Churchill Says London Is Suffering Heaviest From Nazi Robot Bombs

Nearly 3,000 Killed And 8,000 More Hospitalized As Result Of German Secret Weapon; Children And Non-Essential Residents Being Evacuated

London, July 6.—(AP)—German robot bombs concentrated upon London have killed 2,752 persons and sent 8,000 to hospitals in the last three weeks, Prime Minister Churchill disclosed today.

London was evacuating children, as in 1940. The world's largest city put into use its shelters held in reserve for emergencies. An unestimated number of American soldiers have been killed. Schools, hospitals and churches were among the buildings hit by the robots, which carry 2,200 pounds of explosives. The assault continued today.

Churchill told Commons that 2,754 of the robots had been discharged on England in three weeks, at the rate of 100 to 150 a day, but many of them had failed to reach the island or had been destroyed.

As to what the Allies are going to do about it, the Prime Minister promised:

"Everything in human power, and we have never failed yet. "London will never be conquered, will never fall; her renown, triumphing over enemy ordeal, will long shine among men."

"Here we began the war and here we will see it ended."

As Churchill spoke, U. S. heavy bombers struck anew at some of the robots-takeoff sites, subjected already to a bombardment of about 50,000 tons of explosives. The RAF had hit the Pas-De-Calais area again last night.

In addition to the 8,000 hospitalized, Churchill said, many others went home after receiving first aid treatment.

More than 10,000 of the casualties were in London.

Churchill called it a "very remarkable fact" that a "very large proportion" of the 2,750 bombs discharged from the French coast up to last midnight "either failed to cross the channel or have been shot down and destroyed by various methods."

These methods, he said, included "a great deployment of batteries, aircraft and balloons which have been very rapidly placed."

The Prime Minister disclosed that a special committee with "a great number of scientists and engineers" at its disposal had been set up to advise on "offensive and defensive" methods. The committee reports to Churchill personally.

The flying bombs have killed more Britons in southern England than were killed in the first 15 days of the battle of Normandy, Churchill said. Although he announced that London was on a blitz basis, with casualty lists to be announced monthly, Churchill emphasized that military operations in France came first.

"I do not want there to be any misunderstanding about it," he said. "We shall not allow our battle operations in Normandy or the attacks we are making against special targets in Germany to suffer."

Robot Raiders Causing Great Destruction In London; American Service Men And Women Among Casualties

London, July 6.—(AP)—Sections of the world's largest city have been affected by robot raiders which explode with terrific impact, damaging buildings and shattering windows for blocks around. (Twenty-seven words were censored at the start of this dispatch.)

Hitler's latest infernal machine is bringing the ancient city of London under direct attack from the ground for the first time in the history of modern war.

(Sixteen words censored) number of these pilotless craft with their tails spitting fire and their noses crammed with 2,200 pounds of high explosives have landed in London since the unique assault began.

Many more missed their marks and countless others have been shot down by vigilant fighter pilots, and anti-aircraft gunners stationed across southern England. Still there was no doubt the Nazis were aiming for the heart of the empire (12 words censored).

(Forty words censored) schools, hospitals and churches have been blasted with loss of life. While the hundreds of casualties have been mostly civilian, there have been a number of service men and women—including Americans—killed and injured. Some of these were stationed in London and others elsewhere.

(Twenty-five words censored) American soldiers were killed and hurt when bombs fell on a club. One bomb landed on a building housing WAAFS (British WACS) and several of them were killed. Another barely missed quarters occupied by American WAC personnel.

One landed in the middle of a square, blowing out windows and frames of the buildings facing the square.

The concussion is so great that leaves are stripped from trees and the once shady square, spread over the ground more thickly than in autumn.

In some instances bombs have wrecked crowded buses moving along streets, killing and injuring their occupants. (Twenty-eight words censored).

Theaters and movie houses throughout the city remain open but the sell-out crowds have disappeared. You can get a seat any time now.

Circus Fire

Hartford, Conn., July 6.—(AP)—An undetermined number of persons, estimated by various officials at between 50 and 100, died today in a fire which turned the big tent of the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus into a tragic scene of death and pandemonium.

County Detective Joseph Mitchell said the number of dead would reach "at least 100" and that the number of injured, trapped beneath the blazing canvas when it collapsed at 2:45 p. m. in the midst of the afternoon performance, was beyond immediate estimate.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, July 6.—(AP)—OPA ceilings on used cars go into effect next Monday, July 10.

They are expected to—and probably will—stop the terrific price rises in that field.

OPA has placed the ceilings at what used cars were selling for in January of this year.

These ceilings are far above what the used cars would be selling for now if there had been no price increases due to the war.

But there will be two kinds of ceilings:

1. The "as is" price. This means what it says: the car sells without a guarantee of any kind.

All individuals and others who do not have repair services and facilities. But dealers who get outside repair work done and thus give guarantees may also sell at "warranty" prices.

OPA considers as dealers only those car sellers who have normal automobile repair services and facilities. But dealers who get outside repair work done and thus give guarantees may also sell at "warranty" prices.

The "warranty" price is higher than the "as is" price. But when dealers sell at "warranty" prices they must furnish each buyer with a written guarantee that the car is in good operating condition and will remain so for 30 days or 1,000 miles. Neither a dealer nor any one else has to give any guarantees with a car sold at an "as is" price.

This is how the two kinds of price-

say OPA has placed an "as is" ceiling of \$990 on a popular make, 1942 model car. That's the top price which can be charged for it without a guarantee.

But suppose it was a dealer who bought that same car from an individual for the "as is" price of \$990 and wanted to sell it at a profit.

By guaranteeing it for 30 days or 1,000 miles he could add \$100 to the \$990 or he could add 25 per cent to the price he paid, \$990, whichever is greater.

So, if he added \$100, he could sell the car for a ceiling price of \$1,090. If he chose to add 25 per cent to the \$990 purchase price, he could sell the car for \$1,238.

But whichever price he charged—\$1,090 or \$1,238—that would be what OPA calls the warranty price.

Now the dealer could add the "warranty" price by making certain maximum charges for accessories, for example:

Ten dollars for any heater; \$30 for any radio; and certain authorized dollar-and-cents amounts for a specific list of built-in equipment, such as over-drive, fluid drive, vacuum transmission, and so forth.

Before buying or selling a car—if you have doubts about the rules—you can get reliable information from all OPA regional and district offices and from War and Price Rationing boards. For violators there are penalties ranging from triple damages to prison sentences and suspension of a dealer's right to sell used cars.

NEW AIR BLOWS AGAINST NAZIS

Improved Weather Increases Allied Air Activity

London, July 6.—(AP)—Around 1,000 U. S. heavy bombers attacked northwest Germany, enemy airfields in France and flying bomb grounds in the Pas-De-Calais department today, while medium and light bombers assaulted railroad lines leading to the Cherbourg front.

Strong forces of U. S. heavy bombers attacked rail, oil and industrial targets in northern Italy today. Objectives included the Bergamo steel works, the Avisco viaduct on the Brenner Pass, Verona's rail yards, two rail bridges across the Tagliamento river at Casarsa, and oil storage tanks at Port Marghera, Aviano and Trieste.

The RAF in great strength bombed the robot platforms on the channel coast and the rail center of Dijon, 160 miles southeast of Paris.

Flying Fortress and Liberator targets were not immediately specified. More than 300 Mustangs and Havoc bombers, since D-Day, the heaviest operations since D-Day, made 30 attacks on these railroad lines: St. Malo-Rennes, St. Hilaire du Harcourt-Fougères-Vitré, Argentan-Lemans, St. Fiers-Fomfont-La Chapelle and Nogent-Leroutou.

Many are in the gap south of the battle fields between the Seine and Loire rivers, over which most bridgeheads have been destroyed. The assaults were high-pressure continuations of the campaign started well before the invasion to isolate the Normandy theater.

Rankin Issues Leaf Crop Report

Recent rains that fell over the greater portion of Eastern Carolina brought much improvement to the 1944 tobacco crop. These rains varied in intensity, ranging from showers to torrential downpours, and naturally the benefit to crops varied accordingly with, except in a few instances, the late tobacco benefiting most from the rainfall.

However, everywhere rains fell new life came to crops that were suffering from hot, dry weather. Tobacco began to take on a green healthy color and started a belated growth. They also brought relief to the early tobacco that was beginning to lose bottom leaves.

While the larger part of the East Belt had practically no rain during June some sections had fair seasons, strictly local and the result is a late and a "spotted" crop. According to estimates of the tobacco growers themselves stands are better than was expected a month ago. The majority of the growers estimate stands at 80, 85 and 90 per cent and basing the statement on this information the belt has an average stand between 80 and 85 per cent, however, reports from some localities indicate stands of 75 per cent or less. Some expect more poundage than was produced in 1943; the majority believe otherwise.

It is hard to point out a county with a good crop. "Spotted" everywhere but with favorable seasons, the late transplantings can develop, grow in to uniformity and bring the general average much higher. Beaufort, Craven and Greene have suffered most from dry weather with several other counties running them a close second. Some tobacco has been burned in a number of counties and the tobacco, while curing up light in weight, is coming out of the barn with a good desirable color.

Japs Expect Invasion Of Bonin Islands Soon

Tokyo Reports Attacks On Guam Yesterday; Americans Mopping Up Last Resistance On Saipan

London, July 6.—(AP)—The German radio declared today that "Japanese circles" expect an American landing in the Bonin Islands, 500 miles from the Japanese homeland, which a U. S. naval task force has been harassing for days.

New York, July 6.—(AP)—The Tokyo radio said today that a force of United States cruisers had shelled Tinian and Guam islands yesterday and that two other islands in the Marianas-Rota and Pagan—had been attacked by American planes.

The broadcast, recorded by the Federal Communications Commission, described the attack upon Guam as a "combined operation," with about 120 planes blasting the island while the cruisers hammered it with high explosives in the morning and again in the afternoon.

Rota was hit by 23 to 30 planes and Pagan by two waves of 20 planes each, Tokyo said.

FFC monitors said atmospheric prevented clear reception of the portion of the broadcast dealing with the attack on Tinian, but Tokyo seemed to be reporting that American gun crews on neighboring Saipan had joined in the bombardment of Tinian.

In another broadcast recorded by the FCC, Tokyo quoted a Japanese imperial headquarters communiqué as saying five Japanese ships and 30 planes had been destroyed by the U. S. naval task force which thrust into the Bonin and Volcano islands to within some 500 miles of the Japanese homeland on July 3-4.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz previously had announced at least five Japanese ships were sunk and several others damaged in the thrusts during which installations on Iwo Jima and Haha Jima were attacked.

The Japanese asserted they had downed 74 American planes, while an official U. S. statement said six were lost.

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, July 6.—(AP)—Impending slaughter of Japanese, massed body to body for a last ditch

stand on Saipan, and the swift seizure of a second enemy airfield 800 miles southeast of the Philippines added emphasis today to a highly significant prediction by Adm. Chester W. Nimitz.

"What we learn on Saipan we will use in assaults on other Japanese positions," he said at a press conference in which he pointed out that Saipan's larger land mass afforded valuable lessons for future operations.

"We are moving westward across the Pacific as rapidly as we can," the Admiral assured.

"And we continue to view the future with confidence."

Howard Handelman, representing the Combined Allied Press, reported today from aboard a flagship off Saipan that thousands of Japanese squeezed into the northeastern cleft of the island, awaited the inevitable.

"The Japs, resigned to death and defeat, lay body to body in caves and pillboxes for a final, frantic gesture against Americans they know they can't halt," he said.

Massed with them were many of the island's 25,000 Japanese civilians, whose role in the bloody showdown was a source of conjecture.

At Noemfof in Dutch New Guinea's Geelvink Bay, where southwest Pacific ground forces are 1,000 miles closer to the Philippines than they were a year ago, capture of Koror island was announced today by Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Paratroops, dropped in force on two successive days, helped win on the Fourth of July. On Sunday, Sixth army troops opened the invasion of Noemfof, investigating Kamri airfield in the first hours. Kororans' advantage over Kamri is that it can be enlarged into a heavy bombers base from which the Philippines can be pounded.

Russians Unleash New Major Drive

Open Offensive In Southern Area; Other Units Pound Toward Wilno, Gateway To Baltic States

Moscow, July 6.—(AP)—The Red army unleashed a great new thrust today in the direction of Plinsk and Brest Litovsk, while vanguards of Gen. Ivan Cherniakhovsky's Third White Russian army were reported within 45 miles of Wilno, gateway to the northern Baltic republics.

Like the beginning of the White Russian campaign, the new drive was launched with terrific artillery barrages operating with mighty air support. It was too early, however, to tell whether it was a general offensive.

Cherniakhovsky's advance on Wilno from the southeast carried through Smorgonie, where his cavalry units were only 10 miles from the borders of East Prussia, front dispatches said.

Other Soviet troops mopping up the Minsk region proceeded with the liquidation of the battered remnants of the German 12th and 27th corps and the 39th tank corps.

Molodeczno, the latest major point to fall to the sweeping Russian offensive, was one of the mainstays of the German 80-mile Vilna-Nesvizh line, and a junction of the Minsk-Wilno and Polotsk-Lida railroads.

The way now appeared open for a simultaneous advance by Cherniakhovsky's Third White Russian army and Gen. Iva Bagramian's First Baltic army into Lithuania and Latvia.

There was no confirmation in Moscow of a German report that the vital communications center of Kovel, 215 miles southwest of Minsk, had been evacuated by Nazi troops.

(The Moscow radio, in a broadcast recorded by the Soviet Monitor in London, said the Germans were counterattacking in the Baranovitch area, 81 miles southwest of Minsk, using infantry, tanks and aircraft. "Particularly fierce fighting is going on," the broadcast said.

(Reuters quoted the Moscow radio as saying other German counterattacks were reported west of Molodeczno, but declaring "The Red army, however, is sweeping the (Continued on page two)

Exemptions For Brides and Babies

Washington, July 6.—(AP)—Congressional tax experts had a word of cheer today for fall newweds and for households anticipating a blessed event in the latter part of the year.

Digging through the technical language of the income tax simplification bill, which became law May 29, they found:

1. A man can take unto himself a wife at any time during a year even on December 31, and take a full \$500 exemption for her in his tax computation.

2. Likewise, a baby born at any time during the taxable year gives its parents a full year's exemption of \$500.

Louisiana Favors Federation Plan

Following similar action taken by the House of Representatives today evening the Senate of Louisiana passed unanimously today a resolution endorsing World Federation and requested the senators and representatives from Louisiana at Washington to support this proposal in the Congress of the United States. Louisiana is the seventh state of the union to endorse this resolution originally passed by North Carolina, and to declare itself in favor of establishing, after this war, a world federation empowered to enact international law and to enforce this law directly against individuals who violate it. Without implicating a whole nation in the crime of its citizens, the action taken today by the Louisiana legislature had the strong support of the governor, speaker of the house, legislative leaders and influential citizens of the state.

The World Federation plan, originated by Robert Lee Humber, of this city, has received the endorsement of large numbers of leading Americans as the best plan for a world conflict. Mr. Humber has been a student of international affairs for a number of years and was engaged in business in Paris at the outbreak of the present war. He and his family left Paris just before it was occupied by the Nazis.

Since originating the Federation proposal, Mr. Humber has visited practically every section of the country in behalf of its adoption.

Hand-To-Hand Fighting Still Goes On In La Haye Du Puits; Fierce Fighting For Airfield Near Caen; French Patriots Giving Valuable Aid To Allies

Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, July 6.—(AP)—Three more towns have fallen to Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley's footslogging American infantrymen. Flanking La Haye du Puits, the Germans' western anchor point in Normandy, Supreme Headquarters announced today and the French underground army has liberated whole sections of France.

The Americans took Glatigny, four miles southwest of La Haye and Scormen, nearby, in the sector near the west coast, while six miles east of the besieged town they captured La Butte, advancing their lines to the edge of the morass, and Marais de Gorges.

Fighting continued in the streets of La Haye where the Americans had captured the railway station, and heavy battles raged for the wooded high ground to the southeast in the Forest de Mont Caen.

While the Supreme Command announced this 1,313 square miles of Normandy had been liberated—an average of 43 square miles a day since the invasion—British and Canadians in the Caen sector at the eastern end of the battle line clung doggedly to Carpiquet, three miles west of Caen, and waged a bitter fight for a no-man's-land airfield just to the south.

Stressing the help being given by French interior troops, the Supreme Command in a special communiqué said these forces were engaged in fighting on a large scale against regular German army units.

Areas liberated by the French were named as the district of Vercores, southwest of the Swiss border; part of the department of Gers between Bordeaux and Toulouse in southern France; the department of Doubs, just west of the Swiss frontier; the department of Ain, northwest of the Swiss frontier; the department of Ardèche on the west side of the Rhone valley in southern France.

"This is not a question of picking off stragglers or small units but of bearing the brunt of heavy German attacks and engaging regular German army units," Supreme Headquarters explained.

bringing disaster to the western Allies as they undertook the frightfully dangerous amphibious invasion of western Europe. There were a hundred and one misfortunes which could have overtaken this invasion and some of them almost did. Now, however, we are past the likelihood of disaster, and once we have broken through Rommel's guard on the road to Paris, Hitler can waste his luck in vain. Does he intend to fight to the death? He certainly intends to resist to the bitter end, there's small chance that his followers will back him to such a limit. The consensus of close observers seems to be that Germany will surrender short of fighting on the home soil. The general view also is that she will try to submit herself to the mercy of the western Allies rather than to the Russians against whom she has perpetrated some of the most horrible atrocities of history.

reached a concentration of one division to slightly less than three miles of the front—a situation that leaves little room for maneuvering. The Allied troops also are closely packed, with little freedom of movement. The German high command was reported throwing tanks and infantry lavishly into the battle, and hand-to-hand fighting was going on for the airfields south of newly-captured Carpiquet. It was agreed here that a deluge of high explosives from the air and a mighty artillery barrage are needed to crack a hole in the German lines around Caen. Today's clearing weather gave promise of the most intense air activity for three weeks. A naval announcement said that German E-boats and 100-ton mine-laying boats had made their most serious attempt to interfere with Allied invasion shipping. Several German flotillas struck from Le Havre but ran into British light coastal forces protecting the eastern flank of the anchorages. In one battle nine of the enemy vessels were engaged and two E-boats were sunk. The rest of the Germans fled.

Germans away in its drive to the west. Great waves of Stormoviks (dive bombers) hunted out the German salients in the Pinsk marshes blasting them from low levels and driving the Nazis along the few roads leading back toward the Gorn river and Pinsk.

Military observers in Moscow saw in this new activity through the difficult marshes a challenge to Hitler's whole central position and if coupled with the southern White Russian offensive, believed it should carry straight to Brest Litovsk and Warsaw.

"The Russians' mighty push toward the Berlin-Warsaw-Wilno-Daugavpils-Pskov-Leningrad railway—one of the main arteries of the Baltics, was under pressure not only from Bagration's First Baltic army but also from Chernikhovsk's cavalry and tanks.

Yesterday Bagration was 38 to 40 miles east of the railway in the region of St. Myadziol, 40 miles north of Molodeczno, and today Chernikhovsk approached point nearly the same distance away as he moved on from Shornogon.

To the south of these two powerful pushes, Russian troops rolling on west of Minsk toward Baranovsk, in a fierce, storming fight reached a place 18 miles away, dispatches said. The Red army is crossing the Vistula river west of Smorgonie, according to a dispatch from Red Star Correspondent Yakov Miletsky, and numerous Germans are fleeing down side roads with the main escape route to Wilno shut. There were numerous reports of the Germans fighting back fiercely as they were being driven back into Wilno. Undoubtedly they are trying to make a stand, but the power of the Soviet offensive appears too much for them at present. Better weather brought the Soviet air force out in strength. Stormoviks, Bostons and Airacobras roared down the Wilno highway, blasting and strafing every German effort to regroup.

Despite Japan's carrier and other warship losses June 19 in the Philippines sea, the enemy navy merits such consideration that "we take into account the estimated capability of the Jap fleet in every move we make," Nimitz cautioned.

"That observation heightened interest in naval task force thrusts into the Volcano and Bonin Islands within less than 700 miles of Tokyo."

"I believe we are approaching the peak of our efficiency in handling ships and planes," said Nimitz, whose fleet units have put ashore and guarded the Saipan invaders without losing a single warship so far.

Nimitz attention was directed to the current drive of the Japanese to set up a railroad linked defense zone all along the China coast. "If anything, that would make us go faster (across the Pacific) than that were possible," he said.

Mrs. C. E. Moore Died Last Night

Mrs. Fannie Lang Moore, 80, widow of the late Dr. Charles E. Moore of Wilson, and one of Farmville's most prominent and Pitt County's oldest citizens, died at a Wilson hospital Wednesday at midnight after three weeks' illness. Funeral services will be held at Emmanuel Episcopal church in Farmville Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Rev. J. R. Rountree of Kinston, the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, pastor of St. Timothy's Episcopal church, Wilson, and the Rev. C. D. Mashburn, pastor of the Farmville Christian church, will officiate. Burial will be in Forest Hill cemetery.

Mrs. Moore was a daughter of the late William Gray Lang and Annie P. Moye Lang. Her father was one

of the pioneer business men and planters of the section. Mrs. Moore was identified with all worthy community movements. She was educated at Farmville Academy and Greensboro Female College. She was twice married. Her first husband was Jacob Fullmore Joyner of Greenville. To this union was born three sons, the late William Lyman and Roland Joyner and Charles Hubert Joyner of Farmville. Her second marriage was to the late Dr. Charles E. Moore of Wilson and she lived in that city 25 years. After his death she returned to Farmville and resumed her activities in the community.

Mrs. Moore was a charter member of the D. A. R., Farmville Literary Club, American War Mothers and was a state officer in the latter organization. She was for 30 years a member of Rebecca Winbourne Chapter, U. D. C., and president at the time of her death. She was also active in Red Cross work. She was a life-long member of the Episcopal church.

Surviving are a son, Charles Hubert Joyner of Farmville and two grandchildren, Mary Frances and Jimmy Joyner of Farmville; a grandson, William Lyman Joyner, Jr., and a great-grandson, William Joyner III of Farmville.

secret discussion, saying he thought that would give an impression he had "not been frank." Deep shelters hitherto regarded as a reserve now will be brought into use, he said, adding that Home Secretary Herbert Morrison ought to be congratulated "on having these up his sleeve." The total of deaths Churchill reported would figure at the rate of more than 3,600 monthly—not so heavy as those inflicted by the Luftwaffe at its prime four years ago. Monthly casualties during the blitz included: September, 1940, 6,976 deaths; October, 6,311; November, 5,093; December, 3,992; January, 1941, 1,648; February, 860; March, 4,610; April, 4,469; May, 5,601; June, 406. Churchill said that in addition to children, non-essential civilians would be encouraged to leave London but that all others must remain at their posts.

Tossing aside a hypothetical suggestion that Parliament move away from London, Churchill growled: "Here we began the war and here we will see it ended."

The House cheered. The German radio reacted promptly, saying that "Churchill made no attempt to minimize the effects of the flying bomb." It asserted that "Churchill defended himself against charges that the British government had almost completely prevented discussion of the effects of V-1 (robot bomb) and that counter measures were insufficient."

Churchill said he could give "no guarantee" about the future of this form of Germany's attack.

He recalled that when he visited the scene of flying bomb damage last Saturday the only question asked of him was "What are you going to do about it?"

Churchill said he replied: "Everything in human power, and we have never failed yet."

With ringing tones the Prime

Minister recalled his bullock defense when London was getting its heaviest doses of bombs dropped by planes more than three years ago during the blitz. He concluded with this proud boast: "London will never be conquered and will never fall in her renown. Triumphant over every ordeal, her light will long shine among men."

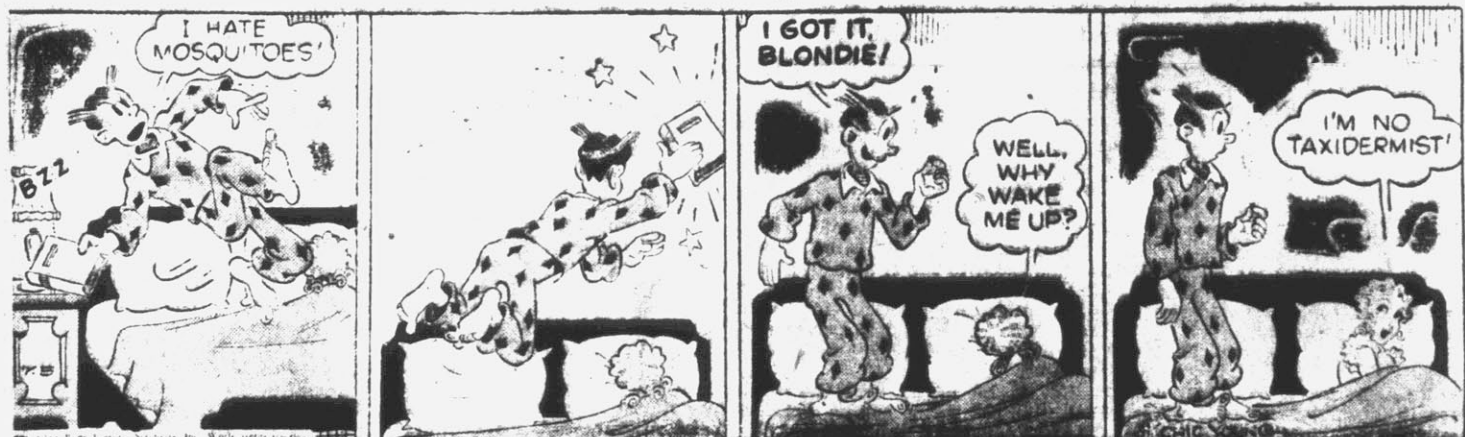

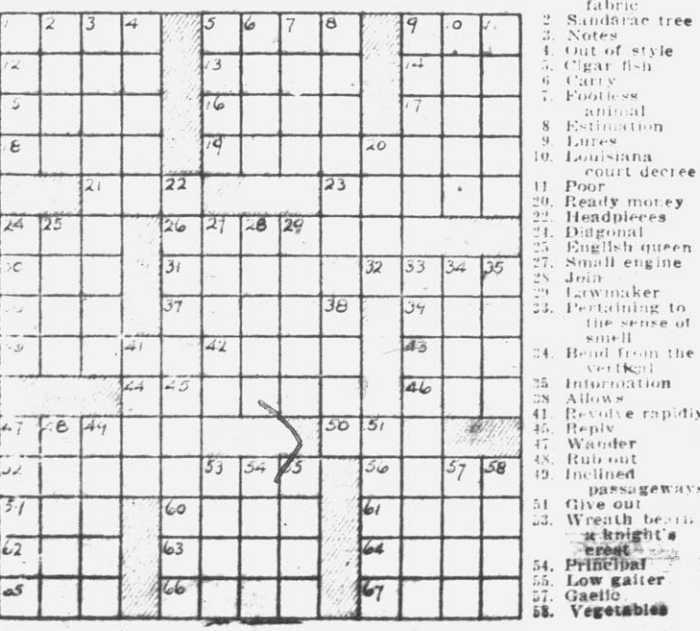

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NAZIS OFFER RESISTANCE

Increased Pressure Slows Allies In Italy

By NOLAN NORGAARD

Rome, July 6.—(AP)—Indian troops of the Eighth army have reached the outskirts of Umbertide in the upper Tiber valley and are threatening the main road to Florence west of Arezzo. Allied headquarters announced today as stiffening German resistance brought the Fifth army's advance up the Italian west coast to a virtual standstill.

American advance units along the coast were reported in the vicinity of Castiglione, some 10 miles south of Livorno (Leghorn), but they were encountering heavy fire from all types of German weapons, including 170 mm. rifles with a range up to 20 miles.

The Germans launched four fierce counter-attacks yesterday against Americans holding half the town of Rosignano, but all were beaten off.

Further inland heavy fighting also was reported in the outskirts of Castellina, but United States tank forces succeeded in driving a mile and a half northeast of Monte Catini under sharp fire from enemy troops lodged on high ground outside the town.

An official spokesman declared "the enemy is particularly nervous about Fifth army movements and is keeping all highways under constant artillery fire."

Northwest of Siena the Fifth army was reported encountering remnants of the 162nd Turcoman and 29th Panzer divisions.

Umbertide, an important highway junction, was reached by Eighth army troops yesterday after they had crushed determined enemy resistance just south of the town, which is 42 miles east of Siena and 65 miles southeast of Florence.

One Eighth army column was only three miles from the important road center of Arezzo after struggling through mud and elaborate German demolitions. At one point the Germans blew out 120 feet of roadway to impede pursuit.

Dudley, across the river, and Russell Standell on the Falkland highway have cured some leaf and are satisfied with the quality, they said. ordinated attack from Italy and England, for radio Berlin asserted that other American bombers and fighters were approaching southern Germany and Austria. British blows at Dijon were aimed at checking enemy reinforcements and supplies moving to the Norman battlefields. Fighters and fighter-bombers flying with the Flying Fortresses and Liberators in the widespread daylight assaults dive-bombed and strafed unspecified targets.

Better weather placed the aerial offensive on a round-the-clock basis again, even though Churchill said "a considerable proportion of our flying power has been diverted" against the robot bomb launching platforms in the Pas-De-Calais area.

Squadrons of Mosquitos bombed a synthetic oil plant in the Ruhr near Gelsenkirche, leaving it wreathed in smoke two miles high. Other industrial targets were hit in western Germany and four Nazi ships, creeping down the coast toward the Frisian islands, felt the

bonds until you get what you want at a reasonable price?

"What about those dollars in hiding in the old shoes, trunks, safes and lock boxes? Wouldn't it be better to have more invested in E bonds drawing interest than have your money lying idle? Is the man with hoarded dollars on the home front backing up the soldier on the battlefield as he should?

"Published figures indicate there is more currency in circulation now than at any other period of our nation's history. Are you helping in this way to create inflation, to deprive the boys who are risking their lives and giving their lives daily of the use of your dollars to buy supplies and ammunition, when you could invest in war bonds and receive interest and have the best security on the face of the earth?" the banker said.
