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Fail Of Sevastopol Frees Red For New Offensives

Important Black Sea Fortress-Port Recaptured By Russians After 25-Day Siege; Engineers Begin Repairing Port Facilities; Axis Suffers Staggering Losses

Moscow, May 10.—(AP)—While the smoke of battle still lay over captured Sevastopol, squads of Soviet engineers entered the city today and tackled the task of repairing the wrecked port, front line dispatches said.

A Red Star correspondent who entered the city with the Russian troops said it was "unbelievably difficult to advance a single step" in the face of "walls and fences of fire" which the Germans and Romanians threw up in the last days of the siege.

The correspondent said the enemy had 16 machineguns for every 50 soldiers in the front lines. Beginning yesterday morning Russian artillery supported by Stormovik bombers bombarded German lines "until the mountains shook," cascading down rocks that caused "more damage than our shells."

The writer gave credit for entry into the city to the Soviet guards under Gen. G. F. Zakaryov and storm units under Gen. Y. C. Kreitzer.

He said he walked through streets littered with dead and dying and saw blasted buildings filled with corpses of enemy killed in the past few days. He declared he saw German storm troop units training machineguns on front line fighters and shooting those who retreated.

There was no wild celebration in Moscow over the capture of Sevastopol because many of the city's workers were asleep when the news was announced at 1 a. m.

The fall of the Crimean fortress after a 24-day siege was announced by Premier Marshal Stalin in an order of the day which indicated one of the two original besieging Soviet armies may already have rushed to the main front for a new Russian westward offensive.

Conspicuously absent from a list of 56 commander cited by Stalin for distinction in the drive which completely cleared the last of the 10,000-square-mile Crimean peninsula was the name of Gen. Andrei I. Yermenko, whose independent maritime army struck 150 miles westward (Continued on page six)

Abolition Of FSA Is Recommended

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—Abolition of the Farm Security Administration was recommended by a special House committee today in a report which accused the agency of controlling its clients "to the extent of telling the borrower how to raise his children" and "how to plan his home life."

The FSA, the committee said, "has not been wisely administered and has been used as an experiment station of un-American ideas and economic and social theories of little or questionable value."

The committee, headed by Rep. Cooley (D-N.C.), emphasized that its criticism applied to the administration of Rexford Guy Tugwell and C. I. Baldwin. It commended the recently appointed administrator Frank Hancock for having made "substantial and worthwhile changes in both policies and personnel."

Today On The Home Front

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—Housewives apparently haven't felt any urge because of meat rationing to buy out the butcher shops.

The rationing except on beef steaks and roasts, went into effect a week ago.

Now, after reports from all its regional offices around the country, the War Food Administration says there has been no great buying rush.

One reason given: Before rationing, meat points generally had been low enough to allow most families sufficient meat.

But it seems likely that more meat will be consumed now than before it was rationed. Able to get unrationed meat as they want it, housewives can spread red points on the rationed kind.

OFA says the total anticipated supply of meat for civilians in May is 25 per cent greater than a year ago.

BAILEY FLAYS LABOR FRONT

Scores 'Left Wing' Drive To Renominate Roosevelt

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—Senator Bailey (D-NC) attributed to what he termed "left wing" labor today an organized drive to renominate President Roosevelt for a fourth term.

Leading off the second day of Senate debate on an anti-poll tax bill, which he said was sponsored by the CIO Political Action Committee, Bailey declared:

"We have in this country a well-organized, well-financed movement by the leftist wing of American labor to capture the Democratic party by infiltration."

"They propose to nominate the President for a fourth term. And they are noisy about it."

"They propose to defeat any senator or any member of the House who does not bow down to their policy of coercing the working men of America."

"Their policy is to say to a worker—if you don't pay (initiation fees and dues) you don't work."

"Asserting southern states 'do not coerce men into paying the poll tax,' Bailey declared:

"It is indefensible, shameless hypocrisy for a labor union, a political (Continued on Page Four)

Government Relinquishes Control Of Montgomery Ward

Chicago, May 10.—(AP)—Federal Judge William H. Holly today dropped injunction litigation stemming from government seizure of Montgomery Ward and Company Chicago properties without ruling on legality of the federal action in taking possession.

The court told company and government counsel that he "considered the case dismissed" but would rule Friday on whether it should be recorded as dismissed with or without prejudice.

Judge Holly said he would not rule on legality of the seizure because "events have transpired which apparently have taken the case out of my hands."

The company properties are back in the hands of its management, Judge Holly said, and it is a well-established fact that federal courts are not required to rule "on a moot question."

He said there was now "nothing before me," events having "transpired" while he was considering the petition of the government for a temporary injunction to prohibit Ward officials from interfering with government operation of the plant.

Chicago, May 10.—(AP)—Sewell L. Avery resumed control of Montgomery Ward and Company today, 13 days after two soldiers carried him from his office of board chairman of the huge mail order house which the government had seized.

Avery's return to office, from which he had been barred by government order, followed an order by Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones last night, ending federal possession. (Continued on page four)

Men Over 29 May Not Be Drafted

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—Indefinite draft deferment of all men over 29 in essential occupations, regardless of whether they are "necessary men" by present standards, was understood today to be one of the provisions of a new selective service policy to be made public tomorrow.

While officials refused to confirm this report, indications that the pool of men under 30 is sufficient to meet calls for several months gave weight to prospects of wide liberalization regarding older men.

Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey has predicted that calls can be met until early fall with men 18 through 25. Those 26 through 29 will be inducted next with deferments granted only to those in a necessary job in essential work.

Under present regulations, this same yardstick is being applied to men over 29.

The new policy would provide blanket deferment of men in this group, no matter what their job so long as it is in an essential occupation.

Memorial Day Observed Here

Confederate Memorial Day was observed in Greenville at noon today on the court house square at the Confederate monument.

The feature of the occasion was a group of former Greenville High School boys, now in the army, standing at the base of the monument, acting as a color guard for the national standard and the Confederate flag. They were Lieutenants James and Leonard Briley, Charles O'H. Horne, Jr., and Cpl. Bob Kittrell.

The Greenville High School Band under the direction of H. A. McDougle and the Glee Club, under the direction of Miss Olga Shindler, furnished music for the ceremonies.

The National Anthem, "America," "America the Beautiful," "Dixie," and a group of old southern tunes were rendered. Rev. Robert Bradshaw delivered the invocation, and J. H. Rose presided over the ceremonies.

The program ended with the playing of "Taps" while the audience stood in reverential silence thinking of the sacrifices of the past, the present, and those to come.

Germans Strive To Plug Invasion Defense Gaps

Allied Aerial Offensive Points To Climax In Preparation For "D-Day"; Hitler Mustering Waning Air Power

London, May 10.—The Germans were reported striving busily today to plug their invasion defense gaps in the all-consuming blitzkrieg which led quickly to Dunkerque and the collapse of France.

This war in the west had swung in a full cycle, reversing the position of May 10, 1940, when the Germans, supreme in the air and on the ground, sent their legions crashing into Belgium and the Netherlands in the all-consuming blitzkrieg which led quickly to Dunkerque and the collapse of France.

With conclusive defeat in the air staring him in the face, Adolf Hitler has designated 29-year-old Maj. Gen. Oberst Pelz to command German air forces in the west and ordered him to assemble a force to combat the impending Allied invasion, said reliable sources from underground Europe.

Pelz, looked upon as an air genius and a prime favorite of Hitler, was given the task of keeping together a force to strike back at the invasion fleets—no matter what damage the homeland suffers in the meantime.

This reorganization, a part of the desperate German effort to strengthen the air force despite great losses of production through Allied bombing, included the division of the western air force into three "corps," two composed completely of fighters and one of bombers.

Simply could be simplified by the creation of separate fighter and bomber corps in which some planes may be "cannibalized" to keep some of the force in the air. Previously an air corps consisted of mixed forces of bombers, fighters, transports and reconnaissance craft.

German plane manufacture was reported cut to four or five types of fighters and bombers.

No matter what the Germans do, even the most conservative American and British air leaders are agreed the Allies can win full control of the air within seven to 10 days after the invasion starts.

In addition to the enormous acceleration in Allied attacks—in the first 10 days of this month there has been almost as much activity as in the two previous months—there were at least three new phases noted:

These were (1) The RAF's new attacks against German ammunition dumps and other critical concentrations, (2) the two-pronged tactical bombing of both railroad junctions and airfields, and (3) the speeded up drive against railroads and bridges.

The campaign against continental air fields was aimed not only at combat planes but against aerial troop transport, for which the Germans have been famous. It was considered that bombardment of the fields had damaged the Nazis' chances for whisking reinforcements by air to critical points.

It seemed reasonable to presume the Allied high command was repeating the process of preparation used in North Africa, where the big push was not started until the Germans' reinforcement and supply lines were wrecked or in a position where they could be wrecked shortly.

This condition, still uncrystallized, seemed to be one of the key factors in determination of the exact day for invasion.

Germany's defensive position was emphasized last night by Lt. Gen. Kurt Dietmar, one of the Berlin radio's leading military commentators, who declared:

"There is no doubt that Germany now lives in a state of siege. It is a state of siege that there is a great tension among the defenders of Europe." (Continued on Page Four)

Allies Continue Pursuit Of Nazis

More Towns Occupied As Germans Fall Back To New Mountain Positions In Italy

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 10.—(AP)—Still pursuing withdrawing German forces, Eighth army troops have thrust a wedge deep into enemy territory along Italy's mountainous backbone and at last report were driving directly toward the German base of Sulmona, it was announced today.

Front advances indicated there was little or no opposition, although the Germans were said to be carrying out extensive demolitions.

A communique announced Allied troops had entered the town of Palsena, on the little Aventino river 25 miles inland from the Adriatic and 11 miles southeast of Sulmona, and a subsequent announcement told of the occupation of the mountain villages of Fallascoso, seven miles northeast of Palsena and San Angelo, 12 miles southeast.

The Eighth army forces also seized high ground near the hamlet of Gamaera, two miles northwest of San Angelo on the road to Palsena.

The advances carried the Allied troops a minimum of nine miles beyond previously announced positions.

A full explanation of why the Germans pulled back was not yet available, but the move apparently was taken to shorten and strengthen their mountain lines.

The Germans, who have broadcast various propaganda reports of Allied preparations for a new offensive somewhere in Italy, appeared to be increasing their defenses. (Continued on page four)

New Air Blows On Jap-Held Islands

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, May 10.—(AP)—Southwest and central Pacific Headquarters announced today Allied blows against Japanese bases guarding the approaches to the Philippines and Truk.

In a communique today, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported Monday attacks on enemy airfields on that part of Dutch New Guinea nearest the Philippines. Only over 100 miles from the northwest coast was a Japanese air opposition encountered. The raiding Liberators shot down one and probably several others, of 11 interceptors but one of the big bombers was lost.

In a press release yesterday, Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, Pearl Harbor headquarters, announced a raid Monday, Caroline Islands time, on Ponape, 140 miles east of Truk. Seventh army air force Liberators and Mitchells had to contend only with moderate anti-aircraft fire.

MacArthur's communique, in a new summary of the successful Hollandia invasion, said Japanese dead total 871 and the prisoners 1873. These totals do not take into account the dead and prisoners at Aitape, 150 miles southeast of Hollandia. The last report of enemy casualties (dead, wounded and prisoners) at Aitape exceed 800.

Cease Work To Pray For Negro

New York, May 10.—(AP)—H. Innis, 60-year-old Negro businessman at the Thatcher Manufacturing Company plant here became critically ill and after two blood transfusions, given by factory employees, doctors decided to operate.

Innis was told that his chances of coming through were dubious. He smiled faintly, only asked that a prayer be said for his recovery. Word was relayed to the factory.

At 2 p. m., time of the operation, a whistle was blown at the Thatcher plant and all work ceased for five minutes. Employees standing by their machines bowed their heads in silent prayer.

Innis now is well on the road to recovery.

NEW SETBACK FOR CHINESE

China Makes Urgent Appeal For More Allied Aid

Chungking, May 10.—(AP)—Chinese forces have all but lost their grip on the north-south Peiping-Hankow railway in Honan province and the Chinese high command indicated today.

Two strong Japanese columns were reported less than 14 miles from a unit where they struck from the south from Chumien and entered the railway town of Sulping from the north. The invaders from Chumien were said to have gained several miles, appreciably narrowing the 14-mile gap.

The invaders pressing toward the ancient Honan province city of Loyang, however, were said to have been checked east of the Yi river. The nearest Japanese forces several days ago were reported only six miles from Loyang.

(A Tokyo broadcast said today that Japanese forces, squeezing through Hubei pass on the road to Loyang yesterday, captured two more towns.)

Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault's 14th U. S. air force continued to participate in the battle with telling results by straining enemy columns (Continued on Page Four)

To Meet To Study Plans For Peace

London, May 10.—(AP)—A three-power conference among the United States, Great Britain and Russia may be held in the near future in an effort to decide the framework of an international organization for the preservation of peace.

The date of the peace of meeting were not believed to have been set, but it was understood that the British government working quietly since the Tehran meetings and have already drafted a tentative organizational plan which has been approved in principle by the current dominions conference.

The greatest danger the Allies face in their war against Japan is that gallant but hard-hit China may be knocked out (for all practical purposes) before we can finish off Hitler and turn our full strength against the Marauders of the Orient.

Actually China's weakness isn't new but is a long standing malady which just recently has become acute again. This column has reported numerous times that our ally was in dire straits.

The fresh difficulty is the Japanese offensive in Honan province. This is surging westward along the great Yellow river (China's sorrow) and southward astride the Peiping-Hankow-Canton railway. It represents a real threat to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's remaining war resources, including such as the temporary bomb-term capital of Chungking.

Chiang's chief defense for years has been his ability to swap land-space for time, since he has lacked equipment for his armies. The enemy has attacked the great industrial areas, the ports and much of the agricultural country—such as the vast hinterland has been just too big for him to overrun.

American Heavy Bombers From England And Italy Take Up The Fight Today

Following RAF Night Assaults On Berlin and Nazi Targets In France

London, May 10.—(AP)—Fighting Fortresses and Liberators from Italy arched over the Alps and bombed the Messerschmitt factory at Wiener Neustadt in Austria today in the wake of what probably was the hardest night pounding yet given Adolf Hitler's channel defenses from British bases.

While the Allies in Britain threw a series of day and night armadas, probably totaling 2,000 planes, against the German defenses of Europe and smashed front-line airfields and railways and war-supporting industries with more than 3,000 tons of bombs, the 15th air force in Italy kept the heavy-bomber daylight offensive going through its 26th day.

Dispatches from Allied headquarters in Naples said night airfields as well as the aircraft factory at Wiener Neustadt were attacked, and Ankara broadcasts said Bucharest, the capital of Romania, also was bombed.

The Naples dispatches added that a Liberator formation dealt a subsidiary attack on Kain, a Yugoslavia rail center 30 miles northeast of Sibenik, but first reports that Vienna also was bombed apparently were in error.

Today's mission over Wiener Neustadt, it was said, was to knock out buildings undamaged in five previous raids.

A night fleet of approximately 750 British bombers carried their greatest load of the 26-day offensive in smashing at both Berlin and Paris and hitting at least 10 targets of the highest priority, including the Anney ballbearing works near the Italian frontier in France.

American Thunderbolts and Liberators, accompanied by fighters, streamed out of Britain, smashing rail yards and airfields in France, and Belgium, carrying the offensive into its 26th straight day. But up to mid-afternoon, there were no official reports of operations by United States "heavies" from Britain which had been over the continent steadily for the last 15 days.

The RAF lost seven aircraft in its night operations. Five bombers and three fighters were lost yesterday. (Continued on Page Six)

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington. — Opposition to a unified military command, with a single overall chief of staff for the Army, Navy and Air, will come in Congress from those Military and Naval Affairs committee members in both chambers who will be asked their opinions on those committees will be asked.

If we had a unified command, it wouldn't be reasonable to suppose that the separate committees for the Army and Navy would be continued. The alternative would be a single committee of Military Affairs in each chamber with subcommittees for Army, Navy and Air. In the Senate, Sen. Robert R. Reynolds' Military Affairs committee has 18 members; and Sen. David I. Walsh's Naval Affairs committee a like number—more than a third, in all, of the entire Senate. In the House, Rep. Andrew J. May's Military Affairs committee has 30 members; and Rep. Carl Vinson's Naval Affairs committee 10. Here, then, are 96 members of Congress who visualize their committee assignments being shaken up; and if the unified committees retained the same number of seats, half of them would see their seniority on those committees vanish.

Other opposition in Congress could conceivably come from administration supporters for a very important reason. President Roosevelt, whether he expresses himself or not, is a "Navy man." He was undersecretary of the Navy in World War I. His interests since boyhood have been with the sea and seafaring men. His collection of gadgets, relics and mementos in the White House and Hyde Park smack heavily of the sea. All his vacations have been taken on the sea or at the shore.

It may be assumed that if the Navy vigorously opposes unification any time soon, the President will string along with his favorite branch of the armed services as long as it doesn't jeopardize the war effort.

In spite of all this, I have found a surprising number in the House particularly who favor unification. It has come out of the lessons of this war, starting with Pearl Harbor. The report of Associate Justice Owen J. Roberts that Army and Navy commanders in Hawaii hadn't conferred for months and showed no evidence of cooperation.

Since that report, strict orders for the closest cooperation have been issued and for the first time they

have been obeyed.

The latest evidence of it came behind the closed doors of the House Appropriations committee going over the Navy's 1945 budget.

Specifically, it came out of the request of the Navy for \$226,000,000 principally for new and expanded air training bases. It was developed, principally by Rep. Jamie L. Whitfield (D-Miss.) that these new and expanded fields were sought at the same time the Army was abandoning training fields all over the country and that no effort of the two services to get together had been made.

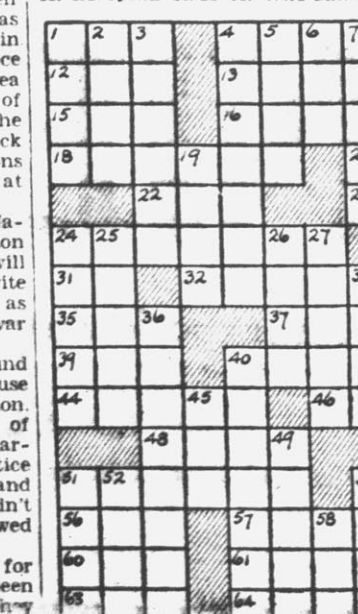

and keypoints, but this only partly balanced the odds against the ill-equipped Chinese who have yielded a large slice of the richest wheat growing area of China since the invaders began their offensive April 18.

An appeal to the Allies for quick help to alleviate the suffering of the Chinese army and people, who on July 7 enter the eighth year of war, was made today by the counselor of the executive Yang, Chang Piao-Hsun.

"If the Chinese soldiers haven't the necessary weapons they cannot win battles," he said in a statement.

In Honan, he declared, the Japanese have mobilized 50,000 to 60,000 of their best men and put into the field 300 tanks, several hundred armored cars and about 1,500 military trucks to move troops as needed while the Chinese have had to fight without enough heavy arms and most of the time have had to move afoot.

China realizes that Allied assistance is limited only by transport, he said, so "let's open the Burma road and before reopening it let's have more transport planes by which to get in more supplies. Where there's a will there's a way. At no time has China looked forward to getting Allied assistance as much as she does today."

on the main fifth army front south of Cassino. While their big guns provided a covering fire, German troops were heard falling trees and digging in on the west bank of a river. An enemy patrol was thrown back in the same area.

An Allied patrol with tank support raided an enemy-held house west of Cisterna on the Anzio beachhead, inflicting casualties. Headquarters said six enemy tanks attacked the raiders, but four hit were scored on the German vehicles and one was left afire.

Although bad visibility kept heavy bombers on the ground for the second day, British Wellingtons last night renewed attacks on the west coast ports of Genoa and Livorno. Raiders, Bostons, Thunderbolts, Warhawks and invaders hammered away at communications north of Rome. Eight Allied planes were lost. After the Wellington attack on Genoa, spread over seven hours, a big fire on the Colombo mole was visible for miles.

An announcement today said staff Sgt. James W. Wisler of Kokomo, Ind., a Liberator gunner, bagged two ME-109's in the heavy bomber foray over Romania May 6, when a total of 22 enemy planes were destroyed.

Lightning pilots credited with one ME-109 included Lt. Andrew Blakely, 429 North Crigler St., Charlotte, N. C.

Avery, however, asserted the president had made a "misstatement," and added that Ward's officials would bargain with any union chosen by the employees but would oppose any contract providing for any form of "closed shop." He also declared that "the government has given no satisfactory reason for its action" for the "abrupt return of

the Montgomery Ward property to its rightful owners."

CONFESSES TO TRUNK MURDER

Killed Wife And Had Body Shipped To Los Angeles

Crystal City, Texas, May 10—(AP)—A confession that he killed his wife, Mrs. Louis Villegos, by hitting her in the back of the head with his fist and shipped her body in a trunk from Chicago to Los Angeles has been signed here by Soya Villegos, 26, Deputy Sheriff Garrett Barnes said last night.

Barnes quoted Villegos as saying that Villegos did not know the woman was dead until he attempted to revive her.

At Villegos struck Mrs. Villegos during an argument, following a visit to a Chicago tavern, where the two had had some drinks.

That Villegos put the body into a trunk the next day, left their apartment and located a man friend.

That he did not tell the man what was in the trunk, but that he had the trunk and a cab driver haul the trunk from the apartment to the Chicago Union station. That it was the friend who sent the trunk to Los Angeles in care of "John Lopez."

A trunk containing a woman's body was opened in Los Angeles last Friday. A way bill showed the trunk was sent from Chicago April 20, by a "John Lopez" to the same name there. No Los Angeles address was included. The way bill was marked "will call."

The body was packed in salt and various articles of clothing thrown over it. Tricking of mailing salt caused a railway express clerk to turn the trunk over to the police.

Deputy Barnes said Villegos was picked up in Crystal City on the advice of Chicago police. Villegos said he was working in an aircraft plant at Chicago at the time of the slaying and that he obtained leave and returned to his home in Crystal City.

ADVANCE ON BURMA FRONT

Allies Closing In On Mogaung From Three Sides

By CHARLES A. GRUMICH

Southeast Asia, Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, May 10—(AP)—Allied forces are operating on three sides of Mogaung in northern Burma. Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters declared for the first time today, indicating that a determined Chinese-British-American drive was in full swing to reopen a land route to China. A communique said heavy casualties had been inflicted on the Japanese south of Mogaung—the first official announcement that Allied forces, presumably Chindits, are operating in that sector. Sharp blows also have been dealt the enemy in the vicinity of Mawla, some 70 miles southwest of Mogaung, where the airborne Chindits have been operating since March against the Mandalay-Myitkyna railway.

Fitting into the picture were Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's American and Chinese forces in the Mogaung valley and native Burmese heading down Japanese attacks in the Fort Hertz valley in their double-barreled push to the south against Mogaung and Myitkyna. These latter forces are closing in on the Japanese 18th division which already is reported becoming disorganized. Stilwell's forces, supported by tanks and artillery, have been attacking strong Japanese positions east of the main Mogaung valley road and south of the Twelon river, headquarters said.

In northeastern India, meanwhile, fighting continued yesterday in the Kohima area, where the enemy still is present in strength, the communique declared. Some 85 miles south of Kohima the enemy added, the Japanese invaders launched two attacks along the Palel road toward the Imphal plain but were repulsed.

Allied aircraft were reported active over all battlefronts, blasting enemy troop concentrations at Namkwin southwest of Mogaung, starting large fires at Nalong on the Myitkyna-Bhamo road and strafing supply depots at Moirang, 25 miles south southwest of Imphal. Twenty Japanese Zeros, unable to reach prime targets on the Imphal front, made a half-hour's secondary attack on an Allied airstrip in mid-Burma, losing three and probably two more planes to anti-aircraft fire. They caused negligible damage.

ABC Officers Raid And Destroy Stills

ABC enforcement officers J. L. Taylor, S. B. Dorsey and Deputy E. G. McMullan destroyed a 50-gallon steel drum liquor still near Penny Hill yesterday. The equipment destroyed included six 50-gallon fermenters, 100 gallons of mash, a condenser barrel, and a doubling keg.

The officers later destroyed a 50-gallon steel drum still and other equipment in the woods near Ballard's Crossroads. No arrest was made.

NAVAL CHIEFS GET TOGETHER

Nimitz, Halsey And King Conferred Last Week-end

By The Associated Press
The meeting in San Francisco of the navy's triple-threat to Japan—Admirals Halsey, Nimitz and King—is looked upon by military observers as a hint that when the European invasion begins, Tokyo may be too busy to listen to the radio.

The navy said little about the meeting except that it had been held and that Admiral Nimitz, Pacific fleet chief had received a new decoration—his second distinguished service medal—for "his sound judgment and masterful conduct" of operations in 1941 and 1942 following the enemy assault on Pearl Harbor. It was a signal honor. Only other ranking officers to be similarly decorated are Admiral Halsey, the south Pacific commander, and General Thomas Holcomb of the Marine Corps, retired. The Navy said the three admirals met last week end.

The west coast meeting is believed to have been singularly significant because the United States fleet commander-in-chief, Admiral King, is known to feel that the Pacific fleet must be carried through without cessation no matter what happens to Hitler's empire before Tokyo falls.

And the forces under Nimitz and Halsey have no alternative from the obvious line of strategy. They must forge new links in the line to Japan, either by plastering Truk, in the Caroline Island group, or by skirting the coast and establishing bases in the Maganna Island chain running north from the Carolines.

Doris Duke Divorce Set Aside By Court

Elizabeth, N. J., May 10—(AP)—Advisory Master Douglas Herr in Chancery court today found null and void the Reno divorce of Doris Duke Cromwell from her husband James H. R. Cromwell, former U. S. minister to Canada, and ordered it set aside.

Herr held the decree "null, void and of no effect in New Jersey." In handing down the court's decision the advisory master challenged the 31-year-old tobacco heiress' competence as a married woman to select a residence outside the state so long as her husband stayed in New Jersey.

He held that an element of fraud was "conspicuous" in Mrs. Cromwell's claim that she was a Reno resident.

Asks Increase In Funds For Army

Washington, May 10—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked Congress today for new appropriations for the army totaling \$15,676,682,700, which would bring the total contemplated expenditures for military purposes up to \$49,009,000,000 for the next fiscal year.

"The estimates," a White House statement said, "contemplate the maintenance and operation of an army of 7,700,000 officers, men and women on the offensive in a global war through June 30, 1945."

Pilotless Plane Flies Four Hours

Denton, Ia., May 10—(AP)—A four-engine bomber from the Sioux City, Ia., army air base flew over sections of two states for four hours with no one aboard before crashing on the side of a ravine two miles northwest of here about 2 a. m. today.

The plane crashed more than 100 miles from where the 10 crew members and a bombardier instructor bailed out about 10 o'clock last night when fire broke out on the ship. The fire evidently burned itself out during the trip.
