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Russians Smash Deeper Into German Territory

Berlin Says Reds Have Penetrated 35 Miles Into East Prussia; Forces Massed Along Norwegian Frontier; Additional Gains Registered In Hungary And Yugoslavia.

Moscow, Oct. 24. (AP)—Russian penetration of German territory to a depth of at least 19 miles in East Prussia was proclaimed today in the first Moscow announcement of a powerful Red army offensive that already has captured 400 Nazi towns and villages.

Summarizing results of a thrust from western Lithuania that the Germans have been reporting for a week, a Russian communiqué said Gen. Ivan D. Cherniakhovsky's Third White Russian army had broken through frontier defenses on an 87-mile front on the east.

Gen. Ivan C. Bagration's First Baltic army cleared the way to spring into the homeland of the Junkers from the north—and may already have done so.

The Soviet bulletin announced Bagration's troops had occupied all of Memel territory except the port of Memel itself, where the German garrison was cut off, and had massed along the Niemen river, East Prussia's northern border, from the Baltic to Jurbarkas in Lithuania.

Twenty salvoes from each side of the main highway and rail routes from Kaunas, Lithuania, to Osterburg and Königsberg, Unsterburg, a hub of five railways 37 miles from the border, appeared the immediate strategic prize.

Late dispatches said the Russians were approaching Gumbinnen, on the main westward route only 15 miles east of Unsterburg and 63 miles from Königsberg, East Prussian capital.

Conflicting Reports On Spanish Uprising

AIRMEN POUND ESSEN AGAIN

RAF Fliers' Weather Snow Storm To Reach Target.

London, Oct. 24. (AP)—Strong forces of German night fighters, saved for defense of prized targets, swarmed over Essen last night to challenge a fleet of 1000 RAF heavy bombers which attacked the great armament and railway center in the heart of the Ruhr.

The bombers, which flew through the first heavy snowstorm of the season over the Western front, also encountered the fiercest ground barrage they have met on their last seven trips to the Ruhr.

While the heavies were unloading their bombs at Essen a small force of fast Mosquitos shot on across northern Germany and attacked Berlin.

Thick clouds began enveloping the bombers as they started across (Continued on page six)

Fighting Between Franco's Troops And 'Reds' Reported In Several Localities.

London, Oct. 24. (AP)—Conflicting reports of armed clashes in Spain reached London today and it was not yet clear whether the action involved only frontier skirmishes or an organized and formidable revolt against Generalissimo Francisco Franco's Falangist regime.

An authoritative source cautioned against overestimating the extent of the hostilities. Official quarters said they had no information confirming reports of a general uprising.

It was pointed out, however, that strong, well-equipped Maquis forces including a high percentage of Spanish Republicans were in southwestern France near the Spanish border.

A responsible source stated it had not been learned how many of these Spanish Maquis had been crossing the border into Spain or to what extent they were in contact and collaborating with guerrilla forces of the Spanish Republican Junta.

Spanish Republican headquarters here said the guerrillas were active in three major provinces of Spain—Galicia, in the northwest; Extremadura in the southwest; and Andalusia in the south.

France's Spanish national radio told of clashes between regular Spanish troops guarding the frontier and "several groups of Spanish Reds" from France, but sought to create the impression that the situation was well in hand, with most of the rebels surrendering or fleeing back across the French border.

The German radio, while stressing the superiority of Franco's regular troops, said today that 4,000 "Reds" already had been killed in the frontier fighting—a rather high figure for the casualties of "several groups." The German report also mentioned that, while one Spanish village was recaptured by Franco's (Continued on page six)

GREENVILLE IS OVER THE TOP IN FUND DRIVE

Township Has Raised Total Of \$23,239.86 Against Quota Of \$21,000.

Greenville township has gone over the top in its collections for the United War Fund by \$2,239.86 according to reports issued this morning. The township quota was set at \$21,000 and collections to date total \$23,239.86. Five other townships in the county have also reported to be over the top.

County Chairman S. B. Underwood, Jr., stated this morning that the drive will continue until each of the 14 townships has attained its quota. The Grimesland division leads all other sections of the county from a percentage standpoint having reached 150 per cent. Pactolus occupies second place in the standings with a percentage of 126 and Greenville is third with 110.

To Organize Civil Air Patrol Here

The United States is the only nation participating in this war that has continued its civilian flying, and this record is attributed to the Civil Air Patrol. A wing has been organized in all of the 48 states, with squadrons and flights making up each wing.

If a Civil Air Patrol is organized here it will be a home town affair, for the Civil Air Patrol is a part of the Army Air Forces. With this background young people will be prepared for peace time aviation. With an airfield here large enough for the biggest planes, commercial and civil aviation will make great progress, members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce believe.

President C. R. McBrayer has appointed a Civil Air Patrol Committee, with Jerry Vaden as chairman. Members of the committee are Belle Lamb of Bissette's drug store, Fred Trueman, Jr., of the Flanagan Bugby Company, and Attorney Frank Woolen.

The Jaycees have asked Matt R. Long, president of Greenville Spinners, Inc., and a former civilian pilot, to serve as advisory head of the Civil Air Patrol here. It is planned to have a meeting here shortly at which young men and women who are interested in aviation will be invited to attend.

After the war civilian flying will be an ordinary pastime. The Jaycees are now trying to get ready for the future.

NEW POSTWAR MEETING SOON

May Follow Conference Of Roosevelt, Churchill And Stalin.

Washington, Oct. 24. (AP)—Undersecretary of State Stettinius disclosed today that the United States government hopes for a United Nations conference next January on World Security, possibly following a Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin meeting late this year to complete the Dumbarton Oaks plan. The January conference, Stettinius speculated, may be preceded by a Pan-American meeting for the purpose of discussing hemispheric questions raised by proposed conversion of the United Nations into a peace-preserving league.

Discussing these points at a press conference, the Undersecretary acknowledged for the first time that the unexpected prolonging of the four-power planning conference at Dumbarton Oaks had thrown the tentative schedule for the next move on world organization out of line.

Stettinius was reminded that Secretary Hull said early in the summer that he hoped for a general United Nations conference before the end of this year and was asked whether that hope had been abandoned.

In reply Stettinius said that the Dumbarton Oaks meeting ran about a month longer than anticipated (Continued on page six)

Three Islands Taken; Tanks Hammer Inland On Leyte, Dive-bombers Smash Jap Counterattack

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Philippines, Oct. 24. (AP)—American Liberators of 11 towns in the central Philippines drove ahead on Leyte island today through almost impassable mud and bitterly resisting Japanese.

Press dispatches from the front to the Melbourne Herald in Australia reported an American tank column had established a bridgehead on Samar island, the link between Leyte and Luzon islands.

The Herald's correspondent Blaine Fielder, reported the tank column was ferried across narrow San Juanico strait Monday, from a highway point above Tacloban, provincial capital of Leyte and provisional seat of the constitutional Philippines government.

Fielder's dispatch from Tacloban, cleared by military censors, said Gen. Douglas MacArthur capitalized on the rapid advance on northern Leyte to send his troops to the fifth island to be invaded since his return to the Philippines.

Invasion of Samar was not mentioned by other correspondent nor by MacArthur's own communique today.

A road leads up the west coast of Samar from the shores opposite Tacloban to the northern tip, 15 miles southeast of Luzon on which Manila is situated.

The southern column on Leyte units of the Seventh infantry division, captured San Pablo airfield in a seven-mile advance stemming westward from the beachhead at Dulag. The doughboys occupied the field after a grueling march of 12 circuitous miles through dense undergrowth. (Continued on page four)

NEW GAINS ON ITALIAN FRONT

Eighth And Fifth Armies Push Into Po Valley.

Rome, Oct. 24. (AP)—American troops of the Fifth Army battling down the northern slopes of the Apennines approached today within four miles of Castel San Pietro, large Po Valley junction town on the Rimini highway 13 miles south-east of Bologna.

Supreme headquarters announced this American column had captured the village of Frassineto, southeast of Castel San Pietro. Thick minefields, demolitions and barbed wire entanglements held up another force advancing on dominating Monte Belmonte. A communique said the most bitter fighting centered around that feature.

On the southeast, other Fifth Army troops drove for two and one-half miles along the highway to Imola, another junction point on the Rimini-Bologna road, and captured the village of Fontanelice. British forces battling along (Continued on page six)

Canadians Gain In Move To Wipe Out Nazi Guns That Prevent Use Of Port Of Antwerp; First Snow Of Winter Slows Action On Main Part Of Western Front.

London, Oct. 24. (AP)—British troops fought into the streets of the key Dutch road center of 'S Hertogenbosch' tonight. German defenses apparently were crumbling on a 12-mile front south of the ancient fortress town.

The British offensive was one phase of a squeeze drive in concert with the Canadian First army against some 40,000 Germans fighting to hold out in western Holland and deny the Allies use of Antwerp as a supply port.

An assault ring was shaping around 'S Hertogenbosch, with the northernmost British column reaching the city. Scottish troops swinging up from the south cut the road leading to Eindhoven.

Nearly 50 miles to the west, Canadians cut off the causeway to the Schelde Estuary islands, where enemy cannon block the sea route to Antwerp, and fought to within from three to five miles of the strongholds of Roosendaal and Bergen Op Zoom.

A dispatch from supreme Allied headquarters in Paris said that Canadian units fighting to clear the south bank of the Schelde estuary held the ferry port of Breskens firmly today and were along or across a road all the way to Schoon-oijk, three miles south of Breskens. The Germans have been squeezed into a pocket in this area.

An earlier dispatch had reported that the Canadians who took Breskens Sunday had withdrawn from one town and that a confused situation prevailed there. Demolition patrols which moved a half-mile beyond Breskens to Fort Frederik Hendrik withdrew. Neither side now occupies the fort, the Paris dispatch said.

North of Antwerp Canadian troops cut the causeway leading to the islands in the Schelde estuary. Their artillery previously had commanded this area.

Along the main 475-mile front facing east toward Germany persistent Allied pressure scored no major gains, and the winters first widespread appearance now sharp. (Continued on page four)

Validate New Food Stamps October 29

Washington, Oct. 24. (AP)—Validation dates for additional food stamps in ration book four were announced today by the Office of Price Administration as follows: Red stamps L5, M5, N5 and P5 will become valid October 29 for buying meats and dairy products. Good for a total of 40 points, they will have to last over the five-week period to December 3.

Processed food 10-point blue stamps S5, T5, U5, V5 and W5 will be good on November 1 and will be the last issued until December 1. All stamps to be validated will be good indefinitely.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Oct. 24. (AP)—Far away and long ago a couple of rats married and raised a family. Some family. Now there probably are as many rats in this country as there are people.

And their number may be increasing. That's the guess of one official of the Interior Department. The reason he gave: The military services' severe drain on men whose occupation was annihilating rats.

There are two main kinds of rats: 1. The brown house rat (Rattus Norvegicus, or Norwegian rat). This is the tramp that roams in garbage, scuttles across the kitchen floor, and hangs out in basements, wharves and sewers. He often looks gray.

2. The black ship rat (Rattus Rattus, or rat ratrat). This sneak shinnies up rain pipes, skates around on the upper floors of loft buildings, and noses around roof-tops.

They cause trouble, cost money and spread disease. They start fires by gnawing the insulation off electric wires. They live mostly off food produced by man so are found mostly near people. Pests from rats, by biting humans, spread typhus fever and bubonic plague. The Interior Department and the U. S. Public Health Service both work against them with the help of state and local authorities. The Interior people do most of their work in rural areas where most of the rats are.

In this country rose from a reported 1,819 in 1940 to 4,517 in 1943 but the death rate is less than five per cent.

Rats eat almost any kind of food: grains, fruit, vegetables, meat, cheese. And, when they're in the mood they kill baby chicks, pigeons, full grown hens and ducks, baby pigs and lambs and destroy eggs.

They gnaw holes in things like lead pipes, grain bags, boxes, doors, furniture and books cause floods by burrowing in embankments; and they undermine building foundations.

Here are some figures the last estimates of the Interior Department—on where the rats are and what damage they do:

Half of them are on farms, about 26 per cent are in non-farm country residences and in towns of less than 10,000 population, and about 24 per cent in cities of 10,000 population or more.

Of a total annual loss of \$180,000,000 caused by rats, \$63,000,000 is on farms an average of \$10 per farm; \$68,000,000 in small towns and non-farm residences; and \$49,000,000 in large cities.

Twenty-five years ago in almost all the large cities there was only one rat to every person. That ratio has been reduced by half.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The most important product of any war is the ensuing peace—a truth which has been mightily impressed on public consciousness by the Dumbarton Oaks conference plan for a world organization to outlaw armed conflict.

Enduring peace is the star to which we want to hitch our chariot, but the difficulties to be surmounted in achieving it become more apparent daily as the European international political sparks shower about the open powder keg. Every point of the continental compass produces its problem. A concrete example is the boundary dispute between Moscow and the Polish government in London—a dangerous situation which again is hot.

Whether a workable peace league can be created seems to me to depend mainly at the outset on the big three—the United States, Russia and Britain—as this column previously has recorded. Of course all nations, big and little, are essential to perfect union, but the trio is the key to the problem.

These three dominant powers have the strength to enforce peace. By the same token the strength of each is so great that a serious failing out among them must mean a fresh upheaval.

That's why the statesmen of all countries watched Moscow intently during the parley just concluded between Premier Stalin and British Prime Minister Churchill regarding military and political problems. This conference may in the long run prove to be one of the most momentous of our time.

While responsibility for peace can be assessed against the big three, it revolves strongly around Russia.

British relations, which have taken on an entirely new complexion as a result of the war, Russia is emerging as the great new power of the eastern hemisphere, and fortune is transferring to Moscow much of the influence which long has made England the gendarme of Europe.

America, situated in the distant western hemisphere, is deeply but not so intimately concerned with this epochal shift of influence in Europe. London and Moscow, however, must reach a thorough and friendly understanding, involving a great deal of give and take. If this colossal readjustment is to be made smoothly.

Thus it was with relief that the outside world received word through the Soviet press that the Stalin-Churchill conference was a success. The government paper Izvestia declared the parley gave good reason to believe that the Soviet Union Britain and the United States would enjoy an era of increasing collaboration in speeding up defeat of Germany and of comradeship in the solution of peace.

If that's a correct estimate, then the prospects of the Dumbarton Oaks project seem good. There are many delicate moments yet to be bridged, but a peace organization can be created and made to function.

What are the prime essentials of nation? I put that query over the luncheon table in New York to Dr. Carl Hambro, famous European statesman who is president of the Norwegian parliament (now in exile in London) and the president of the assembly of the League of Nations. He named two things as vital: 1. Absolute honesty among nations. Out of this will grow confidence. (Continued on page four)

Political Talk Centers Around Foreign Policy

Roosevelt supporters, with Senator Ball (R-Minn.) in their ranks, plugged the foreign policy hard today, while Governor Dewey set out to expound on the same hot dispute tonight in Balls home state.

The Republican Presidential nominee, who will speak from Minneapolis at 10:30 P.M. EWT (NBC and Blue Networks) said in advance that he will "fill in the gaps" of President Roosevelt's New York address on Americas part in the peace-time world.

Awaiting Dewey in Minneapolis was a challenge from Senator Harry Truman, Democratic Vice Presidential candidate. Truman said in a statement there last night that if Dewey sincerely favors "a strong foreign policy," he will ask for defeat "of the eight isolationists" who were nominated by the Republicans for the Senate.

Publisher Robert R. McCormick, whose Chicago Tribune was listed by President Roosevelt as part of "the isolationist press," commented that "the word isolationist is the word that a man controlled by foreign influences uses for patriotism."

Senator Ball, bolting his party's nominee to support Mr. Roosevelt on foreign policy grounds, is to make a radio speech expanding his reasons Thursday night.

The fact that it is to be sponsored by a Republicans for Roosevelt Committee headed by Bartley Crum, California manager for Wendell L. Willkie in 1940, inspired Democrats for the end of more possible recruits from among the ranks of Stassen-Willkie Republicans Ball backed Stassen for the nomination Dewey won.

To the Republican assertions that the Administration is trying to cover up Pearl Harbor facts until after the election was added today a statement by Rep. Engel (R-Mich.) at Washington that President Roosevelt deliberately withheld from Congress information on German air power in 1937.

Engel said that "while President Roosevelt had insisted warnings of grave potentialities of German war strength," he held down requests for military appropriations "and now blames Congress."

The argument that once wars start they "do not wait for a new commander-in-chief to learn something of his duties" was advanced by Postmaster General Walker. He told a Cleveland party rally that Mr. Roosevelt knows the way to victory and a lasting peace.

But from Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, No. 2 man on the Republican ticket, came assertions that "the President follows a 'con-

New Targets

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Oct. 24. (AP)—American planes now are attacking anything that moves or smokes or lives in Germany to bring the hard facts of war home to the Reich.

Targets no longer are just big cities or factories. This new policy is a grim and cold answer to Hitler's total mobilization of manpower. It is letting the Germans in the little towns up front find out what those in the big cities already have learned of Allied hitting power.

Hitler is sweating the last ounce of production out of the industrially important belt of little factories west of the Rhine, across from Duisburg and Bielefeld, an area now imminently threatened by American assault.

It is there that squadrons of American Thunderbolts are strafing at house-top levels and letting go with bombs weighing 250, 500 and 1,000 pounds. American planes, though concentrating intensively on railroad busting to seal off the battlefront, have been given permission to divert their spare energies to everything they find along the way "that lives or moves."

MRS. SMART ADDRESSES AYDEN FINE ARTS DEPT.

Ayden, Oct. 24.—The Fine Arts Department of the Woman's Club had a treat last Thursday evening when the entire group met at the home of Mrs. William Newsom to hear a talk by Mrs. Ford Smart on a subject in which she is well versed, "The Various Types of Paintings."

Mrs. Smart, a new member of the group and a home town girl, known to all as Willie Evonne Boyd, has recently accepted a position as art director in the Greenville schools, while her husband, Dr. Smart, is serving in the armed forces, said that the history of the human race showed that the craving for beauty and the desire for expression in a creative way was a part of early daily living.

She enumerated the various types of paintings and discussed each from the early paintings that survived on the walls of caves, temples and dwellings from the work of the prehistoric man to the modern abstractionist.

Mrs. Smart, herself a picture of illumination and radiance, said "Art supplies to man the illumination and radiance of life, and to many people, as Sir James Barrie said, 'Art is like a rose in December, it adds so much color to one's life.'"

Painting as an independent art began in Italy during the 14th century. (Some reproductions of these were shown by the Fine Arts Department at the Women's Club May meeting). Cimabue, an Italian, has been called the Father of Painting. His best known painting perhaps is generally called "The Madonna in Majesty."

She pointed out that we have our share in one of the keenest pleasures life has to offer by entering into the artist's delight and feeling the emotions that he felt when painting a picture. "A work of art is not to instruct, not to edify, but to awaken an emotion," she said.

Mrs. Smart's familiarity with her subject, her charm of manner and speech, her witty insertions on modern realistic paintings delighted the group throughout her talk and more than once threw the group into hearty laughter with her humorous remarks on modern art, of which she is a zealous admirer.

Mrs. Newsom, chairman, presided during the business session. Mrs. Ralph Hardee, secretary, read the minutes of the September meeting. Mrs. Helen Turnage introduced the subject of the window display which the club will have during Book Week, the theme of which is "United Through Books." The department decided to use the Four Freedoms as its idea, and Mrs. Newsom appointed Mrs. Ford Smart, Mrs. Hardee and Mrs. W. W. Salisbury to be responsible for the window.

After the program, the hostess served Russian tea, cookies, sandwiches and seafood.

The topic of the November meeting will be "Christmas in Other Lands," with Miss Virginia Beale Cooper as program leader.

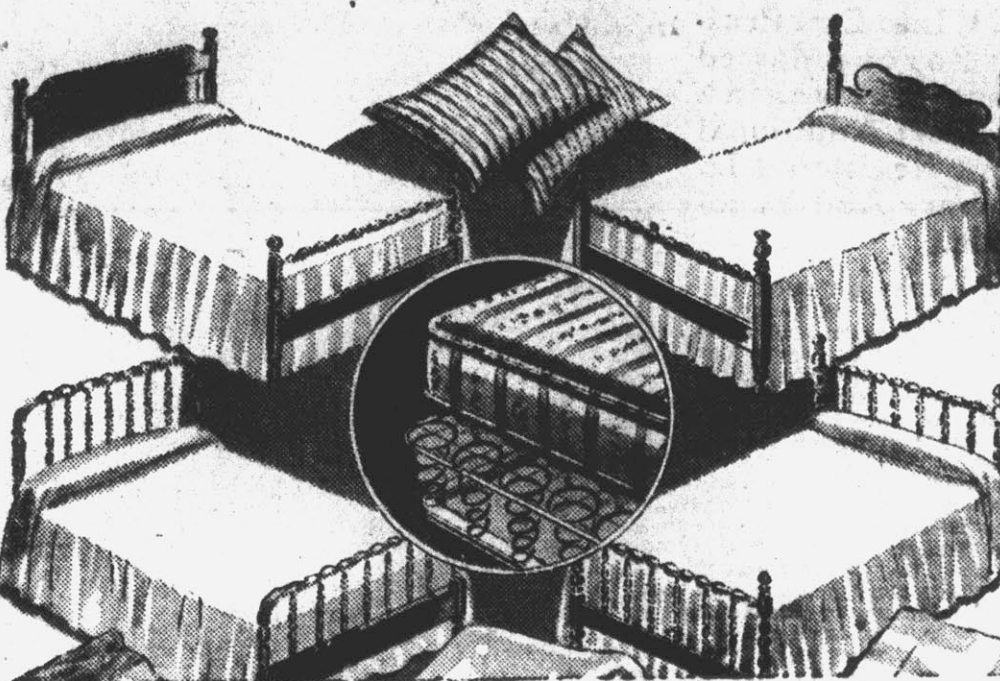

Bennett Speaks To Ayden Club

will be devoted." Ayden, Oct. 24.—"Pitt county's Seal Sale is \$3,750, against the \$3,250 of last year," stated Dr. N. Thomas Bennett of Greenville to members of the Fine Arts Department on the Women's Club, who met at the home of Mrs. William Newsom Thursday evening.

"Mrs. A. F. Rowe of the Welfare Department of the Women's Club has made a splendid chairman for the past five years, increasing the amount each succeeding year and we are expecting with the help of the Fine Arts Dept., Mrs. Newsom, our new chairman, to do equally as well." He named Mrs. J. D. Cannon and Mrs. J. C. Andrews as the first women he had worked with in the Seal Sale and spoke highly in his praise of them.

Dr. Bennett made an interesting and informative talk, tracing the T. B. Seal Sale back to its originator, Enloe Holwell in Denmark in 1904, which place he said had the highest percentage of T. B. "The fair-haired people seem to be more susceptible or else the climatic conditions are more favorable to the disease."

"Our National Tuberculosis Association originated in Philadelphia in 1904 organized by T. L. Trudeau, but it was years later before America had its first T. B. Seal Sale in Wilmington, Delaware. They raised \$2000. For a number of years the sale was under the auspices of the Red Cross. It was fifteen years ago that the National T. B. Asso. took it over and has been operating successfully ever since."

Those who have studied T. B. know that "an early discovery means an early recovery" and that is why T. B. is gradually being reduced in this county. The T. B. seals are making it possible to make an early discovery.

"Pitt County is the first county in the state that has actually limited its funds to X-ray only," he quoted Dr. McCain and that the work meets with Dr. McCain's hearty approval.

"Money donated to T. B. bonds and money derived from the sale of T. B. seals actually goes into the cost of X-rays to people in the low pay brackets who might not be able to have the cost of an X-ray to

detect it in its early stages. X-ray is the only way to know to what extent T. B. is at work in a person's lungs. Loss of weight and appetite, slight temperature, constipation, hurting in the chest or prolonged coughs are each indicative of the early stages, but only X-ray can be certain."

For the first ten months last year in Pitt County there were 42 cases and for the first ten months of this year there were only 47 new cases. There is a decrease though slight. He urged the Fine Arts club to work diligently on this great work.

Dr. Bennett closed his talk with this blazing truth, "Those who buy seals and those who buy bonds are getting more than they pay for, for they are insuring their own health by helping to decrease the spread of T. B."

NEARER THAN WE THINK
Gold was discovered in California in 1848. Legions of excited men crossed the plains or went by ship to the west coast, lured by the fascination of hidden treasure.

Yet who in the end found real treasure in California? Certainly not the great mass of people who went in search of gold. A few of these struck real bonanzas and became wealthy. Most of those who were lucky enough to find "paying dirt," however, wasted their savings in saloons and gambling houses. The common, ordinary businesses of life still remain the foundation of our economic structure. Store-keeping and farming, banking, contracting, the practice of a profession—these are still the solid well-worn paths to economic security and personal satisfaction.

The place to make a success is generally where we happen to be and the way to make a success is to do well the things which most naturally come to hand.

sistent pattern of contradictions." It will be a relief for the people, Bricker said at Denver, "to listen to a man who does not talk in terms of expediency."

The article said that accounts accusing the teamsters of provoking a political fight reacted against Republican candidates.

Another home front dispute started when Republican Chairman Brownell said in a statement at New York that Senator Truman "gave his blessing to Hal Styles x x x whose admission that he was formerly a leader of the Ku Klux Klan has been printed extensively in California newspapers." Styles is the Democratic Congressional nominee for California's 15th district. His secretary issued a statement in his name saying that "I did join the Ku Klux Klan 18 years ago, x x x In 1930 I wrote a series of articles in the New York Graphic exposing the Klan and holding it up to public condemnation. In this rendering a public service, it seems to me I should be highly commended for my courage."

man tanks. The bulk of the Japanese force was in full retreat.
U. S. Sixth army troops moved northwestward from Tacloban, at the northern tip of the 20 mile Leyte east coast front, and slid through swamps in the southern sector from Dulag, Muck and slime, proved a greater obstacle in the south than the Japanese, and sometimes left the advancing Yanks without the support of their tanks.

The coastal road south from Tacloban to Palo was entirely in American hands.

Palo and Dulag anchored the westbound arms of a potential trap reaching out to engulf Nipponese 16th division elements—the torturers at Bataan—in a 140-square mile area bounded on the east by the coast and on the west by a valley road from Burauen to Santa Fe.

Marked progress was reported today in a communique on the Dulag south arm toward Burauen. After menacing Nipponese positions in the Catmon hills area were bypassed, Sherman tanks pushed seven miles into the outskirts of San Pablo. That is about three miles from Burauen. The advance was over mud roads.

It was a different story at Palo. All Monday night, the Japanese counterattacked fiercely and it was not until this morning that it was broken bloody. Then the Americans resumed a slow push west of the liberated town of Palo which is six miles from the road junction of Santa Fe. The advance was contested along the main road.

There are signs that the Japanese sensed the growing danger at the southern end and already are pulling out to the northwest. The opposition supplied before San Pablo was by rear guards.

Other enemy rear guards at the extreme north end of the Leyte front retreated before first cavalry troops which, last night, pushed three miles northwest of Tacloban.

The new provisional capital of the Sergio Osmena Philippines government.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communique listed not only the libera-

tion of 11 towns on the island of Leyte but also the complete occupation of the three small islands of Suluan, Dinagat and Homonhon guarding the entrances to Leyte gulf. Patrols had been put ashore on those islands one week ago today, preparatory to last Friday's big landings on Leyte.

Front line dispatches told of Filipino women and children, who took to the hills when battlewagons of the 600-ship convoy opened up the pre-invasion shelling, coming down into liberated communities where they were issued food and clothing.

The list of liberated towns announced those along the road from Tacloban to Palo. Despite the bitter fighting around Palo, almost continuous since the landings in that sector, Murlin Spencer, Associated Press war correspondent, said the town itself was intact and its 3,000 residents returned to their homes.

Although in firm control of the coastal road from Tacloban to Palo, attempts of the 10th corps to move south of Palo were slowed down in scrub-contested palm plantations flanking the road. Warships in San Pedro bay poured salvos into Japanese pockets and carrier planes swept down for low level bombing and strafing.

ened the plague of weather which has hampered the Allied armies for weeks.

Front reports indicated that the Germans in the 'S Hertogenbosch area were suffering from lack of artillery support. The British were using a powerful force of infantry, tanks and artillery.

Three British columns drove on the cathedral city and Dutch provincial capital. The northernmost one, having captured the village of Roosendaal, drove its way westward into the outskirts of 'S Hertogenbosch during the early morning darkness. Two more columns slashed their way toward that communications hub and bastion of the Germans' west Holland line from the

south and east.
To the west, Canadian troops neared Roosendaal in their drive to flank the German anchor of Bergen Op Zoom. An Allied communique, reporting fresh crossings of the Dutch border north of Antwerp, announced new gains northward along the Antwerp-Roosendaal railway. The Paris radio said the Canadians were less than three miles from Roosendaal.

The Canadians were within about five miles of Bergen Op Zoom. This port and Roosendaal are two main German strongholds in southwestern Holland.

The pinchoff of the causeway to the west bottled up the Germans on South Veleland and Walcheren islands, where enemy guns also forbade Allied use of the water lane to Antwerp.

The sector around Aachen was not active, but to the south German big guns, apparently railway weapons, hurled from 15 to 20 700-pound shells into the Third army area.

The German radio reported Allied guns were pounding the fortress of Metz with a heavy barrage. Street fighting for possession of Maizieres Les Metz to the north continued, with the Americans now holding about three-fourths of the town.

The enemy hurled several counterattacks, with armored support, against the Allied lines near Lunenburg, farther south, but headquarters consolidated their gains to the vicinity of Noncourt.

The eastward push of Allied troops northeast of Brouvelieures was continued by forward units which crossed the Montagne river at several points. The Allied communique said gains were made in the Vosges mountains against "stiff resistance."

May Extend Speed

Limit On Highways

Raleigh, Oct. 24—(AP)—T. Boddie Ward, commissioner of motor vehicles, believes the 35-mile-an-hour speed limit on North Carolina highways should be enforced for at least six months after the war "due to the antiquated equipment now on our highways."

He made this comment in connection with a resolution adopted by state directors of the Junior Chamber of Commerce requesting the General Assembly to authorize the governor to continue the speed limit after the war until such time as it is deemed wise to increase the maximum.

Commissioner Ward yesterday announced the resignation of three members of the state highway patrol. He said there are approximately 50 vacancies on the patrol.

New Trans-Atlantic

Record Established

New York, Oct. 24—(AP)—Establishment of a new trans-Atlantic non-stop commercial flight record of 14 hours, 17 minutes from La Guardia Field to Foyles, Eire, was announced today by James M. Eaton, Vice President of American Export Airlines.

The new record, one hour and 13 minutes faster than the previous best time, was made by Captain Charles L. Blair, Jr. who piloted an Export Line plane carrying 14 passengers and a full cargo load, Eaton said. The plane left New York Sunday and arrived in Eire yesterday.

Germans Renew

Robot Attacks

Brussels, Oct. 24—(AP)—German flying bombs have landed in Belgium, a government communique said today. The announcement warned the public not to help the enemy by spreading information about the time and place the robots landed.

London, Oct. 24—(AP)—The Germans struck twice at Britain last night with their flying bombs, ending a 48 hour lull that followed 11 successive nights of attack.

The double assault, which appeared more intense than any recent raids, was met by terrific anti-aircraft fire, but a number of the robots penetrated the barrage.

One crashed in the center of a town in southern England, plunging into a garage and setting fire to many automobiles and trucks. Gasoline tank explosions rocked the whole town and flames shot 100 feet into the air. An elderly couple living above the garage was critically injured.

Now In Use

Effective November 1st, all County Boards will discontinue the issuing of No. 2 Permit Books.

That no books are to be issued to those persons convicted of drunkenness or any crime in which any intoxicating beverages are a contributing factor within 12 months, or to any person who deserts or fails to support his family or other dependents, or to any persons whom the County Board has reason to suspect desires a permit for the purpose of purchasing merchandise for re-sale, or to any person who violates any of the rules and regulations of the State or County Boards of Alcoholic Control, and the County Boards are to be the sole judge as to the eligibility of the applicant.

Require of each and every applicant that he or she identify himself, or herself by displaying their War Ration Book No. 4, and any additional evidence of identification that the County Boards may require to satisfy it that the applicant is entitled to a Permit Book. At the time the Control Sales Permit Book is issued, the employee of the County will punch the upper right hand corner of the back cover with a designated punch.

Require that all persons making application for Sales Permit Books make application in the county in which they reside. Refuse to issue a permit to a non-resident in your County if the applicant resides in one of the other ABC counties.

The matter of issuing Tourist and Transient Books is to remain in the discretion of the County Boards, but it is important that all County Boards satisfy themselves that such applicants have established a temporary residence in this State, and then only when applicant presents War Ration Book No. 4, as required of State residents.

Require that all persons who are residents of non ABC Counties make application ONLY in their nearest ABC County.

No Permit Books will be issued to any Service Men located in any Military Camp, Cantonment, or Post located in any County east of Durham or Moore Counties. Arrangements have been made with the Commanding Officers of all Camps located in all Control Counties for the issuance of Books to men under their command. Only Tourist and Transient Books will be issued to Service Men in the control area who are stationed in Camps or Cantonments outside the State of North Carolina only after satisfying the County Board that he is stationed outside of this State by displaying his leave papers. Service men located in Camps or Cantonments west of Durham and Moore Counties will be requested to accept a Tourist or Transient Book but may, within the discretion of the local Board be issued regular Permit Books after properly identifying themselves, and in such cases, presentation of War Ration Book No. 4, shall not be required.

All Sales Permit Books Which Have Intentionally Been Tampered With, Such As

Binding Removed And Coupons From Other Books Placed Therein, Shall Be Tak-

en Up And The Holder Of Such Book Shall Be Denied The Privilege Of Re-

registering.

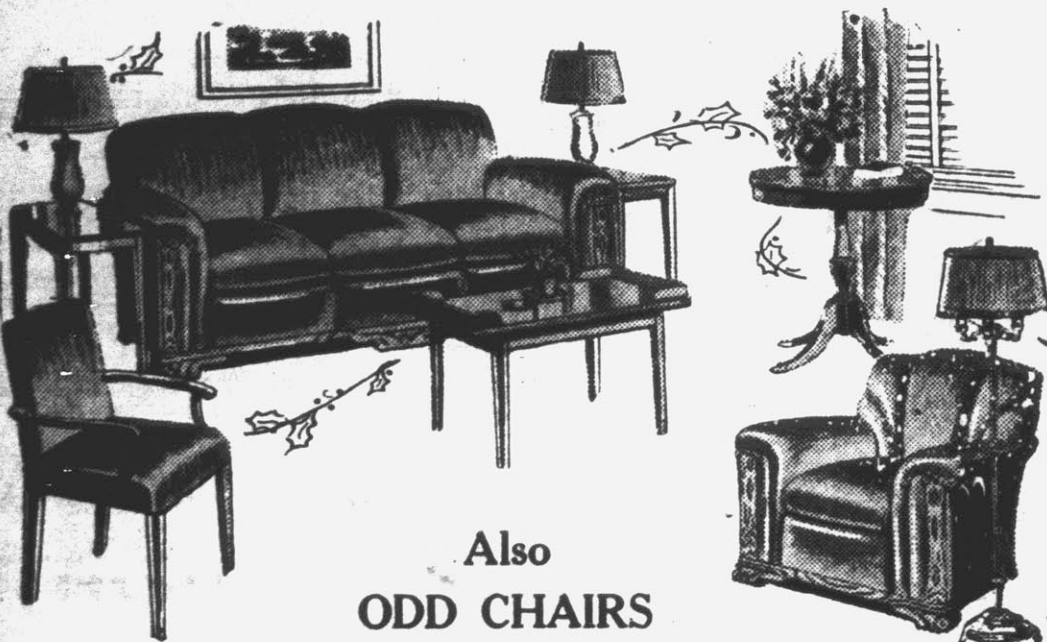

men, the "Reds" still held three villages.

"In general," said a broadcast by the Spanish national radio, "it seems that the infiltration of Spanish Reds into Navarra can be considered over, as many of them are surrendering without arms. When taken prisoner, all express disappointment at not finding conditions favoring formation of a so-called army of liberation."

The broadcast added that some "fugitives still are roaming through the mountains of Navarra," said most of these were being closely pursued by Spanish troops.

American forces, Madrid asserted, disarmed several groups to Spanish "Reds" who retreated into southern France after clashes with the Spanish army.

There was no indication in the Madrid broadcast of the real extent of the fighting in northern Spain, but British quarters here said they had no reports of any general uprising in Spain.

Associated Press dispatches from Lerida, in northeast Spain, said the Spanish Maquis had occupied several small towns in the Aran valley in the central Pyrenees during the past week, but their position was reported untenable by a swift encircling movement of Spanish regular troops which closed the main frontier exit from the valley.

The Maquis now must surrender, or disband and try to escape by ones and twos over snow-covered smugglers trails leading to the border, these advisers said.

**Flanagan Named
On Safety Council**

Dr. Beecher Flanagan, member of the Social Science Department at East Carolina Teachers College has recently been appointed to serve on the National Safety Council's Committee on Higher Education. This is a committee of five university and college faculty members appointed to make studies and submit recommendations to the National Safety Council.

"Your interest in safety education leads me to believe you will welcome the opportunity to serve on this committee," stated Mr. Forrest E. Long, director of the school and college division of the National Safety Council, in a letter to Dr. Flanagan.

Dr. Flanagan will serve on one of five national committees, which, in addition to studying problems in safety education, will chart a program of accident prevention. Immediate emphasis will be placed on teacher education.

Goldap, south of the Kaunas-Konigsberg line. At captured Walterkehnen, 12 miles north of Goldap, they were only seven miles from Gumbinnen.

(A German broadcast last night said the Russians now had reached the Angerapp river, 17 miles west of fallen Goldap, for a total penetration of 35 miles inside East Prussia. Berlin declared further that on

the north Bagramian's forces, already within shelling range of Tilsit, and attempted to cross the Nieman and capture that fortress city on the south bank of the stream.

Insterburg, where the sound of the Red guns already was said to be audible, lies 29 miles south of Tilsit. If Insterburg falls, the northern city would be threatened with encirclement.

With Memel effectively isolated by land, Bagramian is moving most of his forces southward to East Prussia. The Nieman, a formidable water barrier, still is to be crossed, but his troops already are keeping considerable German strength committed at Tilsit.

Bagramian's First Baltic army captured 500 populated points in virtually cleaning up Memel territory, a 1,099-square-mile area ceded to Germany by Lithuania in 1939 under German pressure.

In a battle for the frozen wastes of Norway's Northcap, Gen. K. A. Meretskov's Alpine troops deployed for miles along the Norwegian frontier after cleaning up the nickel mine area around Petsamo. It was announced officially they had cut the highway to Kirkenes, big German naval base in Norway. (A Berlin announcement indicated they already had crossed into Norway).

The Russians also announced gains in Hungary and Yugoslavia. Front dispatches said elements of Hitler's new home guard, mobilized last week among civilian men from 16 to 60, had been killed or captured in the big break through in East Prussia.

France and soon they were flying through a blinding snowstorm. It was not snowing at Essen, but the sky was so black that Fatfinder planes had to circle the city repeatedly during the attack to lay color markers for the bombers.

"An enormous glow over an area of two or three miles was the only sign we had of the success of our attack," said a bombardier.

A saturation attack on the Krupp Works, which occupy a large part of Essen, the night of March 5, 1943, marked the beginning of the Allies' all-out strategic bombing offensive. Six large scale blows put two-thirds of the Krupp Works out of business for a while. Last night's attack was to undo repairs since made to the factories.

Essen also has two large railroad yards and inland harbor facilities.

Eight of the British raiders failed to return.

and then concluded with a plan which is incomplete.

Some weeks ago, Stettinius said, he had held out slender hope that the time schedule might not be changed. Now, however, it should be borne in mind that President Roosevelt will be very busy for the next two weeks or so, Stettinius continued, and then he will be very tired.

It is a question, Stettinius said, whether or not the President will be able to arrange a meeting with the other great men, as he termed them, right away.

Asked whether there definitely would be a meeting of the chiefs of state to fill out the gaps in the Dumbarton Oaks planning, Stettinius said that was one of several methods which might be used. The others, he said, included diplomatic interchanges or a sort of second Dumbarton Oaks.

Perhaps, the Undersecretary continued, it will be possible to send invitations out in December and there may be a conference held sometime in the early winter, naming January.

Certainly, Stettinius said, the fact that a national election is being held is a consideration in the time schedule now contemplated, but he did not say just how it modified the plans.

Stettinius said that he is planning another meeting this week with the ambassadors of the other American nations to discuss the Dumbarton Oaks plan. While no formal request has been made for a Pan-American conference on the subject, he said that should one be made the American government would fall in line.

Highway 67 in the sector to the east pushed beyond the road junction of Portico on the way to Forli. On the Fifth Army left flank South African troops operating northeast of Vergato seized a hill dominating the Prato-Bologna highway.

Indian troops captured Monte Cavallo, west of the Savio River and south of Cesena on the Eighth Army front, and on the Adriatic coast other Eighth Army forces advanced one-half mile beyond captured Cervia. Canadian forces enlarged and strengthened their bridgehead across the Savio north of Cesena.

German tanks and infantry counterattacked the Canadians, but the latter held firm, the announce-

ment said.
West of Cesena, where British troops hold another bridgehead across the Savio, the Germans were hurling a heavy weight of shells. Tanks were moving up most of the supplies for the British infantry. Flood conditions made for difficult going on the Eighth Army front, but the troops were meeting only slight resistance.**Draw Jurors For

Governor Broughton ordered the special term.

The commissioners were in special session today to draw a panel of 150 men to be called for selection of a jury. Jesse A. Jones, Kinston attorney, who was appointed by Governor Broughton to assist Fifth Judicial Solicitor Dave M. Clark in prosecution of the cases against Meadows, was in Greenville today conferring with the solicitor and associate counsel J. Henry Harrell. Jones was appointed upon recommendation of Solicitor Clark.

Judge Albion Dunn of Greenville, John G. Dawson of Kinston and Clay Carter of Washington are counsel for Dr. Meadows.

**Hellcat Brings
Down The Zeros**

Washington, Oct. 24—(AP)—The Navy has thrown a new Hellcat into the Pacific which is bringing down Japanese planes on a 31 to 1 ratio, a major contribution to the sweeping advances of the past six months.

The new ship is called the F6F-3. It supersedes the earlier Hellcat which itself was superior in speed, armor, armament and fire power over Japanese fighters.

In the new edition, the engine cowling has been further streamlined, stepping up the speed which already was better than 400 miles an hour; painting has been changed to increase speed and provide camouflage; a new type aileron increases maneuverability; a revamped windshield increases visibility;

armor plate behind the pilot has been widened, giving him better protection.

The new ship mounts six .50 calibre machine guns, also can carry rockets and bombs. Pilots say it handles beautifully in a dive, takes off nicely from flattops and can outrun the fastest Zero ever made at any altitude.

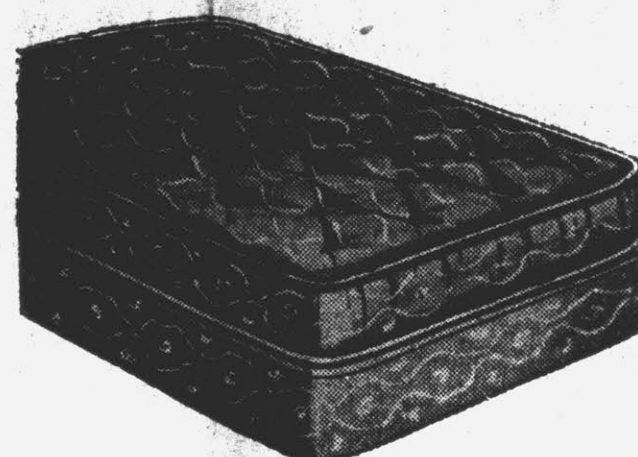
