WAR CARRIED BACK TO PHILIPPINES

Nazis Fighting Fiercely To Protect Northern Flank

Allies Struggle To Hold Open Crossing On Rhine

Position of Allied Airborne Forces In Arnhem Sector Officially Described As Critical; First Army Takes Stolberg; Patton's Forces Smashing Forward.

London, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Airborne British and Poles, fiercely beset by a German counterattack from all sides, fought a desperate battle for preservation tonight in an effort to hold open the strategic crossing of the Rhine's upper branch in Holland so the Allies could sweep into northern Germany.

The position of the airborne soldiers, who leaped into the middle of the Germans' northern river defenses 50 miles ahead of Allied lines last Sunday, was officially described as critical at Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's supreme headquarters.

A determined rush of German guns and troops had brought to a standstill the relieving advance of Lt. Gen. Sir Miles C. Dempsey's Second Army tanks two miles north of Nijmegen and six miles short of a junction with the beleaguered force.

The British parachute troops, identified by the Germans as the First Airborne Division, had been reinforced by a Polish unit ferried by air, but mid-weather mist further reinforced the supply difficulty.

The Germans were throwing strong anti-aircraft fire and many of their available planes into attempts to turn back further aerial carriers.

The Germans declared 4,000 of the original landing force—perhaps half its strength—had been wiped out, but Supreme Headquarters gave this statement no confirmation.

It was not known whether the isolated force had managed to keep its hold on the Arnhem bridge—gateway to the Ruhr and potential jumping off place for an end run around the Siegfried Line.

But latest reports said it was maintaining its positions north of the northern arm of the Rhine, and the Germans said invasion units had entered Arnhem itself.

Dempsey was pouring every possible bit of armor across the brilliantly won Nijmegen bridge over the lower Rhine branch, the Waal. British guns were giving some relief to the parachutists, picking off surrounding German targets.

Adriatic Port Of Rimini Falls Opening Way To Po Valley; Americans Capture Vital Road Junction

Rome, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Eighteen army troops swept well into the rich industrial Po valley today after capturing the stubbornly defended seaport of Rimini in a thundering climax to a four weeks' offensive on the Adriatic sector of the Italian front.

Simultaneously American troops of the Fifth army captured Fivizzano, an important road junction in the heart of the Gothic line from which highways extend north and northeast into the Po valley.

The twin victories held the threat of imminent disaster for Nazi Field Marshal Albert Kesselring's troops. The capture of Rimini turned the east side of the Gothic line and allowed Allied troops to spill into the Emilia and Lombard plains on which they can swiftly cut German communications to the Gothic line—centered around mile-high mountains which canalize traffic.

Canadian infantry on the left mopped up San Fortunato and the ridge of the same name, capturing 500 prisoners and surged to the Marecchia river, well west of Rimini.

Rimini was mostly in ruins, for the Germans had turned the city into a fortress target for Allied power.

American units of the Fifth army widened and deepened their penetration of Gothic defenses against reduced enemy opposition, finding large number of enemy dead littering the slopes on which a withering (Continued on page three)

Soviet Forces Smashing Ahead Along All Fronts

Sweep Across Estonia; Gen. Bor Reports Reds Have Crossed Vistula And Joined Poles In Warsaw.

Russian armies brushed aside German resistance today in swift sweeps to within 40 miles of the Estonian capital of Tallinn and less than 15 from the Hungarian frontier at opposite ends of the long, undulating eastern front.

Gen. Bor issued a communiqué from inside besieged Warsaw declaring the Russians had crossed the Vistula and established contact inside the Polish capital with its embattled partisan force. He said Russian planes had successfully dropped more supplies. The Germans asserted that river crossings had been broken up and that "disengagement movements" in Estonia were proceeding according to plan.

Arad, on the immediate approach to Hungary, and Tapa, on the route to the Estonian capital were under attack.

In Latvia, the great seaport of Riga, whose 393,000 persons make it the largest city in the Baltic states, was besieged. Red army troops were only six miles away.

At midnight, the Kremlin announced seizure of the rail town of Bakvere and said the 30-mile isthmus between the gulf and Lake Peipus had been captured. Russians then were reported on the outskirts of Tapa on railroad fanning out to Leningrad, Tallinn and Riga.

A Helsinki dispatch said fires set in Tallinn by the retreating Germans were visible from the north shore of the Finnish gulf, and violent explosions were heard incessantly. (Continued on page three)

Jap Forces Occupy Vital Chinese Port

Present Offensive Is Aimed At Securing Chinese Coast Against Invasion By American Forces.

Chungking, Sept. 22.—(AP)—A Chinese army spokesman announced today that Japanese forces had captured Wuchow, important port on the Siang river in eastern Kwangsi province.

Wuchow is about 180 miles west of Canton and about 170 southeast of Kweilin, where the Americans formerly had their principal eastern China air bases.

Advices last night from the front said the Japanese were within 9-12 miles of Wuchow. The Japanese took the city by a descent from the north and a sweep along the river which carried them across the Kwangsi frontier.

Meanwhile another column of invaders slashing northeastward from Luichow peninsula captured Jungyun, 60 miles southwest of Wuchow. Once the gap between these two points is closed, informed sources said, the Japanese will have a line curving from Hainan to Hongkong, and a large slice of Kwangsi province will be converted into an "offensive-defensive" area against any American landing in this part of the China coast.

The Chinese spokesman said the Japanese might now converge from Jungyun and Wuchow on the Siang river port of Tankchuk, 47 miles west of Wuchow, and then possibly attempt to push on to Luichow, junction of the Hunan-Kwangsi and Kwangsi-Kweichow railroads.

Five More Jap Admirals Killed

New York, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Five more Japanese admirals have died in action, according to a Tokyo broadcast reported today by United States government monitors.

Quoting an announcement made by the Yokosuka naval station, Tokyo identified them as Vice Admiral Tei Monzen and Rear Admirals Tei Seki, Kan Mori, Tsunao Orita and Shin Okubo. Circumstances of their deaths were not disclosed.

Says Roosevelt Better For Job

New York, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Vice President Henry A. Wallace's first speech of the campaign today gave the nation a "liberal's" blueprint of the postwar future, predicated on the re-election of President Roosevelt as the man "who can better provide for permanent peace and full employment."

Speaking before 20,000 persons at Madison Square Garden last night, Wallace declared the campaign issue was not that of indispensability, but which of two men—Roosevelt or Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican presidential nominee—could:

"1. Better cooperate with Churchill, Stalin and the Generalissimo, in writing a lasting, liberal, democratic peace which will best preserve American interests without being unfair to any nation, big or small?"
"2. Best make sure that there are jobs for everybody and therefore good incomes for farmers, white collar workers, business and professional men?"
Asserting that Roosevelt has "the precious asset of long acquaintance" and "continuous, almost daily contact" with Churchill and Stalin, Wallace declared "even a reactionary will not lightly vote to throw such knowledge into the discard." (Continued on page three)

AIRMEN POUND REICH AGAIN

Kassel And Munich Principal Allied Targets Today.

London, Sept. 22.—(AP)—American heavy bombers, 1,200 strong and flying from England and Italy, pounded Kassel behind the Siegfried line and Munich behind the threatened Belfort gap today.

Kassel, a Prussian rail center of 217,000, lies 160 miles southeast of Arnhem in Holland where a definitive battle to outflank the Siegfried line progressed.

Several hundred Mustangs conveyed the Flying Fortresses and Liberators. First reports made no mention of air fights. Bombing was through overcast preventing observation.

The WAR TODAY

Developments of the next few days may give us a pretty good idea of when V-Day will come in Europe. Unofficial reports, from Quebec and the front itself, say that the Allied drive is still ahead of schedule. The latest official word said five days. The latest report is a month, which can be considered from two angles.

It is hardly likely that we have gained any in the actual ground-taking schedule in the last few weeks of increasing German resistance. We could be in better position for the final battle, both as to organization of supplies and reserves, than was expected a month ago.

The conservative appraisal is that France was reconquered somewhat earlier and at smaller cost than expected, so that now we enter the battle of Germany in better shape generally. From here on out there are many imponderables.

A breakthrough at Arnhem in the next few days, which is not too much to expect, could result in the crumbling of the whole German line. Allied officers express doubt as to the value of German defenses along the Dutch border, believing the Nazis rely strongly on the flooded Dutch lowlands. But it is too much to hope that the Germans are entirely dependent on water defenses which proved no real barrier to them in 1940. They undoubtedly have done everything possible to prepare defenses in depth deep into Germany.

So the big factor is the German army—whether it is now offering, with its last strength, a tough but thin crust backed with little fighting, or whether the Allies must penetrate miles and miles of defenses as strongly defended as we have found the outposts.

Bad weather already has come to the channel across which reserves and supplies must move. Patton's tanks have run into heavy rains, which, together with fog in Holland, have interfered with the air arm. Another fortnight will see increasingly bad weather as a regular thing. October would be the month in which to win the war. Now it would be the outside limit unless the Allies were willing to risk some very serious delays.

All of which gives the idea that the fall of Arnhem will see Eisenhower turn loose his Sunday punch.

Today On The Home Front

Editor's note: This is the first of two stories on the reconversion program set up by Congress after months of wrangling and compromising.
Washington, Sept. 22.—(AP)—It's no wonder if the average reader is foggy about the Congress has done about the reconversion program to get this country back on a firm peacetime footing.

The congressional tug-of-war over the points of the program has taken months. Congress finally has passed four principal measures:

1. The "G. I. Bill of Rights" to take care of soldiers and sailors after they are mustered out of the armed services: pay, benefits, training, education and so on.
2. The War Contract Cancellation Act. This is intended to provide fair and speedy settlement of billions of dollars worth of war contracts.
3. The Surplus Property Act. This sets up controls on the disposal of billions of dollars worth of government property after the war.
4. And the act creating the office of War Mobilization and Reconversion. This office is supposed to coordinate—a fancy term which means to make the pieces fit together without conflict—all the government efforts and agencies which have anything to do with getting the nation back to a peacetime basis.

The first two were passed months ago and already are law. The last

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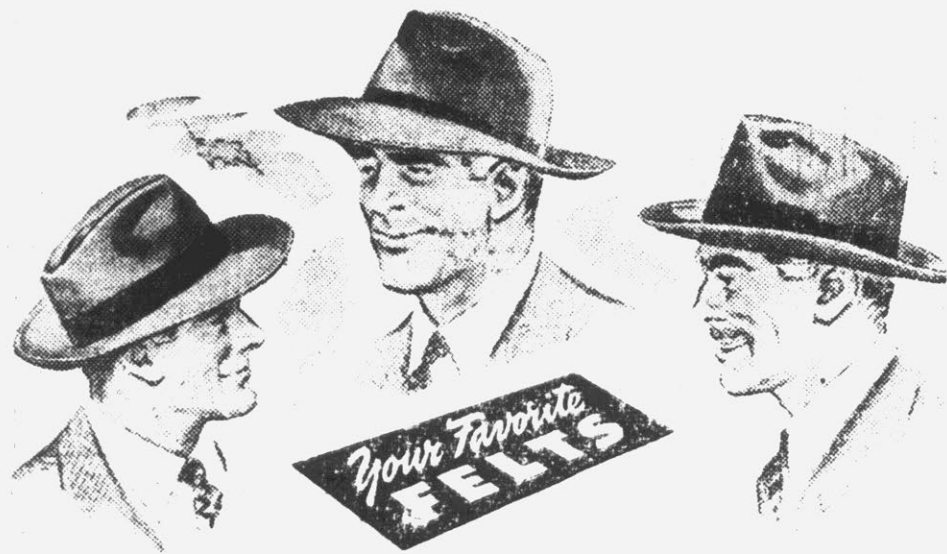
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the armed forces in Porto Rico and former Boy Scout executive secretary in Greenville.

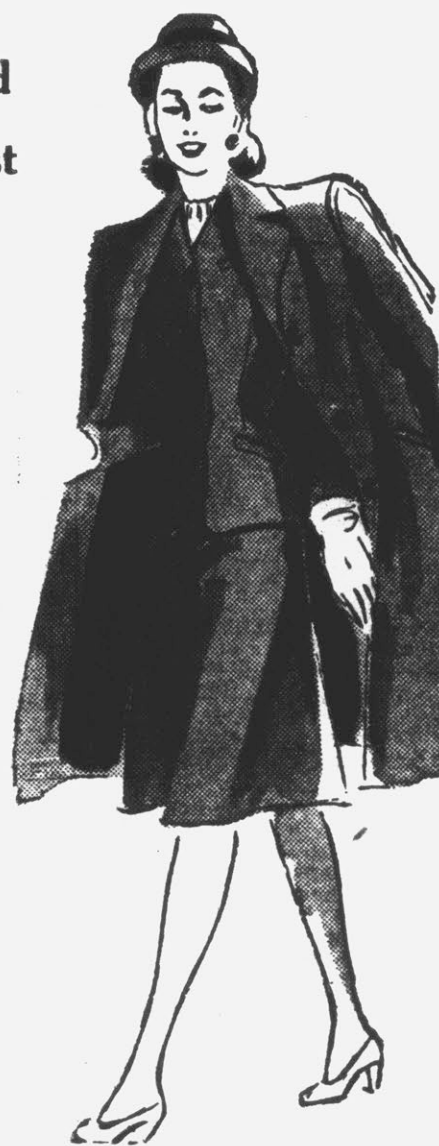

Artillery and machinegun fire had been laid down in order to clear the path of the advance.

Near Italy's west coast, Brazilian troops have been beating steadily northward and keeping pace with U. S. forces farther inland.

The important town of Pietrasanta was captured, 19 miles north northwest of Pisa. The Brazilians were also reported well up on 4,000-foot Mt. Prano, six miles east of Pietrasanta.

The vain effort to hold the sagging eastern end of the Gothic line cost the Nazis heavily in manpower.

An official frontline report said the 71st and 98th German infantry divisions "have lost the greater part of their effective fighting strength."

Greenville has been prevailed upon to accept the position of Alumni Secretary.

At the urging of Dr. McGinnis and of the special alumni committee, headed by Mrs. J. C. Holland of Raleigh, Mrs. Garner resigned her office as president of the Alumni Association to take charge of the work of the Alumni Office for the College and the Association. To make it possible for her to take the new place, City Supt. J. H. Rose willingly released her from her teaching position in the Greenville schools. She has been succeeded as president by the vice-president, Mrs. Augusta Woodward Marcom of Raleigh.

This placing of the ECTC alumni work on a permanent basis is the realization of a goal set a number of years ago by active alumnae. For some years the association found it possible to provide only a part-time worker, but with the appointment of Miss Estelle McGinnis of Elizabeth City in 1940, through the efforts of Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart Bennett of Forest City, then president, the office became a full-time one, depending still, however, entirely on voluntary alumni support.

The alumni committee appointed to work with the Board of Trustees and the State Budget Committee to investigate the possibility of a permanent secretary was composed of Mrs. Holland, Miss Grace Smith of Greenville, and Miss Wita Bond of Rocky Mount. The matter was presented to the Board of Trustees by Mrs. Charles M. Johnson of Raleigh, an alumna member of the Board, in the form of a resolution that the Budget Committee of the Board include in the college budget for the coming year an amount to set up a permanent alumni secretary with a salary similar to that of the alumni secretaries at other state colleges and universities, and received the unanimous support of the Board.

Mrs. Garner, the new secretary, has both her B. A. and her M. A. degrees from East Carolina Teachers College. Before coming to the Greenville city school system six years ago, she had taught in Newport, Whitakers, and Grimesland.

She was an active president of the Greenville chapter of the alumni for a year, and became president of the Association in June, 1943. Since there was no alumni secretary on the campus last year, Mrs. Garner practically did the work of a secretary in addition to carrying her responsibilities as the association president, and is thus thoroughly familiar with the work she began officially the first of September.

The chief goals of the work this year, says Mrs. Garner, will be not only the building up of an association strong in number of individual members and of chapters, but also the developing of an interested alumni, informed, and active in their support.

"Those days are never coming back again," he asserted. "They are not coming back because we are never again going to submit to mass unemployment. Government's first job in the peacetime years ahead will be to see that conditions exist which promote widespread job opportunities in private enterprise."

"There are many means to that end, including the creation of foreign markets and the promotion of foreign trade. If at any time there are not sufficient jobs in private employment to go around, then government can and must create additional job opportunities."

"There must be jobs for all." Reiterating his approval of unemployment insurance, old age pension and minimum wage laws, Dewey said the Republicans also were committed to the proposition that "the prices of major farm crops must be supported against the menace of disastrous collapse."

Dewey said future government action "must be of a character consistent with the American system of opportunity for all, and it must be administered by men and women who believe in and understand American workers, American business men and American farmers."

He urged revision of complicated government regulations, asserting: "There can be neither freedom nor a healthy economy under laws and decrees which are so multitudinous that business men, labor leaders and, indeed, citizens generally, cannot be law-abiding except by doing nothing."

infantry attack against the west flank of Gen. Ivan Bagration's forces besieging the Latvian port of Riga was beaten off. The Germans still hold a narrow land corridor connecting Riga with western Latvia, Lithuania and East Prussia.

In a drive that may doom the rest of the divisions of the Hungarian army and crack the Magyar people's will to resist, Malinovsky turned his columns north from the

mouth of the Mures valley, where it meets the Danubian plain. Pushing close to the railway center of Arad from two sides, the Red army troops were within 17 miles of the Hungarian-Romanian frontier

and were advancing steadily in the direction of Oradea, rail junction 68 miles away. There the Russians could sever communications of the German and Hungarian defenders of northern Transylvania.

(Moscow was silent on operations at Warsaw, but the German radio indicated the Russians had established bridgeheads on the west bank of the Vistula just north and south of the capital.)

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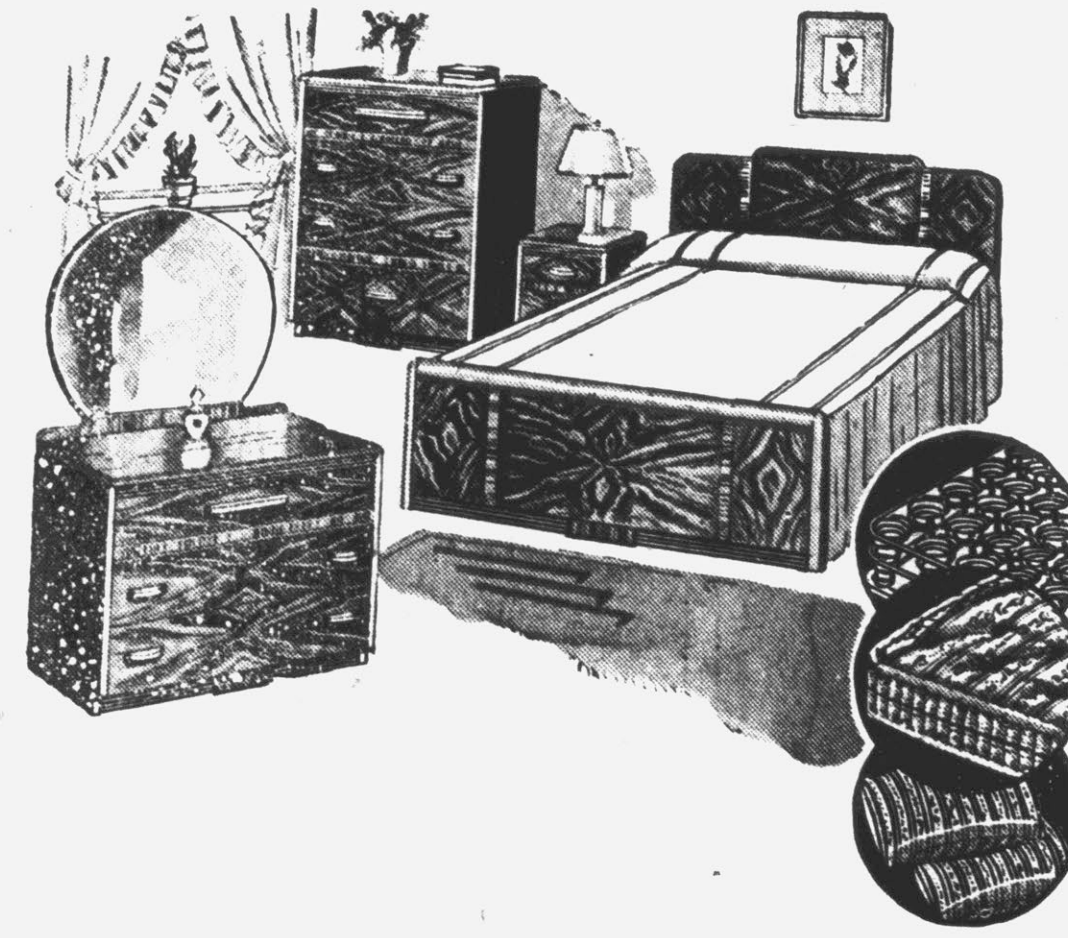

Thus OWMR is to do for peace time what OWM did for wartime. Actually, however OWMR will be operating in wartime. For when Germany quits, there still will be the war against Japan. (Tomorrow: Other highlights on the Reconversion bill.)

Montreal, Sept. 22 (AP)—The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration's Policy Committee approved today a United States proposal to expend \$50,000,000 for relief in Italy. The UNRRA council is expected to follow suit Monday.

Pamphlet On Social Security Is Free

E. A. Hoffman, assistant manager of the Rocky Mount office of the Social Security board said today that his organization is making a special effort at this time to inform salaried workers as well as wage earners concerning their rights and obligations under old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security act.

"Because many workers over age 65 who are eligible for old-age insurance payments will be giving up their jobs within the coming year," he added, "we particularly want them to have the information they need, in order to make their benefits count."

This pamphlet, known as Circular 35, "Old-Age and Survivors Insurance for Workers and Their Families," tells where, when and how to apply for payments. It shows how a person may qualify for old-age

Army power drive 19 miles beyond Nancy plowed into fresh enemy armored forces in the Arrancourt area. Americans and Germans fought through the fourth day of the greatest tank battles since Normandy.

American tankmen in that area ran into 45 more German tanks as the morning mists lifted, after destroying 100 in three days there.

The German communiqué said the Allied push from Nijmegen had been halted, and that an all-out attack had been launched with the aim of annihilating the isolated remnants at Arnhem, identified by Berlin as the British First Airborne division. The Germans said yesterday the division had largely been wiped out.

Another German broadcast said a push from the south already had linked up with the Arnhem force. A third said the Arnhem force already had been liquidated. Again it was declared that the fierce fight was continuing and that German forces everywhere in Holland had gone over to the counterattack.

Allied dispatches saying the airborne force still held the Arnhem bridge was inconclusive, as they were dated two days ago.

Against this the BBC quoted a front reporter today as saying the Germans still held the bridge, but British troops had established a bridgehead on the north side and had the span itself under fire. The Germans were attempting to flee north over the bridge, said this broadcast recorded by CBS.

Meanwhile, the British shoved out on both sides of Eindhoven, to

their rear, and broadened to 25 miles the base of their 45-mile deep corridor across Holland through which a one-way flow of men and armor was streaming toward the river crossing nearest Berlin.

Somer, 10 miles east of Eindhoven, and Wintelre, six miles westward, were reached, and the Waal crossing was made secure by wiping out in Nijmegen itself a pocket of Germans with which advance elements had not bothered.

Lt. Gen. Herman B. Ramcke, who commanded the Brest garrison, was flown to England as a prisoner of war. The Germans announced the beginning of attacks on St. Nazaire, another U-boat nest in Brittany.

Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's troops had battered their way to within six miles of Metz, perhaps the greatest inland fortress city in western Europe, had cleared the Nazis from Lunville, 25 miles south of Nancy, and won high ground along the Meurthe 10 miles farther south-east near Flin in a closing action on Beccarat, 40 miles from the Strasbourg crossing of the Rhine.

The Third army battled across the Seltz river somewhere in the Chateau-Salins-Moyenvie Dieuze area, 18 to 28 miles northeast of Nancy, but was thrown back.

The Germans announced that American troops had broken into the Remiremont, but were dislodged after a hard fight. This is in a sector linking the Third and Seventh armies.

Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's Seventh army also was forced back a mile or two from Verdun, 17 miles southwest of Belfort in the Pont-de-Ronde area, to Grand Bois. But these were the only sectors where the Allies yielded a foot in the face of fanatical resistance.

Other forces of the Seventh army pounded forward into stiff artillery fire east of Epinal, on the Moselle 35 miles south of Nancy, and reached Mabsouhans and Mabsouhans, two villages three miles apart.

Lt. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' First army was blocked temporarily from exploiting its penetration of the Siegfried line, but was slowly widening its wedge in the German defense system north and south of Aachen.

These veterans drove five miles inside Germany at a point 12 miles north of Aachen, mopped up in

the forests at the base of their wedge south of Aachen and were blasting out the last Nazi-held houses in industrial Stolberg east of Aachen.

(The American First army has occupied Stolberg in Germany, a blue network correspondent reported today. This industrial city of 23,000 is four miles east of Aachen and 32 miles from Cologne on the Rhine.)

Other forces which had bypassed Stolberg were four miles farther east and about 28 miles from Cologne on the Rhine, but apparently had been pinned down there in heavy engagements.

About 1,700 more Germans were captured in the mop-up of the last Nazi pocket between Antwerp and Terneuzen, where the Poles reached the Schelde Estuary in southwestern Holland.

The count of prisoners taken by Canadians at Boulogne mounted to 7,500 as infantry closed in on Le-port, a stronghold two miles south of Boulogne, and Wimereux, three miles north on the port.

The Audierne naval base northwest of Lorient on the south coast of Brittany has not been heard from since September 19. Berlin broadcast said, and coincident with the report of attacks on St. Nazaire the Germans said artillery deployments were taking place about Lorient, the other remaining Nazi-held Breton submarine base.

The Germans claimed to be still holding La Rochelle, a submarine base to the south of Brittany.

West of the British wedge driven north through Holland, the Germans declared an Allied bridge over the Meuse-Schelde canal near Aart had been liquidated. The Germans said the British had been trying to reinforce Allied air-borne forces at Tilburg from this bridgehead.

ers, a large transport, 10 large cargo ships, and 12 medium cargo ships. A floating drydock also probably was sunk.

The Mitscher-Halsey armada, which since August 30 has accounted for 286 Japanese ships and 908 planes, the bulk of them in the Philippines area, struck ahead of invasion forces gathering in advanced bases south and east of Mindanao.

Tokyo radio said 150 carrier planes attacked in three waves in the Manila sector in the morning and 200 in the afternoon. It claimed 24 were downed. Tokyo announced that the puppet president, Jose P. Laurel, declared martial law throughout the Philippines, effective the day of the raid.

The dispatch of such a huge fleet toward the Philippines reflected confidence in the outcome of the invasion of the Palaus, 515 miles east of Mindanao, where Marines are locked with ridge-entrenched Japanese in one of the most savage engagements of the Pacific war.

Nimitz, in a communiqué preceding the special one on the Manila raid, said the Leathernecks on Peleliu in the southern Palaus have won all the east shore and two small islands nearby, and have killed more than 6,000 Nipponese. But 3,000 more Japanese, taking advantage of the most difficult terrain encountered by the Americans anywhere in the Pacific, are putting up a bitter, bloody stand on the west coast.

(The key to the situation is a ridge called "Bloody Nose" by the Marines. Today in a broadcast from Peleliu, William Ewing, blue network correspondent, said the conquest of that ridge in the Umurbrogol mountains was but a matter of hours.)

Demonstrating that the United States has the navy strength for a diversity of action, the day of the Manila attack cruisers and destroyers off Peleliu supported the Marines in their bitter struggle by pouring shells into the enemy network of defenses.

A constant umbrella of American planes at the invasion scene added their bombs to the attack. Other planes swung north to prevent Japanese air bases elsewhere in the

Palaus from interfering at Peleliu. South of Peleliu, Angaur island has been completely conquered by the 81st army division against much lighter opposition than that massed against the Marines. There 800 Nipponese have been slain.

In the southwest Pacific, where Gen. Douglas MacArthur has gained a base at Morofai, within 300 miles of the Philippines, he announced today the dropping of 215 tons of explosives on adjacent Halmahera island and on Ceram and Celebes.

German fighters ventured out in greater strength yesterday in defense of the Reich itself, and 30 were shot from the cloudy skies by alert American fliers.

Four American planes were listed as lost.

Medium bombers attacked German rail centers at Ehrang, Gerolstein and Fromfeld, running to 16 the number of supply feeder points bombed since Tuesday.

Bombers attacked the Creche forest on the outskirts of Boulogne, to which the German garrison of the port apparently had retreated.

Weather hampered air offensive from both the west and south, although planes in the Mediterranean

cheater set fires at Salonika, the great Greek port, which were visible for 100 miles.

About 2,000 sorties were flown from the west in muggy weather.

The Germans made four challenges.

As, although their planes were outnumbered about 20 to 1, in the greatest of the daylight, yesterday, 30 Messerschmitts and Focke-Wulfs were destroyed of 60 planes which attacked.

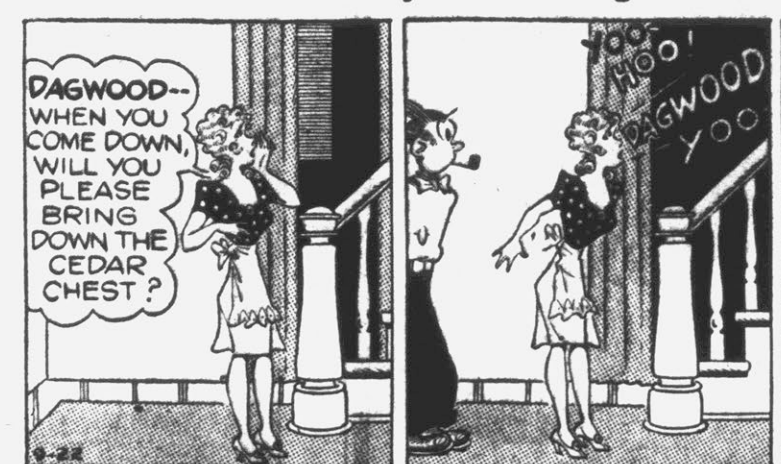

Greenville Market Is Forging Ahead

Greenville tobacco warehousemen and buyers and the redrying plants are doing a great job disposing of the unusually heavy breaks of tobacco on the market this season. The warehousemen are effectively using the selling time allotted and the sales forces are functioning like an Elgin watch, an observer of the market said today.

Prices are holding up satisfactorily and, in spite of temporarily blocked sales, farmers are pleased with the prices being paid for tobacco, especially the lower grades. Incidentally, much inferior leaf is being offered here as a result of the long dry period over weather last June and the rapid growth of the crop after the crop-saving rain of June 30.

After observing sales here and on other markets it is apparent to the casual observer that the selling and buying organization on the Greenville tobacco market is much above the average. Convincing evidence of this is the fact that farmers selling tobacco here now have been selling in Greenville through succeeding generations. The feature of the Greenville market at this time is the outstanding efficient methods of handling the heavy sales and satisfactory prices.

"We are getting the finest kind of cooperation from the warehousemen, the buyers and the redrying plants and the good sales we are making is appreciated by the growers," Bob Rankin, sales supervisor, said.

Germans Reported Evacuating Greece

Cairo, Sept. 22 — (AP)—Reliable reports said today that the Germans have abandoned the greater part of Peloponnesus, southernmost sector of Greece proper.

The 8,35 square mile area, about a sixth of Greece, is virtually an island, linked to the mainland by a narrow land bridge west of Athens. Peloponnesus includes such towns as Sparta, Patrai, Pyrgos and Kalamata. Its defense has become increasingly untenable since the Russians overran Romania and Bulgaria and Marshal Tito in Yugoslavia started an offensive to cut all rail communications.

The reports said German movements from southern and northern Greece still continued as Baron Maximilian von Weichs, Field Marshal commanding German armies in the Balkans, strove to extricate his forces.
