GOVERNMENT BULLETIN ON CANNING NOW AVAILABLE.

"Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables." Bulletin AWT-93, prepared by the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, gives detailed but condensed information on the right method for each food, suggestions on the preparation of equipment for canning including steam pressure canner, water-bath canner, and jars. Five main types of jars are described and illustrated with closures. Directions for the preparation of food for canning, the pre-cooking of fruits and vegetables, and detailed steps in the canning process are given. The steps in the canning of fruits (peaches) and tomatoes in the hot water canner are illustrated with attractive and colorful pictures. The steps in the canning of non-acid vegetables, using snap beans as an example, in the pressure canner, are likewise illustrated with attractive and colorful pictures.

Directions are given for the canning of fruits, tomatoes, pickled vegetables with the water bath canner, and for canning non-acid vegetables with the pressure canner. Tables for figuring the yield of canned food from fresh vegetables are given.

Seven points of successful canning appear on the cover page, and "Day-After" canning jobs, storage of canned food, and suggestions for preventing spoilage are given on the last page.

This bulletin is free and should be in the hands of every homemaker. A copy may be obtained by calling the Home Demonstration office, telephone 2631.

The World carried a story of the trial in London of James G. Cunningham and Harry Burton, charged with conspiracy and causing an explosion at the Tower of London. The two men were later charged with high treason, but their fate could not be read in the yellowed newspaper page.

Bill Arp, noted columnist and author of his day, had a story in the Atlanta Constitution apologizing for saying that there were only 300 Presbyterians in Georgia. The writer wound up by blaming the error on the printer.

Crops Continue To Grow Luxuriantly

Crops have made wonderful gains the past several weeks as a result of copious rains and farmers who three weeks ago did not know whether they would have any tobacco to cure during the dry period are now wondering whether they will have enough barns in which to cure the lot, said Billie Branch, Winterville farmer and Greenville tobacco auctioneer. All field crops developed unusual root growths during the drought and when the water got to the fertilizer growth was phenomenal.

Incidentally, farmers planted more peanuts in Pitt county than ever before and have luxuriant stands. The bean crop promises to be a bumper one and corn has done some beanstalk growing recently. Truck crops are coming along and fruit is ripening.

The canning season, like tobacco curing, is several weeks late, but there are good crops in prospect and with prevailing prices the harvest season is expected to be profitable for farmers and others in this section.

Says Democratic Defeat Would Be Aid To Hitler

Convention Chairman Urges Continuation of Roosevelt Administration

Chicago Stadium, July 20.—(AP) Declaring wartime is no time to change administrations, Senator Samuel D. Jackson of Indiana told the Democratic convention today that the ballot box must not become "Hitler's secret weapon." The commander in chief, he said, must not be taken from the fighting forces overseas.

Jackson, taking over as permanent chairman, told the delegates he was confident of victory in November because "the American electorate will not vote for change, interruption and delay" in winning the war.

"America will win this war finally and completely, no matter who is elected President of the United States next November," he said.

"But how many battlefields would a Democratic defeat be worth to you?"

"How many Nazi legions would it be worth to Adolf Hitler?"

"Frankly, could Goebbels himself do better to bolster Axis morale than the word that the American people have upset this administration—the administration that made it possible for the Russians to drive the Nazis back to the Prussian border?"

Jackson contended also that the Republicans thwarted moves for a lasting peace after World War I, sought to hamstring defense preparations before the current conflict, and in three terms under Harding, Coolidge and Hoover "led us into the depths of depression."

He hit hard at 42-year-old Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's references to "old, tired and quarrelsome men" in the Roosevelt administration, made when Dewey accepted the Republican presidential nomination.

President Roosevelt, Jackson declared, "has more rugged vitality in him today than any two men the opposition has to offer."

"Moreover," he added, "the refrain 'Old, tired and quarrelsome' is a gratuitous and contemptible attack upon all persons of mature age."

"We might not condemn," he continued, "our adversaries' selection of a candidate so young, but we do expose the hypocrisy in their claim that the presidency, now, needs a man of just his age."

"What the presidency demands is not so much a bright young man as a man of wisdom and experience, with depth and breadth of vision."

But repeatedly, he hammered away at his contention that there must be no change of administration during the war.

"If it were true," he said, "that the

Republican nominee is able, as experienced, as definite in his indicated principles of government, and as clear in his war and peace concepts as the present occupant of the White House, still exchange now might well prove to be the tragedy of this generation.

"In terms of statesmanship, a comparison of the apparent dimensions of the GOP aspirant with a man of the stature of the President, rules out of the field of rational consideration this proposed substitution for the party of Franklin D. Roosevelt."

"We are in the midst of the fiercest, most devastating war mankind has ever known."

"America cannot afford to take a chance."

"Our people will not gamble with the lives of their sons, your sons and mine."

As for the Republican platform, Jackson said the opposition offered "equally weak and unwholesome" in 1932, 1936 and 1940, but the American people would not take it and he predicted they would not take it in 1944.

Sokolka river to cross.

By comparison, the opening of Maslennikov's smash toward Latvia, even though it showed the Nazis back 26 miles on a 45-mile front in two days and helped smash a total of nearly 1,500 hamlets and towns captured by Russian forces, was just another development in the war which shortly may see activity from the Finnish gulf to the lands just north of the Danube.

Meanwhile the Russian press reported signs of cracking German morale.

Another group of four to five divisions surrounded east of Lwow at Brody was reported surrendering by the hundreds.

Dispatches said Italians, French and Yugoslavs had been liberated from prison camps where the Germans had interned them for fear that they would desert.

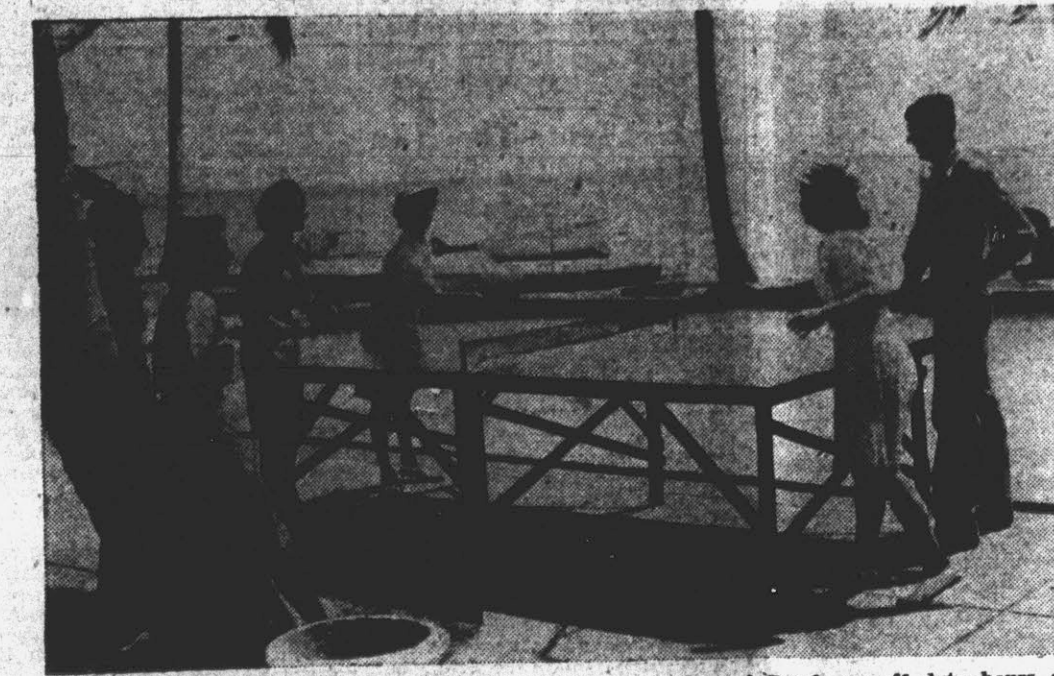
"The Red army offensive," commented the Moscow News, "which in number of troops, material and organization surpasses anything heretofore, including the offensive at the Kursk bulge, is proceeding so rapidly that the Germans have no chance to make use of even some splendid natural defense lines."

Battle-scarred Lwow, hub of six important rail lines and in Soviet hands the last time in 1941, appeared certain to be lost by the reeling German defenders, who fell back over 13 miles in the last 24 hours.

The gateway city to central Europe, it is expected to be easily enveloped if the Germans choose to make a house-to-house fight. It is situated on gently rolling hills, surrounded by flat grain lands.

Soviet offensives, near the northern corner of the Latvian border, is under the direction of Gen. Ivan Ivanovich Maslennikov, formerly one of Marshal Leonid A. Govorov's leaders on the Leningrad front.

Maslennikov's forces liberated 700 villages and towns in the first two days of their drive. In all, the seven Russian armies took 1,237 towns and villages.

The latest Russian communique disclosed that Marshal Ivan S. Konev's First Ukrainian army crossed the Bug river on a front of almost 10 miles north and south of Sokol on the fourth day of its offensive.

Konev's troops captured Prusnov, 10 miles west of Krystynopol on the Bug river border, as well as Krystynopol and Sokol. Also taken were Boratyn, five miles west of Sokol, and Ostrov, eight miles southwest of Sokol.

In a frontal attack on Lwow one Russian column captured Remenov, less than nine miles to the northeast, and another unit took Olsbanitsa, 28 miles directly east of the city. Derzhytsa, 21 miles north, and Mosky Veydke, 28 miles north fell to Soviet troops breaking into the Polish plains behind the city.

The 21st German general to be taken prisoner since the greatest Russian attacks in history were unleashed 26 days ago was captured by Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's forces in the Lithuanian salient west of the Niemen river. He was identified as Lt. Gen. Ochsen, commander of the 31st infantry division.

Heavy armored battles were raging from a considerable distance south of these villages in an arc to Troarn. Clashes also occurred between the Odon and Orne rivers

and on the road southwest to Villers-Bocage. The Germans still held Noyers on the Villers-Bocage road, but the British advanced on the west.

The first phase of the three-day-old British offensive is now over but another big effort obviously is still to come. Presently it is not clear whether Rommel will risk a major battle to hold positions in the Troarn plain or fight a slow withdrawal to the next best defensive position blocking the road to Paris.

Although a considerable number of German prisoners have been taken including more than 1,200 in Fausbourg de Vaucelles, Rommel apparently has been able to save the main body of his troops and tanks despite the British breakthrough.

In the American sector the Germans pounded St. Lo with artillery stationed in heights south of the town but made no counterattacks or attempt to retake it. The villages captured on the American front were La Barde, Thiebot and L'Ange, engulfed in a half-mile advance on a mile front west of Remilly-sur-Lozon.

An overcast dropped to only 600 feet over the battle area yesterday limiting air support to occasional patrols, and not allowing the air forces to get at Rommel's reserves which are being shifted to meet the developing threats.

RAF heavy bombers streamed across the channel in daylight against the robot bomb platform of northern France after bombing covers housing the missiles at Thiverny, 30 miles northeast of Paris, at dusk.

American Havoc light bombers jabbed against air opposition near

were able to strike seven bridges and fuel dumps around Brus and Orleans, in the gap between the interdicted Seine and Loire rivers.

Three Loire bridges were knocked out. Mosquitoes dumped two-ton blockbusters on Bremen. Italy-based forces struck at German communications in the Po valley—the Carpi rail yards, at oil stored at Trieste and Fiume. Others crossed the Adriatic to bomb a chrome mine in Greece.

Russian planes, enjoying absolute and almost unchallenged air superiority in the Lwow sector of old Poland, struck that city of six major trunk lines and the Warsaw area. Moscow laid 34 German planes were destroyed. The Russians also bombed invested Daugavpils in Lithuania.

The Normandy-bound planes passed over incoming convoys of flying bombs which continued to crash on southern England during the night and morning.

WELCOME IN AN ITALIAN VILLAGE

We have been reading a great
deal these days about the reception
our soldiers get from the civilians
in Italy.

A mother was telling me recently
that her boy had written home de-
scribing an event which had touch-
ed him very deeply. He was the first
officer to ride into a certain Italian
town in a jeep. The population sur-
rounded him, cheering and giving
every evidence of their satisfaction
and joy. Suddenly this tall Ameri-
can officer was conscious that a
small boy was crawling up his leg.
He shinned straight up to the of-
ficer's shoulder just as if he were
climbing a tree, and then when he
reached his desired destination, he
gave the American officer a big hug
and put a rose in his lapel.

It was all too much for the stal-
wart Yankee. He had a boy this
same age at home. He wrote his
mother that he pushed his way
through the crowd and sought out
some inconspicuous place where he
could collect himself and get con-
trol of his emotions.

War is a dreadful thing, and it
calls upon men to do dreadful
things. Yet under the uniforms
who love still beat the hearts of men
who love things that are decent and
honorable. Much training in the
arts of war and much gruesome ex-
perience on the field of battle have
not altered the fact that the sol-
dier is a home-loving person and
that his greatest joys are derived
from situations which are common
to all men.

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THEY SHOULD BE KICKED OUT

We heartily agree with
the News and Observer in its
statement that recent action
of the Board of Trustees of
East Carolina Teachers Col-
lege was arbitrary, not
American and contrary to
the traditions of North Caro-
lina. Although the vast ma-
jority of the people of North
Carolina, especially those in
this immediate section of the
state, have lost confidence in
the board and feel that the
best interests of the institu-
tion and the state would be
served by a new board, cer-
tain members have declared
that they have no intention
of giving up their posts. In
view of this situation it ap-
pears that the only relief
from the present deplorable
situation is impeachment
proceedings by the next
General Assembly for re-
moval of the board.

Commenting on the latest
action of the board the News
and Observer says:

Even critics of the board of
trustees of the East Carolina Teachers
College are surprised and disap-
pointed by the latest action of that
body in reaffirming the dismissal
of three members of the faculty with-
out a public hearing and without
any statement of facts to support
the action taken.

North Carolina is not accustomed
to transaction of public business
and the conviction of public em-
ployees by star chamber proceedings.
There was surprise, akin to shock,
when the board of trustees dis-
regarded customary procedure in re-
gard to notice and on June 6 dis-
missed six members of the faculty
without notice. When demands for
a public hearing were made, it was
assumed that the hearing would be
granted, since the same board had
held a public hearing in the case
of Dr. Leon R. Meadows, former
president of the institution—al-
though some members of the board
so far forgot their judicial positions
as to give evidence of approval or
disapproval of that hearing.

Instead of a public hearing, to
which the accused and the people
of the state, who support the insti-

tution, were clearly entitled, the
board heard five of the six accused
in a secret session on June 30, after
which two of the five and the sixth
accused, who was ill, were rein-
stated.

Action upon the other three mem-
bers was postponed until a subse-
quent meeting of the board. It was
still assumed that before taking
final action the board would hold
a public hearing or, at the least,
would issue a public statement set-
ting forth its findings of facts upon
which the action was based.

Instead of furnishing any justi-
fication of its action, the board
merely stated that the three faculty
members had not been "re-elected."
The vote of the board in this in-
stance was eight to three, following
in the main the lines of an eight to
four vote by which the board earlier
exonerated Dr. Meadows on charges
of failure to account for college and
student funds. In that case, the
judgment of a majority of the board
was not approved by students, the
public or the Governor. Dr. Mead-
ows himself voluntarily retired,
shortly before his indictment by the
Pitt County grand jury on charges
of embezzlement and false pretense
in connection with the same charges
on which the board had exonerated
him.

In the case of the three faculty
members who have been dismissed,
the public not only does not know
the evidence. It does not know the
exact charges. The only charges
made public have been "inciting
students to insurrection" and be-
ing "an unwholesome influence on
the campus." The first of these
charges is silly. There has been no
insurrection at the college, unless,
forsooth, the board considers criti-
cism of itself to be insurrection. As
to the "unwholesome influence,"
charges that may or may not be
limited also to the exercise of the
right of free speech guaranteed to
all Americans by the Constitution.
The public does not know.

This kind of proceeding is not
American. It is contrary to North
Carolina traditions. If such actions
have caused the public to lose con-

fidence in the board of trustees, the
board has only itself to thank.

Racial Issue Thorn In Flesh Of Platform Framers

WOMEN PLAY MAJOR ROLE

Charlotte Woman Addressed Convention Last Night

Chicago, July 20.—(AP)—The women took over a major share of attention at the Democratic National Convention today, their role ever so important in a year when their political strength is at record peak. Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas, actress-politician and Democratic nominee for congress from the 14th California district, tonight will address the delegates, the second woman to have such an invitation at this convocation.

Petite, brown-eyed Mrs. Charles W. Tillet of North Carolina, assistant chairman of the National Committee and head of the women's division, told the convention last night that women throughout the nation have deep hopes for a victorious and lasting peace and prosperity which she said could be had by keeping Democrats in power.

Mrs. Mary T. Norton of New Jersey, guest at a breakfast given by national committeewomen celebrating her 20th year in congress, told the six other Democratic women candidates for the house that "we are much wiser politically than we were at the time the suffrage amendment was adopted."

In her convention speech, Mrs. Tillet declared that "the hearts of our women are overseas but they are doing their thinking here." She has a son in the army.

Countering the "G. I. Jim" speech made by Rep. Clare Booth Luce of Connecticut to the Republican convention, Mrs. Tillet said that the rise of Axis leaders was followed by events "over which we had no control, this war could not have been avoided."

"I believe that the hearts of American women recoil more tragically they fear would result if the grand strategy of the future of this war should suddenly be placed in the hands of inexperience," Mrs. Tillet asserted.

A source in London with close European connections said the incident probably occurred at Breda, Holland, reported to be the headquarters of Field Marshal Erwin Rommel.

This same source, who cannot be identified by name, said the critical question of regresses for the German armies on three fronts had provoked a split between Rommel and Field Marshal Gen. Guenther von Kluge, commander of the forces in Normandy. He speculated that the incident might have resulted from a general division of the German staff, resulting in a brawl.

Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering at once went to Hitler upon learning of what had happened, the Berlin broadcast added.

Schmundt was chief military adjutant to Hitler in the days of Munich and had since remained close to the Fuehrer. He was at the Brenner Pass conference of Hitler and Benito Mussolini March 8, 1940, which preceded Italy's declaration of war upon the Allies.

Only yesterday, the Russian press published a statement by the captured commander of the 41st German army tank corps, Lt. Gen. Edmund Hofmeister, saying there was grave dissent in ranks of the German high command, because old generals were dissatisfied with Hitler's strategy in refusing to retreat.

It was the second time, at least, during the war that Hitler narrowly missed death.

The first time was on Nov. 8, 1939, when a bomb exploded in the Munich beer hall just after the Fuehrer had left a celebration marking his ill-fated putsch of 1923.

The Berlin broadcasts did not immediately name the time or place of the bombing attempt. Hitler has been reported spending a great deal of his time on his eerie mountaintop at Berchtesgaden. The captured General Hofmeister said it was there that Hitler recently held a conference of 150 generals and admirals to outline his strategy. The Hofmeister statement, as published in Moscow, described Hitler then as of swollen face, of low and jumbled voice.

For a dictator, however, Hitler's life has been singularly free of recorded attempts to assassinate him.

The most notable episode developing from internal opposition to Hitler was in June, 1934, shortly after he had taken power in Germany, when he led the ruthless "blood

purge" of Capt. Ernest Roehme and his associates.

Roehme's movement was described as a "rebellious riot" in the Reichstag session which Hitler summoned to hear his accounting.

Saipan, was hit Monday by nearly 80 tons of carrier plane bombs and returning flyers reported the town of Rota has been wiped out.

Tuesday's warship shelling of Guam was the ninth, the last five of which have been in unbroken sequence. Carrier planes haven't missed a day since July 4 in blasting its defenses, particularly those guarding the fine harbor of Port Apra. Monday alone the planes flew 650 sorties to attack the very types of defenses behind which the Saipan Japs put up a fierce resistance.

Rationing No Bother At All

Louisville, Ky., July 20.—(AP)—Rationing and point-budgiting may stamp and befuddle most Americans but not the O. W. Smiths, a Louisville family of three. They simply buy no rationed goods.

As a matter of fact, the Smiths never have applied for a ration book although they are entitled to three.

"If a man sits down and makes a list of all the things that are not rationed," says Mr. Smith, "he will find he can get plenty to eat."

And since introduction of rationing back in 1942, Smith, 27, a power plant worker, his wife, Theresa, 23, and their four-year-old daughter, Evalina, have been proving it. A skeptical neighbor reported them to the Office of Price Administration.

After an investigation, OPA food procurement Attorney Fred J. Karem said:

"I wouldn't believe it until I saw the proof, but they live on unrationed foods. They buy no sugar. We are convinced they don't buy anything in the black market, and we give them a clean bill of health."

Mrs. Smith said they were all well supplied with shoes when rationing was introduced, but since have bought some unrationed footwear. Growing Evalina's needs were taken care of through foresight, she explained. Mrs. Smith, prior to ra-

tioning, purchased four or five pairs of graduated sizes to cover the child's growth.

The Smiths had a car but sold it when gasoline was rationed.

Casualties On Italian Front

Washington, July 20.—(AP)—American army casualties in Italy from the time of the landings last September to July 12 totaled 73,166, Acting Secretary of War Patterson reported today. This was an increase of 2,767 for one week.

The death list stands now at 12,999, an increase of 344 for the week; the wounded at 49,561, an increase of 2,104. There are 10,606 missing.

Figures for other theaters were not announced today.

Fire At Camp Lejeune.

Camp Lejeune, July 20.—(AP)—Capt. H. F. Volkman, assistant provost marshal, estimated today that fire caused damages of \$10,000 last night in the officers' mess building.

Smoke pouring through the hallways drove officers, their wives and guests from half-finished dinners. The fire broke out in the storeroom and did not spread to the main part of the building.

The storeroom was gutted and a quantity of canned goods destroyed.
