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Soviets Within Sight Of Baltic

German Divisions In Danzig, Pomerania And Polish Corridor Menaced As Soviets Smash Toward Baltic In Three Places; Communications Severed

London, March 3.—(AP)—Second White Russian army tanks have severed communications between Danzig and Stettin, isolating the German troops being backed against the Baltic in eastern Pomerania, the "Polish Corridor" and the Danzig territory, the Berlin radio said today.

The Russians were fighting within sight of the Baltic at three places. Moscow clothed in a security blackout the exact extent of the Soviet penetration northward in Pomerania, but AP Correspondent Eddy Gilmore said in a dispatch from the Russian capital that Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's wedge driven between Rummelsburg and Bulbitz southeast of Koenigsberg "has broken the Germans' line as a line."

By German account, Russian armored spearheads cut across the Danzig-Stettin communications east of Koenigsberg, seven miles from the Baltic coast.

Moscow has not confirmed this report nor a German statement that the Russians were in the outskirts of Koenigsberg.

By enemy accounts Russian attempts to widen their wedge were repulsed in wild hand-to-hand fighting while Moscow dispatches said Rodossovsky, when he had driven his wedge as far as he needed, it turned his attention to the flanks and rapidly beat back Volkstrum (home guard) and seasoned Nazi (army units).

A German announcement that Soviet units had thrust northwest of Danzig, indicated the Russians were making a new smash through Pomerania toward the Baltic. Danzig is 47 miles southwest of Koenigsberg.

Three Russian spearheads were jabbing for Koenigsberg and the port of Kolberg, 24 miles to the west. Tanks drove the wedge between (Continued on Page Six)

Fierce Fighting On Italian Front

Rome, March 3.—(AP)—Fierce fighting that has been costly to both sides raged today along the east bank of the Senio river in the 8th army sector of the Italian front. Allied headquarters announced.

Dispatches said Germans had taken up positions on one side of a high concrete dyke, with Allied forces fighting from the opposite side.

The German communique yesterday reported heavy fighting along the Senio but said 8th army attacks had been frustrated.

In the battle along the dyke, the opposing forces at some places were only a few yards apart and engaged in hand grenade duels.

German artillery, meanwhile, unleashed a fresh assault in the Mount Belvedere area west of the Pistola-Bologna road.

There was normal patrolling activity along most of the remainder of the front.

A deserter from the German lines said Mussolini, wearing a gray uniform without rank, had visited the front.

The "Act of Chapultepec" would provide for the use of joint force to stifle aggression within the hemisphere, echoes the spirit of the Crimean conference of the Big Three who pledged themselves to peace at all costs. There are many in this hemisphere who hope that the Americas may even bind themselves to stand as a bloc against any aggression from outside.

Undoubtedly the Inter-American conference is wise to proceed without haste, in order not to undertake any commitment which might raise difficulties for the San Francisco meeting. However, observers generally see no reason why the World Security organization shouldn't accommodate itself to a Western Hemisphere peace bloc. Indeed, it seems to fit Prime Minister Churchill's idea for regional units within the peace plan.

As a matter of fact, if this terrible war has taught the Americas any-

thing, it is that from now on they must stand together — one for all and all for one. This doesn't mean isolation or non-cooperation with the rest of the world. It means that if another Hitler or Tojo ever raises his head, we shall be on the alert to aggression. It means we recognize that if a would-be aggressor obtains a foothold in a single Western Hemisphere country, he has a base from which he can strike at the rest.

One of the happiest aspects of the Mexico City conference, from the viewpoint of a Yankee, is that the "Act of Chapultepec" originates among our good neighbors and not in the United States. This means, as I see it, that there probably is a lot less suspicion of Uncle Sam's motives than there has been in some quarters heretofore. Maybe his attitude in this war has made it clear that he really has no designs against anybody, but is honestly interested in the welfare of his fellows.

However that may be, it must be admitted that when nations enter such a pact they want to know a lot about their partners. One assumes that under a Western Hemisphere pact the United States might be asked by smaller nations to deal with any infraction of the peace

DEFENSE WILL REST MONDAY

Meadows Trial May Last Two More Weeks

The defense in the trial of Dr. Leon R. Meadows will rest its case following the introduction of one witness Monday morning when the trial enters its sixth week.

The trial of the former president of East Carolina Teachers College on charges of false pretense and embezzlement in connection with his handling of special college funds administered by him, got under way in a special term of court here on January 29 with Judge Clavon L. Williams, of Sanford, presiding.

Well over a hundred witnesses have been on the stand and approximately 500 documents, checks, etc., have been presented into evidence. Solicitor D. M. Clark, and J. H. Harrell, of this city, and Jesse A. Jones, of Kinston, are prosecuting the case and Judge Albion Dunn, of this city, Clay Carter, of Washington, and John G. Dawson, of Kinston, are acting as defense counsel.

After presenting a score of witnesses, most of them character witnesses, yesterday afternoon the defense stated it was ready to rest with the exception of one witness. The witness will be the college librarian who will present articles from the files of the Teco Echo, college newspaper, dealing with improvements made at the college during Dr. Meadows' administration as president. The testimony was barred from evidence earlier in the trial but Judge Williams announced yesterday afternoon that he had decided to permit it to be offered.

Character witnesses for Dr. Meadows yesterday afternoon included John T. Thorne, of Farmville; Dr. M. T. Friesella, of Ayden; J. E. K. of Kinston; and L. L. Perkins, of Stokes. Mrs. Curtis Spence, of Black Jack; J. E. Williams, H. L. Hodges, J. Roy Brown, J. L. Outlaw, J. Knott Proctor, John Mitchell, Mrs. C. S. Forbes, W. P. Young, Julius Brown, and E. B. Suggs, all of Greenville, and Heber Foster, of Siler City, were also called to the stand.

Acting as the defense's chief actors and reputations of E. L. Baker, N. O. Van Norwick, L. B. Garret, Charlie (Big) G. C. Henderson, L. M. Ernest, Roy Smith and other state witnesses.

W. E. Hooker, brother-in-law of the late E. G. Flanagan, in addition to appearing as a character witness, testified that at one time Mr. Flanagan had told him that he had advanced \$1,200 to the college for improvements. On cross examination he stated he did not recall exactly what year it was but that it was some time between 1930 and 1940.

Nearly A Million Germans Captured

Paris, March 3.—(AP)—German captives since D-day last June total 954,377, with more than one-quarter taken by the U. S. First army, supreme headquarters disclosed today.

By armies, the prisoner totals are: U. S. First, 251,251; U. S. Third, 187,417; U. S. Ninth, 75,815; U. S. 7th, 93,167; Canadian First, 137,614; British Second, 104,336; French First, 85,624; By the FFI and others, 19,992; total, 954,377.

Assembly May End March 17

Raleigh, March 3.—(AP)—Legislative leaders predicted today that the assembly would not adjourn before March 17, if then, and said the delay partly could be attributed to the adoption yesterday of a finance bill amendment imposing an additional tax of \$1 a gallon on all wines.

The amendment, by Rep. Stone of Rockingham, caused second reading to be postponed until Monday. Passage of the \$129,000,000 measure already had been delayed by the adoption Thursday of what Speaker Oscar Richardson ruled was a material amendment. That change emptied insecticides from the sales tax if purchased for use on poultry or livestock.

Opponents of Stone's amendment claimed that since it increased a tax, it was contrary to the recommendations Governor Cherry made in his inaugural address. He asked then that no tax increases be made.

If precedent is followed—and indications today were that it would be—wine lobbyists will ask for a public hearing on the amendment. That would reopen the revenue bill.

Hit Jackpot

Manila, March 3.—(AP)—A 25th division artillery battery firing on suspected Japanese positions near Rizal the other day hit the jackpot with a 105 mm. shell.

A veritable geyser of silver poured out as the shell exploded. Silver coins showered down on troops several hundred yards away.

The shell had struck a cache of Filipino pre-war silver, including some United States money.

The cash, scooped up into sand bags after Americans captured the area, required two trucks to haul it to the Sixth army finance officer who began a hunt for the owners.

Filipinos buried a great deal of money during the Japanese occupation lest it be taken from them in exchange for the worthless Nipponese currency.

GEN. HARMON IS MISSING

Wide Search Being Made For Air Commander

Army Headquarters, Pacific Ocean Area, March 3.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Milford F. Harmon, commander of Army Air Forces operating in the Pacific, is missing with nine other officers and men in a transoceanic flight.

Early today the Army announced that the 37-year-old general's plane was mysteriously missing on a routine flight and the greatest air and naval search ever launched in the Pacific was underway.

The brief announcement by Lt. Gen. Richard C. Richardson, Jr., commander of Army forces in the Pacific Ocean area, did not disclose when or where the plane was last seen.

When last heard from the general's Yanks overwhelmed "negligible resistance" on the 18-by-eight mile island at the western end of Verde passage, the 18th Philippines island MacArthur has invaded.

This completes the capture of all key positions through San Bernardino straits and Verde island passage designed to secure the main navigational channel through the islands for shipping from the United States," today's communique reported.

Within a little over a week, that route was cleared by invasions of Verde island, east of Lubang, and Capul and Biri islands guarding the eastern end of the sea route in San Bernardino strait between Luzon and Samar.

Lubang was the second island invasion in as many days. Yanks of Maj. Gen. Jens A. Doe's 41st division swarmed ashore on Palawan, 250 miles southwest of Manila, Wednesday. Today MacArthur said the (Continued on Page Four)

MacArthur Announces Capture Of Lubang Island 35 Miles From Manila Bay

Manila, March 3.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur disclosed today the fourth in a series of rapid-fire invasions—a landing on Lubang island, 35 miles southwest of Manila bay—giving his forces complete control of the shortest sea route through the heart of the Philippines to Manila.

The western end of a 300-mile passage, through which Manila can be supplied and Luzon transformed into a huge military base facing Asia, was opened by veteran 24th division troops which seized Lubang Thursday.

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Ninth Army Battling For Bridges Across The Rhine

Planes And Warships Bombard Jap Islands

Scores Of Jap Planes Destroyed And Many Ships Sunk By U. S. Blw Against Ryukyu Islands

Tokyo radio reported today that American warships shelled the Okinawa group of the Ryukyu islands throughout Thursday night on the heels of a daylight carrier plane raid.

This is the closest bombardment U. S. warships have ever been reported to Japan or the China coast.

The broadcast, recorded by the Federal Communications Commission, said several U. S. warships "massed" off Daito island in the Okinawa chain.

The bombardment opened at nightfall and lasted until Friday morning, Tokyo said, but insisted "there was no damage caused by the naval gun barrages."

Today's Tokyo broadcast made no reference to the previous stories of the carrier attack which the government-controlled Domei news agency had said was "believed to be from the same task force" that raided Tokyo Sunday.

United States Pacific Fleet headquarters, Guam, March 3.—(AP)—American carrier planes swept across the Ryukyu islands virtually unopposed Thursday, destroying or damaging 55 Japanese ships and 91 planes, Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced today.

That night a task force from Adm. Raymond A. Spruance's Fifth fleet followed up the daylight raid with a night-long bombardment of Okinawa, 210 miles east of the main Ryukyu chain, which guards the approaches to southern Japan and the China coast.

Bombardment warships were only 350 miles south of Japan, the closest announced approach to the enemy mainland in a heavy gun attack on shore objectives.

Nimitz said 13 enemy vessels were sunk, 13 probably sunk and 20 damaged. Forty-one Japanese planes were definitely destroyed and 50 others either demolished or damaged on the ground.

Only four of the total were shot down in the air and American pilots had to chase Jap planes to bring them down. Not a single interceptor ventured to oppose the American pilots, which Tokyo broadcasts previously said swarmed over the islands 600 strong.

The attack cost the raiders eight airmen and 13 planes.

Kiwianians To Aid Red Cross Drive

Last night was Red Cross night at the Kiwanis Club's supper meeting. "The Cross of Christ is a symbol of Christianity—of service to man, but there is another cross—the Red Cross—which has become a symbol of service to all the world."

W. J. (Dick) Bundy, Greenville attorney, in an appeal for fullest cooperation in raising more than the sum the Red Cross is calling for in its mission of mercy in this war.

"Our contribution to the Red Cross is a gift, which will be repaid in the knowledge and consolation that we are sharing in the great task of doing good, following the example of Him who, nearly 2,000 years ago, went about doing good," Bundy said.

"Wherever love and charity go to the aid of distressed humanity the Red Cross goes with them, their companion and symbol; for, as it has been said, 'The place for charity, like that of God, is everywhere.' But to talk about it and think about it is of no avail. We must do something about it. In Holy Writ we are told, 'Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only.'"

The speaker concluded his appeal for the Red Cross drive by quoting Horace Mann: "To pity distress is but humanity for a wrong estimate provided it is not wrong by more than 20 per cent."

So, two groups of people will file an estimate and start making quarterly payments.

1. Those whose income of \$5,000 or more is from wages or salary from which tax is regularly withheld. If you're in this group you know how much tax is being withheld. You figure the difference between the amount withheld and the total tax you estimate you'll owe on 1945 income.

2. Those with income from which no tax is withheld, like doctors' fees in fees and landlords' living off rents. These people have to estimate their income for the year, what the tax is on that income, and then start paying that total tax in quarterly installments.

If you're in this second group—and if your income is under \$5,000—you can find your tax for 1945 in the table on the back of Form 1040 which is being used by people making their 1944 income tax returns. Note: Form 1040 is not Form 1041. (Continued on page four)

Canadian and American Forces, Five Miles Apart, Are Closing Trap On Nazi Divisions; Stiff Resistance At Cologne; More German Prisoners Taken

Paris, March 3.—(AP)—American troops 250,000 strong, fighting today for control of the Rhine bridges, battered to the river on a broadening front and thrust to within five miles of closing a Canadian-American trap on parts of two German armies.

Field Marshal Von Rundstedt's divisions in the north, making up the First Parachute and 15th armies, were reported in headlong retreat behind rear guard defenses.

U. S. Ninth army men reached the Rhine at new points on a five-mile sector, burst through Krefeld, and in a northward push reached Gelden. The latter is five miles from the Canadian First army wheeling Germans back across the Rhine.

Just to the south, U. S. First army tanks and infantry spread the battle before Cologne into a dozen more villages and slammed within easy artillery range of the great Rhine stronghold along a curving 20-mile front. Last night they were but 4-12 miles from Cologne at one point.

Bein declared Ninth army forces were attempting to span the Rhine, and unofficial reports reaching London said the Doughboys already had crossed near Neuss, suburb of shell-ripped Dusseldorf. There was no confirmation of this report from direct field dispatches or supreme headquarters.

In the middle of the Western front, the American Third army driving toward Coblenz advanced up to 3-12 miles on a 45-mile front, seized 13 more towns and 4,600 prisoners.

U. S. Ninth army reached the river at two points yesterday in a 15-mile advance that toppled all the arsenal cities in the Ruhr basin west of the Rhine, routed the German 15th army, and split Nazi divisions. (Continued on Page Six)

AIRMAN POUND REICH TODAY

Factories, Communications And Troops Blasted

London, March 3.—(AP)—While Allied divebombers were mauling the Germans along the Rhine, more than 1,800 U. S. Eighth Air Force planes flew into central and southern Germany for the third straight day and battered more than a dozen rail, oil and industrial targets essential to the Nazi war machine.

This great fleet, including 1,100 heavy bombers, first gave Berlin an air attack, then swung south over the Brunswick-Magdeburg region where 103 Nazi planes were destroyed yesterday.

The targets included three factories at Brunswick where Panther tanks, trucks and oil refinery equipment are produced; four small oil refineries northeast of Brunswick; large synthetic oil plants at Roth; a suburb of Magdeburg; Ruhland, 27 miles north of Dresden, and Misburg near Hanover.

One of the task forces of heavy bombers went 50 miles beyond Leipzig. (Continued on page six)

North Dakota Senator Dies

Rochester Minn., March 3.—(AP)—United States Senator John Moses (D-ND), 73-year-old governor of North Dakota who won his national office by defeating Gerald P. Nye last fall, died early today.

Sen. Moses had been undergoing post-operative treatment at the Mayo Clinic for an abdominal ailment when an attack of pleurisy complicated his recovery.

Last night it was announced that the 59-year-old Senator had suffered a setback and that his physician had despaired of his life.

His wife and a son, Lt. James Moses, who came here yesterday, were at his bedside. Another son, John, an Army lieutenant, is recovering from a shrapnel wound received in France. A daughter, Mary Jean, is in the U. S. Nurses Cadet Corps. A third son, Robert, also survives.

Moses was the first Democrat ever elected to represent North Dakota in either House of Congress and was one of two men to serve three terms as governor of the state.

Today On The Home Front

Editor's Note: This is the last of 12 stories explaining who has to do what about his taxes. Washington, March 2.—(AP)—Here are pointers if you're one of those who must—by March 15—file a declaration of estimated income tax for 1945 and pay the first quarterly installment at the same time.

You make your declaration on form 1040-ES. The part you use, tear off and turn in to the collector is about the size of a bank check. If you don't have a form 1040-ES now, you can get one from your internal revenue collector's office.

You may be unable, for various reasons, to make an estimate right to the last penny. There is no penalty for a wrong estimate provided it is not wrong by more than 20 per cent.

The declaration must be made if you expect to receive in 1945: 1. Wages subject to withholding in excess of \$5,000 plus \$500 for each surtax exemption except your own. For example: \$5,500 in the case of a married couple with no dependents or a single person with one dependent.

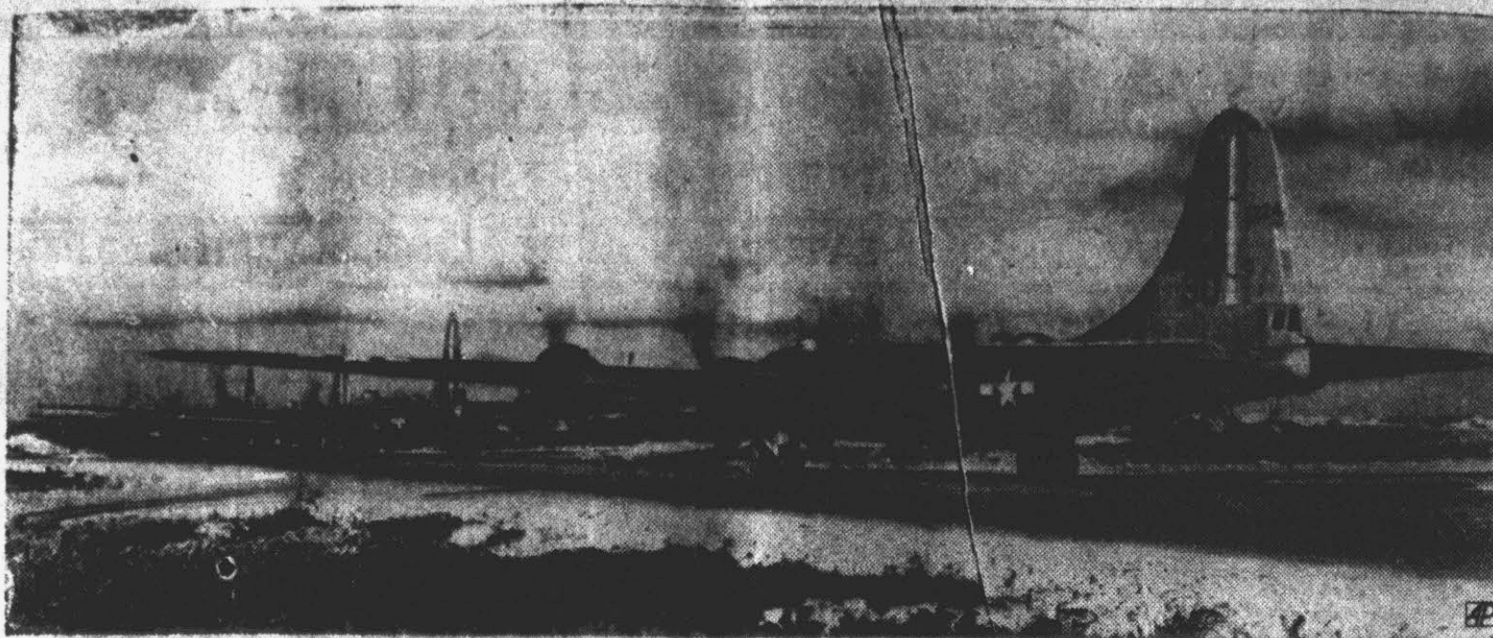

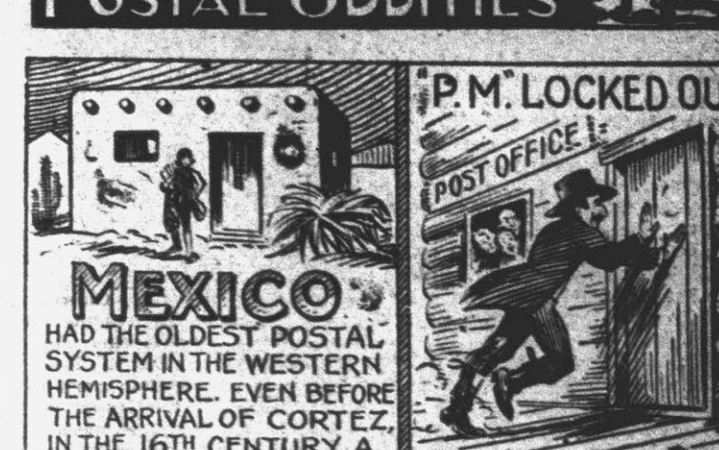

NO GREATER TRUTH IN LIFE

When Louis XIV was buried, the famous pulpit orator, Massillon, was called upon to make the funeral oration. Stepping to the pulpit he began his address by saying, "God alone is great." As he uttered these words, the whole congregation rose to its feet. He had put into words what was in everyone's mind. Louis had been the Grand Monarch in his early years, yet here he lay, discredited in the sight of the whole world, his glory a thing of dust and ashes. "Surely," said the hearts of even the most worldly on that day, "God alone is great."

It had taken France the better part of a century to learn this. The sharp-toothed harrow of war had been drawn back and forth across her prostate form before she realized that the glory of Louis was an empty shell. "God alone is great."

When that conviction becomes the pole toward which, like a magnetic needle, a man's life ever turns, all other points of the compass are easily found. He never gets far out of the way if he keeps that great fact in mind. The sovereignty of God is the most overwhelming fact with which we have to deal. Upon the proper understanding of that great fact our happiness and true welfare depend.

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AMERICA IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—If there's any truth in the talk around Capitol Hill, the voiceless District of Columbia is close to getting a vote and some sort of representation in Congress than at any time since the oldest inhabitants got their first mustache cups.

The reason is the Summers-Capper proposed constitutional amendment. Since you and you will vote on it or at least make it clear to your state legislators how you feel about it, it's just as well you should be understood now.

We had to see how Congress can refuse to pass the Summers-Capper bill.

It is merely an enabling act. It doesn't give the citizens of the District a right to vote or any representation whatever.

It merely specifies that when and if three-fourths of the states adopt it as an amendment, then Congress shall determine the extent of the franchise and representation in Congress. There is no thought whatsoever that this will mean the District's city government will be turned over to the people who live there.

There's also little argument in Congress, as far as I can find, that the District should have no vote as a non-voting delegate in the House, as Hawaii, Alaska, the Philippines and Puerto Rico are now represented.

But those are matters which would be left up to Congress if the Summers-Capper act should become a part of the Constitution.

It's hard to see either why the voters of the nation would refuse to place in Congress, where it belongs, this responsibility for giving residents of the national capital some sort of say-so about how they are governed, and equal rights with the rest of the nation in voting for President and vice president.

The difficulty that the proposed amendment probably will have, say its backers is in lack of interest.

Why that should be of interest to understand Washington, D. C. belongs to the nation. Chairman Hutton Summers (D-Tex.) of the House Judiciary committee, co-author of the bill, calls the District "the workshop of the Government." He and a great many others are content that as such the government of the District must remain in the hands of the representatives of the nation as a whole.

But they see no reason for a million persons, many of them with a far greater knowledge of national government than the voters of the states, to be deprived of their constitutional rights to a vote.

As Congressman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) puts it, "all over the coun-

bonds should suffer from the tax reductions.

10. Do you think the Roosevelt administration, especially the securities and exchange commission, is unfriendly to legitimate business? Answer: No. I do not. The masses of the entire world are on the march and, with all the regulations and difficulties facing U. S. employers, they are—and will continue to be—better off than the business men and investors of any other nation.

Spiritual Awakening Needed
11. Do you think inflation is inevitable? Answer: Yes, and this means a gradual increase in living costs with higher prices for most consumer goods as well as for certain stocks, real estate and gold. Moreover, once a world spiritual awakening comes, a final collapse of the monetary spiral.

12. What about the postwar unemployment scare? Answer: There will be no special difficulty for a few years, but later there may be much trouble. Unemployment is a spiritual and educational problem rather than economic. Congress cannot prevent unemployment. The churches and school committees of each community will determine the unemployment situation.

ES. They are separate and distinct. You use form 1040-ES in filing your 1945 estimate.

Here's an example of working out form 1040-ES:
Jones, married, one child, is paid \$125 a week in salary. So, his salary in 1945 will be \$6,500. A tax of \$21.30 is withheld from his salary every week. But that's not all the tax he'll owe for the year.

He turns to form 1040, which he is using for his 1944 return, as a guide in working out his 1945 tax which will be \$1,135. He enters that on line 1, form 1040-ES.

To find out how much tax will be withheld from his salary for the year, he multiplies the withholding of \$21.30 by 52 weeks. The total—\$1,107.60—is the tax that will be withheld from him. He enters that on line 2.

Then he subtracts the \$1,107.60 from the \$1,135 and puts the result—\$27.40—on line 3. That's the tax

he'll owe over and beyond the tax taken out of his paycheck weekly.

But—Jones is one of those people who overpaid on the 1944 tax. When he figured out his 1944 tax on the 1040 long form, he made a note of this overpayment and indicated on the form that he wanted it credited against his 1945 tax. That overpayment was \$15.

So—on line 4 of form 1040-ES, he enters that \$15, subtracts it from the \$27.40 on line 3, and gets his result: \$12.40. This is the tax he must pay as his estimated tax due on 1945 income. He puts that on line 6.

He can pay it—anyone can do the same—in a lump sum or in quarterly installments of \$3.10, the first by March 15, the second by June 15, the third by September 15, and the fourth and final payment by January 15, 1946.

On line 7 Jones writes the amount he's paying with form 1040-ES. The full payment or first quarterly installment must be paid when Jones turns in his form 1040-ES to the collector, personally or by mail.

So he writes his name and address on form 1040-ES, signs it and he's through.

where force was necessary. If that assumption is correct, then the "Act of Chapultepec" is doubly a vote of confidence in Uncle Sam.

The probabilities are that the punitive measures threatened would in themselves be sufficient to maintain peace. Nations aren't going to practice aggression if they know they're going to be punished.

In considering the American machinery for enforcing peace, from both internal and external aggression, my thoughts immediately turned to the possibilities of the great United States air-naval base which Washington acquired in the British colony of Trinidad in 1940 on a 99 year lease. It should be said immediately that this is purely my own idea. I haven't even heard it mentioned.

I first became interested in the possibilities of Trinidad and the adjacent Gulf of Paria as a base several years ago when I spent considerable time there. Experts told me that the huge and well-protected gulf would house an unlimited navy, and that Trinidad has ample facilities for air fields.

The main point, however, is that this big island and its vast harbor are so centrally situated that naval

and air forces can strike in any direction easily. They could quickly reach the Panama Canal, all South America, all North America, and the West Indies.

It would make an admirable police station—if all the American nations agreed to employ its facilities.

As a post-script it may be said that it would be great if England would make it possible for the United States to acquire Trinidad for keeps.

41st has complete occupation of Puerto Princess harbor, midway along Palawan's 275-mile-long east coast and occupied a third airfield.

In fighting on Luzon east of Manila, where Japanese forces are in slow retreat into mountains of the Maguindanao watershed, Maj. Gen. Verne D. Madsen's First Cavalry Division and Maj. Gen. Edwin D. Patrick's Sixth Division are attacking strong enemy defense positions. Supporting air units dropped 120 tons of explosives on one strong-point.

Far to the north in Nueva Ecija province, Yank infiltration into the Caraballo mountains are enveloping and unhinging enemy positions covering the Balete pass area.

Today's communique told of a 200-ton bombing by Liberators in the Davao-Zamboanga area of Mindanao island in the southern Philippines, and effective attacks on shipping by patrol planes off Formosa, Okinawa and the China coast. Ten small freighters were sunk or set afire between Formosa and Okinawa. Five more were sunk or fired in the Hongkong area.

ward a little after having been stopped for five days by ferocious enemy fire. To the left of the Third division, the Fifth Marines also advanced, but met the largest-scale counterattack the Japanese have offered in several days. It had some effect on the Japanese, but the enemy has staged elsewhere when his position became hopeless.

The enemy also was believed to be running short of water. Capture of the 362-foot hill by the Third division left the enemy with only a remaining similar height near the steep cliffs. It also brought the Yanks to within 1,400 yards of the northernmost tip of the island.

The advance of the Fifth division also took in another 362-foot hill dominating a fortified ridge, and forcing the enemy to retreat to the island. The clearing of the enemy from this ridge would put him back on sloping ground along the northern outside edge of the boomerang, and make him an open target for tanks.

A significant feature of today's fleet communique was the absence of any reference to enemy artillery fire. This suggested that the Japanese field guns had been knocked out.

The communique today reported a count of 7,127 enemy dead as of noon March 2, an increase of 2,343 in four days. There have been no American reports on Yank losses since Feb. 23, when a communique said the American casualties as of 6 p. m. Feb. 21 were 644 killed, 4,168 wounded and 560 missing—a total of 5,372.

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Women IN THE CHURCH

The recent death in Jerusalem of Baltimore-born Henrietta Szold, world-famed Jewish woman leader and founder of Hadassah, women's Zionist organization of America, removes from organized Jewry one of its most beloved and useful daughters. Miss Szold, daughter of an American Jewish rabbi, was appalled by the prevalence of trachoma and other maladies in the Holy Land which she visited in 1909. From this grew the American Zionist Medical Unit which served during the first World War in giving aid to refugees, and later became the American arm of the Zionist movement. During more recent years, Miss Szold and her associates worked tirelessly for the rescue of victims of the Nazis in Europe. Her eightieth birthday, four years ago, was marked by celebrations in Palestine and in many cities of the United States.

Through personal counseling and in classes two Memphis, Tenn., ministers are endeavoring to help wives of service men to "develop insight and mature emotional attitudes which will enable them to reconstitute normal family relationships based upon companionship and understanding when their soldier-husbands return from overseas. The classes are being jointly conducted by the Rev. S. E. Howie of the Westminster Presbyterian church, and the Rev. William G. Gehri of Grace-St. Luke's Protestant Episcopal church, and are being quite largely attended by service wives of the community.

Miss Sarah Chakko, vice principal and professor of history at Festila Thoburn College, Lucknow, India, has been elected principal of this Methodist college. She succeeds Mrs. Prem Nath Dass. They are the only two women to head the school in its three-quarters of a century of service. Miss Chakko comes from the Syrian Christian church in South India—the church which, ac-
