

Russian Forces Smash To Within 20 Miles Of Austrian Border Today

Advance Units Within 58 Miles Of Vienna; German Resistance Crumbling Along Entire Front; Danzig Being Cleared; Port Of Gdynia Captured

London, March 28.—(AP)—Russian troops have captured the Baltic port of Gdynia. Marshal Stalin announced tonight.

London, March 28.—(AP)—Four Russian armies hammered in a huge pincer on Czechoslovakia and Vienna today, and Berlin declared one thrust through Western Hungary within 58 miles of Vienna now had rolled up to the Central Raba River, guarding Austria.

A German broadcast declared the Soviets had forced a new crossing of the Oder River northwest of Kustrin, 38 miles from Berlin. A Moscow dispatch reported the Russian supply system was "working all-out to prepare a spring offensive" on this front closest to the Nazi capital.

Other Russian units were cleaning out Danzig, where the opening shots of this war were fired, and fighting into nearby Gdynia. The German high command reported fierce street combat in both cities.

The Third Ukrainian Army was below the Danube to within 20 miles of Austria, and 58 of Vienna yesterday, and the German high command said Marshal Fedor Tolbukhin's men now had thrust to the Central Raba River, south of their closest approach to Vienna.

To the north the First and Fourth Ukrainian armies were lunging through German and Polish Silesia toward Czechoslovakia, hitting for the Moravian Gap to Prague and Vienna.

This push from Silesia on an 80-mile front had struck to within 14 miles of Moravia-Czechia, Czechoslovakia. (Continued on Page Six)

Hitler May Seek Refuge In Japan

Moscow, March 28.—(AP)—A Romanian diplomat en route home from Tokyo asserted today that the Japanese firmly expect Adolf Hitler, Heinrich Himmler and Benito Mussolini to seek refuge in Japan "at any time" now that Germany's cause seems hopeless.

"The fact is, they've been expecting for a long time," declared the diplomat, Victor Gutulesco, a former member of the Romanian embassy staff in Tokyo who has just arrived in Moscow.

He said the Japanese did not appear particularly pleased about the prospect of giving shelter to Nazi or Fascist leaders, fearing that it may only make life harder for them than it already is.

Gutulesco, who traveled through Manchuria on his way here, said he had found an unmistakable spirit of defeat prevailing everywhere.

SENATE GETS LABOR BILL

President Urges Passage Manpower Measure

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—The White House was reported today to have thrown its power behind the Manpower Bill pending in the Senate.

Senator Thomas (D-Utah), manager of the bill on the floor, received a letter from President Roosevelt which was reported to urge passage of the measure.

Thomas only confirmed receipt of the communication. He was expected to read it to the Senate later in the day.

The bill, which carries a threat of fine or jail for workers and employers alike to disregard job directives, just barely squeezed through the House.

The 167-to-160 margin by which it cleared the House yesterday was a tip-off to the opposition which was developing, particularly among lawmakers with large organized labor groups in their constituencies.

A compromise between the House work-or-jail bill and the milder, largely voluntary measure which passed the Senate, the conference bill provides for a selective labor freeze at the discretion of War Mobilizer James F. Byrnes. Byrnes also would be authorized to establish plant employment ceilings and to regulate or forbid employers from hiring new workers.

Penalties up to a year in jail and a \$10,000 fine would confront both workers and employers who balked at Byrnes' directives. The penalties would apply, however, only after court conviction of a willful violation.

During yesterday's House debate Rep. Short (R-Mo) called the measure "tranny and slavery brought up to date." But Rep. Thompson (Continued on page four)

Report Gains On Burma Front

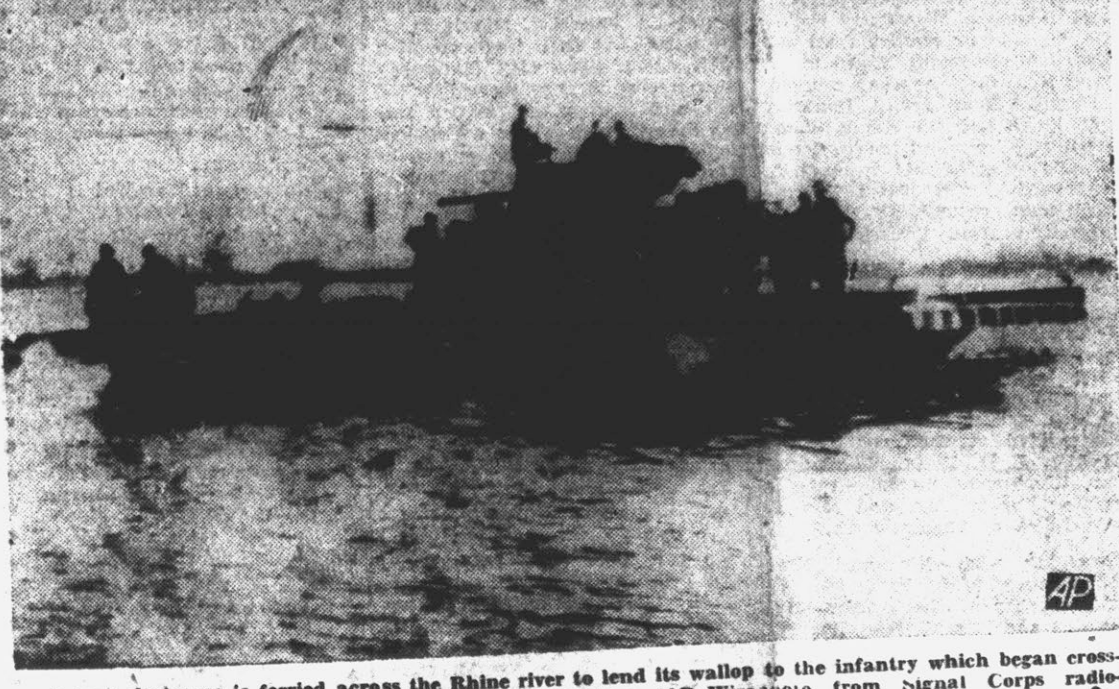
Calcutta, March 28.—(AP)—Japanese positions in the Kyaikase area 25 miles south of Mandalay were battered yesterday by Allied bombers as British and Indian land forces pushed toward the town from the south and north, Allied headquarters said today.

The Japanese have been reported massing at Kyaikase, apparently for a drive eastward out of the collapse in central Burma pocket.

British and Indian troops have cleared the east bank of the Irrawaddy river from Pakokku to Myittha, 25 miles northeast of Kyaikase. Other Allied troops advancing northward from captured Meiktila have occupied Myittha, 10 miles south of Kyaikase while from the north British troops are mopping up south of Mandalay.

Northeast of Mandalay Chinese First army troops were fanning out south and southeast from captured Hsipaw, Burma road junction, in a move to cut the eastern escape routes of the enemy.

AIRMEN POUND BERLIN TODAY

Germans Announce Plans To Evacuate City

London, March 28.—(AP)—More than 400 U. S. Flying Fortresses attacked war plants today in Berlin, where new orders for evacuation of women, children and all unneeded persons were issued—while more than 500 other fortresses hammered similar targets in Hannover.

There was heavy anti-aircraft fire over the Reich capital, where targets included plants making panzer tanks, armored cars and trucks in the Spandau and Falkensee districts eight and 15 miles west and northwest of the heart of Berlin.

The bombers were escorted by 350 Mustang fighters.

The German news agency DNB made the announcement that steps would be taken to remove all unessential citizens from the city, which underwent its 36th consecutive RAF Mosquito raid last night.

Similar plans have been reported by the Japanese for Tokyo and thus Allied air power was forcing further emergency measures in the last two remaining major Axis capitals. Armament plants in Berlin and Hannover were the targets for today's raiders.

Today's raid was the fifth major one since the start of the war. (Continued on Page Four)

Report Gains On Burma Front

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Heads Of State Hospitals Resign

Raleigh, March 28.—(AP)—With the resignation yesterday of Dr. J. R. Saunders, superintendent of the State Hospital at Morganton, two of the state's four mental institutions were without directing heads today.

Dr. J. M. Owens, superintendent of the Dix Hill Hospital here, previously had resigned to accept a post with the District of Columbia Health Service. His resignation is effective April 1.

R. M. Rothgeb, business manager of the State Hospital Board of Control, said Dr. Saunders had received several offers with higher salaries but had not announced which one he would accept. His resignation becomes effective May 1.

The Morganton superintendent, head of the hospital since July 1943, tendered his resignation at a meeting of the executive committee of the hospital board headed by J. H. Beall of Lenoir. He was elected to a six-year term after the death of Dr. F. B. Watkins.

Rothgeb said replacements for the two men probably would be selected by the new hospital board of control which will be appointed by Governor Cherry effective April 1. The new board, to be selected from congressional districts, was authorized by the recent General Assembly and will serve staggered terms.

ITALIANS TOLD TO GET READY

Clark Asks Patriots To Hamper Nazi Retreat

Rome, March 28.—(AP)—Gen. Mark W. Clark, the Allied commander in Italy, declared today that a German retreat northward was inevitable "sooner or later" and ordered patriots to stand by to strike at a moment's notice to hamper the withdrawal.

The Germans inevitably will retreat sooner or later, leaving Fascist troops to cover their rear," Clark said.

He declared it was certain that patriots in the Central Apennines area would "be called upon to be of effective assistance to my armies shortly."

Patriots on escape routes north from Bologna to the Brenner Pass and along railroads leading to the Alpine Passes should prepare now for their jobs of hampering the withdrawal, Clark added.

He advised them not to take on new recruits because of many Italian who "will try to join the winning side with suddenly acquired enthusiasm" as the end approaches.

He urged rather, that the patriots use the quality of their formations.

Clark asserted that when the German retreat came "the order to those of you who are in areas of opportunity will be to harry their retreat by interrupting communications and by killing Germans," he added.

"That time is not yet. But it is certain that patriots in the Central Apennines area will be called upon to do so," he said.

The entire Italian front was quiet today, Clark broadcast his message. Only a few patrol skirmishes broke the monotony of a March drizzle.

In the central sector, patrols reported that Germans had cleared out of several localities where there had been sharp clashes in recent weeks.

Planes Operating From Nazi Fields

Advance Headquarters U. S. Ninth Air Force, March 28.—(AP)—American planes shuttled today from the Allies' first airfield east of the Rhine.

Location of the new air force anchor in the battle of Central Germany remained secret but Brig. Gen. James B. Newman, Jr., commander of the Ninth Engineer Command, said it would enable the army to "keep tactical aircraft operating as close as possible on the tail of the retreating enemy."

The first planes landed late yesterday. Their initial assignment was to remove American wounded.

Packard Plant Workers Strike

Detroit, March 28.—(AP)—A strike spread today through five departments of the Packard Motor Car Co., threatening to suspend production of aircraft and marine engines.

At noon a company spokesman reported 1,800 workers had left their work and that hundreds of other employees were milling about the main plant.

Spokesmen for Packard Local 900, United Automobile Workers (CIO), said the stoppage was unauthorized and that union officials in the plant were attempting to persuade workers to remain on their jobs.

The strike began at Packard's Main Avenue plant, a company spokesman said, after the management refused to reinstate a district union steward who had been discharged March 27 for calling 237 workers out on a 24-hour strike after an unsuccessful attempt to block a union study of the time standards in the marine packing department.

Raids Continue

Cinam, March 28.—(AP)—Tokyo radio reported today American carrier planes raided Kiyushu island at the southern end of Japan this afternoon in a quick follow-up of two Superfortress raids within 12 hours.

Tokyo said about 50 sea-borne planes raided the southernmost shores of Kiyushu, last assaulted by carrier aircraft March 19.

Neither report was confirmed by the American command, which announced battleships and swarms of carrier planes continued their aerial and naval bombardments of the Ryukyu islands, stepping stones to Kiyushu, which they began attacking last Friday.

JAPS DESTROY CITY OF CEBU

Yank Forces Sweep To Outskirts Of City

Manila, March 28.—(AP)—American assault troops, swarming ashore on Cebu Island Monday against elaborate beach defenses, swept almost to the outskirts of Cebu City, headquarters reported today, but that busy second city of the Philippines already was aflame and exploding from Japanese demolition.

Shortly after Maj. Gen. William H. Hodge's American division hit the beaches the first big fire appeared in the heart of the city. Then came thunderous explosions and sheets of flame as the Japanese demolition crews went to work as the city burned.

Installations at the modern air-drome just northwest of the city, the fine wharf area, the municipal electric plant and the huge coconut refinery just across the harbor on Mactan Island—the largest refinery in the Philippines—all were burned and blasted as the Yanks probed into the southern outskirts.

County Auditor John H. Coward's car, reported stolen from near his home in Ayden on a recent night, was found next day abandoned in a swampy area near Haddock's Cross Road, minus its four wheels and tires and a spare wheel from the trunk compartment. According to authorities, the car, which was locked, was pushed to the lonely spot and stripped of the wheels and tires. The thieves broke through the rear seat cushion to get to the spare wheel. Otherwise the car was undamaged.

S. C. Ives, Bethel banker, reported the theft of his car in Bethel on a recent night. It was later found abandoned, with some of the tires worn to shreds after being punctured.

Volunteers Needed For State Guard

Capt. Jasper L. Jones, commander of the Greenville State Guard company, said today that the company needs recruits to keep the company's quota up to the minimum number of men. He extended an invitation to men outside of the draft ages, up to 45.

Enlistments are voluntary. The company drills at the armory one night each week. The State Guard was organized at the beginning of the war to take care of any emergency on the home front until the regular army could take over. The militiamen are uniformed and adequately equipped with rifles, tommy guns, machine guns, tear gas bombs, etc., to preserve order in case of strikes or other trouble. The Greenville State Guard company, on signal from the fire siren, can assemble and be ready to leave the armory in 40 minutes.

Volunteers are given beneficial training. Men interested in performing a patriotic service should contact Capt. Jones, Lieut. W. H. Woodard, Jr., and Burt Greene or Sgt. Geoffrey Oakley.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

While the Allied offensive out of the Rhineland is operating under a partial news blackout for security reasons, reports continue to give us a picture of a fast moving front whose very fluidity bespeaks the extent of the disaster which the Allies are inflicting on the Germans.

Obviously we are getting close to the end of the conflict. However, let's take a lesson from yesterday's peace-stampede which swept the United States and have another premature celebration such as we had in the last war.

As General Eisenhower said yesterday, the German front is the western front "is a whipped army" but there's "damn tough fighting ahead." That's our cue to take it easy, though we can be happy in the knowledge that things are going so well that Nazism's complete collapse isn't far off.

What we must recognize is that you can't throw seven Allied armies across one of the world's greatest rivers and expect them to do a non-stop sprint to Berlin or the Russian front like a runner doing a hundred yard dash. They couldn't perform such a feat even if there weren't a single enemy soldier in their way. Why? Well, because armies have to be fed and receive munitions supplies to keep them moving.

General Ike indicated this yesterday when he remarked that the extent of the Allied thrust beyond the Rhine is limited at present by the problem of supply. The speed of our advance depends heavily on supplies and the build up of the seven armies.

The Rhine still remains a tremendous impediment to movement of supplies, because we need rail lines for expeditious movement, and the railroad bridges are destroyed, forcing us to depend on pontons and trucks. Our communications already are greatly extended, and our handicap will grow by leaps and bounds as the rapid advance continues.

In short, this is a difficult moment for Eisenhower's offensive. Having achieved that amazing crossing of the Rhine—one of the great military feats of history—we must now get reorganized for the final onslaught. And in this connection it should be noted that we are going into hostile territory where, if we get no active opposition from an unfriendly population, the people at least won't give us the support which we've been getting in freed Allied territory.

While Hitler's forces in the west are indeed "whipped," Eisenhower is indeed "whipped" because they will organize a front at some place "where our maintenance is stretched to the limit"—that question of supplies again. The Nazis are up against the problem of finding time to reorganize for a stand in this connection they are faced with the danger that one of our (Continued on Page Four)

DR. EDSALL ADDRESSES A. A. U. W. MEETING

"The treaty-making process is one of the most vital questions of today," said Dr. Preston W. Edsall of the social science department of the college, speaking last night at the A. A. U. W. meeting on "Treaties and Treaty Making," as presumably a new world organization will take the treaty form.

Dr. Edsall's address went on to discuss the way the present system of Senate ratification of treaties has hindered the nation in various wars in its negotiations with other countries, to explain the weakness of the amendment being proposed, which probably has no chance of being passed, the speaker said, and to point out as a satisfactory alternative the international executive agreement which can accomplish anything a treaty can and which does not demand Senate ratifications.

The treaty negotiations that will probably come out of the California conference have a better chance than most to be ratified, Dr. Edsall declared, because of the representation of both houses of Congress in the United States delegation and of the President's refusal in recent months to become involved in a struggle with the Senate over other problems.

The speaker was introduced to the A. A. U. W. members and guests by Mrs. Ethel R. Watters, president of the organization.

At a short business meeting after the program, Miss Irene Haster, city librarian, was elected vice-president for the coming two-year period; and Miss Margaret Sammon of the college library staff, was chosen treasurer.

Dr. Edsall devoted much of his speech to discussing the defects of the present system of treaty making, by which a minority in the Senate may defeat the will of the people. He showed not only that the Senate has emasculated the amendment or killed it by direct vote or failure to take action, some 287 of the 969 treaties with foreign nations submitted to it through the years, but also that many of our major treaties that passed did so by the narrowest of margins, sometimes even by one vote. Also, he said, the uncertainty of ratification handicaps our negotiations by making the President seem to be an irresponsible negotiator.

The proposed amendment to have the President make treaties with the aid and support of both houses, the speaker said, has all the weaknesses of the present system plus some of its own. Then, after examining various other proposals that have been offered, Dr. Edsall suggested as the most satisfactory the increased use of the international executive agreement. Contrary to common opinion, he said, this is not a new method. In fact, some 1,200 such agreements have been signed since the founding of the nation. And such an agreement does accomplish the same purpose as a treaty does.

The speaker closed by saying that both groups and individuals can do much to strengthen the negotiations for a satisfactory world organization by keeping their views before their representatives.

"After all," he said, "we get about the kind of government that our own citizenship justifies."—Reported

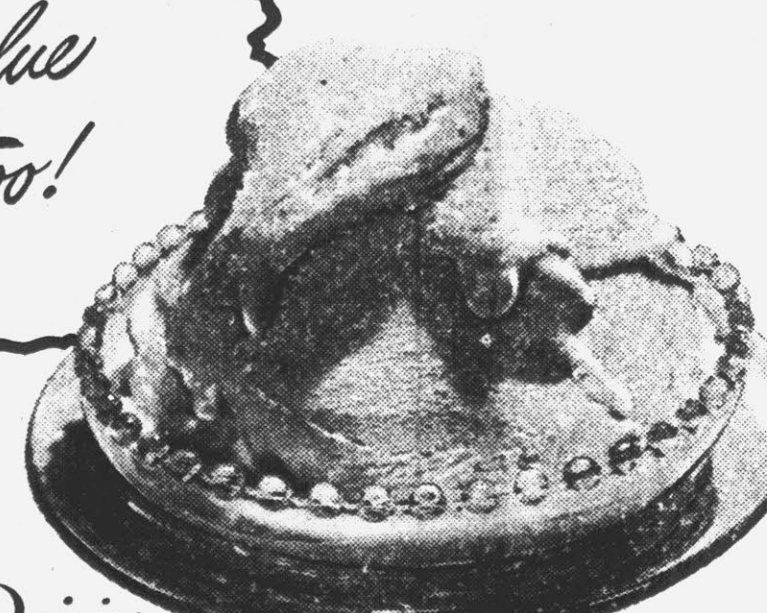

AMERICA IN WARTIME

(First of two columns on the small powers' attitude toward the Dumbarton Oaks plan)

Washington, March 28.—One of the main bones of contention at the United Nations conference at San Francisco April 25 will be this:

The need to assure the small nations that they won't be at the mercy of the big powers, versus the fact that the big powers must be left free enough to take swift action if war threatens.

The difficulty lies in the fact that the more nations permitted to debate, the longer the debate—and the longer it will be before the world organization can "call out the fire department."

The debates will take place according to the Dumbarton Oaks agreement in an 11-member Council which will be the inner nucleus of the world organization. Every member nation can belong to the organization's Assembly but it doesn't have much actual power.

The Council will decide when a nation is threatening the peace and what action should be taken to quell the trouble-maker. It will actually have about the same duties that a combination police-chief and police-judge would have in your home town.

At this writing, 11 nations will sit on the Council. Permanent seats will go to the United States, the United Kingdom, the USSR, France and China. That leaves six seats for the rest of the nations to scrap over.

Nothing one of those seats will be their one chance to sit in where policy is written.

The scrap for those six rotating seats on the Council (they're handed out for two-year terms) is expected to be as exciting as Jersey City on election night, and with about the same amount of button-pushing and log-rolling.

There's already a widespread move to get more power for the small nations. These nations have a natural fear that the big powers might gang up on them and vote some action that would benefit the big nations at the expense of the small.

The Netherlands stepped up first with a printed pamphlet of sug-

gestions sent to the Yalta conference, in which she pointed out that the smaller nations of Europe comprise about 150 millions, and those of Latin America another 100 million—no inconsiderable numbers with a right to the pursuit of freedom from fear equal to that of great powers."

She pointed out that all the Big Five would need to put over big power politics would be the vote of one small nation—to get a majority vote on that council of 11 nations. She wanted the charter that will be written at San Francisco to include this provision: that the Council can take action only when at least three small nations vote "yes."

At Yalta the Big Three met her request part way. It is now proposed that Council action be taken by a "majority" of seven, which means that where the Big Five are agreed at least two small nations must vote with them.

Fordney-McCumber tariff bill, the highest in our history. And in 1930 another Republican congress passed the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill, still higher.

Other nations retaliated and erected high tariff walls of their own. So, our products were kept out of European markets. European products were kept out of America. World trade broke down. The world went into chaos.

All that Wilson had foreseen came true. Europe, indebted to us, could not pay off any debts because it couldn't sell its products to us.

Now we come to 1945. The European war is almost over. Europe is destitute. We face again the same situation that America faced in Wilson's time.

High tariffs can shut off Europe's products. But in the meantime this happened: seeing the damage done, a Democratic congress in 1934 passed the reciprocal trade agreements act.

This enabled this country to cut its tariffs as much as 50 per cent to deal with nations which agreed to cut their tariffs an equal amount to deal with us.

This act had to be renewed every few years. If it is not renewed in June it will collapse. President Roosevelt this week, in the notes given above, asked congress to renew the act.

He did more: he asked permission to reduce the tariffs even more than they have been cut. Republicans are up in arms in congress. They want to fight this proposal. History will show who is right: Roosevelt or the Republicans who oppose him.

speeding armies may be able to cut the Reich in two from west to east. The broad strategy of the Allied drive is this:

On the far northern flank the Canadians, British and U. S. Ninth army have been assigned the task of knocking out the great industrial Ruhr, and are trying to draw Nazi Field Marshal Kesselring's northern army into a battle of annihilation. On their south, the U. S. First army is heading hell-for-leather out of its Remagen bridgehead toward Berlin with the idea of cutting Germany in halves and thus preventing the German troops in the north from retreating to Hitler's Alpine last-ditch defenses in the south.

General Patton's Third army still further south is running interference for the First, and the U. S. Seventh is on Patton's right flank. The news blackout surrounding Patton makes guess-work hazardous, but it's possible he may strike southward for a junction with the Russians, thus further hamstringing Hitler's preparations for a last ditch stand in the Alps.

daylight assault of the year on Berlin and was carried out by two formations of Flying Fortresses which thundered over almost an hour apart.

The first wave had dropped its bombs and was heading back to England as the second group arrived.

Both attacks, as well as the one on Hannover, were carried out between 11 a. m. and 1 p. m. British time, an official U. S. army air force announcement said.

Prior to today's attack American and British bomber forces had dropped more than 73,000 tons of bombs on Berlin—more than the Germans have hurled at England since the start of the war.

north where the bombing had to be advanced sometimes every 20 minutes said the Germans appeared to be in route before a British armored breakthrough toward the Westphalian capital of Muenster, 30 miles away at last reports.

The American 1st and 7th armies united in a solid front 80 miles wide from besieged Mannheim to east of Bonn. The 7th army had raced 32 miles east of the Rhine to join the 3rd on the Main below Aschaffenburg, which 3rd army troops were mopping up southeast of Frankfurt.

Frankfurt itself was doomed. Two 3rd army divisions mopped up its southern suburbs and the western part of that ninth largest German city, a major rail center and one of Hitler's most important arsenals.

"Military disaster has overtaken the German army," Correspondent William Fry reported from British headquarters in the flat tank country leading to the north gate of Berlin.

British units cracked within half a mile of Borken and within two of Bocholt, a key rail center of 23,000. Raesfeld was within sight. Hamm, the vast rail center of 52,000 where the Ruhr valley ends in the east was less than 35 miles away.

Field Marshal Montgomery's armored breakthrough between Bocholt and Dorsgen started off with a seven-mile sprint toward Muenster capital of Westphalia, before consors clamped down. How far the British were anybody's guess but it seemed clear that they were through the crust of Nazi defenses and out in the open on the Westphalian flatlands in a rush for the river Rhine.

The American 9th army bypassed Duisburg (431,000) after clearing its northern suburbs and veered sharply southeastward toward Essen (660,000), largest city in the Ruhr. They were seven miles from the Krupp works there.

Canadians reached the important Rhine bastion of Emmerich (11,562) which was reported to have broken out in a rash of white flares.

First army troops were either in or within sight of Giessen, an important traffic center 225 miles southwest of Berlin, after sensation, all overnight advances.

Weather for the second day restricted tactical air support but more than 400 American heavy bombers shook Berlin with a fierce daylight blow. Road jams east of virtually captured Dorsgen were strangled.

The enemy said 3rd army troops had captured and were using the radio inside Frankfurt on the Main Germany's ninth largest city which

the 3rd army was conquering block by block.

The full extent of victories in the west still was obscured by partial security blackouts.

A dispatch from 3rd army headquarters, filed by Thoburn Wiant four hours earlier than the German broadcast, said the easternmost advance of Patton's troops still was Aschaffenburg, 22 miles southeast of Frankfurt and 25 southwest of Gemunden.

The enemy broadcast came as vast 1st army tank and infantry forces rolled within 225 miles of the capital in a continued advance into the Giessen area 60 odd miles beyond the utterly shattered Rhine line.

A partial lifting of the news blackout on 3rd army movements disclosed that 10,251 Germans had been captured east of the Rhine in a week. 4,312 of them yesterday. Enormous stores of booty were being taken. For instance, the 6th armored division seized 400 box cars filled with German equipment near Frankfurt yesterday. The enemy generally was retreating eastward and northeastward in the Berlin direction before Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's forces.

Oil Drilling Begins Today

Kinston, March 28.—(AP)—Drilling for oil was scheduled to get under way today on the Lawton Tract five miles north of Morehead City, according to Coastal Plains Commission officials.

The tract, which covers hundreds of thousands of acres of swampy lands and water bottoms in the eastern part of the state from the Department of Conservation and Development and the State Board of Education.

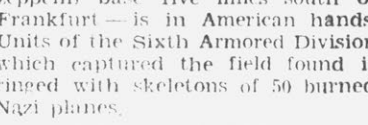
Zeppelin Base Captured

But with an obvious eye on the war in Europe, Speaker Rayburn told the chamber "there might be a condition arising in world affairs where the chair would feel called upon to ask members to return before the 10th of April."

Sees Pope Again

Vatican City, March 28.—(AP)—Pope Pius XII received Edward J. Flynn in a private audience today for the third time since the former Democratic National Committee chairman arrived in Rome last Wednesday.

Flynn's first audience with the Pontiff, the day after he arrived in Rome from Moscow, lasted an hour. They conferred 15 minutes Saturday. The length of the audience today was not announced.

The New Yorker was again accompanied by Myron Taylor, President Roosevelt's personal representative to the Vatican.

Prisoners Liberated

With Seventh Army Troops at Heppenheim, March 27.—(Delayed)

—(AP)—Two hundred and ninety wounded American prisoners of war were liberated when U. S. Seventh Army infantrymen captured this town today.

The soldiers were found in a hospital with 800 other Allied prisoners. All of them had been badly fed and all who had been there more than a few weeks had lost an average of around 35 pounds.

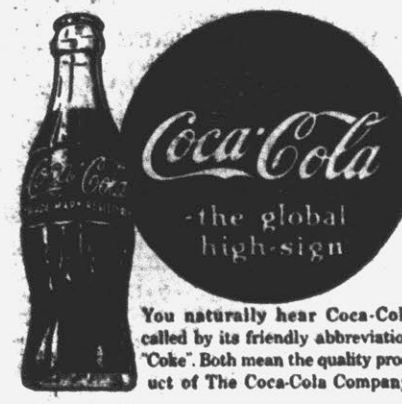

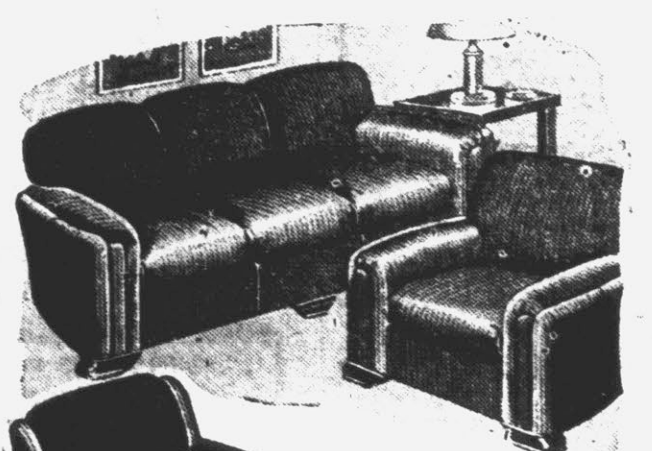

lovakia's third city.
Dispatches from Moscow said the red air force was aiding the tremendous Russian drives on a scale seldom if ever before equalled by Soviet planes.
"It was taken yesterday by Tol-

bukhin's troops in the push menacing Vienna.

A Russian communistic broadcast by Moscow indicated resistance was crumbling all the way from the Danube on the north to the shores of Lake Balaton on the south.

The war bulletin, which announced the capture of Tel, also reported the fall of Kibber in an outflanking thrust to the vital Danube bastion of Komarom, 40 miles northwest of Budapest and the communications center of Gyor farther west.

Acz, six miles southwest of Komarom and 16 northeast of Gyor, fell, too, placing in peril German forces attempting to bar the Danube Valley invasion route westward to Bratislava and Vienna.

Seizure of Janoshaz, a seven-way road junction on the canalized Marcell River, breached the Austrian

capital's first natural defense line. At the same time, Soviet forces cleaned up along the west bank of Lake Balaton in a 14-mile advance that carried to the road center of Tapolca, leaving only 12 miles to go to hold the entire lake's western shoreline.

The battle for Danzig and Gdynia was grim. Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's Second White Russian Army smashed into the two cities, located 10 miles apart on the Baltic, just a week after they had been separated.

The Red Army captured 14 suburbs before they drove into the heart of the one-time free city, while units which burst into the streets of Gdynia seized nine towns, the largest Rahmel, seven miles

northwest of the Polish port.

The cleanup of these cities, by-passed in the great Russian sweep toward the West along the Baltic, will free what the Germans have estimated at half a million Russians for a frontal drive on Berlin. Final capture of the naval bases would be a psychological as well as military achievement. Hitler pounced on Danzig and the adjacent Polish corridor as his excuse for launching World War II.

Two other Russian armies were linked in a massive drive on an 80-mile front against the Germans' positions in the Sudeten Mountains.

On this front, units of Marshal Ivan I. Petrov's Fourth Ukrainian Army and Marshal Ivan S. Konev's First Ukraine pushed to within 14

miles northeast of Moravska-Ostava, Czechoslovakia's third city and guardian of the northern route to Prague and imperiled Vienna.

Apparel, dry goods, and house furnishings retailers will be provided with greatly simplified methods of calculating their ceiling prices by the new price regulation, District Director Theodore S. Johnson said in announcing the distribution of copies of the regulation to retailers throughout the district by the local boards. Copies of the regulation are available in all War Price and Rationing Boards. This regulation sets forth the retailer's part in the government's far-reaching textile-apparel program.

Managers or owners of stores that sell apparel and apparel accessories for men and boys and for women, girls and infants, footwear, household textile commodities and yard goods, consumer durable goods, bedding, floor covering, lamps and lamp shades are expected to attend a meeting at the City Hall in Greenville on Wednesday, April 4, at 8 p. m.

"Every apparel, dry goods, and house furnishings retailer in 54 Eastern North Carolina counties covered by the District Office is required to prepare three copies of a pricing chart. This chart is to be based on the costs and selling prices of the goods offered for sale on March 19, 1945. On or before April 23, each retailer must file two copies of this chart with the OPA District Office. One copy must be kept in his store," Johnson said.

"In cooperation with state retailer organizations we are making plans for the organization of a committee in each locality to help War Price and Rationing Boards get accurate information about these price charts to every retailer," Johnson said.

"Merchants are asked to watch for local Price Panel and local Merchant's Committee announcements outlining information services that will be available in connection with

the new regulation.

"By summer more of the clothes in stores will be in the low and medium price ranges," Johnson said. "Through pricing charts, retailers will find the job of figuring ceiling prices greatly simplified. The definite pricing procedures provided by these charts will assure customers that the lower priced garments growing out of the government's clothing program are fairly priced at retail," he said.

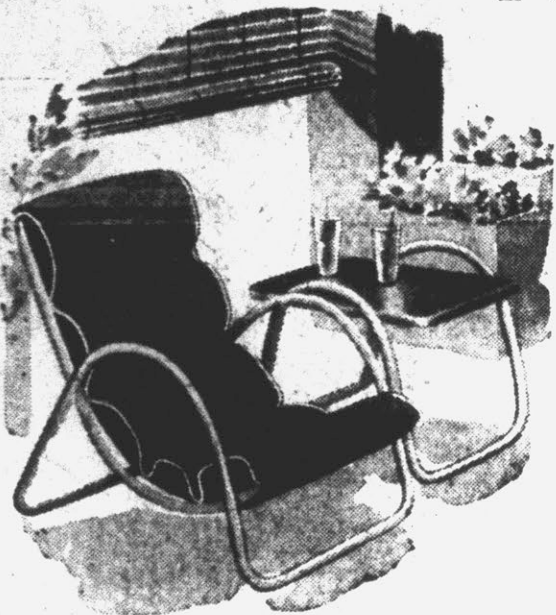

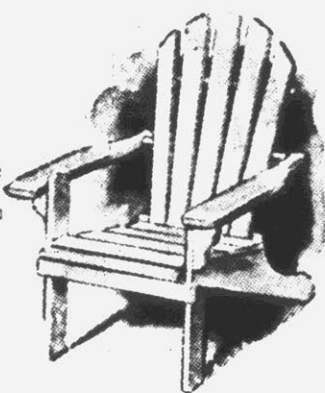
