

Russians Hammer Germans Before Crumbling Warsaw

Old Polish Capital Besieged From Without And Within; Other Red Forces Smash Closer To Border Of East Prussia; New German Atrocities Are Reported

London, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The German radio said tonight that the Russians had established two strong bridgeheads over the broad and swift Vistula river, one 37 miles south of the Polish capital, which was outflanked and besieged from without and within.

As the siege of Warsaw intensified in its fourth day, another Red army group was battering at the gates of East Prussia from positions three miles from the frontier.

East Prussian soil shook to an artillery barrage.

Yet another group of armies beating through the rough hill country north of the Carpathians drove swiftly to within 70 miles of Krakow, fifth city of old Poland.

In Latvia and Estonia, a Nazi force estimated by Prime Minister Churchill at 20 or 30 divisions of up to 200,000 men, was rapidly being squeezed between four Red army groups, which severed their landward escape by establishing a ten-mile corridor to the Baltic sea 35 miles west of Riga.

The German report placed the Russians eight miles west of the Vistula in the Warta area, 37 miles below the first Polish city. The other bridgehead was said to be beyond Baranow, 125 miles northeast of Warsaw.

Marshal Konstantin Rokossovsky's troops were besieging Warsaw along a 20-mile suburban area at the eastern fringe of the city of 1,255,000.

Inside Warsaw, a Polish underground army of 25,000 was reported by the exiled Polish government to be fighting a grim street battle, attempting to shiver the German garrison into a trap of death on the Vistula.

The German radio said Nazi lines had been broken eight miles from the wild Masurian lake country in the south of East Prussia near Augustow. Their communique asserted that the Red army had been held or thrown back along the entire 1,000-mile front from the Carpathians to the Gulf of Finland, and that Nazi forces had recaptured Radzymin, 12 miles north of Warsaw.

Moscow, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Ukraine state atrocities committee charged today that 150,000 patients died in a German hospital at Slavuta about 100 miles west of Kiev, during the two years of Nazi occupation.

The committee charged that German doctors intentionally spread infectious diseases by herding new patients at gunpoint into a room where 1,800 were already dying of typhoid and tuberculosis.

Evidence was collected by investigators under Nikita Krushchev, head of the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic, said the committee, which included medical and legal experts. Their findings were given a full page, with photographs, in all

Another Airstrip And Three More Villages Captured; Japanese Losses Mount

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Tough and almost tireless Americans have blasted the Japanese from another airstrip and three more villages on Guam, and have captured nearly two-thirds of the former U. S. possession.

As American soldiers and marines carved out gains of more than a mile all across the island, the doomed enemy force of perhaps 10,000 men today was falling back into the jungle-covered plateaus of Guam's northern third.

There was still no confirmation of Tokyo radio reports that Americans had invaded Rota island between Guam and Tinian.

Rota is the last large island in the southern Marianas not yet dominated by the Americans.

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Aldermen To Hold Important Meeting

A number of important matters are to come before the Board of Aldermen at the regular meeting at the City Hall tonight at 8 o'clock, including a suit for damages instituted against the city and three police officers by Mamie Lee Garrett, Negro girl, for alleged false arrest and injury. Tropical Storm Damaged Crops

Raleigh, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Severe crop damage was caused by the tropical storm which veered inland and hit parts of Eastern North Carolina yesterday, the State Department of Agriculture reported today.

Tobacco and corn suffered heavy damage throughout a wide area, officials of the department said. They pointed out, however, that the full extent of the damage could not be determined until a survey of the affected areas has been completed.

AIRMEN BLAST NAZI TARGETS AGAIN TODAY

Italy-Based Heavy Bombers Pound War Industries At Friedrichshafen, Near Swiss Border

London, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Approximately 2,000 American and British planes in coordinated attacks from Britain and Italy attacked a wide variety of military objectives today in Germany, France and northern Italy.

Strong forces of 500 or so Flying Fortresses from England bombed railway yards at the German frontier city of Saarbrücken, and at the French border cities of Mulhouse and Strasbourg, once bastions in the Maginot line. They also bombed an oil storage dump at Merckwiller and other military targets in France.

Weather was excellent, allowing visual bombings. Up to 500 Mustangs, Lightning and Thunderbolt fighters escorted the fighters. Other fighters strafed a variety of targets aground.

Another American force of more than 750 American heavy bombers, striking from Italy, attacked industrial targets in the air craft center of Friedrichshafen, just across Lake Constance from Switzerland. They also pounded German communications in the Po valley of northern Italy. The Germans asserted they met the attackers from the south with fighters and flak and that several American planes crashed in the Alps.

Up to 1,000 British bombers, escorted by fighters attacked two flying bomb and rocket depots north of France. Both attacks were well concentrated.

United States strategic air forces alone in July flew 58,979 sorties and dropped more than 73,000 tons of bombs on the Germans. Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Expeditionary Force announced. They destroyed 1,573 or more planes in combat and aground. They flew against the foe every day in July except on the tenth, striking oil refineries, aircraft factories, railroads, bridges and other objectives.

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Warns Against Farm Land Boom

Washington, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Another disastrous farm land boom is developing, Secretary of Agriculture R. Wickard said today as he urged would-be purchasers to use extra money to retire debts or to purchase war bonds rather than to buy farm real estate at present inflated values.

The rate at which farm land prices are rising, coupled with the large number of sales, are unmistakable signs that an inflationary land spree is under way in many regions," he said.

The secretary's comments were made in connection with an Agriculture Department survey showing that war markets for farm commodities have boosted land values an average of 42 per cent above the average prevailing in the 1935-39 period.

"People who go into debt to buy farms at inflated prices," he said, "stand to lose in the long run, through foreclosure or economic ruin, when peacetime conditions return to the farm commodity and real-estate market."

Allies Don't Care Who Reaches Berlin First

Washington, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Plans for immediate follow-up of the surrender or collapse of Germany are reported here to have been worked out in great detail. Officials familiar with their provisions said today that they call for full cooperation among the United States, Britain and Russia in the hour of victory.

For this reason and because of the general pledges of cooperation made at the Moscow and Tehran conferences last year, American officials say they are convinced beyond any doubt that it makes no difference whether Russian or Anglo-American forces get to Berlin first, or which first accepts a major German army surrender.

Early victory forecasts by Prime Minister Churchill yesterday brought a renewed wave of speculation here over what will happen if the Germans surrender first to the Russians, or what difference it will make if they give up instead to British-American forces.

The answer given to both questions in official quarters here is: It will not make any difference. Neither side will make a "separate peace." Either side will accept Germany's unconditional surrender at any time or place—except in the name of all the Allied powers.

ALLIES REPEL NAZI ATTACKS

Drives In Italy Slow By German Resistance

Rome, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Fifth army has broken German efforts to send counterattacking forces across the Arno river on both sides of besieged Pisa near Italy's west coast, Allied headquarters announced today.

The enemy appeared attempting to take the initiative also near the inland wing of the American forces by sending 200 troops to the south bank of the Arno river north of Pontedera, but mortar fire dispersed this force.

Eight army units were making fresh gains in the Nazi defense ring around Florence.

Attacking north from San Michele and La Romola, Eighth army units captured the commanding heights of La Poggiona, five and one-half miles southwest of the historic city. New Zealand troops previously had been reported within five miles of the city's outskirts in that area.

West of Florence British and Indian troops crossed the Pesa river on a two-mile bridgehead and advanced one mile, capturing the village of Ginestra, three miles southeast of Montelupo, and threatening the entire west flank of the German line south of the Arno river in that area.

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Army Making Preparations To Take Over Paralyzed Transportation System

Philadelphia, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Major Gen. Philip Hayes, commanding general of the third service command, came here today as the army made apparent preparations to take over Philadelphia's paralyzed transportation system.

Superintendent of Police Guy E. Parsons said he had been informed "unofficially" that the army was preparing to take over the system. All policemen have been ordered, he said, to assist.

The nation's second war production center looked to the White House today for action to end a work stoppage that locked the city's transportation wheels a third day and gave rise to continued violence involving negroes and whites.

Upgrading of eight negro employees under a directive of President Roosevelt's Fair Employment Practices Committee precipitated the walkout, which appeared almost certain to culminate in government seizure of the Philadelphia Transportation company with possible use of troops.

Police reported a new wave of window smashings, which they attributed to negro youths, as a two-hour move by a small group of PTC employees to restore service on Philadelphia's two subway lines ended in failure.

An official of the Transport Workers' union (CIO), who declined to be quoted by name, said back-to-work appeals for the 6,000 employees had "only a ghost of a chance to succeed" barring a big break in Washington. Government seizure, he agreed, would be such a "break."

Inter-racial clashes stemming from the work stoppage caused hospitalization of at least 13 persons before yesterday's steady rain—called "providential" by one police official—drove wandering bands in

Merchant Loses Hand In Accident

Carl T. Reid, owner of Reid's store, lost his left hand by the accidental discharge of an automatic shotgun in the office of his store this morning.

Following his usual custom, Reid had gone to the store about 8:15 to open the safe and get things ready for beginning the day's business. He was accompanied by his son, Carl T. Jr., who aids his father in the operation of the store.

Reid was stooping in front of the safe with his left hand against the wall, and as he removed a ledger and money box from the safe with his right hand, it became entangled with the wire of a radio on top of the safe, causing the radio to fall off and knock over a gun that had been resting beside the safe since hunting season. The entire load from the gun went through his left hand and peppered the low metal ceiling of the office.

Reddin Jones, Guy Harris, J. L. Savage and James Paschal, at Brown-Wood Motor Company next door, heard the explosion and ran to Reid's store to ascertain the cause. Reid was standing up, holding his left wrist attempting to check the flow of blood. They immediately put a tourniquet on his arm and carried him to the hospital, where doctors found it necessary to amputate the hand.

ROBOTS BLAST LONDON AGAIN

Germans Send Over Flying Bombs For 14 Continuous Hours

London, August 3.—(AP)—Flying bombs crashed on London and southern England, in salvoes for 14 hours today in the longest sustained attack since the Germans fired the first across the channel seven weeks ago.

At mid-afternoon, the bombardment slackened.

At least 28 persons were killed, bringing the total death toll to 4,743.

Ten men repairing bomb damage were killed by a robot in their billet next door to a mortuary containing victims of an earlier similar explosion. Eight others were killed when a group of houses was wrecked, adding to the 317,000 buildings destroyed or damaged since the attacks started June 15.

Some Americans joined in the defense shooting in south England during the night.

Anti-aircraft gunners in southern England maintained almost continuous barrage. Some robots were reported destroyed over the English channel.

Seven hospitals were hit, 10 patients being killed at one, and ex-

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Southerners have shouted loudest about "white supremacy" over negroes but there is plenty of evidence to show that doctrine is practiced widely in the rest of the country.

The strike of Philadelphia transit workers against hiring of negro drivers by the transportation company there followed bitter complaints of outright discrimination in that northern city.

This tells some of the story: The Fair Employment Practices Committee has pending about 2,111 complaints of racial discrimination.

The FEPC was created to prevent discrimination on racial or religious grounds in war industries and thus, its advocates argued, make the best use of the nation's manpower.

Of the total of 2,111 complaints, 561 are in the south. The remaining 1,550 complaints have been made from the rest of the country.

FEPC officials say: "Those figures don't mean that those are all the cases of discrimination occurring either in the south or the rest of the country."

"Actual discrimination may be far greater but we report only the complaints received."

"In the north, particularly, complaints of discrimination against negroes are apt to be more numerous for two reasons: "First, there are more negro organizations in the north and they are active against discrimination. Second, there are more war industries in the north and the FEPC handles only cases of discrimination in war jobs."

Philadelphia is not the only city where there have been protests

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Gen Omar N. Bradley's armored columns, pressing at burning speed into the heart of Brittany, have captured Rennes after a two-day advance which carried them 43 miles from Avranches.

The Americans were pushing swiftly toward their old World War base of St. Nazaire, 80 miles beyond Rennes, which is almost in the center of the Breton peninsula. Other west-bound columns were reported in the outskirts of Dinan, after an advance of 35 miles from Avranches. Bradley's forces thus had opened a wedge 30 miles deep and 35 miles broad in the heart of Brittany in a series of open-field dashes.

Enemy resistance collapsed altogether below Avranches and for many miles American tanks had no opposition until they reached the outskirts of Rennes and Dinan, as Associated Press dispatch from the front said.

The assault into Brittany had caught the wounded Marshal Erwin Rommel with the barest garrison force. There were some unofficial estimates here that the whole Breton peninsula might fall by the week-end.

Not until the outskirts of Rennes and Dinan were reached was an enemy force, and then 1,000 German soldiers tossed down their arms at Rennes. At Dinan the Americans had swept across the Rance river, which runs on the east side of the town.

Latest frontline dispatch was written Wednesday evening, and it was probable that the American whirlwind already had swept well past these points.

British and Americans were still pushing with manifold thrusts into the flanks of a seemingly bewildered enemy. Canadian troops struck out with a new attack below Caen which imperiled the whole Nazi defense in Western France.

With the Allied bag of German prisoners taken since D-day approaching 100,000, Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery, commander of Allied ground forces in France, told the Associated Press at the front: "We are hitting the Hun a good crack."

St. Malo, a highly important port across the Bay of St. Michel from Normandy, apparently was being bypassed by the rampaging American columns which had turned the corner into Brittany.

Dinan is 13 miles south of St. Malo and 100 miles east of the great port of Brest at Brittany's tip.

The Americans reached the outskirts of Rennes last night, a field dispatch announced. Dol de Bretagne, 14 miles east of Dinan, was captured yesterday.

Pushing out with a new attack, supported by another of the Allies' smashing aerial and artillery bombardments which saturated the area of attack with steel and fire, Canadian troops struck in the Tilly-le-

against proposals to promote negroes to jobs as bus drivers or as get car motormen and conductors.

There have been complaints of discrimination in Washington, D. C., Baltimore and Los Angeles. The Los Angeles case will be heard August 8 and 9.

The other side of the transportation picture: FEPC officials point out that negroes employed as conductors, motormen, or bus drivers in New York, Detroit, San Francisco, Cleveland, Chicago and Buffalo.

FEPC officials say further: "There has been very little discrimination in foundries, coal mines and longshore work, traditionally heavy jobs which long have employed negro help."

But there have been complaints of discrimination in the ship-building and aircraft industries, public utilities, southern textile mills, machinery manufacture and railroads.

The heaviest load of complaints has come from New York, Philadelphia, Detroit, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco and St. Louis.

FEPC has 15 regional offices. The fewest complaints have come from regions 1 (New England) and region 8 (North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa). Each reported 16.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The Anglo-American Allies continue to tear into the badly mauled and disorganized Nazi ranks on the invasion front of France, and a late dispatch from British headquarters in Normandy says this is the beginning of "the great retreat."

That may well be so. The cold fact is the Germans are up against an overwhelming strength in both men and materiel which have been poured through the bloody beachheads of Normandy.

Hitler's fighting machine in France is beginning to break up, just as it is doing on the eastern front.

British Prime Minister Churchill yesterday said truly that "it is the Russian army that has done the main work of tearing." But while the fighting in France never will reach the monumental scale of the Russo-Nazi war, the western allies also are about to give a fearsome exhibition of ripping out what Mr. Churchill said.

If the Americans succeed in cutting off the Brest peninsula and capturing the great port of Brest—and today's reports indicate smashing progress—it will provide harbor and rail facilities which will add much to the Allied striking power. However, Cherbourg can fill the bill for the time being without Brest, and we may expect that there will be no delay in pressing the drive on Paris, for the Canadians and British are destroying the Nazi right wing and the center in the fire sector while the Yanks race into

Brittany on the other flank. Truly Hitler's pagan gods have deserted him. At last he's feeling the mighty weight of the Allied vise. With the Red armies slashing his entire line to ribbons, and today his entire line of the "sacred soil" of East Prussia, he can't spare troops from the eastern theater to bolster his hard-pressed forces in France. And he has nothing like enough troops or equipment in the west to protect himself for long.

At latest reports the Germans had on the Normandy front a total of 28 divisions of various categories, including four panzer units and some infantry divisions which are partly armored. Thirteen of these divisions have been on the British sector for fifteen on the American. It's impossible to estimate accurately the number of troops involved, because many divisions are under normal quota. Perhaps there has been a minimum of a quarter million men.

The Hitlerites claim that the Allies have fifty divisions in Normandy. If that's so it might mean close to 700,000 men. When you consider that the Germans have only about 65 divisions in western Europe, Hitler's problem becomes doubly clear. For he has many points to protect against further Allied invasions. The American drive into Brittany is eased greatly by the fact that the Germans had to withdraw forces from there to meet the Allied onslaught in Normandy. This withdrawal also lessens the danger of a heavy German counterattack from Brittany against the Allies' right wing now emerging from Normandy.

TRUE JEWELS AND FALSE

Jewels are a passion with many women. And it is amazing how many are completely satisfied with anything that sparkles, whether it is real or not. The difference, you see, between real diamonds and glass cannot be discerned unless you look closely for it, taking the jewel in your hand, turning it over, and examining it from the back. If there is a metal backing over the stone, it is really nothing more than a piece of common glass, though it may sparkle from the front like a diamond of almost priceless quality. If it has no metal backing, if the light shines through straight, clear and blue-white, then you have a diamond of real worth and lasting beauty.

You can tell a true Christian by looking closely at him in much the same way. If he has to have something corresponding to the metal backing before he can shine forth, then he is not a real Christian. If he is burdened down by ostentation, making a great public show of his gifts to church and to charity, then he is false. If his sparkle comes only from the fact that he goes to church on Sundays because it is the thing to do, then he is like the piece of glass with the metal backing and the big, flashy front. But if a man is humble, meek, and sincere, if you see the true love of God shining through and reflected again and again, then that man is a true jewel of God, a priceless possession.

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AMERICA IN WARTIME

Washington—The most technical, perfect movie theater in the capital operates with no ticket booth, no usherettes, no popcorn machines—and all for free.

But you can't go there just for fun. The theater, deep in the air-cooled recesses of the National Academy Building, is only part of the "little Hollywood" operated by Archives' Division of Motion Pictures and Sound Recordings. Stainless steel vaults contain more than 100,000 feet of film ranging from jerky glimpses of President Grover Cleveland to smashing battle scenes of the present war.

John Bradley, head of the division, will arrange special showings of any subject for individuals or groups able to prove a legitimate interest.

"If a farmer comes in and asks to see some special agricultural films, we are glad to show them to him," Bradley explained. "We'll show a film on silicosis to doctors, but if a farmer comes in and wants to see the silicosis film for entertainment we'd have to turn him down."

Only five days a year is the rule against entertainment relaxed. For the past two Christmas seasons the division has invited lonely service men in to enjoy revivals of feature films of long ago.

The war has first call on the division's facilities. The army, navy and civilian divisions of government are finding unexpected treasures of information in their recesses. Cooperation with the Library of Congress has widened this particularly aid to the war effort. The library is custodian of millions of feet of paper photographic prints of movie film, filed under the copyright law. Technicians at the Archives built a special camera which can photograph the paper tape, reproducing the film in usable negative form.

The system is ideal when the navy, for instance, wants some out-of-print shots of naval action in the first World War.

Archives experts, working with the Bureau of Standards and film makers, have cooperated in development of film expected to last from 300 to 500 years.

"When it's nearing its age limit," Bradley said, "it can be duplicated and reduplicated. That ought to be good for several thousand years, and I refuse to worry after that."

The big fireproof storage rooms contain not only movies of every

president since Cleveland, but recordings of the voices of all those since Woodrow Wilson.

Among the most highly prized sound effects are cylindrical records, made in the '90's, of Indian war chants sung by tribesmen.

Five feet away are other war chants of much later date—recordings of Japanese and German propaganda broadcasts picked up by U. S. listening posts. The division has 25,000 such recordings.

in Superfortress range of Japan.

The newly advanced American line extends east across the island from Tumon bay on the west coast. It is three miles north of the captured capital, Agaña, and more than 10 miles north of American-occupied Port Apra.

It was disclosed that the Americans have killed about 33,000 Japanese in the southern Marianas, at a cost of 5,139 Yank dead or missing. Not a single Japanese ship or plane has appeared in the area since the early days of the Saipan invasion.

On the British New Guinea coast, 1,300 miles south of the Marianas, units of a Japanese force of perhaps 45,000, trapped in the Wewak-Aitape sector since April, made two new Bananal-shooting charges against American lines Tuesday. Both attacks were beaten back with heavy Japanese losses.

Six hundred more Japanese bodies were counted in mopping-up operations on Biak and Noemfoor islands off Dutch New Guinea, and 300 more prisoners were taken.

bombers and 180 fighters. Losses represented 1.5 per cent of the 39,994 bomber sorties and less than 0.7 per cent of the 23,985 fighter sorties.

Heavy bombers of the United States eighth air force provided frequent tactical support for ground forces in Normandy, the announcement pointed out. More than 1,500 participated in the aerial preliminary to the breakthrough west of St. Lo and about 750 flew in the earlier drive on Cean.

The heavies struck numerous objectives in France yesterday from west and south. Foul weather grounded the British bomb armada for the second night.

The Swiss told of planes flying over their eastern district, touching off sirens in Zurich, St. Gotthard and St. Moritz.

Weather reduced visibility to zero in some places over Cherbourg today but deeper in France it was not so murky and some improvement was forecast.

Spotty weather limited Allied bombers based in Britain and Normandy to 2,500 offensive sorties yesterday. These included strategic attacks by the U. S. army air forces and assaults by RAF heavy bombers ranging from Belgium to the Bay of Biscay and deep into southern France, smashing bridges, rail lines, enemy fuel and supply dumps and armored vehicles.

Ten German planes were destroyed while 17 Allied craft were lost.

American heavy bombers, concentrating on tactical targets in support of the ground forces, struck fuel dumps and bridges in the Paris area and the Loire valley, and other tactical objectives in northern and central France.

Medium bombers and fighter-bombers hammered rail bridges over a wide area, ammunition dumps east of the battle zone and 35 to 40 barges on the Seine river.

Just before dark yesterday Ameri-

can and British heavy bombers blasted German flying bomb bases in northern France. Three separate assaults were made on the robot targets, the first by 500 U. S. heavyweights.

Then the RAF sent Lancasters and Stirlings against launching ramps across the channel, and finally 750 Fortresses and Liberators delivered another bombardment in the same area.

Soviet newspapers. The patients were starved to death on a diet of 250 grams of ersatz flour, made of ground wood pulp and containing less than two per cent of starch, the committee said.

Other charges were: Red army prisoners were tortured and beaten, and many were buried alive. Hospital newcomers were robbed of warm clothing and shoes by guards.

All attempts at escape were punished by death.

Barbed wire, searchlights and machineguns surrounded ten brick barracks, where 15,000 to 18,000 wounded and diseased were housed.

Throughout the two years an average of 800 to 900 corpses lay on the ground at a hospital railway siding, and only 525 persons remained alive in the hospital when the Red army liberated Slavuta.

floors. But the downpour also contributed to a transport snarl that kept 140,000 of the area's 800,000 war workers from their jobs, the war manpower Commission reported and caused a central city business decline estimated by a retail trade spokesman at \$1,000,000 a day.

Extra trains on the Pennsylvania railroad and Reading company lines could carry only a fraction of the 1,500,000 persons who daily ride on ETO trolleys, buses and subway trains, while an oil industry spokesman said motorists granted extra gasoline in the emergency were draining the region's tanks.

Late appeals to the absentee workers were made by Mayor Bernard Samuel, who said the work stoppage was "sabotage of our country's war effort," and James J. Fitzsimon, TWU international president, who asserted that "a small group of self-seeking, disgruntled employees were trying to regain power over the dead bodies of American soldiers."

At least a dozen draft boards announce they were reclassifying into 1-A a total of more than 500 idle workers, who previously had occupational deferments.

North Philadelphia's civic league yesterday's sporadic violence lessened, posted several hundred placards reading: "Negroes, think before you act. Your neighbors are not your enemies. Let's all cooperate for mutual helpfulness."

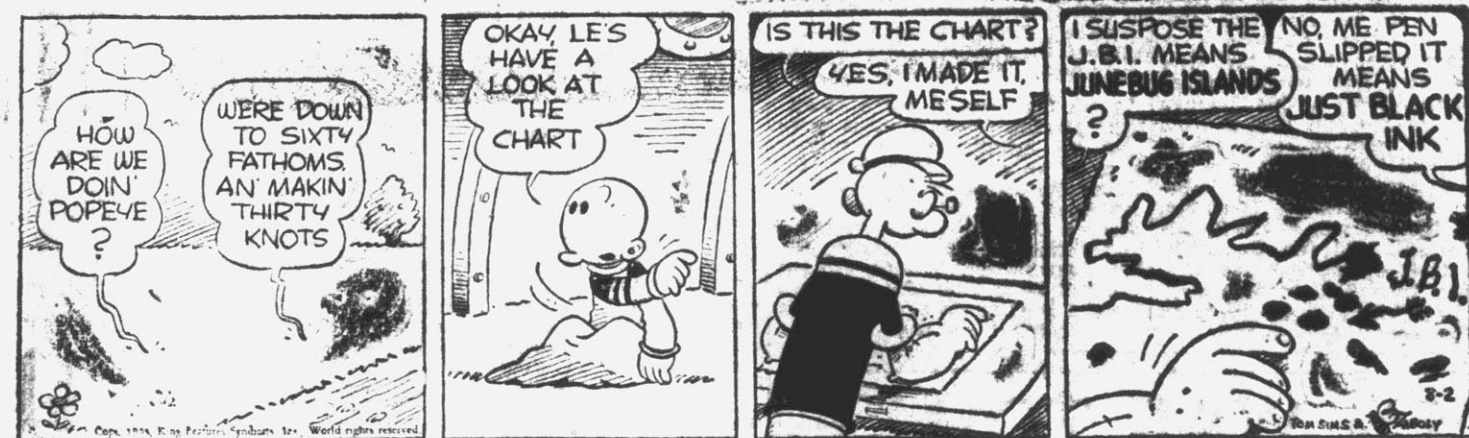

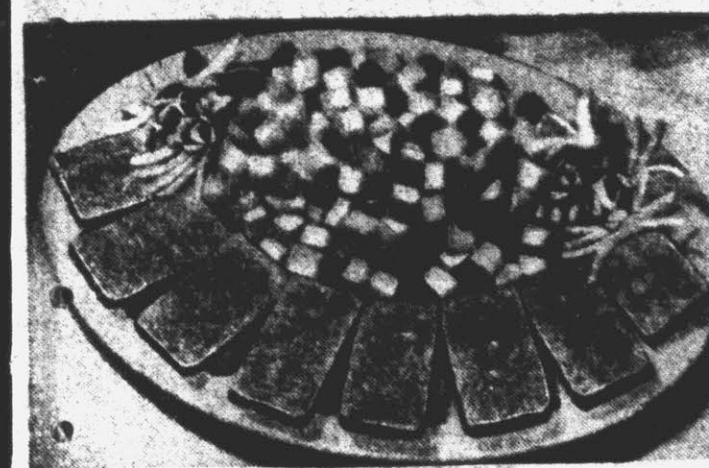

High ranking officers of the North Carolina State Guard will come to Greenville to attend a supper meeting at the armory Thursday, August 10, at 7 p. m. The meeting will be held to arouse interest in the local company and to recruit it up to the required quota of three officers and 50 enlisted men.

The Kiwanis, Lions and Rotary clubs and the Chamber of Commerce, American Legion and Merchants Association are sponsoring the meeting. Members of the guard will be special guests. This meeting will take the place of the civic club meetings on Monday and Friday evenings of that week.

The State Guard is a voluntary military organization for service at home during the war. The men serve without pay. They drill two hours on Tuesday nights. The officers and men have had special training under army officers from Fort Bragg. The outfit is equipped with rifles, riot and tommy guns, hand grenades and tear gas bombs, and is prepared to take care of any emergency at home until the regular army could take over. Capt. Jasper L. Jones is the commanding officer.

Rampaging Yanks...

Compagnie area below Caen. This offensive intensified the danger to German troops holding stubbornly to the granite hills and forest lands which they have turned into a huge anti-tank area as the keystone of their defenses.

It is in this area that British staff officers said yesterday the Germans must stand and fight with the prospect of being destroyed.

The first army of a prospective encirclement—Lt. Gen Sir Miles Dempsey's British—was weaving a strong web of steel below the area from the direction of captured Vire and Estery.

And now the Canadians were striking out from the north with the apparent purpose of meeting it.

German armor milled about in the area yesterday, apparently in a state of confusion as to where to go. A deep penetration into the valleys below Caen from the Canadian sector, a dispatch pointed out, would cut across the Germans' communications and "result in final" disaster for the enemy's campaign in the whole of the west of France.

Rocket-carrying Typhoons laid the whiplash to the confused enemy armor yesterday, sending 18 tanks so flaming destruction, damaging 19 more and destroying or damaging 176 other vehicles.

American fighter bombers over Bradley's columns smashed 32 more German tanks, and more than 300 other staff cars, half-tracks, trucks, motorcycles and buses.

In the Roncey-Cavray area, inside a 20 by 16-mile area between Avranches and Vire where at least two German armored divisions were feared with threat of entrapment. The roads were so cluttered with broken German transport that American bulldozers were put into action to clear the highways.

Another British spearhead was driven into the center of the 60-mile pocket below Caen, its tip reaching within 2,000 yards of Avranches below Villers-Bocage.

The British were at the edge of Villers-Bocage itself, one of the chief German strongholds, and were believed to have turned it into a no-man's-land. Attacking by moonlight, the British took five towns before dawn in the Villers-Bocage vicinity.

Giving the enemy no chance to rest or dig in, the British tomahawks left a series of strong points around Villers-Bocage. Throughout the night, capturing Bleville, La Dresserie, La Douette, St. Germain, and Bayers.

Between Villers-Bocage and Avranches—sur-Odon the Germans were fighting savagely in woods and hedgerows around Le Monde, ancient town northwest of St. George d'Autry.

Although it was not yet apparent whether the Germans would continue to stand and fight or attempt a mass retreat, there were signs that German reinforcements were beginning to arrive in an effort to plug the breach torn in the center of the German line.

"We are pushing east from the Fire-Le Bény-Bocage sector in a most satisfactory manner," a British staff colonel said.

Vire itself, one of Normandy's prime communication centers, fell under Allied control, with British troops in its streets, front dispatches reported. An American column driving up from the southwest reached St. Pons, 10 miles away.

This tightened the drawstring on the German rear guard, including the 15th and 21st Panzer divisions, withdrawing in the Vire-Troucy-Percy-Villedieu pocket although they may be able to weasel out through the 10-mile gap.

The invasion of France now has rolled into its 50th day with at least 100,000 prisoners among the casualties inflicted on the Germans.

Lower Prices On Georgia Markets

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Showing a declining price tendency, the Georgia-Florida tobacco belt entered its fourth selling day today with indications that the 39-cent OPA ceiling average would prevail before the end of the second week.

Better grades of leaf, particularly primings, still have not appeared in the abundance of normal years, the Tobacco Division of the War Food Administration announced last night.

Sales continued heavy. The WFA reported sales for the first two days on all Georgia markets totaled 11,213,832 pounds at an average of 39.57 cents with Florida's two markets selling 1,440,918 pounds at an average of 39.72 cents or a total of 12,654,840 pounds for the belt with an over-all average of 39.59 cents a pound.

Wednesday's prices on the WFA table showed declines of \$1 per hundred pounds or more for most grades.
