All-India Moslem League.

It is a delicate matter, for not on-
ly is there the age-old religious dif-
ference, but the Moslems are out-
numbered by the Hindus three to
one and distrust them politically.
Still, many observers feel that

Gandhi and Jinnah might be able
to find common ground.

In any event, Field-Marshal Lord
Wavell, the new viceroy, will have a
chance to immortalize his already
famous name if he can start the
wheels of peace turning. This is one
of the great moments of one epoch-
al time.

The Chinese were believed in con-
trol of the railway for a distance of
40 or 50 miles below that point.

Chenghsien is about 65 miles east
of Loyang and is the base from
which the Japanese have been
pressing their drive westward along

the Lunghai railway toward that
city. Chinese dispatches said most
of Loyang's garrison had been evi-
cuated.

Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault's
Chinese-American wing again
struck at invader columns south-
east of Loyang in direct support of
Chinese. A communique said
strafing attacks on motor con-
centrations and troops last Saturday
knocked out about 125 vehicles and
killed some 250 Japanese.

Other U. S. 14th air force planes
ranged wide over French Indo-Chi-
na, wrecking 15 sampans and a
many larger boats and knocking out
about 100 railroad cars, the bullet-
in said.

The Chinese high command de-
clared successful counterattacks had
been made against Japanese strik-
ing westward from northern Anhui
province in the general direc-
tion of the Peiping-Hankow rail-
way.

West of the railway itself the
Japanese were reported to have
continued attempts to seek their
battle with the Chinese, but with-
out success.

Speculation on Japanese objec-
tives ranged from the possibility of
an ambitious drive aimed at
knocking China out of the war to
the theory that this offensive may
be primarily intended to give bat-
tle training to Japanese troops des-
tined for action outside China.

Pensive ran the mile and a quarter in 2:04 1/2 on a track that was good, but not fast, and his time would have been better had not the hard riding George Woolf and Eddie Arcaro caught him in the jam as the trio neared the finish.

As Woolf, riding Broadcloth, which finished second, sought to break off the oncoming Pensive by pulling over to Arcaro on Str Up, McCreary quickly shot to the rail and finished with such a tremendous burst of speed that neither Arcaro nor Woolf knew what was happening.

Pensive, which was 13th at the quarter, won by four and a half lengths with Broadcloth finishing a length and a half ahead of Str Up. Shut Up, one of a group of seven field horses, was a head back in fourth place.

The combination of Arcaro and Str Up had the crowd, variously estimated at 60,000 to 70,000, in such a lather that it went to the post a 7-5 favorite. Pensive paid \$16.20 for a \$2 winning ticket and earned a check of \$64,675, a new record for derby winners for owner Wright. The old mark was held by Mrs. Payne Whitney's Shut Out which earned \$64,226 for the 1942 triumph.

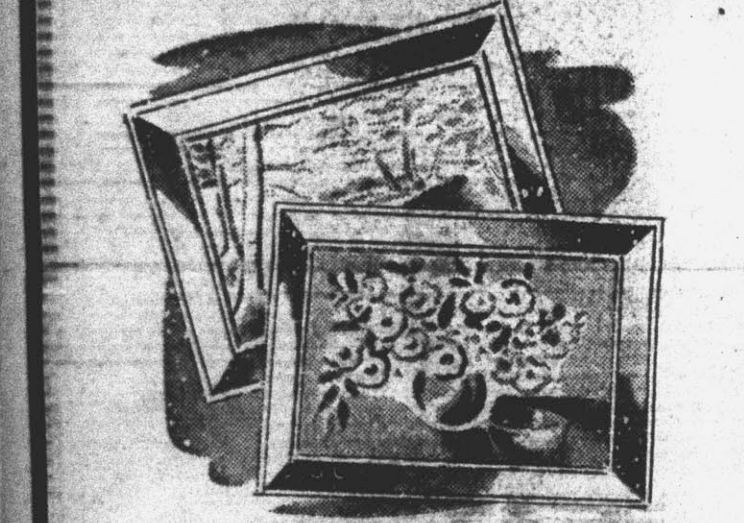
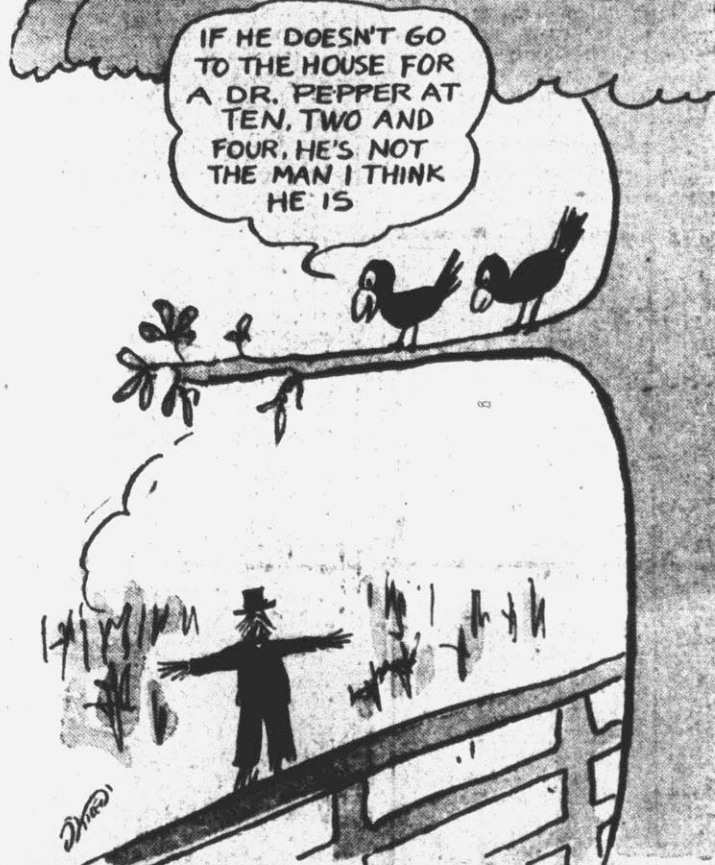
