Allied Forces Inching Their Way Toward Rome

German Fighting Terrific Rearguard Actions While Trying To Extricate Main Forces From Southern Italian Battlefront

Allied Headquarters, Naples, May 31.—(AP)—The Fifth army fought Germans today barely 14 miles from Rome and the eighth army smashed into the outskirts of Frosinone, narrowing to 23 air-line miles the distance between the two armies along the Via Cassina.

British troops advanced to a point just south of coastal Pescara. The German radio said dramatic street fighting was in progress inside Velletri, Alban hills road junction 18 miles from the capital.

To reach Frosinone's outskirts the Eighth army troops of Lt. Gen. Sir Oliver Leese advanced upon Via Cassina (Highway 6) on a broad front, with the enemy falling back steadily under pressure, an official source said. Frosinone is an important road junction and a city of 20,000—the largest in the immediate path of the current offensive.

The Eighth army previously had taken a dozen or more towns near the important highway. Fifth army artillery interdicted the Via Cassina in the Valmontone area, 20 miles from Rome. This and the Eighth army's advance forced the Germans to depend increasingly upon secondary routes.

But in the critical area of the Rome line generally 16 to 20 miles south of the eternal city, enemy defenses were stubborn and skilled along 25 miles of battle zone stretching from Valmontone around the southern slopes of the Alban hills to Campo Liano at the sea. At some points west of Velletri, the Allies were within six miles of the Pope's summer home at Castel Gandolfo.

The German massed infantry, tanks and flamethrowers and scattered mines in confusion in a do-or-die attempt to check an Allied breakthrough of their long-established steel and stone fortifications. The din of approaching battle grew louder in Rome as the Fifth army attacked gallantly and without pause.

The provincial capital of Frosinone, on the Via Cassina 43 miles southeast of Rome, tottered as the Allies moved within four miles. Berlin said German troops had taken positions north of the city of 20,000. Increased enemy fire showed the Germans were intent on holding off the Allies until the (Continued on page two)

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The Germans themselves have taken the initiative on the eastern front by making a heavy attack which has forced the Russian line north of Iasi, Romania.

While the full import of this move isn't yet apparent, it is insignificant as showing the importance Hitler attaches to the Balkans as the southeastern shield for his fortress Europe. Time will tell whether it's a big scale assault to forestall the impending Red offensive. Moscow thinks it is merely to disrupt Russian troop concentrations.

The Nazi attack is particularly interesting since it comes on the heels of further moves by Hitler to compel Bulgaria to knuckle under. He is reported to have slammed his mailed fist down on the Sofia government's council table and demanded not only full war aid but severance of diplomatic relations with Moscow.

That puts Bulgaria on a tough spot and has increased the tension in an already taut Balkans, for Moscow more than once has warned Sofia to quit catering to the Nazi brigand. Moreover we have the peculiar situation of a pro-Nazi government trying to help Hitler while a great majority of the people have turned thumbs down on Germany and are demanding cooperation with the Slavic brothers, the Russians.

Things cannot continue long like that without a further upheaval in this cockpit of southeastern Europe. This could be the emergency which would force a reluctant Turkey to

LABOR PICTURE STILL CLOUDY

Back To Work Movements Under Way In Some Places

(By The Associated Press)

Back to work movements and discussions were under way today in some sectors of the nationwide strike front, but shutdowns still involved more than 50,000 workers.

Production of medical supplies at Parke Davis and Company in Detroit was hampered and Detroit's bakery deliveries were 90 per cent shut off, as the CIO and AFL unions in the respective walkouts were called before the War Labor Board to show cause why they should not return to work. There were about 2,900 workers in the two shutdowns.

Employees in a third Detroit walk-out, involving 1,500 at the Federal Mogul Company plant, met to consider returning to work.

Nazi Attack Convoys

London, May 31.—(AP)—The Berlin radio asserted today that German planes had attacked an east-bound Allied convoy off Algeria last night, sinking one transport and two freighters totaling 23,900 tons.

The broadcast also declared that six other vessels totaling 50,000 tons were heavily damaged. There was no Allied confirmation of the attack or the German claims.

PACIFIC AREA MORE ACTIVE

Japs Counter-Attack Savagely On Biak Island

In new bursts of power the Japanese are strongly resisting Americans invading Biak island off New Guinea and are developing swiftly their offensive to seize China's Hanoi-Canton railway. Allied announcements revealed.

The two enemy forces on these fronts 2,500 miles apart had the same objective—to prevent Allied exploitation of new bases nearer Japan.

Offering the fiercest resistance Gen. Douglas MacArthur has met in months, the Japanese threw tanks, planes and first-class troops into the battle for Mokmer airdrome on Biak, which is only 880 miles from the Philippines. They crouched in caves and behind tree-protected ridges. Heavy rifle, machinegun, mortar and artillery fire pinned down MacArthur's sixth army troops two miles from the field.

The Americans countered with destroyer bombardment, planes, tanks and infantry. Associated Press War Correspondent Spencer Davis in an exclusive story from Biak, dated Monday, told how the enemy virtually ambushed two American battalions which suffered severe casualties. In the general fighting the Japanese suffered heavily, too.

In the southwest Pacific's first tank battle, Davis reported, the enemy attacked with 30 tanks. American Sherman's engaged and defeated them, the Japanese losing 11 machines. Of nine Japanese planes sent into the fight, six were shot down.

The Americans were holding back their full power until the Bosnek village was thoroughly mopped up. Tokyo radio claimed its airforce at Biak sank a cruiser or aircraft carrier, transport, six or seven amphibious trucks and damaged three warships.

Canadian Ships Sink Submarine

London, May 31.—(AP)—Sinking of a German submarine in the north Atlantic by the combined action of several Canadian escort vessels was announced today by the Admiralty. The submarine was forced to surface by a series of depth charge attacks and then was engaged in a surface gun duel in which the raider finally was sunk by the destroyer Icarus, the announcement said. A number of the submarine's crew were taken prisoner.

Greenville Native Now East Coast Commander

Maj. Gen. Durward S. Wilson In Charge Of Coast Defense Units From New York To Florida

New York, May 31.—Major General Durward S. Wilson, commanding general of the Infantry Replacement Training Center at Camp Croft, S. C., since November, 1942, has been appointed commanding general of the southeastern sector, Eastern Defense Command, it was announced today by Lieutenant General George Gruent, commanding general of the Eastern Defense Command.

General Wilson will command all army coastal defense units from New York to Florida, succeeding Major General John L. Homer, who was recently transferred to the Pacific coast. His headquarters will be in Raleigh, N. C. In October, 1940, General Wilson was ordered to Hawaii, where he became a brigadier general and assumed command of the 21st Infantry Brigade. On October 1, 1941, he assumed command of the 24th Infantry Division upon its organization. In May, 1942, he was promoted to the rank of major general, he was later transferred to command the 6th Motorized Division.

A native of Greenville, N. C., General Wilson was commissioned a second lieutenant of infantry upon his graduation from West Point in 1910. After serving at various infantry posts in the United States, he was ordered to the Philippines in 1914. Shortly after the outbreak of the First World War, General Wilson returned to the United States and served at southern training camps throughout the war. Returning to the Philippines in 1920, he served first with the 57th Infantry, and then was assigned to West Point. In subsequent years, General Wilson was graduated from the Infantry school advanced course, the Command and General Staff school, the Army War College, and the Naval War College.

Nation Ready To Offer League Of Nations Plan

Washington, May 31.—(AP)—The United States is prepared to put forth at the forthcoming big-four meeting here a plan for an international security organization patterned on the League of Nations and providing a consultative formula for the use of force to suppress war.

By this formula each nation would retain final authority over its own troops, planes and ships and would assign no direct power over them to the international agency. The agency after consultations among its members, could recommend but not order that a member nation use its troops for international police duty.

The only binding commitment on this vital point would be one which in effect has already been made in the Moscow four-power declaration—that no participating country would use its forces in foreign territory except in accordance with the decisions of the international agency to maintain peace.

The program, covering five main points, will go before the representatives of Russia, Britain and China here this summer at the start of the informal discussions to which those governments were invited yesterday by Secretary Hull.

The conferees very probably will be either the foreign secretaries of the four powers—Eden, Molotov, T. V. Soong and Hull—or their undersecretaries. President Roosevelt discussed the American proposal briefly at his news conference yesterday. He called it a first draft, subject to great changes and vast improvement. It fits in, he said, with the American aim to work with the rest of the world without in any way detracting from the League of Nations independence.

The intention of the White House and State Department is not to make the plan public until after the big-four meeting. Yet as a result of detailed inquiry in responsible quarters it is possible to report that the main points of the American proposal are these:

1. United Nations council (or executive committee)—to be composed initially of this country, Britain, China and Russia but later to be expanded to a membership of seven or eight countries, with special emphasis on representation for small nations.

2. United Nations assembly—to include at first all 35 United Nations and the nine so-called associated nations among which France is presently listed. The assembly would be expanded to take in, first, nations now neutral and second, reformed enemy countries. All nations large and small would be equal in sovereignty and voice.

3. Police power—instead of a single police force—proposals for which have no support in official quarters here—power would be exercised by the league council against potential trouble-makers through the military forces of member nations. Once the council had voted action in a specific case the final decision to act (Continued on page two)

TOWNS SUFFER FIRE LOSSES

Big Blazes At Elizabeth City And Edenton

Elizabeth City, May 31.—(AP)—Spectacular fires in Elizabeth City and Edenton last night called out city and naval fire-fighting equipment to subdue flames that were seen for miles around.

Fifteen thousand gallons of fuel oil and kerosene were destroyed, along with a filling station-dwelling nearby, in Elizabeth City. The Edenton blaze was reported to have caused \$50,000 damage in a clothing store.

Black smoke billowed from the oil tank in Elizabeth City, as five city fire trucks, two from the naval air station and one from the coast guard air station poured water on both the blazing tanks and a nearby tank containing 16,000 gallons of gasoline. With a strong north wind blowing the flames toward the gasoline tank, firemen were afraid the heat would cause the tank to explode. They played streams of water on it continuously to keep the tank cool.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, May 31.—(AP)—Railroads, after last year's grisly toll in wrecks and deaths, are beginning to take an active interest in radio as a safety device.

They had experimented with radio in the 1920's but as of now Chairman James L. Fly of the Federal Communications Commission says:

"So far as is known, there is no radio system in regular use on any commercial line in the United States."

But since March 21, FCC has received applications for 22 experimental radio stations for use in railroading.

This was sudden interest for FCC says, no similar application had been received between January 1, 1942, and March 1, 1944, years in which shocking accidents had accumulated.

Those accidents eventually did two things: Created wide public interest in the possible use of radio in railroad work and brought official action in Washington.

At hearings early in February a Senate subcommittee on war mobilization, headed by Senator Kilgore (D-W. Va.), gathered much information which was made public today.

Kilgore is a member of the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce headed by Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) who, on February 19, wrote to Fly about the "alarming number of accidents" and suggested an FCC investigation on the possibilities of using radio to prevent rail wrecks.

Fly has ordered an investigation and public hearings. He has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to cooperate. No date for the hearings has been set.

Britain Based Bombers Smash Four Important Rail Centers While Air Fleets From Italy Blast Oil Refineries

Ploesti, Romania

London, May 31.—(AP)—U.S. 3,500 invading American bombers striking from Britain and Italy the third consecutive day, bombed Romanian oil refinery at Ploesti today, four German rail yards, tacking traffic to the incessant tacking French invasion coast, an enemy air base in the old Ploesti line.

The air base was near Mulhouse, just north of Switzerland. The rail yards were at Hamm, naburc, Schwerte, 10 miles east of Dortmund, and Soes miles southeast of Hamm. The from Britain numbered 250 and 300 bombers and 1,200 fighters.

From 500 to 750 U.S. heavy bombers escorted by swarms of tanks and Lightnings struck Italy at Ploesti, 35 miles north of Bucharest, and enveloped at one major refinery with 100,000 tons of oil. Clouds obscured full results of first attack on Ploesti, 180 from the Russian battle lines, May 18. A number of German interceptors and intense flak encountered.

Wave after wave of U.S. bombers struck again and again the French invasion coast.

The eighth airforce's attack on Britain was its 25th this year against European targets and 15th in May against Germany, equaling March records. It was fourth consecutive day in which 200 fighters from Britain sought out the Luftwaffe to battles of attrition. It was also fifth successive day of heavy action from Britain.

The RAF's overnight were concentrated on anti-aircraft stations along the French coast, but Mosquito bombers penetrated into Germany to the chemical center of Leverkusen. Not a single plane was lost in operations, which also included mine-laying in enemy waters. (Continued on page two)

LIFE TAKES COURAGE AND THOUGHT

Carl Van Doren, in his autobiog-
raph, says: "If this were fiction, I
might say that I went into retreat
to think things out. But it still is
history. I have never in my life
thought things out, nor have I
always had to live them out, think-
ing as I went along."

Some people think they can plan
out their lives, and make every-
thing conform to a schedule. Every-
body, of course, should have a plan
for his life, but he should be well
aware of the fact that this plan
will have to be modified in many
respects and perhaps utterly put
aside in the interest of a better
plan. As Van Doren insists, there
is no such thing as going into re-
treat and thinking things out. What
we have to do is to get into the
thick of things and work them out
as opportunities open up. There are
times when quiet reflection on
principle is the only profitable em-
ployment. But when the great sit-
uations of life are upon us, we can-
not go into seclusion and think
them out. We have to live them out,
thinking as we go along.

Life is not an abstraction; rather
it is a pilgrimage. There is some-
thing disconcertingly concrete
about the whole of it. It consists
not in nicely laid plans or care-
fully spun theories, but in perplex-
ing situations and a few over-
whelming joys followed by a series
of blighting mistakes, griefs, and
triumphs.

Turkey, Bulgaria and two periods

the staff of General Infantry of the
Fourth Army.

Lieutenant-Colonel William Ros-
ser Wilson graduated from West
Point in 1916. Due to a slight dis-
ability received at the military
academy he was not permitted to
go overseas during World War I but

tions.

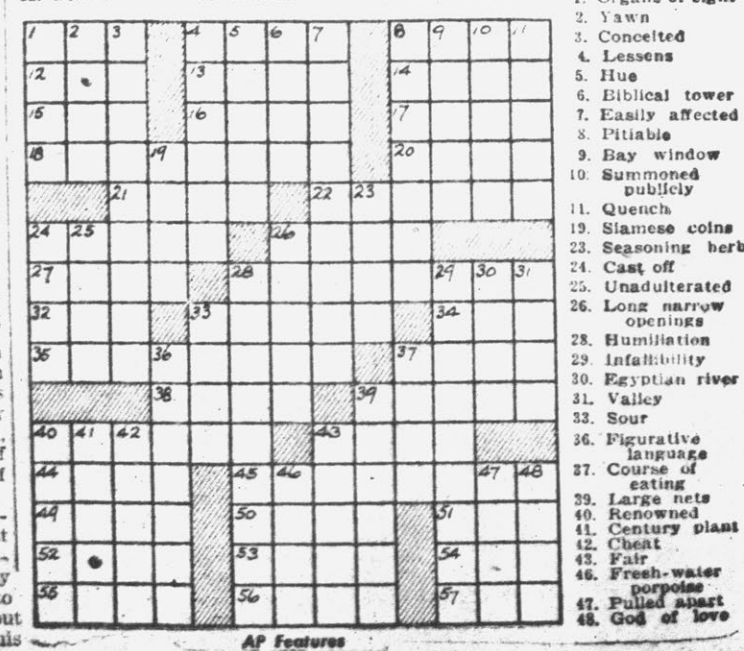

Senators Passes Debt Limit Bill

Washington, May 31.—(AP)—The Senate passed a bill raising the national debt limit from 210 billion dollars to 260 billion dollars today after adopting an amendment reducing the cabaret tax from 30 to 20 per cent and exempting uniformed service people from payment of the levy.

The measure now goes back to the house, which previously had voted to raise the debt limit to 240 billion dollars, and which has yet to act on the revised cabaret tax.

Senator Bilbo (D-Miss.) abandoned an attempt to reduce the tax on theater admissions from 20 to 10 per cent.

Bilbo withdrew his amendment after Senator Downey (D-Calif.) advocate of the reduced cabaret tax, revised it to fix the new levy at 20 instead of 10 per cent.

"I just didn't want the cabaret tax to be lower than that paid by 95,000,000 American movie-goers," Bilbo asserted.

Refugees Seized. Philadelphia, May 31.—(AP)—A German submarine stopped the Portuguese passenger liner Serpa Pinto carrying refugees in a mid-ocean last Friday, took two American citizens prisoners and threatened to torpedo the vessel, the Fourth Naval District announced today.

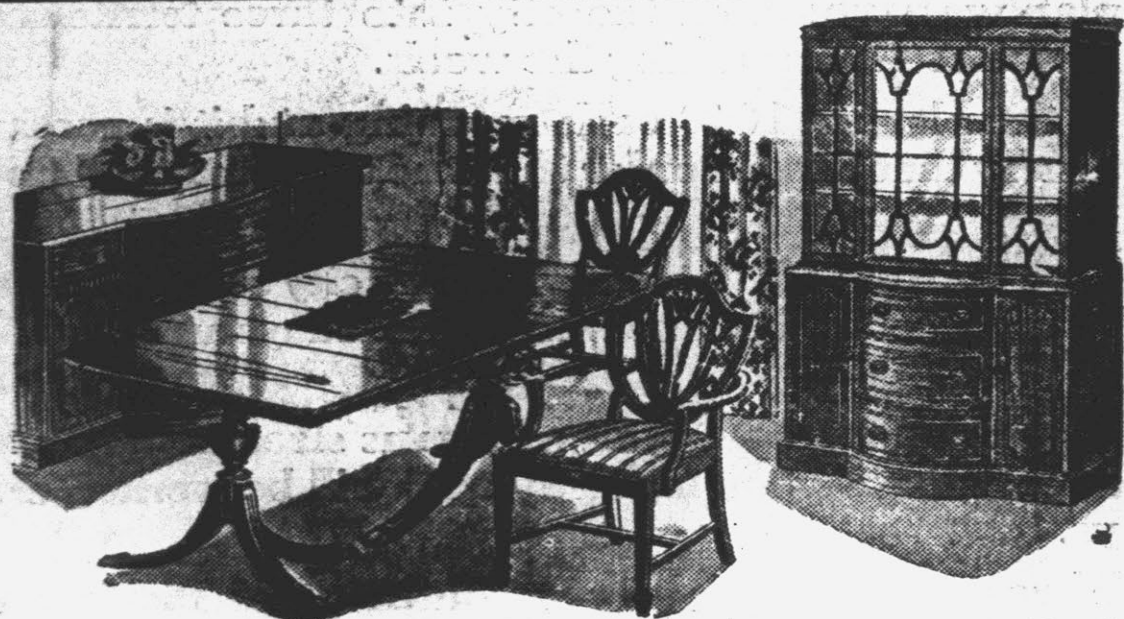
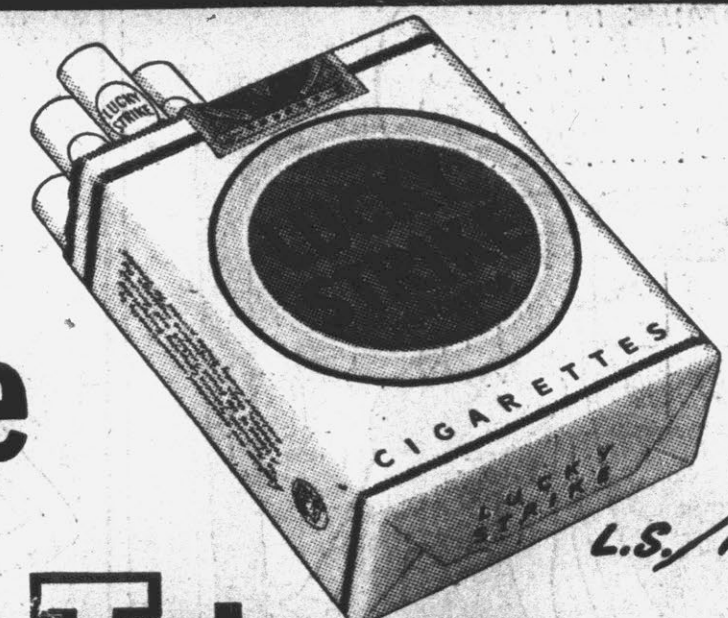
