Soviet Army Reported To Have Entered Bucharest

Russians Believed To Have Reached Romanian Capital After Spectacular Sweep Through Ploesti Oil Fields, Partially Destroyed By Fleeing Germans.

London, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Red army has entered Bucharest, Marshal Stalin announced tonight.

Moscow, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Red army was believed today to have entered Bucharest, capital of Romania, after capturing the great Ploesti oil fields and preempting perhaps a third of the German petroleum supply.

At midnight, the Russians were 17 miles from the city of 440,000 after an advance of nearly 40 miles in a day through the capitulated Balkan kingdom.

An official announcement was not yet made but Muscovites kept their radios tuned for an order of the day.

"With the fall of Ploesti, the way to Bucharest is open," Red Star said.

Investia reported from captured Ploesti that the abrupt Red army drive had prevented destruction of the Ploesti oil fields but added that serious damage had been done. Romanian oil workers helped the Russians put out tremendous fires and civilians directed Soviet troops to a large group of Germans dressed as civilians, applying the torch right and left.

The dispatch added that a plane trip over the fields, greatest in Europe except for those in Russia itself, disclosed that the Germans did everything possible to destroy wells, pipelines, derricks and equipment.

Forces of Gen. Fedor I. Tolbukhin were pushing through level plain country along with those of Gen. Roion Y. Malinovsky and were believed already to have joined hands.

Another arm of Malinovsky's big command moved directly north through a pass leading to Brasov (pop. 61,000) on the trunk line railroad from Bucharest and Vienna. Large groups of Germans and Hungarians are known to be massed in Hungary-held Transylvania in the path of this force.

Even after the Romanian army's big defeat on the Russian steppes, in the Crimea and at Odessa, Red star said it still had 30 to 35 divisions. King Mihai has pledged these to the Allies.

Death Truck Driver Placed Under Bond

At an inquest at the City Hall in Greenville last night, a coroner's jury recommended that Edward Vance Belcher, Jr., Negro, of Wilmington, driver of the tobacco truck that was in a collision with a motor transport tank truck, driven by J. D. Keefe, 21, of Wilmington, in Bethel Tuesday night, be held for further investigation by the grand jury. Bond was fixed at \$5,000.

Keefe was burned to death in his cab by blazing oil which destroyed the tanker, a service station into which it crashed, and several adjacent stores' buildings.

Coroner Griffin H. Rouse of Greenville presided over the inquest.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Any family which has a serviceman reported missing in action should keep in mind a bill just passed by Congress.

It affects the death pension claims of a serviceman's dependant survivors.

This is the main point of the bill.

It prevents a surviving dependant from receiving for the same period of time—both pension money and allotments or service pay.

It also prevents the Veterans Administration (VA), which pays out death pensions, from making its own decision as to when a serviceman died.

From now on VA—which sponsored the bill to avoid future confusion—must accept the findings of the War or Navy departments as to when a serviceman died.

Private Jones was first reported missing 12 months ago. Today the War department notified his wife that he must be considered dead.

So under the bill—VA must consider Jones dead as of today. Pension payments to his dependants therefore would start as of today.

The procedure generally worked like that in the past anyway. But there were cases in which VA could make exceptions, decide itself on the actual date of death, and make pension payments from that date.

For instance:

The War department on Aug. 1, 1944 notified the wife of Jones, first reported missing Aug. 1, 1943, that

File New Indictments In Local Loan Racket

JAP SHIPPING BLASTED AGAIN

Airmen Sink 10 Ships And Damage 13 More.

General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Allied airmen sinking Japanese ships from the Kuriles northeast of Nippon to the Dutch East Indies have knocked out 23 more vessels, 10 of them sunk.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communiqué today listed nine enemy freighters, transport, small freighters, coastal vessels and barges—the types which he has said were the sole supply carriers for many Japanese East Indies garrisons.

These and the 10 or more ships damaged, including a 7,000-ton freighter-transport, were found by bombers which ranged from Mindanao Island, in the southern Philippines, southward to Celebes, Ceram and Kai Islands, all now within easy range of Allied aircraft operating from newly won bases in northwestern New Guinea.

Halmahera, south of Mindanao, was given a 113-ton bomb drubbing (Continued on page three)

Davenport's Bond Increased To \$17,500; Three New Defendants Named.

The Roderick Davenport, Dixie Produce Company, conspiracy to defraud case grew to greater dimensions today with additional indictments returned against Davenport and with three new defendants added to the four previously indicted. Davenport remained in the Pitt county jail this afternoon pending the posting of \$17,500 bail. Davenport's bond, previously fixed at \$10,000, was raised to an additional \$7,500 by Judge R. Hunt Parker today when the grand jury returned the new indictments.

The new false pretense and conspiracy to defraud indictments returned today included S. H. Powers (reported to be a woman), Al Horton and Wilson Boyle, all of New Bern. Five other indictments for worthless checks totaling \$1,785 were filed against Davenport. Meanwhile from other counties where Davenport and his associates had been operating came reports that depositions, unable to cash their checks, were swearing out warrants against Davenport.

Meadows to Make Own ECTC Audit

In Superior Court today the grand jury returned a true bill against Dr. L. R. Meadows, former president of East Carolina Teachers' College, alleging the embezzlement of \$18,634.44 of college and student association funds entrusted to his care. This bill was presented to the court after the grand jury had heard additional testimony on the various charges against Meadows in presentments made at a previous term of court.

Counsel for Meadows today obtained from Judge R. Hunt Parker, presiding over the criminal term, an order granting permission to F. P. Wall, auditor and accountant, hired by Meadows to make a special audit of the college books.

The order permits the said F. P. Wall to inspect and examine all original records from which the state audit was made, now in possession of state auditors and the treasurer of East Carolina Teachers' College, in any wise pertaining to matters and things referred to in the bill of indictment or bill of particulars, and to question state witnesses but not argue with them, in the presence of the solicitor, Dave Clark, or his associate, J. H. Harrell.

Field Marshal

London, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery was elevated tonight to the rank of field marshal, effective tomorrow. The war office announced that King George VI had approved the promotion of the hero of El Alamein who now directs British armies in northern France.

SAYS BULGARS ARE GUILTY OF AIDING NAZIS

Russia Charges Bulgaria Permitted Withdrawal Of German Forces And Ships After Declaring Neutrality.

London, Aug. 31.—Moscow today accused Bulgaria of aiding the Germans after professing neutrality, with the Russian press declaring the only hope for the Bulgars to save themselves would be by active war against the Nazis.

This sharp rebuke came as a Bulgarian armistice delegation was held virtually prisoners in Cairo awaiting Allied terms. The formal presentation was delayed pending return from America in a few days of Lincoln Mac Veigh, U. S. ambassador to the exiled Greek and Yugoslav governments.

Consultations with some of the Allies, especially the Greeks and Yugoslavs whose lands have been occupied by Bulgarian troops, were believed not yet completed.

Moscow press stories charged that Bulgaria, after declaring her neutrality, had made an agreement with the Germans whereby Hitler would be allowed to withdraw troops and munitions from the country. Such a failure to intern armed German ships and crews in Bulgarian waters, and the role Bulgars played and are playing in Greece and Yugoslavia will not be forgotten they asserted.

Russia and Bulgaria are not at war.

"The maneuver of the Bulgarian government will not fool anybody and the Allies are taking this into full account," a Moscow broadcast said.

Thus, as a Romanian delegation reached Moscow to formalize that country's armistice and the Red army drove deeper into Romania and Transylvania, the stage was set for collapse of Hitler's Balkan ramparts.

An Ankara dispatch said Romanian signature of an armistice in the Russian capital appeared likely within 48 hours. Romanian troops already are fighting beside the Russians.

Ankara reports said the Germans bombed Bucharest, causing heavy damage in residential districts. These same reports said General G. Stenberg, head of the German (Continued on page four)

Youth Convicted On Murder Charge

Taylorsville, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Fifteen-year-old Marvin Matheson was convicted of first degree murder by a Superior court jury today for the slaying of Taylorsville Police Chief Dexter Millsaps last July 9.

The jury, composed mostly of farmers, returned its verdict at 10:30 a. m., after deliberating since noon yesterday. Presiding Judge Justice Rudisill pronounced the sentence of death in the state gas chamber, October 27.

A notice of appeal was taken by young Matheson's attorney, Horace Kennedy of Shelby.

Chief Millsaps, 30, was fatally shot in a hotel here when he undertook to question a youth about a reported theft in Catawba county. Matheson was arrested shortly after the shooting.

Roosevelt And Churchill To Discuss Future Plans

Washington, Aug. 31.—(AP)—It now seems certain that before an end of the month passes President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill will meet to formalize plans for the control of Germany—now approaching defeat—and the immediate post-war security of the western world.

Also expected to come up for discussion are arrangements for Britain's full participation in the final phases of the war against Japan. This British help was promised by the prime minister when the President and he met at Quebec, Canada, a year ago this month.

Little remained to be announced of the forthcoming session except time and place. President Roosevelt has answered every recent press conference inquiry with the comment that he would meet Churchill soon. London reports said today that Churchill would not remain long in England following his trip to Italy and his conference with Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia.

This will be the eleventh session of the British and American leaders with their political and military advisers. They last had three sessions in the Middle East, meeting at Cairo with Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek, Stalin at Teheran and again at Cairo with President Ismet Inonu of Turkey.

The intervening eight months have constituted the longest period since their original 1940 Atlantic charter meeting that they have not conferred.

That period has seen climactic advances on all fronts toward Allied military victory.

Likewise it has brought a number of political plans to fruition, notable

Nazi Forces Now In Open Flight Toward Homeland

Remnants Of Battered 19th German Army Fall Back In Rhone Valley before Driving Force Of Southern Invasion; Nazis Suffer Tremendous Losses Of Materiel.

Rome, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Remnants of the German 19th army raced desperately north toward Lyon today fighting costly rearguard action with the pursuing Americans only when necessary, while other Seventh army units moved through the French Riviera metropolis of Nice toward the Italian frontier, some 12 miles ahead.

Nice, with a population of 200,000 and the largest of the Riviera's famed playgrounds, was taken without any opposition. Damage was confined chiefly to the harbor area, Allied headquarters said.

The total of prisoners captured by the Seventh army since it swarmed ashore on the beaches of southern France passed the 50,000 mark, with additional thousands rounded up from Nazi units interdicted and cut to pieces in the Rhone valley pockets south of the junction of the Rhone and Drome rivers.

Equally impressive were the material losses of the enemy.

In a pocket of slightly more than 11 miles south of Livron losses inflicted by our ground forces included 240 motor vehicles, 1,000 horses, 27 five-millimeter anti-tank guns, 12 seventy-seven millimeter guns, three batteries of field artillery pieces, six railroad guns, 40 twenty millimeter anti-aircraft weapons, eight self-propelled guns and a trailer with a printing press, Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's headquarters said.

Additional hundreds of vehicles and guns knocked out by Allied planes littered the roads throughout the valley and 200 enemy dead were found in the same area.

Yesterday morning the Germans locked in sharp battle with an American column in the vicinity of Livron on the north banks of the Drome river, 11 miles south of Valence. In the afternoon the enemy broke off contact and fled north when the avenue of escape was threatened by another Allied column that punched into Chabeuil six miles southeast of Valence.

By accounting heavy losses of the last several days a substantial portion of the enemy personnel has succeeded in reaching the Lyon area," an official headquarters statement conceded.

"On August 30 from the vicinity of Livron to Lyon the Germans are fighting where they are forced to, and are delaying and blocking at a heavy cost in men and equipment."

During the course of one of the most violent Nazi rearguard actions in the Montellier area, the Germans drove Patch's doughboys out of the occupied village of Clary, five miles northeast of Montellier, last Monday night. The Americans retook it the following day, but against light opposition.

Farther north in the Alps of the Franco-Italian frontier south of Switzerland "enemy forces have been showing signs of nervousness and have been moving out of front" (Continued on page four)

Campaign In France Is Ahead Of Schedule

Eisenhower Announces General Bradley Now Full Field Commander

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Gen. Eisenhower announced today that Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley had taken his place as a full field commander of American armies in northern France in equal status to Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery and declared confidently his forces would carry the fight into Germany, inevitably and decisively.

Bradley, mild Missouri infantry specialist, hitherto has been officially subservient to Montgomery who commanded all ground troops in northern France under Eisenhower. Bradley, however, has assumed great stature by directing his first and third American armies in the breakthrough from St. Lo across the Brest peninsula, beyond Paris and to the approaches of Belgium and Germany.

Eisenhower, smiling and bronzed, said operations were five days ahead of schedule.

His eyes twinkling, Eisenhower stood before a huge battle map of northern France streaked with red arrows of his troop gains toward Belgium and the Rhine and spoke with a firm voice of confidence in victories won and others yet ahead.

Eisenhower said the crushing defeat administered to Field Marshal von Kluge was due partly to the land-greedy Nazi strategy of indecisive defense—a rigid stake-all stand on a flank south of the Seine.

Eisenhower did not permit direct quotations from his talk—his first to his main press headquarters since D-Day—observing with a wry smile that generals get in trouble when they talk.

In announcing the new setup of field command, he paid high tribute to Montgomery, describing him as a close and warm friend and one of the greatest soldiers of this war or any other. He emphasized the change was in no way the slightest reflection upon "Monty" nor a demotion for him.

The exact time when the division of responsibility was reached was not specified. But Eisenhower said it was not effective at the time that report of the division first came out a fortnight ago.

Casualties

Washington, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Reflecting the period of heaviest fighting in northern France, total army casualties jumped to 234,833 on August 13, an increase of 32,499 over those reported just a week earlier.

Coupled with navy casualties of 58,333, the latest overall figures for the armed services is 342,191, compared with 317,846 a week ago. All figures are on the basis of those officially reported to next of kin and represent a lag of three weeks or more before action in the field.

Undersecretary of War Patterson, who reported the figures to his news conference, said they reflected the heaviest period of fighting in northern France toward the end of July.

British, Canadian and American Forces Smashing Forward Across Battlefields of First World War; British Reach Amiens After 60 Mile Advance In 48 Hours.

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Aug. 31.—(AP)—British tanks cut across Amiens and smashed across the Somme river today in a lightning 60-mile drive in 48 hours that found the Germans in full flight back to the Reich before four onrushing Allied armies.

The British raced with American columns which overran Laon and stabbed on north more than two miles to within 33 miles of Belgium with such bewildering speed that they overwhelmed three trainloads of German soldiers trying to escape.

The speed of the advance, virtually uncontested along a 150-mile arc at the Somme and approaching the Meuse river, indicated that the Germans had given up the last vestige of a rearguard stand and were in open flight through Belgium back to the imperiled homeland.

The Somme had been considered a natural barrier along which the enemy might try to fashion some sort of a stand, but the capture of the city of Amiens, which straddles the river, blasted this possibility.

With the Canadians mopping up the big river port of Rouen, 35 miles inland from Dieppe, and the British 25 miles inland from Abbeville at Amiens, half the German robot bomb coast and any forces garrisoning it seemed doomed.

There was no rest anywhere for the disorganized Germans, and Allied drives mushroomed over battlefields of the first World War, covering in an hour territory that it once took days and weeks to conquer.

One force of Americans heading east for the German frontier, seized St. Dizier, 18 miles southeast of fallen Vitry and pressed on to within 40 miles of the reversed Maginot line. The Saar border of Germany was 37 miles ahead of this force.

Forty-five miles ahead of the American drive was the gateway city of Sedan, where the Germans won the battle of France in 1940 by skirting the Maginot line. Verdun, 40 miles north of St. Dizier, along with Metz and Nancy were strong points of the French defense line.

Equally, there is no indication that Eisenhower intends a head-on attack through the Maginot and Siegfried lines.

Spearheads are aimed instead at the Ardennes forest, skirting the north end of the Maginot and leading into Germany where the German chain of forts probably is thinnest.

NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

Adriatic Port Of Pesaro Falls To Polish Troops.

Rome, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Adriatic port of Pesaro, one of the eastern anchors of the German Gothic Line, has fallen to Polish troops, and Allied forces now are in contact with strong enemy positions further inland after storming across the Foglia river on a broad front, it was announced today.

Pesaro fell only after a bitter fight in which both infantry and armor participated. The Germans counterattacked fiercely yesterday after the Poles had invested part of the city, but were repulsed with heavy losses.

The Poles announced they had taken a sizeable bag of prisoners in the fighting.

Dispatches from the front said that in some places further west Eighth army troops drove across the Foglia so swiftly that the Germans had not even had time to lay mines.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Good news continues to roll out of Allied supreme headquarters in France and today we have several announcements of vast and happy significance.

One of Patton's racing armored columns has driven northward beyond Laon, not far from the headwaters of the winding river Somme whose valley is the main defensive position in the northern tip of France and as such is one of the great battlefields of the ages. This means that an advance of a few more miles will enable us to flank this historic valley and render it untenable for the Hitlerites.

In the meantime, the British have launched a great offensive from their bridgeheads across the lower Seine and have thrust spearheads into Amiens on the Somme, far to the north. This railway city, which has grown gray in the service of war, is one of the key positions on the Somme.

This British advance, coupled with the American drive on the east, will compel the Germans to abandon their positions on the coast of the English channel below the mouth of the Somme. They'll have to move fast, too, or get caught in another disastrous trap.

But one of the most cheering aspects of the British offensive lies in the official statement that "the thrust was cutting off German flying bomb launching sites with every mile gained."

Supreme Commander Eisenhower

has capped all this fine news with the statement that the campaign in northern France is five days ahead of schedule.

That five days means a lot at this critical juncture. Hitler is fighting for time and we are fighting to deprive him of it. The Nazis declare the Allies are speeding in an effort to win the war before winter comes—a claim which one would scarcely dispute—and five days saved now may be worth a hundred after the bad weather comes.

The whole picture of the fighting in France is that of a wholesale German retreat. The Nazis now are offering only such resistance as is necessary to cover their retreat.

As they pull out they will, of course, free the English channel ports which will be invaluable to the Allies. We can't have too many docking facilities, for our supply problem is a huge one.

General Eisenhower finally has announced the elevation of Lt. Gen. Omar Bradley to the position of overall commander of American forces in northern France, a position equal to that of General Sir Bernard Montgomery, who commands the British field forces. Here (Continued on Page Four)

RAISE NUMBER OF TEACHERS

Board Increases Year's Allotment By 437.

Raleigh, Aug. 31. — (AP) — The State School Board today allotted 437 additional teachers to the public school system for 1944-45, bringing the total allotment for the teaching year to 24,463.

It adopted four changes in its regulations to provide for the increase all following closely a recommendation made before it a month ago by Rep. John Umstead of Orange county.

The changes: The elementary allotment shall be six teachers for the first 175 pupils in average daily attendance and one additional teacher for each 10 pupils thereafter.

All those high schools which have been allotted two high school teachers for the 1944-45 term shall be allotted one additional high school teacher if the average daily attendance for 1943-44 reached 45.

Any school losing as many as three teachers in 1944-45 under the allotment for 1943-44 shall have one teacher restored.

For the year 1944-45, all high school teacher allotments shall be restored to the 1943-44 level; provided, that in the case of union schools the allotment does not exceed the number allotted for 1943-44; and provided, further, that such high schools have not already received aid by some other regulation adopted for 1944-45 by the State Board of Education or by transfer that has been authorized by the board.

The 1944-45 allotment to date was 23,901, with an additional 125 reserved for opening, to care for increased attendance.

The 1943-44 allotment was 24,355. Estimated salary needs for the next year will be \$29,600,230, based on an average salary of \$1,210.

Under the changes, Controller Paul Reid estimated number one

would call for 270 more teachers, number two for 33, number three for two, and number four for 132.

The board voted to pay teachers this year a month's salary after the first two weeks of school, to care for delayed openings caused by infantile paralysis, to pay the second month's salary after five more weeks and the third month's salary after five more weeks.

On motion of Dr. Julian Miller of Charlotte, a move to pay teachers salaries in 12 monthly installments was referred to the finance committee.

are doomed," the usually conservative army organ added. Red Star said five to six German divisions in Greece and the Aegean Islands were cut off from the main German army and that Marshal Tito's divisions had handed the Germans defeats in Yugoslavia. In Ploesti itself, dispatches said fires lit by fleeing Germans raged through the streets and interfered with operations. The Germans left dozens of barbed wire barricades in the path of the Red army.

The lightning advance by Gen. Malinovsky's army captured an additional 15,000 Germans Tuesday, including a corps commander, Gen. Heil; a divisional commander, Lt. Gen. Weitzner, and two colonels commanding divisions. The Soviet communiqué said:

German losses in the unsuccessful defense of Ploesti were declared "tremendous."

Gen. Feodor I. Tolbukhin's Third army captured 100 towns in the pocket between the Danube river bend and the Black Sea, and shouldered up to the river next to the second army.

His army moved rapidly upon the Bulgarian border from positions south of the Danube through Dobruja and reached down the Danube valley through Walachia in towns which promised to link up

ties passes, particularly the Larche and St. Genevieve passes, to try to contact our forward elements," said an official report.

It was one of these thrusts in force that compelled the small American garrison to withdraw into the outskirts of Briancon, five miles from the border.

Swift French assault forces punching up the west side of the Rhone river valley today were reported to have made contact with enemy rearguards in the vicinity of Bourg-St. Andreol, 14 miles north of Briancon, their farthest point of advance the preceding day.

The Germans lucky enough to escape to Lyon had a long, hard road ahead to the safety of the German frontier.

In and near Lyon small fleeing enemy columns have been raided repeatedly by French patriots. Nazi losses from these ambushes have been extraordinarily high, reports reaching Rome said.

In the Lyon area Allied warplanes were taking a steadily mounting toll of Germans who, escaped to that communications center, and who were trying desperately to muster transportation for a continued flight.

at mission in Romania, was taken prisoner and escaped.

Quoting a Tass dispatch from the Romanian port of Constanta, where Soviet troops stand only 20 miles from the Bulgarian border, the Moscow radio declared that by all indications Bulgaria announced her neutral "in order to enable the Germans to hide in Bulgaria from prosecution by the Allies."

"This broadcast said German Black sea naval vessels, including submarines, had found a haven in Bulgaria ports, and "in violation of the neutrality proclaimed by Bulgaria, these ships were not subject to a regime of internment."

Moscow declared Bulgarian troops

still were fighting along with Germans against the Yugoslav partisans and the Greeks.

"This additional evidence of the real aims of the Bulgarian government confirms, as all other factors do, that the government of Premier Ivan Bagrianov in reality doesn't think of bringing about a radical change in policy," Moscow declared.

"X x x Bulgarian propaganda is raising a big noise around the declaration of neutrality, attempts at the same time to put into circulation all sorts of rumors, even going so far as to act as if Soviet circles had approved of the present position. These maneuvers have been exposed."

Radio France in Algiers said an armistice between Bulgaria and the Allies might be signed today.

The Bulgarian delegation reached Cairo by plane yesterday and immediately was taken into seclusion by Allied authorities, who issued this statement:

"The Bulgarian armistice delegation has arrived in Cairo, where they will shortly have armistice terms presented to them. A statement will be issued when the armistice has been signed."

east of Dieppe, scene of the commando raid of 1942.

British and Belgians crossed near the mouth of the Seine from 18 to 20 miles east of the doomed Atlantic port of Le Havre, and Canadians flushed the last snipers from historic Rouen, whose river docks make it an immense military prize.

Other Canadian forces, without waiting for the final mop up in Rouen, moved around the city and headed west up the Le Havre peninsula to clean up enemy remnants cut off by the swift British advance to the north.

The fall of Beauvais, 30 miles north of the Seine, and Gournay, 15 miles west, denied to the Germans the Peninsula their most direct route of retreat, and the onrushing British at Amiens threatened to seal off the entire coast to Le Havre, 85 miles southwest.

(A British broadcast recorded by CBS said Americans in the center had reached Clermont, 37 miles north of Paris and due west of Amiens, in whose forest the 1918 armistice was signed and where Adolf Hitler in 1940 forced his truce on beaten France.)

At Amiens the British were on familiar soil, for it was here that their fathers under Sir Douglas Haig launched a counterblow August 8, 1918 that caught the Germans off balance and hastened the day of their final collapse.

Some 200 enemy vehicles caught on a road racing northeast of Amiens in today's clearing weather were wiped out, the RAF reported.

which the enemy is expected to make his main stand in defense of northern Italy—were meeting stiff resistance.

Reports from the field said that not a Nazi was left on the south bank of the Foglia for a distance of 16 miles inland from the Adriatic.

Other Eighth army forces further inland, headquarters said, were approaching the Foglia after occupying the town of Urbino and pushing on five miles beyond in an

advance through difficult mountain terrain in the Apennines.

On the central sector of the front further advances in the upper Tiber and Arno valleys also brought Allied troops close to the Gothic Line.

North of Pontassieve, just east of Florence, several important features were captured, headquarters said, but enemy resistance was reported becoming stronger hourly in this sector.

The situation of the Fifth army front in the west remained unchanged.
