Russian Armies Hammer Through Nazi Defenses

New Gains At Krakow, Warsaw And On East Prussian Border; Reds Capture Important Oil And Communications Center At Southern End Of The Front

London, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The German stronghold of Sandomierz on the Carpathian slopes 42 miles southwest of Lwow was captured by the Red army today, Marshal Stalin said in an order of the day.

The town of about 18,000 lies 15 miles northwest of the Polish oil center of Prolubov, topped by the Red army yesterday.

Stalin's order, broadcast by Moscow and recorded by the Soviet monitor, called Sandomierz a large railway junction and "important strong point in German defenses in the Carpathian foothills."

It lies on rail lines between Lwow and Czechoslovakia and Hungary, and between German Silesia and Romania. Stalin's order was addressed to troops of the First Ukrainian army group, commanded by Gen. Ivan S. Konev, who captured Krakow finally in 1943 and who led the first Russian troops across the Dnieper river.

PHILADELPHIA STRIKE ENDED

Transit Systems Functioning Today Under Army Protection

Philadelphia, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The army restored normal transportation service in Philadelphia today and fired four leaders of the unauthorized walkout that gave the nation's second largest arsenal a "nightmare week," cut war production and caused racial violence.

An army spokesman reported that at 10:30 a. m. service was "100 per cent normal, with every vehicle moving on schedule and soldiers guarding every vehicle."

The strike leaders were discharged as they reported for work. The four, James H. McMenamin, Frank P. Carney, William C. Dixey and Frank Thompson, are free on \$2,500 bonds pending new charges August 14 on charges of violating the Smith-Connally act.

Only 13 of the Philadelphia Transportation Company's 6,000 operating employees failed to report at their scheduled time, an army spokesman said, and "it is not yet known how many of them will be able to present medical certificates or illness to excuse their absence."

Maj. Gen. Philip Hayes who took over the PTC for the army, warned the employees that "any man who isn't back on his job at the scheduled time will get no job for the duration, and the duration may be a long time."

Production soared again in this country's largest arsenal of government armaments and munitions. The strike had been lost—eight negroes were called to resume training as trolley motormen, the issue that caused the stoppage, but whether they had reported for work or not was not determined.

General Hayes' statement of Thursday that "all the employees will continue in the capacity they held" before the walkout, General Hayes did not mention specifically the eight trainees.

For three days the strikers disregarded the appeals of government officials, community leaders and officers of their own CIO Transport Workers union.

Then the army took over. Maj. Gen. Philip Hayes, seizing the system by order of President Roosevelt, said "the war cannot wait." He conferred briefly with government agency officials.

To break the strike:

1. U. S. deputy marshals Saturday night arrested James H. McMenamin, strike committee chairman, on charges of violating the Smith-Connally anti-strike act, which provides imprisonment and fine for strikes against government-operated industry. Three other leaders likewise were arrested.
2. The War Manpower Commission denied further employment (Continued on Page Four)

Warn Motorists To Fix Lights, Brakes

Fall Fatal To Reuben Mobley

Mr. Reuben Mobley, 67, died in Pitt General Hospital at 10 o'clock this morning as a result of injuries received when he fell from the roof of the home of Dal Cox on East Eighth street at about 9 o'clock. He was making repairs to the roof at the time the accident occurred.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed pending the arrival of members of the family.

Mr. Mobley was born and reared near Stokes, and came to Greenville to live in 1903. He was married to Miss Eva S. Wilson on February 18, 1905. He served six years in the United States Army and was a veteran of the Spanish-American War. He was a member of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church and the Ellington Bible Class. He was a carpenter.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Lt. J. E. Mobley of the U. S. Army, now stationed at Tulsa, Okla., and one daughter, Mrs. J. M. Ryan of Washington, D. C.; five grandchildren; two brothers, Walter Mobley of near Rocky Mount, and Tommie Mobley of near Williamston; and three sisters, Mrs. Della Robertson and Mrs. Marvin Ayers of near Williamston, and Mrs. Jennie Anderson of Raleigh.

Eleven Jap Ships Sunk Thirty Others Damaged

Fast American Task Force Shells And Bombs Bonin Islands 600 Miles From Tokyo

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters Pearl Harbor, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Striking within 600 miles of Tokyo, a fast American carrier task force, has sunk 11 Japanese ships and damaged 30 other surface craft.

The sinking vessels included the Japanese battleship Yamato, the heavy cruiser Mogami, and the light cruiser Asagiri. The task force also sank 11 Japanese destroyers and damaged 19 others.

A Pacific fleet communiqué said the American task force "virtually wiped out a Japanese convoy" during the raids Thursday and Friday, U. S. time. The score:

Sunk—Five Japanese destroyers or destroyer escorts, five cargo ships, one oiler, two smaller craft, and several barges also were destroyed. Two Japanese destroyers, one light cruiser, five smaller vessels, a large freighter hit on both days, three landing ships, and 18 small vessels, including five barges, two of them troop-laden.

A two, six enemy planes were shot down. Six others were destroyed and five damaged, on the ground. One parked plane was destroyed at Chichi Island anti-aircraft gun shot down 16 American carrier planes, and 19 American aircraft were lost.

The Bonin-Kazan islands are less than 900 miles north of Saipan, the most advanced American base in the Marianas, where airfields are under construction.

Strongly indicating that B-29 Superfortresses will be based on Saipan, Brig. Gen. Robert W. Douglas, Jr., commander of the 7th Army air force, disclosed that American

engineers in the Marianas, "accomplishing a miracle of construction," were building big air bases "that threaten the very gates of Tokyo."

On Guam, 130 miles south of Saipan, American soldiers and marines forced Japanese defenders deeper into the northern quarter of the island. Advancing one to three miles in two days, the Americans captured two more villages, Ukudu and Liguana, five miles northeast of the American-occupied capital Agaña.

Marines began operating fighter planes off the Orote peninsula airfield on Guam, cleared of the wreckage of 76 Japanese planes. Guam's civilians continued to surrender by the hundreds; 22,000 already have taken refuge behind American lines.

Greenville Soldier Killed In Battle

The War Department has informed Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Andrews of Greenville that their son, Pvt. Kelly Andrews, 22, with the U. S. Army in Italy, was killed in battle on July 17.

Pvt. Andrews had been in the army two years. He attended school at Belvoir. He was a brother to Sgt. Henry A. Andrews, in the U. S. Cavalry and stationed at Camp Campbell, Ky.

Congress Faces Major Measures During Week

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Congress comes to grips this week with reconversion legislation, with a states' rights fight brewing in the Senate on unemployment compensation and House Republicans condemning what they called an "accident on unemployment rather than on ways of creating employment."

The fireworks will be touched off in the Senate Tuesday when the Murray-Truman-Kilgore unemployment bill and a rival measure by Senator George (D-Ga.) come up for debate.

At issue is the amount to be paid, and who shall pay it.

Backed by a large segment of organized labor, the Murray-Truman-Kilgore measure calls for benefits ranging as high as \$35 weekly for jobless war veterans and civilian unemployed. The federal government would pay the excess over the current \$16 weekly average of state compensation laws.

While broadening coverage by state programs and bringing under them some 2,000,000 federal employees, the Kilgore proposal leaves administration to the states, with smaller payments than are provided by the rival measure. It has the backing of most southern Democrats and the Republican leadership, who have assailed the Murray-Truman-Kilgore bill as too costly, likely to encourage prolonged idleness, and an attempt to federalize state unemployment programs.

The Senate leadership hopes to dispose of the fight, one way or another, this week and the House

HEAVY RAIDS OVER GERMANY

Nazis Undergo Week-end of Terror From The Skies

London, Aug. 7.—(AP)—More than 500 U. S. heavy bombers blasted at two synthetic oil plants deep in the Reich today in concert with from 100 Liberators and Flying Fortresses which struck at vital targets over a wide area of France.

The Fifteenth air force sent its heavyweights from Mediterranean bases to Blechamer, 75 miles southeast of Breslau, where they scored hits on two plants which produce much of the German army's high grade motor fuel. The Germans threw up smoke screens and interceptors swarmed into the air to guard these plants, one of which is the third largest Nazi synthetic plant still operating, but the bombers fought through and dropped their loads visually or by instrument.

Another force of Liberators, roaring into the Balkans, pounded an enemy airfield at Albunar, 21 miles northeast of Belgrade, and oil installations on the Danube at Novi Sad, northwest of Belgrade.

A big force of four-engine American bombers from British bases—numbering up to 750—bombed fuel tanks and depots, bridges and railway junctions over a wide stretch of France.

An equal number of Lightnings, Thunderbolts, and Mustangs guarded the big American bombers striking targets in areas east and northeast of Paris, southeast of Bordeaux, and in the Amiens region.

Moscow disclosed that U. S. heavy bombers flying from England on Sunday, pounded a Nazi aircraft plant at Rahmel, 10 miles northwest of the Polish port of Gdynia, and then flew on to Russian bases without loss.

Today's aerial assaults followed an RAF heavy bomber raid last night on the rail junction of Hazebrouck, south of Dunkerque, and Berlin radio said planes from the south also were hitting at German targets.

American Marauder bombers, maintaining pressure to seal in whatever Germans are left on the Breton peninsula, made direct bomb hits on two enemy freighters in the harbor of Brest before noon. Other mediums bombarded Seine river railways bridges 30 miles south of Paris at Corbeil, and at Corbeil near Vernon.

While British heavy bombers rained explosives on the enemy's important north-south supply route last night, Mosquitoes ranged over Germany and a wide area of France, hammering targets near the battle zone and 100 miles beyond.

Most of the Mosquito attacks were shifted at rail transport in continuation of efforts to block movement of German forces withdrawing rapidly from the western front.

Other Mosquitoes continued the assault on Germany's shrinking oil supply by bombing a synthetic oil plant at Castrop-Rauxel, near the (Continued on Page Four)

Urge Purchase Of Winter Fuel Now

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Householders and building owners were prompted by the Office of Defense Transportation today to lay in their winter's fuel oil supply "while deliveries can still be made."

The shortage of tank trucks and heavy tires, coupled with a scarcity of railroad tank cars, it said, makes next fall's fuel oil deliveries a precarious matter.

Open County, City Schools Sept. 18

Opening of the city and county schools has been tentatively set for September 18, instead of August 31, on account of the epidemic of polio prevailing in the state. It was announced today. If the polio situation does not subside a later date may be fixed for opening the schools.

A meeting of the Pitt County Board of Education today Miss Rea Proctor of Rocky Mount was appointed to work with the board in a program of improving the instructional program in the county schools. She formerly taught in Edgecombe county. During the past nine years Miss Proctor taught at the Chisum school and was principal of the Falkland school. She is an A. B. graduate of East Carolina Teachers' college and has taken summer school work at the University of North Carolina. She was highly recommended for her new position by the school officials and the supervisory staff of the State Board of Education, Supt. Don H. Conley stated.

The superintendent said about a dozen teachers are still needed for the county schools and suggested that some of the teachers who married and gave up teaching volunteer to teach during the coming session.

NO NEW POLIO IS REPORTED

Health Department Says One Case In County So Far

According to the local Health Department, no new case of polio has been reported to the department since last Friday.

At present the only known case in Pitt county is on Charles street in the city of Greenville.

The local health officer, Dr. Ennett, strongly advises against children under 16 attending the movie theaters. The management of theaters in Greenville has been approached and has offered full cooperation to this end.

The health officer recommends that children under 16, not only stay away from gatherings in public places, but advises that until the polio situation improves, that children be kept on their own premises.

Dr. Ennett calls attention to certain other control measures recommended by the State Board of Health: "Improper disposal of human excreta may be an important factor in the spread of infantile paralysis. Where approved sewage systems do not exist, excreta should be disposed of only in fly-proof privies."

"Increased attention should be called to the hygiene in the home. Food should be prepared and handled in a manner to prevent contamination." (Continued on page two)

Heaviest Counterattacks Since D-Day Launched By Germans Today In Effort To Halt American Occupation Of Breton Peninsula About Completed

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Germans today struck their most furious counterblow at Americans since D-Day, shooting four armored divisions to a depth of about three miles into the thinnest Allied coastal strip east of Avranches.

The counterattack, described in front line dispatches as the most concentrated the Germans have yet made in France, apparently was aimed at outflanking four American spearheads pointing dangerously toward Paris and at separating Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley's American forces in Brittany from the British forces to the north in Normandy.

The Germans in their first rush recaptured Mortain, cutting the road behind the most advanced Bradley spearhead at Domfront where it was aimed at Paris, 135 miles away.

The Americans were said to still hold the high ground around Mortain, however, and the German thrust was met by a hurricane of fire from hundreds of guns and Allied air forces.

"The air forces are having a field day," one high officer said at the front.

Earlier, a fleet of more than 500 American Fortresses and Liberators was reported coursing the French battlefields.

The German counterattack was on an eight-mile front from Mortain to Soudreval, to the north, and was in an area about 20 miles from the sea.

The German commander, evidently aimed their thrust at Avranches, the coastal city where American forces turned the corner from Normandy into Brittany.

The first penetrations carried to the area of Juvigny-le-Tertre, three miles northwest of Mortain, and (Continued on page two)

Border Markets Open Tomorrow

Florence, S. C., Aug. 7.—(AP)—The border belt tobacco markets of North and South Carolina begin the auction season tomorrow a week late.

The delayed opening was ordered by the governors of the two states while they sought unsuccessfully to have the OPA boost by two cents the ceiling of 42-1/2 cents a pound.

The OPA refused, contending that an upward revision would result in an increase in the retail price of cigarettes.

Predictions of a good market were made on all sides. The War Food Administration said this year's crop was far superior to last year's in both quality and quantity.

Late rains and favorable weather turned a crop which at one time threatened to be a near failure into one almost equalling the choice crop of 1943, the WFA said.

The belt's estimated production this year is 174,255,000 pounds. This is exceeded only by the record production of 231,970,000 pounds in 1939.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The most fascinating spectacle of the flaming battle-fronts today—and a key situation to watch—is that loose left wing of Hitler's Normandy line which is flying wild like a pennant in a hurricane.

It was the tearing away of this Nazi flank from its coastal anchor that let the American armored forces loose to rampage through Brittany. Now it's being swung back like a turnpike toll-gate to open the route to Paris, as witness the news that Yankee columns achieved the crossing of the Mayenne river barrier in five places and are roaring on towards the French capital in the favorable open country between the Seine and the Loire rivers.

That lashing pennant is symbolic of Hitler's whole position at the critical moment—both in the fighting zones and on the home front. Just as he is trying frantically to stabilize that Normandy line, and also keep it from being torn away from its right anchor at Caen, where the Allies are attacking again today, so he is straining every nerve to reorganize his civilian war effort in face of the recent revolt organized by the Prussian generals.

One of General Montgomery's senior staff officers yesterday declared that "the next two or three weeks may be the most critical of any time of the war for Germany." That's true not only in the military sense but as regards the crisis within the Reich. Hitler himself acknowledged this in his statement to Nazi party leaders last Friday when he said:

"I am not afraid to wage battle against outside enemies.... But I must have certainty that in the rear there is absolute security, loyal confidence and faithful cooperation."

The Fuehrer is facing the monumental task not only of repairing the shaken morale of his troops but of his people. He must do this at a moment when both his eastern and western fronts are being riddled with holes, and there's no question that the disaffection had deep roots.

The next three weeks may indeed vastly clarify the war picture. We already know Hitler is beaten—and he knows it—but we don't know how long he may be able to hang on. His every move indicates his determination to fight to the last (Continued on page two)

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—American shoppers are breaking their 1943 spending record, which made the 1929 boom year look like peanuts.

Their spending on the kind of things they always bought—food, clothing, repairs for their homes, jewelry—although they can't buy all the things they used to buy.

Figures on retail sales for the first six months of 1944, just completed by the Commerce Department, go much beyond the first six months of 1943.

They indicate what is likely to happen in the last six months of this year.

This story deals only with retail sales to the buying public. That is, sales by food stores, restaurants, department stores, clothing shops, drug stores, places like that.

It doesn't include sales by manufacturers or wholesale business firms to the government.

In the first six months of 1943 retail sales were \$26,774,000,000. In the first six months of 1944 they were \$32,113,000,000, an eight per cent increase. If that rate of increase is maintained the rest of this year, and it probably will be, retail sales for all of 1944 will be somewhere between \$66 and \$68 billion dollars, a new record.

In 1943 for the year, retail sales totaled \$63,818,000,000. In 1929 they

were only \$46,450,000,000.

The big increase has been in non-durable goods: foods, meals in restaurants, clothing, gasoline, drugs, liquor, fuel, ice, cigars, flowers, or you name it.

On non-durable goods, Americans between January 1 and June 30 of 1944, spent \$27,467,000,000. In the same period last year they spent \$25,350,000,000.

On durable goods—jewelry, furniture, building materials, automobiles and auto parts—they spent in the first six months of this year \$4,464,000,000. In the first six months of 1943 they spent \$4,415,000,000.

Furniture was the only line of goods listed by the Commerce Department which showed a decrease this year.

Here are notes on some of the items which showed increased spending:

Food—Undoubtedly there were more sales of finished foods, which would boost the cost. At the same time there probably was wide chiseling on things like meat through upgrading. This means you often paid for better cuts than you received, all of which would raise the total of money spent.

Clothing in apparel stores—Many lines of cheap clothing had disappeared, so shoppers had to pay more.

MAINTAINING A GOOD FRONT
Dr. Samuel Johnson used to tell about his father's workshop which was so nearly in ruins that one could walk in the back door at any time. The front door, however, was always kept securely locked. One would have thought, had he come to the front door and not known the condition of the back, that there was the shop of a wise man who took careful precaution against danger.
Many people are very careful to maintain a good front. If they can do that, they pay little attention to anything else. They may have big and well-furnished offices and no business. They may have plenty of glitter to their personality and no real friendship. They may pretend to be friendly and yet have not an acquaintance who trusts them. They may live in a beautiful house yet have no happiness whatsoever in their lives. They may be noted for their gay and sumptuous parties among those who attend, and be cursed by every merchant in town because they don't pay their debts. They may have diplomas on their walls and not a grain of sense in their heads. They may give lavishly to the church and yet be utterly devoid of genuine faith and good works.
There is much to be said for a good appearance, but there is nothing to be said for a mere front. Wise men look their houses and their workshops, but only the slovenly, the inept, and the foolish give their attention to the front door and neglect the back.

**AMERICA
IN WARTIME**

Washington—If a more or less permanent peace comes out of this war, it isn't improbable that the blueprint will be drawn at historic Dumbarton Oaks.
The conference, which is the first in the series of closed-door conferences to lay the foundation for the international organization which may keep peace in the world for years to come.
Except for the first day or so, when by press and radio, the conference will be introduced to the world at large, and the primary objectives outlined, there probably will be little or no fanfare attending the conferences. This little get-together is just for the purpose of saving a few shafts. They may have to be pulled up and sunk again before even the four great powers agree that the foundation is perfect. They may have to be shifted slightly when the "little nations" come in for their say, as they will be invited to do as soon as the preliminaries are over.
But Dumbarton Oaks will go down in history even if it turns out to be another tragic version of Versailles or articles are drawn there which fail as did President Wilson's "Fourteen Points."

The conference, as of today, will be undersecretary of State Edward R. Stettinius, Sir Alexander Cadogan, permanent undersecretary of the British Foreign Office and close friend of Foreign Minister Sir Anthony Eden; Maxim Litvinov, for the U. S. S. R.; and either H. H. Kung, China's minister of finance, or possibly China's foreign minister himself, Dr. T. V. Soong.
It really doesn't matter too much for figuratively sitting behind the conference will be Secretary of State Cordell Hull; Anthony Eden; Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov; and either Mr. Soong or Chiang Kai-shek himself.
There is no place in the whole of the world where there is fighting for such a session. The conference can carry on their debates on cool, peaceful terraces, or along walks that lead through yews to miniature waterfalls and an old waterwheel. Or they can remain in the quiet, almost deserted rooms of the restored late Georgian mansion.
Dumbarton Oaks was built in 1889 and remains one of the best examples of the 18th Century chateau this country has to offer. Orig-



inally known as the "Acropolis," when it was constructed by William St. Dorsay, first judge of the Orphans' Court, established by Jefferson, it has passed through several ownerships and as many names. Most famous of its tenants was John C. Calhoun, who lived there as secretary of war, vice president and senator from South Carolina.
The estate was called "The Oaks" when Robert Woods Bliss, then ambassador to the Argentine, took it over some years ago and changed the title to Dumbarton Oaks. Harvard University owns the property now and it's something of a retreat for research students. It won't be during the conference, of course. If it turns out as state department officials hope it will, Harvard may find it one of the world's historic shrines.

ditch, if he can get his army and home front to support him. Three weeks may disclose his prospects.
What we can see now—and this should be emphasized—is that the Hitlerian forces are continuing to resist fiercely at many places, despite the precariousness of their position. For that reason it would be criminal to take it for granted that they are about to fold up. The developments of the next three weeks don't depend entirely on whether Hitler can inspire his people to follow him; they depend to great degree on how hard the Allies hit him on the battle field, and that in turn depends on how hard we labor here at home.
There's one development which represents a terrible menace to Hitler, though it isn't getting much publicity, and that's the rapidly increasing activity of the vast underground army of Europe. The Poles are coming into action in a big way, especially in Warsaw where there is open fighting. The French civilians also are striking heavily in many sections.

Serious Shortage Of Farm Workers

By CHESTER WALSH
A serious labor shortage confronted farmers curing tobacco today after tobacco factories had sent out a call for Negro men and women workers to register at the factories today.

Some farmers were without outside help and were fearful that much of the tobacco will be lost in the field. Others were cropping tobacco and tying the leaf with skeleton crews and frantically seeking more workers.

Many of the workers were transient laborers and had only been working in tobacco a short time. Others working at the curing barns were employees of the tobacco fac-

ories and were subject to recall at any time.

Inquiry at the U. S. Employment Service office this morning revealed that the department is not releasing any regular farm workers for other jobs. Releases are only given to those who had been employed on the farms as transient laborers.

Tobacco is rolling into some of the Greenville factories from the Georgia markets and much leaf is expected to begin coming in after tomorrow from border and South Carolina markets, it was stated.

Tobacco has grown rapidly since the heavy rain and much of it is ripening fast and needs to go into the curing barns at once. Farmers are faced with a serious labor problem. County Agent Floyd F. Hendrix, the U. S. Employment Service and other agencies are cooperating to relieve the farm labor shortage.

"For the duration" — and unemployment compensation — to any who declined to return. They were refused referral cards or statements of availability.

3. The WMC and the War Production board warned industries not to hire strikers on penalty of having their war contracts cancelled and their employees released to other industries.

4. National selective service, at the request of Acting Secretary of War Robert F. Patterson, cancelled the occupational deferments of all and ordered their immediate induction.

5. The OPA denied them gasoline, shoe and food rations issued on the basis of essential employment.

6. U. S. Attorney General Biddle ordered an investigation to determine whether any federal law had been violated, and also requested a federal grand jury inquiry opening Wednesday.

During the week 14 persons were hospitalized after racial clashes; war work slumped an estimated 15 per cent; merchants lost \$5,000,000 in business; the strikers lost some \$250,000 in wages; PTO lost \$650,000 in revenue; and 1,500,000 daily PTO riders were forced to walk, hitch-hike, use precious gas, or travel in industry-provided trucks.

Postwar Talks To Be Delayed

Washington, Aug. 7. — (AP) — Acting Secretary of State Stettinius announced today that the post-war security talks have been postponed until August 21 at the request of Russia.

The Anglo-American-Russian phase of the four-power conference was scheduled to begin in Washington August 14, with discussions among the United States, Britain and China to follow upon their conclusion.

Stettinius told his news conference that the Russian government found it needed more time for preparation in Moscow before Soviet representatives start for Washington.

No Inquest To Be Held In Slayings
Elizabethtown, N. C., Aug. 7. — (AP) — Coroner T. Rushon Young said today there would be no inquest into the slaying of four persons near here by Wilbur Rice, 33, who later killed himself.

While his four young children looked on, Rice late Saturday shot and killed his wife, his wife's foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland Cain, a 60-year-old couple, and Evander Edge, a neighbor, the coroner said.

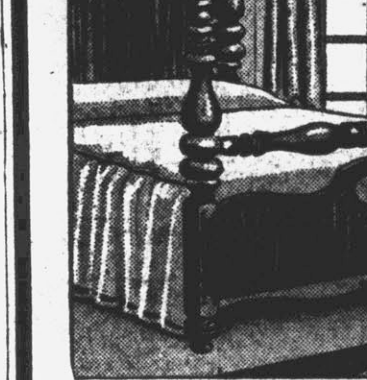

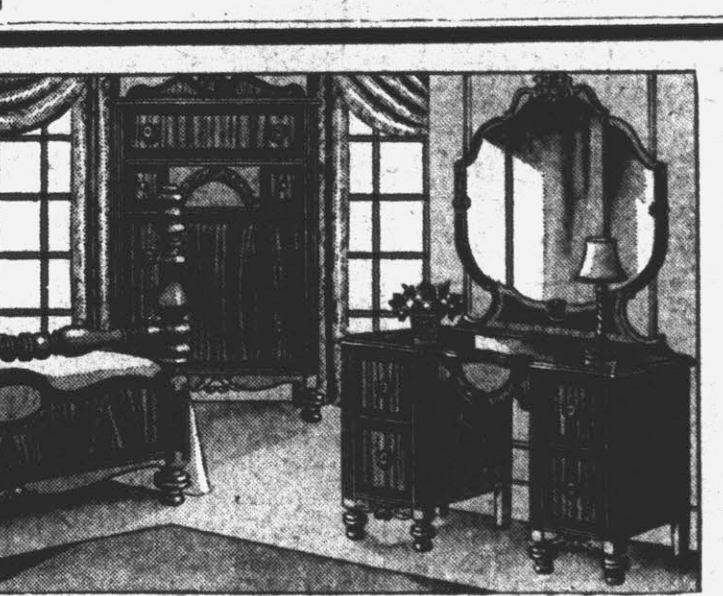
