Over Half Nazi Forces In South France Eliminated

More Than 50,000 Reported Killed, Wounded Or Captured In Less Than Two Weeks; Tattered Remnants Fighting Frantically To Escape To German Border.

Rome, Aug. 28.—(AP)—More than half of all German soldiers garrisoning southern France prior to the Allied landings are believed to have been killed, wounded or captured in less than two weeks, and today the tattered remnants were fighting a frantic battle in the Rhone valley to escape to German border.

American troops have reached the Rhone valley north of Montelimar, 100 airline miles north of Marseille, after a march of 20 miles in two days, and have cut off the line of retreat of the German 11th armored division and other troops to the south, field dispatches announced today.

At least 50,000 enemy front line troops were estimated to have been blocked out of the war in the invasion of southern France to date.

The German 11th division was being pressed from the south by other American units, dispatches said, and was being harassed by Maquis in the hills to the west and cut up by Allied artillery fire from the east.

The Germans were making a fierce effort to cut a way through to Valence, 28 miles north of Montelimar. It was said, but the Americans were confident of their ability to crush the breakout attempts. The Germans were confronted by the additional menace of "Butler's tank force"—the mobile column commanded by Brig. Gen. Frederick Butler, which several days ago reached Grenoble, 70 miles north-east of Montelimar, and whose activities have not been reported since.

The Germans were attempting to withdraw northward through the Rhone valley along the river's east bank when a column from Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's advancing army fell upon them and in a series of rough encounters killed untold hundreds, a headquarters announcement said, Montelimar about 100 miles north of Marseille.

It was estimated 15,000 of the tattered German 19th army have been eliminated. This defeated German force included elements of the German 11th panzer and 18th infantry divisions, which had been reinforced by scattered elements of three other enemy infantry divisions.

Twenty-Six Killed By Transport Crash

London, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Twenty-six persons were killed early today when an incoming air transport crashed into a house near the trans-Atlantic military air base at Prestwick, Scotland.

The dead included seven of the plane crew, 14 passengers and five occupants of the house, which was demolished.

American soldiers and civil defense workers labored through the darkness to recover bodies from the wreckage and still were searching this morning for any additional victims.

Two nearby houses were badly damaged and the roof of a fourth was torn off.

BULGARS SEEK PEACE TERMS

Allied Answer To Be Ready Within Next Few Days.

London, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Surrender terms for Bulgaria probably will be handed to an envoy of that Nazi satellite in Cairo within a few days and armistice terms for Romania are expected to be signed shortly in Moscow, it was learned today.

Greek and Yugoslav interests are understood to have full protection in the terms to the Bulgars, despite that Balkan kingdom's strange plea to be allowed to retain parts of those Allied nations which Bulgaria grabbed with German approval. The peace terms were prepared by the European advisory commission and submitted to Washington and Moscow for approval. Steps were taken to obtain Greek and Yugoslav consent.

LIGHT SALES MARK OPENING LEAF MARKET

Less Than Half Million Pounds Offered Here; Estimated average Price Between 42 and 43 Cents.

The 1944 auction tobacco season got under way here today with one of the smallest opening banks in 20 years, but with prices that came up to expectations. The price range was from 15 to 40 cents a pound with indications that the day's average price would probably be between 42 and 43 cents. The government weighted ceiling for the season is \$43.50 per hundred pounds.

With offerings composed mostly of first primings with quality not up to last year's opening sales, prices were up to expectations. The lower grades sold exceedingly well with best grades reaching as high as 48 cents. The small scattering of good tobacco was much in demand. The bulk of today's offerings sold between 37 and 47 cents a pound.

The light sales were due to the lateness of the crop with many growers still harvesting. Those who have finished getting their tobacco into the barns have not had time to grade and prepare any of it for market.

All sales were completed before the noon hour.

Very light opening sales were reported today on the Eastern North Carolina new bright tobacco belt (Type 12) with the unofficial average fluctuating a little under the weighted average ceiling of 43-1/2 cents a pound.

Wilson, the largest bright leaf market in the world, had only 275,000 pounds on its floor, its highest opening in 25 years. The average on first sales was 41.32 cents a pound, with quality better than average. Wilson usually opens with two to three million pounds ready for sale.

Light offerings throughout the belt were attributed to the late crop and to a general shortage of stock. Farmers have not completed their curings and some labor is being diverted to cotton picking. Goldboro, with an opening average right on the ceiling, had offerings of good quality totaling 150,000 pounds, about half of normal. Farm- (Continued on page four)

Chevalier's wife, a blonde, straw hat and Parisian smile, was familiar to American film audiences. He had made appearances many times in German-occupied Paris, according to reports relayed from France after its capitulation.

Compromise Sought In World Security Plan

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Soviet, American and British delegates to the Dumbarton Oaks security conference worked today toward agreement—possibly a three-way compromise—on the most effective way to organize force for suppressing future aggressor nations.

As the historic preliminary talks went into their second week, it was learned that two principal ideas have been developed thus far. One is a Russian proposal for an international air corps. The Russian delegation is understood not to be irrevocably committed to creation of such a corps but is backing it strongly with the argument that it would provide a ready means of striking in any part of the world where trouble threatened.

The American delegation has suggested a plan by which each nation would commit at least a part of its national forces, including air and naval, to be used in accordance with the orders of the international security organization but at the discretion of the national governments. It is American plan is understood to be tied in with a general principle

Russian Forces Reported To Have Smashed Into Hungary

NEW BLOWS ON NAZI TARGETS

German Transport Facilities And Industries Blasted.

London, Aug. 28.—(AP)—American fighters and fighter bombers flew thousands of sorties from the west today beating up fleeing German troops; their airports and transport facilities all through northern France, the Low countries and as far into Germany as Frankfurt.

Striking up from Italy, strong forces of heavy U. S. bombers blasted the Moosierbaum oil refinery in Hungary on the Danube 50 miles northwest of Budapest; the Mis-kolc rail yards 100 miles northeast of Budapest; the Aviso viaduct and the Orv bridge on the Brenner Pass rail line in northern Italy. The Hungarian rail targets were at the junction of lines into surrendered Romania and threatened Czechoslovakia and were in tactical support of the swiftly advancing Russian armies.

Preliminary reports from British and French bases showed that about 500 American fighters alone had shot up 11 troop trains, more than 200 locomotives, oil tanks, barges, radio, tank emplacements, radio towers and power stations. This cavalry of the sky destroyed 500 freight cars and damaged 1,000 more.

They exploded an ammunition train carrying many tons of explosives near Budvenice with a blast started by a machinegun bullet which jerryed the countryside for miles around.

Other Units Have Advanced To Within Less Than 50 Miles Of Bucharest

Moscow, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Two great Russian army groups, paced by colorful Cossacks advanced within less than 50 miles of Bucharest today in a drive swiftly overrunning the wealthy Ploesti oil region.

An unconfirmed report said some columns had plunged also 50 miles into Transylvania.

The 16,642 square mile northern section of Transylvania was cut away from Romania and awarded to Hungary by Hitler in the 1940 Vienna dictate. Yet there were no reports of Hungarians fighting alongside the Germans in that area.

The German communiqué said "counterattacks" by Hungarian and German troops to prevent the enemy from entering Hungary through the eastern Carpathians are making good headway. Russian attacks at Piatra-Neamt at the edge of Transylvania were reported foiled. The Germans said the Russians "continued their big attack" between Warsaw and East Prussia in the region between the Vistula and the new rivers and "reached the Bobr area."

The main Russian direction in Romania was toward Bucharest, but numerous columns moved off the Russian right flank into the Carpathians. It was one of these which was reported deep in Transylvania (which capitulated to Romania has sworn to retake from Hungary).

Strong air forces were bombing and strafing the disorganized German day and night.

Capture Meaux, Beyond Marne, 23 Mi. East Of Paris; Germans Yielding Territory Without Fight; New Crossings Of Seine Closing Trap On Nazis.

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 28.—(AP)—American troops, sweeping in a wide arc, threatening German lines of retreat into the Reich, have crossed the Marne and captured Meaux in the loop of the historic river 23 miles east of Paris.

The Germans were yielding the battleground of the first World War without a fight as the Americans swept on through Meaux unchecked. Sedan, a famous battlefield in 1870 and 1940, was 105 miles to the northeast.

Toward the sea the British established a fifth bridgehead across the Seine, swinging their forces across the river near Louviers, between Vernon and Point-de-l'Arche where the Canadians have crossed.

For the first time in this war American troops were fighting on a battlefield of the first World War. The quiet town of Meaux marked the high tide of the German attempt to take Paris in September, 1914—an attempt which ended with the Allied victory of the first battle of the Marne when the Paris taxi-cab army stemmed the German tide.

The town is 24 miles southwest of Chateau-Thierry where American troops in the second battle of the Marne held the Germans during the fateful days of June and July, 1918 and took part in the counter-offensive launched on July 18.

The whole Allied attack today was swinging north on or across the Seine river along almost the whole 200 miles from its source to the sea. Between Paris and the English Channel, American, British and Canadian troops, supported by four German divisions, had fought over the Meuse and the Scheldt, where John of Arc was tried and burned. Rouen, 13th city of France with 125,000 population, now is the center of German resistance, such as it is.

The Allies also virtually doomed the great port of Le Havre and have opened the way into the German flying bomb belt in the Pas de Calais further north.

The American bridgehead was at Mantes, the British at Vernon and the Canadians had two between Elbeuf and Pont-de-l'Arche.

U. S. Third army infantry was screaming into the great tank-bulge between the Seine and the Marne forming a consolidated front (Continued on page six)

TWO PLANES CRASH HERE

Lt. Douglas M. Ogilvy Killed Other Pilot Escapes.

Lt. Douglas M. Ogilvy, 22, pilot of one of two Marine Squadron 913 fighter planes which collided in the air and burned several miles from the airfield Saturday afternoon, was killed. The pilot of the other plane, Lt. Joseph Pace of Texas, parachuted to safety.

Ogilvy's plane caught fire in the air. His body was recovered with difficulty from the burning wreckage in woods. Pace's plane crashed on a dirt road a quarter of a mile away and was destroyed.

Ogilvy's body was sent to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Ogilvy, in Watertown, S. D. Lt. Keith Miller, a boyhood friend, accompanied it. Lt. George Mil-zeholder accompanied Mrs. Ogilvy. They left Greenville by train today.

Surviving Lt. Ogilvy are his wife, Mrs. Joyce Linquist Ogilvy of Watertown and Greenville, his parents, and two sisters, Margaret and Florence Ogilvy of Watertown.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The great military war continues to close with accelerated speed about the desperate Hitlerites, crushing in toward doomed Germany both from the freshly erupting Russian front and from the speedily armored columns of the United Nations in the west.

The only question that remains is how long the already beaten Nazis can stand off utter collapse. The Allies are rushing in an effort to turn the trick before the bad weather of late Autumn arrives to impede offensives.

There are three major Allied operations which are especially worth watching. These are the great northward turning movement growing out of the battle of the Seine and Paris, the sensational Russian drive into Romania, and the fresh assault against the Vistula line above Warsaw by the Red Army.

Supreme Allied headquarters in France confirms that American troops east of Paris have swung northward and reached the Marne river—famous battle field of two world wars. This means that the western Allies are well set to carry out a flanking movement against the Germans above the Seine river and along the coast of the English channel.

The Hitlerites must begin their great withdrawal northward toward Belgium and their own frontier

quickly or face disaster for the already greatly weakened forces of the Fifteenth army which is holding along the line of the Seine and guarding the channel coast opposite England. Disaster hangs over them anyway, for in their retreat they cannot escape the eagle eye of the vast Allied airforce which will chop them to pieces by scores of thousands as they flee.

The situation in the eastern theater presents momentous possibilities. The terrific Red drive down into Romania has already smashed the defenses of the famous Galati Gap, which is the gateway into the rolling plains of the Danube basin. This gap is about 50 miles wide and lies between the expansive estuary of the Danube, with its many mouths, and the Carpathian mountains.

When the Muscovites broke through that gap they breached the whole Balkan keg and made it impossible for the Germans to hold the great peninsula. The Hitlerites are already sealed. Thus they not only will lose absolutely vital supplies of grain, war minerals and oil, but the Danubian gateway into Germany will be in jeopardy.

Equally important is word that the Russians again are smashing at the Vistula front above Warsaw with the idea of flanking the capital. This city is the anchor of this powerful defensive line to which the (Continued on Page Four)

Naval Skirmishes Off French Coast

London, Aug. 28.—(AP)—British and American light naval forces engaged eight enemy patrol vessels off the French coast yesterday, sank one, torpedoed two and drove another ashore, the Admiralty announced today.

Off the Dutch coast, British motor torpedo boats sank a German minesweeper. Two casualties aboard British boats were reported in these engagements.

London, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The German propaganda agency Trans-ocean declared in a Berlin broadcast today that German patrol ships had sunk an Allied cruiser and a motor torpedo boat off the Normandy coast last night.

The broadcast acknowledged the loss of two German vessels.

There was no immediate Allied report on such an engagement.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The farm problem—that perennial political issue everyone thought was dormant—may yet show a lot of life and cause a lot of trouble for congressional and presidential candidates between now and November.

It has been rather generally assumed that the issue of farm prices, income and markets—which, in brief, constitute the farm problem—would be a minor one at this election because farmers have been reaping record incomes and have had very little difficulty disposing of their products.

But the possibility of an early defeat of the Axis powers in Europe threatens to change all this. Realizing that their present prosperity is war-induced, farmers are beginning to worry about the possible effect of peace on their prices and markets.

They are asking questions of their congressmen and of their federal food and agriculture department officials. The belief prevails generally among the government economists and administrative officials as well as among farmers that the collapse of Germany will bring a rather sharp break in farm prices.

This belief is based upon the assumption that American food production will be greatly in excess of the demand.

It requires no imagination to visualize now farm prices could become a major issue in the present campaign if the war ended before election day and the expected drop in prices followed.

Farmers and their leaders would demand action. Being in power, the Roosevelt administration would, of course, have to bear the brunt of these demands.

The issue would revolve about the government's ability to live up to promises to farmers. Congress has directed that prices of most farm products be supported at not less than 90 percent of parity for two years after the war. The administration has promised considerably higher prices for most commodities produced this year.

The problem will have to be tossed into the lap of Congress—the most important political sounding board in the country.

To carry out the price support promises, the administration will need a vast amount of money. Some government economists estimate the need at two billion dollars a year. Without doubt, there would be congressmen representing consumer interests.

The Russians asked Germany's remaining allies—Finland, Hungary and the rump state of Slovakia—to quit the Nazis before it is too late.

Urging other countries to turn against the Nazis like Romania, the official Communist party organ Pravda said only thus could they "escape the disastrous consequences of the criminal policies of their governments."

"Events are developing so rapidly," said Pravda, "that they leave no time for hesitation. The situation is quite clear. The Germans have no hope and he who does not break with them will share their fate."

While Russia is not at war with Bulgaria, Pravda's warning seems aimed at her as much as Hungary and Finland.

Moscow is believed fully informed of the armistice terms forwarded to Sofia. The terms were not disclosed, but it was believed that, besides demanding unconditional surrender, they called upon Bulgaria to give up all territories acquired since the war and turn over to the Allies all facilities needed in the war against Germany. The latter presumably includes right of passage for Allied troops.

There seemed little possibility that either Washington or London would be satisfied with the position of "complete neutrality" Bulgaria seeks.

"Bulgaria, with its record of greed and guilt, cannot slide gently into neutrality," said the Times of London, and other papers expressed similar sentiments.

Reports from Moscow said the Germans were doing their best to keep weakening Hungary in line by rushing defense construction workers to her borders. The Free Hungarian Council in London urged Hungarians to overthrow the present government and turn against the Germans.

There also were reports indicating Finland might be taking steps to break with the Nazis. One unconfirmed dispatch from Stockholm said Juho Paasikivi, Finland's ace negotiator, was in Moscow dickering for terms.

New Government Being Set Up In French Capital

Capital Reported Quiet Today After Tumultuous Week-End.

(By The Associated Press)

Paris, Aug. 28.—A new French government was being set up in liberated Paris today after a frenzied week-end in which Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was given a tumultuous welcome, the Germans bombed the city, and Gen. Charles De Gaulle escaped death or injury from snipers' bullets.

(The Paris radio in a broadcast heard in London said the city was quiet today and that two additional tests of enemy resistance had been mopped up).

Nearly all of the directors of the French resistance movements, who will have prominent parts in the new government, were in the city. The Algiers government was en route.

Juventus Cerat, head of all French resistance, was appointed minister-at-large under De Gaulle. Cerat's name, like some others in the resistance movement, is an assumed one.

Crowds jammed the Champs-Élysées yesterday and shouted themselves hoarse as Gen. Eisenhower and his British, French and American staffs made a ceremonial tour of the city that ended in the shadow of the Arc De Triumphe.

There the four-star general, with smile as broad as the Kansas prairie, told cheering Parisians: "I have come here to pay the tribute of the Allied forces to the indomitable spirit of Paris."

With him were Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, commander of the U. S. 2nd army group; Lt. Gen. Joseph H. Koenig, commander of the French forces of the interior; Brig. Gen. Jacques LeClerc, commander of the French second armored division; Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Tedder, deputy supreme commander; Maj. Gen. Leonard T. Gerow, 11th U. S. corps commander.

Gen. Eisenhower wanted Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, Lt. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr. and Gen. Charles De Gaulle to participate in the parade, but duty prevented their appearance.

German planes had bombed Paris suburbs the night before, and early yesterday the skies were aglow from the light of fires. The death toll was placed at 110, with 719 persons injured.

When the raiders came over, people were still in the streets celebrating, despite the battle which broke out Saturday afternoon when roof-top snipers started firing during the victory parade for Gen. De Gaulle.

Thousands of Parisians were thrown into panic as the parade broke up in wild flurries of gunfire along the four-mile line of march. Several spectators were killed and dozens were wounded as the shooting spread.

French patriots in the parade fired at roof tops from which French Fascist militia had sniped at them. Soon thousands of men of the French forces of the interior joined in the fighting, which extended rapidly throughout Paris.

De Gaulle's victory address was postponed.

A simple low mass was said before a small assembly at the Cathedral of Notre Dame yesterday, and prayers were offered for all who had died in defense of France.

COOL SPELL OVER NATION

Many Sections Shiver With Unseasonable Weather.

From Wichita to Boston the nation shivered in abnormally low temperatures.

It never got above 65 yesterday (Sunday) in Kansas City, the third day in a row that the thermometer had set a record for a low maximum. And a mark that had stood for 66 years in Charlotte, N. C., fell chattering when the mercury dipped to 54.8.

Fires were lit in north Georgia (low 50) and in Indianapolis (50), while fall clothes were trotted out on New York's Fifth Avenue (57). And many of the 30,000 fans at the Athletics-Red Sox baseball game in Philadelphia (51) were tickled they had fetched along their topcoats.

Boston had a low of 53, Des Moines and Detroit 52.

But the queerest quirk came in Kansas. Not only was it cold, it was wet. And on these normally hot, dry plains cold and wet are two adjectives usually as out of place this time of year as a mountain yodeler any time of year.

Streams which in many a Kansas August won't run a cup full a

month are gushing from bank to bank, with flood stages reported on the Kay, the Blue and the Missouri. In Kansas City the Swope Park swimming pool, scene of the women's National A. A. U. swimming meet only a week ago, is closed to await the rebirth of summer. Normal Sunday attendance for August:

But in Florida, in southern Texas and on west and up the coast, it was weather pretty much as usual. (Exception: Denver's eight-inch hail storm (Saturday). And things certainly were humming in Yuma, Ariz. The thermometer hit 113

NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

Germans Withdrawing Slowly Into Gothic Line Defenses.

Rome Aug. 28.—(AP)—Attacking fiercely against German forces withdrawing slowly into their Gothic Line defenses for a last ditch defense of Northern Italy. Polish troops have punched a path through Nazi strongholds behind the Metauro river and have fought on across the Arzilia. Allied headquarters announced today.

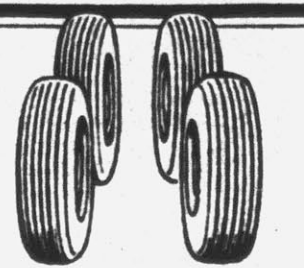
The advances placed eight army units in the Adriatic sector within five miles of the important port of Pesaro and only a little more than 20 miles from Rimini at the southern edge of the broad Po Valley.

Substantial gains were made by Eighth army troops further inland where Allied forces crossed the Magliore river in the mountains and captured Fossombrone, on the main lateral road to Fano.

OUR ONLY SECURITY

It has become a truism that there is no security in the modern world. We look at the efforts men have made in the past to insure security—the Great Wall of China, the Maginot Line, the Hitler Line.

So are the Russian parents and the British. And within the occupied areas, multitudes of people are weeping that the death might come to end their miseries.

There has not been a time in centuries when the vaunted security of earthly things stood at a lower figure than today.

"High" walls are useless things in these modern times.

Dark relies they of warlike ages past. Man's vigilance alone will make them last.

They crumble with the winds—"The Bible says that the house is a vain thing for safety, and we have learned that modern inventions are vain things when the south of all countries is east heading into battle.

Where then is our security? It is in our own hearts. It is not what man can do for us, or what we can do for ourselves, but what God can do for us. We have nothing to turn to in these days but the Word—the promise of God. We must stand on that or succumb in despair.

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AMERICA IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—The gentleman from Tallahassee, Fla., Sen. Claude Pepper, sometimes referred to as the administration sounding board in the upper chamber, has come forward with another resolution to put the proceedings of Congress on the national radio networks.

This is a "stupid" and you don't need to take it seriously. The temptation is to paraphrase the proceedings of Congress slightly and give a sample script of what might go out on the radio as "My Day in Congress."

The Washington Post editorially gave that story a fling, suggesting Congress adopt a musical signature piece and pointing out how dramatically you might catch 15 minutes with whether Congresswoman X would yield the floor in debate to Congressman Y.

This, of course, was all in fun, but there are more or less serious aspects to the proposal too.

In the first place, with an exception that occurs hardly once a month, there is nothing duller than a session of either chamber of Congress. And when the drama comes, there are two factors that would make catching it by radio as impractical as trying to broadcast the buzz of a mosquito on its mission of delivering malarial knock-out drops.

The point is that you could never be sure that you would have the microphone right there at the moment of contact and if you followed the mosquito for hours all you would get would be a monotonous buzz.

Sessions of Congress move slowly. They are filled with long pauses, some so long that a musical diversion like Beethoven's "Fifth Symphony" wouldn't fill the gap. There are long moments of Parliamentary procedure which, even if put to the tune of "Oklahoma!" and crooned by a trio composed of Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra and Deanna Durbin, wouldn't be entertaining.

The alternative of course would be to "stage" the sessions of Congress which would go on the radio. Nothing could be phonier and probably even funnier than the Washington Post has outlined. The spectacle of 531 members of the two branches of Congress battling for that free time on a national hook-up, in itself, probably make the whole business a sideshow.

Even if that could be worked out, perhaps by seniority, regardless of merit, as committee appointments are now handled, the only sessions

worth hearing would be rehearsals in which the members decided exactly what they would do and say and debated the advisability of striking this or that out of the record.

I am strictly in sympathy with Sen. Pepper in his idea of giving the voters and serious thinkers of the country a better view of just how Congress works. There's nothing I can think of that would bring about a quicker revision of our legislative process than a 99 radio entertainment rating, they had better promote the election of a few Fred Allens, Jack Benny's Bob Hojens and a dozen or so Ingrid Bergmans, Veronica Lakes and Mary Martins before they give it another thought.

skirt the Maragon steppe north of the Bulgarian frontier.

Front dispatches said Nazi storm troops were haranguing and threatening the German troops in efforts to make a stand. There was sporadic resistance, but the armies of Gen. Feodor I. Tolbukhin and Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky appeared to have broken the back of the Nazi forces before Bucharest.

A Bucharest communique said Romanian troops going over to the Allies struck the Germans at Ploesti and blocked mountain passes leading to Hungary by way of Transylvania.

German broadcasts frankly admitted their position was "precarious," and said Nazi troops were locked in "unusually ferocious" battle with Romanian troops amid the twisted wreckage of Ploesti oil field installations.

Russians overwhelmed the Germans at Focani and Galati, anchors of the once vaunted Nazi defense line, and rolled on through the oil fields of Raminul-Sarat, 22 miles beyond Focani and 75 miles northeast of Bucharest. Ploesti is 57 miles southwest of the advancing Red armies.

Malinovsky moved on Ploesti and Bucharest down the southern side of the Transylvania Alps while Tolbukhin rolled ahead from the Danube. The way appeared wide open to Bucharest.

The Russian war bulletin said other Soviet forces climbing westward into the Carpathians above the Galati Gap captured some localities along a railway leading to

the Transylvania plateau.

Surrender of two Nazi corps commanders and two major generals, together with 18,000 soldiers, indicated the seriousness of the Germans' plight.

The remnants of 12 German divisions pocketed southwest of Chisinau, 140 miles behind the Russians pouring through the Galati Gap, had been compressed into a small wooded area and were being destroyed, the war bulletin said.

In eight days of the Romanian drive the Russians have killed or captured more than 300,000 Germans and Romanians. This made 1,081,886 Axis troops killed or captured since the summer offensive started June 23.

The Moscow communique said Russian positions northwest and east of Praga, Warsaw's east suburb, had been improved, and that 50 additional localities on the Estonian front capitulated to the Third Baltic army.

that the defendants did influence the public in general and Amos Eyr, William J. Anderson and White Bianco in particular, to execute and issue certain worthless checks in violation of law with a view and intent on the part of the said defendants of subsequently extorting money from the makers of said checks by threats of prosecution for giving same, contrary to law and against the peace and dignity of the State, and that they did later on extort and collect a sum of money of interest on the loans.

Solicitor Clark's bill of indictment is further alleged that the said Davenport, Jones, Heath and Hunning did unlawfully and feloniously in pursuance of and furtherance of said conspiracy and design and solicit and receive deposits from the said Worsley, Wooten, Rouse and Tripp, and from other individuals and the public generally, in violation of the banking laws of North Carolina and contrary to the statute.

Clark presented another bill of indictment to the grand jury alleging that Rhoderick Davenport, C. R. Jones, Johnny Heath and J. R. Hunning, with force and arms, and in the county aforesaid unlawfully, knowingly, designedly, wickedly, deceitfully and feloniously, with intent to cheat and defraud, did combine, conspire and plan together amongst themselves, each with the other and with each other, to obtain large sums of money for their own use, by means of false pretenses from the public in general, and particularly James R. Worsley, Thad Wooten, J. S. Rouse and W. M. Tripp. The bill specifies the sums procured from Worsley as \$100; Wooten, \$500; Rouse, \$1,000, and Tripp, \$1,000.

A second count in this bill of indictment alleges that the said defendants, Davenport, Jones, Heath and Hunning, did obtain the money by means of false pretense, one of the methods was giving their checks for deposits made with them and that they pretended that their checks would be good any time they were presented for cashing, whereas in truth and fact the said "depositors," James R. Worsley, Thad Wooten, J. S. Rouse and W. M. Tripp, have been unable to get their money, the solicitor pointed out.

Solicitor Clark said he had information that the four defendants claimed their method of borrowing and lending money is legal and that they are solvent. Other information he had was that when a "client" loaned the said defendants money they gave their check for the amount to the "lender" and that the defendants paid five per cent interest a month to the "lender" as long as he or she did not cash the defendants' check. Other information in the solicitor's hands is that the said Worsley, Wooten, Rouse and Tripp were unable to cash checks given to them by the said defendants as security for loans.

Washington's offerings were comparatively light, with 250,000 pounds for sale. The average was around 42 cents, with some piles bringing as much as 47 cents a pound.

All opposition was confined exclusively to the harbor area.

On the eastern flank of the Bridgehead Allied forces have reached the Var river and have spread out along its banks. The Var's mouth is only four miles from the great Riviera playground resort of Nice.

For the 15th consecutive day Allied ground forces were favored by clear skies and warm weather.

Italy bombed the oil plants in Austria and Hungary through smoke screens. Fires and explosions blanketed the rail targets. A rail bridge over the Tisza river 55 miles southeast of Budapest received a good pattern of bombs, stopping for a time traffic from Hungary to the southeast.

Tactical planes operated with the speed left to outstep Patch's forward columns and they can find a way to keep the Allied air force from slashing their communications too severely, their one chance of

southwest of Verona and harbor facilities at Imperia and Savona on the Italian Riviera.

RAF Lancasters and Halifaxes with fighter escort attacked a concrete structure in the French coastal area late yesterday believed to be connected with the Nazis' secret long range "V" rocket, the Air Ministry announced today.

Last night RAF Mosquitos slashed at the Rhineland industrial center of Mannheim and attacked German transport in the Low countries.

Heavy bombers which have flown 8,500 sorties in large scale assaults from British and Italian bases in the past four days were apparently idle overnight, but the fast Mosquitos struck into Holland, bombing and strafing trains, motor convoys and barges while others slashed at Mannheim.

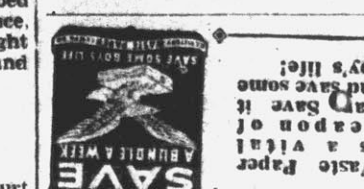
Yesterday powerful formations of Allied planes from Britain and Italy smashed at Germany's synthetic oil sources and strafed and bombed retreating Nazi troops in France, after RAF assaults Saturday night on Konigsberg, Kiel, Hamburg and Berlin.

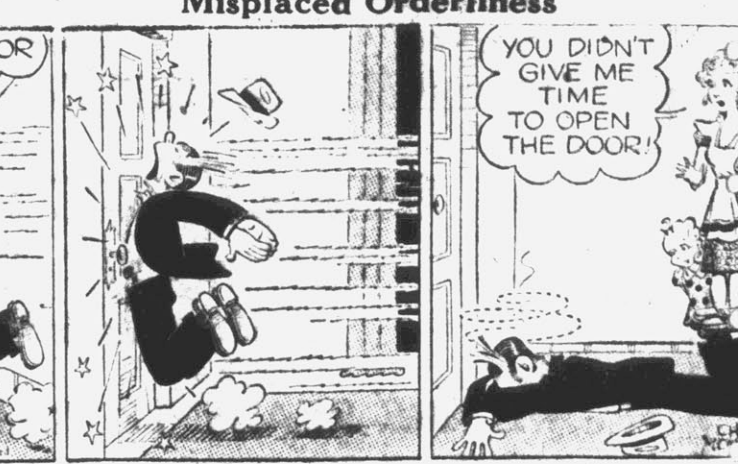

Planes Continue Pound Invasion Route To Japan

New Base Established On Middleburg Island 200 Miles Near Philippines.

General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Aug. 23 (AP)—Hitting its bases ever closer to Tokyo, Allied air power in the Pacific is heightening the tempo of its assault.

Reported over the week-end were some of the heaviest sustained bombing raids yet conducted simultaneously on a wide range of targets in the Nimitz-MacArthur theater—33 tons of bombs on Iwo Jima in the Volcano Islands 750 miles south of Tokyo; 142 tons on Palau, more than 150 tons on the Moluccas.

In these attacks, eight small Japanese warcraft were sunk or damaged and 11 enemy planes destroyed or damaged.

"Disclosure of a new airstrip on Middleburg island off Sansapor at the northwest tip of Dutch New Guinea, 200 miles closer to the Philippines than any other Allied base, came today in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communique announcing a night raid on Middleburg by an enemy plane. Damage was slight.

Middleburg, taken July 30, is within 600 miles of Mindanao, southern Philippines.

Ground action flared east and southwest of Sansapor. American patrols killed 320 enemy troops and captured 199.

A summary of the principal aerial strikes:

Two Jima—intense anti-aircraft fire, strong fighter interception Thursday and Friday; several raiding Liberators damaged; five Japanese planes shot down, two damaged.

Palau—docks set afire, three enemy planes destroyed on ground; 35-minute battle with intercepting Zeros, one Liberator shot down.

Truk—44 tons of bombs; one intercepting plane damaged.

Moluccas—Ceram and Ambon, 151 tons of bombs; small freighter left in flames off Halmahera; small freighter sunk off Rai Islands; 6,000-ton ship destroyed or severely damaged near Boeroe.

Celebes—two sailing vessels and lugger damaged.

Colombo, Ceylon, Aug. 23 (AP)—Another blow against Japanese installations on the island of Sumatra—the fourth since its occupation by the enemy—has been made by Allied carrier-borne aircraft with heavy support of the far-ranging eastern fleet. It was announced yesterday.

The primary target of the latest raid, made last Thursday, was the great cement manufacturing plant at Indarong, near Padang, on the island's west coast. Flames and smoke rose 1,000 feet from the plant after large numbers of heavy bombers were dropped.

Superior Court In Criminal Session

85 miles or more almost due east of Paris in a great half-wheel around the still exuberant and now virtually cleared French capital.

The push through Meaux, 10 miles beyond the first won foothold along the Marne at Lagny, was described as meeting virtually no opposition.

It gave the Americans an assault line from which they could turn any Marne defense or tab north in a deep encirclement—or cut off of the rocket bomb coast.

(The Algiers radio said U. S. spearheads had crossed the Marne at Vitray, 45 miles southwest of Verdun.)

On the extreme right flank of the American advance, a column thrust 12 miles northward from Troyes to a point but 118 miles from the German border in the Saar. The Nazis put up a stiffened resistance, possibly indicating they were beginning to react to the American threat to

LOVE COMES TO COSTELLO IN SOCIETY

Northwest of Paris, in the area forming the left side of the Allied line, British Second army and Canadian First army troops poured into the four bridgeheads over the Seine river and struck out in a mighty pursuit aimed at the rocket bomb coast.

The Germans already were reported evacuating Le Havre, except for a few rearwards and demolition troops and were said to be streaking east toward Germany under pulverizing aerial attacks. Capture of Le Havre would give the Allies an excellent port.

These three activities were being conducted by the Allies between Paris and the sea:

1. The British were building up a bridgehead at Vernon, 55 airline miles from the mouth of the Seine, to strike out probably in the direction of Beauvais, which is one of the main German retreat lines from Rouen. Beauvais is 35 miles northeast of Vernon.

2. Canadian, Belgian and Dutch troops were engaged in what one observer called a "fair sized slaughter" of the enemy Seventh army. Canadian troops were locked with German rear guards at the southwestern approaches to Rouen.

3. American troops were clearing out German stragglers in the 30-mile wide area between Mantres and Paris.

Paris itself, where Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was a Sunday visitor, has been cleared of the enemy except for German and Fascist French snipers.

At the tip of the Breton peninsula, far behind the main battleline, Allied ground troops were making slow but steady progress in the battle to reduce the port of Brest.

British headquarters in France announced that since D-day 25 German generals and one admiral had been killed, wounded, captured, replaced or have just disappeared in western France.

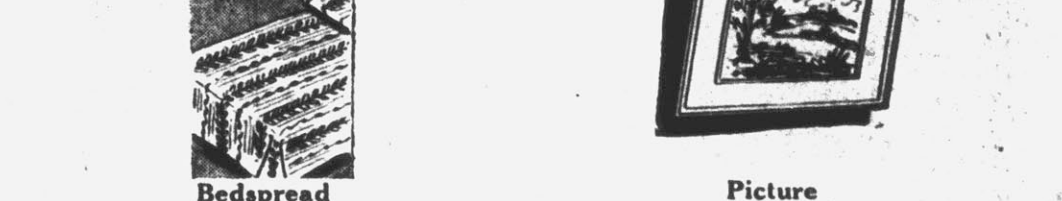

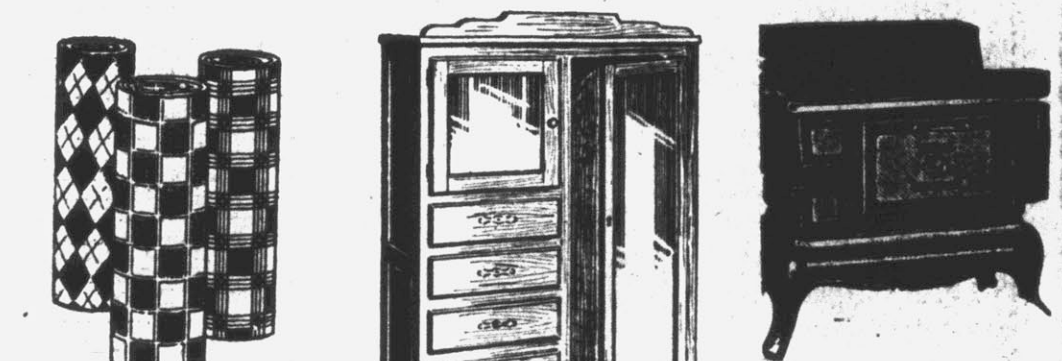
