FOUR JAP SHIPS SUNK, TEN DAMAGED

Nazis Fight Desperately To Hold On At Cherbourg

• Allied Land And Air Forces Unlimber Greatest Attack Since 'D-Day' To Smash Remaining Defenses And Gain Possession Of Prized Port

Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, June 22.—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's forces unlimbered this afternoon their greatest assault since the storming of the beaches of Normandy—a combined land and air attack intended to crack the last defenses of the fortified city of Cherbourg.

The attack began when waves of British and American planes swept in with a terrific aerial barrage lasting 90 minutes, a field dispatch from Associated Press War Correspondent Don Whitehead reported. Rocked back on their heels by the weight of this assault in which light and medium bombers dropped down almost to cannon-mouth level to drop their explosive charges, the Germans were immediately beset by a thunderous artillery pounding which left smoke and flame sweeping the German forts.

American doughboys of Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, drawn up in position tensely waiting the effect of these blows, then swept forward. They last were reported hammering at Fort Du Roule only about 1,500 yards south of the military port, and at Fort Octeville, only slightly farther away to the southwest.

The latest headquarters announcements showed that the concentric attack had virtually split the German garrison into three segments.

Bradley's troops captured St. Pierre Eglise, 8 1/2 miles east of the port and the last road junction leading to Cherbourg from Cape

• Heavy Ship Losses Suffered By Japs

Washington, June 22.—(AP)—Records of announced sinkings of Japanese vessels by American forces showed today that 2,468 enemy craft of all types have been sunk, probably sunk or damaged.

The box score, compiled unofficially from communiques and reports from field headquarters:

Combatant vessels—sunk: battleships 3; carriers 7; cruisers 53; destroyers 141; submarines 14; tenders 5; others 57, total 280. Probably sunk: one aircraft carrier, five cruisers, 20 destroyers, one submarine, one tender, five others, total 32. Damaged: battleships 12; carriers 10; cruisers 104; destroyers 149; submarines 8; tenders 9; others 36, total 328. Grand total combatant vessels, 641.

Non-combatant vessels, sunk: fleet tankers 110; transports 135; cargo-supply 649; miscellaneous 200, total 1,094. Probably sunk: fleet tankers 6; transports 13; cargo-supply 55; miscellaneous 14, total 88. Damaged: fleet tankers 36; transports 44; cargo-supply 339; miscellaneous 226, total 645. Grand total 1,827.

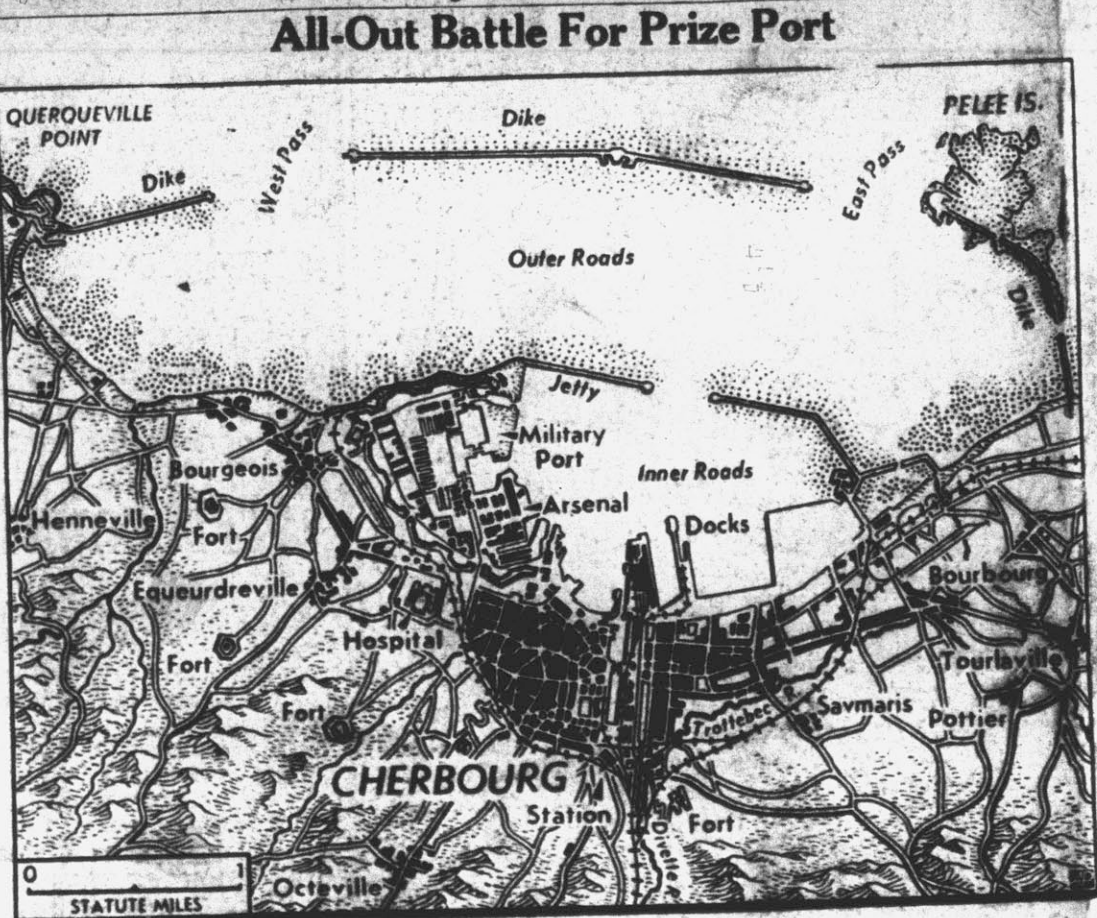
It's grand news from the Pacific today, where we have exacted another payment for Pearl Harbor, but again the Japanese appear to have evaded all efforts to force them into a real struggle.

Our planes have inflicted losses which amount to a severe amputation, but both the communique and a report from Rembert James, AP correspondent with the Fifth fleet, indicate that yesterday's hopes for a real contact battle have gone glimmering.

The navy apparently felt until yesterday that there was chance of further action, and enthusiasm was high. This was sufficient indication of our overwhelming strength, and we might have guessed then that the enemy would get away with all he could.

Earlier reports that the Japanese force consisted of a large portion of the grand fleet proved unfounded, although its strength, prior to the arrival of our planes, was nothing to be sneezed at. But there is nothing to indicate now that it ever had any intention of standing up to Admiral Spruance's force.

The most likely explanation of its

CONGRESS MAY RECESS FRIDAY

Legislative Calendar Being Cleared At Rapid Pace

Washington, June 22.—(AP)—Legislation intended to cancel out the supreme court's opinion that the insurance business is subject to anti-trust laws held the attention of the house today as congress raced to a summer recess.

Three hours of debate were set aside to dispose of the measure, when the prospect that half a dozen departmental supply bills awaiting final action would be sandwiched in.

The legislation is the outgrowth of a case involving federal action against 198 insurance companies accused of conspiracy to fix and maintain arbitrary and non-competitive rates of fire insurance sold in southern states.

Disposed of in a burst of speed yesterday were several appropriation bills, legislation to extend war-

Upheaval In Finnish Government May Be Prelude To Peace Request

(By The Associated Press)

London, June 22.—The Red army hurled masses of men and equipment into two new drives on a broad front north of Lake Ladoga today in an effort to make a quick end of the war with Finland, already reported in the throes of a government upheaval which may be the prelude to a bid for peace.

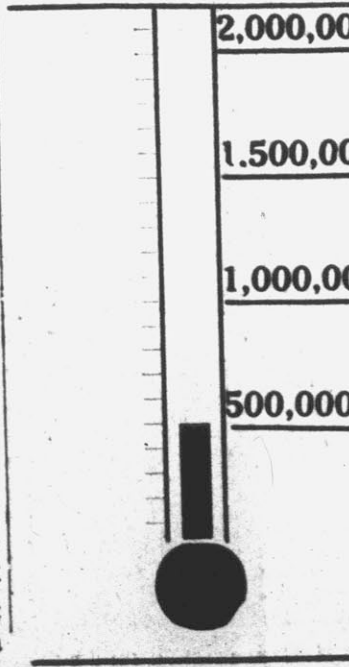
Launching of the drives was announced last night in a Moscow communique, which also disclosed that Soviet forces advancing from captured Viipuri on the Karelian Isthmus south of Lake Ladoga were within 20 miles of the border fixed at the end of the 1939-40 Finnish-Russian war.

The political situation in Helsinki as the Russians intensified pressure on the staggering Finnish army remained obscure, but there were strong indications that the Finnish government was facing a crisis.

A Reuters dispatch from Stockholm said a Finnish peace cabinet had already been selected. An Associated Press Stockholm dispatch said the Swedish paper Svenska Dagbladet declared the Finnish government crisis had been "definitely solved," a phrase interpreted to

ALLIES SCORE NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

• Allied And Italian Troops Drive Toward Important Port Of Ancona On Adriatic Coast

Rome, June 22.—(AP)—Allied and Italian troops are within 32 miles of Ancona, prize Italian port on the Adriatic coast, while Eighth army troops are "approaching Camerino, approximately 35 miles east and a little north of Perugia, Allied headquarters announced today.

American forces to the west have pushed on 15 airline miles northwest of Grosseto. In all land operations, although weather has improved, misty conditions are preventing cross-country movements on a large scale, a communique said.

The advance toward Ancona, ranking next to Venice in port facilities in that coastal sector, was made by troops which have reached Fermo, only 65 airline miles below Rimini, the eastern anchor of the so-called Pisa-Florence-Rimini line, where the fleeing Germans may offer stiff resistance against the Allied drive.

Eighth army troops have also approached Nocera Umbra, 14 miles west of Camerino. Limited gains were made north of the newly-taken ancient fortress city of Perugia, and in the Lake Trasimeno area west of Perugia, despite strong resistance.

A field dispatch from Correspondent Sid Feder said casualties inflicted upon the Germans during the past 41 days of the Allied offensive in Italy were estimated unofficially at between 80,000 and 100,000 killed, wounded and captured. More than 27,000 Nazis have been taken prisoner.

The Mediterranean air force stepped up its activity, making 1,100 individual plane flights in attacking shipping in the Adriatic, battle area targets and a railway at Ventimiglia on the Italian Riviera.

There were no losses. The communique disclosed that in a "spirited naval engagement" in connection with the ousting of the Germans from Elba, light coastal forces torpedoed three loaded enemy lighters attempting to evacuate troops, possibly sank a fourth. In another engagement a single en-

War Survivors Donate To Help The Strikers

New York, June 22.—(AP)—An appeal to workers in war plants not to interrupt the production of fighting implements by striking—coupled with an offer accompanied by \$143 in cash to help pay the wage increase that money-hungry strikers are demanding—was contained in a communication received by the Associated Press marked as coming from "The Crew of the U. S. S. Coos Bay," a seaplane tender, and stamped "Passed by Naval Center."

The communication dated June 10 in care of the Fleet Post Office, San Francisco, referred specifically to "the present strikers of the Wright Aircraft Corporation" and added "please implore them to end their strike and accept our offer to help pay their wage increase which they feel is more important than our lives."

Referring to the strike which lasted from June 5 to June 9 at the Lockland, Ohio, plant of the Wright Aeronautical Corporation, without union authorization, and after being shown by the Associated Press a copy of the Coos Bay letter, R. J. Thomas, president of the United Automobile Workers, CIO, said in Washington:

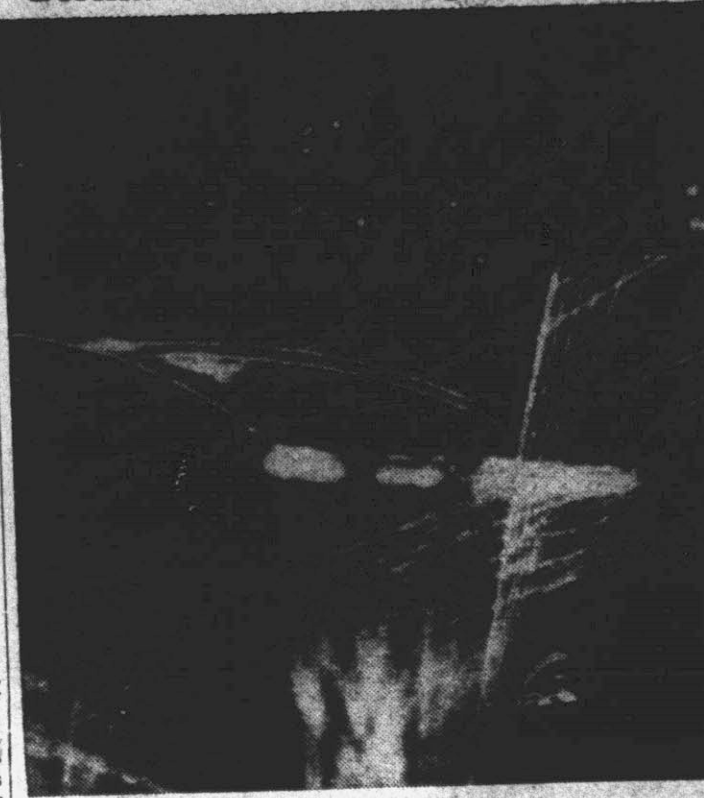
"These men in the armed service have been propagandized, our national office has done everything it possibly can and will continue to do more to stop all such strikes as the Wright strike. No wage issue was involved. It was an anti-Negro issue."

Oil Company Purchases Site At Port Terminal

Facilities For Distribution Of Petroleum Products To Be Erected

The sale of an oil terminal site at the port of Greenville on Tar river to the Purol Company of Chicago was completed yesterday afternoon, it was announced by J. Nat Harrison, chairman, and C. W. Howard, secretary, of the Tar River Port Commission. The property sold has a frontage of 200 feet on Tar river with a depth of 800 feet, and consists of approximately four acres of land.

The Purol Company is now planning for the construction of docks and warehouse facilities, and the erection of storage tanks. Gasoline and petroleum products of all kinds will be transported by inland waterway to the Greenville port, and thence distributed by trucks throughout this entire area for the use and convenience of the public generally.

Water transportation for Greenville was made possible through the untiring efforts of a number of prominent citizens of the community who were aware of the advantages of the inland waterways now serving the entire length of the Atlantic seaboard. For more than 20 years government approval for the dredging of Tar river had been sought, and in 1938 Congress passed a bill sponsored by Hon. Lindsay C. Warren, then representing this district, and \$225,000 for dredging and the necessary annual maintenance costs for upkeep were provided to connect the port of Greenville

Second Primary Next Saturday

Pitt county Democrats will go to the polls Saturday, June 24, to nominate a candidate for the office of State Senator while the voters of Chicod township also will have the opportunity of naming a constable.

Saturday's countywide contest is between Senator J. Con Lanier, present incumbent and Arthur B. Corey, former State Senator from this county.

In a three way race in the first primary in which J. L. Winstead was also a candidate Corey led Lanier by 319 votes. The Chicod township constable race is between Van Mills and John G. Bailey. Mills led Bailey by 32 votes in the first primary in a three way race in which W. A. Buck was the other candidate.

Aircraft Carrier And Three Tankers Sunk; Destroyer Believed Sunk; Carriers, Battleship, Cruiser And Destroyers Damaged; Japs Put To Flight

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, June 22.—(AP)—Carrier planes of the United States Fifth fleet inflicted a smashing defeat on a formidable Japanese naval force trapped Monday off the Philippines, sinking four ships and damaging at least ten before the enemy escaped under cover of night.

The victory, the third great blow since Pearl Harbor against Japan's navy, stemmed from Sunday's great air battle off Saipan island, in which American carrier planes and warship guns shot down 353 enemy aircraft.

Because of this stunning aerial loss, the Japanese fleet, caught between the Marianas and the Philippines, could send up only a handful of interceptors from its five or six carriers. Of these 15 to 20 were shot down. The American loss was 49 planes.

The enemy lost an aircraft carrier and three tankers sunk; possibly a destroyer sunk; and nine or ten ships, including a battleship and cruiser, seriously damaged. Admiral Raymond A. Spruance's Fifth fleet suffered 30 surface vessel losses.

The Japanese fleet, which had nearly a week dodged contact with the American force, protecting the Saipan invasion, turned and fled with all speed toward the Gulf of Iloilo. Nightfall saved it from further battering and there was no indication from Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, who announced the victory today, that the battle had been resumed.

In the Sunday air battle preceding the bigger struggle, American plane losses were 21 against Japan's 353. The Sunday attack represented an arms-length enemy attempt to break up the American invasion of Saipan, principal island of the Marianas and only 1,500 miles from Tokyo and the Philippines.

The Monday action ended a nightfall with the Japanese fleet and there was no indication that the battle had been resumed. Two U. S. carriers and one battleship suffered "superficial damage" and 21 aircraft were lost in combat. A fleet spokesman said "superficial damage means the ship's capacity for battle was not impaired, indicating these three probably participated in Monday's action."

The attack of the 5th fleet under command of Adm. Raymond Spruance was such a complete surprise that the Japanese appeared made no counter attack against our surface units.

Admiral Nimitz, who played his headquarters' part, midnight ceasing battle reports and still appeared bright eyed despite his 55 years, said the Japanese force consisted of four or more battleships or six carriers, five fleet tankers and an unspecified number of cruisers and destroyers.

He listed these casualties inflicted on the enemy:

One carrier, believed to be Zuikaku (17,000 tons) received 1,000 pound bomb hits.

RENEW EFFORT TO STOP DEWEY

Bricker Backers Put On Last Minute Campaign

Chicago, June 22.—(AP)—Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio came to Chicago today to take personal command of a last lap drive for a Republican presidential nomination many party leaders openly conceded to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

The Ohioan hoped to spark a hotel lobby campaign for the support of nearly 500 delegates still undecided in many polls.

The convention, opening Monday, has 1,057 delegates with 529 needed to nominate.

Arriving early, Bricker scheduled a 10:30 a. m. news conference. J. Russell Sprague, New York national committeeman and "Draft Dewey" leader arranged a similar conference 30 minutes later.

Bricker's backers claimed new support with J. Frank McDermond, Attica publisher, reporting the

WITNESSING IN PRISON

Yesterday I recounted the story of a brave Protestant pastor in France who talked back to an army officer. Let us look today at an even more spectacular picture of a brave Catholic priest.

This priest is 88 years old. One day, with a vigor which astonished his congregation, he stood up in his pulpit and, after denouncing the Allies for their many sins and shortcomings, he turned his attention to Germany and the Nazi regime and gave them such a blast that he found himself in a concentration camp before sunset. The underground managed to effect his escape before the next Sunday, and to the amazement of all, including even the Nazi official, he appeared in the pulpit and gave the Eucharist and his gang another blast. Thereafter he was not only sent to a concentration camp but a guard was placed over him all the time, individual guards being changed every eight hours.

This French priest had been born and reared in Alsace and therefore knew German very well. With escape impossible and all his powers failing, he decided that the only thing he could do would be to pray earnestly in the presence of these German guards and to pray in the German language which they understood. This he does a number of times each day, and particularly at the changing of the guard. And it has had such an astounding effect upon the soldiers involved that the Nazis are at their wits end what to do with this troublesome old man.

Parleur isolating the Germans in the northeastern tip of the peninsula. Other troops coming up from the south had entered Cherbourg, a large town near St. Vaast. La Hague on the east coast and 13 miles southeast of Cherbourg.

On the west another spearhead had ironically split the Germans in Cherbourg from those in the northwestern tip of the peninsula by advancing to within half a mile of Cherbourg before the road to Cherbourg was cut off.

Supreme Headquarters said it lacked any knowledge of a reported American ultimatum by field radio to the Cherbourg garrison demanding surrender at 7 a. m. today (3 a. m. EDT). The London Daily Sketch said last night it had recorded such a broadcast.

It was assumed that if the ultimatum was made it was rejected and that Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley had ordered a final attack. Supreme Headquarters said it was possible the field commander might have made the demand in his own authority.

In the center substantial gains were made along the main road from V. lognon. Communiqué No. 33 reported "good progress" with advances of two to three miles along the entire front.

Allied experts flew into the Cherbourg peninsula to investigate the flying bomb bases captured intact by the American troops, but the Supreme command said there were no indications the Germans had been using these against England. It appeared, a spokesman said, that the American drive over the peninsula left the enemy insufficient time to get the launching sites ready for operation.

Except for the swift encircling drive on Cherbourg, there was little activity on the beachhead. The communiqué reported only patrol activity elsewhere, although enemy artillery and mortar fire in the British-Canadian sector at Tilly was said to be unusually heavy.

price he charged for his most expensive product sometime in 1941 or 1942. For instance:

Manufacturer Jones in 1941 or 1942 sold women's printed dresses for prices ranging from \$1 to \$3 to

\$5 to \$10. Now he can not sell any dress for more than \$10. And this is why:

In normal, pre-war times the kind of profit to be made on cheap dresses and on expensive dresses maintained out. The margin of profit was greater on the expensive kind but fewer of them were sold.

But now, with so much customer-money floating around, without OPA controls Manufacturer Jones might try to sell nothing but dresses costing \$30 or \$40. If all manufacturers could do that, the cost of living would sky-rocket.

So the only ones who now can sell dresses costing \$30 or \$40 are manufacturers who sold them at that price in 1941 or 1942. In other words: A manufacturer can not sell higher-priced lines than he sold in 1941 or 1942.

But this has happened anyway: Since the manufacturer gets fewer cheap items from the finisher, he has to handle the more expensive kinds. He sells fewer of the \$1, \$2 and \$5 dresses and more of the \$10 kind.

So, the cheaper dresses disappear from the market. They are replaced by the higher-priced dresses. That means you have to spend more money.

The War Production Board has taken steps to force production of cheaper goods. That cheaper line may reach the market by fall. Maybe. Seeing is believing.

One Hayataka class carrier was severely damaged and left burning furiously.

One light carrier (probably around 10,000 tons) Zuhoio Taiho class received at least one 100-mile shot.

One Kongo class battleship (29,000 tons) was damaged.

One cruiser was damaged.

Three destroyers were damaged, one of which is believed to have sunk.

Three tankers were sunk.

Two tankers were severely damaged and left burning.

Fifteen to 20 defending aircraft were shot down.

This destruction or damaging of 15 ships was the third greatest single blow dealt the Japanese battle fleet of the war.

The greatest was the battle of Midway in June, 1942, when another carrier force under Admiral Spruance sank four enemy carriers and their escorts.

The second biggest defeat was November 13-15, 1942, in the battle off Guadalcanal when the enemy lost more than 30 ships sunk and damaged.

The battle summary for Sunday's and Monday's action shows conclusively that Admiral Nimitz in a Monday press conference stated he hoped the enemy would close with the United States fleet for a decisive naval action.

On Sunday Japanese planes attacked Admiral Spruance's 5th fleet. They achieved no surprise. They lost 223 planes—335 to our fighters and 18 to our ship's anti-aircraft. They inflicted only superficial damage on only three of our ships.

Admiral Mitscher's carrier force pursued the Japanese. On Monday afternoon it located the Japanese and attacked. There was time for just one assault before nightfall.

But in just those two or three hours of daylight his bombers and torpedo planes sank or damaged 14 enemy ships.

They destroyed 15 or 20 Japanese planes which rose in weak defense of the enemy's great force.

And Mitscher's force achieved such surprise that the enemy was not able to counter-attack.

Admiral Mitscher had one advantage Monday. He caught the Japanese with their planes down—down in the ocean.

This enemy fleet which Admiral Mitscher riddled Monday now has been safely well established as the one which attacked our force Sunday. Loss of 353 planes from its five or six carriers virtually wiped out its planes so that it had to rely largely on anti-aircraft for defense—a defense which proved pretty futile.

The fact that only 20 Japanese planes were downed Monday shows that the enemy had very few aircraft to offer resistance.

Our loss of 49 aircraft does not necessarily mean anywhere near that total was lost to enemy action.

Because the battle was closed so

late in the day and at nearly extreme range in order to catch the Jap fleet, all of our planes were not able to return to their carriers.

Many of these 49 landed in the water and the crews took to rubber life rafts.

Some of these already have been picked up and others undoubtedly were rescued after dark, a rescue, although reports are incomplete.

The Hyataka sunk in the Philippines sea was at least the 8th Japanese flat-top sent to the bottom. In addition to four at Midway, the Japanese lost two in the battle of the Coral Sea and one to a submarine.

On Saipan, whose invasion June 14 entered the Japanese navy out of prolonged seclusion. Yanks holding the southern third of that Marianas base, 1500 miles south of Tokyo, incited north along Magellan Bay.

"Severe fighting continues," the Wednesday communiqué said, echoing previous reports. Japanese trapped at the southeastern tip are being squeezed into a tighter pocket.

More than 600 miles east of Saipan, Japan's by-passed sea-air fortress of Truk did not send up a single plane to ward off the latest two-way aerial punches presently paralyzing it.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced that his Liberators winged more than 700 miles northeast from the Admiralties Monday to drop 198 tons of bombs, a record single day for land-based raiders of that Caroline stronghold. The next day central Pacific army bombers swarmed in from the Marshalls.

Admiral Nimitz, in a press release last night, also reported aerial tabs at Ponape, east of Truk, and Shumushu and Paramushiro north of Japan in the Kuriles.

46,705, an increase of 932 since a list published two weeks ago. Those killed total 20,014, an increase of 242. Wounded amount to 12,905, missing 9,295 and prisoners 4,461.

American army ground forces fighting in Italy since the landings last September suffered casualties totaling 64,992 through June 15. This was in increase of 2,991 since a report last week which covered the period through June 5. The dead in the Italian campaign now total 11,610, an increase of 507. Wounded are 44,426 and missing 8,956. In the same period, air forces in the theater operating in Italy and in strategic missions deep into Europe have had 9,052 casualties, of which 1,166 are killed, 1,373 wounded and 6,493 missing. This was the first time air force casualties in the Italian theater have been announced separately.

with deep water ports of export, and thence to the world at large.

The Tar River Port Commission was created by an act of the North Carolina General Assembly, and the Board of Aldermen of the city of Greenville and the Pitt County Board of Commissioners were authorized to advance to the Port Commission the sum of \$7,500 each, and to maintain the membership of the Port Commission for the development of port facilities.

The Greenville port was opened for freight Oct. 10, 1940, and a schedule was maintained three days each week by the Norfolk, Baltimore and Carolina Line until the need for additional freighters by the government necessitated its discontinuance for the duration. In addition, solid cargoes of sugar have been handled through the terminal depot for the brokerage firm of J. B. Kittrell of this city. During the 16 months period of operating the port, incoming freight totaled 32 million pounds and outgoing freight amounted to more than eight million pounds.

The port of Greenville is for the use of all transportation lines, and general shipping will be resumed as soon as the operating lines can obtain the necessary boats for the handling of business.

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Finland, capital of Helsinki after taking more than 50 additional places, the Soviet communiqué said.

The new drives menaced seven divisions of German troops garrisoned in northern Finland as protection for the metal mines located there.

Meanwhile the Soviet Information Bureau, in a review on the third anniversary of the German attack on Russia, said more than 7,800,000 Germans have been killed or captured in the three years of fighting, compared with 5,300,000 Russians killed, missing or captured.

German losses totaled 70,000 tanks, 20,000 airplanes and more than 90,000 pieces of artillery, while Russian losses were 49,000 tanks, 36,128 airplanes and 48,000 guns, the bureau said.

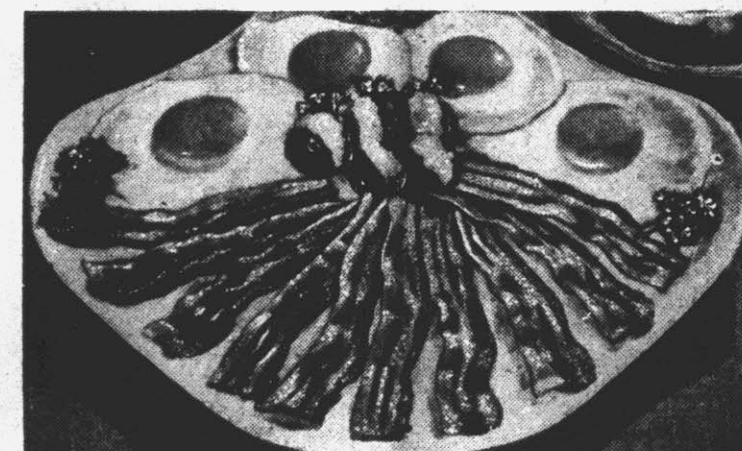

Moscow, June 22—(AP)—Taking note of the third anniversary of the German attack on Russia, the Soviet Information Bureau said today in a review of the war on the eastern front that more than 7,500,000 Germans have been killed or captured, compared with 3,300,000 Russians killed, missing or captured.

The review declared that "a considerable contribution to the success of the Red army was made by our Allies, the United States of America and Great Britain, who supplied us with very valuable strategic raw materials and subjected Germany's military objectives to systematic bombing, and thereby undermined Germany's military might."
