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## SOVIET FORCES LASH FORWARD IN LITHUANIA

**Advance Units Within 60 Miles Of East Prussia; Other Red Army Forces Driving Toward Warsaw; Germans Report New Russian Offensive On Romanian Front**

London, July 11.—Russian troops streaming deep into Lithuania thrust within striking distance today of the East Prussian frontier and moved swiftly toward the Baltic coast in wide enveloping advances which threatened to trap two German armies in the north.

Southward in old Poland, other army groups beat toward the rail center of Bialystok and directly menaced Pinsk. The Germans reported a massive new Soviet offensive in Romania north of the rail center of Iasi—a drive threatening the Galati gap and the Ploesti oil fields, already extensively ruined by American bombs.

The Moscow communique said the Germans suffered "tremendous losses" in a general Russian forward surge all the way from the Latvian border to the middle of the Pripyat marshes, some 400 miles southward.

A powerful wedge was driven into Lithuania at about the midway point of the 100-mile battlefront between Daugavpils, in southeastern Latvia, and the by-passed and doomed German stronghold of Wilno—some now of bloody street fighting.

Advancing not less than 28 miles yesterday, Col. Gen. Ivan C. Bagration's Baltic troops cut the highway between Daugavpils and the Lithuanian city of Kaunas in a drive within 120 miles of the Baltic port of Riga, capital of Latvia.

Bagration's drive was accompanied to within 20 miles of Daugavpils in a frontal assault.

Ten miles westward from Wilno rampaging Soviet soldiers overran the rail junction of Landwarow on the route to Kaunas—an advance that supported British press dispatches that the Red army vanguards were within 60 miles of East Prussia. The Swedish newspaper Morgon Tidningen reported the Germans were emptying East Prussia of civilians.

Premier Stalin announced in an order of the day that the first White Russian army of Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky, pounding westward on the southern sector of the front, had occupied Luniniec, 30 miles east of Pinsk on the rail route to Brest-Litovsk and Warsaw, and Slonim, 28 miles to the Polish northwest on the railway to the Polish communications hub of Bialystok now only 85 miles beyond.

Other columns striking north through the Pripyat marshes moved within nine miles of Pinsk.

The fall of Luniniec and the pressure of a companion column driving from the Pripyat marshes on the south was rapidly making the German position in Pinsk untenable.

Nearly 500 planes fell in yesterday's westward surge. Utena forward the advance peak of the wedge thrust into Lithuania. Here the Russians stood within 115 miles of the Baltic seaport of Memel.

## Compromise Is Reached On Production Program

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—A compromise settlement has been reached on WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson's program for resumption of limited civilian production, informed government sources reported today.

Three of his four proposed orders will become effective at once but the fourth will be postponed for a time.

The compromise has been agreed upon by top WPB officials in conference with army and navy chiefs who objected to the plan on grounds it would divert needed labor from war production, these sources said.

Formal announcement of the compromise was expected late today.

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—Signs emerged today that the military may prove willing to compromise with WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson on his disputed program paving the way for reconversion.

Army and navy sources indicated, however, that the controversy would be carried to the White House, where James F. Byrnes, director of the Office of War Mobilization, stated yesterday that he would make the decision if necessary.

## DE GAULLE TO RULE FRANCE

**To Administer Civil Affairs Under Eisenhower Supervision**

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt announced today that he is accepting the French National Committee headed by General Charles De Gaulle as the authority for civil administration of liberated France.

Mr. Roosevelt's new attitude toward the committee, the chief executive made clear at his news conference, results from the talks which he had last Thursday, Friday and Saturday with De Gaulle.

There is no change, the President said, in the policy of this government in not recognizing the French Committee as a provisional government.

In its capacity of "de facto authority," the committee will be under the general supervision of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Allied supreme commander. Eisenhower will have the decision on when a city or town or department can be released from military administration and turned over to the committee.

The President used the term "de facto authority" in describing the committee's role pending the time that the French people have an opportunity to choose a government for themselves.

"De facto authority" simply means that the committee will in fact exercise the authority of an administrator and will be recognized.

## More Than 2,000 Aircraft Take Part; Berlin And Other Areas Hit By RAF Last Night

London, July 11.—(AP)—A sky-blackened fleet of 2,500 American planes attacked the Munich area of southern Germany today while another force of U. S. Liberators struck from Italy at Toulon, in the south of France.

By night, British Mosquitos bombed Berlin with two-ton explosives. Some 1,100 of the Munich attack force were heavy bombers, the rest were fighters.

Toulon, graveyard of the scuttled French fleet, lies to the east of the Rhone valley, a historic invasion route. It was the sixth attack on this port from Italy, the last previous raid being on July 5. German reports a good pattern of bombs on the harbor installations, including German submarine pens.

A Swiss communique said seven American bombers landed in the country, southwest of Munich.

With American planes operating on Munich and Toulon, Britain's great black-winged Lancasters with fighter escort attacked flying bomb installations in northern France, from which the Nazis dispatched more robots at London after dawn.

The targets were not immediately identified. Weather was foul, forcing Fortresses and Liberators to force their high explosive loads by instrument through cloud layers.

The Munich attack was the second.

## Need Teachers For Schools In County

Inquiry at the office of the County Board of Education today revealed that the county school system is still short 21 teachers for the fall and winter term which opens on August 30.

The largest number of vacancies is in first grade work, seventh grade, commercial subjects, mathematics and natural science. Very few teachers are now being trained in these special and difficult fields.

Supt. Don H. Conley stated today.

"Every effort is being made by the County Board of Education to fill existing vacancies. In many instances it has become necessary to draft local teachers who dropped out of school work several years ago. It now appears that this will have to be a general practice for at least the duration of the war," the superintendent said.

## Dewey To Attend Governors' Meet

Albany, N. Y., July 11.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey announced today a conference of Republican governors would take place Aug. 2 and 3 in St. Louis.

Dewey, GOP presidential nominee, will attend the conference with the other 25 Republican governors, including John W. Bricker of Ohio, the vice-presidential nominee.

Dewey said the conference would be concerned with the "area of responsibility and obligation as between states and the federal government and how these obligations to the people can best be performed."

## ROOSEVELT TO BE CANDIDATE FOURTH TERM

**Says He Prefers To Retire But Will Accept Presidency Again If Renominated And Reelected**

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt declared today he will "reluctantly, but as a good soldier" accept renomination by the Democratic national convention and serve another four years in the White House if elected.

In a letter to Democratic Chairman Robert E. Hannegan, Mr. Roosevelt said he personally wanted to retire and avoid public responsibilities and the publicity that "follows every step" of the President.

"But if the people command me to continue in this office and in this war," he added, "I have as little right to withdraw as the soldier has to leave his post in the line."

The President's letter was made public at a White House news conference which grew tense with expectancy when Mr. Roosevelt told 99 reporters gathered in his oval office that the doors had been locked.

A reporter said that something important was coming.

Another reporter raised the familiar fourth-term question and, stammering, Mr. Roosevelt disclosed that this time the big news was coming.

He then read his exchange of letters with Hannegan. Hannegan wrote the President in July 10 that enough delegates to the party convention starting a week from tomorrow are committed to his renomination to assure it.

"If the convention should carry this out, and nominate me for the presidency, I shall accept," Mr. Roosevelt wrote Hannegan. "If the people elect me, I will serve."

The President said, however, that he would not "run" for reelection in the accepted political sense "but if the people command me to continue in this office and in this war, I have as little right to withdraw as the soldier has to leave his post in the line."

## Airmen Hit Jap Bases In China

Chungking, July 11.—(AP)—U. S. planes have bombed the Japanese bases of Sinyang and Yochow, destroying five enemy planes and damaging several others, Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell announced today.

Southeast of Hengyang, American Warhawks destroyed 50 supply boats and two pontoon bridges in support of the unobtainable Chinese. An air strike at Hengyang was damaged.

The 14th air force also raided canal shipping in the northeast of French Indo-China and dropped supplies to Chinese forces on the Salween river front in Yunnan.

Three barges, one of which was damaged, were in the canal at Yochow. The chief Japanese base in the current drive in Hunan province, Sinyang nourishes the enemy offensive moves in southern Honan.

Large fires were kindled at Yochow where four of ten Japanese planes were destroyed.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The new and heavy attacks on the islands of Guam and Rota by American warships and bombers are a natural accompaniment of the capture of the neighboring island of Saipan—the strategic air and naval base which has been one of the enemy's main shields not only for Japan proper but for the Philippines.

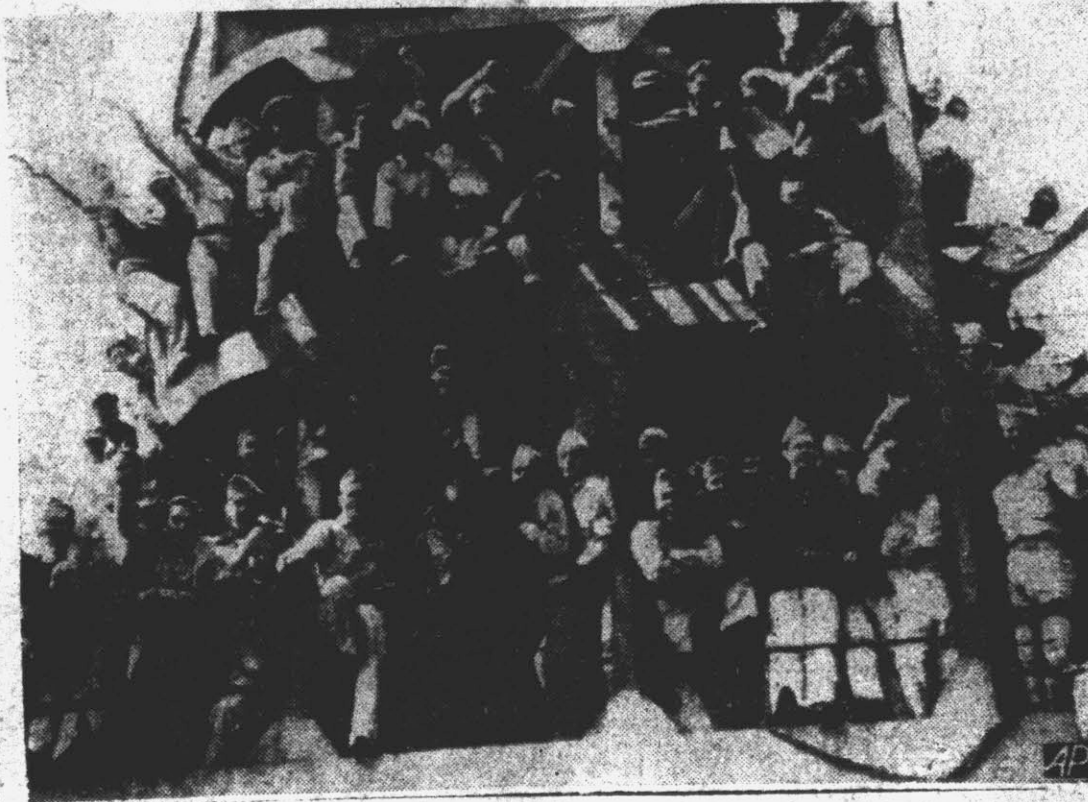
The war is moving very fast in the Pacific. The fresh assaults on Guam and Rota certainly presage neutralization of these bases and it's not unlikely that we shall occupy them. We may expect similar operations in the immediate future against other major Japanese bases in this inner defense area—Truk, Yap, Palau and Bonin, all of which are within reach of our big bombers.

But after we have neutralized and perhaps occupied these islands, where do we go? It would indeed be interesting to know what ideas are being nursed by General MacArthur and Admiral Nimitz, now that we have possession of Saipan. Certainly this pair has in mind what could bring no joy to a harassed Japanese government which 12 days ago, during the height of the bloody struggle for Saipan, broadcast to its public:

"We, the 100,000,000 people of Japan, must realize now, if ever, that the outcome of the battle of the Marianas (the group of which Saipan is the main island) will exert a very serious influence upon

## NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

**Nazis Fighting Fiercely and Yielding Ground Grudgingly**

Rome, July 11.—(AP)—Employing encircling tactics against stubbornly defended and heavily fortified German strongholds, American troops were working their way steadily northward today in a broad enveloping movement aimed at the key Italian port of Livorno (Leghorn).

Allied headquarters announced that Fifth army forces had by-passed the town of Lajatico, 21 miles southeast of Livorno in one phase of this movement and had stabbed ahead against fierce opposition.

A similar operation resulted in the bypassing of Pomaja, about eight miles inland from the Italian west coast and approximately midway between Lajatico and the coastal town of Castiglione. Troops which drove around Pomaja on the east subsequently captured the village of Casale, one mile to the north.

## More Landings Expected; Berlin Says U. S. Will Not Shun Showdown Fight With Japs

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, July 11.—(AP)—American ships and planes struck fresh blows at Guam and Rota over the week-end, bringing complete neutralization of the Marianas—or perhaps, new invasion operations—a step nearer today.

Guam and Rota are less than 150 miles south of Saipan, which has been captured by American Marines and soldiers.

Light cruisers and destroyers shelled Guam Saturday for the second time since Japan took the island December 11, 1941. Guam first was shelled June 15, while the Saipan landings were in progress.

A Pearl Harbor communique said the Saturday shelling damaged Japanese defense positions, buildings and small craft along the beaches.

Planes of a fast carrier task group, braving heavy anti-aircraft fire, attacked both Guam and Rota Sunday with bombs, rockets and machinegun fire. One carrier plane was lost, but a destroyer rescued the crew.

## Newspapers Helped War Bond Campaign

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—Treasury Secretary Morgenthau and Ted R. Grumble, war finance director, expressed enthusiastic recognition of the newspapers' cooperation in the successful Fifth War Loan drive. Frank Tripp, chairman of the Allied Newspaper Council, said today.

Tripp, who made a preliminary report for the newspapers in a conference with the treasury officials, said they paid particular tribute to news writers and editors.

The newspaper representative said he was confident that final financial figures will show that the \$5,000,000,000 individual quota has been exceeded and that every phase of the Fifth Loan drive will create new record of public support of the war.

## Toabacco Grows Like Beanstalk In Pitt

Tobacco is growing like the proverbial beanstalk and corn is making an excellent comeback in many fields and other crops are flourishing as a result of recent rains.

The condition of crops now in comparison with two weeks ago is a revelation in what nature can do with plenty of moisture. Tobacco prospects are excellent, farmers say, except in cases where no satisfactory stand was secured in the spring.

Tobacco in some fields is as high as a man's head. One farmer last Saturday afternoon placed a tobacco stick by the side of a tobacco plant and set the top of it on a level with the plant. Monday morning the tobacco plant had grown six inches and was still growing. Kinchen Cobb, farmer and warehouseman, reported today.

## SUB IS LOST IN PACIFIC

**All Hands Perish In Training Cruise Disaster**

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—Loss of the 20-year-old submarine S-28 during training exercises in the Pacific was announced today by the navy.

The sub carried a complement of about 60 men and was under command of Lt. Cmdr. Jack C. Campbell, 29, whose wife, Mrs. Jean Brooks Campbell, lives in Groton, Conn.

The navy did not disclose where the S-28 was lost.

"The depth of water makes it impossible to salvage the submarine, and hope has been abandoned for the recovery of the missing personnel," the navy said.

It added that an investigation is being made to determine the cause of the accident.

"There were no survivors," the navy said.

The S-28 was built by the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation at Quincy, Mass., and was commissioned in December, 1923. She is the 25th submarine to be lost since the war started and the second lost in training exercises during that period.

## More Platform Talk As Convention Date Nears

Democrats talked platform and vice presidential problems today while Republicans looked forward to a pooling of the election-winning abilities of their 26 governors for the benefit of Thomas E. Dewey in the presidential race.

John W. McCormack of Massachusetts, majority leader in the house and chairman of the Democratic convention platform committee, expressed confidence that one plank will call for "sound and international action to prevent war and to assure permanent peace."

The convention starts a week from tomorrow in Chicago but a two-hour visit between President Roosevelt and Vice President Wallace at the White House yesterday produced no new information on how Wallace stands for renomination.

Whether Mr. Roosevelt, the expected nominee for a fourth term, requests Wallace's selection will be of great consequence, but Wallace was emphatic in saying the only subject they discussed was China.

At Montgomery, Ala., Governor Chauncey Sparks declared that southerners who want to supplant Wallace are unwise in not uniting behind one candidate alone. He said he thought Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky would be a

## British And Canadians Push Forward In Caen Area While Americans Open New Two-Pronged Offensive Against St. Lo; Nazi Fighting Desperately

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, July 11.—(AP)—American troops bursting forward in a new offensive shattered today to a point within two miles of St. Lo, junction-bastion of central Normandy, and ripped through Nazi defenses in two sectors farther west on their flaming 40-mile front.

In Eastern Normandy, British-Canadian forces struck ahead a mile across the Orne river east of Caen against the Germans making a fierce stand in the suburb of Vaucelles, and occupied the west bank of the Orne and a four-mile stretch from Caen's outskirts.

U. S. troops and tanks, advancing under a pulverizing artillery barrage, gained from two to three miles in the drive on St. Lo, and other doughboys farther northwest also pounded forward, seizing four towns in a few hours.

One of these columns striking south from Caen captured La Maugeule and La Roerle four miles from Periers, and another hitting west from the Vire river seized Haut Verney and Le Mesnilgout three miles beyond fallen St. Jean de Daye.

These two blows were coordinated with the new offensive against St. Lo, jumping off at dawn and closing on the town from two directions, the doughboys pushed to within two miles of St. Lo against heavy resistance by crack parachute troops and SS forces.

British troops in their first advance from positions east of the Orne in several weeks drove south a mile, and occupied Combelles on the outskirts of the suburb of Vaucelles.

Canadian troops in a fast mop-up of their sector reached the Orne's west bank from Caen to a point just north of Maltot, four miles southwest of Caen, where the British were engaged in heavy fighting. German resistance was stiffening in the Caen sector.

Troops of Lt.-Gen. Omar N. Bradley's American First army driving on St. Lo reached the outskirts of Luzerne and Mesnil-Rozelin, just north of the city.

The attack was coordinated from the north and northwest of St. Lo. Fall of that city of 15,000 would force a German withdrawal from the remainder of the Cherbourg peninsula.

## Roosevelt May Back Wallace

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—Reports circulated today that President Roosevelt has decided to indicate publicly that Henry Wallace is his choice for renomination as vice president.

How Mr. Roosevelt might make known his views was not indicated. The same political sources said that a public expression for Wallace did not mean the President would attempt to dictate a choice to the convention meeting in Chicago on July 19.

The opinion in Democratic circles continued to be that the President, beyond making his opinion known, would leave choice of a vice-presidential running mate entirely to the convention.

And the best way for parents to instill loyalty to the church in the life of a child is by being loyal to the church themselves.

Every branch of the Christian church stands eager and ready to help parents in the training of their children. The wise parent welcomes such assistance.

cent was referring to his war-time role of commander in chief of the armed forces.

"For myself, I do not want to run," Mr. Roosevelt said. "By next spring I shall have been President and commander-in-chief of the armed forces for 12 years—three times elected by the people of this country under the American constitutional system."

"From the personal point of view, I believe that our economic system is on a sounder, more human basis than it was at the time of my first inauguration x x x. "After many years of public service, therefore, my personal thoughts have turned to the day when I could return to civil life. All that is within me cries out to go back to my home on the Hudson river, to avoid public responsibilities, and to avoid also the publicity which in our democracy follows every step of the nation's chief executive."

In Albany, N. Y., Governor Thomas E. Dewey, Republican presidential nominee, had no comment on Mr. Roosevelt's statement.

That would be his choice, Mr. Roosevelt said, but he assured Hannegan he would forego if the convention drafted him and the people elected him for another term.

Mr. Roosevelt made no mention of the second place on the ticket and the status of Vice President Wallace remained unclarified.

Wallace told reporters last night after a two-hour conference with the President, that the conversation dealt solely with China, from where the vice president has just returned.

A reporter asked if "you mean that the 1944 political situation was not mentioned?"

"That is right," Wallace replied. "As he completed reading his correspondence today a reporter asked Mr. Roosevelt what he could say about yesterday's conference with Wallace."

Oh, the President said, they had

just talked about China.

Smiling, he told the reporters how to get out of his office and a scramble started toward the doors.

Mr. Roosevelt stated in his letter to Hannegan that winning the war is the number one objective of this nation. In one of the few operations in

yesterday's murky weather, rocket-firing Typhoons, bomb-carrying Spitfires and RAF Mustangs poured explosives and fire into German troops driven into the woods southeast of Caen by the British-Canadian capture of that city.

Despite the adverse conditions, fighter-bombers ran up more than 300 individual flights by last evening. American fighter-bombers, dive-bombed German gun positions and strong points southeast and southwest of Lessay and east of St. Lo.

The night attack on Berlin was the ninth time the German capital has been bombed since D-Day. Mosquitoes have battered it eight times and American daylight heavy bombers made a mass attack on the city June 21.

A number of ferries and six trains were shot up in the forays into France last night and a big highway convoy near Compiègne was attacked and the road was left littered.

Two Mosquitoes carrying a pair of 500-pound bombs each in addition to guns, accomplished this damage in half an hour.

Ripped up the main railroad line near Ruffec, bombed the rear end of a camouflaged freight train as it entered a tunnel and shot up the front end as it emerged. Bombed two transformer stations and shelled a third, shot up freight cars in three yards, blew up a locomotive, and shot up three more trains.

Ottawa, July 11—(AP)—General Charles De Gaulle arrived by plane this morning for a one-day visit to Ottawa, and was greeted at the airport by Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Defense Minister J. L. Ralston, high army, navy and air force officers and other members of the federal cabinet.

De Gaulle reviewed a guard of honor, and a unit of Fighting French air cadets.

through the Marianas by taking Saipan, hunted down the few remaining Japanese snipers and stragglers at large on that island. Belated enemy civilians also were trickling in to surrender.

Meanwhile, Liberators from central and southwest Pacific bases collaborated in attacks upon the principal Japanese bases in the Carolines—at Truk, Palau, Yap and Woleai.

Enemy planes took off from Truk and Palau to avoid destruction on the ground. Only at Yap was there interception, but three of the 13 enemy planes probably were shot down.

Liberators of the Far East all force dropped 43 tons of bombs upon Sorong, last important Japanese base in Dutch New Guinea. Other Allied planes hit targets from the by-passed Marshall Islands to the south westernmost borders of the New Guinea sector.

New York, July 11—(AP)—The Japanese radio said today that "a very powerful enemy fleet consisting of two aircraft carriers and more than 30 cruisers and destroyers are playing the waters northwest of 'Tinian Island' in the Marianas. The radio report, a Domei agency advisory recorded by U. S. government monitors, said 90 planes attacked the stolen American island of Guam in the Marianas on July 16 and that cruisers and destroyers shelled Japanese positions on Guam while other aircraft were bombing 'Tinian and Rota. All are in the same island group as captured Saipan, 1,465 miles from Tokyo."

"Enemy raids against our positions around Saipan are increasing in intensity," the advisory said.

Domei said "several large planes and more than 50 small planes" were observed using Asitilo airfield on the southern end of Saipan island, first captured strip in the Marianas, which has been in operation a week or more.

The Berlin radio said the United States "possesses considerable supremacy in aircraft carriers" in the Marianas.

"The United States has prepared itself for a decisive battle," the Berlin radio asserted, "it will not shun this battle wherever opportunity offers."

The 100th battalion, composed of American troops of Japanese origin, was engaged in violent fighting on relatively flat ground three miles west of Pomaia and was reported making some progress.

The German garrison at Pomaia thus was threatened on two sides, and the Nazi force at Laajatico was in much the same position.

Except for a few spots where the enemy gave ground grudgingly to maintain a unified line, the battle along the entire Italian front was slow and arduous. The Nazis launched a number of fierce counterattacks.

"There were growing indications that it likely would be a matter of many days before the Allies batter their way even to contact with the main Gothic line defenses."

A large force of RAF Wellingtons and Halifaxes poured many two-ton blockbusters and thousands of incendiaries on rail yards at Milan, leaving the target sprinkled with fires.

Unfavorable weather grounded American heavy bombers yesterday but B-25 Mitchells, penetrating farther north than ever before, hammered rail yards and bridges at Cremona and in the Venice and Genoa areas. Marauders bombed similar targets in the Bologna region.

A large enemy fuel dump west of Cremona was destroyed by Thunderbolts. Smoke from the flaming dump was visible 70 miles.

Thunderbolts also cut rail lines and destroyed at least 50 railroad cars and strafed the Modena airfield in repeated sorties into the Po valley.

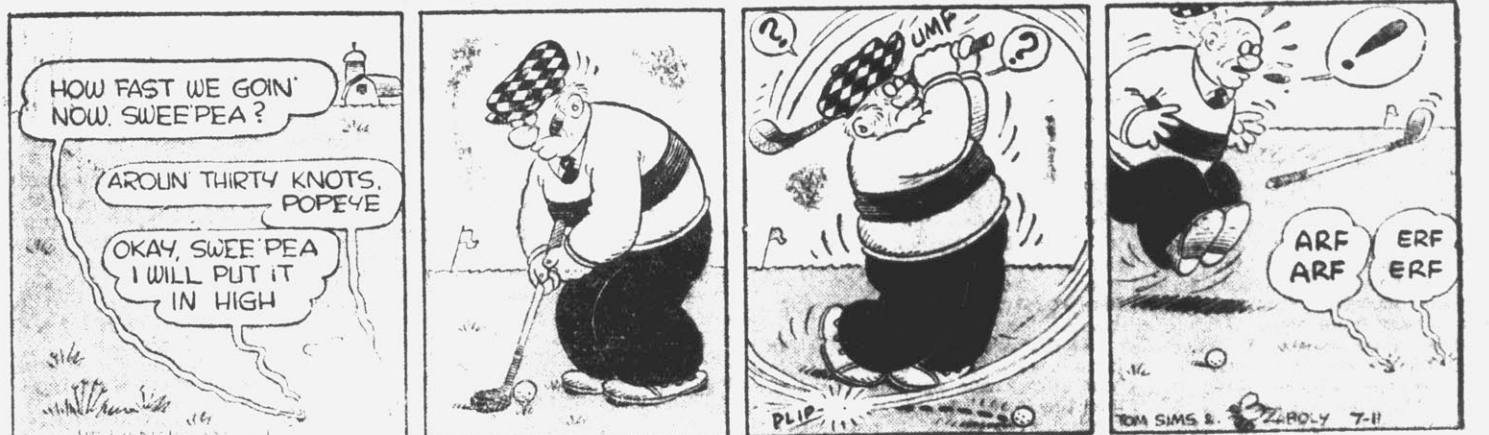

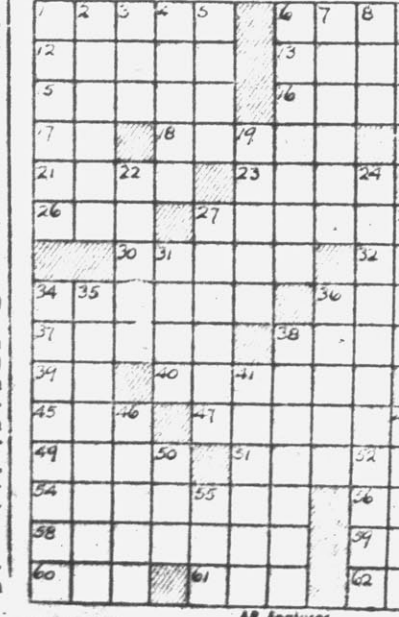

peninsula, and Nazi lines were under steady heavy pressure along a front curving 40 miles to the sea.

The attack opened after hundreds of field guns belabored steadily for hours, wrecking German hedgehog positions, and numbing the nerves of even some of the most fanatical Nazis holding the line.

Other doughboys advanced one to two miles elsewhere on the front winding across Chembourg peninsula, making flank penetrations threatening to force a German withdrawal southward along the peninsula's west coast.

The German radio asserted that German troops had reentered La Haye du Puits, strategic road center captured by the American First army Sunday.

Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, Allied ground commander in France, declared 54,000 prisoners have been taken since D-day, and told his American-British-Canadian forces that much has been achieved "with definite and concrete gains."

"We are firm and secure," he asserted.

Bad weather and strengthening German resistance slowed the British Second army assault in the Caen sector, and heavy fighting flamed south of the Odon and Orne rivers.

The Germans forced the British to withdraw to the north of Malot, a town four miles southwest of Caen.

A costly price still was being exacted of the enemy, and a British headquarters officer estimated 30 to 35 Nazi tanks had been knocked out on the front Southwest of Caen.

The German position west of the Orne appeared hopeless in the long run, but the fanatical Nazi opposition against the drive of both the

British and the Canadians was forcing the fighting line back temporarily in both spots and limiting progress to a few hundred yards in others.

Part of the loss of power of Montgomery's punch was caused by bad weather, which made it impossible for the Allied air force to put in strong, close support.

Canadian troops cleared all the Germans from the north bank of the Odon river down to its junction with the Orne. The British clung fiercely to Hill 112, just north of Esquay, which controls land observation between the two rivers.

"Waves of German infantry were chopped to ribbons in a violent battle" for this hill, wrote Associated Press Correspondent Roger D. Greepe in a front dispatch. He quoted a British field officer as saying, "the Boche was slaughtered while we were sitting where we were."

This sturdy stand forced the Germans to retreat from the hill area.

Capt. Ronald Slay of Greenville, now home on furlough from the South Pacific and who participated in the "Battles on New Britain," recognized many of the scenes in the picture when it was shown at the Pitt theater recently.
