Russian Forces Rolling Forward Toward Germany

Baltic States, Latvia and Lithuania Expected To Be Reached In Three or Four Days; Swift Advance Traps Disorganized German Forces Behind Russian Lines

Stockholm, July 5.—(AP)—Russian troops have begun a large-scale landing operation on the northern shores of Viipuri Bay in southern Finland in an apparent attempt to establish a bridgehead behind Finnish lines, the Finnish communiqué said today.

Red army troops began landing from many boats early Tuesday, the Finnish high command said, supported by coastal batteries firing from the southern shores and by smoke screens.

The town of Viipuri at the head of the bay was captured recently by Russian troops.

The Finnish bulletin also reported landings on islands in the Bay of Narva, and said the Soviets had been thrown back into the sea on two of them.

Landings are continuing with violent fighting, the bulletin added.

Moscow, July 5.—(AP)—Two powerful Russian armies pounded on today toward Latvia and Lithuania, at a pace that may reach one or both of the Baltic republics in three or four days, menacing Daugavpils (Dvinsk) in Latvia and Wilno and Kaunas in the Soviet Lithuanian republic.

To the south the German high command said, Nazi forces evacuated Kowel in old Poland. Moscow made no reference to Kowel or this central front.

Berlin also declared the Russians had landed on the islands in Narva Bay, between Estonia and Finland. The Russians crossed the Estonian frontier in an offensive last winter, pounding close to Narva on the bay.

(The DNB broadcast said counterattacking Finns regained two islands, between Narva and Lammassaari, with heavy fighting continuing on a third, Teikassari. Light Finnish naval forces and German naval craft "successfully engaged" Soviet traffic, it added.)

Field dispatches declared the Germans appeared wholly unable to halt the Red army drives toward Latvia and Lithuania.

Beating back disorganized German resistance, Gen. Ivan Bagration's First Baltic army pressed up the valley of the western Dvina toward the southern Estonian town of Narva.

While the Red army drives toward Latvia and Lithuania, the Soviet radio acknowledged that the Soviet advance is sweeping so fast a considerable number of German forces suddenly found themselves in the rear of the Soviet lines.

By London estimates the advancing Red army troops were within 10 miles of the Latvian border and 15 or 17 miles from Lithuania. (Continued on page two)

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—Proposals for a national program to make Americans healthier may come out of a senate subcommittee hearing which starts Monday.

Some of the top men of the army, navy and U. S. public health service will go before the subcommittee headed by Senator Pepper (D-Fla.).

The committee will make recommendations after it learns the score on things like these:

The physical and mental defects found among the working population and men of military age; what army, navy and civilian rehabilitation programs have found in medicine and dentistry; what the veterans' health needs are likely to be; and what planning is being considered for hospital and medical centers.

In working out the hearing schedule, committee staff members have said:

"Millions of citizens have physical or mental defects which could be but are not corrected. The failure to remedy this is due to poor national planning and organization."

Here are comments from the staff:

ALLIES SCORE NEW GAINS IN ITALIAN FRONT

British Drive Toward Important Communications Center; Americans Nearing Port Of Leghorn

Rome, July 5.—(AP)—Eight army troops, converging from the southwest and south, have driven within five miles of the important communications center of Arezzo on the road to Florence while American units on Italy's west coast have moved up to the outskirts of Rosignano, less than 13 miles inland from Livorno. Allied headquarters announced today.

Both advances were recorded against stiff German resistance and the Nazis gave every indication they intended to battle to retain the valuable port of Livorno as long as possible.

Heavy guns situated on dominant hills opened fire on approaching American infantry and tanks around Rosignano. At the same time heavy road movements westward were seen behind the enemy lines, indicating that reserves were being moved into position.

Strongly by artillery, the Americans finally broke into the town in strength and reinforced their position yesterday, while north of the town tanks established road blocks against expected German counterattacks.

American artillery knocked out two Tiger tanks during this fighting while American tanks destroyed two Nazi field guns and 15 vehicles.

By road the advanced troops were only 15 miles from Livorno but an official spokesman declared that only a slow advance could be expected.

"Livorno itself is defended by thick concrete pillboxes, extensive minefields, wire, anti-landing mines and ack-ack," he went on. "Further indications of our approach to Livorno are being kept secret."

In other sectors along the entire front the Germans were being rolled back steadily against the outer

No-Deferments For Pre-Med Students

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt declined today to interfere with a selective service order banning occupational draft deferments for pre-medical students after July 1.

"No one is more keenly conscious than I am of the need of maintaining the health of the nation and of making sure that we have an adequate supply of doctors," the President wrote Rep. Miller (R-Neb.), "but in this war the need of the armed forces for young, vigorous men must also be given thorough consideration."

Miller wrote the President asking him to review the order withholding deferments for pre-medical students. The President said the interagency committee on deferments—a group of government officials set up some months ago to study essential occupations—concluded that the present-day medical students would not be available to practice medicine before 1948 and "many of them would never practice medicine."

The committee also gave attention, the President said, "to the fact that young men and women who do not meet military physical standards are available to become pre-medical students."

Prisoner Paroled
Raleigh, July 5.—(AP)—Six prisoners, including one convicted of second degree murder and another of manslaughter, were paroled today by Governor Broughton.

They included: Roy Lee Ross, convicted in Pitt county in 1942 of larceny and sentenced to four to five years.

May Name Congressman Head Platform Committee

New York, two-time chairman of the platform-making resolutions committee at Democratic national conventions, has declined the job again and party leaders were reported today to have offered it to a prominent house member.

The Democratic National Committee expects to announce the name of the new chairman before the week ends. That will permit appointment of a subcommittee which will assemble in Chicago before July 17, hold hearings, and put up a scaffolding for erection of the 1944 national party platform.

The subcommittee will have no power to act. The convention itself, which begins July 19, must create the resolutions and all other major committees.

It will be in the credentials committee that a scrap may develop over seating fourth term or anti-fourth term delegates from some states. The committee on rules and order of business will have to pass on southern demands for the restoration of a rule that a two-thirds vote is necessary to nominate.

One reason Wagner turned down the resolutions chairmanship is that he is attending an international monetary conference at Bretton

Woods, New Hampshire. The conference probably will overlap the Democratic candidate picking.

Except for the Democrats' planning, the Fourth of July was largely a holiday politically.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York the Republican presidential nominee took things easy.

Ships And Planes Shatter Jap Bases Close To Japan

SUBS SINK 17 JAP VESSELS

Cruiser And Destroyer Included In Latest Sinkings

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—Navy Secretary Forrestal reported today the sinking of 17 Japanese vessels, including a light cruiser and a destroyer, by American submarines operating in Pacific waters.

He disclosed the latest bag of American undersea craft at a news conference at which he reported that the submarines deserve "the lion's share of the credit for knocking the props from under Japan's conquest."

Forrestal said that the rate of sinking of the Japanese merchant fleet would be accelerated "and has caught up with the Jap retreat."

"Japan," he said, "is losing merchant ships faster than she can afford to" and continuation of the current trends "will leave her by the end of 1944 with a sizeable and

Explosion Wrecks City In Denmark
Stockholm, July 5.—(AP)—The Free Danish Press Service asserted today that a German munitions ship blew up in Aarhus harbor yesterday causing damage estimated at close to \$25,000,000.

First reports from underground sources indicated that at least 80 persons were killed and 300 injured by the blast which damaged possibly 1,000 buildings in Aarhus, the second city of Denmark, and set fire to several other vessels in the harbor.

Earlier the news agency had said that order and normal conditions are returning to Copenhagen after a five-day general strike, and disturbances which forced concessions from German occupation authorities.

Eisenhower Visits Front In Normandy

Gen. Eisenhower's Advance Command Post, July 5.—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower returned to his headquarters in England today completing a five-day visit to his troops on the Normandy battlefields.

Besides numerous important conferences with Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley and other field officers, Eisenhower's tour was highlighted by two trips behind enemy lines.

The first, by road, took him past an enemy pocket of resistance during the new American drive on the western side of the Cherbourg peninsula.

The second, by air, was made in an adapted Mustang fighter plane flown by Maj. Gen. Elwood Quesada, head of the Ninth Air Force's "Thunderbolt" command, who led a fighter sweep behind German lines with General Ike as passenger.

Railway Station 300 Yards From Heart Of City Captured; Hand-to-hand Fighting In Streets; Rommel Launches Fierce Counter-Attacks Against British And Canadians

Supreme Allied Expeditionary Force, July 5.—(AP)—Doughboys fought hand-to-hand late today through the streets of La Haye du Puits, German anchor on their western flank in France, after seizing the railway station 300 yards from the heart of that important junction town.

Fierce fighting raged at both ends of the Normandy battlefield as Supreme Headquarters disclosed that more than 58 French cities, towns and villages had been liberated in the first month of the invasion.

Besides battering into La Haye du Puits, Lt. Gen. Omar Bradley's men scored advances of more than two miles along the entire front near the town, six miles inland from the western coast. A field dispatch said the railway station fell shortly after 9 a. m.

The Germans counterattacked with infantry and tanks, throwing in giant Tiger tanks for the first time on the U. S. sector in Normandy in a vain attempt to save the town, the dispatch said.

Violent fighting flared also at the eastern end of the front near Caen. Field Marshal Erwin Rommel attacked heavily against the lower tip of the British wedge southwest of Caen, seeking to break through the Allied line and Canadian troops were forced back in the battle for Carpiquet airfield, due west of Caen.

The Germans held all but the northern half of the airfield after counter-attacks with 30 to 40 tanks, a field dispatch said, and the Canadians withdrew a few hundred yards. But the Canadians continued their hold on the town of Carpiquet itself, three miles from Caen and one of the fortress points guarding that bomb-blasted city of 61,000 population.

The American closed in on La Haye on three sides. The Germans resisted bitterly on the Cherbourg peninsula front, and little progress was made in the swampy country further east from St. Jores to Carpiquet.

The doughboy drive on the peninsula had freed 17 villages and hamlets in 24 hours before the final assault that broke into the highway center.

Progress was far from easy. The Germans, resisted heavily in all sectors, and a particularly violent engagement was going on one-half mile south of newly captured St. Jores, east of La Haye.

The long-quiet Carentan sector erupted into bloody fighting when the Americans launched an attack down the Carentan-Periers road. The doughboys advanced half mile in an attack starting at noon yesterday.

Each foot of the advance had to be covered with artillery. Swamps and canals channelized the fighting. (Continued on page two)

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The Red avalanche, having torn the Germans loose from the strategic strongholds of Minsk and Polotsk, has continued to roll the Nazi back in what has been the greatest disaster that has yet overtaken the man who three years ago marched his conquering legions over this old invasion route in his arrogant quest of world domination.

Berlin itself has admitted that the Russian advances have been so rapid that big German units have been left in the rear of the Muscovites. The Nazi losses have been colossal—something like a quarter of a million men killed or captured in the last 13 days. This sacrifice has been imposed by Hitler himself to the death and, according to captured Nazi General Bauer, has been enforcing this bloody command by exacting reprisals for disobedience.

We have here a picture of German distress which strengthens the belief of observers that the battle of Minsk will prove to be one of the decisive engagements of the entire war. The conservative London Times yesterday in describing the position declared that "part of the eastern front today presents a spectacle that has not been seen in Europe since 1918—that of a broken German army."

This analysis, however, makes it his business to prophesy, but only to indicate trends, possibilities and probabilities. There's the possibility of a German debacle in White Russia. However, the facts don't warrant us in assuming a collapse at the moment. A big more time will tell whether Hitler's rapidly advancing military skill will again enable a withdrawal to other defenses.

In any event, the disaster already visited on the Hitlerites, and the great military advantage gained by the victory in the Minsk sector, rank this as one of the decisive contributions toward the final overthrow of the ancient citadel of Minsk is permitting the Red armies to roll eastward towards East Prussia, Warsaw and Berlin! Polotsk is the open sesame to Latvia and Lithuania, and the crushing Muscovites were said to be less than a score of miles from the frontiers of these Baltic states today.

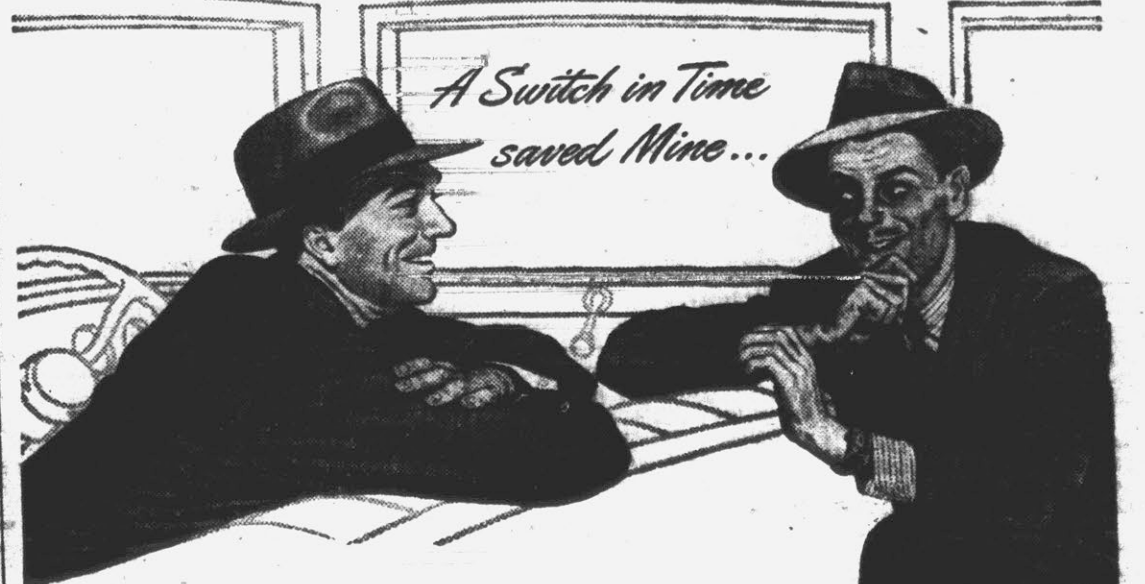

On their first leg June 21, the bombers from Britain attacked a synthetic oil plant 50 miles south of Berlin at Ruhland and flew on to Russia while nearly 1,000 other heavies were working over the German capital itself. This was the first shuttle from British to Russian bases. Five days later, they flew to Italy bombing a Polish oil plant at Drobobycz in Galicia.

The Toulon raid was the fifth from Italy. Harbor installations were attacked and no fighter opposition was reported. Other formations of Portresses and Liberators attacked rail facilities in southern France.

Up to 500 U. S. planes, half heavy bombers and half conveying fighters, carried out the forenoon assault in cloudy weather with opposition so scant that all returned. Other fighter formations dived, bombed and strafed a variety of targets at disclosed points in Europe, again without loss.

British heavy and light bombers struck before dawn at railroads, troop bivouacs and rocket bomb launching platforms, and a synthetic oil plant in the Ruhr.

American Marauders supported British ground troops by bombing two road bridges over the Orne river close to Caen. Both were valuable links for movement of German reserves and material into that embattled inland port.

Other Marauder formations bombed fuel and supply dumps in the Senones forest, 20 miles southwest of Dreux; a rail junction near Laille, 30 miles west of Dreux; and supply points in the wooded area 25 miles southwest of Dreux. Dreux is two-thirds of the way from Caen to Paris. The Marauders and their Thunderbolt escorts encountered no interceptors, but German flak brought down two of the medium bombers.

During the sweeping overnight operations, which climaxed a July 4 display of aerial might in which nearly 5,000 planes ranged over the continent yesterday, RAF Lancasters and Halifaxes pounded railways yards at Villeneuve St. Georges on the southeastern outskirts of Paris and at Orleans, 75 miles to the south.

The blows renewed a campaign—recently interrupted by bad weather—to disrupt the movement of enemy supplies and reinforcements to the Normandy battlefield.
