Malaria Control Work Under Way

The opening of the Marine air field in Greenville in March, bringing these troops for training, required special measures for the prevention of malaria while these men were in training here.
Malaria is a problem in all camps located in the southeastern states and at the beginning of the war the U. S. Public Health Service recognized this danger and set up an organization within itself known as malaria control in war areas, with headquarters in Atlanta.
Malaria control work is being carried out around all camps located in states where malaria is endemic and this work is financed entirely by funds from the U. S. Public Health Service. This organization works entirely through and with the State Board of Health and the local county health department.
In Greenville, the Public Health Service has assigned H. K. Dickert as area supervisor in charge of the field work. This work is carried on under the auspices of the local health officer, Dr. N. T. Ennett.
Mr. Dickert is from South Carolina and has had a number of years experience in malaria control work. He is a civil engineer and intends to carry out as much drainage work as is necessary for the reduction of the breeding places for the malaria mosquito. Since the swamp just across the river is one of the largest breeding areas in the vicinity, any drainage work carried out there should tend to reduce malaria in the city of Greenville.

DEAN ROBERT B. HOUSE SPEAKS AT COLLEGE
Robert B. House, dean of administration of the University of North Carolina, spoke on the "Vocation of a Teacher" at noon today to an audience composed of students, faculty and townsfolk in the Austin Auditorium at East Carolina Teachers College.

Dean House was introduced by President Howard J. McGinnis, and responded immediately by presenting his "notes" for his speech by playing a mouth organ, to the delight of his listeners.

Dean House pointed out that a teacher must love, study, and practice what he teaches; that this love, thought, and action must also extend to his students; that he should lead students to love, study, and practice something worth while. He held that subjects change and become more numerous, but fundamental values remain the same.

Vocational education, he said, is being emphasized now, and should be, but that it should not lessen advancement in culture and religion. In dealing with culture, Dean House became more specific and pointed out that among its essentials are real knowledge of reading, writing, and speaking. Religion he characterized as deep spiritual feeling.

Teachers must provide vocational knowledge, and culture and culture grounded in religion in order to fit a person to function to advantage in life.

Every ounce of home-canned food is urgently needed. Your Government begs you not only to match what you did last year but, if possible, to better your 1943 record.

Put up fruits and tomatoes by the boilingwater bath method — a safe and satisfactory method for these foods.

But before you begin your 1944 canning of all other vegetables, Good Housekeeping wants to tell you how to avoid a danger that may occur in home-canned food—a danger recognized by many authorities, including the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

That danger is botulinus food poisoning!

Botulinus poisoning comes from bacteria that live in the soil and cling to vegetables. It is rare — but it isn't confined to just a few parts of the country, as some people think.

Botulinus germs may be on the food you can. They must be destroyed. Wherever these bacteria are present in the food and are not de-

stroyed during the canning process, they gradually produce a toxin which is poisonous.

It takes hotter-than-boiling heat to kill botulinus germs. Neither hot water bath nor open-kettle canning provides enough heat to destroy them. That is why we advise: the only safe way to can low-acid vegetables — which means all vegetables except tomatoes — is by the correct use of a pressure cooker!

If you don't already own a pressure cooker, you'll be glad to know that the Government is allowing the manufacture of 400,000 new cookers for sale this summer without priorities.

If you can't buy a pressure cooker, borrow your neighbor's... or perhaps you'll find one available through a community canning group. If not, form your own community group, and buy one. To be safe, don't can low-acid vegetables any other way.

We take this opportunity to issue two further warnings: 1. Oven canning is dangerous. It has caused many serious accidents to persons and to property. Shun it! 2. All home-canned foods should be examined carefully when opened. If there is evidence of spoilage, the food should not be used. NEVER TASTE to discover spoilage.

By all means, put up every ounce of surplus food you possibly can. Our armed forces and the hungry nations of the earth need the benefits of our abundance.

Spot prices were unchanged to 15 cents a bale lower; July 22.12, October 21.60 and December 21.49. Futures closed 10 to 40 cents a bale higher.

N. Y. Stock Market

New York, July 10—(AP)—Customers turned to the selling side here and there in today's stock market but enough new buying appeared to lift selected issues fractions to a point or more and the 7-year high division was well populated.

Optimism over war developments again was helpful although this was chilled somewhat marketwise by General Eisenhower's prediction of "long and bitter fighting before final victory." ugly spectacle of senseless dying," he continued.

"Enemy troops, weakened to a point of exhaustion by two days of futile counterattack, were pushed steadily backward. The desperation and panic behind the enemy lines helped to crumble Japanese defenses."

The strategic value of Saipan was immense. "Saipan offers the best possibilities for airfield development of any of the islands captured from the Japanese in the central Pacific campaign," said Vice Adm. John H. Hoover, commander of the central Pacific forward area.

"Its main airstrip is far the best that we have taken and the island's size offers additional advantages of wide dispersal."

Superfortresses could operate from Saipan with devastating power against Tokyo 1,450 miles north, or the Philippines, 1,500 miles west. The island also has great potentialities as a naval supply point and submarine staging base. It is less than 150 miles north of Guam, first U. S. territory taken by Japan after the outbreak of war.

Noemfoor's three airfields, 800 miles southeast of Mindanao, were captured within five days last week. Noemfoor and the nearby Schouten Islands, where the Americans hold four airdromes on Blak and Owl, surround New Guinea's huge Geelvink Bay, with its possibilities for elaborate naval development.

Organized resistance of Saipan collapsed rather suddenly. Admiral Chester W. Nimitz announced, following a day of suicidal counterattacks that penetrated the American lines in some places as much as 2,000 yards but cost the enemy 1,500 dead.

At least 11,500 Japanese—probably thousands more—were killed and more than 7,000 enemy civilians were imprisoned. American casualties to June 28 were 1,474 dead and 8,278 wounded.

landed 14 miles southeast of Livorno. This village is astride the important north-south highway. La-jatico, 21 miles east of Livorno, was threatened by another thrust.

In a brisk battle north of Rosignano, the Americans took 80 prisoners. Northwest of Castellina they killed 20 and captured 22 in close quarter fighting. Elements of eight German divisions have been identified in the line facing the Fifth army. Among them are the 36th SS regiment and the Ninth Panzer Grenadier regiment.

ferred to Lithuania in 1940, the Russians appeared to have that ancient center of Baltic civilization on the verge of capitulation, Moscow dispatches said.

The German broadcast said the Nazi defenders had "barricaded themselves in the center of the city. House after house was defended the most stubbornly and the Soviets are paying with the highest sanguinary losses for every meter of ground gained in the shattered town."

The Berlin commentator, Walter

Plato, said the Russians had reached the Kaunas-Daugavpils road in the neighborhood of Otena where fierce fighting raged.

This was inside Lithuanian borders as they existed before the country was made a Soviet republic and some former Polish territory annexed. It apparently was about 80 or 85 miles from the German frontier of East Prussia.

Previous reports said the Russians were sweeping past Wilno to the northwest toward Kaunas, 50 miles to the west, and had crossed the pre-war Lithuanian border and had brought the rail line under fire.

Tilist in East Prussia and Elga, the Latvian port on the Baltic appeared in the path of the offensive. The German underground information received here said the Germans already had declared East Prussia "a rear area of operations" and were planning a swift withdrawal from the Pakov-Narva sector of Estonia in the northern Baltics where their forces were threatened with being cut off from Germany except by sea.

The Nazi plan called for evacuation of all Estonia and most of Latvia in order to conserve forces for the defense of East Prussia, the cradle of Junkerism, this adviser said.

The Stockholm newspaper Afton-tidningen declared Adolf Hitler had moved his headquarters at Lotzen in East Prussia to a point deeper inland and that German army headquarters at Rominlen in East Prussia, also were being moved westward.

Restriction on civilian travel and other activities were reported in East Prussia as the Russian army groups thundered westward at a startling pace. Gauleiter, Erich Koegel, commander of East Prussia, were said to have been given dictatorial powers to aid the defense of the province.

The forces of Field Marshal Erwin Rommel were badly mauled in the fierce fighting for Caen, with the major part of two divisions trapped in pockets north of the river Orne by the swift British advance. But the bulk of the German troops engaged in the area staged an "organized retreat."
