

Tobacco Market Opens August 21

Opening Dates For All Belts Set; Numbers Of Buyers On Larger Markets Reduced; Governor Flays Disproportionate Profits Of Farmers And Tobacco Industry

Raleigh, June 28—(AP)—The sales committee of the Tobacco Association of the United States approved today a resolution reducing by one set the number of sets of buyers on all markets with three or more sets, and set selling hours, selling speed and the weight of tobacco piles on all markets and belts.

These opening dates for all belts were approved: Georgia-Florida, Monday, July 24; South Carolina, Monday, July 24; North Carolina, Monday, August 1; Eastern (New Bright N. C. belt), Monday, August 21; Middle, Monday, September 11; Old Belt, Monday, September 18; Dark Virginia, Monday, December 11.

The selling speed on all belts will not exceed 360 piles per hour, with a tolerance of 15 piles per hour at the end of a sale to complete the selling of a lot. Piles are to be limited to 300 pounds.

In reference to the length of selling days, the committee listed these regulations:

Sales days on Georgia and Florida markets are limited to 4½ hours. Selling time on all North and South Carolina flue-cured markets is limited to 3½ hours. More time will be allowed on markets with more than three sets of buyers, but the additional time was not announced.

Meanwhile, Governor J. M. Broughton told the association which is conducting its annual convention today, that "there can be no justification for disproportionate profits in the value of tobacco production and industry."

In a welcoming address, the governor asserted that the tobacco industry is one of the nation's great producers of wealth and employment.

"Every consideration of this meeting should be based primarily on what is best for the tobacco farmer," he said. "The farmers are inadequately organized. In the strength of their cooperative efforts they cannot compete with the organizations of warehousemen, buyers or manufacturers, but fundamentally they are still the greatest force. Any failure to recognize the fundamental strength of our farmers is a failure to recognize the future of the industry."

REDS DRIVING AGAINST MINSK

Nazi Armored Forces Blasted By Russian Airmen

London, June 28—(AP)—Moscow, guarding the approaches to the White Russian capital of Minsk, has been captured by the onrushing Red armies. Marshal Stalin announced tonight in a special order of the day.

Moscow, June 28—(AP)—Supported by one of the greatest air attacks ever hurled against the Germans, on the Russian front, the Red army closed in from three directions today on Minsk, the capital of White Russia.

Dispatches from the front said that probably never before had Stormoviks (dive-bombers) been thrown with such strength and effectiveness against Nazi armored forces. Hour after hour they were reported searching out German tanks, plastering them in mass with their flying artillery and blasting the way for four armies converging in a great semi-circle on the gateway city to Warsaw and Germany.

The northernmost of the three spearheads aimed at Minsk was composed of Gen. Ivan Bagramian's first Baltic army and 36-year-old Gen. Ivan Cherniakhovsky's First White Russian army. In the van of this group were the Stormoviks, fast Yak fighter planes and medium bombers of Lt. Gen. M. P. Paplavin. Bagramian's 37-year-old air commander, and Col. Gen. Timofey Krutkin. Cherniakhovsky's youthful aviation chief.

Two of the most astute students of aviation in the Red air force, these young pilots were reported blasting clouds of dive-bombers and medium bombers against the German ground troops and fortifications, blasting bridges and strafing communication lines over a wide area.

Cherniakhovsky, who is himself the youngest army general in Russia, (Continued on page three)

More Trouble With Argentina

Washington, June 28—(AP)—The United States attitude towards Argentina drew more heat today with the recall of American ambassador, Norman Armour. Armour is expected to leave Buenos Aires today or tomorrow.

The ambassador has been ordered home for consultations. His departure from Buenos Aires will serve to register sharply this country's concern over Argentina's failure to join the rest of the hemisphere in the drive against the Axis.

The State Department has had a series of conferences with other American governments on Argentina recently, and it is likely that the American slap at the regime of General Edelmiro Farrell will be followed by a multilateral expression of policy.

Only Chile, Paraguay and Bolivia have had diplomatic relations with the Farrell regime since it overthrew the government of President Pedro Ramirez February 25.

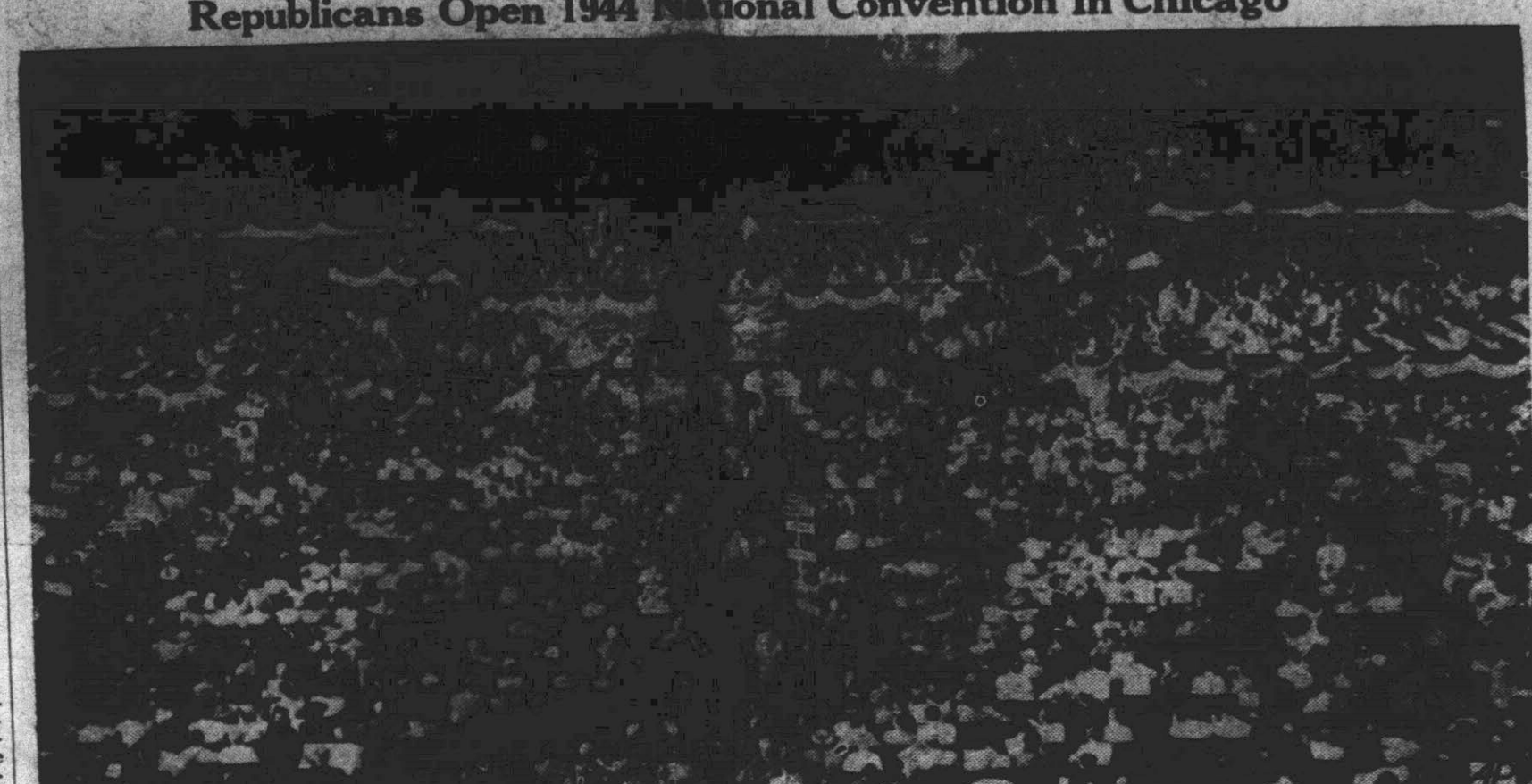

AIR BLOWS ON NAZI TARGETS

American Bombers Whiplash Across Hitler's Europe

London, June 28—(AP)—American bombers struck the enemy hard today in France, Romania and Bulgaria in mass attacks from Britain and Italy close upon the closure of the first three-way shuttle assault of the war.

A cloud of 250 or more flying Fortresses and Liberators soared widely over France and western Germany bombing three airbases near Leon, targets near Paris and rail yards at Saarbrücken. By night, 1,000 RAF heavy bombers attacked the Calais robot bomb spawning grounds and rail centers east and south of Paris. The avowed purpose was to flatten every Nazi airbase in France and tangle every rail

Help It Rise

Chicago Stadium, June 28—(AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey was nominated the Republican candidate for President today by a vote of 1,056 to 1, and Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, was named his running mate.

A lone delegate from Wisconsin, Grant Ritter, 55-year-old farmer of Beloit, cast his vote for Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur, explaining "he's still my candidate. We didn't get an opportunity to present him."

A committee hurried to telephone Governor Dewey at Albany where he awaited formal notification before going ahead with plans to rush here for his speech of acceptance tonight, if weather does not interfere with a trip by plane.

At the same time, Rep. Joseph W. Martin of Massachusetts, convention chairman, dispatched the following telegram to Dewey:

American Planes Pound Several Japanese Bases

Tokyo Reports New Blows On Guam And Rota; MacArthur's Men Blast Yap; Hard Fighting In China

The Pacific war antagonists traded hard blows today, the Japanese putting a stranglehold on Hengyang in China's vital southeast even as the Americans surged to within sight of complete victory at Saipan.

The Chinese high command indicated the Japanese had encircled Hengyang and were battering at it from all sides, apparently very near to delivering the hardest blow to the Chinese since 1938. This Hankow-Canton rail junction could serve as a Japanese springboard for a westward drive toward Kweilin and eventually, Kunming. This drive would imperil Allied air bases.

AP Correspondent Rembert James reported from Saipan that Americans on the firing line thought they glimpsed the eventual end of the hardest land battle in the central Pacific, although none doubted the most difficult fighting still lay ahead. The Americans control the air, half the island and hold the initiative.

American planes again raided Guam and Rota islands south of Saipan. Tokyo radio said, declaring that from 60 to 100 craft struck at the islands still in enemy hands. These were the third attacks in four days on Guam and Rota, suggesting

that the U. S. navy was clearing the way for expansion of its holdings in the Marianas, which are 1,500 miles from Japan.

Coupled with the report Guam-Rota roads was an air blow at Yap from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's southwest Pacific theater. Yap, 250 miles northeast of Palau in the Carolines, was slugged with 35 tons of bombs, presumably to insure that Japanese air forces there are kept from interfering with the Saipan operations 700 miles to the north.

It was Yap's third raid in a week and 30 enemy planes rose to meet it. Eight were downed. The Americans lost a Liberator.

MacArthur's airmen bombed Palau and Woleai, wrecked a Japanese freighter off Boeroe island west of New Guinea, damaged three other vessels in the East Indies, and attacked Manokwari, Noemfof, Wewak and their old favorite, Rabaul.

The Japanese retaliated with a ten-ton raid on Biak island's Mokmer airdrome, inflicting minor casualties.

Myitkyina was still under heavy attack by Lt. Gen. Joseph Stilwell's troops, and a supporting Chinese force cut the Burma road below Lungling, which the Chinese are trying to recapture. The Chinese who captured Mogauing moved six miles northeast and took Namti.

GERMANS TAKE OVER FINLAND

Finnish Leaders Cast Nation's Lot With Hitler

Stockholm, June 28—(AP)—Finland, handed over to Germany by its leaders without Parliament's approval, swarmed with German troops today and all pretensions that the country was fighting a separate war with Russia were ended.

The capital resounded with the songs of German regulars and SS guards. Some were reported already at the eastern front to bolster Finnish defenses crumbling before the Russian onslaught.

An eyewitness who left Helsinki yesterday said President Ryti, Premier Edwin Linowomies and Finance Minister Vaino Tanner submitted to Nazi pressure after a series of meetings with German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, Field Marshal Gen. Wilhelm Keitel, Gen. Alfred Jodl and Col. Gen. Eduard Dietl.

Finland's leaders called for open German military support after the Nazis had signed the capital into a paraded ground of German might. Destroyers brought blue-coated officers with their hip-swinging swords and German cavalry paraded through the heart of Helsinki.

Finland's government announced officially last night that von Ribbentrop had answered an appeal for help with troops, and proclaimed that a "perfect understanding" had been reached between the two coun-

Big Firms Helping Sale Of War Bonds

The following big firms of the country are allocating part of their War Bond purchases to their branches in this county to help the Pitt County War Finance Committee sell its quota of the Fifth War Loan drive. J. Herbert Waldrop, county chairman, stated today:

North Carolina Theatres, Inc., American Tobacco Company, Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Norfolk Southern Railway Company, J. C. Penney Company, W. T. Grant Company, Colonial Ice Company, Colonial Stores, McClellan's Stores and Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company.

The State of North Carolina has allocated a part of the purchase to Pitt county and the County of Pitt has purchased bonds during the drive. All of this adds up to a substantial portion of the county's quota being sold, which will be revealed by reports from the Federal Reserve Bank at an early date.

Pitt county's quota of \$667,000 in "E" bonds, which can be purchased by individuals only, has hardly been scratched, with less than 25 per cent sold. We have never failed on any previous war loan drive to not only purchase the over-all quota, but the "E" bond quota, Mr. Waldrop emphasized, and added:

"What are we going to do now? Have you purchased 'E' bonds in this drive to the limit of your capacity? Is every member of your firm on a payroll deduction plan for the purchase of these 'E' bonds?"

"Does it take it all to buy so-called necessities and pay taxes, or are you planning for the post-war period, when there will be so many new and better things to buy? If we have 'E' bonds, they can be converted into cash and create the power to buy new cars, radios, stoves, and many other things."

"Why not be smart and be prepared, and not let the high prices and substitutes absorb all of your income?" he said.

NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

Nazi Resistance Stiffens As Allies Drive Northward

Rome, June 28—(AP)—San Vincenzo, only 32 miles below the big port of Livorno on the Italian west coast, was wrested from the Germans after a bitter house-to-house battle that lasted for several hours last night, and today the Fifth army was reported slugging its way steadily forward.

San Vincenzo had been converted into a fortress by the Nazis, who had evacuated all civilians, then erected barricades and wire entanglements in front of the defenses.

Further inland an American armored force continued to roll back stubborn enemy resistance and occupied the villages of Chiusdino and Travale. Chiusdino is only 17 miles southwest of Siena, key highway and communications center 31 miles below Florence.

Supported by Italian partisans, an American infantry force bypassed, then surrounded and captured the town of Sassetta, four miles north-east of San Vincenzo, despite its defense by elements of the German 17th SS division, identified in that sector for the first time.

Other enemy units were mopped up in the village of Belvedere, below Chiusdino and Travale, while the French, who advanced to the vicinity of San Quirico D'Orcia, 22 miles southeast of Siena an highway two, beat back repeated enemy counterattacks.

In addition to moving in reinforcements, the Germans opposed a further Fifth army advance with increased artillery fire, hurriedly laid (Continued on page two)

Warning Issued By Health Department

The following statement was issued today by the Pitt County Health Department:

"In view of the fact that the State Board of Health has reported a number of infantile paralysis cases in several counties in the western part of the state and in view of the fact that a case was reported yesterday in Wilson, it would seem wise for the citizens in the eastern part of the state to take precautions against the spread of the disease."

"These are: No travel for children in the infected areas. No visiting of children in neighbor's homes where there may be any illness of undetermined nature. No unnecessary group meeting of children. Segregation of any child who appears to be sick in any way and promptly calling the family physician."

"This notice is intended to alarm but simply as a word of precaution."

"We had in Pitt county two cases of infantile paralysis reported in 1941; 2 in 1942; and 1 in 1943. There has been no case reported since August, 1943."

"If and when new cases do occur in our county, it will be our policy to keep the public informed."

AN ANALYSIS OF THE

Finland has taken the road to utter ruin which she so narrowly escaped in 1939-40.

Some of us may regret it, remembering her story. Among the best lines of human progress between the wars, and with what brave principle she fought the winter war as the Russians, coldly practical, prepared their strategic defenses for 1941.

But Finland supported her pro-Nazi leaders, possibly hopelessly but probably willingly, preferring the Germans to the Russians. For that decision, which only saved off this day when she has become another Italy, she must pay bitterly. The United States, one of her longest-suffering friends, can tolerate her no longer. Finland drops to the rank of the Hitlerite Balkans.

Oddly enough, the man most responsible for Finland's position is a former Russian army officer, Field Marshal Gustav Mannerheim, hailed from 1918 to 1941 as Finland's greatest patriot. He now stands as another Mussolini, wrecking of the country at whose birth he played the roles of both father and midwife. He now ranks even lower than Hitler's other satellites, Der Fuehrer brought them into line with irresistible pressure. Mannerheim joined him with gusto.

Not that Mannerheim would have joined Pappily in a war on Norway, Denmark, Belgium, Britain or the United States. But he saw opportunity for revenge, for recapture of

AMERICA IN WARTIME

Washington—Telling a minister of an ambassador that he is "person non grata" is just the diplomatic way of saying, "Here's your hat. If you hurry, you can catch the first boat."

That's what happened in the case of Minister Blomster Procopio of Finland. The Finnish government behind it probably had known until after the war, unless the future raised by the order here in some circles causes the State Department or the White House to explain more fully. The given reason was "actions inimical to the interests of the United States."

No one ever doubted that Mr. Procopio is by birth and national inheritance an anti-Russian; but on several occasions during the first phase of the Russian-Finnish war and the present one, his declaration of anti-Russian feeling were a good deal milder than the expressions many of our members of Congress and others are uttering publicly.

No one could doubt either his great devotion and loyalty to Finland. If that led him into any diplomatic indiscretions, it could certainly be understood, even if it could not be condoned by a nation at war with the Nazis, with whom Finland is an ally against Russia and England.

State Department officials, checking back through records and memories for at least 15 years, couldn't find any similar case, but handing a diplomat his hat in just this manner is among the first diplomatic records of our relationship with other nations.

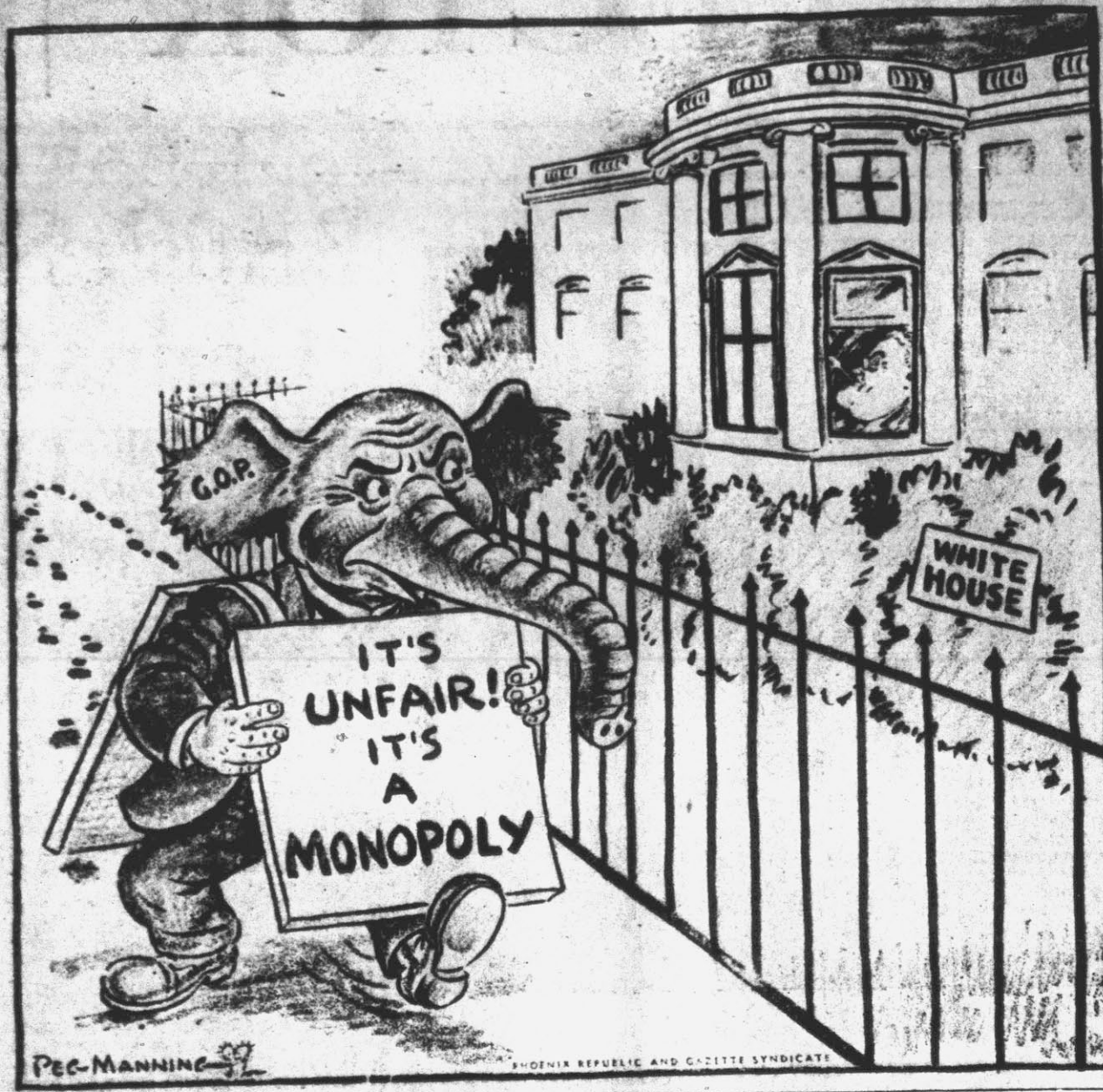
It was President Washington himself who handed Citizen Genet his beret and told him to run along right away back to France. The good citizen, it seems had been guilty of trying to stir up the youthful United States against England.

There was also the Sackville-West case in the 1880's where that worthy of the British embassy was sent packing for writing a letter to a naturalized Britisher here suggesting that Cleveland's election would be more favorable to Great Britain than Benjamin Harrison's.

And the records are full of cases where minor consular or diplomatic officials were invited to go home—our own as well as those of other nations.

ish troops pinning down German defense forces while tanks swept in from behind.

Allied planes hovered over the tank battle and lashed at Nazi reserves. Twenty-five German tanks were knocked out in Tuesday's fighting, and today's battle was on a much larger scale. Planes shot up 27 troop-carrying vehicles rushing about 800 German reinforcements to a weak spot, destroying 12 and damaging the others.

British infantrymen alone have advanced more than 10,000 yards—some six miles—since Montgomery began his whirlwind offensive Monday. The punch on Tourville along the cross-peninsula road from Caen, then thrust on northeast of Esquay, about six miles southwest of Caen and midway between the Odon and Arne rivers.

The operation is very successful and we hold a very strong corridor across the Odon," a staff officer in the field told Associated Press War Correspondent Roger Greene.

(Vichy radio declared Montgomery was using 100,000 troops and two armored divisions in this all-out assault. The German high command acknowledged a penetration in the area in this sector, but said other blows were thwarted.)

Americans in Cherbourg captured a second German General, the deputy commander of Cherbourg, 241st Gen. Robert Statler, yesterday when they stormed the arsenal in the port city, one of the last centers of Nazi resistance.

Supreme headquarters disclosed that the Allies had suffered 40,349 casualties in the first two weeks of the invasion. German losses in killed, wounded and captured for three weeks of battle were estimated at not less than 70,000.

American casualties were 24,162 more than half the total suffered by the Allies and did not include those incurred in the assault on Cherbourg.

Out of the 40,349 casualties, 5,267 were killed, 23,079 wounded and 12,183 missing. The percent of fatal casualties of the total was 13. The

mine fields and assembled new concentrations of anti-tank guns. Disabled German tanks were used as road blocks and the village of Travale was demolished by the enemy in an attempt to convert the entire town into a road block.

The Eighth army continued to move forward slowly against fierce opposition at the main points of its attack. West and southwest of Lake Trasimeno, the British captured the towns of Gioella and Porto. Gioella, four and a half miles southwest of Castiglione, on the west shore of the lake, fell to a tank force only after a six-hour battle. Limited gains were made on the east side of the lake, where the enemy was holding Magione in force.

Five miles north of Perugia the Eighth army climaxed a day's hard fighting by occupying the dominating hills of Monte Bagnola and Monte Pacciano. East of the Tiber the village of Pagliaccia was taken.

Enemy losses at the hands of Italian based Allied planes were placed officially at more than 100 in two days. It was announced that 38 Luftwaffe fighters were blasted off by the air by American heavy bombers and escorts over the Tiber area yesterday. A total of 35 had been reported destroyed in the air and on the ground the preceding day.

More than 100 enemy fighters were encountered over the targets yesterday, but the Mediterranean Allied air force said that some of the pilots were "apparently inexperienced and few of them were aggressive." Allied losses in all of yesterday's operations amounted to six planes.

Maj. Robert Johnston of Lawton, Okla., has 27 victories in the European theater of operations, and Maj. Richard I. Bong of Poplar, Wis., knocked down 27 in the Pacific. Neither Johnston nor Bong is currently flying in combat.

Toledo, Ohio, June 28. (AP)—Virtually all public transportation was at a standstill here today, after 350 AFL unionists of the Community Traction Co., refused to man street cars and buses in a surprise strike union leaders said was called to protest refusal of the company to discharge two inspectors.

More Oil For Heating.
Washington, June 28. (AP)—If your home is heated only by an oil heating stove, and you have a child under six years of age, you can get an increase of ten per cent of fuel oil ration, the OPA announced today.

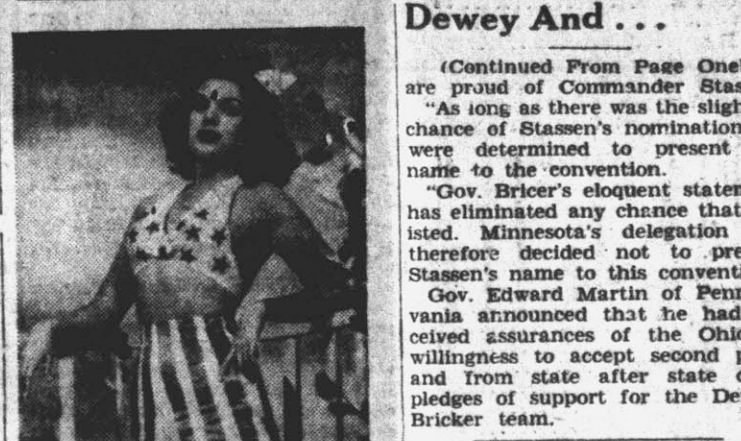

Clearwater, Fla., June 28. (AP)—Dr. Milan Hodza, former prime minister of Czechoslovakia, died in a hospital here last night.

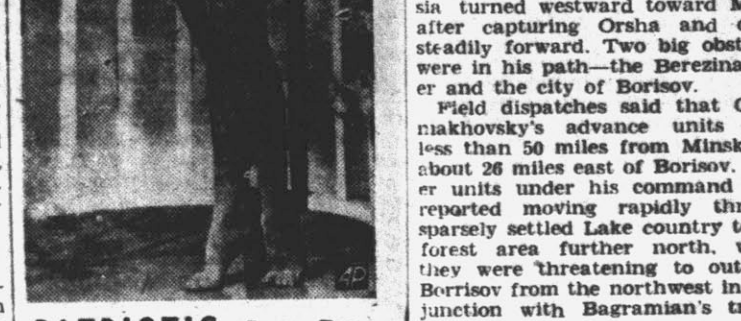

"I am told on good authority that a meeting of the cabinet occurred Saturday night, lasting until 3 a. m. Sunday. Ribbentrop, Jodl and Dietl were there, and Mannerheim was not."

"Various party groups met in Cautious Sunday to discuss the government's decision to continue the war. Social Democrats and Swedes definitely refused to accept the government's decision. With a few other peace activists among the other parties they could swing a majority in parliament voting. One prominent Finn said he tallied 140 out of 200 deputies against the Riti-Linkomies-Tanner plan. Two secret sessions were held by parliament Monday but the government didn't dare risk its policy by submitting it for approval."

sion turned westward toward Minsk after capturing Orsha and drove steadily forward. Two big obstacles were in his path—the Beresina river and the city of Borisov.

Field dispatches said that Cherniakhovsky's advance units were less than 50 miles from Minsk and about 26 miles east of Borisov. Other units under his command were reported moving rapidly through sparsely settled Lake country to the forest area further north, where they were threatening to outflank Borisov from the northwest in conjunction with Bagration's troops.

From Italy, 500 American heavy
bombers attacked two oil refineries
near and in the Bucharest suburbs
and laid yards at Chitila north of
the Romanian capital on the main
line to the Ploesti oil fields, 35 miles
away. The German said Bucharest
itself and Ploesti both were bomb-
ed. The Karlovo airdrome in Bul-
garia 75 miles east of Sofia also was
attacked. A number of intercepting
Nazl planes were destroyed.

Returning pilots reported flames
darting from dense black smoke
erupting from a bombed and appear-
ingly northwest of Bucharest. The
Tilken oil works in the eastern sub-
urbs. The Chitila rail yards nor-
mally are clogged with tank cars
and columns of black smoke rose
from them.

Allied air commanders in Britain,
even before today's attack, said the
Germans were suffering "acute
shortage of oil."
The triple shuttle bombing
smashed Berlin a week ago and a
Polish oil refinery Monday.

America's vast air power was
demonstrated in the operation Mon-
day—and disclosed only today—that
sent Flying Fortresses thundering
out from the new bases in Russia,
45 miles southwest of Lwow in old
Poland, and carried them on to Ita-
ly to complete the mission without
loss. The bombers were those that
flew from Britain on June 21 and
gave Berlin one of its most terrible
poundings of the war before going
on to Russia.

Mustangs escorted the Fortresses
from Russia into Poland on the
Monday raid and 15th airforce
Mustangs from Italy joined the es-
cort after the bombing.
