## Fifth Army Captures Important Seaport Above Rome

### Nazi Forces Are Fleeing In Disorder

Port Of Civitavecchia, 38 Miles Northwest of Rome, Braccinno, 20 Miles North Of Rome, And A Score Of Other Towns Taken By Swiftly Advancing Allies

Rome, June 8. — (AP) — Allied armored forces driving steadily against fleeing enemy troops west of the Tiber today captured Civita Castellana, strategic highway and rail junction 32 miles north of Rome, after other Fifth army units had seized Civitavecchia, Rome's principal seaport 38 miles northwest of the Eternal City.

Civita Castellana is a junction of three highways, and also of electric railways to Rome and Viterbo. Other Fifth army units, speeding in a more northerly direction, captured the town of Braccinno, 20 miles north of Rome, on the west shore of the large lake of the same name. Still another column was last reported passing the lake on the east side, 15 miles north of Rome.

The Germans still appeared to be withdrawing in a bad state of demoralization, without any indication yet available as to when they might turn and attempt a determined stand.

An official spokesman declared "the battered remnants of the German army are in a considerable state of disorganization. Upwards of 40 Wehrmacht formations are represented in the collection of prisoners taken in the exodus from Rome and beyond. Apparently even battalions are attaching themselves to whatever higher echelon is available."

Allied forces driving due north of Rome captured Field Marshal Albert Kesselring's former headquarters, about three miles southeast of Civita Castellana.

The headquarters, described as "elaborate, tunneled underground stronghold," was put under a strong guard.

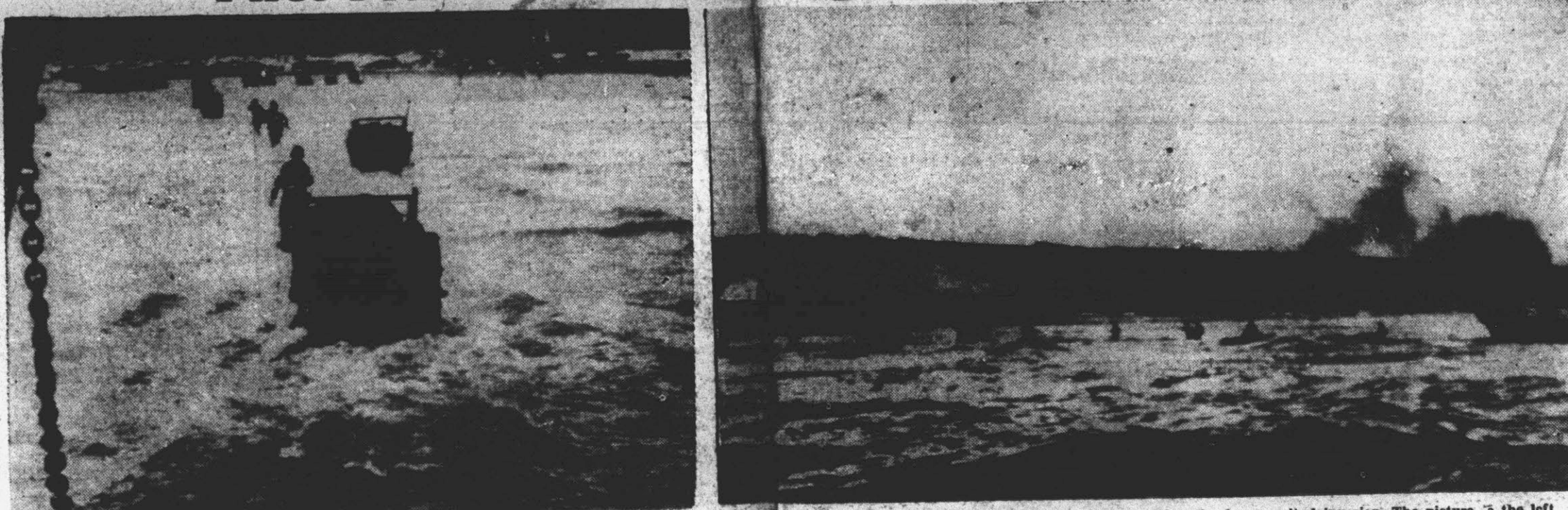
The drive on Civita Castellana, about 25 miles northeast of Rome, made rapid progress up highway three and an official report that reconnaissance elements encountered some opposition west of the town indicated it might be by-passed first.

The Eighth army, meanwhile, punched into the Tiber valley above Rome and forged northward along the east bank of the river.

Gen. Sir Oliver Leese's men captured "the important town of Monterotondo, 12 miles northeast of Rome, and the same distance northwest of Tivoli, and the nearby towns of Sant' Angelo, Romano, Guidonia, and Martana. Guidonia is valuable because it has an air field.

Farther to the east the Eighth army captured Subiaco, about eight miles south of the main highway running across the Italian peninsula from Rome to the Adriatic, and (Continued on page two)

### NEW GAINS IN PACIFIC WAR

Americans Seize Airfield; Airmen Blast Jap Bases

Gen. Douglas MacArthur owned an airbase today within bomber range of the Philippines—the Allies' first since Japan's steamroller crushed them back against Australia early in the Pacific war.

Toughened American invaders of Biak, largest island of the Schouten group off Dutch New Guinea, outsmarted the Japanese defenders to grab Mokmer airfield after 12 days of savage fighting. Mokmer is only 880 miles southeast of the Philippines.

Announcement of the Yanks' Mokmer triumph highlighted Japanese setbacks in every Pacific theater except central China where fierce Chinese resistance was being overcome around Changsha.

This key Hankow-Canton railway center in Hunan province was being spearheaded slowly by six Japanese spearheads in a drive to split China from North to south.

But the Chinese pressed ahead of the Salween river front in their thrust through Yunnan province toward Burma where other Allied forces are fighting to link the Burma and Ledo roads. In India, Allied troops pursued Japanese fleeing the Kohima area.

American fliers, striking from central Pacific bases, carried new attacks to Guam, prewar U. S. na- (Continued on Page Four)

### Aerial Losses

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, June 8. — (AP) — The latest compilation of aerial losses since the beginning of the invasion showed 177 Allied planes missing and at least 174 enemy planes destroyed. Losses reported today, covering the yesterday's operations, totaled 104, including 29 British heavy bombers failing to return from night missions, two American heavy bombers, and 48 American fighters and fighter-bombers.

### Seventeen Die In Plane Crash

San Diego, Calif., June 8. — (AP) — Names of 17 men killed in a navy Liberator bomber crash at the Camp Kearny auxiliary air station on Kearny mesa yesterday were reported tonight by the 11th naval district.

Twelve navy men also were injured in the accident.

The injured included Aviation Machinist Mate Dudley Stallings, Smithfield, N. C., RFD 2.

Potato Buyers  
Raleigh, June 8. — (AP) — The Office of Food Distribution has placed buyers on eastern Carolina potato markets.

The OFD, the department said, has begun buying the size B potatoes at \$1.15, a hundred pounds, loaded in cars.

### Park Committee Makes Its Report

The park and the park program sponsored and directed by the American Legion Auxiliary the past two months has become a part of the two months operation by the Auxiliary the organization was able to give to its community a project which cannot be measured in terms of dollars and cents, but a business man would easily figure the value to be no less than \$500.

### Nazis Say Drive Is Under Way

Report Unconfirmed By Moscow; Red Communique Says Germans Stopped In Push Near Iasi

London, June 8. — (AP) — DNB in a Berlin broadcast today announced that the Russians had launched an offensive on a broad front in the sector of Iasi, Romania.

A broadcast Romanian communique said "heavy fighting is in progress."

There was no confirmation immediately from Moscow, but a new offensive on the Russian front has been expected to put new pressure on Germany's east while American and British forces are attacking in France and Italy.

Last night's Moscow communique said German attacks north of Iasi have "diminished considerably," indicating the Germans may have been stopped in a push which they announced earlier.

Red troops counter-attacking in the Moldavian province succeeded in capturing two heights from the Nazis, a broadcast communique said.

From May 30 to June 6 the Germans lost more than 10,000 dead in the savage fighting near Iasi, and suffered heavily through destruction of equipment, Moscow asserted.

A Berlin broadcast agreed the battle had ended, but asserted at least several rifle divisions had been "wiped out or decisively mauled."

The Russian communique said minor actions had been fought northwest of Tirospol on the lower

Dniestr end near Vitebsk in White Russia.

Moscow, June 8. — (AP) — Russian newspapers reported on all phases of the invasion of France today, carrying maps and pictures of barges and tanks—exceptional coverage of an operation by the Allies.

"Russian infantry will march soon across German land," Red Star promised. Ivestia observed that Pierre Laval should be sad "because he has to be hanged on the first lamp post."

### President May Veto Price Bill

Washington, June 8. — (AP) — Presidential veto of the price and wage control extension bill was considered a possibility today after the Senate voted to relieve merchants of damage liability in consumer suits if they prove that charged ceiling price violations were unintentional.

Senator Murdock (D-Utah) viewed in the Senate action an apparent trend toward amending the stabilization law which expires June 30, and said that if the trend continued and the act is weakened "Congress, instead of controlling prices and wages, will be supervising inflation."

With the grand assault on embattled Germany, however, Allied representatives can argue that the possibility of a German attack on Sweden is negligible, and can force the argument to a decision.

Inssofar as future Nazi blows are concerned, the facts which apply to Sweden may apply to Turkey, and it would not be surprising if now the Turks should act.

### War In Europe

The Allies advanced deeper into the base of the Cherbourg peninsula today in a violent tank-infantry battle, and the Germans asserted that Russia had launched a broad offensive north of Iasi in the most ambitious military squeeze in all history.

On yet a third front in Italy, the broken remnants of two German armies were in route 38 miles above Rome. The Allied armies invading France and the Russians, north of the old Romanian rail center of Iasi were 1,300 miles apart; other Russians in the western Ukraine were within 1,150 miles of Caen, which the Americans and British in France have invested. Troops in Italy were 660 miles from Caen.

London, June 8. — (AP) — The Allied command in an appeal broadcast over the Brazzaville radio tonight asked Norwegian, Danish, Belgian, Dutch and French fishermen not to fish off their coasts between now and June 15 lest they "hamper Allied operations."

### Phillips Says Everything OK

Mrs. E. E. Rawl has just received a letter from her son Lt. H. Matt Phillips, written since he and three companions recently were rescued from under the very noses of the Japs 20 miles from the Jap Pacific base of Ponape.

Last Saturday's Associated Press story reported that Phillips and three companions had been rescued after spending two days on a life-raft following a crash landing of their Mitchell bomber in the sea after Phillips had piloted his plane on a successful bombing mission over Ponape.

Lt. Phillips' letter revealed that the plane was shot down and that two members of his crew were killed. He stated that he and the other survivors were now in a rest camp and were recuperating from their ordeal satisfactorily. He said that he escaped without any serious injuries.

### Rocket Ships Are Effective

New York, June 8. — (AP) — Rocket ships used in the invasion of France "discharge vast quantities of explosives onto beaches much more quickly than has ever been done by a warship," the British Information Service said today. Use of the rocket ships was disclosed at Allied expeditionary headquarters.

"The rocket ships were developed as a result of experience in the Dieppe raid," the British agency said. "The actual destruction they cause is not so great as in normal bombardment since there is no splinter, but a blast from these weapons has a terrific effect on the morale of personnel anywhere near the receiving end. Great navigational skill is needed to bring these ships to the place of action."

The ships were described as a new secret British naval weapon.

### GIVES REPORT ON CASUALTIES

Dead, Wounded And Missing In Italian Campaign 57,529

Washington, June 8. — (AP) — Secretary of War Stimson reported today that a recent three-day period of heavy fighting preceding the fall of Rome cost American forces in Italy 2,379 casualties.

American casualties in the Italian campaign from the landings last September to May 30 amounted to 57,529, Stimson said.

Of these 9,964 were killed, 38,554 wounded and 9,011 missing.

From the start of the war, army and navy casualties total 217,131, an increase of 10,994 since a report on May 25. Stimson said that army casualties up to May 21 totaled 171,358. This was an increase of 10,245 since his previous report.

Of the new army casualty total, 28,952 were killed, 68,779 wounded, 40,864 missing and 33,543 prisoners of war.

Navy casualties reported up to today amount to 45,773 of which 19,802 were killed, 12,253 wounded, 9,256 missing and 4,462 prisoners of war.

The three-day period referred to by Stimson was May 27 to 30, inclusive, the time of the breakthrough on the Volturno-Volturne line south of Rome in the Alban hills. The 2,379 casualties were made up of 278 killed, 1,644 wounded and 457 missing.

### Allies Drive Deeper Into Nazi Europe

Eisenhower Says First Phase Of Invasion Successful; Tanks And Infantry Smash On Beyond Captured Bayeux; Bombers Disrupt Counter-Attack Movement

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, June 8. — (AP) — Allied invasion troops, over the first hurdle of winning footholds in France and buttressed by reinforcements, threw back repeated Nazi armored counterthrusts today, fought inland beyond Bayeux and menaced bomb-blasted Caen.

German broadcasts indicated a developing Allied pincer drive to the west to chop off the tip of the Normandy peninsula and its prize port of Cherbourg, and placed the Allied wings below Cherbourg only 20 miles apart.

American, Canadian and British troops rattled all the German counterblows—forerunners of heavier smashes yet to come—and were "getting along" all along the battlefield, a dispatch from 21st army group headquarters said.

The first phase of invasion, "which might be said to be securing a foothold and defeating local German reserves," has been "accomplished," Supreme Headquarters announced.

The Allies now are beginning the second stage of defeating Nazi "tactical reserves," and still ahead is the third task of crushing "strategic reserves" perhaps massing already for a strong counterblow.

Specific directions and progress in today's fighting were not disclosed, but headquarters announced that medium bombers had struck heavily at the town of Caen, 16 miles southeast of Bayeux, starting fires. The Allies have plunged near Caen, nine miles inland on the peninsula's base.

Prime Minister Churchill said Tuesday that there was fighting in Caen, perhaps referring to paratroopers who had reached there. Nazi counterblows near Caen were repulsed yesterday, headquarters said.

Tactical reserves consist of forces immediately at Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's disposal—the full forces of the seventh and 15th armies which now are in process of engaging the Allies, as well as the German army group in the south of France.

Strategic reserves would consist of the whole German army as the Germans might move in from anywhere outside the battle region—from Germany itself or other theaters.

American heavy bombers blasted railway installations at Rennes, Laval, Tours, Le Mans, Nantes and Angers, in support of the beachhead forces, flying out 750 to 1,000 strong, a German broadcast, totally without confirmation, said 1,300 soldiers used to rush in a huge air-borne army, had been destroyed or captured.

## The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The great (and undoubtedly bloody) battle which is boiling up from the Allied invasion of the Cherbourg peninsula shows increasing signs of becoming an exceptional game of wits between these old rivals of the North African desert. Field Marshal Rommel and General Montgomery—two of the fastest thinking and quickest acting tacticians the war has produced.

One is prone to regard all battles as chess games—but the rule doesn't hold. Many are won by overwhelming strength without any finesse, as witness Hitler's early victories when he rode roughshod over a helpless Europe. But the battle of the peninsula will turn in no small degree on the acumen of those great soldiers, Montgomery and Rommel.

Already the German local counter-attacks are under way and there's fierce fighting. However, Rommel seems to be moving cautiously. Of course, before he rushes a big army to the peninsula he must be sure that this is one of the major Allied thrusts and not merely a feint to draw his fire while the main attack is made elsewhere. Still, one feels that he's holding his hand pending the moment when he can

do the most damage. That may account in part for the lack of German air power on D-day. The greatly depleted Luftwaffe is being held in reserve for crucial battles.

Rommel undoubtedly would like to get a big Allied force farther inland before his major counter-attack. He's an exponent of tank action and favors conditions under which he can make quick maneuvers. He may try to force an open battle. That will suit Montgomery—providing the Allies have been able to put ashore sufficient men and equipment. It's a race against time.

Well, we should know more about it in another week or so, if the Allies continue to develop their landing. Apparently they're aiming to cut the whole peninsula off, thereby securing a superb base, made to order with the great port of Cherbourg and a main railroad and highways leading to Paris.

The Allied capture of the strategic rail and highway center of Bayeux, five miles inland from the central Normandy coast—a coup which Allied headquarters labels as "very important news"—will do much to expedite the conquest of the whole peninsula, and that means an advance deeper into France.

## Expect Invasion To Have Great Effect On Neutrals

Washington, June 8. — (AP) — Allied invasion forces are cracking the diplomatic as well as the military defenses of Hitler Europe.

Officials said today that major changes in the positions of neutral nations may be expected as soon as several skeptical bystanders are convinced the Allies are winning this campaign and are going to win the war.

This should occur within 10 days or two weeks when the main Allied armies and the enemy's strategic reserves have clashed in the climactic engagement of the invasion.

After that it should cease to be an invasion and become instead a land campaign aimed at destruction of German military strength and conquest of the German nation.

The fact that the battle on the beaches was won Tuesday without terrific losses is understood to have shaken severely the position of those neutral leaders who have not yet been convinced of the certainty of Allied victory.

Notable among these are reported to be Generalissimo Francisco Franco of Spain and ranking military men in Finland. Franco, despite the record of restrained conduct which won him Prime Minister

Churchill's "kindly words," has doubted all along that Germany could be compelled to unconditional surrender. He insisted on making a compromise deal on wolfram shipments to the Reich. Now he may be put under pressure to halt all trade with Germany.

## Today On The Home Front

Washington, June 8. — (AP) — Six years ago Rudolf Flesch was a lawyer in Vienna. His knowledge of English was the kind you'd pick up in a European capital.

Today at 33 he works for OPA, but not as a lawyer. He writes back into everyday English the English written by OPA lawyers.

The lawyers write regulations. Flesch re-writes those regulations. Here is an OPA lawyer's explanation of an "ultimate consumer" of eggs:

"Ultimate consumer means a person or group of persons, generally constituting a domestic household, who purchase eggs generally at the individual stores of retailers or purchase and receive deliveries of eggs at the place of abode of the individual or domestic household from producers or retail route sellers and who use such eggs for their consumption as food."

Flesch re-writes that to read: "Ultimate consumers are people who buy eggs to eat them."

When Hitler went into Vienna in 1938, Flesch came to this country. He went to the Columbia University Library school on a scholarship. He did research work. Columbia gave him a doctor of philosophy degree for a study of readability. He has worked out what he says

is a scientific test of sentences for their readability. Using census figures, he says, the average adult reader has had about 8 1/2 years of schooling. His tests are applied with that average reader in mind.

To reach that average reader with the written word, Flesch says, sentences should not average more than 17 words in length. They should be simple, not long or involved. They should not have many prepositional phrases or dependent clauses.

To create human interest and therefore hold the readers interest, sentences should have a generous sprinkling of personal references, like the names of people, or words like mother and father, or words like I, me, you, your, he, she, it, they, them.

So, he writes: "The seller can determine the price. Write it: 'You' (Continued on page four)

# TEACHERS GET BOOST IN PAY

## Increases For Other Employees Temporarily Denied

Raleigh, June 8—(AP)—The State Board of Education today temporarily postponed a proposal to increase salaries of employees of the Department of Public Instruction and the controller's office, and voted to distribute approximately \$400,000 in salary revisions to building principals and teachers.

Building principals are those in charge of schools with six teachers or more. Those who have been in the same school for six months during the last school year.

The increases, amounting to \$2 a month for each teacher and building principal, are retroactive to last July 1.

Authority for the increased pay was granted in the 1943 school machinery act.

The proposal to increase the pay of departmental employees was opposed by State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson, who said such an adoption would be quickly followed by similar requests from other state departments. If certain experienced employees are entitled to increases under an emergency, then the matter should be considered case by case, Johnson said. The schedule would have allowed some salaries to be raised as much as \$1,000 a year.

The proposal was contained in a report by the board's finance committee, which had been instructed to prepare it.

The motion by which it was postponed provided that board members be given copies by the next meeting, July 6.

Salaries of about every employee of the Department of Public Instruction and the controller's office, except the heads of these two departments, would have been increased under the drafted proposal. Whereas the heads of some sub-departments now are limited to a top salary of \$3,600 a year, they would have been boosted to \$4,500. They along with their subordinates, also would be given new titles.

The board also adopted two recommendations of the controller.

"The average daily attendance for the best continuous six months for the eighth grade pupils for 1943-44 shall be added to the average daily attendance of the high school which these pupils shall attend in order to determine the number of teachers to be allotted for the eighth grade and the high school combined."

"Schools having fully established 12th grade for the term 1944-45 and whose eleventh grade pupils were not awarded diplomas from high school for the year 1943-44 may elect toward the teacher allotment for the year 1944-45 those pupils returning to high school for the regular twelfth grade, provided such pupils are enrolled in at least three regular major subjects."

## Weather Held Back Crops Other Years

Old Man Weather is having a lot to do about the growing crops in the fields this year. All crops are away to a late start, but there have been years in which they were away to an even later start.

At this time it is estimated that the stand of tobacco in Pitt county is about 85 per cent. The success of the crop depends on whether or not we get some rain and get it early. Looking over crop records for a score of years, there have been those in which all crops were late starting. "There were years when summer came early and every crop had to be crowded out and held back by rain and wet ground," said Kinchen Cobb, tobaccoist, farmer and community booster, after some rides over the country side observing crops.

Farmers have worked their hearts out resetting tobacco, frequently being forced to neglect other crops. Tobacco in the fields now is almost standing still except in those areas where local showers have brought relief.

Floyd F. Hendrix, county farm agent, estimates that the tobacco stand is about 85 per cent. When asked if insect pests are bothering the farmers, Hendrix said chinchbugs are doing some damage, but reminded that there are ways for farmers to fight the pest. Chinchbugs, he said, feed on native grasses. They infest the small grain fields and migrate to other crops and they suck at the bottom of the stalks until the plant withers and dies or is not productive. The federal Department of Agriculture is providing limited quantities of Di-Nitro-Dust to make barriers against chinchbugs migrating from crop to crop. Farmers whose crops are infested by this pest should consult the county farm agent.

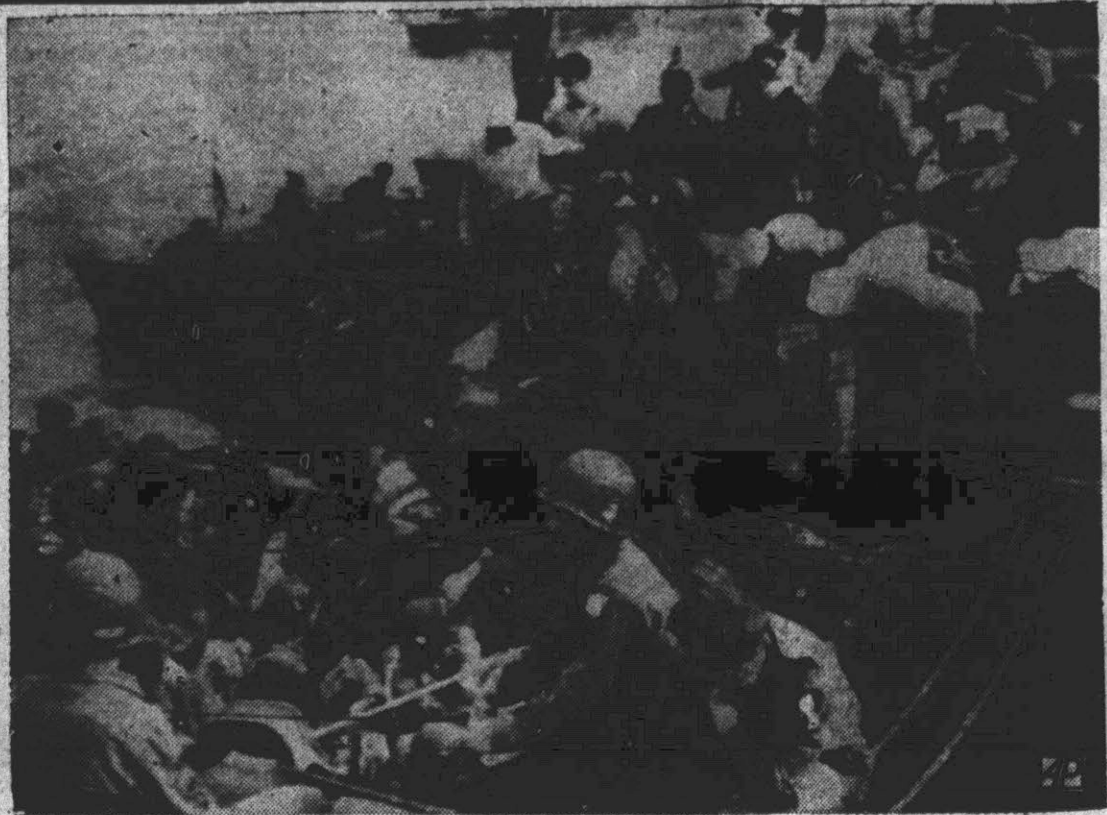

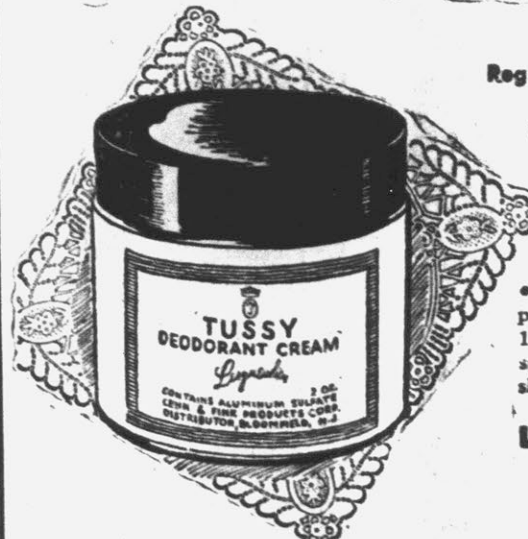

### THE CONFLICT IS CONTINUOUS

A few weeks ago I sat in a college chapel listening to the student choir as they sang a beautiful anthem. As the closing notes died away there was the sound of an airplane passing overhead. The roar of its propellers created a positive discord following the sweet melody of the anthem.

It was hard to escape the conclusion that modern materialism is out of tune with things spiritual. This does not mean that there is anything wrong with airplanes; but it does mean that as our life becomes more accustomed to the ease and speed of modern inventions, the more indifferent do people become to the pressing needs of the spirit. Today young men in military life are thinking about God with a seriousness which they would probably not have manifested had their lives been lived without interruption in the routine of civilian life. It is a well-known fact that out of periods of persecution and times of strife and suffering have often come the finest expressions of Christian faith.

So the hum of the airplane which created a most unpleasant discord at the very end of the beautiful anthem was illustrative of what is happening in modern life. Things spiritual and things material very often do not blend together harmoniously. Materialism still continues to jeopardize spiritual aspiration.

## WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

San Francisco—Not since Pecos Bill rode into camp on a mountain lion, using a live rattlesnake for a quirt, or since Paul Bunyan arrived to shake down San Francisco, using big redwoods for toothpicks, has the west had a hero like Henry J. Kaiser.

In California and the rest of the Pacific coast, the big, burly industrial magnate is a miracle man. He strides up and down the coast from Seattle to San Diego, hops off to the nation's capital and gives the industrial east a piece of his mind, and returns to find the west hanging on his every word.

Kaiser's reputation is based on fabulous accomplishment. A whole network of production from raw materials in the western hinterlands to finished ships and super planes stems from his four floors of central offices in midtown Oakland just across the bay. Industrial California has mushroomed in a couple of years until only production centers like Detroit, Pittsburgh and Chester, Pa., can claim any comparison.

But if Henry J. Kaiser stopped there, the Pacific coast probably would be relegating him to limbo. He doesn't. The west has one great worry. It's simply what's going to happen when this is all over. California alone has added more than a million population since the last census and billions of dollars in wartime contracts. Kaiser is operating five huge shipyards in the San Francisco bay area, to mention only one section. Once sprawling little Richmond, for example, had about 20,000 population. Now it has about 100,000.

Communities and states like these that don't look ahead are living in a fool's paradise and most Pacific coasters know it. The thing that makes Henry J. Kaiser the fabled character that he is out here is that he has answers for everything.

Perhaps you've already heard of Kaiser's post-war plans for building supercargo and passenger planes for high-speed travel to replace the rolling stock rapidly shaking to pieces under the pressure of wartime transportation.

Kaiser doesn't stop there. There is hardly a fortnight that he doesn't come out with some new scheme for keeping the west in the industrial picture and the west gobbling it up—simply because it is positive that what Henry Kaiser has done over and over again in wartime, he can do once more in peacetime.

What makes California credulous is that Kaiser makes it sound so easy and in the past has never fail-

ed to make good his words. If the industrial east wants to stay that way it had better start figuring how to beat Kaiser to the draw. Ten or 15 million people out here think he's the fastest man on earth.

With Mokmer secured, the Yanks mounted a new assault toward Biak's other airfields—Borokoe, two miles west and a mile inland, and Orido, three and one-half miles west on the coast.

stabbed up on a lateral road which had been one of the main German lines of retreat.  
Around Salisburgo, the last of an ancient Benedictine monastery, enemy tanks and infantry put up a stiff scrap and the line of advance for armored units was held to the road, which was cratered by demolitions. The villages of Venne and

Vallepietra were occupied in this area.  
Enemy transport withdrawing toward Avezzano in the Apennines from Balsorano was shelled heavily, and 11 German Mark Five Panther tanks were found.

Near the Adriatic flank, Eighth army troops followed up the withdrawing Germans, gaining two to three miles to reach the outskirts of the towns of Barrea, Pasco-stanza and Rivisondoli in the direction of Sulmano, birthplace of Ovid.

The capture of Civitavecchia, whose population is approximately 36,000, gives the Allies a valuable port, which has been enlarged greatly in recent years.

Between 250 and 500 Fortresses and Liberators yesterday pounded rail lines on the French Riviera, the port of Livorno, the Voltri shipyards west of Genoa, and the Savona rail yards.

Fighter bombers continued to hammer the retreating enemy columns, destroying or damaging at least 384 vehicles.

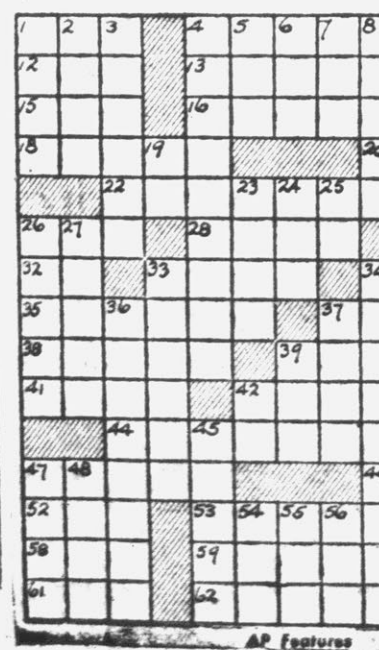
The Mediterranean air force flew over 1,800 sorties yesterday, during the course of which medium bombers hit rail and road bridges in the west coastal areas north of Rome. Last night objectives were attacked near Orvieto, 60 miles northwest of Rome. Three aircraft were listed as missing.

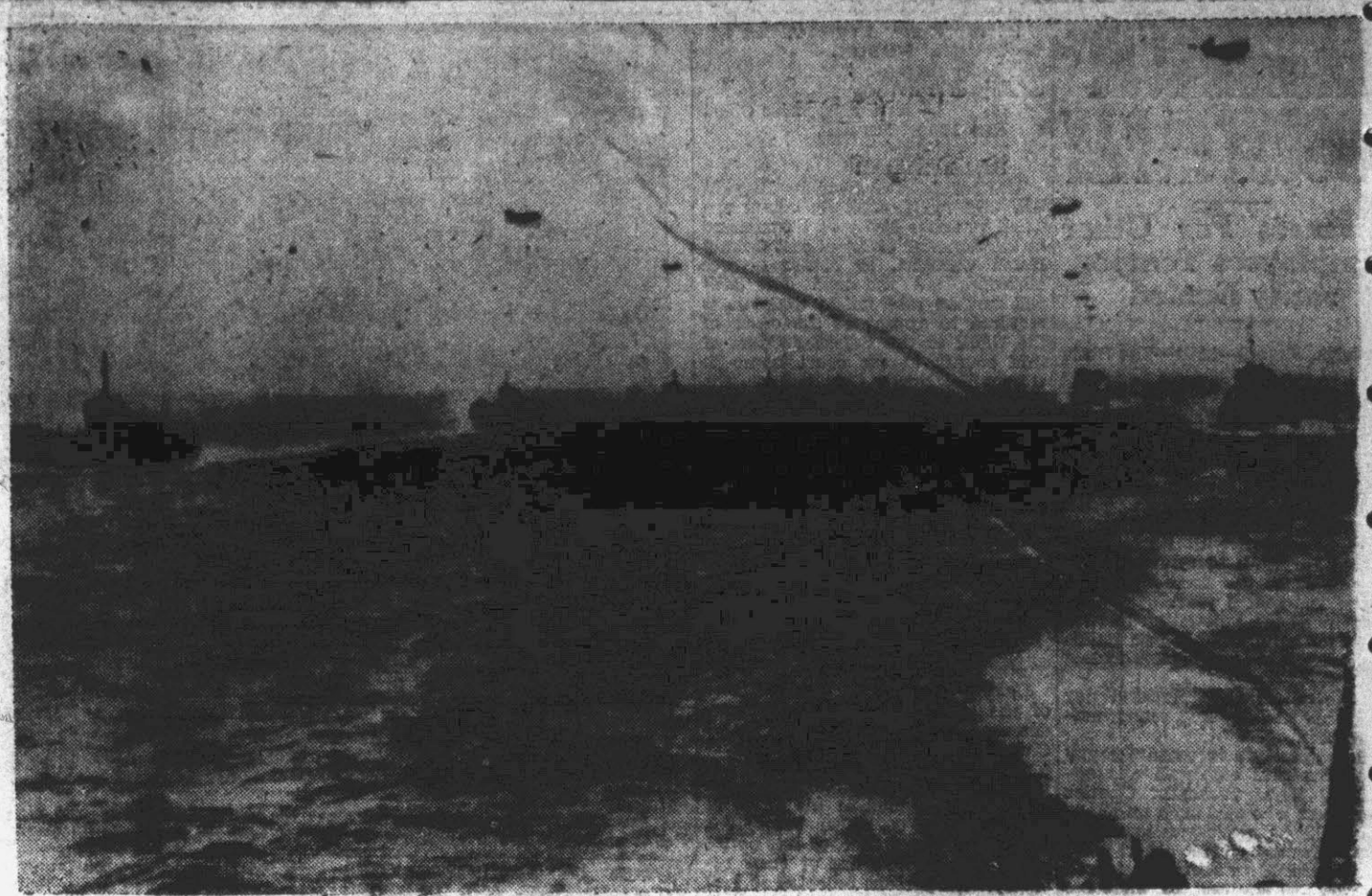

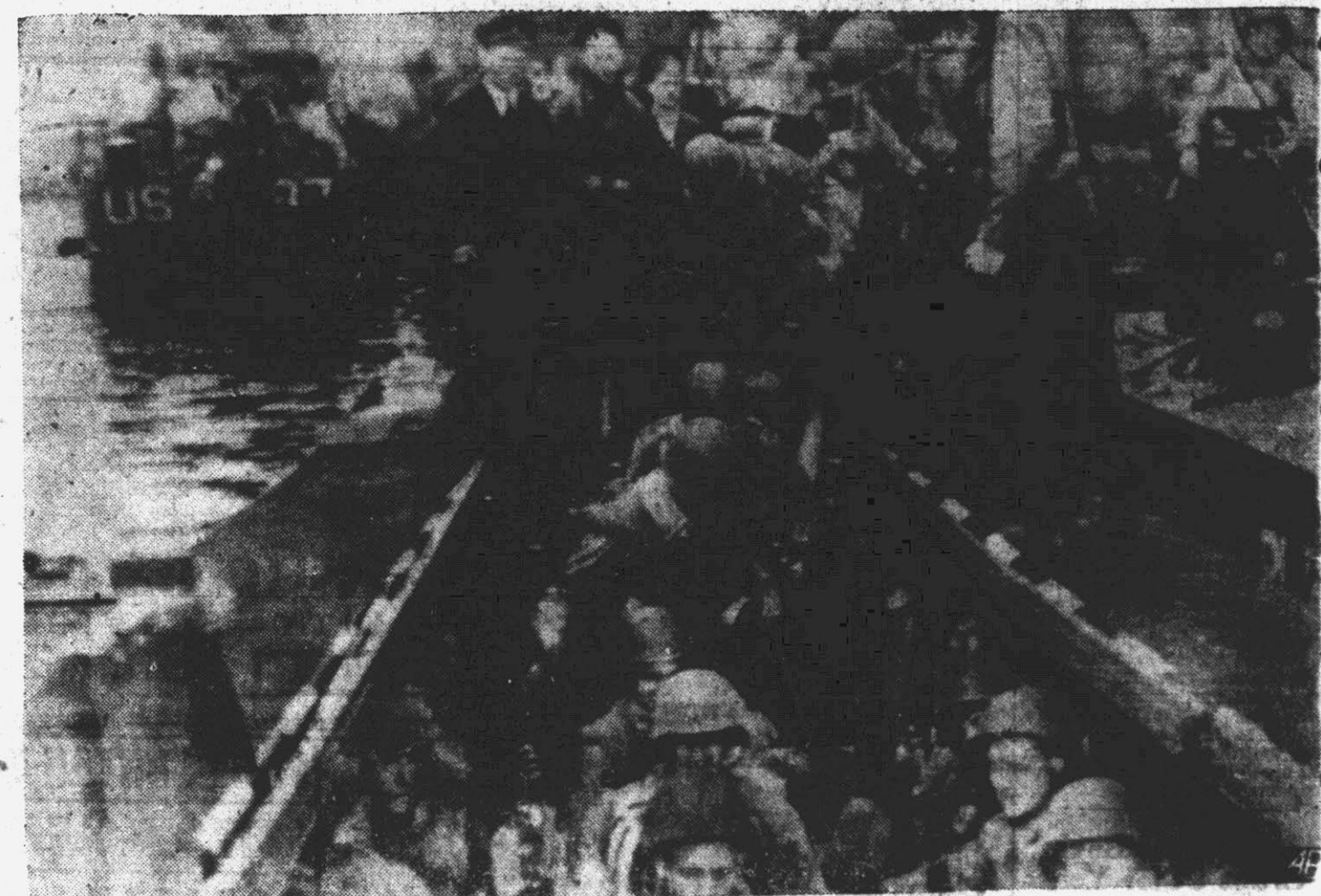

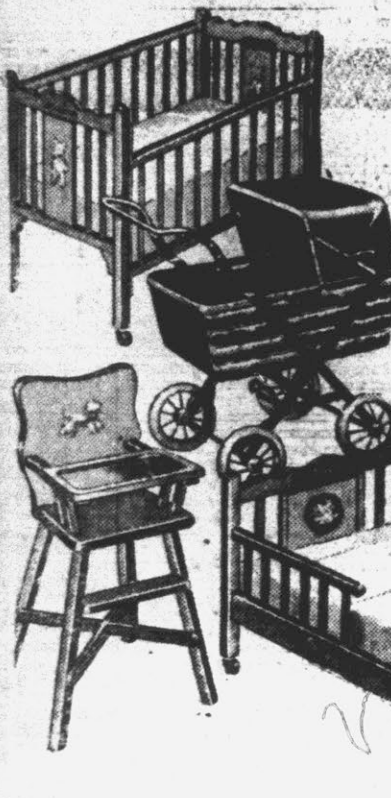

railway between Paris and Cherbourg, 45 miles to the northwest, and opened the way for a thrust deeper inland.

But farther west the Germans pictured Allied forces already within 20 miles of a junction that would choke off Cherbourg itself. Berlin declared house-to-house fighting raged in Ste. Mere-Eglise, 20 miles southeast of the port, and said paratroopers had landed on the west coast only a score of miles southwest of Ste. Mere-Eglise.

There was no Allied confirmation of west coast landings or of fighting at Ste. Mere-Eglise, one of the two main roads to Cherbourg. Heavy battles, with tanks and reserves sped up by both sides, flared over the peninsula. Allied beachhead troops are linking up with airborne forces dropped deeper inland, headquarters said, and improvement in adverse weather aided reinforcements from glider sky trains.

Field reports declared British-Canadian troops had captured a number of French towns and villages, advancing on open roads to points some miles from the coast. Infantrymen rode up to battle on bicycles and tanks to speed the advance.

A Berlin broadcast said British troops pushed through Bayeux early today and are advancing southwest toward the Vire river, which cuts across the peninsula.

On the third day of the invasion, Supreme Commander Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared:

"My complete confidence in the ability of the Allied armies, navies and air forces to do all they are asked to do has been completely justified."

Eisenhower declared the ground troops are "performing magnificently," praised the naval landing operations as surpassing any other amphibious operation he has seen, and lauded the "long and brilliant" campaign that proved such effective preparation for landings.

Powerful air armadas scourged German defenses today, with 750 to 1,000 Flying Fortresses and Liberators mauling bridges, railroad targets and airfields in an area 100 to 150 miles south of the beachheads, and U. S. Marauders starting fires

in Caen, southeast of Bayeux, toward which a beachhead force is driving.

Canadian and British troops have captured several hundred prisoners and shot up numerous Nazi 88-millimeter guns, field reports said. Canadian Press Correspondent Ross Munro, with Canadians in an unidentified sector, said the Germans were reported falling back in one area under persistent attacks, and strength is being built up rapidly in the Allied bridgeheads for the big battles which should come any day, or even any hour.

The German high command declared the Allies had opened an attack from the bridgehead between Caen and Bayeux, and that Nazi forces counterattacked. Heavy fighting continues, it added. Berlin said Americans who gained a foothold north of Carentan, some 27 miles southeast of Cherbourg, had suffered heavy casualties. It also claimed successes near the Orne river mouth, above Caen.

A landing attempt in the Bay of St. Martin at the northwest tip of the peninsula, near Cap de la Hague, was frustrated, the enemy high command said.

Engineer troops joined the flood of Allied reinforcements, helping in tearing down Atlantic wall defenses, and a U. S. Ninth Air Force troop carrier report of flying in jeeps and guns disclosed the Allies had captured or built at least one airfield on the peninsula.

"Everything is going excellently," said Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, ground forces commander. It is now apparent the Allies have several beachheads on a 50-mile coastal stretch between Caen and Carentan, with some of them joined together.

Headquarters was silent on Berlin reports that paratroopers in a deep, daring thrust had landed at Falaise and Argentan, 30 miles southeast of Caen, with street fighting flaring in Falaise. The Germans said eight to 13 Allied divisions were fighting on the peninsula.

Thundering naval support of the drive continued, and Allied armies destroyed 102 Nazi planes yesterday. Hungry French villagers greeted liberating troops with flags and kisses.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower used his airborne troops to the fullest and an observer on a ship in the channel said at one time "the sky overhead became unbelievably crowded with aircraft. Four lanes of tow-plane traffic going each way spanned the channel."

The Germans likewise rushed in new strength, and Prime Minister Churchill warned against over-optimism, declaring "enormous exertions lie before us."

Some of the troops have been fighting continuously since Tuesday morning, and it is likely there may be a short lull in advances as they rest, regroup, and bring up supplies.

Supreme headquarters described the capture of Bayeux, five miles inland from the central Normandy coast and first French city to fall.

to the invaders, as "very important news" because it opens up avenues for a new advance deeper into France.

"Progress continues despite determined enemy resistance," said this morning's communique. "Fierce armored and infantry fighting has taken place."

The Germans said new Allied airborne operations were directed against three points on the Brittany peninsula—Lorient, Nantes and St. Briac—and against Falaise and Argentan, adjoining rail junctions 30 miles south of Caen.

Supreme headquarters indicated a firm grip had been won on the Normandy coast.

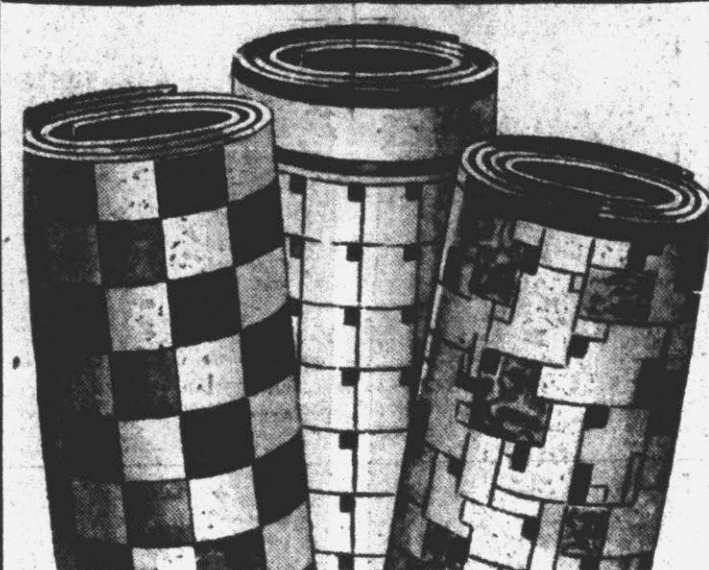
