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Red Pincers Offensive Against Hungary Cracks Frontier Fortifications

Strong Propaganda Campaign Urging Hungarians To Surrender Opened Today; German Losses On Northern Front Continue To Mount As Battle For Riga Grows In Fury.

Moscow, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Russia opened today with a strong propaganda campaign urging Hungarians to surrender as Red army troops tighten a pincer offensive against Hitler's last Balkan vassal state.

Leaflets dropped over the Hungarian lines encouraged the enemy troops to capitulate. The leaflets declared the Romanians were well received when they threw down their arms. Broadcasts informed the Hungarians that it was not too late to desert Hitler and save themselves.

The Russian offensive against Hungary has cracked a 90-mile stretch of frontier fortifications along the Czech-Polish border defending the Ruthenian highlands, and is sweeping west through northern Transylvania.

Gen. Ivan Petrov's combined Russian-Czechoslovak forces, driving a wedge into every important Ruthenian pass, extended their grip on pre-war Czechoslovakia's frontier to 160 miles.

Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky scored a major success in the eastern Carpathians by capturing the Transylvanian city of Targu Mures and crossing the Mures river line at a point within 50 miles east of Cluj, the Hungarian-annexed Transylvanian capital.

Operations of Malinovsky's forces on the Hungarian plain from western Romania were not mentioned officially here.

A Bucharest broadcast said the Russians had broken into Oradea, a strategic rail city controlling one of the main Nazi escape routes out of Transylvania. It is only six miles from the pre-war Hungarian frontier.

Berlin reports implied that Red army troops temporarily had smashed into Szeged, Hungary's second city, 95 miles southeast of Budapest.

In the north the battle for the Latvian port of Riga grew in fury. The Germans were knocked out of 30 additional settlements, but enemy resistance definitely stiffened.

An official summation last night said that Marshal Leonid A. Govorov's clearing of the Estonian mainland had cost the Germans over 30,000 killed and 15,745 prisoners between September 17 and 26.

The Swiss radio said the Russians landed on the islands of Hiiuma (Dago) and Saare (Osel) off the Estonian coast. Capture of the islands would complete the ousting of the Germans from all Estonian territory.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Here are things for a veteran and his family to remember to do when he returns home after his discharge from the service.

Government insurance. He'll probably want to keep his national service life insurance in force. This insurance he got in the Army. It runs up to \$10,000. If it lapses, he won't be able to buy similar protection for himself and family for the same cost.

To keep it up he will have to pay the premiums direct. (In the Army he may have paid it direct but most likely had the money allotted out of his pay.) He should make his check or money order payable to the Treasurer of the United States and mail it to the Collection Subdivision, Veterans Administration, Washington, 25, D. C.

He can arrange to make the payments monthly, quarterly, every six months, or once a year.

His insurance originally was issued on what is called the five-year level-premium term. Before those five years are up he can convert it into ordinary life insurance, 20-payment life, or 30-payment life.

The new policy will have a regular cash value after the first year. Then he can borrow from it if necessary.

SAYS PRESS IS IN FOREFRONT

President Praises Newspapers For Job Well Done.

New York, Sept. 30.—(AP)—In a statement on the observation of National Newspaper Week, Oct. 1-8, President Roosevelt says the Free Press of America "is in the forefront of Democracy's battle for survival" and "will help to win the peace."

The President said in a message appearing in Editor and Publisher, newspaper trade journal:

"The Free Press of America is a living symbol of Democracy, and as such, it is in the forefront of Democracy's battle for survival. It is helping to win that battle and will help to win the peace and a better and free world in the future."

"The press of America has upheld the hand of the soldier at the front and the worker on the production line. By providing the people with honest news, it has enlightened the minds of the people and strengthened their will. It has loyally shared in the sacrifices imposed by the need for national security materials. It has gladly and voluntarily abided by a code of censorship."

"The American press has met the test of our greatest national crisis with courage, loyalty and integrity, and to the members of the Newspaper Association managers, as representatives of that press, I am happy to send greetings."

SHAKE-UP IN POLISH RULE

Move Is Designed To Placate Moscow Government.

London, Sept. 30.—(AP)—General Kazimierz Sosnkowski was ousted today as commander-in-chief of Poland's armed forces in a move to placate Russia and pave the way for resumption of friendly Polish-Soviet relations.

Yielding finally to the persuasion of peasant-born Polish premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk and the pressure of the British government, President Wladyslaw Rakiewicz signed the decree dismissing his long-time friend as Poland's military leader.

The country's military leadership was transferred at the same time to the hero of the Warsaw uprising and commander of Poland's underground army, Gen. Tadeusz (Bor) Komorowski—until a few days ago known only as "General Bor."

Bor was regarded in London quarters as acceptable to Moscow. His communications from within Warsaw in recent days have reported that his forces were working in close cooperation with the Red army.

The development left still unsolved the problems arising from the fact Poland continues to have two military chiefs—Bor and Gen. Rola-Bymierski, commander of the rival regime set up by the National Liberation committee.

But today's step may prove a prelude toward resumption of talks between Marshal Stalin and Mikolajczyk.

The necessity for haste in reaching a conclusion with Moscow is underscored by these reasons:

1. Formation under Soviet auspices of the rival government which has moved in behind the Red army to take over civil administration in liberated areas of Poland.

2. Desire of the London government in exile to utilize resources of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration to help rescue its stricken people from famine and disease.

3. A belief, shared by many high Allied diplomats as well as Polish officials, that the Polish-Russian difficulties must be solved now to avoid a civil war after victory over Germany.

Today's action came only two days after Prime Minister Churchill placed Britain squarely behind the "right" of the Soviet's territorial demands upon Poland.

It was a bitter pill for the hard-bitten, tough-talking able Sosnkowski. The reaction upon Polish troops who have been used in some of the most dangerous assignments of the war in western Europe remained uncertain.

**Flash Flood In
East Tennessee**

Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Flash flood waters from the highest rain in the city's history receded today leaving widespread property damage but not confirmed loss of life.

Traffic was blocked completely in some sections of Knoxville by the 7.6 inch downpour that fell in 27 hours and hundreds of persons were evacuated from their homes.

At Lake City other persons were forced to flee as waters reached before receding. More than 100 families were routed at Murfreesboro in the central part of the state.

Nazis Fighting Bitterly To Halt Allies In Italy

Counterattacks Pinch Off One Small British Bridgehead; Americans Take Highway Center.

Rome, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Furious German counterattacks have pinched off the small bridgeheads won by the British Eighth Army across the Fiumicino River eight miles northwest of Rimini, but similar savage efforts to wrest Monte Battaglia, 11 miles below Imola, from the Fifth Army have failed. Allied headquarters announced today.

Steadily rooting the enemy from commanding heights overlooking the roads into the Po Valley, both American and British forces of the Fifth Army reported moderate gains in the central sector of the Italian front.

The Americans captured Gignola, an important highway town seven and a half miles northeast of Fiumicino, and patrols forged ahead into Belvedere, 18 miles southeast of Bologna.

Other American units pushed more than three miles up highway 65 toward Bologna from La Masetta to Filigare.

Enemy efforts to regain Monte Battaglia, which overlooks most of the route down the northern slope of the Apennines to the Bologna-Rimini highway, were launched in heavy strength. One Nazi regiment was beaten off Thursday and another yesterday.

Other Fifth Army troops captured the village of Montefredente, nine miles northwest of Fiumicino, and nearby Monte Balestra.

From the west coast sector, where the Brazilians and other units have been advancing slowly, came only a report that pressure was maintained on the enemy with aggressive patrolling.

**What About Real Estate
Says Now Is Time To Sell Old Houses**

Babson Park, Mass., Sept. 30.—I don't know what is happening in all sections of the country, but I am getting many very bullish reports on the demand for small and medium sized houses. Houses that could have been bought for \$7.00 six months ago are now being sold at \$10.00. There has not been much activity as yet in vacant land, but houses are turning over very rapidly at large price increases.

What Are the Reasons?
As birds instinctively build nests so married couples like to have a home. Up to the present time many of them have not had the money to buy a home. Furthermore, there have been enough vacant houses which could be rented. All at once people have realized that they now have enough money to buy a house on a safe mortgage and at the same time find it very difficult to rent a house. These people might be doing the wise thing if they can get the houses at reasonable prices, but it would be better for them to "sleep in a tent" for a while than to pay foolishly high prices.

The real estate market today is where the stock market was in 1928. Then when the stock market suddenly discovered that the supply of good stocks was limited, they stampeded one another to buy stocks. Hence, the market went to unwarranted high prices and then collapsed in the fall of 1929. Frankly, I think the same thing will some day happen again. People will find that the present supply of good stocks is limited and, before long, will stampede to buy them. This will result in the stock market selling at much higher prices; but finally, through a fear of communism or some other bugaboo, prices will again collapse.

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Do no building now although you can put in the concrete cellar if you wish to and in most communities can engage the brick, lumber, etc. Get a standard plan from your builder and have it understood that he is to build your house as soon as the war is over. Then you should get a better house than you can now buy and should get it for less money.

JAPS GAIN ON CHINA FRONT

American Airmen Smash At Jap Positions.

Chungking, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Fighting near Hsuan, railway town only 31 miles northeast of Kweilin, was reported tonight by the Chinese high command. Continued street fighting in Paoching, 145 miles north northeast of Kweilin, also was announced and it was admitted that the Japanese had reached Tanchuk on the west river.

"The Japanese already have claimed complete occupation of both Paoching, 65 miles west of Hsuan, and Tanchuk."

The high command communique said Japanese regulars east of the Hunan-Kwangsi railway, advanced southward yesterday.

U. S. Fourteenth air force heavy bombers have sunk a 15,000-ton whaler in Formosa strait, Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced today.

American Liberators have bombed Samshui, 30 miles west of Canton, starting fires and secondary explosions in the eastern part of the city. Escorting P-51s encountered 15 to 20 enemy fighters destroying two, probably destroying one and damaging two. The American planes were undamaged.

Striking at the Japanese advance toward Kweilin, capital of Kwangsi province and site of an abandoned American air base, American fighters rained 135 miles northeast of that city, shooting up a concentration of enemy vehicles, bridges, barracks, troops and river junks.

**Condemn 22,000
Jars Mayonnaise**

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—(AP)—More than 22,000 jars of mayonnaise, salad dressing and sandwich spread have been withdrawn from sale in 13 places in North Carolina.

Dr. E. W. Constable, head of the Department of Agriculture Food Division and State Chemist, said the products were "unfit for human consumption."

Held under State embargo at Roxboro, Henderson, Pilot Mountain, Elkin, Greensboro, High Point, Graham, Rougemont, Durham, Burlington, Thomasville and Mt. Airy are approximately 10,000 jars of "Temple Garden" products manufactured by Canova Foods, Inc., Memphis, Tenn.

A quantity of mayonnaise made by Calveas Brothers of Norfolk, Va., were removed from sale because of alleged adulteration.

Dr. Constable said two other brands of dressing, "Salannaise," prepared by Ivanhoe Foods, Inc., Auburn, N. Y., and "Warren's Home Made Mayonnaise" made in Columbia, S. C., were converted into salad because "mineral oils had been substituted for edible oils."

**Greenville Flier
Killed In Crash**

First Lieutenant Donald A. Edwards, of this city, pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber was killed in the crash of his plane in New Mexico Wednesday night according to information received here by his mother, Mrs. Addie Edwards, besides Lt. Edwards, seven other officers and three enlisted men died in the accident.

In addition to his mother, Lt. Edwards, 27, is survived by his wife, who lives in California, and three brothers and five sisters of this county.

**Says America
Going Too Far**

London, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Manchester Guardian, one of the best known English newspapers outside London, declared in an editorial today that the United States "is going rather far in its measures of coercion" against Argentina.

The United States, the newspaper added, "has barred its ships from calling at Argentine ports and no doubt would like us to follow suit."

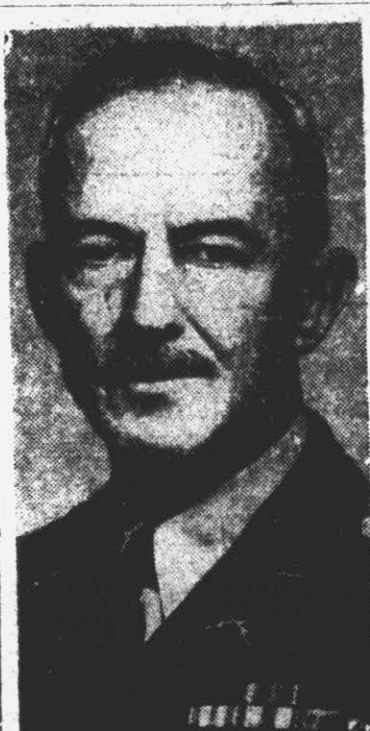
We like the Argentine brand of Fascism as little as does Mr. Cordell Hull, but we also prefer Argentine beef to American pork.

MORE PALAU ISLES TAKEN

Yanks Seize Stepping Stones To Philippines.

New York, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Tokyo radio said today that "about 20 small islands" had been taken in the Palau north of Peleliu Thursday (Japanese Time).

The Domestic Broadcast, recorded by the Federal Communications Commission, added that Marcus Island, about 874 miles northwest of Wake, was raided yesterday afternoon by "several" Liberator bombers.

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Taking three more strides against the stepping stones that lead westward to the Philippines, U. S. forces today controlled nine islands of the strategic Palau group, and a new airfield.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced last night that Kongaur, Ngesubus with its 4,800 foot fighter strip, and an unnamed island "have been made secure."

U. S. forces thus increased the usefulness of the excellent captured airstrip on Peleliu, which the Japanese expended almost 9,000 men to defend. This field, and others in the Palau, are little more than 500 miles east of the Philippines.

By invading the three islets the Americans drove Japanese artillery out of range of the Peleliu bomber field.

Added to the flying facilities of the Palau, the Americans have other bases close to the Philippines and Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communique today indicated he is

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Hitler's V-3, as described from France, is just another rocket, and the only new things about it are its huge size and its substitution of alcohol for gasoline fuel, and even the latter is not altogether new.

Sixty feet long, five feet in diameter is the description. Divided by three, it sounds like the meteorological rocket which Dr. Robert Goddard was firing in New Mexico years before 1939. His was a long cylindrical tube, an air torpedo in looks.

German rocket experimenters before the war were using various fuels, including powder, liquid oxygen and gasoline.

The V-3 is said to use liquid air, which is probably not an important change, as the purpose of either liquid air or of liquid oxygen is to get enough oxygen to keep the explosive jet burning to drive the projectile.

Substitution of alcohol for gasoline could be a confession of acute oil shortage. Alcohol certainly would make a fine rocket fuel, but gasoline contains more heat energy, volume for volume and weight for weight.

The engine which drove the buzz-bomb to London evidently has been abandoned for the V-3. The buzz-bomb draws its oxygen from the air outside. That would not be possible for V-3 as described. The buzz-bomb flies low. V-3 is said to start almost straight up, like a

long-range artillery shell. The French reports give no idea of the amount of explosive in V-3. Take-off weight is 14 tons. Much of this may be fuel, but how much would be in the range. The only information about the weapon's power is that it has "an explosive radius of three kilometers," or almost two miles.

But the words explosive radius do not necessarily mean very wide destructive power. The absorbing power of air is tremendous. As it passes the air waves are able to do considerable damage to structures which happen to be situated just right, but the lethal power is long gone.

If the V-3 is a short range weapon, 30 miles or less, the radio control is easy to understand. If it is long range, the efficiency of radio control is not so easy. A huge rocket of this type would travel much faster than any airplane, although maybe the unknown but highly touted speeds of German rocket planes might be a help in keeping track of one.

will usually require certain information, such as his serial number, details of his discharge, and, in some cases, proof of the relationship of dependents.

The most important records are the following: Army or Marine Corps' serial number, Navy service or the number, Coast Guard service number, discharge papers, disability

claim—"C"—number, insurance policies, social security card, birth certificate of himself and family, marriage certificate, divorce decrees, will and testament, and selective service registration card.

He should get those records in order now.

making good use of them. He said planes flying from them sank or damaged 17 Japanese craft, ranging from small freighters to barges.

Bitter fighting by the Japanese to defend their Palau strongholds underscored the importance they attach to the American thrust toward the Philippines.

American Marines and soldiers have killed 8,717 Japanese on Peleliu and 1,955 on nearby Angaur, a total of 9,772. Fighting has raged since September 15 and the Japanese are battling to the bitter end from isolated pockets, on Peleliu.

The three nearby islets were invaded Wednesday and Nimitz said Neesbus was captured the same day. The next day, Kongsauru was secured, along with the nearby unnamed island.

invasion.

British planes met them head-on, destroyed 33, damaged 16, and kept them from getting into strafing range of British ground forces at any time in the fight. A single British plane was lost.

American paratroops helped the British beat off the attacks without losing more than a couple of aircraft.

Southwest of Nijmegen the British widened their corridor within four miles of the Dutch communications center of Hertogenbosch which the Germans fortified to hold an escape corridor to the north around the Borad Mass estuary for troops hemmed tightly in western Holland.

Lt. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' longhairs were punching into German defenses again all the way from north of Aachen to the southern tip of Luxembourg.

They gained a mile northeast of Sittard on the Dutch-German frontier 20 miles north of Aachen and drove anew against Hurtgen, fourteen miles southeast of that besieged fortress town.

They made only what the communiqué called "limited progress" in the Siegfried-denting attack to the southwest of Prüm, eight miles inside the German border midway between Aachen and Trier, but knocked out eight strongpoints in a single attack and were forging ahead.

The doughboys liberated Monpach and Wasserbillig on the Luxembourg border just six miles west of Trier and captured Haute-Contz. The Seventh army was running into heavy fire of German artillery concentrations—a whole thundering arsenal from field guns to six-barreled rocket mortars.

The Germans for the first time were taking the initiative in patrol operations, however, probing Allied lines for thin spots in every indication of a fierce fighting stand in the Vases.

In addition to the above, the Utilities Commission has retired during the year, \$25,000.00 of Rural Electrification Revenue Bonds and \$5,000.00 Vanceboro Notes. (Making a total retirement for the year of \$30,000.00)

Total Paid to City and Retirement of Bonds and Bond Interest for the Year \$164,439.79

During the year an additional \$70,000.00 has been invested in War Bonds, making a total of \$105,000.00, this being a continuation of the adopted policy of the Board of Commissioners in anticipation of future growth and urgent requirements immediately following the close of the War, in an effort to keep future bond issues for expansion and development to a minimum.

Improvements were made during the Year to the extent of \$33,121.46 compared with the previous Year of \$7,020.19. The Utilities Commission has also advanced to the City a total of \$24,000.00 for the purchase of the Airport property.

This report is being published in connection with the Annual Audit at the request of your Board of Commissioners, in order to enlighten you as to the disposition of the Commission's Revenue for the Year, and to give some insight as to the benefits the Taxpayers are receiving due to the ownership of the Water, Lights and Gas Utilities.
