Soviet Forces Drive Toward East Prussia

Many-Pronged Red Offensive Hurls Germans Back; One Unit Within 30 Miles Of Border; Drive Sweeps Toward Latvian Border After Liberating 1,000 Towns

Moscow, July 13.—(AP)—Russian troops drove to a point within 30 miles of East Prussia today in a 19-mile advance in the Suwalki area of western White Russia.

(Suwalki itself is but 11 miles from East Prussia. It is a city of old Poland on a wedge of land between East Prussia and Lithuania. It lies 60 miles southwest of Kaunas and 90 miles from the Prussian Baltic coast. A Russian drive to the Baltic might trap two German armies in the Russian-annexed states of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.)

(An NBC broadcast from Sweden said the Russians were within 12 miles of East Prussia after driving 30 miles beyond Grodno, also an old Polish city. Such proximity would mean that battle echoes could be heard in Germany itself.)

Other Russian columns struck within 38 miles of Kaunas, old capital of Lithuania in a seven-mile advance. Detachments were within 29 miles of Grodno after racing 27 miles in 24 hours. Yet another group was 50 miles from Bialystok, strategic rail center leading into Warsaw and East Prussia. Brest Litovsk on the river Bug was within 67 miles of forces on the north and 70 of those in the Pripyat marsh area. Warsaw itself was within 150 miles of Russian guns to the northeast.

Daugavpils, gateway to the Baltic sea and Riga, was feeling increasing pressure of two huge approaching Russian armies. Already its garrison was like the one surrounded in Wilno in Lithuania, awaiting for the coming blow.

The newest disaster to fall on the Germans was Andrei I. Yermolenko's offensive against the Latvian republic, which in its first two days gobbled up more than 1,000 villages in a break-through which front dispatches said was now 100 miles wide and 25 miles deep north of Gen. Ivan Bagramian's First Baltic army.

Yermolenko, fresh from his victories in the Crimea, moved to within 18 miles of the border of the Latvian Soviet Republic on the main Veliki Luki-Riga railway.

NEW ADVANCE ITALIAN FRONT

Americans Crack Nazi Defenses To Capture Lajatico

Rome, July 13.—(AP)—American troops of the Fifth army, breaking through German defenses in the upper Etruria valley some 17 miles inland from Italy's west coast in a flanking move against Livorno, have captured the town of Lajatico in the bitter fighting Italy has seen in recent weeks, Allied headquarters announced today.

The toughboys quickly mopped up all enemy soldiers remaining in the town yesterday, taking 150 to 200 prisoners, and surged on northward. By noon they had closed to a point only 12 miles from the Arno river valley, key to the outer strong points of the German "Gothic Line" defenses—supposedly the last strong (Continued on page four)

Nazi Homeward Bound
Buenos Aires, July 13.—(AP)—The last German diplomatic representatives in Argentina were homeward bound today—repatriated aboard an Argentine ship which left last night for Lisbon.

Argentina broke relations with Germany last January. The government said it had hoped to complete the repatriation last March but had encountered difficulties beyond its control.

Chairman Of War Production Says Paper Shortage Is Threatening War Effort

War Production Chairman Donald Nelson in a telegram to the critical shortage of paper and urged the full cooperation of the public in the waste paper campaign.

Another Nippon Admiral Killed

London, July 13.—(AP)—Vice Admiral Kichiro Hasegawa of the Japanese navy has been killed in action, the Berlin radio said today in a dispatch from the Japanese naval station of Yokosuka.

Berlin said Admiral Hasegawa had been attached to the technical staff of the fleet air arm headquarters since 1942.

He may have met his death in action around Saipan in the Marianas where Japanese naval aircraft, flying from fleet carriers, met an important defeat.

Public Hearing On Ricks Bus Lines

R. G. Johnson of the State Utilities Commission, Raleigh, conducted a public hearing here today on the application of Paul T. Ricks for a franchise for the Ricks Bus Lines to operate passenger motor buses to the old NYA center, the county-city airport across the river, and as far east on Fifth street as Greenwood cemetery. The city had already granted Ricks a franchise to operate in the city limits.

The purpose of the meeting was to hear testimony as to the necessity and convenience of the bus line. Leading citizens testified as to the need for the service and emphasized the convenience it would provide for public transportation, especially for people going to and from work and for the armed forces stationed in Greenville.

Strong endorsement of the proposed bus line is expected to result in prompt granting of a franchise by the state to enable the buses to go a short distance into the suburban area. The next step now is to secure approval from the Office of Defense Transportation.

AIR OFFENSIVE AGAINST NAZIS STILL GOES ON

Americans Hit Munich for Third Straight Day; Italy-Based Bombers Smash At Nazi Oil Fields And Communications

London, July 13.—(AP)—Munich was hit a hard blow for the third successive day by 1,000 flying Fortresses and Liberators today while the 15th air force in Italy again stabbed at Nazi oil and rail facilities in northern Italy.

Saarbrücken in western Germany also was hit by the heavies from England.

Up to 500 Fortresses and Liberators smashed at Porto Marghera and Trieste oil storage tanks. Four railroads on the Milan-Venice line and the Pinesse rail bridge over the Tagliamento river 30 miles northwest of Trieste, Rome dispatches announced.

The railroads hit were at Brescia, Verona, Mestre and Mantua.

Munich is a transportation center for railways and roads between Germany, Italy and France and the attack fitted into the rapidly snow-balling campaign threatening to cripple German transport over all western Europe, the same as it now is disrupted in the northwest corner.

The Munich area now has reported about 9,000 tons of American bombs in three days, making it probably the most intensively bombed region on earth.

Berlin said also a fleet was striking from Italy, as on the last two days.

A large fleet of 1300 RAF heavy bombers without loss before dawn struck two of the most important rail centers in central France. Other British bombers from Italy hit (Continued on Page Five)

Germans Devise New Booby Trap

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—The army said today it had received a report that the Germans were using a new and diabolical booby trap—candy with a piece of thermite implanted in its center. When eaten the candy melts away and the thermite flames up in the throat and mouth.

Two experts in booby trap detection told of the device during a demonstration of weapons and mines at Acting Secretary of War Patterson's news conference.

The Germans also are using the Yankee desire for cleanliness in developing their traps. The experts reported a liquid soap dispenser is filled with sulphuric acid, or similar material, to burn the hands when tipped up. Another gadget is an innocent looking cake of soap which can be used for some time and then, when the outer coating is worn away, detonates an explosive to blow off the hands.

More Cooperation From Turkey Soon

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—Laurence Steinhardt, American ambassador to Turkey, said today that he could expect "much closer cooperation" from Turkey soon.

Steinhardt, who left Ankara a week ago, saw President Roosevelt this morning and said he discussed the general situation with him.

Reports from Ankara in the last two days indicated intense diplomatic activity there foreshadowing some spectacular development.

Steinhardt said he had returned to report on Anglo-American-Russian conversations with the Turks which began a few weeks ago and are still going on.

Turkey has been neutral through the war but has recently taken moves of extreme importance to the Allies.

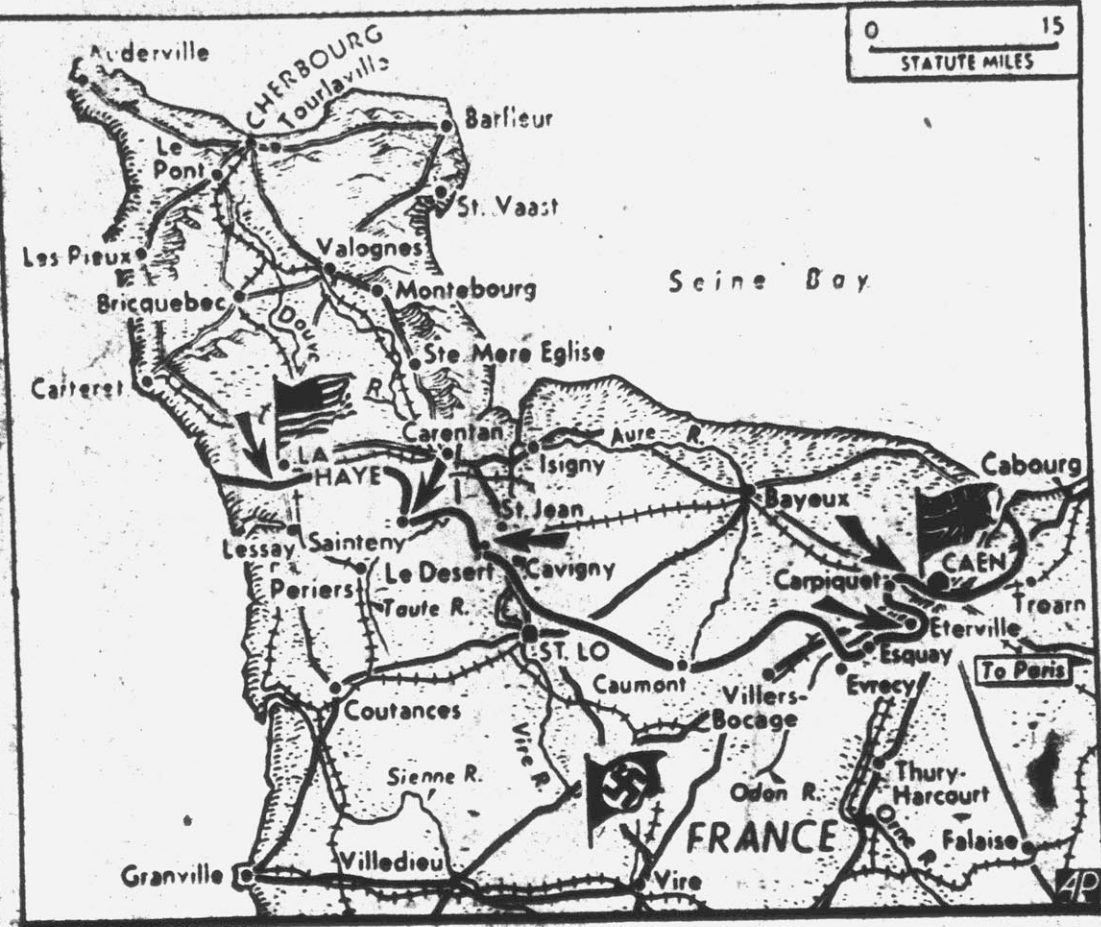
All Local Warehouses To Get Sale Every Day

Has Hinted Of Early Meeting With Churchill

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—A meeting between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill may come about before long, the White House said today. Mr. Roosevelt's dramatic revision of French policy to permit practical cooperation with Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

Allied Gains In Burma; Saipan Casualties Heavy; Jap Islands Bombed Again

Another isolated Japanese army twice as large as the 20,000-man force wiped out on Saipan last week today built up an all-out offensive to break free of the Allied death-trap on New Guinea.

The preliminaries started Monday with an attack against veteran American troops 1 miles southeast of Titiapo, one of the jaws of the trap which has squeezed the enemy into the Wewak area. A second attack followed Tuesday and Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported skirmishes were continuing. The other jaw is an Australian force pushing (Continued on Page Five)

Meeting Cancelled Because Of Polio

Durham, July 13.—(AP)—Rev. Ernest J. Arnold, executive secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches, announced today that the southeastern conference of the United Christian Youth Movement, scheduled to be held at Lake Junaluska July 15-19, has been called off due to the polio epidemic. He said that church leaders in the "seven or eight" states involved are being contacted.

Rev. Mr. Arnold said the decision to call off the conference was reached after "consultation with state health officers and officers of the United Christian Youth Movement in Chicago." He said that the step was advised by health officials.

Announce Loss Fifteen Ships

London, July 13.—(AP)—Six American and British destroyers were lost in landing operations in France, the U. S. Navy Department and the British Admiralty announced tonight.

The former Grace liner Santa Clara, renamed the Transport Susan B. Anthony, also was lost by American naval forces along with the minesweeper Tide, the destroyer Escort Rich and the fleet tug Partridge.

The American destroyers were the Corry and Glenmon, built in the 1940-41 program, and the Meredith. President Roosevelt announced yesterday after the landings that two destroyers had been lost. He did not name them.

Three British destroyers announced lost by the Admiralty were the Bodicea, Swift and Svaner. The British also announced the loss of the frigates Mourne, Blackwood and Lawford, the trawler Lord Austin and the auxiliary Minister.

Total naval losses announced were 15 vessels, seven American and eight British. Several thousand ships were involved in the landings.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—The National Safety Council soon will publish a report showing 18,000 workers were killed on job accidents in 1943.

This gruesome toll for only one year is almost as great as the total number of war deaths—20,362—reported to date since Pearl Harbor by the navy, Marine corps and Coast Guards.

It is a drop of only three percent from 1942 when occupational deaths were 18,500. Yet it shows that progress has been made in cutting down job accidents.

More people were employed in 1943 than in 1942 but fewer deaths occurred from accidents at work.

But, when considering the battle casualties since December 7, 1941, it shows how far American industry has to go in preventing a truly civilized picture of accident prevention.

Flanking Movement Cuts Off Strategic St. Lo; Another Drive Threatens To Engulf Lessay; British Forces Recapture Maltot Near Caen After Much Heavy Fighting

Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, July 13.—(AP)—The Germans in St. Lo, ancient fortress town in the middle of the base of the Cherbourg peninsula, were being gradually strangled today by the arms of a powerful American tank and infantry offensive which already had passed by the town to the east.

Supreme Headquarters announced the capture of seven towns by the Americans in gains along a 48-mile front.

On their left flank Lt. Gen Omar N. Bradley's warriors captured La Boulaye, 21-4 miles east of St. Lo. They pressed in across the 21-2 miles southeast of St. Lo.

(The Paris radio said 32 divisions had been concentrated in the 14-mile stretch from St. Lo to Caumont to the east, and a Nazi front line correspondent reported that the Allied artillery barrage was the heaviest yet encountered.)

Another similar American drive down the Cherbourg peninsula's west coast threatened to engulf Lessay, 21 miles northwest of St. Lo, and reached to within two miles of that town.

Four towns and several square miles of territory were overrun by the Americans, making their biggest territorial gains in several days.

The British Second army, meanwhile, regained the much fought-over town of Maltot, four miles southwest of Caen, at the eastern end of the battlefront in the bloody triangle formed by the Orne and Odon rivers.

The American attack on St. Lo again was preceded by a heavy crash of artillery upon German foxholes and hedgerow hiding places.

Advance formations of tanks and infantry swept through La Boulaye and then pushed three-quarters of a mile beyond—southward across the St. Lo-Bayeux road and drawing up a semi-circle about the town of 15,000.

At the northwest they turned back a savage counter-attack and retook the no-man's-land village of Le Desert in the Vire valley.

A front line dispatch quoted refugees as saying the Germans were bracing the one undamaged building in St. Lo, apparently preparing (Continued on Page Five)

More Casualties Reported Today

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—Announced American battle casualties in the present war are approaching the total casualties incurred in the First World War. Unreported results in the last three weeks of heavy fighting in France possibly have brought the total past the 1917-1918 mark.

A total of 187,028 army casualties announced today by Acting War Secretary Patterson brought to 235,411 the overall total of official announced casualties on the ground, in the air and at sea. The First World War's overall total was 278,824.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Catastrophe is treading on the heels of the Hitlerian armies which are being rolled back with heavy loss of life and material by a multiple Red offensive which is developing the greatest striking power ever let loose in such an operation.

The German danger is so acute that disaster of the first magnitude might overtake them at any time. They apparently are trying to engineer a wholesale withdrawal of great depth to new defenses, thus straightening their long and unwieldy front and shortening their communications.

The Nazis will have to be mighty lucky to succeed. We've seen their generalship achieve many masterly withdrawals, and it would be a serious mistake to underestimate German resourcefulness in emergencies.

However, Hitler no longer has the manpower or equipment to enable him to manipulate his defenses as he has in the past.

Women in the Church by Mary Fowler

Women trained in the Christian schools of Iran (Persia) seem to be establishing the beginnings of a suffragist movement. The Y. W. C. A. was organized in Teheran largely for the benefit of a large group of British nurses serving there, but now appears to be heading for the organization of an association of Iranian women of whom the leaders will be the alumnae of the mission schools. Among the leaders of the movement are a professor whose avocation is the establishment of baby clinics in Teheran and vicinity, and the daughter of a former prime minister. The latter is a graduate of the schools of the Presbyterian Mission and is editor of a woman's magazine in Teheran.

So many educated women of India, especially the Christian women, have entered the Indian equivalent of the WACS in America that the municipalities and the Christian mission agencies are reporting an acute shortage of teachers. Many of the Christian women—most of them not long out of the "outcaste" population, some of them recently out of "purdah"—are now village visitants, assisting the families of men in the services, reading and writing letters for the illiterates, reporting illnesses, and looking after the general health and morale of the villagers. Four hundred women village workers met recently for consultation in Jullundur.

Growing out of the awakening of underprivileged people, the world over, a by-product of the war, there is a demand for Christian literature in all parts of Africa, especially from Dakar and the Ivory Coast where such publication must be in French, according to Miss Margaret Wrong, of London, secretary of the International Committee for Christian Literature for Africa. 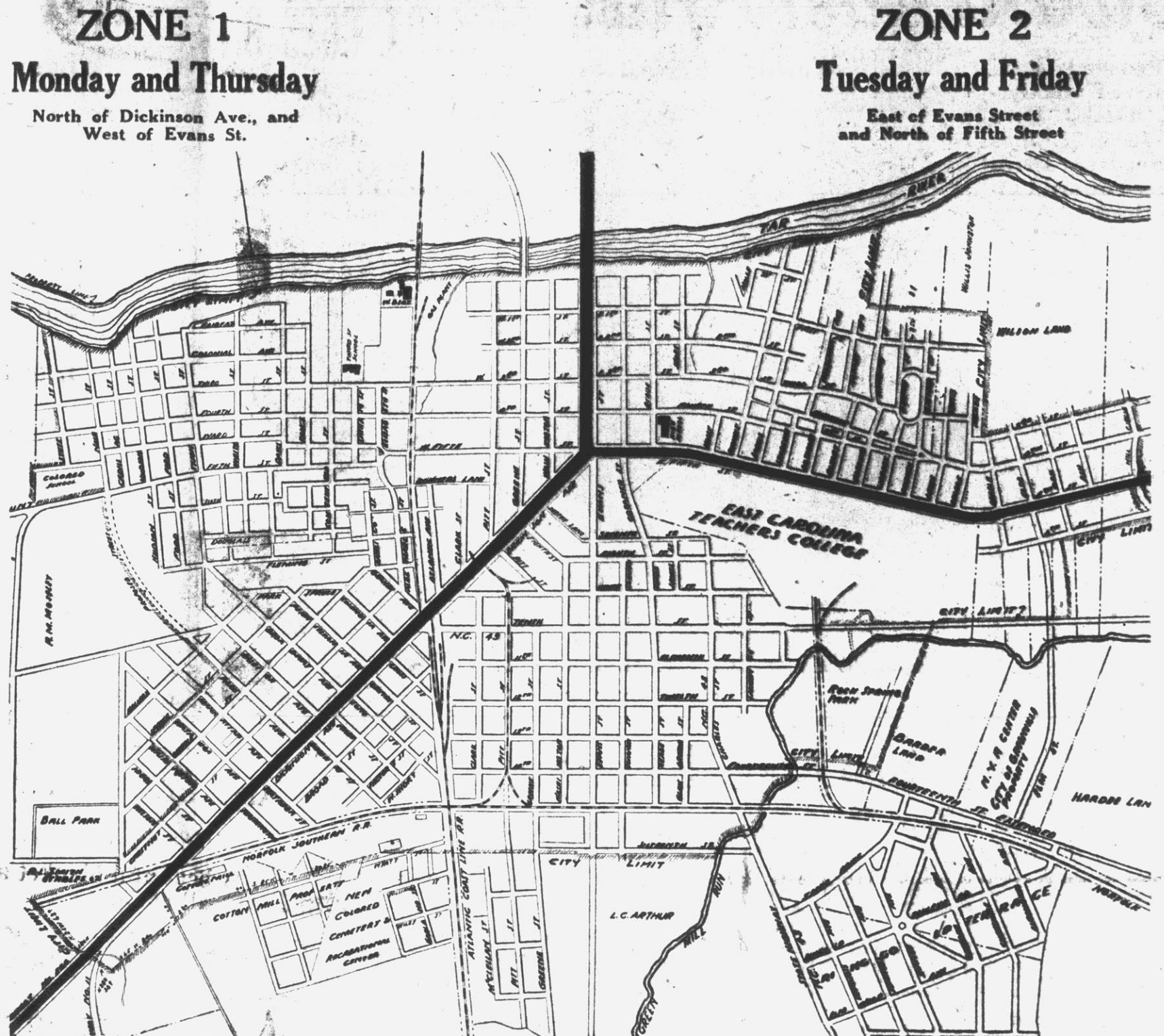
New Red Cross Head.

FURNITURE DELIVERIES RESTRICTED
BY ORDER ODT BEGINNING JULY 17th

Because of the continued gasoline, tire and truck shortage it has become necessary to take further steps to effect every possible saving in motor equipment and gasoline. The Office of Defense Transportation has, therefore, issued ODT Order 17

Amendment 3B to limit and restrict retail deliveries. In compliance with this order the furniture dealers of Greenville are compelled to make all deliveries to conform to the new rules and regulations that have been made, as follows:

- (1) The City of Greenville has been divided into 3 zones and deliveries can be made only two days weekly in each zone, as shown on the map, but a full truckload may be delivered to any one home on any day.
- (2) No package or packages measuring less than 60 inches in combined length and girth or weighing less than 5 pounds may be delivered.
- (3) No special deliveries can be made at any time (with exception of full truckload to any one home).
- (4) This order also prohibits us from delivering any merchandise on approval.

We feel sure that the public will cooperate in making a success of these new rules, and we earnestly ask that you do not request any of us to violate these regulations.

Daydreaming is a devastating mental habit. The very pleasant-ness of it hides from those who in-clude in it the seriousness of its consequences. Like Stephen Leacock's horseman, we go on our way riding in all directions.

Children need to be warned against such tendencies and dis-ciplined with firmness when they ap-pear to fall into any such mental habits. But the tendency to waste one's time in daydreaming some-times persists into mature years. The habit can always be broken by the exercise of firmness and will power. One never has a comfortable sense of self-security until he learns how to overcome the tendency to fritter away precious time in day-dreaming and resolutely brings his thoughts to bear on the practical enterprises of life.

AMERICA IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—More Roosevelt con-versation goes into the record than any other you ever heard about.

He's got it all for the record—ev-erything from Mr. Roosevelt's oc-casional wisecracks to his most so-ber public words.

Romagna is the White House's most important job. He's been since early in the war, and he's de-liberately inconspicuous, he sits on the left of Mr. Roosevelt at all news conferences and takes in lightning-quick shorthand notes on the Presi-dent's ever-changing moods.

"For the record" Presidential news conferences begin when Ro-magna opens his notebook. Then he talks down everything, including the few presidential slips in gram-mar, omitting only occasional wis-pers which obviously are not intend-ed for the record.

The story Romagna pours out on the pages of his notebook is any-thing but dull. He colors his notes by indicating laughter, gestures, smiles and other bits of by-play which cannot be disregarded.

It's a tough job, even though you wouldn't think so by listening to the deliberate, carefully-chosen words that come out of your radio during a fireside chat. The President's ra-dio speeches go along at a comfort-able 100 words per minute or so—a breeze for any shorthand reporter.

But in news conferences the pace is bewildering. Mr. Roosevelt steps up a 90-word-per-minute pace to 200 words or better. Along with that is a steady stream of interrup-tions, half-phrased questions and half-phrased replies.

Sometimes the President dismiss-es a question with a gesture. Some-times he literally talks into his fam-ous cigar holder. Frequently the reporters fill the room with laugh-ter.

Romagna's job is to get it all in-cluding the laughter—and get it the first time. He's never asked the President for a repeat.

After conferences Romagna types out his notes and cross indexes the whole business by subjects so he can put a finger on any word the President has ever said on any sub-ject.

A copy of his transcript becomes a part of the national archives and takes its place among the official papers of the administration.

recognition and second, by indica-tions that this attitude in recent months has become increasingly widespread throughout the British government.

Had this recognition issue re-mained in a highly unsettled condi-tion with Allied armies in France, it would undoubtedly have colored all the discussions of Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill in their expected talks.

No time for these talks has been indicated. The President, however, has hinted at two news conferences that he expects to see the Prime Minister this summer or fall and that he would probably make the trip to Britain this time instead of having Mr. Churchill come over.

For a long time, Gen. Eisenhower, lacking an Allied directive, relied on French cooperation along the lines that had been informally agreed to with French General Koenig, De Gaulle's representative.

The informal nature of the Eisen-hower-Koenig arrangements is re-garded here as having contributed to the breakdown in cooperation between De Gaulle and Eisenhower in the hours immediately before the invasion started. It was not until about two weeks after D-Day that the Allied command finally got co-operation worked out with the French on a day-to-day basis.

natural barrier left to the enemy short of the Po river line in north-ern Italy.

Simultaneously French troops on the right of the Americans carved a path through German defense points and captured San Donato, astride a secondary highway in a mountainous area 25 miles south-west of Florence.

Still further to the east other French forces repulsed enemy coun-terattacks against all 218, two miles southwest of Poggibonsi and 38 miles inland from the west coast. Clinging doggedly to their positions, the French inflicted heavy losses

on the enemy and remained poised as a menace to Poggibonsi, key junction controlling roads toward Florence and the Arno valley.

The only major changes on the Eighth army front came in the upper Tiber valley. There Allied forces gained as much as four miles, halving the distance to the road junction of Citta Di Castello. East of the Tiber the enemy withdrew from two strong hill positions.

Around Arezzo, a focal point of major fighting on the Eighth army front for the past week, a lull set-tled down, but there were numer-ous brisk patrol clashes.

An official at headquarters said the enemy had massed more than 70 big guns around Arezzo. The day brought no fresh news of the American elements which have taken Castiglione and pro-gressed up the west coast to within eight miles of Livorno. Further progress on the coast appeared to depend largely on gains further in-land, where it is necessary to root the enemy out of high ground com-manding the coastal plain.

ever, I call today on the newspapers and their readers for still greater efforts in the salvaging of waste paper. Right now many mills with important war contracts have al-most exhausted their supply of this vital raw material and some have been forced to shut down tempo-rarily. The situation is critical, but fortunately can be remedied quickly by greater public cooperation in the U. S. victory waste paper campaign. A survey made public by the Department of Commerce indicates 62 per cent of all salvable waste paper in the United States is avail-able from industry and 38 per cent from homes and farms. In your city approximately 5.9 pounds of household waste paper per person are available each month, in addi-tion to 4.2 pounds per person on surrounding farms. These figures provide for the first time monthly

quotas for your area and should prove helpful in stimulating house-hold collections.

"Despite the excellent coopera-tion of the public and the 17,000 salvage committees, collections have average 588,000 tons a month in 1944, or 79,000 tons short of our monthly goal. Receipts in May were 622,000 tons or 45,000 tons below our quota and for June we are receiving only 84 per cent. Obviously continuation of this dangerous situation will not only jeopardize war production but cause further curtailment of the diminished allotments of civilian paper."

"A new study made through the courtesy of the Gallup newspaper sponsorship reveals only 63 per cent of our families are saving waste pa-per regularly and only 67 per cent are convinced of the need of waste paper. This is astonishing in the light of your generous support. Waste paper is the nation's number one critical war material so essen-tial the army is now preparing to salvage what little they can in the North African and South Pacific combat zones. Therefore I appeal to every man, woman and child of your city to redouble his efforts in the U. S. victory waste paper cam-paign in cooperation with your newspaper."

the new front.)
A Moscow communique said more than 7,000 Germans were killed and about 1,500 taken prisoner in a single day's fighting on the new sec-tor.

Front dispatches pictured this latest offensive as well under way and said the Germans were falling back Pell-Mell.

(The Berlin radio, apparently preparing the German people for news of a large-scale withdrawal along the entire eastern front, said: "It is obvious that the front cannot remain as it is. There are two alternatives. One is a large-scale counter-offensive and the other the adaptation of the entire front to new lines. Since we are on the defen-sive in the east, the second alterna-tive is the one to be applied.")

A dispatch to Izvestia said Yere-menko's offensive, which swept in the big towns of Idritsa, 22 miles east of the Latvian border, and Ku-dritsa, began with a heavy artillery barrage that blasted the Germans' "permanent" fortifications as high as 130 feet in the air.

Sebezh, 28 miles northwest of Idritsa, and Opochka, 15 miles southwest, the last strongholds held by the Germans on the eastern side of the Latvian middle border, were feeling the artillery of Yermenko's advance field units. His infantry fanned out north and south of both objectives.

To the south the right wing of Gen. Bagramian's army, which had crossed the river Drissa, was 14 miles from the Latvian border. The left arm of Bagramian's forces moving up through the Lake coun-try to the south of Daugavpils (Dvinsk), got within 17 miles of the city in the region of the village of Rymshani.

Red Cross Will Handle Requests

Washington, July 13—(AP)—The War Department has decided to discontinue transmitting to theater commanders requests for soldiers overseas to be returned to this country because of illness in the family or other emergency reasons.

Upward of 500 RAF Lancasters and Halifaxes participated in the overnight operations, during which railway yards at Tours and Com-mont-Chalney were the main targets.

Tours is a vital bottleneck in the German transportation network 130 miles behind the Normandy battlefront, while Culmont-Chalney—150 miles southeast of Paris and half way to the German frontier—is a key point through which the Germans have been funneling supplies and reinforcements into France.

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters Pearl Harbor, July 13—(AP)—Sustained American air and naval attacks focused attention today on Guam, southwest of Saipan which now is a U. S. operational base served out of Japan's inner defenses at a record cost of 15,053 casualties.

Already the enemy airforce at Guam and on intervening Rota appears to have been knocked out by the same type of pounding loosed on Saipan since its invasion June 15. Guam was held for nearly a week and intermittently shelled by warships.

On Saipan, concealing caves and ravines were probed for swells which are expected to add both the total of nearly 12,000 Japanese dead counted so far and the more than 10,000 captives. A Marine regiment killed more than 700 Nips Monday in one mopping-up action.

Figures for both sides establish new records for fierce fighting among the Pacific islands.

1. The 15,053 American casualties including 2,359 killed, 11,481 wounded and 1,213 missing.

2. The Japanese dead—11,948 already buried by Yank troops, with many more to be accounted for. One heavily strafed ravine alone is believed to hold 1,000 Jap bodies.

3. The Japanese captives—more than 10,000 soldier prisoners of war; more than 9,000 interned civilians.

The American casualties were announced in Washington by Navy Secretary Forrestal.

Walter S. Delaney, assistant chief of staff for readiness who recently visited the Pacific battle area, said:

"This is an example of what we can expect. The going is going to get tougher because we are up against the enemy's inner circle of defenses and up against great land masses."

Forrestal estimated that 85 per cent of Japan's defense of most than 20,000 died defending the island "which had been developed as one of their most strongly fortified bases in the Pacific."

He supported his assessment of Saipan as a "prize of the first magnitude" by pointing out Japan expended more than 1,000 planes during the campaign and also sustained a naval defeat in efforts to hold it.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, in reporting carrier plane raids Monday on Guam and Rota, disclosed the enemy air bases there have been so effectively smothered that no fighter opposition was encountered. A bomber was shot down over Rota.

The raiders fired rockets into military installations along the west shore of Guam, first U. S. territory to fall into Japanese hands at the outset of the war, and cratered Rota's runways.

Nimitz also announced a 50-ton bombing of Truk Monday by army Liberators from the Marshalls, concentrating on a naval base at that bypassed enemy stronghold in the central Carolines.

Nazi Ace Killed.

London, July 13—(AP)—Lt. Eugen Zweigert who as one of Germany's leading air aces claimed he had downed 69 Allied planes, has been killed on the western front, the German radio announced today.

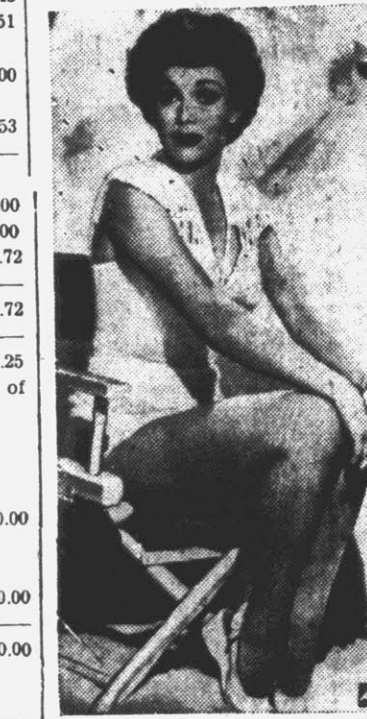
