Reds Tighten Noose Around German Forces In Baltics

Other Units Drive A Deeper Wedge Through Poland Toward German Silesia West Of Vistula River; Germans Reinforcements Fail To Halt Onrushing Soviets

Moscow, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The Red army tightened a noose today around German Baltic forces once estimated at more than 20 divisions between 250,000 and 300,000 men and smashed a deeper wedge through Poland toward German Silesia west of the Vistula.

Three Soviet columns pressed on from the west, south and east for possibly the biggest kill of the summer campaign. Heavily armored enemy units fell back upon the Latvian capital, their offensive thrusts shattered by Gen. Ivan C. Bagramian's right wing.

The Soviet high command announced that enemy forces are being "bled white" and "our troops are stubbornly advancing" against the German reserve divisions thrown into desperate counterattacks in nearly every sector of the front to keep the Russian hordes from German soil. A communique supplemented said all were repulsed.

The communique also announced a six-mile northward thrust on the Vistula bridgehead, a drive that may be pointed at Warsaw from the south and an advance to within 33 miles of Czechoslovakian border.

The Russians said that to support their counterattacks the Germans are hurling "every road-building, airborne and other rear echelon" into battle. It was reported, 16 new German divisions have reached the front in the past three weeks—some from the central German reserves, others from western Poland, Italy, Yugoslavia, Hungary and Norway.

The Russians did not disclose where the German counterattacks have occurred but it could be assumed that at least part were aimed at keeping the Red army from leaping forward a few miles needed.

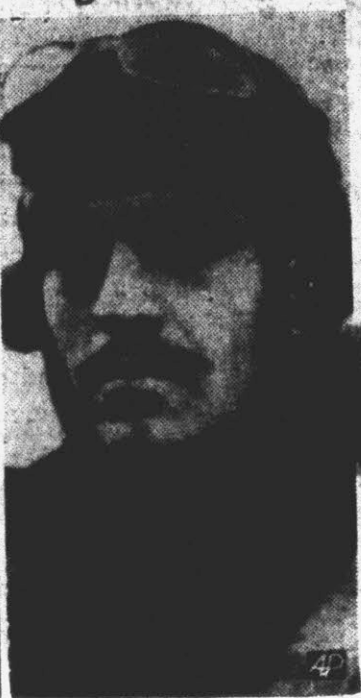
Nineteen New Polio Cases Are Reported

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Nineteen new cases of infantile paralysis were reported today to the State Health Department, bringing the total number of cases in the current polio epidemic to 494 since June 1.

The new cases were confined to the western section of the state where the first cases were reported in early summer.

Additional cases by counties were reported today as follows: Alleghany 3; Buncombe 1; Burke 1; Cabarrus 3; Caldwell 1; Columbus 1; Cumberland 1; Forsyth 3; McDowell 1; Rockingham 1 and Rowan 1.

RETIRED ARMY OFFICER DIES

Colonel James F. Brooke To Be Buried at Arlington

Col. James F. Brooke, 64, died at his home, 1102 Johnson street, at 1:30 o'clock this morning after several months illness. The body will be sent to Washington, D. C., by train. Funeral services will be held in Arlington National cemetery at 11 o'clock Friday morning.

WILL IMPROVE INSTITUTIONS

Governor Announces Plans For State Hospitals

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Governor Bragenton announced today that four immediate additional provisions for the North Carolina hospitals for the insane, designed to improve state institutions up to standards contained in provisions under which the State Hospitals Board of Control was established.

The provisions are:

1. Provision has been made for the employment of full time recreational directors for the hospitals at Raleigh and Morganton.
2. Psychiatric social workers will be employed in the hospitals at Raleigh, Morganton and Goldsboro.
3. Hydrotherapy equipment will be installed and utilized at the state hospital at Raleigh.
4. Provision was made for additional enclosures in the courtyards of the institutions, in order to give the patients further benefits of outdoor exercise, fresh air and sunshine.

Gov. Bragenton said that the provisions were made in line with a program designed "to get away from custodial care and begin remedial work with the insane."

Appropriations for the program will be taken from the contingency and emergency fund on the recommendation of N. E. Edgerton of the State Hospitals Board of Control and Robert G. Dreyton, assistant director of the budget.

A psychiatric social worker already has been employed at the Raleigh institution, the governor said. In connection with this phase of the work Acting Director George H. Lawrence of the University of North Carolina states that a program of clinical training has been worked out between the university and the state hospitals, offering university students accredited psychiatric training. Under this plan, the university will be the only accredited school south of Washington giving credit in this phase of work he said. Each of the institutions (Continued on Page Five)

Drastic Ruling On Tires Made Today

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—All outstanding ration certificates for tires 8.25 and larger, dated July 15 or earlier, have been cancelled and must be returned by August 10. Theodore S. Johnson, district director of the Office of Price Administration, said today.

OPA must turn in their replacement portion of the certificates, whether or not tires have been delivered, to the district OPA office in Raleigh. Individuals who still hold such certificates must turn them in to the local War Price and Rationing board where issued.

OPA's drastic action in cancelling all such certificates was made necessary by the present critical shortage of larger size truck and bus tires, Johnson said. Smaller size tires were not affected by the action. Nor were certificates for the large-size tires issued on and after July 16.

Truck and bus operators whose certificates were invalidated by the action may apply anew at the local board. A large number were affected, OPA said, because tire dealers have, for several months, been unable to secure enough tires to supply purchasers holding approved certificates. Hence, certificates in circulation accumulated until they far exceed the entire quota of the large-size tires for August.

Any person is eligible for a certificate provided he has no other means of cooking, whether or not the stove is to be used in what is considered "essential" living or working space.

OPA also announced that conversion burners for ranges used in cooking may be obtained by dealers, distributors and manufacturers certificate-free on and after August 5, 1944. Consumers, however, continue to need ration certificates. Control at the consumer level is still necessary as a means of conserving kerosene, which is in acute short supply.

American Occupation Of Guam Near Completion

Extermination Of Last-Ditch Defenders Herded In 15-Square-Mile Area Now Under Way

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Japan's hour glass was running out on Guam today.

Extermination of the last Nipponese was under way in the northeast corner of that U. S. outpost where a garrison of little more than 200 marines was overwhelmed in December, 1941, by 7,600 Japanese who told the survivors "the Americans never would return." The counted enemy dead already exceeds 10,000. American warships, planes, marines and soldiers herded a last-ditch group of defenders into a 15-square-mile area of the 235-square-mile island. Then they drove a center wedge within a mile of the northeast coast, seeking to split up the doomed Japanese and speed their destruction.

While this clincher blow was falling on the eastern approach to the Philippines, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today at his southwest Pacific headquarters the sapping of Japan's air strength at Halmahera on the southern approach. He said Liberators, circling bad weather, wiped out 13 parked planes and damaged many others in a 48-ton bombing raid.

French Patriots Hinder Movement German Forces

Irun, Spain, Aug. 9.—(AP)—German attempts to evacuate men and equipment from positions in southwestern France outflanked by Allied troops farther north are being seriously disrupted by French patriots sabotaging communication lines and spreading panic among the Nazi staff in that area, border reports said today.

As the German army of occupation moved northward the Maquis were reported narrowing its way of escape and grimly awaiting the time when those Nazis left behind are too weak to survive the challenge of the Frenchmen of the mountains. The Maquis were declared to be forcing the Germans to destroy much of the material they hoped to rescue from southern France.

The few Germans still remaining along the French border were comparatively calm. They apparently feel that if the worst comes they can cross into Spain and surrender their arms. It was among the German units further to the north that the dread of the Maquis was said to be growing.

U. S. HEAVIES HIT STUTTGART

Other Forces Smash Targets In France And Balkans

London, Aug. 9.—(AP)—More than 150 American planes attacked the Stuttgart area of southwest Germany and Nazi oil and aircraft facilities in Hungary in coordinated blows today from the west and south.

Yugoslav rail yards at Brod were bombed.

An invasion of 1,000 heavy bombers and fighters flew through clouds three miles thick in attacking the war plants of Stuttgart, the "Detroit of Germany." They flew from England.

Up to 500 Flying Fortresses and Liberators from Italy struck in Hungary. The Almas Puzito oil refinery on the Danube 30 miles west of Budapest was left in flames. Other targets were a Messerschmitt assembly plant at Gyor, and airbases at Veches and Tokol.

Stuttgart, a city of 400,000, and the capital of Wurttemberg, is in southwest Germany 110 miles from the French frontier. It is on rail and highway routes to Paris and Munich and is the site of a ball-bearing factory, a magneto works, and airplane engines and assembly plants.

British medium bombers in the early afternoon exploded an ammunition dump in the Lyons forest, 10 miles east of Roen. A forest fire was kindled by the explosion and "this was followed by a gigantic upheaval of the earth which sent a wave over a radius of five miles."

"You could see the whole countryside quivering and trees were bent over by the blast," he said. "Flames (Continued on page four)"

Blames Walkout On Conspiracy

Philadelphia, Aug. 9.—(AP)—U. S. District Judge George A. Welsh today said that Philadelphia's six-day transit strike may have been called "to have some effect on the impending national election."

The jurist, in a 40-minute charge, said he did not believe the upgrading of eight negro transit employees to operating jobs was the real cause of the unauthorized walkout. Strike spokesmen had said it was.

"I don't want to bring politics into this investigation," Judge Welsh said, "but you may find that what was in the hearts and minds of the men who called this strike was intended to have some effect on the impending national election."

Attorney General Biddle, who ordered the grand jury probe, said at hearings Monday night, as he traveled west, that he believed there was a "conspiracy" behind the walkout. He did not elaborate.

ALLIES GAIN ON ITALIAN FRONT

British And Indian Forces Recapture Monte Grillo

Rome, Aug. 9.—(AP)—British and Indian forces have recaptured blood-soaked Monte Grillo and have beaten off five enemy counterattacks on its slopes in furious fighting north and northwest of Aezzo. Allied headquarters announced today as a lull prevailed over most of the Italian front.

A communique described the situation in and around Florence as virtually unchanged, with only patrol activity in the immediate vicinity of the great art center.

There were no further reports of the Germans shelling the southern part of the city. Associated Press War Correspondent Lynn Henzler, who has been with the Eighth army inside the city in recent days said the German batteries had been directing their fire at targets outside the southern limits and there was nothing to indicate damage to the city itself.

There were conflicting reports however, on conditions within the heart of Florence on the north bank of the Arno.

The British troop paper "Union Jack" said that life was going on normally, but that the water supply was short and black marketeers were selling water at 20 lire per bottle. (The lire had a pre-war value of about 5 cents.)

On the other hand the Canadian troopsheet, "Maple Leaf," said an Italian who had fled the Arno had reached the Allied lines declared that "central Florence is being systematically looted by the (Continued on page four)"

Poles Unalbe To Reach Agreement

Moscow, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Rival Polish regimes failed to agree today on a plan of fusion and leaders are returning to their respective headquarters in London and Lublin with renewal of negotiations delayed at least until after the Russians capture Warsaw.

Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk consulted the U. S. and British ambassadors late today after Soviet-sponsored Polish Committee of National Liberation said his exiled government in London was clinging to the "dictatorial" constitution of 1935, blocking formation of a "democratic provisional government." He probably will leave for London tomorrow.

President Morawski of the committee departed for Lublin.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Millions of additional workers have built up during these war years credits toward old age and survivors insurance benefits. But what happens to them when the war ends?

These are the workers that have come out of the so-called uncovered jobs—that is, jobs not covered by those benefits under federal law—like farm and domestic workers.

Also included in the group are the self-employed, the employees of non-profit religious, educational and humane organizations, and the employees of federal, state, county and local government.

Paul V. McNutt, social security administrator, says there are 20 million such persons, that 12 million of them are farm workers.

After the war many thousands of these uncovered workers who have been in "covered" jobs during the war will drift back to the "uncovered occupations" or into retirement.

But, when they do, the old age and survivors insurance protection which they built up during the war years will decrease while they work in non-covered jobs. And they may lose it.

The old age and survivors insurance protection is operated by the federal government through the Social Security board.

That insurance became law in 1936 and has been in effect since January 1, 1937.

Yanks Sweep On Through Important Communications Center Of Le Mans and Storm Unchecked Toward Paris; German General Among Captives At Brest

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 9.—(AP)—American troops today captured Le Mans, southwestern gateway to Paris barely 110 miles beyond, and Canadians smashed through the Germans' second defense line to a point 16 miles below Caen.

(Berlin broadcasts said motorized U. S. forces had raced on through Le Mans to within 87 miles of Paris.)

The Canadian plunge carried within four miles of Falaise, itself only 65 miles above Le Mans. The Allied wings were curling around the bulk of the German army, threatening to pocket it.

Other U. S. troops battering southward near the outer defenses of the Loire river, 50 miles inland from the river port of Nantes and 50 southwest of Le Mans.

This broadened the U. S. front in France to some 80 miles. Enemy resistance in the Loire push was reported light.

On the Breton peninsula, doughboys charged into the outer defenses of the great port of Brest after the German garrison refused a surrender ultimatum. Lt. Gen. Karl Spang, commander of the German 26th infantry was captured near Brest.

Both the Americans and Canadians were within little more than 100 miles—and perhaps closer—to Paris in a great pincers drive on the French capital.

The Allies apparently had split German armored forces—heretofore so carefully husbanded—into three great blobs. The enemy threw tanks into vain attempts to halt (Continued on page four)"

Japs Oblonged. Southeast Asia Command Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Dislodged from positions 50 miles south of Imphal, Japanese rearguard covering the retreat of the main body of enemy troops still inside India were overtaken again last night by Allied troops four miles farther south of the Tiddim road, an Allied communique announced today.

Chinese Clearing Burma Road. Chungking, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Chinese troops in western Yunnan province have driven the Japanese from 311 and three positions on Sungshan mountain, whose fall would clear the Burma road from the nearby Salween river to Luning, 25 miles to the southwest, a Chinese communique said today.

Seventeen Die In Plane Crash

Havana, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Seventeen passengers are dead or missing as the result of the crash of a Pan American flying boat, which broke into and sank yesterday in an attempted takeoff from the rough waters of Nipe bay, in northeastern Cuba.

Nine passengers and the crew of five are safe.

Survivors who were flown this morning from Antilla, scene of the accident, to Miami said they felt certain that all of those who are missing were trapped in the clipper and were drowned. Six bodies had been recovered at the time.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Whether there's truth in the report that Nazi Gestapo Chief Himmler—the Hangman—has been assassinated and Reichsmarshal Goering wounded, the fact remains that all the leaders of the Hitler regime are increasingly in danger of violent death.

The dictator has put the already war-weary and gloomy German people under a terrific strain of regimentation in his program for total war. He has chained them to their galley seats and is using the lash to make them pull their oars. His armies are under the even greater stress of continual defeats and retreats.

Thus Hitler may be able to keep the lid on for a time by terrorism and force, morale inevitably will deteriorate to the point where more and more individuals will seek the lives of the leaders responsible for Germany's catastrophe. The gallows which yesterday claimed eight more army officers has only begun its grim work. No wonder the Fuehrer's spirits are so low that he's said to be taking a rest cure in his Alps retreat at Berchtesgaden.

The greatest test of Hitler's ability to hold his people in line is still to be made. He's about to undergo a trial by fire in the great retreats which the German armies must achieve in the western and eastern theaters to reach the inner defenses of the Reich for their last stand.

The next few weeks are going to be among the most crucial of the war. They will tell us whether the out-matched Nazi soldiers can endure the bloody grind of firing and retreating—firing and retreating. They will tell us whether the German home front can stand the frightful casualty lists and growing defeat, in addition to the serfdom Hitler has imposed.

The greatest single menace hanging over Hitler as he tries to extricate his armies probably is the mighty Allied air-force which these days rains the skies with little challenge. When the Germans stand and fight, great fleets of American and British flying-artillery deluge them with death—even the heavy bombers, so huge they look like winged battleships, unleashing their monster explosives in enemy ranks. When the Hitlerites retreat, they're pursued and decimated by warplanes.

The fine and going Canadian offensive in the Caen sector provides an excellent illustration of the use of air power in battle. This vastly important and difficult attack was preceded by an unprecedented bombardment by some 1,600 planes, after which the hard-hitting Canadians (grand troops, those chaps), slammed into the powerful German defenses and hurled the enemy back several miles.

That battle, by the way, is worth watching. The Caen sector is the hinge on which the Hitlerites are (Continued on Page Five)

The levy of taxes was as follows:
For maintenance of graded schools, 40 cents on each \$100 valuation and \$1.20 on each poll.

For interest on graded school bonds, 4 cents on each \$100 valuation and 12 cents on each poll.

For interest on improvement bonds, 24 cents on each \$100 valuation, 72 cents on each poll.

For general purposes, 57 cents on each \$100 valuation and \$1.71 on each poll. Of this levy 25 cents on each \$100 valuation and 75 cents on each poll is for the purpose of building a system of sewerage in connection with the waterworks being put in by the board of internal improvements.

This makes the total tax levy of the town for all purposes \$1.25 on each \$100 valuation and \$3.75 on each poll.

Hold Clinic In Bethel Friday

Some weeks ago, the Pitt County Health Department announced the

schedule of the Early Diagnosis Tuberculosis clinics to be held in the county during the coming months. The next clinic will be held in Dr. C. G. Garrenton's office, Bethel, on Friday, August 18, 2 to 4 p. m., conducted by Dr. Garrenton.

Patients, both white and colored, from any part of the county are eligible to attend these clinics. Wherever practical, patients should make an appointment through the Pitt County Health Department and bring a note to the clinic from his physician. In the case of children, an appointment is not necessary.

In speaking of tuberculosis symptoms, Dr. McCam, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospitals, has this to say: "Any of the following symptoms should make a person suspicious of having tuberculosis: Loss of weight, loss of strength, loss of energy or endurance. Feeling tired or 'run-down,' especially in the afternoon or evening. Poor appetite, indigestion or dyspepsia.

A temperature normal or below normal in the morning and 99 or above in the afternoon or evening. A persistent cough. Cough is frequently, but not always, present in tuberculosis. Every cough lasting

three weeks or longer is suspicious. A hemorrhage from the lungs, as much as a teaspoonful of pure blood. Blood-streaked sputum is also suspicious. Pleurisy—a sharp pain in the chest, made worse by deep breathing and lasting an hour or more. The clinic is being held under the auspices of the Pitt County Health Department and Pitt County Tuberculosis Association.

All services are free except X-ray and this is free to those who deserve it. These clinics with the free X-ray are made possible through the Pitt County Tuberculosis Seal Safe Fund.

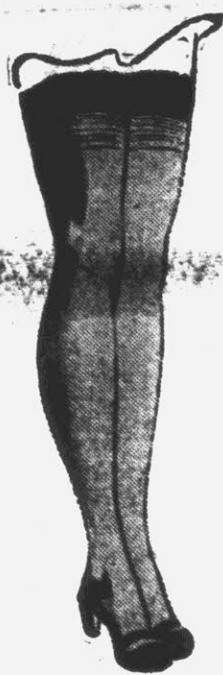

TOLERANCE VERSUS INDIFFERENCE

We are sometimes prone to con-
gratulate ourselves on our tol-
erance of other faiths when in real-
ity we are merely indifferent to
them—and probably to our own.

It is not hard, for instance, for a
man who is neither a Christian nor
a Buddhist and unaffected by ei-
ther religion to be tolerant toward
both. But it is entirely a different
thing for a man who believes that
salvation can be gained only
through Christ to tolerate a reli-
gion which is directing millions of
people away from the truth.

For such a man, conviction plays
a great role in his life. He is so sure
of certain things that he views with
considerable hostility anyone who
would brush these convictions aside
as being of little or no value.
Tolerance is easy for the unbel-
ieving. But the believing man needs
great strength of character to be
tolerant. For his hate of the erro-
neous religion must be exceeded by
his love for its communicants. His
goal to stamp out the evil must be
tempered by his desire to conserve
the human rights of those who have
been led astray by it.

The truly tolerant man is not si-
lent when confronted by what he
considers the erroneous beliefs of
others. But he will strike at such
beliefs only by moral suasion, never
by force. His attitude will be
that of Voltaire, who said in an
argument with a friend, "I dis-
agree with what you say, but I will
die for your right to say it."

Dr. Ennett Gives Advice On Polio

Dr. N. Thomas Ennett, Pitt
county health officer, at a meeting
of the Bethel Rotary club last night,
made an interesting talk on infantile
paralysis and gave some timely
advice about preventing spread of
the dreaded disease.

The health officer pointed out
that the disease is a relatively late
discovery as far as contagious dis-
eases go. The cause had been delib-
erately found to be a *poliovirus*—
which can be found in the nose
and throats of some of the victims,
but is almost invariably found in
the stools; hence, although it is
possible for it to be spread by nose
and throat discharges, it is more
often spread by way of the feces
with the common housefly being the
carrier. This means that our great-
est efforts should be directed to-
ward the elimination of this pest.

Dr. Ennett suggested better
screening, use of insecticides, the
fly swatter, elimination of fly
breeding places, such as manure
piles and any stables within city
limits. He believes that the reason
the disease is not so common among
small babies as it formerly was is
that babies as a whole are given
more hygienic treatment than in
former days. In fact he feels that
eventually the name will be changed
from infantile paralysis to juve-
nile paralysis.

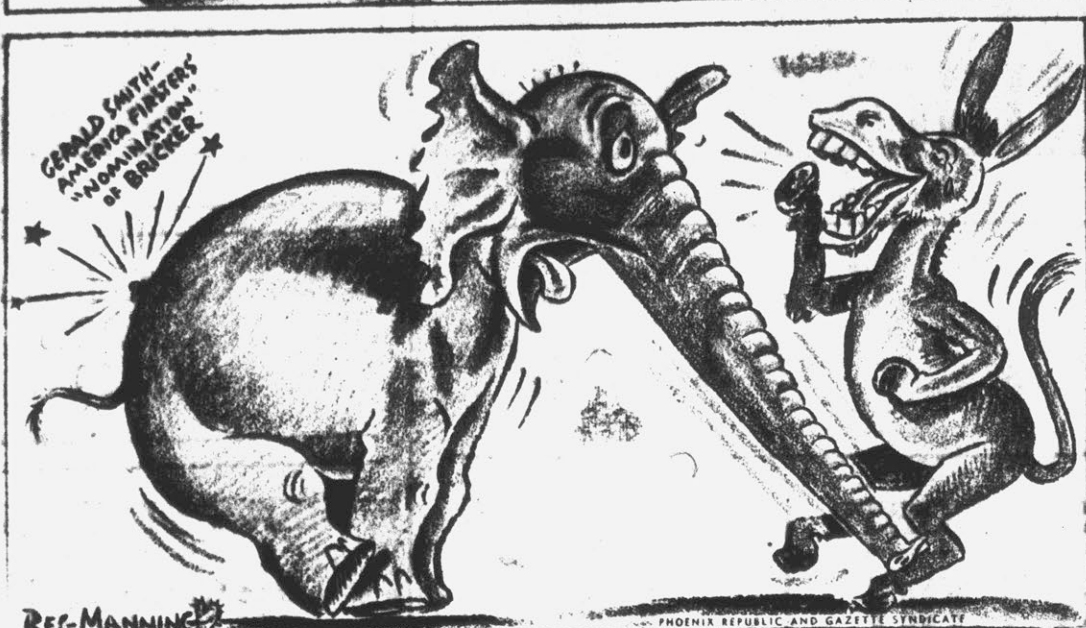
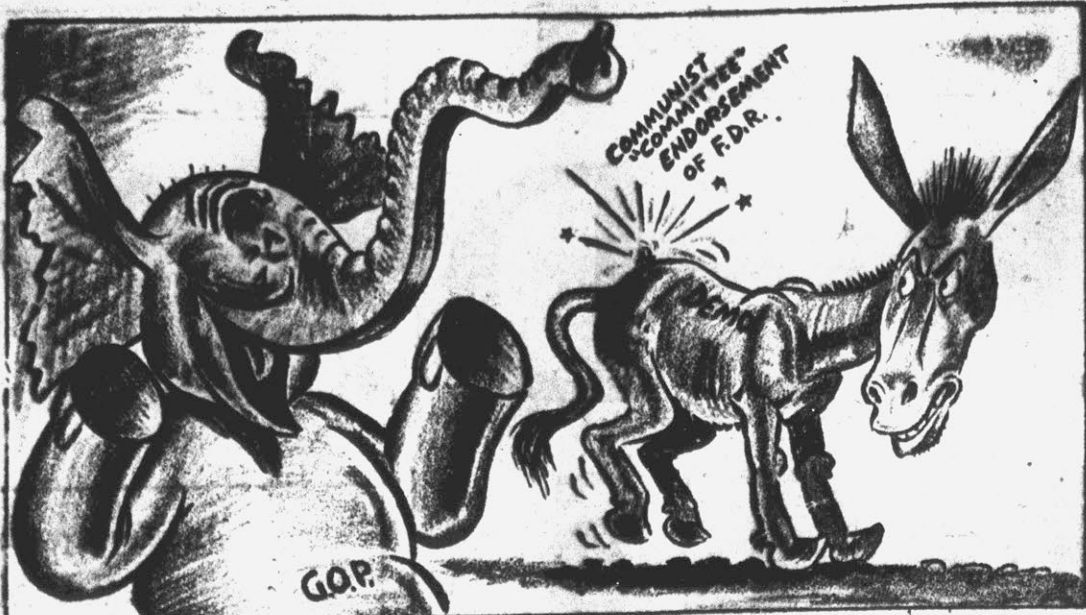
He told the Bethel Rotarians
that most probably the reason that
older people are immune to the
disease is that they have already
had the disease in a mild form
which was unrecognized. This can
also account for the fact that usu-
ally there is only one case in a
family. He felt that one of the
next most important things to do to
prevent the spread of the disease
was to keep all children in their
yards, not allowing them to go to
the picture show or to Sunday
school; however, he does not think
it essential to restrict the activities
of grown-ups at all, except in the
case of school teachers and food
handlers.

He said that one of the most use-
ful measures to use after the dis-
ease has struck is whole blood from
a person who has recovered from
the disease. This must be given in
the early stages before the paral-
ysis sets in to be effective.

Rise in Price of Potatoes

for five pounds, instead of 29 cents,
an increase of nearly a cent a
pound.

and smoke rose to a great height."
Three of these bombers were lost
to intense ground fire.

The first flares returning from
Stuttgart reported only moderate
flack and no enemy fighters, in con-
trast to German assertions. Weather
was foul, some crews running
into three-mile thick cloud banks
which made flying hazardous.

The reported thrust into the Reich
was the first since Sunday for British
based heavy bombers, which had
devoted all their efforts to support
of Allied armies in France.

Planes filled the channel skies
throughout the morning. One bomber
fleet took more than an hour to
cross the coast.

Twice within three hours last
night RAF Lancasters and Hal-
faxes attacked three fuel dumps in
northern France—all considerable
distances from the battle front and
each containing hundreds of tons
of oil.

All three dumps—at Aire-sur-la-
Lys, in the Pas-de-Calais area, in
the Forêt de Luchaux to the south
and in the Forêt de Chantilly just
north of Paris—were left in flames.
More than 3,200 sorties were flown
yesterday against German positions
in support of ground troops driving
towards Paris, but Allied appraisal

of the results was marred again by
a report that some explosives fell
short, bombing Canadian positions.

to reach the soil of East Prussia.
The Germans announced that
many new officers "have taken over
on the eastern front at this critical
juncture."

A German southward thrust aimed
at breaking out of the Estonian
encirclement was broken up by
Soviet forces several days ago in the
Bilzai area in northern Lithuania
near the Latvian border, the
daily Russian communique said.

Since then the rolling Russian
legions in that sector have captured
more than 80 communities, includ-
ing Radviliskis, on the border 43
miles from Riga.

Along with the Bilzai offensive,
the Soviet forces shot two other
spearheads into Latvia along the
Daugava river toward Riga, sweep-
ing through a total of 120 places,
including Krustpils.

Front advances said there was rea-
son to believe one of the biggest com-
paigns was gaining new momentum.
Thousands of German soldiers
strung out in the vast spaces from
the Gulf of Riga to the southern
shores of Lake Peipus were reported
being driven back to the Baltic in
a battle of extermination.

The Russian advance on the Vis-
tula bridgehead in Poland likewise
threatened new German disasters.

The six-mile northward gain
freed 50 towns and villages west and
northwest of Sandomierz.
Once again the Russian com-
munique made no mention of the
situation before Warsaw, where So-

viet troops last were reported bat-
tling the eastern suburbs while
the Polish underground fought the
Germans inside the capital itself.

the surge into Lemans, four ar-
mored divisions had been commit-
ted to a futile counterattack at the
Allied center near Mortain. The
enemy was throwing other steel
machines against the Canadian ar-
my tide advancing below Caen.

A front dispatch said Americans
had sealed off the German penetra-
tion near Mortain, aimed at split-
ting the Allied corridor, and had
knocked the enemy from Cherence
Roussel in that area and captured
three more towns. Fighting contin-
ued, however, near Juvigny, north-
west of Mortain.

U. S. forces were closing also on
the ports of St. Malo, and on the
north Breton coast, St. Nazaire and
Nantes. Reconnaissance patrols were
reported at the Loire's mouth.

The Berlin radio said German
troops at St. Malo had pulled back
within the inner ring of the city's
defenses.

The Canadian drive, ripping
through a great German anti-tank
wall, had cut more than 10 miles
forward, carrying 16 of the 20 miles
from Caen to the road hub of Fal-
aise. From 300 to 1,000 Germans
were captured. The key town of

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Brétville-sur-Loire, nine miles be-
low Caen, was seized.

On the Canadian left, the Ger-
mans counterattacked today against
the British bridgehead across the
Orne river, but it was repelled with
slight loss of ground, and the
bridgehead was termed secure. This
British wedge threatens to trap
Germans between the Orne and
Loire rivers by joining with the
Canadian push below Caen.

Supreme headquarters said that
the bulk of approximately 100 sub-
marines which the Nazis were re-
ported to have in Brittany were be-
lieved to have escaped.

U. S. Gen. Omar N. Bradley's col-
umns fought in the outskirts of St.
Nizier on the north coast. The siege
was into its fourth day. Headquar-
ters reported the Americans four
miles from Brest and five from Lo-
rient.

The British Second army punched
into central German defenses be-
tween Vire and Thury-Harcourt
capturing Le Plessis-Grimoult, 19
miles southwest of Caen.

Just north of Thury-Harcourt,
tank-supported British infantry
beat off strong German counterat-
tacks seeking to wipe out the Grim-
boso bridgehead. With reinforce-
ments, the tommyes strengthened
their hold along the east bank of
the Orne river and the fringes of
the Grimboso forest, in the sector
13 miles southwest of Caen.

The forward line of the Canadian
First army still was rolling toward
Falaise, birthplace of William the
Conqueror, and the level land lead-
ing toward Paris.

Hundreds of German prisoners
were captured but the Canadians
had no time to count them.

The British radio said that the
Canadian drive had reached the
high ground near the village of Po-
tigny, a little more than five miles
from Falaise, a communications
center.

Supreme headquarters gave no
new information on the drives for
St. Nazaire and Nantes. U. S. units
are known to be within 12 miles of
each.

The German radio reported a
fierce battle for Lorient and said

the Germans have "withdrawn close-
er to the fortress itself."

Further indications were that the
Germans virtually were abandon-
ing southern France to scrape to the
other shore for defense of the
Loire river line. From Spain came
word that a second trainload of
warps and other equipment en route
north from the Bayonne defenses
275 miles south of the Loire, had
been wrecked by French Marquis.

Prime Minister Churchill visited
the Normandy battle front again
yesterday and talked to Gen. Sir
Bernard L. Montgomery and Gen.
Bradley.

But to return to the air. Allied planes are roving the whole continent at will, destroying war industries and supplies and vital communications until Lt. Gen. Lewis H. Brereton, commander of the U. S. Ninth Air Force in France, was able to declare yesterday that the German army in Normandy is in critical state. He said it "is slowly strangling for want of supplies."

So the retreat of the German armies will be one of the most hazardous of history.

Suppose the war ends the 30th of this month and he quits his war job to go back to farming. Then he will have worked 2 years, 7 months and 30 days in a covered job.

But—on August 30 Jones would have been 65 years old. Could he get old age insurance? No.

Since the old age insurance program went into effect January 1, 1937, that means it has been operating 7 years, 7 months and 30 days. Therefore Jones' service in "covered" employment is less than half of the time since old age insurance has been in operation. So, he is not entitled to old age insurance.

This is an extreme example, but there are many others. Younger people—such as farm workers—who moved into covered employment during the war and then went back to the farm may lose the credits they built up.

McNutt plumps for a social security program that will take in all classes of workers and broaden benefits even to include disability insurance. This problem will probably cause a titanic fight in Congress in the year ahead.

Of course, the workers would have to share a greater share of the expense. Now he only pays 1 per cent of his salary for old age insurance. The boss pays another 1 per cent. In addition, the boss pays 3 per cent of his payroll for unemployment insurance.

Under the set-up McNutt is talking about, employers and employees each would pay 5 per cent of payroll and wages, making a total of 10 per cent, which would cover unemployment and old age benefits.

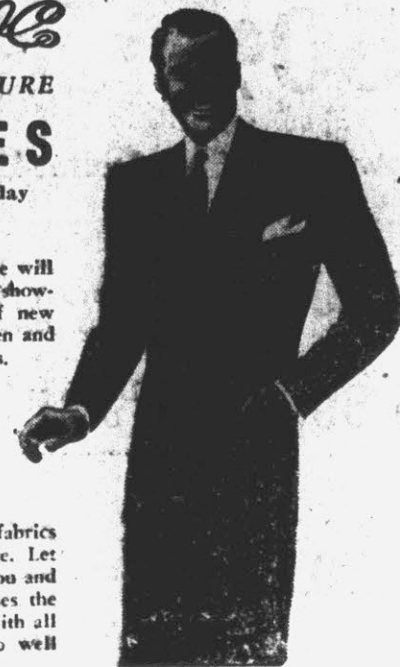
