Russian Armies Smash Forward Toward Minsk After Taking Moglev

Soviet Forces Now Within 37 Miles Of Capital Of White Russia On Route To Warsaw And Berlin; Liquidation Of Nazi Divisions Near Brest-Litovsk Continues

Moscow, June 29.—(AP)—Soviet armies converging on Minsk drove within 37 miles of the White Russian capital today pushing the Germans swiftly back over the same road to Warsaw and Berlin which Napoleon followed in his disastrous retreat from Moscow.

Like a huge grasping hand, the Red army reached for Minsk while artillery and bombers blasted a way for the ground forces.

The hand-like Soviet offensive was formed by units fanning out to the northeast of Minsk like fingers, while strong groups southeast of the city formed the thumb.

With the freeing of Moglev the Russians for the first time in nearly three years have a direct mail route between Leningrad and Odessa.

A Russian military commentator, Col. Nikolai Akimov, said the reopening of this rail route "is a factor which should not be underestimated, for the advantage it affords in transferring forces parallel to the line of the front is one of the major conditions for achieving supremacy in any direction chosen for new blows."

The Russians have had four-fifths of the railway in working order since the winter, but have been unable to use the section passing through Vitebsk, Orsha, Mogilev and Zhlobin.

Field dispatches said the Germans had retreated from this area so quickly they had had little time to damage the rail line.

The three main thrusts at Minsk were: down the old Smolensk-Warsaw road; over the Byhov-Minsk highway across the middle of the Berezina river; up through the valley of the Pech river over the Gomel.

The speed of the Red advance through White Russia, with the capture of Minsk apparently only a few days away, supports previous reports that Hitler has withdrawn his major forces to shorten lines back in old Poland—probably along the Bug river.

Points like Orsha and Mogilev don't fall overnight when the Germans really try to hold them, even before such great power as the Russians are displaying. The Berlin radio, broadcasting about an elastic defense in the east, without benefit of reserves until the Allies have been taken care of in the west, also supports the thought. If that were true, no such broadcast would have been made.

For a year there have been reports from various sources that the Germans were preparing to stand at the Bug, the "Ribbentrop" border established in 1939, and that if driven back from there a last ditch fight would be made along the Vistula.

This would not mean, of course, an uninterrupted Russian march over the 300 miles from their present central positions, or the 100 miles from their westernmost salient at Kowel, to Brest-Litovsk. Large

NEW BLOWS ON JAP ISLANDS

Widespread Bombings Continue; Gains On Saipan

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, June 29.—(AP)—While American warships and planes attacked half a dozen Japanese bases along a 3,300-mile ocean-spanning arc, U. S. forces on Saipan island scored gains of up to 20 miles, headquarters announced.

From Washington came the promise of impending blows at Japan itself. Secretary of Navy James Forrestal said at a press conference that the final occupation of Saipan will enable us to project surface and air operations that will include the mainland of Japan, the Philippines and a greater part of the Dutch East Indies.

One Pacific fleet task force ventured amongst the Kurile islands to shell Kurabu Zaki, main airbase on southern Paramushiro.

Another gave Tinian island, next door to Saipan in the Marianas, its usual working-over.

Carrier planes swept Guam and Rota, south of Tinian. Land-based army bombers struck at Paramushiro and Shumushu in the Kuriles, and at Yap and Truk, in the distant Carolines.

Japanese hurried torpedo planes and bombers against Allied carriers and transports near the Marianas. The attacks were unsuccessful.

American Marines and infantrymen, already possessing the southern half of Saipan, occupied two villages in a two-mile push up the east coast. On the west coast they blasted the Japanese street by street, then by block, from Garapan, Saipan's largest town.

An estimated 20,000 Japanese defenders were pushed into Saipan's northern peninsula, an area two miles wide and seven to nine miles long.

A smaller Japanese force, similarly trapped on the southern tip of the island, tried to break through Monday night, headquarters said in an attempt to join the.

Calls Off State Guard Encampment

Raleigh, June 29.—(AP)—The North Carolina State Guard's camp of instruction, scheduled for July 6-16 at Fort Bragg, has been postponed because of the prevalence of infantile paralysis in the state. Adjutant General J. Van Metts announced the postponement yesterday and said he was acting upon "information and recommendation" by Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, state health officer. Hope was expressed that the encampment could be held in August.

General Metts pointed out that 11 companies of the state guard are in counties where cases have been reported.

Dr. Reynolds said 11 new cases were reported to his office yesterday. He said 104 had been reported this month. He listed the cases by counties as: Alexander 3, Ashe 6, Burke 11, Cabarrus 2, Caldwell 11, Catawba 39, Gaston 12, Iredell 1, Lee 1, Lincoln 3, Rowan 7, Stanly 1, Union 1, Watauga 2, Wilkes 3, and Wilson 1.

CHANGES IN MEAT POINTS

Lamb Cuts And Beef Roasts Back On Ration List

Washington, June 29.—(AP)—Housewives will have to take their ration books to market again in buying choice lamb cuts and soft cheese, and the butcher will take one to two more points a pound for beef steaks and roasts.

The Office of Price Administration, announcing point values for the period from next Sunday through July 29, said today it was necessary to put lamb chops, steaks and roasts back under rationing because national distribution has not been equitable.

Values assigned range from three points a pound for some chuck roasts to 10 points for loin chops.

The supply of beef steaks and roasts will be smaller by 12 percent in July, OPA explained, in hiking the point values to a record high. A porterhouse steak, for example, will cost 14 points a pound.

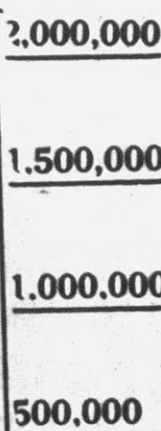
U. S. Casualties Reach 251,158

Washington, June 29.—(AP)—American casualties in the war, including the first two weeks of battle in Normandy, total 251,158. Of these 55,206 are dead—35,104 soldiers and 20,102 navy, marine and coast guard personnel.

Secretary of War Stimson reported today that through June 13 American casualties were 179,923 of which 32,022 were killed, 73,668 wounded, 37,766 missing and 36,467 prisoners. These figures, he explained, did not include casualties in France because compilation of casualties from individual names transmitted from the field to the department lagged behind actual events.

To be added to them, however, was the report of Supreme Allied Headquarters that during the first two weeks of fighting in France American casualties totaled 24,162, with 3,062 killed, 13,121 wounded and 7,959 missing.

Help It Rise

Fifth Army Continues Advance In North Italy

Castagneto, 25 Miles Below Port Of Leghorn Captured Yesterday; Another Column Drive On Siena

Rome, June 29.—(AP)—Along a highway littered with enemy dead and abandoned equipment, American troops of the Fifth army punched forward another five miles along Italy's west coast yesterday and captured the town of Castagneto, only 25 miles from Livorno (Leghorn), while a second American column farther inland pierced through German lines to within a dozen miles of Siena. Allied headquarters said today.

Livorno is an important port 11 miles below Pisa, while Siena is a key rail and communications center 31 miles south of Florence.

An official spokesman declared the enemy "is showing signs of confusion" in the coastal sector, where the incessant battering by American guns caused heavy casualties and the round-up of prisoners from decimated German units progressed steadily.

Capture of Castagneto gave the Allies control of an important lateral road which formerly linked the enemy's coastal defenders with the Nazis' central sector.

The enemy intensified by every conceivable means the retarding of the Fifth army advance, felling trees across roads, then boobytrapping them, destroying all bridges and laying minefields. The tactics failed to prevent a close pursuit, and an enemy infantry company which attempted to break the advance by infiltration back into the captured village of Sasseta was wiped out.

An American armored force driving from the southwest captured the street from junction town of Monticchio on Highway 73, and leading elements thrust beyond to within

12 miles of Siena. The village of Monticchio also was taken.

The French, on the right wing of the Fifth army, reported substantial gains, capturing the towns of Monticchio, Pienza and Montalcino, all southeast of Siena.

It was announced that the Fifth army alone has taken over 25,000 prisoners since the offensive began seven weeks ago today.

American gunners, with a surprise concentration of fire, destroyed a newly organized enemy artillery unit. In a single sector the Germans lost six tanks, five guns, two anti-tank guns, and 15 caissons.

The Eighth army reported limited gains in heavy fighting in the areas of Lake Trasimeno and north of Perugia. Eleven guns were destroyed and 200 enemy troops were wiped out in mopping up Casella, six miles northeast of Perugia.

West of Lake Trasimeno the villages of Pratavalle and Laffore were occupied. Among trophies taken were German railway guns with 70-foot barrels, firing 500 pound projectiles.

To illustrate the frame of mind of the bewildered Germans being beaten steadily back in Italy, an official spokesman cited this portion of a letter taken from a captured German trooper on the Fifth army front:

"For us this is no war anymore, it's a cat and mouse game. Their superiority is so great in every thing. Our soldiers have become indifferent as never before. x x x The Americans are finishing us off in their stride just as they please."

Comments was that of Senator Clyde Reed of Kansas, who said: "We've got not only a match for Roosevelt but a master on the platform to carry the fight to him on his own front."

Youth against age was the predominant theme of Dewey's acceptance speech as he set out to follow Franklin D. Roosevelt's trail from the executive mansion in Albany to the White House via the Chicago nomination convention. Mr. Roosevelt, too, flew to this city to accept the high honor in 1932.

The 42-year-old former racket-buster, in his opening statement to the American electoral jury last night, promised that "next year our government will again have a cabinet of the ablest men and women to be found in America."

"Its members," he declared, "will expect and will receive full delegation of the powers of their office. They will be capable of administering the government in the task to be done and young enough to do it."

The task of achieving a lasting peace, he declared, "is no task to be entrusted to stubborn men, grown old and tired and quarrelsome in office."

"It seems," he declared, "that the great men who founded this nation really knew what they were talking about when they said that three terms were too many."

A middle of the road path was advocated by the shaggy-browed 1944 standard bearer on the touchy foreign policy issue.

"We are agreed, all of us," he said, "that America will participate with other sovereign nations in a cooperative effort to prevent future wars."

British Hurl Back Nine German Counter-Attacks

HEAVIES BLAST REICH AGAIN

Aircraft Plants And Oil Refineries Today's Targets

London, June 29.—(AP)—Upwards of 1,000 Fortresses and Liberators attacked Germany today, hitting four aircraft producing centers, a synthetic oil refinery and a number of other military and industrial targets in the center of the Reich. Prioritized by an equal number of fighters, the heavies attacked aircraft plants at Leipzig, Oeschersleben, Aschersleben and Fallersleben and a refinery at Bohlsen, capping a 12-hour Allied air offensive which saw more than 2,000 war planes scouring important Nazi installations across the face of northwestern Europe.

Leipzig, Oeschersleben and Aschersleben are within 90 to 100 miles southwest of Berlin, while Fallersleben is 40 miles east of Hannover. Bohlsen is also in the Hannover area.

Railroad centers haltingly feeding reinforcements to the Germans' taxed battlelines are other targets in the big assault.

In darkness before the American heavies swept out, some 500 RAF Halifaxes carried the campaign against Nazi supply lines to the German border, bombing railroad yards in the region of Metz, near the world war battlefield of Verdun.

Simultaneously, night raiding Mosquitos hit Saarbrücken, a railroad center attacked by the American heavies yesterday, and an oil plant near Essen in the Ruhr.

The Mosquitos made their attack without loss, while the British heavy bomber assault on Metz cost 20 planes.

Casualty radio said Allied bombers had penetrated to Thurnitz, an eastern German province bordering on Czechoslovakia, and declared that fierce air battles were raging there.

The night blows came after daylight attacks by both British and American heavy bomber formations yesterday, which included the bombing of the Saarbrücken rail yards.

Violent Tank Battle Raging Beyond Caen

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, June 29.—(AP)—The British were reported to have thrown the bulk of the 15th and 17th armies into the defense of Caen in an attempt to break the German thrust on the inland port.

But Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's men smashed nine German attacks in 24 hours and won a breach in the enemy lines.

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U. S. BASE IN CHINA LOST

Abandonment Of Hengyang Airfield Is Announced

Chungking, June 29.—(AP)—The U. S. air force has abandoned its airfield at Hengyang, strategic city surrounded by Japanese forces, and a communiqué today said American P-51s dropped thousands of bombs on the airfield—formerly one of the 14th's principal forward bases in China.

The P-51 attack, which took place Monday, was aimed at making the airfield useless to the enemy. It left one runway destroyed, Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters said.

The communiqué added that Hengyang was reported to be in flames. Loss of this Hunan province center would be the greatest military blow to China since 1938.

Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault's air force was going all-out in an attempt to arrest Japan's drive down the Canton-Hankow railway, an offensive designed to bisect China and make difficult the supply problems of both the Chinese army and the American air force. NEW RATION STAMPS

TO BE VALID ON JULY 1

Raleigh, June 28 — Five more blue stamps totaling 50 points—W-8, X-8, Y-8, Z-8 and A-5—will be good for buying rationed processed foods on July 1. Theodore S. Johnson, Raleigh district OPA director, said today.

During July, Johnson said, many housewives will use all of the first strip of blue ration stamps in Book Four and will begin using the second strip, the first stamp in this strip being A-5.

The first strip contained stamps bearing the figure "8" on their face. The figure "5" is printed on stamps in the second row. These figures serve for identification of the stamps only, and have no connection whatever with their value. Regardless of whether food ration stamps have an 8, 5, 2 or 1 on their face, they are all worth ten points.

All stamps valid on July 1 will be good indefinitely.

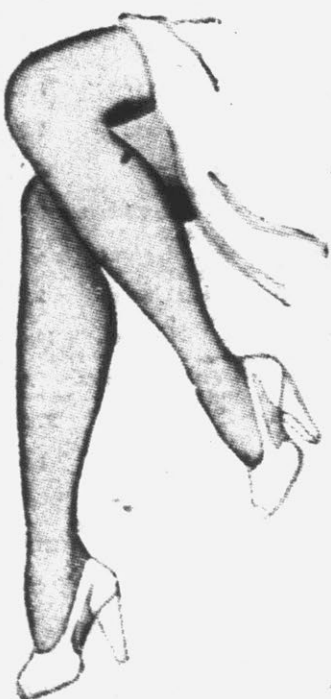

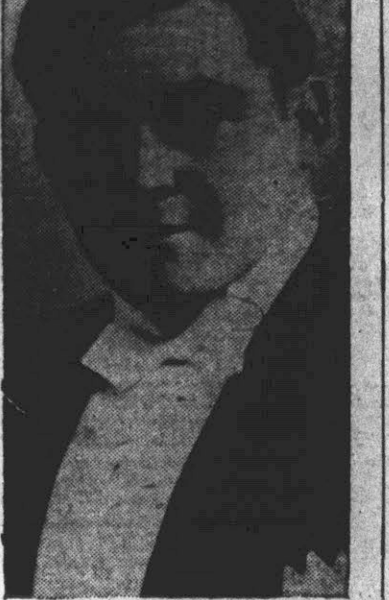

up two, while a seven-inch-cut
standing rib roast goes from eight
to 10 points a pound.

The decision to put points back on
lamb was made. OPA said, when
three out of four of the agency's
94 district offices reported that
choice cuts were short of demand.
Because return of popular lamb
cuts to the chart is counter balanc-
ed by a smaller supply of beef,
housewives will continue to get only
30 points a month for buying meats
and fats. The allotment was 60
points a month before all meat ex-
cept choice beef was made ration-
free early in May.

All pork, veal and the cheaper
cuts of beef and lamb remain point-
free, and butter and margarine con-
tinue at 12 and two points a pound,
respectively.

Soft cheeses, the so-called perish-
able varieties including Swiss and
cream, go from a point-free value
to four points a pound.

Washington, June 29 - (AP) -
Deaths in action of two officers
from the operations division of the
general staff while acting as ob-
servers on Saipan for the chief of
staff were announced today by Sec-
retary of War Stimson.
Col. Carl D. Silverthorne, chief
of the Pacific theater section of the
operations division, was killed by a
Japanese sniper, and Lt. Col. Fred-
erick G. Terry, a member of the
strategy section, was killed when a
bomber collided with the artillery
liaison plane from which he was
directing artillery fire.
