ALLIES SMASH DEEPER INTO REICH

Germans Report Russians In Earliest New Offensive

Two Soviet Army Groups Battle Through Hungary, Nearing Austrian Border; Germans Fall Back On Well Fortified Positions; Heavy Fighting East Of Berlin

London, March 26—(AP)—Marshal Stalin announced tonight the opening of a new offensive north of the Danube in Slovakia and said Baniska Bytca, former headquarters of a Czechoslovak underground uprising, had been captured.

London, March 26—A fourth Russian offensive has been launched toward Germany's southern mountain redoubt, Berlin, announced today, and Moscow dispatches said the enemy had shifted divisions from Italy and the sagging western front to defend Vienna against a not distant attack.

Two Russian armies already had overrun four-fifths of Hungary below the Danube and their spearhead was within 36 miles of the Austrian border and 77 miles southeast of Vienna.

Berlin broadcasts said a new assault had been sprung north of the Danube in Slovakia, while Marshal Ivan Novev's First Ukrainian army group continued to grind through the Moravian mountains north of Vienna.

The newest attack, described in Berlin as an "all-out onslaught," started on the lower reaches of the Iron River in Slovakia at 4 a. m. yesterday, a German broadcast said, and a bridgehead, over the Iron was gained at Leva, 50 miles northwest of Budapest and 37 miles northeast of Komorn, the Danube river key to Bratislava.

Marshal Fedor I. Tolbukhin's Third Ukrainian army linked up with the Second Ukraine army under Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky in a drive that swept along a 90-mile front through Hungary and (Continued on Page Four)

Officers Probe Gas Black Market

Raleigh, March 26—(AP)—The Raleigh district OPA said today that an alert filling station operator and State Highway Patrolman Albert J. Taylor, both of Henderson, had broken "the crust" on a large black-market counterfeit gasoline ring.

OPA is investigating evidence uncovered by Taylor, who was notified by a filling station operator that a negro had just purchased gasoline from his station with a counterfeit "A" coupon.

A widespread investigation in the Henderson, Louisville, Frankfort, and Durham areas is now underway. Pending developments, OPA said that further information could not be released at this time. However OPA indicated that the case was developing into one of the largest black market investigations in some time.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The most important news of the moment is that the Allied armies which have stormed across the Rhine in the greatest operation of its kind in history are so firmly established on German soil that they cannot be thrown back to the west side—they definitely are there to stay and to continue their drive into the Reich. This doesn't mean that there won't be heavy enemy resistance in some areas. The time of major counter-attacks by the Nazis is yet to come, and we must expect these, especially in the north between Emmerich and the Ruhr. Here the Germans have their best troops, including their crack first paratrooper army, which also comprises tanks and infantry to protect this strategic gateway to the Westphalian plain that flanks the Ruhr and leads to Berlin.

It is the particular ambition of the Nazis to force the Hitlerites to stand and fight on that northern flank, which is adapted to tank warfare. If that battle eventuates it will be a fight to a finish, our immediate objective being the utter annihilation of this German army. Nazi Field Marshal Kesselring, who has been brought up from the Italian theater to supplant Field Marshal Von Rundstedt, is no Napoleon genius but he is a capable and determined fighter. Perhaps more important, he is said to be staunchly loyal to Hitler.

Report New Landings Near Jap Homeland

Prisoners

Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army took first place today among all the nine Allied armies on the Western Front in the capture of prisoners, building its total to 361,478.

The Third went to the head of Gen. Eisenhower's class over the First Army, in combat two months longer, which has seized 299,916 Germans on the Western Front. All armies on the western front have announced the capture of at least 1,169,917 prisoners, more than 3,000 of them yesterday.

Latest figures announced showed the Ninth Army with 84,645 and the Seventh Army with 113,005—counting only 15,000 of the Germans captured in the Palatinate and Saarland.

The French First Army has taken 85,841, the Canadian First Army 143,614, the British Second 107,847, the Allied First Airborne 3,500 and the Fifth 20,016. The American 15th Army has not yet reported.

WILL SEEK TO AVERT STRIKE

To Ask 30-Day Extension Of Coal Contract

Washington, March 26—(AP)—Secretary of Labor Perkins is expected to try to avert a possible nationwide soft coal strike by appealing this week for a 30-day contract extension.

The current wage agreement expires Saturday night, and negotiations between John L. Lewis's United Mine Workers and bituminous operators, which began March 1, have stalled.

Lewis's demand for a 10 cent ton royalty is said by the operators to be a big obstacle. Adding to the tense situation building up as the contract's expiration date approaches, is a strike threat among the 400,000 bituminous miners scheduled for Wednesday. Few would predict that the miners would vote in the negative while Lewis is negotiating a new contract for them.

Oscar S. Smith, head of the National Labor Relations Board's division, said the NLRB is all set to take the vote on Wednesday. Lewis's notice on February 26 that a dispute existed under the war labor disputes act.

Tokyo Reports Follow Bombardment Of Ryukyu Islands By Carrier-Battleship Task Force

Guam, March 26—(AP)—American troops, supported by intensive bombardment from a large carrier-battleship task force, are "attempting" landings on the Okinawa group in the Ryukyu chain, only 325 miles south of Kyushu in the Japanese homeland, Domei news agency reported without confirmation today.

Aerial bombardment of several of the Ryukyu islands, including Okinawa itself, and of air bases in all of the southern Japanese home islands of Kyushu, Shikoku and Honshu, preceded the reported landings.

Tokyo said Okinawa itself was bombed three times Saturday by U. S. battleships—presumably some of the biggest, newest 16-inch battleships in Adm. Raymond A. Spruance's Fifth fleet. Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz has announced only that Minami Daito, 230 miles east of Okinawa, was shelled.

The enemy broadcast, made in English and recorded by the Federal Communications Commission, reported the landings were attempted on Toka Shima and Aka Jima, small islands west of the southwestern tip of Okinawa.

Okinawa, most important in the Ryukyu chain and an ideal base for strikes at either Japan or the China coast, probably would be the chief objective in any amphibious operation in the central Ryukyus.

Okinawa has several airfields and good harbors suitable for anchorage of large warships.

Tokyo said a powerful U. S. task force of "15 standard and converted carriers, 11 battleships, 10 cruisers, 32 destroyers as well as innumerable auxiliary vessels" was lying south-west of Inawa to support and protect the landing troops.

Capture of Okinawa would give the United States control of the East China sea and would provide airfields to strike at the Japanese (Continued on Page Four)

Churchill Will Report To House

London, March 26—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill is expected to give the House of Commons an eye-witness account of the new Western Front offensive as he witnessed it yesterday on a visit to the Rhine's east bank.

Churchill almost certainly will appear in the House before its adjournment Thursday for the Easter holiday, and it was felt he would not miss the opportunity to describe the opening phases of what he has called "the big heave."

The Prime Minister had a close call while standing at the shattered western end of the bridge at Wesel. Guided by Lt. Gen. William H. Simpson, commander of the Ninth Army, Churchill was almost hit when a German shell crashed 50 yards away. Churchill was peering through binoculars at the remains of the German town of Wesel at the time. Other enemy shells landed in the river nearby.

Says Luftwaffe Is Now Grounded

Rome, March 26—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Ira C. Eaker, chief of the Mediterranean Allied air force declared today that the German air force is "virtually grounded."

Noting that only six German oil refineries still in operation within range of his bombers have not come under attack, he said:

"Every day our pilots see a modern German fighter force perched on airfields for lack of fuel. They average 20 missions daily. We average more than 2,000. The Luftwaffe is virtually grounded. I mean just that."

The U. S. 15th air force campaign to knock out enemy fuel sources has occupied more than 50,000 men and has cost 2,857 heavy bombers and more than 20,000 men in a year's time, Eaker said.

He pointed out that the combat crew strength of the 15th air force is about 20,000 and therefore that during the year this aerial arm lost the equivalent of 100 per cent of its total fighting personnel. "We take some consolation from the knowledge that these losses have saved many thousands of ground soldiers," he added.

Senate Group Studying Nation's Food Shortage

Witness Declares Shortage Of Meat Is Due Principally To Activity Of Black Markets

Washington, March 26—(AP)—Senators asked today why Great Britain does not get more meat from Canada and less from the United States as they began a broad investigation into the nation's food situation.

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) told the Agriculture Committee he understood the Canadians had ample meat and recommended an inquiry into why more of it is not used for feed-lease.

Saying he agreed that it was a point that should be investigated, Senator Shipstead (R-Minn.) said his information was that butter was unrationed in Canada and it was "Great Britain" asked Senator Ellender (D-La.)

"The British have to pay for it if they get it from Canada." Shipstead replied.

As the committee began its hearings, Chairman Thomas (D-Okla.) announced that one aim will be to "uncover and destroy" black markets.

"Using the power of subpoena," he said, "the committee will, if necessary, compel the production of records which will expose the black market operations in meat, chickens, butter, sugar and other food products."

Wheeler said he had heard the government would not let meat be brought into this country from Canada although the Canadians were anxious to export it.

Lt. Col. R. W. Olmstead, director of Supply for the Commodity Credit Corporation, answered Wheeler that "We have made efforts to get large quantities" but the Canadian government would not permit exports. What Wheeler had probably heard, Olmstead continued, was of instances where Americans had crossed the border and bought meat for household use. He said he understood OPA frowned on that.

The first witness was Wilbur LaRoe, Jr., counsel for the National Independent Meat Packers Association which he described as an organization of about 700 "small and medium-sized packers."

"This shortage of meat," LaRoe asserted, is not by any means due entirely to the large amount which is taken by the armed forces and feed-lease. The shortage is due in very substantial part to an illegal diversion of meat from the normal channels of distribution.

"We have the worst black market in our history, a black market which owes its existence primarily to the fact that legitimate packers are required under OPA regulations to produce both pork and beef at a loss."

He repeated the argument that packers have been making for months—that OPA regulations are putting them out of business because the margin between ceiling prices for live animals and wholesale meat products is too small.

A five-man subcommittee has been named to study the problem. The present work contract expires Saturday night.

POUND NAZI WAR PLANTS

Oil Plants, Gun Factories And Car Works Hit

London, March 26—(AP)—Two oil plants, a gun factory and an armored car works in southeastern Germany were attacked today by 300 escorted American bombers as the airmen switched back to strategic targets after a weeklong bombing prelude for the Rhine offensive.

The small force of heavy bombers split into two task forces over Leipzig. One went for a synthetic oil plant and a natural oil refinery at Seitz, 20 miles south of Leipzig while the other flew to Plauen, 11 miles from the Czechoslovak border and blasted the twin war factories.

The attack was the first heavy bomber assault on Germany in 4 days and was part of another night raid coordinated with the U. S. 15th air force in Italy. Bomber from Italy hammered communications in Austria, the German radio reported.

The Germans also indicated that Russian bombers attacked Berlin. The American bombers yesterday launched what may be one of their toughest assignments—hunting out and blasting German underground factories and warehouses.

Last night Mosquitos attacked Berlin for the 34th consecutive night. American night-flying planes joined in hammering German targets. The night attacks followed yesterday's pulverizing of German strongpoints and reinforcement centers in front of Field Marshal Montgomery's drive into the Ruhr by thousands of Allied planes.

A hidden underground objective was made yesterday by a force of 250 British-based Liberators which attacked three buried oil storage dumps between Hamburg (Continued on Page Four)

WILL CONSIDER GEORGIA CASE

High Court To Hear Freight Rates Complaint

Washington, March 26—(AP)—The Supreme Court today agreed to consider a complaint by the state of Georgia which seeks to force equalization of freight rates between the south and other parts of the country.

Justice Douglas delivered a 3-4 opinion explaining the court's decision. Chief Justice Stone wrote a dissent in which Justices Roberts, Frankfurter and Jackson concurred.

Governor Ellis Arnall of Georgia, in urging the court to consider the complaint, asserted that 23 major railroads had "resorted to conspiracy and coercion" to prevent lower freight rates. He said they were operating an "illegal combination" against his state, resulting in northern manufacturers, sellers and other shippers gaining an advantage over Georgia business concerns.

Railroad attorneys denied the assertions. They said the lines were required by law to "fix joint rates and file them with the Interstate Commerce Commission." They recalled that Georgia already has a similar case pending before the ICC, and contended that to permit such rate cases would destroy the entire principle of ICC regulation of the industry.

Governor Paroles Two Pitt Countians

William Earl Spain, who was sentenced to from four to seven years for hit-and-run driving and manslaughter at the April, 1944, term of Superior Court, has been paroled by Governor Gregg Cherry. Spain was convicted in connection with the death of Pfc. Raymond Alvin Hahn, 13, of Marine Squadron "43. Testimony in the case was that two Marines, Pfc. Hahn and Pfc. J. J. Jacobs, on the night of April 16, were walking along 10th Street extension toward the N.Y.A. Spain's car struck the Marines, fracturing Hahn's skull and knocking Jacobs into a ditch. Hahn died at the hospital. Jacobs recovered. The driver of the car did not stop.

State highway patrolmen and local police nearly a week later followed a clue that led to the arrest of Spain and a companion, Joe Riggs, both farmers. Spain admitted he was the driver of the death car. His companion, Riggs, was acquitted of complicity.

Another parole issued by the governor was for Randall Williams, who was sentenced to a year in prison for forging an order.

Ninth Army Forces Cross Lippe River 17 Miles East Of The Rhine; Patton's Divisions Within 235 Miles Of Berlin; Other Armies Driving Speedily Ahead

With the U. S. First Army, March 26—(AP)—First Army troops in a dramatic coup today sprinted 22 miles through German lines.

Elements of an armored unit wheeled northeast of Coblenz, fought onto a highway and then rolled on "without major opposition," an officer said.

This push was timed with other tank drives farther north in the First Army sector.

"One of the oddest things about it is the way the tanks whipped on past villages where German troops were garrisoned," an officer said.

Resistance in some sectors apparently depended on the temperature of the enemy commander.

Paris, March 26—(AP)—American Ninth Army troops and armor broke through German defenses on the Lippe River, east of Dornum, 17 miles east of the Rhine. The American and British Airborne divisions were crashing through the broken and disorganized enemy for huge gains against light opposition in the northern sector.

The Ninth Army's 30th Infantry division, breaking through Meuse defenses on the Lippe River, collided with Infantry of the German 118th Panzer division and a field dispatch said a heavy battle was raging.

Sweeping out of their positions along the Isel River, British Parachute troops drove to within little more than a half-mile of Brunen, six miles northeast of Wesel, and (Continued on page six)

Today On The Home Front

Washington, March 26—(AP)—U. S. San may have to pay money out of his pocket to the night clubs which lose money through the curfew and to the race tracks which have lost by being closed down.

The reason: Through the income tax law set-up they can get a refund on taxes paid a couple of years ago to make up for money they lose this year. In 1942 Congress passed the law which makes this possible.

The intention of that law was to give business a break. This was the feeling behind the law.

The wartime tax rates are very high. They drain off most of the business profits, profits which otherwise could be laid aside as a reserve against a bad year.

So, if a firm runs into a bad year it can re-open its tax payments of a couple of years ago and get a refund on some of the money paid the government.

This means, in effect, that instead of having to suffer a big profit loss in any one year a firm, through this refund, actually is enabled to spread its loss over a couple of years.

Example: Businessman Jones for several years has had an annual profit of \$75,000. But this year he has a loss of \$100,000. So he reopens his tax payments for 1943 and 1944.

In 1943 his profits were \$75,000. He applies this year's loss of \$100,000 against 1943 profit and finds he owes no tax for 1943.

But he still has a loss of \$25,000 to do something about—the difference between \$100,000 and \$75,000. So he re-opens his tax payment for 1944 when his profits were also \$75,000.

He subtracts that \$25,000 from the \$75,000 and finds that his tax for 1944 should be paid only on \$50,000 instead of \$75,000.

So he gets a refund on the tax he paid on the \$75,000 profit in 1943 and a refund on the tax paid on \$25,000 of the \$75,000 profit in 1944.

This can be done by individuals who have business losses and by corporations. An individual can't do it if he suffers a loss through investments or if his income is from salary or wages.

So far we have been talking only about income tax. But a corporation can get a refund also on the tax paid on excess profits.

Business income is hit with two kinds of taxes: A regular income tax and a corporate tax.

Membership at close of quarter—officers and teachers 29, scholars 202, cradle roll 46. Collections during quarter—orphans \$15, Sunday school supplies \$25.60, missions \$28.78. Out of the 53 additions to the church, 33 have come from the Sunday school.

Christian Science Service.
"Matter" was the subject of the lesson-sermon in all Christian Science churches and societies on Sunday, March 25.

The golden text was from Isaiah 40:8: "The grass withereth, the flower fadeth; but the word of our God shall stand for ever."

Among the citations which composed the lesson-sermon were the following from the Bible: "And Jesus went about all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all manner of sickness and all manner of disease among the people. And his fame went throughout all Syria; and they brought unto him all sick people that were taken with divers diseases and torments, and those which were possessed with devils, and those which were lunatic, and those that had the palsy, and he healed them." the physical senses, reveals man as harmoniously existent. In Truth, which is the only basis of health; and thus Science denies all disease, heals the sick, overthrows false evidence and refutes materialistic logic.

Collection of Oriental Art.
The official board of the Community Art Center has secured for the Art Center a collection of more than 75 pieces of Oriental Art. In the collection are objects from Japan, China, Indo China, India and the Philippines. The objects are more varied than the countries from which they come. One can find in the collection a bronze and ivory rocking elephant, a clausonne vase, a Satsuma china incense burner, quartz horses, miniature Chinese iron, a Chinese inlaid blackwood chair, Foochow lacquer cabinet, set jade jewelry (necklace, bracelet, earrings, ivory chopsticks, a Tonkin girl bronze bust, brass tray, dolls and what-not.

The collection was assembled by Mr. and Mrs. George V. Monk of Farmville. Mr. Monk lived in the Orient for more than 25 years and Mrs. Monk for a number of years. When the war came they were able to get their fine collection out of China to this country. In their home in Farmville they had no room for

many of their art objects and the idea of placing them in storage where no one could see and enjoy them seemed such a pity that they decided to lend them to art galleries or museums. The State Museum in Raleigh has the largest collection—enough to fill a big room. The Greenville gallery is delighted to have the above mentioned collection which is all the officials think they can take care of—with the limited space at their disposal.

The Monk collection is loaned to the gallery for an indefinite period and will be open to the public on the opening day of the Community Art Festival, Wednesday, April 4. At this time Mrs. Monk, dressed in Chinese costume, will be present to tell interesting things about the objects of art on display.

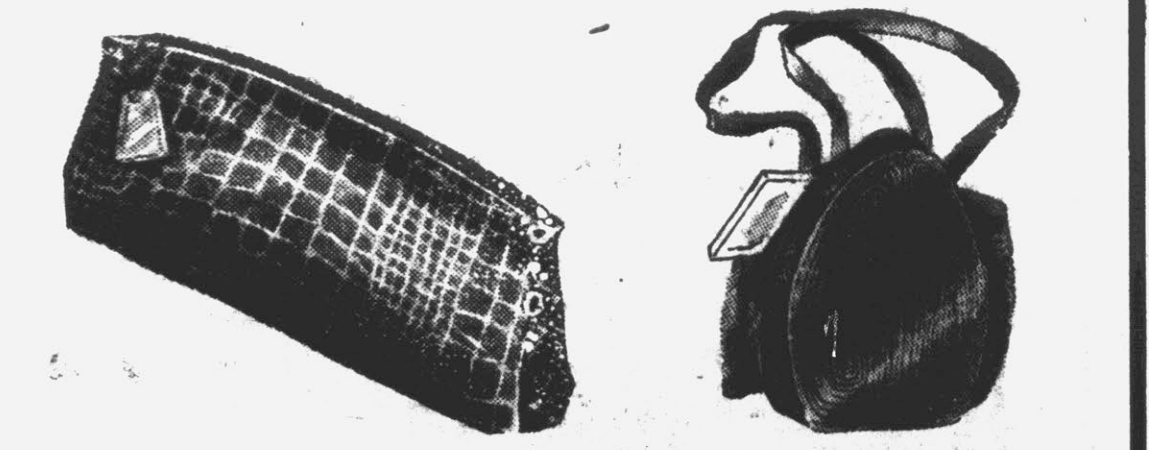

Some time ago Dirk Lay, mission-
ary to the Pima Indians, died, and
newspapers all over the country
carried the account of the great
service he had rendered those needy
people.

It seems that the white people
living on the river which flows
through the Pima Reservation had
invested the irrigation water for
their own use and by so doing left
the Indians in a half-starving con-
dition. As Lay watched the Indian
crops wither summer after summer
under the scorching sun, he decid-
ed to do something about the mat-
ter. He went to Washington and
worked for six months interviewing
congressmen and senators. In addi-
tion he sent out 44,000 appeals all
over the country urging the people
to write their senators and con-
gressmen. He stuck to the thing
until the bill passed both houses.
It was said that the bell in the
church steeple at Sacaton rang for
a whole day and night after this
word was received.

Lay was a humble man who asked
nothing of his fellows but the op-
portunity to serve them, and who
served for his efforts little beside
their undying good will. He had no
nation-wide acclaim at any time,
but there are thousands of humble
hearts today that grow warm at
the memory of him. He loved his
fellowmen and served them.

AMERICA IN WARTIME

Washington—Another war bond
drive is almost upon us. The seventh
one—running from May 14 to
June 30—is the greatest of all. The
sum of seven billion dollars for
individuals is the highest yet. Of
that amount, four billion must be
series E bonds, and that, too, is the
highest goal yet.

To give you an idea of what those
figures mean, let's forget the big
money figures for a minute.

Instead, let's think about the
bonds themselves—separate, in-
dividual objects that you can see
and feel.

In the first war loan drive, no
fewer than 20 million of those ob-
jects were sold. In the second war
loan, this shot up to 34 million.

Hold your hats. We're still going
up. In the third war loan 54,700,000
units changed hands. In the fourth
it was 71,700,000. In the fifth, 74-
80,000.

Then, in the Christmas season
last war loan drive last November
and December, the number of units
dropped back to 66,300,000.

Now—the pay-off.

If the goals of the seventh war
loan are met, we'll have to buy
more than 90 million bonds. If
those bonds were milestones, they
would reach to the sun.

Of course, the vast majority of all
government securities, in terms of
separate pieces of paper, are series E
bonds. In the sixth war loan, when
80,000,000 bonds were sold, 66,132-
000 were series E.

That illustrates the wide partici-
pation of the people in financing
this war, because series E is the
"people's bond." Only individuals
can buy these small bonds.

Between the start of the war
finance program in May, 1941, and
the end of January, 1945—less than
four years—the people bought 761-
000,000 series E bonds.

Those E bonds would stretch to
the sun if set 200 yards apart.
Let's see how those 761,408,000
bonds are divided as to denomina-
tion: 540,776,000 are \$25 bonds;
109,786,000 are \$50 bonds; 88,326-
000 are \$100 bonds; 10,295,000 are
\$500 bonds; and 7,249,000 are \$1,000
bonds. Then 4,376,000 are the \$10
service men's bonds.

don't add to the exact total.)
The tremendous number of \$25
bonds gives a good indication of the
extent to which war finance has
touched lives and homes. Those
\$25 bonds cost the buyers more than
ten billion dollars. The next denomina-
tion in total value was the \$100
bond, representing about 6 1-2 bil-
lions in sales.
Total amount of E bonds issued
has been \$30,700,000,000. Buyers
have kept total close to 85 per
cent of buyers—about \$26,000,000,000
worth.

tax and an excess profits tax.
Thus a firm who has no excess
profits this year can get a refund
on the excess profits tax paid two
years ago, or last year.
You can see how all this would
work. Here's a New York night
club. By staying open until 4 a. m.,
last year its profits were \$500,000.
Say the midnight curfew cuts its
profits down to \$200,000 this year.
Since it did not operate at a loss,
it could not get a refund on the
income tax paid in previous years.
But it might be able to get a re-
fund on its excess profits tax pre-
viously paid.

Some economists look on this re-
fund arrangement as a great boon
to businesses whose profits are cut
down sharply during the reconver-
sion period after the war.

German First and Seventh armies
on that sector of the front were all
but wiped out in the recent offen-
sive by the U. S. Third and Seventh
armies west to the Rhine. The Nazis
have their big stuff up north.
Another important aspect of the
situation is the intensification of
the Russian drive for Austria. Two
red armies are smashing for Vien-
na, and the Third Ukrainian army
in Hungary is less than two score

miles from the Austrian border.
Thus the back-door to the Reich
is in dire peril. Successful penetra-
tion of Australia would bring the
Russians up against Hitler's Alpine
"last stand" fortress. Taken in con-
junction with Patton's headlong
push, it holds out fascinating pos-
sibilities.

been assigned to the investigation.
But virtually the entire Senate
Agriculture Committee arranged to
sit in on the opening session, to hear
testimony from smut meat packers.
Senator Stewart (D-Tenn) invited
the packers to bring along their
balance sheets to prove their con-
tention they can not buy and
slaughter livestock at a profit under
existing price ceilings.
The investigation has four prin-
cipal aims: 1. To determine how
much food is on hand in the nation;
2. Where it is; 3. What are the pro-
spects for increased production; 4.
The probable demand.
Chairman Thomas (D-Okla) told
reporters the inquiry is almost cer-
tain to lead into an investigation
of black markets.
Stewart said he is determined to
find out how big a food stockpile
Great Britain has and the amounts
set aside for lend-lease and UNRRA
operations.
The United States Chamber of
Commerce, meanwhile, made public
a report of its agriculture committee
contending that "present and pro-
spective shortages of x x x were readi-
ly foreseeable and have developed
only because of the persistent and
continued under-production of
adequate food supplies."

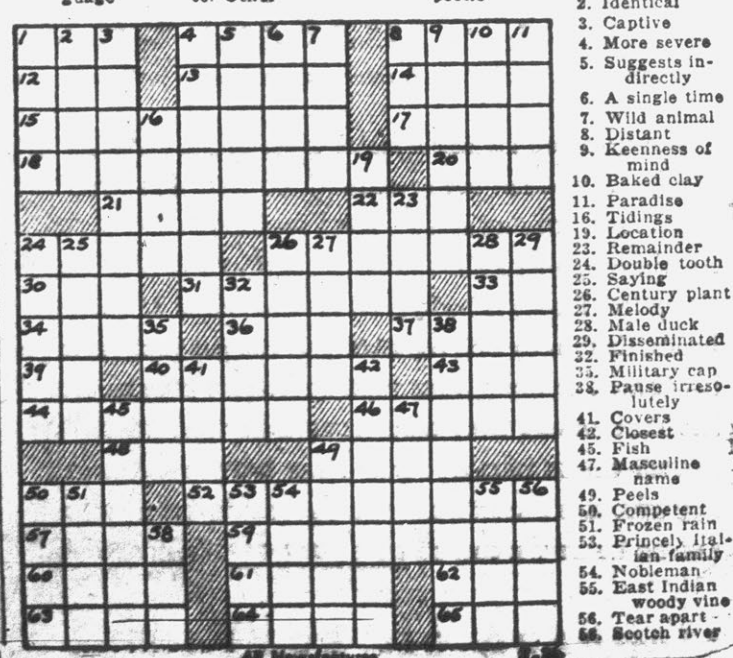

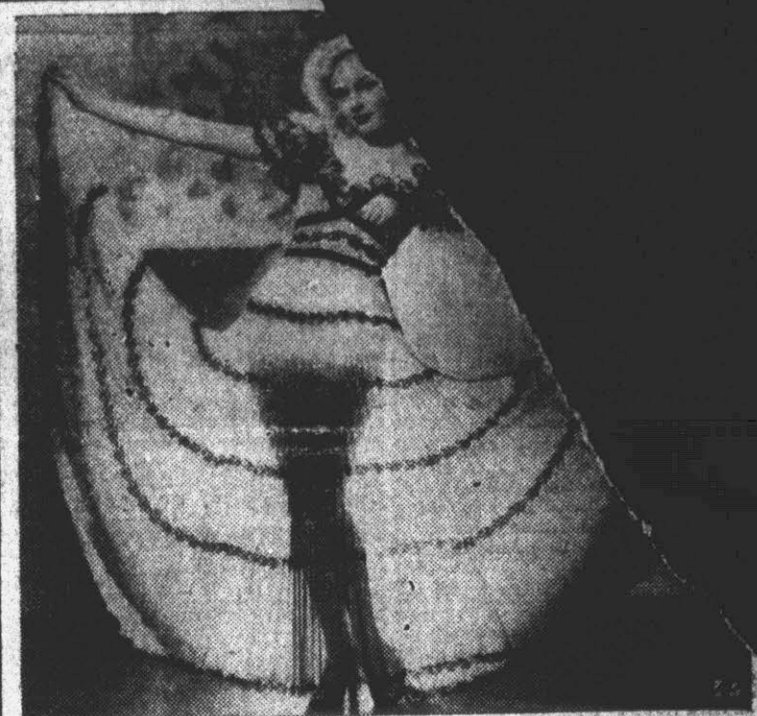

Smaller Crops Are Forecast

Raleigh, March 26—(AP)—Frank

beans and cowpeas, Parker said.

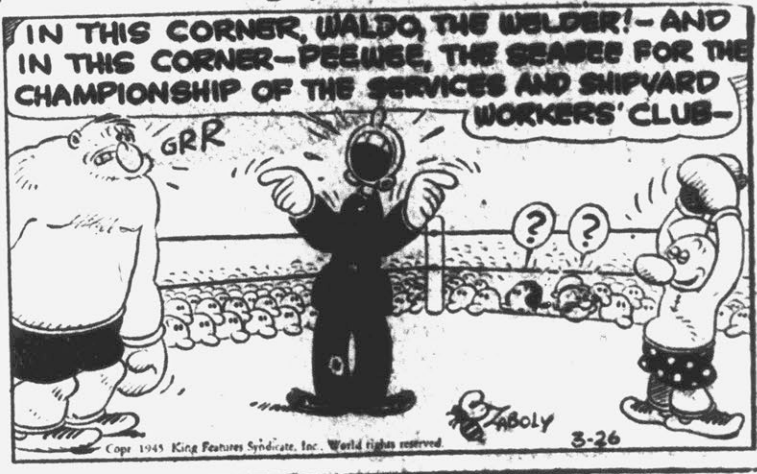

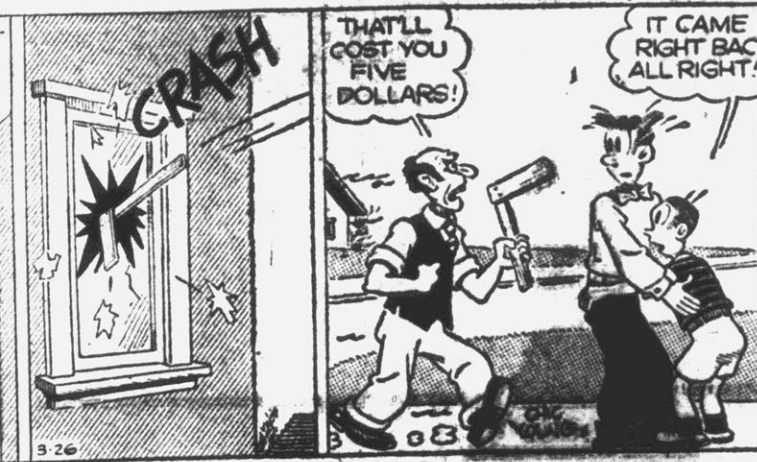

ADVANCES ON LUZON TODAY

Bombers Wreck Power Plant On Formosa

By JAMES HUTCHESON

Manila, March 26—(AP)—Philippine-based American bombers wrecked the big Jitsugetsu hydroelectric plant on Formosa Friday in their continued pounding of this headquarters reported today.

The new blow by more than 50 Liberator bombers and Lightning fighters of Maj. Gen. Ennis C. Whitehead's Fifth air force was disclosed as Tokyo reports said the Ryukyus were being invaded by Americans.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Monday and Sunday communiques, in addition to announcing the crippling of the power plant, reported other damage to Formosa installations.

A shift of units of the famous First (dismounted) cavalry division from central to southern Luzon was disclosed for the first time. The Monday communique said they were initiating a drive along the main highway south of Santo Tomas in Batangas province.

Doughboys of the 25th and 32nd divisions, fighting for important Bataan pass of northern Luzon, bloodily repulsed six Japanese counterattacks.

There was no further report on the situation around the Philippine summer capital of Baguio. Previous communiques had reported 32nd division troops only a few miles from the city in two directions.

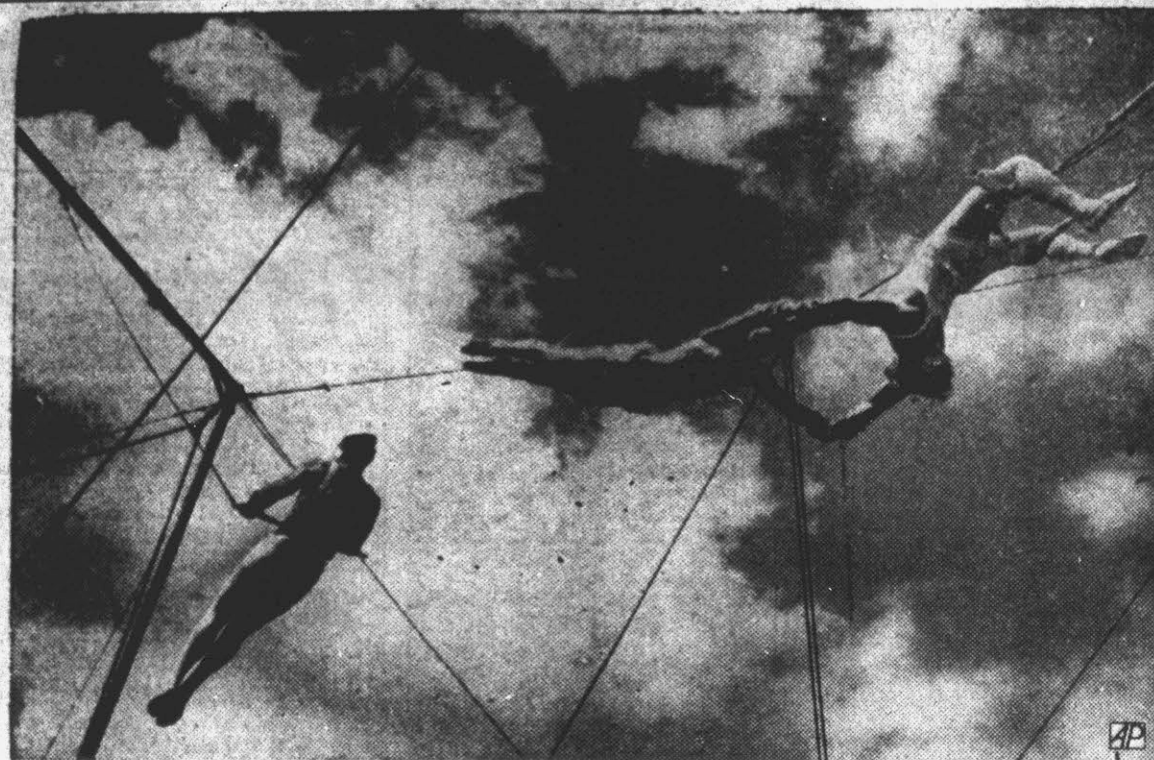

Allies Smash . . .

were still advancing. "There is nothing to halt a breakthrough," the commander of an American Airborne unit said tonight.

The Third Army sent its tanks crashing across the main river bridge at Aschaffenburg into the wide Frankfurt Plain a bare 250 miles from Russian lines in the East.

One unconfirmed report said Frankfurt had been entered. The last "dimmed out" battle accounts hours before had placed Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's mighty shock troops six miles away. The city's radio went dead last night.

The Fourth Armored division again had burst loose 40 miles beyond the Rhine in a sweep so swift that the Germans were caught without time to blow the Aschaffenburg Bridge, 22 miles southeast of Frankfurt. The "breakthrough" division's coup was so complete that Frankfurt was hopelessly outflanked. Frankfurt, a city of 547,000, is the ninth largest in Germany and one of the Reich's greatest railroad centers.

The First Army also broke from its original Rhine bridgehead at Remagen and pushed 19 miles east of the shattered river line.

The U. S. Ninth and British Second Armies in and north of the Ruhr were ten miles past the river on a solid 31-mile front and battle dispatches said a general breakout there was expected momentarily.

"The decisive fighting of the whole war now is unequivocally under way in the West," a German military spokesman said by radio from Berlin, 235 miles from vanguard of Patton's army.

The Ninth Army fought in the northeast suburbs of Duisburg, vast inland port of 431,000, and within ten miles of rubble-piled Essen, where the sprawling Krupp Works have been rebuilt seven times after bombers' calls.

The Germans reported fighting

outside the Baden capital of Karlsruhe, suggesting yet another crossing by the Seventh Army, which had cleared the Palatinate and routed the last Germans west of the Rhine between Switzerland and Holland.

The whole Western Front was becoming fluid as Gen. Eisenhower's offensive turned into a powerful floodtide. The humblest infantryman sensed complete victory over Germany, because the Russians also were pushing in from the East in massive power.

With troops already 136 miles deep in the heart of Germany and the Rhine crossed at seven places, the Third Army threw yet another bridgehead across the upper Rhine at an undisclosed place where the river rapidly runs through a gorge.

At nightfall, a security blackout was imposed on most movements of the British Second Army ten miles beyond the lower Rhine, the same sort of censorship which has prevailed during most transcendent developments.

Close to 85 miles of the east bank of the Rhine was in Allied hands at the time; the river was being crossed virtually at will.

Duisburg, sprawling port of the Ruhr basin, was bypassed as Field Marshal Montgomery's armies moved within grasp of several cities which spawned German war mater-

ial. At last reports, Essen (pop. 660,000) was 10 miles away; the Duisburg suburbs were entered; Mülheim (126,805) was five miles distant; Oberhausen (191,305); Dortmund (539,000); 29, and Münster (143,748) 48.

The unverified report reaching Supreme Headquarters that Frankfurt had been entered added that the great cathedral city, where many German emperors were crowned, was found virtually desert-

The First Army to the north exploited another breakthrough of decaying German defenses comparable to the victory at St. Lo, advancing three miles nearer Berlin overnight from the Remagen-Bonn sector. A dozen villages fell.

Nowhere was the bewildered and feverishly fled Wehrmacht able to check the mighty tide of more than 1,250,000 shock troops Gen. Eisenhower had massed on the Western Front for the final battle.

The Third Army was more than 60 miles beyond the Rhine and running ahead unchecked within 235 miles of Berlin.

The hollow heart of Germany was exposed. The staggered enemy army, deprived of more than 300,000 effectives in the West alone since the start of this month, had neither the force nor the mobility to recover from the multiple blow Eisenhower was raining in increasing numbers and strength.

Final victory was in the air and in the songs of infantrymen riding eastward in clanking tanks and every conceivable conveyance.

Condition Weaker

London, March 26—(AP)—The condition of David Lloyd George, who has been ill for some weeks at his home in North Wales, is "becoming critical," a bulletin from his doctor said today.

"The physical weakness of Earl Lloyd George of Dwyfor has increased considerably during the last 24 hours and his condition is now becoming critical," the bulletin declared.

Jolson Marries Again

Palm Springs, Calif., March 26—(AP)—Al Jolson has taken his fourth bride.

She's 21-year-old Erle Galbraith, who has had a few minor parts in motion pictures.

The 56-year-old movie and radio singer signed with her to the little town of Quartzsite, Ariz., yesterday and was married by a justice of the peace.

New Cases of Polio

Durham, March 26—(AP)—Durham's second case of infantile paralysis within a week was reported to health department officials today, the first two cases since last summer's serious outbreak.

Latest victim of the disease is Bennett Hayes, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Hayes.

Burma Town Taken
