

Western Anchor Of Nazi Line In Holland Smashed

German Defenses Crumbling As Brit- ish Drive Forward In Effort To Take 40,000 Nazis In Land. Germans Re- ported To Be Fleeing Strongholds.

London, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The whole German stand in southwest Holland is collapsing, front discharges declared today, as British-Canadian columns raced toward the enemy's last two escape bridges in an effort to cut off perhaps 440,000 West troops below the Maas (Meuse) river.

Canadians seized the Germans' western anchor of Bergen Op Zoom without a fight, and hit within a mile of the stronghold of Roosendaal. British army troops closed within five miles of the central bastion of Breda, after winning Tilburg as well as 'S Hertogenbosch.

The German defense line below the Maas has fallen to pieces, one front dispatch declared. Another said Allied armor and infantry were moving so rapidly that Field Marshal Gen. Walter Von Model either had to pull back across the bridges at Moerdijk and Geertruidenberg, 10 miles northwest and northeast of Breda, or have his fleeing forces cut to bits.

As success followed success, Allied headquarters announced that the free use of the great port of Antwerp, the prize of this campaign, now is blocked only by the isolated and doomed enemy coastal guns of the battery at Vlissingen (Flushing) on Walcheren Island.

The Germans are abandoning their positions from the Scheldt to Tilburg, Associated Press war correspondent William F. Frye reported from the field, and the campaign has become a race to reach the Maas bridges.

The swift-moving Allied drive brought these major developments along a 40-mile front:

(1) Bergen Op Zoom stoutly defended western anchor of the enemy suddenly abandoned by its garrison, and entered without opposition last night by Canadian armor and infantry.

(2) Canadian infantry on south Beveland Island crossed the north-south canal to the main part of that island, and fought their way toward reinforced British units which crossed the Scheldt and expanded their bridgehead on the southeast coast of Beveland.

(3) Allied troops were within 2,000 (Continued on Page Two)

British Seize Greek Islands

Rome, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Allied troops landed from the British cruiser Sirius and occupied the island of Piscopi, northwest of Rhodes, the night of October 26. Allied headquarters announced today.

Piscopi (Tilos) is a small mountainous island of the Sporades, subdivision of the Grecian archipelago off the west coast of Asia Minor. It is less than 25 miles from Rhodes.

The communiqué said also that the island of Melos (Kilo), one of the Cyclades group, was bombarded by four British warships, Thursday. There was no report of resistance to the landing at Piscopi, the communiqué said.

For those who are anxious because the all-out Allied offensive hasn't yet started in western Europe, despite the fact that winter breezes are blowing off the fighting lines, let it be said that there's no cause to worry for the drive is on its way.

Every time my vagrant telephone makes me up these autumn nights I say to myself: "This will be the word that General Ike has let hell loose against Hitler." That's how close the assault seems to be.

The reason Eisenhower hasn't already struck is mainly due, as I see it, to the necessity of bringing up vast supplies under fierce hand-caps. We probably even are justified in saying that the Allies might be across the Rhine—right now, headed for Unter Den Linden, if they had possessed the wherewithal when they first came up against the West Wall in mid-September. That's not everybody's fault but is one of those ironies of war over which nobody has control.

We outdistanced our supplies in the amazing hare-and-hound chase of the Nazis across broad France. Actually we were ahead of schedule when the hare went to ground in his own safety-zone.

Allied striking-power was temporarily short-circuited by coming to a halt against the German frontier defenses. While the chase continued over open ground, our magnificent air and road transport kept us sufficiently supplied. But the Siegfried Line is another proposition.

ROOSEVELT TO SPEAK TONIGHT

Will Give Attention To Postwar Business Plan.

Enroute to Chicago with President Roosevelt, Oct. 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt turned his attention to post-war business today with indications he will outline an "inducement tax" policy in Chicago's soldier field tonight intended to help private industry maintain full employment into the post-war era.

The chief executive, stalling 41 electoral votes in Indiana and Illinois, moved to the west after an administration war policy speech in Philadelphia last night in which he accused some Republican politicians of putting "political advantage" above effort to guarantee future peace.

Before he arrives in Chicago the President will make a brief platform appearance at Fort Wayne, Ind., and his train will slow down at Lima, Ohio, and Gary, Ind.

The chief executive wrote his Chicago speech as he rode today, probably still recalling the noisy reception in Philadelphia's jam-packed Shibe park last night as he recounted his administration's preparedness and war record.

Mr. Roosevelt spoke partly as commander-in-chief. In that capacity, he emphasized, he chose the nation's present top commanders—men responsible for what he called 27 successful D-days within the (Continued on page two)

LOAN CASE MAY BE POSTPONED

Trial Of Davenport And Associates May Be Delayed.

Roderick Davenport New Bern white man charged with conspiracy to defraud and violation of the State Banking laws in the operation of a small loans business in Pitt County is scheduled to go on trial in Superior Court here next week.

However, informed sources said today the case may not be called for trial, because of the reported inability of both prosecution and defense to get the case ready for trial. Indications were that it would be postponed for several weeks.

Scheduled to be tried along with Davenport are six of his associates. They are C. R. Jones of Kinston, J. E. Hunnings of Greenville, John R. Heath, S. K. Powers, Hal Horton and Wilson Boyle, all of New Bern.

Davenport was indicted by the Pitt County Grand Jury on more than 12 counts of alleged conspiracy to defraud violation of the State Banking laws, false pretense and issuing worthless checks. He was released under bonds totaling \$17,500 set by Judge R. Hunt Parker of Roanoke Rapids.

Later, Davenport and his associates were indicted in Craven County on the same charges. Bond of \$10,000 was set for Davenport in Craven County. The others were placed under bonds of \$5,000 each in Pitt and Craven.

The State Bureau of Investigation which spent several months investigating Davenport's activities, told the Pitt County Grand Jury that its investigation had shown Davenport and his associates collected more than \$300,000 throughout Eastern North Carolina from investors who were promised a return on their money of 5 per cent per week. The FBI said the firm loaned the money to small borrowers at 10 per cent (Continued on Page Two)

Japs Open New Drive In China

Chungking, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The Japanese opened an all-out offensive against the northern Kwangsi defense center of Kweilin yesterday and are now attacking Chinese positions at the outskirts of the city, a Chinese communiqué announced today.

The Japanese also advanced six miles in a renewed thrust eastward from Pingnam, 115 miles south of Kweilin, and at the same time struck westward from the recently-occupied east China seaport of Foochow.

The new Japanese push began after a long lull during which the enemy regrouped forces, built roads to bring up supplies and completed other preparations for the major operation.

The drive began with twin thrusts down both sides of the Hunan-Kwangsi railway, which slashed at Chinese defenses from 14 to 17 miles east of Kweilin. Still another column swung southwestward from Kwangyang, 50 miles east northeast of Kweilin, with the ultimate aim of joining the general attack and bringing under two-sided pressure the city which the Chinese have said would prove "China's Stalingrad."

As the Japanese blasted their way down the railway, a supporting column moved to outflank Kweilin from the west. The Chinese said fighting raged at all points of the attack.

Weather Slows Drive In Italy

Rome, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Gales and floods brought operations on the eastern Italian front to a virtual standstill today and the Germans were capitalizing on the weather-imposed lull in fighting to reinforce their defenses south and southeast of Bologna.

Allied headquarters said adverse weather also restricted the Mediterranean Allied air force operations.

In one attack fighterbombers hit an important bridge in northern Italy. Three Allied planes were missing from the mission.

The battle line between the British Eighth Army and the Nazis in the Adriatic sector, east of Bologna, was drawn up along the main German defenses at the Ronco River, two miles east of Forlì.

American and other troops of the Fifth Army were bogged down eight miles south of Bologna.

British forces in the central sector, however, were able to move up highway 67 and occupy Rocca Casciano and Indian troops in the area occupied several hills without meeting any opposition. American Fifth Army troops south of Bologna in some forward areas were being supplied by ferries as flood waters cut them off from main supply depots.

Russians Drive Ahead Along Extended Front

New Red Gains In East Prussia Reported; Other Soviet Troops Pour Into Slovakia.

Moscow, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Russian mountain troops were driving across the threshold of Slovakia today after virtually completing the conquest of Hungarian-annexed Ruthenia with the capture of Umayar, its chief city and former capital.

Seizure of Umayar gave Gen. Ivan Petrov's Fourth Ukrainian Army a southern terminus for a supply route through the Carpathian Mountains by way of the East Pass for an accelerated effort to reach the isolated Czechoslovak patriot resistance forces at Banska Bystrica, 140 miles west, now linked with the Allies only by plane.

Twenty-five miles north of Umayar, other units of Petrov's army penetrated six miles into Slovakia, capturing the town of Straina, in the Ciroka valley nine miles northwest of Ullie, taken along with 48 other localities.

Gen. Ivan Cherniakhovsky's battalion of attrition against the furiously fighting Nazis in East Prussia forced the Germans out of three more village fortresses in the Ebnrode area yesterday, one of them 21 miles northwest of Insterburg and 17 miles east of the main Insterburg-Tilsit railroad.

The only Russian progress of any consequence in East Prussia appeared to be on the secondary road west of Pilkallen where the capture of Kussen put Cherniakhovsky's

forces deep on the northern flank of enemy defenses concentrated around Gumbinnen.

The midnight Soviet war bulletin said the Russians, beating off numerous counterattacks by large forces of German infantry and armor, killed 3,000 Nazis making a two-day total of 5,800.

The predicament of the Czechoslovak partisans waiting the arrival of Petrov, ironically, became more hazardous as the Russian advance toward them gained momentum.

It was too early to say how the situation might develop but potentially the estimated 25,000 patriot soldiers faced the hazard of being overrun by Germans hastening their escape from Petrov's army.

The immediate course of the Russian campaign into central Hungary appeared to hinge on the outcome of strong German-Hungarian counterattacks against the Russian salient at Nyiregyhaza, northwest of Budapest.

Meanwhile the Russian advance on Budapest from the southwest was halted sharply in the vicinity of Szobok by the enemy's violent counterattacks.

In Yugoslavia other Soviet forces aided by Marshal Tito's partisans captured Novi Sad, Yugoslavia's seventh city of 64,000, the north banks of the Danube, 42 miles northwest of fallen Belgrade.

Jap Losses In Recent Sea Battle May Reach 40 Ships

MacArthur's Men En- gulf Samar Island And Double Hold On Leyte Capturing 12 More Towns And Villages.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Philippines, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The crushing power of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's invasion armies, released as Japan's shattered fleet fled the Philippines, rapidly engulfed Samar Island today, within 275 miles of Manila, aided brilliantly by Filipino guerrillas.

On Leyte, where land-based fighter planes drew cheers from elated soldiers as they began operating from captured airfields, great segments of the island fell to the on-rushing Yanks.

By the hour, Japanese dead and wounded were added to the more than 14,000 casualties already inflicted. Most of the dead were men of Nippon's defeated and demoralized 16th division which perpetrated the tortures on Batan.

Virtually all Samar's more than 1,200 square miles, which extend to within 15 miles of prized Luzon, were under American and Filipino domination. The capital city, Cebu, was captured by men of Maj. Gen. Franklin C. Sibert's 10th corps.

It was the second island capital invested in the Philippines, the other being Lete's Tacloban, now provisional capital for Sergio Osmeña's Philippine government.

Twelve more towns and villages were liberated on Leyte. At least 55 now are freed.

Disaster from many directions confronted the selfsame Japanese who brutally compelled the haggard Filipino-American garrison which surrendered on Batan to march for days, killing the men who faltered.

Some Nipponese are bottled up in the Leyte valley with Yanks moving on them from north and south. Others had two choices: flee into the hills or stand and die.

Spearhead of Maj. Gen. Frederick A. Irving's 24th division, crashing through the 16th backbone of resistance west of Palo, pushed spearheads six miles southward into the valley. They drove through Santa Fe and Pastrana.

Elements of Maj. Gen. Archibald V. Arnold's seventh and Maj. Gen. James L. Bradley's 96th divisions struck north above captured Butuan to within two miles of Dagami, main supply and troop concentration for the Nipponese 16th.

The gap between the converging Yanks is less than 10 miles. When it is closed, the plight of all Japanese between there and the east coast is hopeless.

Japanese facing the 24th blew up bridges to slow the American advance but many were destroyed by the infantrymen continuing the relentless pursuit.

Gen. Stilwell Is Recalled

Washington, Oct. 28.—(AP)—General Joseph W. Stilwell has been relieved of his triple command in the Far East and has been recalled to Washington, the White House announced today.

The announcement said Stilwell "has been relieved as chief of staff to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek as deputy to Admiral Mountbatten, commander of the southeast Asia command, and as U. S. commander of the China-Burma-India theater and has been recalled to Washington."

The former China-Burma-India theater will be divided into two theaters under separate commanders, said the announcement, which gave no reason for Stilwell's recall.

Argentina Asks For Conference

Buenos Aires, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The Argentine government announced last night it had asked the Pan-American Union in Washington to call a conference of foreign ministers of all American nations to consider Argentina's international status and seek an "adequate solution."

"It has been alleged," said a memorandum forwarded to all foreign ministers "that Argentina has not fulfilled its international obligations, which fact x x x involves a problem which interests not one country, nor a group of countries, but the entire continent."

While declaring that Argentina would "receive in a cordial spirit any initiative tending to accentuate the collaboration among the nations," that statement made clear that "in no case can the adoption of measures of internal order, related to the juridical and institutional regime of this country, be matters of international negotiation."

The statement declared the conference would afford all countries "an opportunity to explain their points of view."

AIRMEN BLAST BERLIN AGAIN

Other Raids Over Germany Reported Today.

London, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Two sharp air attacks hit Berlin last night a short time after Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi propaganda minister, completed a "battle to death" plea to the German nation.

The stronger force of swift Mosquito bombers dumped their bombs on the Nazi capital almost as soon as Goebbels left the air. An hour later, a second group struck.

The operation put Berlin under attack for the sixth night this month.

The Nazi propaganda and home defense minister declared that Germany had no choice but to fight to the finish and threatened that a new German air force would take the war to her enemies.

Other objectives in western Germany were bombed—also without loss.

After another break because of unfavorable weather, the air offensive was resumed today. The German radio reported bomber formations over western Germany before noon.

While the Allied air forces in Britain and Italy have been given the "green light" for an all-out campaign to start the German army by cutting off its supplies from behind, the weather at this time of year is their main handicap. Up to last night the RAF had been idle two nights in a row for the first time in months.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Oct. 28.—(AP)—You may never have heard of it because of the uproar over the presidential race. But organized labor has a big stake in the November 7 elections.

This is why: The voters in Arkansas, California and Florida will ballot on proposed amendments to those states' constitutions.

Amendments, practically identical, sound simple and innocent enough.

They propose: A person shall not be denied a job because of membership or non-membership in a labor organization. That's all.

But labor says the amendments are deliberately aimed at smashing union shops. The AFL and CIO are fighting the proposals.

A union—or "closed"—shop is a place where none but a union man may work. This arrangement is the result of agreement between labor and management in the individual shop.

Labor says further: These amendments—if they pass—are the signal for a torrent of similar amendments to be offered in other states by forces eager to destroy organized labor.

They actually would prevent strikes or threats of strike, they say.

Singling out the California amendment, labor says: "Under the broad language of the proposed amendment, a corporation could challenge the right of a union to attempt to organize its employees."

"Any union pursuing an organizational campaign in California could be kept so busy in the courts that it would have no time to organize."

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Oct. 28.—American planes and surface craft today hunted down Japanese warships limping from disaster in the Philippines, where the imperial fleet lost probably 40 ships and had its maximum strength cut at least in half.

Bombers maintained an aerial dragnet from South China to the Sulu sea, searching for survivors. Secrecy shadowed the activities of Allied fleet units which, however, were not overlooking the opportunity for a more decisive "kill."

The loss of six American warships in the three vital naval engagements was announced yesterday. They included the light carrier Princeton, most of whose personnel were saved, two escort carriers, two destroyers and one destroyer escort, all unidentified.

This saddened, but did not dim, the commemoration of America's most triumphant navy day, during which top-ranking officials reported the elimination of Japan's navy as a major striking force, at least temporarily.

Simultaneously, reports from the battle scene emphasized the skill and daring of Allied commanders and men who fought off superior forces to secure the Philippine invasion and possibly to shorten the Pacific conflict.

Rear Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, chief of staff of the Pacific fleet, reported "It appears 40 Japanese ships were sunk or crippled," although the exact number of naval engagements is not complete.

Official figures, based on earlier incomplete reports, list a minimum of 27 Japanese warcraft sunk or damaged, including two carriers and two battleships sunk.

(Tokyo's latest claims of American losses were 10 warships and transport losses, or damaged, including eight carriers sunk and seven carriers and a battleship damaged. It acknowledged Japanese losses of six warcraft sunk—a carrier, a battleship, two cruisers and one battleship damaged.)

Admiral Sherman's estimate was included in a navy day broadcast from Honolulu. He added that "it will be a long time before the Japanese fleet again is fit for sea."

AFL attorneys say the amendments are unconstitutional because: The 14th amendment says no state shall pass laws abridging the privileges or rights of citizens. (Collective bargaining, they argue, is a privilege of citizenship.) And the amendments are discriminatory because they would enforce an open shop by legislation.

Tagged tackling by Greenville High School Green Phantoms against superb blocking in behalf of their fast moving ball carriers by the Kinston Red Devils cost Greenville another ball game to Kinston last night by a score of 20 to 6. The game was played in Kinston before a large crowd including many from Greenville. Kinston's tallies came in the second, third and fourth periods of the game while Greenville's came in the early stages of the fourth. While the Phantoms racked up 11 first downs to Kinston's 13, the Kinston yardage for the game was about triple that of the Phantoms due to a series of long gains by Cherry, Evans and Bizzell for the Red Devils.

First Period

straight for a new peril. Barring their way at Carigara bay are 10th corps elements of General Silbert which have seized the coastal town of Barugo. It is the terminus for one of two escape roads the Japanese can use and is only five miles east of Carigara, terminus of the other.

MacArthur's communique today reporting capture of Barugo also disclosed that men of Gen. Arnold's seventh have pushed down Leyte's east coast 14 miles below Dulag to enter Abuyog. From Barugo to Abuyog stretch 70 miles of Leyte coast now under control of the invaders. Control of Samar island plus the seizure of Barugo on Leyte would mean command of a 100-mile coastal segment bordering the Samar sea. MacArthur's men, in shore to shore movements, earlier this week won both sides of San Juanico

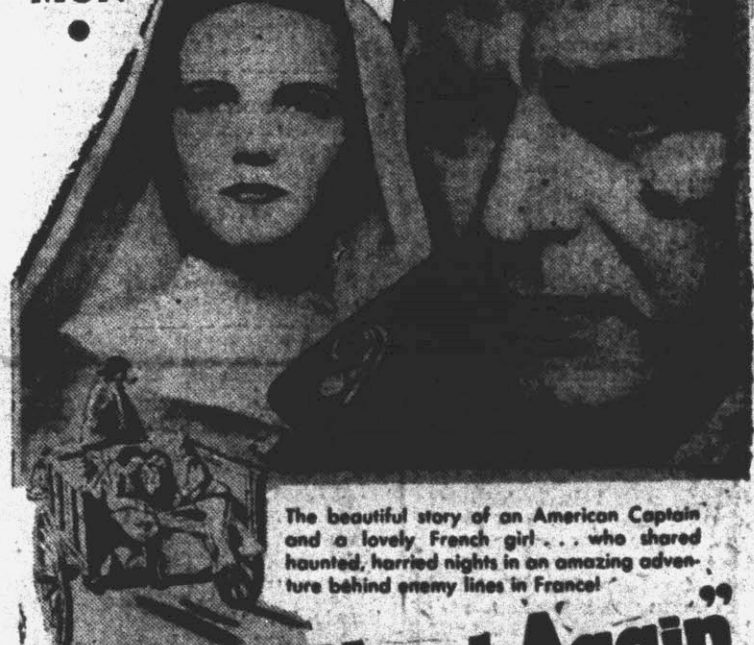
