Fortresses Bomb German Submarine Base At Kiel

Other Attacks On Invasion Coast Fortifications; RAF Bombed Port Of Duisburg Last Night; Hundreds Of Nazi Locomotives Destroyed Yesterday

London, May 22—(AP)—Flying Fortresses bombed the German submarine center of Kiel and U. S. Liberators pounded German fortifications in the Pas-de-Calais area of France today after a night in which 750 heavy British bombers saturated the major inland Nazi port of Duisburg with 2,800 tons of explosives.

The double-barreled daylight blow carried the newest Allied aerial prelude to the western invasion past 80 hours of continuous day-night attacks.

Up to 250 Flying Fortresses and the same number of Liberators, each group protected by swarms of American fighters, struck the twin assault.

Hannover, a rail and rubber center, and a German airfield in Belgium, were other British targets of the night.

Thirty British planes were lost in the night attacks.

In all some 3,000 Allied planes, most of them fighters, sprayed nearly every moving piece of Nazi transport sighted in western Europe yesterday with cannon and machine gun fire. These fighters swept and the RAF night blows dovetailed into the Allied strategy aimed at crippling Germany's movement of troops and supplies to combat the impending invasion from the west.

Duisburg, Germany's greatest inland port, had been bombed 61 times previously of which seven were major attacks. It last was hit hard on May 12, 1943, and following that attack, a record of the time, the Air Ministry announced the entire commercial and administrative center of the city of 300,000 had been laid in ruins.

The attack on Duisburg last night was described by the Air Ministry as "very heavy." While Duisburg was being pummeled, other British bomber formations cracked down on objectives in Hannover, raided a Nazi airfield in Belgium and carried out extensive mine-laying in enemy waters.

The loss of 30 night bombers was the greatest sustained by the RAF since May 5, when 49 bombers failed to return from widespread attacks on multiple targets in France and Germany.

Through Duisburg Pass vast quantities of heavy freight, including coal, iron and steel for both Germany and Italy.

Hannover, last attacked on the night of April 11, is the most important German rail center between the Reich and the low countries. It previously has been the target of four major raids.

Airmen back from Duisburg reported fierce combats over the city. (Continued on page two)

The decisive battle of the European war, Berlin declares, will have to be fought on the German west wall defenses of the invasion zone, and the real attack must come from the supply base and aircraft carrier, England.

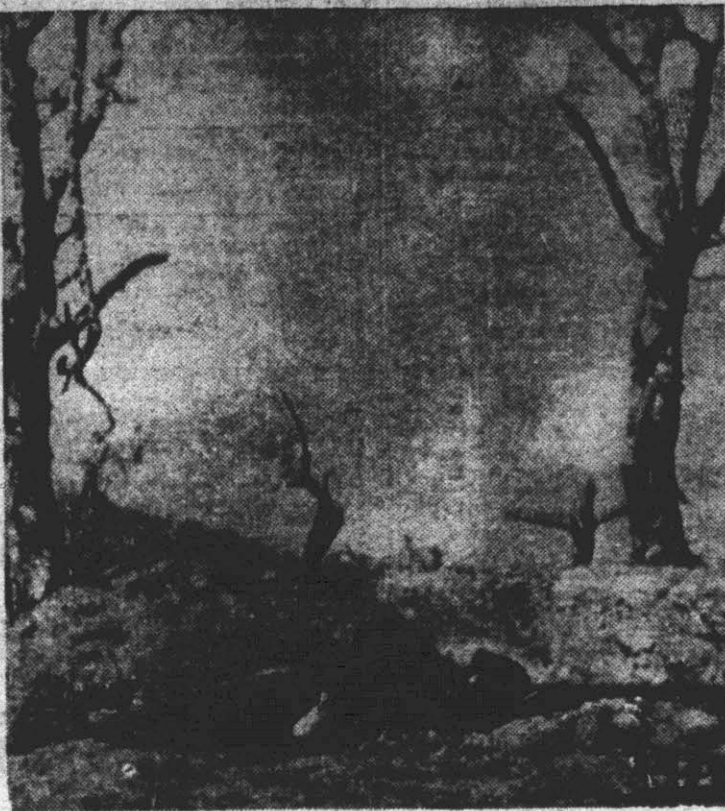
This assertion is made with a worried weather eye on the up-and-down Allied offensive in Italy. There the Nazis are in a nasty jam, with both flanks of their loudly sung Adolf Hitler line in danger of being turned—one the left wing by the French and on the right by the Americans.

There's no question of the ability of the western allies to set up a second front, and even the Germans admit that this can be done. Still, while we refuse to consider the possibility of failure in such an operation, it must be said hypothetically that if there were no invasion of western Europe the war would drag on interminably no matter how much striking power the Russians might apply on the eastern front.

It's equally true, of course, that an invasion by the western allies would be long in knocking out the Germans if the Red armies weren't hammering the enemy on the eastern front. There must be pressure on both sides.

Japs Suffer Big Losses In New Guinea Campaign

PLANT SEIZED BY THE ARMY

Government Operation Ends 17-Day Worker's Strike

Springfield, Ill., May 22—(AP)—The Hummer Manufacturing Company, second Montgomery Ward property to be seized by the army within four weeks, resumed production today under government operation when workers on the early shift returned to their jobs.

Lt. Col. Nelson Talbot, War Department representative in charge, said 198 of 200 workers on the early shift reported at 7 a. m. Spokesmen for the union said "over 90 percent—all we could notify last night" of the 325 normally employed on the two day shifts, agreed to report.

The plant employs 550, including some 100 office workers.

There were no disturbances and John J. Saxon, plant manager, said he and other plant officials were "cooperating to the fullest extent" with a 10-man army contingent which took possession yesterday acting under President Roosevelt's orders.

Operations at the factory site had been halted for 17 days by a strike of 450 AFL machinists who protested the concern's rejection of a War Labor Board directive to sign (Continued on page two)

American Bombers Continue To Rain Destruction On Japanese Positions

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, May 22—(AP)—Japanese casualties in the month-old American invasion of northern New Guinea mounted today as the Yanks counted enemy bodies at conquered Wakde and on the mainland nearby where counterattacks were bloodily repulsed.

Of the total enemy casualties, 3,343 Japanese were killed.

This meant 76 Japanese killed for every American in the overall northern New Guinea operation which began with the April 22 landings at Hollandia and Aitape.

American sixth army troops who annihilated every Japanese on the Wakde islands, 110 miles northwest of Hollandia, have counted 676 enemy dead, "with others not yet reported," Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced in his Monday communique.

The Americans pressed against stubborn mortar, machinegun and rifle fire from their Tor river beachhead on the mainland. Three enemy counter punches Friday and Saturday were turned back, with 111 Japanese dead. The Americans had the support of strafing fighter planes.

From the Hollandia and Aitape areas came official word of 436 more Japanese killed and 45 captured in widespread patrol actions the last week or so. This brought the total enemy casualties there to 3,042 dead and captured.

The last recapitulation of American casualties in the Hollandia-Aitape sector said 28 Americans had been killed and 95 wounded. In the Wakde area invasion which began Wednesday, 16 Americans have been reported killed and 83 wounded.

Heavy Allied bombers, despite the bad weather, pounded two airbases on Biak Island in the Schouten group, 260 miles northwest of Hollandia, with 97 tons of bombs on Friday and the next day Boston attack planes gave the area a thorough bombing and strafing. Large fuel fires were ignited.

Liberators also hit Manokwari and Noemfoor island in the general area and struck far to the east of Hollandia. (Continued on page two)

Firemen Did Great Work Here Saturday

Fire destroyed five dwelling houses occupied by colored people in the "Bama" section of the city Saturday afternoon. It was a dangerous fire and the firemen, working some distance from reach of the city water supply, did great work in controlling it with the assistance of a number of volunteer workers in the community. The fire originated in Sarah Clark's home, firemen said. The houses were owned by Will Clark and Mrs. W. F. Young.

The firemen could only use their auxiliary pumps with water brought to them by neighbors and others. When they found out that they could not save the burning houses the firemen gave their attention to saving nearby buildings.

The fire is believed to have started from a defective line.

Peace Terms

London, May 22—(AP)—Japanese "peace terms" to the United States involving such "demands" as confiscation of the entire American navy have been published in the Japanese periodical "Heiho," a Berlin broadcast said today.

Other conditions prescribed: "All expenses arising out of taking over of American ships by Japan are to be paid by the United States."

"All large ships of the merchant fleet are to be put at the disposal of Japan."

"All naval installations, naval stations, dockyards, arsenals, colleges and other centers of naval education are to be destroyed."

"In case of the scuttling of a single ship 10 times its value should be paid the Japanese government."

MAKES REPORT ON LEND-LEASE

Preparations Being Made For Three-Way Invasion

Washington, May 22—(AP)—Lend-lease arms and equipment to power a three-way invasion smash at Europe are moving out of this country at a steadily growing speed. President Roosevelt told Congress today.

"United Nations forces are now about to strike new and mighty blows at Nazi-occupied Europe from the south and the east," the President said as he submitted the 15th report on lend-lease operations.

"They are armed with the most powerful weapons that the combined resources and ingenuity of the United Nations can produce. x x x Through lend-lease we have made certain that every man in the forces of the other United Nations who goes into battle beside an American fighting man has what he needs to hit the common enemy as hard as possible."

The report shows \$24,235,000,000 worth of equipment, services and supplies have gone from this country's lend-lease arsenal—nearly three-fourths to Britain and Russia.

"China is being helped to the utmost of our ability," Mr. Roosevelt said. But the report itself shows the supplies being flown into that country are only a trickle against the flood of equipment being massed before the Nazi forces.

More than \$1,000,000,000 in planes and parts, a like amount of tanks and ammunition and almost that value in tanks and war vehicles have gone to the United Kingdom—three-fourths of them in the past year. British bombers are dumping American-made charges on Germany and American fighters roar up from the decks of British aircraft carriers.

Occupied Nations Get Invasion Instructions

London, May 22—(AP)—Thousands of passengers missed their trains at London stations today, with blackboards announcing that many schedules had been cancelled without warning.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's supreme headquarters told the peoples of occupied countries today more ways to help the invasion armies—by providing intimate knowledge about roads, bridges, rivers, woods and possible landing fields.

The broadcast came after a German threat of "terrible and bloody reprisals" against any French patriots who heed Eisenhower's previous call to take up arms and help the invasion forces.

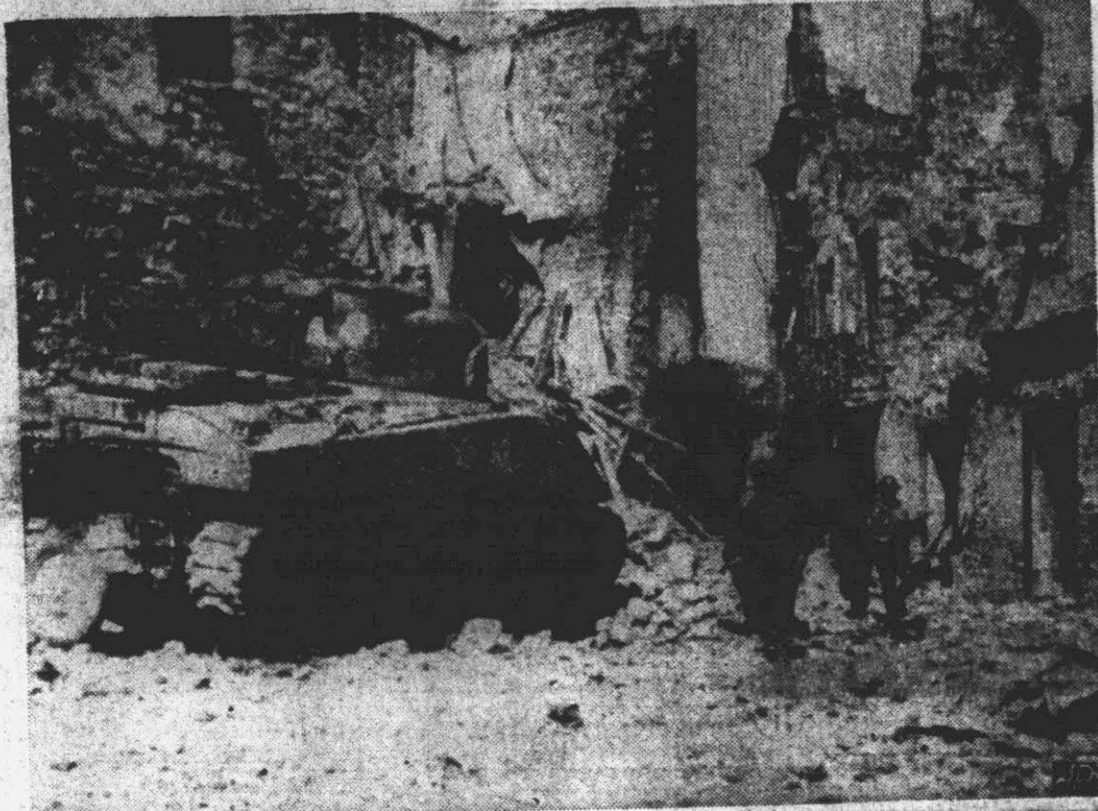
A member of Eisenhower's staff told the radio listeners: "Listen carefully. For some time you have been receiving from our offices already well known to you, advice and instructions on how to prepare yourselves for the final phase of the struggle for liberation."

"The supreme commander wishes you to know that what you have heard is in accordance with his plans and wishes. In due course, you will receive advice and instructions from the supreme commander himself in the meantime, he directs you to continue to note well and to act on advice and instructions by speakers whom I introduce in his behalf."

Imminent Victory Seen For Stilwell In Northern Burma

TO BLACKLIST SWEDISH FIRMS

Action Against Several Firms Expected Shortly

Washington, May 22—(AP)—The State Department made known today that a considerable number of Swedish firms are being investigated for blacklisting and action against them probably will be taken within the next few days.

The information came out in connection with a statement by the department that no firm "has been or will be included in the proclaimed list merely because means of pressure may exist by reason of American connections."

Today's announcement was the latest in a series of developments stemming from the efforts of the United States, Britain and Russia to persuade Sweden to stop sending ball bearings to Germany. The principal Swedish ball bearing manufacturer is the SKF firm which has American affiliates at Philadelphia and New York.

Expected Fall Of Myitkyina Will Give Allies Strategic Advantage

Southeast Asia Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, May 22—(AP)—Allied forces advancing through deep mud and monsoon rains hammering the battle for Myitkyina—great Japanese base in northern Burma already one-third in Allied hands—have won command of the junction of roads fanning west and north to Mogaung and Fort Hertz, it was announced today.

Lt.-Gen. Stilwell's troops were reported in a communique yesterday to have taken a third of Myitkyina in heavy street fighting, and U. S. airmen sank boatloads of enemy troops seeking to flee across the Irrawaddy river. The fall of Myitkyina would mark the first major Allied strategic victory in the north Burma offensive.

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Today On The Home Front

Washington, May 22—(AP)—In a week's time the words—majority, minority, two-thirds—have become brightly significant.

They are wrapped up in two proposals to amend the constitution. This country's future peaceful foreign relations and quiet at home may depend upon those proposals; modification of the senate's special treaty-ratifying powers and elimination of the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting in eight southern states.

So on the ground that it was unconstitutional, early last week southern senators forced withdrawal of an anti-poll tax bill, already approved by the house, by threatening to filibuster against it.

They could do that. There's a rule limiting debate in the house but not in the senate. Senators say this freedom to talk endlessly for or against something is democratic, that it protects the right of a minority in the senate.

A filibuster could be stopped by a vote for cloture which limits debate to one hour per senator. They voted on cloture. It needs a two-thirds vote. Not even a majority voted for it.

Meanwhile, even an attempt to abolish poll taxes constitutionally, by a constitutional amendment, was crushed, at least temporarily, early in January Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) made such a proposal. The Senate Judiciary Committee refused to let it reach the floor. Early last week it refused again.

But—at week's end almost every Republican senator signed a resolution proposing a similar constitution (Continued on page two)

Americans Take Control Anchor Of Terracina And Then Lose It; Poles Capture Piedmonte, Bastion Position Guarding Liri Valley Approach To Rome

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 22—(AP)—American troops have seized three mountains northeast of Terracina, but advanced patrols who pushed into that coastal anchor city itself only 24 miles from the Anzio beachhead have withdrawn, headquarters announced tonight.

The German high command has thrown all its reserves into a desperate effort to halt the Allied drive toward Rome, headquarters declared, but the Allied armies smashed ahead again today all along the front.

U. S. troops entered Terracina, sea bastion of the Nazis' third defense wall in southern Italy, after a nine mile advance along the coast, but later pulled back.

At last reports, U. S. forces had established a line three miles north-west of Terracina. The Americans were pushing farther into the hills of the Terracina-Pico line despite intense opposition. Northeast of Terracina they took Monte Marino, Monte Autone, and Monte Capicchio.

Further inland, French troops closed in on Pico in the center of the line and elsewhere made progress.

Seventeen German divisions, some of them badly mauled in the fighting of the last 10 days, now are committed on the main and Anzio beachhead fronts, and the Nazis have no reserves left south of Rome, headquarters declared.

On the northern flank, Poles entered the bastion of Piedmonte on the northern edge of the Liri valley, and the Eighth army was laying step by step toward the Anzio beachhead.

The Germans rushed reinforcements from the north into the sagging coastal line against the Americans, and Lt.-Gen. Mark W. Clark's troops quickly captured 100 prisoners from them.

French troops toward the center took lost, and then recaptured today Monte Leucio west of Pico on the road from Pontecorvo. Canadians penetrated the Hitler line northeast of Pontecorvo, on the lower edge of the Liri valley, pinning barbed wire entanglements, headquarters said.

The first troops to push into Terracina—only 24 miles across the Pontine marshes from the Anzio beachhead—had reported only light German rearward resistance.

On the beachhead itself, U. S. patrols pushed out five miles from (Continued on page two)

Gen. Clark Has Narrow Escape

On the Fifth Army Front in Italy, May 22—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark, Fifth army commander, narrowly missed being killed when a well-disguised booby trap on an abandoned German artillery piece exploded less than 25 feet from the Jeep in which he was riding yesterday.

The explosion critically wounded one soldier and injured several others who had been standing near the Nazi anti-tank gun. Clark, who was making an inspection tour of the front, was told that someone had been tinkering with the abandoned gun.

POWER OF AN UNDEFILED LIFE

The story of Parsifal is a beau-
tiful study in the power of an un-
defiled life. Sin had laid waste a
group of men whose lives were de-
voted to the advancement of the

ing upon the scene, broke the power
of evil because he had in his na-
ture that purity which alone could

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—If you are a betting
man, don't give any odds that the
second congressional district race in
Texas will end the "Dies Commit-
tee."

The "Dies Committee" to investi-
gate the activities of communists
in May, 1938. No special commit-
tee in Congress has received as
much attention since that time. Even
the major permanent commit-
tees have to take a back seat occa-
sionally but there have been few
weeks in six years when the "Dies
Committee" wasn't in the headlines.

You may or may not like Con-
gressman Dies and his committee,
but there are many members of the
House who would trade their ob-
scurity for the limelight that Mar-
tin Dies has had, even if the spot
frequently drew as many eggs as
rocks.

There's a rumor now that a draft
Dies, despite his declaration that a
troop of all-time will keep him out of
the race. There's another that a
petition is being circulated to per-
suade the "Dies committee" with
whatever personnel it has left plus
new appointments. A third possi-
bility is that the Republicans will
have a majority in the 79th Congress,
and will make quite a noise about
abolishing the Dies committee altogeth-
er.

There is however one school of
thought here which argues that the
defeat of Rep. Joe Starnes in the
Alabama primaries indicates that the
Dies committee is marked for the
discard. He was the No. 2 man on
the committee. It's no secret that he
had the opposition of organized la-
bor. Starnes comes from an indus-
trial district in Alabama (centered
on Glenside) which has had a con-
siderable influx of union labor since
the war.

Some observers feel that Dies' loss
was a signal victory in Ala-
bama and were marshalling their
forces to duplicate that victory in
the second district of Texas.

On the other hand, friends of
Dies here say his throat ailment is
critical and will demand an opera-
tion from which it will be impos-
sible for him to recover in time to en-
ter actively into the campaign—and
that is his sole reason for with-
drawal.

Nevertheless, the defeat of the
Dies committee's No. 2 man and the
withdrawal of the chairman leave
the committee in pretty bad odds.

ate's treaty-ratifying powers.

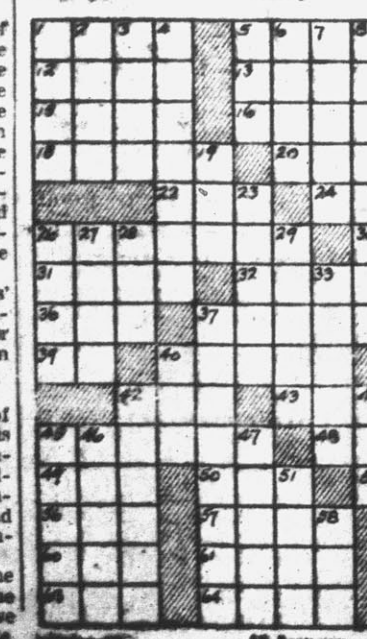
Under the constitution, the house
has no voice in treaty-making. The
President approves a treaty and
sends it to the senate for ratifica-
tion. To ratify, a two-thirds vote is
needed. Thus one third of the sen-
ators, plus one, could kill a treaty.

From the house side have come
proposals to amend the constitu-
tion so that both house and senate
vote on a treaty with only a major-
ity vote necessary.

From the senate side there's a
proposal to amend the constitution
—but still keep it strictly a senate
vote.

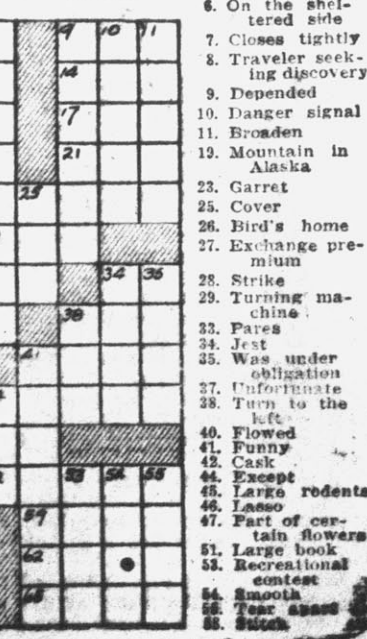

aid has gone to Russia, two-thirds

1944, we had sent Russia 8,800 high-
speed trucks, 36,000 jeeps, 5,200 tanks
and tank destroyers and 30,000 other
military vehicles.

The report showed a mounting
total of reverse lend-lease. Empha-
sizing the pooling of Allied fighting
equipment, it said:

"In proportion to their available
resources our principal Allies are

ludicrous to harass the enemy along
the northeastern New Guinea coast
as well as the "milk run" visits to
New Britain and New Ireland is-
lands.

An enemy freighter at Nomo in
the Carolines was damaged by a
single patrol bomber which knocked
down one of four interceptors. An-
other similar bomber wiped out nine
floatplanes at Lamotrek, 540 miles
to the west.

Later accounts brought to five the
number of coastal vessels sunk in
Friday's assault on Japanese ship-
ping at Manokwari by American at-
tack planes.

London, May 22.—(AP)—A Japa-
nese communiqué broadcast by
Tokyo today said that "enemy naval
units" approaching from the east
had launched aerial attacks Satur-
day and Sunday against the central
Pacific. Minamitori island, 1,200
miles southeast of Tokyo.

Damage to Japanese installations
was acknowledged in the broadcast
recorded by the Associated Press,
and the bulletin declared that at
least 32 raiding planes were shot
down.

Minamitori, or Marcus island, is
about mid-way between the Mar-
shall islands and the Japanese
mainland, and 600 miles east of the
main islands of the Bonin group.
It has been attacked before by U.
S. fleet units.

They had little opposition on the
way to the target, however, and the
bombs started plunging down before
the German fighter packs arrived.
One pilot said the Nazis pursued
homeward-bound bombers beyond
the coast.

Light units of the riddled Ger-
man navy lurking in the English
Channel felt the weight of Allied
aerial might when RAF Typhoon
fighter-bombers and Spitfire fight-
ers flew mass-high through intense
flak to attack a half-dozen Nazi

naval vessels sighted off Cap Frehel
near St. Malo last night.

The Air Ministry said the Spit-
fires shot up the German ships, the
majority of which were minesweep-
ers. Typhoon pilots said one was in
flames as they went in low to bomb.
Observation of the bombing was
difficult. One Typhoon was missing
from the operation.

Activity over the channel contin-
ued throughout the forenoon today
with fighter formations sweeping
out toward the Bologne and Dieppe
areas as another returned from Cal-
ais.

The gigantic operations yesterday
were unique, since never before had
American fighter forces and the
British second tactical air force
joined in such a gigantic bid aimed
at destroying every moving military
object in the Nazis' defensive ter-
ritory behind the Atlantic wall.
From official accounts it appeared
everything in western Europe was
driven to cover.

PREPARATIONS FOR VICTORY GARDENS
If you expect your victory garden to produce the vegetables your family needs, it is necessary to prepare your soil, use a fertilizer suitable to your type of soil and plant your

seeds according to the plan in which that plant will thrive best and produce most.

After the soil has been thoroughly plowed or broken up it should be freed from stones and large pieces of trash.

Whether you use decayed organic matter or commercial fertilizer, it is necessary that the fertilizer be thoroughly mixed with the soil, since fertilizer should not come in direct contact with the seed. It might be successfully placed in two rows a few inches apart on either side of the trench in which the seed are to be planted.

There is only a limited amount of garden seed available, but no more than you need and plant only enough to get a stand. Drop the seed evenly spaced in a row to avoid waste. Thick planting causes both a waste of seed and time, since they must be thinned to allow room for growing space. Cover seed very lightly with fine soil; pack gently with garden rake.

Cultivate your garden intensely to keep it free from weeds; weeds rob your plants of water and nutrients, also space and light which they require.

donate a redwood tree to be planted in memory of a Greenville boy.

Your letter of April 13 assuming that I am 100 per cent for you finds me utterly unable to see how you reached this conclusion. I am not even 50 per cent for you, although if the Democrats should err to the extent of nominating you then I, as a Democrat, will vote for you in November.

In supporting any candidate for any public office I feel that such primary duties as the listing and payment of taxes on property owned by said candidate should be considered as being a very vital and important matter. I have recently read a letter from our county accountant which states that Dr. Ralph McDonald has neither listed or paid taxes for the years 1942 and 1943 on the lot on Tenney Circle which he acquired in 1941. I have also seen a letter from our City Manager, J. L. Caldwell, in which he states that his records do not show that Dr. Ralph McDonald has listed any property for taxes. On March 12, 1941, W. L. Foushee, Commissioner, deeded to Ralph W. McDonald and wife, a lot on Tenney Circle in Chapel Hill, Orange County. This deed is recorded in the office of Register of Deeds for Orange County in Book 113 on page 313.

There is no record in the office of Register of Deeds for Orange County that this lot has been transferred to anyone else since that date.

The 1942 and 1943 Town of Chapel Hill taxes have not been paid as of this date (May 19, 1944).
