Heavy Weather Over Channel Delayed Today's Activity But Strong Formations Roared Toward The French Coast This Afternoon

By GLADWIN HILL London, June 1.—(AP)—In simultaneous, overnight assaults, powerful forces of RAF bombers hammered Nazi defense installations along the French coast and fanned out over a 300-mile front in France to blast three of the largest railroad centers through which the Germans are shuffling their forces to meet the impending Allied invasion.

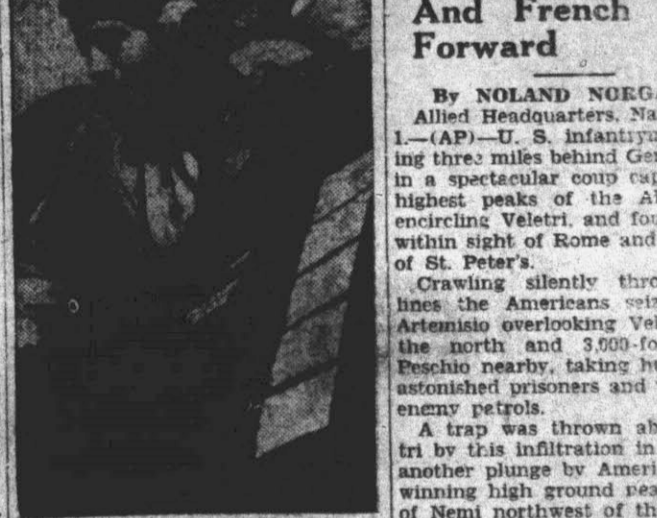

(Continued from page one) all sectors where the Germans have garrisons, to launch immediately most decisive actions against important bases and military lines, communications and other vital objectives.

A Tito communique void of fresh blows against the Germans, including the capture of the enemy base of Arzano in Dalmatia. Partisan units are advancing in the direction of Sinj, 17 miles northeast of Split, leading seaport in Dalmatia, the communique added.

In another action in Slovenia, partisan forces penetrated into Svatjanj, near the Austrian frontier, and blockaded a German garrison of 800 officers and men, the communique said. An enemy daily was repulsed with losses.

King Peter II was understood to have decided to bestow the title of commander-in-chief on Tito, who has accused Mihailovic of collaboration with the Germans. Peter has invited Dr. Ivan Subasic to form a new government and to establish contact with the partisans. It was learned.

The monarch also was represented as ready to send Tito a pledge that he would not attempt to return to Yugoslavia as king until after an election can be held to determine the form of post-war government.

Expect Turkey To Join The Allies

London, June 1—(AP)—Turkey's entrance into the war on the side of the Allies soon after they launch their invasion of western Europe is regarded as a strong possibility by some quarters in London, not only because of the Turks' improved military position but because of the voice such a move would give them in post-war settlements.

The possibility is given added weight by the continuation of Allied-Turkish negotiations in Ankara, which are generally viewed here as having considerable significance over and above the question of shutting off the flow of supplies from Turkey to Germany.

If the Turks do decide to enter the war, it was pointed out, they could not pick a better time than when the Germans are heavily committed on both the western and Russian fronts and therefore are not in a position to four reserves into the Balkans.

Under lend-lease, the United States has sent the Soviet Union more than 7,800 planes to date.



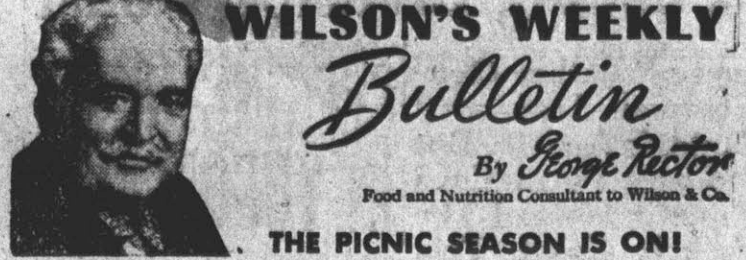

Confederate Veteran Dies

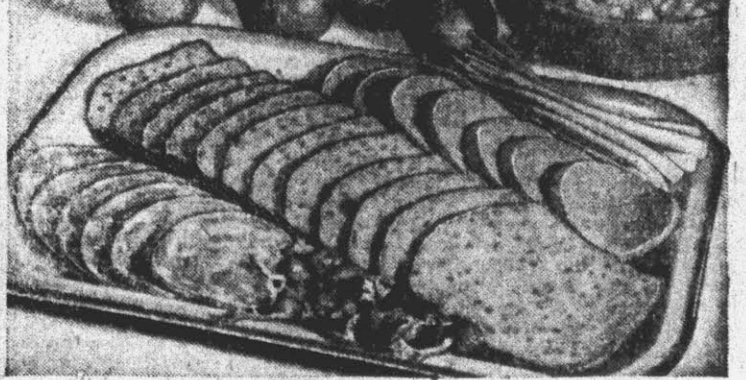

Many patients who otherwise would not have had care, have been hospitalized through the Laughinghouse Hospital Bed Fund. Since its beginning, approximately \$2,500 has been spent in this project. Others include: The Womanless Wedding, sales of aprons, food and pinafiores from the shelf at Ellington's Book Store, which provided a large amount of money for the hospital bed fund; work of many members in the community campaigns, War Loan drives, surgical dressings and knitting room, making of layettes; Girl Scout activities; Red Cross Home Service office; salvage drives; War Participation Committee; Greenville Council of Child Welfare; and the Recreational Committee; the placing of a \$25 first aid kit on the coast guard cutter Pamlico; and the provision of a campship for a Girl Scout at Camp Hardee.

The Thrift Shop and Service League office has added to its usual duties the supervision on Saturday afternoons of a group of girls, "The Jolly Juniors" interested in doing community service.

Mrs. Pace closed her report with a plea for all to "dedicate themselves anew to the perpetuation of service on the home front" to make our community a brighter and happier place for our boys to come back to.

Officers, committee chairmen and members of the advisory council were recognized and Mrs. Pace was given a rising vote of thanks for the magnificent work she has done as president during the past two years.

When Mrs. Helen Hansen of Milwaukee, Wis., fell down stairs ten years ago and injured her spine, physicians feared she would never walk again. But she taught herself to walk by pushing a weighted chair in front of her, and, although her left hand is still not normal, she has regained its use by patiently squeezing sand through her fingers for hours at a time. Today Mrs. Hansen is promoting the activities of the Milwaukee Goodwill Industries, organized by the Methodist Church there. Here she has helped teach scores of people, handicapped as she once was, to become useful again through the repair and making of many kinds "from shoes and coats to chairs and pianos." Hundreds of people are "gotten on their feet again," both physically and economically through the Industries. And Mrs. Hansen, as a block leader, has urged her neighbors to salvage metals and fats and furniture. Meanwhile she has "adopted" three orphan soldiers and writes to them daily.

Encouraged by the fact that a number of Indian young women are preparing themselves to teach in rural areas of India, Miss Aileen B. Hakin, Indian principal of the Nur Nivass School, Hissar, India, says: "I hope the school will not fail in meeting the needs of the rural church. It is very hopeful when we see girls going back to their villages to take responsibility. One girl who completed her middle school course here and took teachers' training at Ambala, is in charge of one of the village schools. Another is in training at Muttra with the intention of coming back into village work."

"Thoroughbred half-breed bantam chicks are good to eat and people are eating them like quail," said Dick Stokes, III, chicken fancier and specialist in bantam squabs. The versatile and enterprising radio announcer and miniature chicken specialist is mopping up on sales of his young bantams for frying and broiling.

"Game chickens know they were created to fight. Bantams instinctively know that their taste as good as quail, are just as tender, and they will walk right up to their owner to be slaughtered to fry or broil," he said. Stokes has one bantam rooster nine years old who is the patriarch of the flock.

WACs Reach Naples. Naples, May 31 - (AP) - The largest contingent of WACs ever sent to the Mediterranean theater - 32 officers and 357 enlisted women - has arrived in Naples direct from the United States.

Women IN THE CHURCH by Mary Fowler

Miss Azalia Peet, former missionary to Japan, has organized what is thought to be the first church in a labor camp operating under the War Food Administration. The church, known as the Boice Valley Community Church, was formed on Easter Sunday with 31 charter members at Nyssa, Oregon. Many others in the camp are said by Miss Peet to be "Christian in interest, if not in their affiliations." Included in the congregation was a truckload of Christian friends who drove 92 miles to attend the service. Two carloads were from Ontario.

When Mrs. Helen Hansen of Milwaukee, Wis., fell down stairs ten years ago and injured her spine, physicians feared she would never walk again. But she taught herself to walk by pushing a weighted chair in front of her, and, although her left hand is still not normal, she has regained its use by patiently squeezing sand through her fingers for hours at a time. Today Mrs. Hansen is promoting the activities of the Milwaukee Goodwill Industries, organized by the Methodist Church there. Here she has helped teach scores of people, handicapped as she once was, to become useful again through the repair and making of many kinds "from shoes and coats to chairs and pianos." Hundreds of people are "gotten on their feet again," both physically and economically through the Industries. And Mrs. Hansen, as a block leader, has urged her neighbors to salvage metals and fats and furniture. Meanwhile she has "adopted" three orphan soldiers and writes to them daily.

Encouraged by the fact that a number of Indian young women are preparing themselves to teach in rural areas of India, Miss Aileen B. Hakin, Indian principal of the Nur Nivass School, Hissar, India, says: "I hope the school will not fail in meeting the needs of the rural church. It is very hopeful when we see girls going back to their villages to take responsibility. One girl who completed her middle school course here and took teachers' training at Ambala, is in charge of one of the village schools. Another is in training at Muttra with the intention of coming back into village work."

In Detroit the last major strike came to an end today as employees of Parke, Davis & Co. voted to end their nine-day walkout at midnight tonight.

Striking bakery drivers in the Michigan metropolis yesterday voted to resume bread deliveries. About 1,000 drivers walked out a week ago to support demands for wage increases. Bakeries in Decatur and Pana, Ill., resumed production at 80 A. M. and returned to work after a five-day walkout.

A second strike in Detroit also ended last night when 1,500 employees of the Federal Mogul Company returned to work after staying away from their jobs for five days.

Bread supplies were scarce in Toledo and Cincinnati, Ohio, as the strike of employees of shops supplying about 75 per cent of the market continued.

There also was no immediate indication of a settlement of a controversy which slowed production at the American Steel and wire Company plant at Worcester, Mass. About 3,600 workers were away from their jobs, apparently not heeding a plea by CIO union leaders to return to work.
