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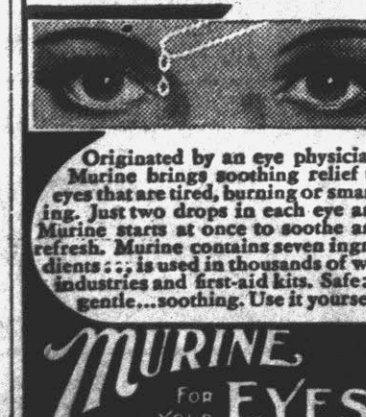

The War Today ...

(Continued From Page One)
uniforms. Later this unholy drive
would—if the Hitlerian scheme suc-
ceeded—take on a political com-
plexion. Apropos of this the Wash-
ington State Department says the
government has photographic copies
of German documents disclosing
"well-arranged postwar plans for
the perpetuation of Nazi doctrines
and domination."

Right now the terrorists are en-
gaged in keeping the population in
line by violence. An example was
the Nazi assassination of Aachen's
Allied-appointed mayor, Franz Op-
penhof, who was executed as a
"traitor" to provide an example for
other Germans who might be in-
clined to cooperate with the Allies.
And there have been other similar
incidents.

Naturally this continued hopeless
resistance by military and civilians
is reducing the country to ruins,
and plunging the German people
into greater depths of despair. Fan-
tastic as it may seem, this is ex-
actly what the Nazi leaders want. But
let me give you a view of this in the
words of the British official military
expert Veritas who has excellent
sources of information:

"The Nazi leaders are fully pre-
pared to see every German town-
ship turned into rubble and general
holocaust. It is quite logical. The
resulting chaos and starvation will
be an Allied burden. When anarchy
reigns supreme in Europe, the twi-
light of the Nazi gods—Gottedam-
merung—will be followed by a re-
surrection—not necessarily the re-
surrection of the German Reich in
the first instance, but of the Nazi
idea to which the tortured peoples
of Europe will turn (the Nazis cal-
culate) in their horror of 'Bolshev-
ism' and in their contempt and dis-
trust of Anglo-American democracy
which has failed them."

Veritas says that when the Ger-
man leaders speak of confidence in
the final victory, they're not think-
ing of military victory but are plan-
ning ten or fifteen years ahead, to the
restoration of Nazism. However,
this grandiose program is doomed
to failure, as I see it, because the
Allies are forewarned and thus are
fore-armed. The roots of Nazism

privileged teachers, absentee par-
ents, and immature pupils. The edu-
cational stream remains polluted at
its springs. The employment prob-
lem will be to procure employable
people. To attain this, de-louse the
school committees. Spotlight mem-
bers of the shady, self-seeking po-
litical brand and give them dishon-
orable discharge.

Warsaw regime and the Polish gov-
ernment in exile here have bid for
seats at San Francisco.

The broadcast makes no reference
to the London group, declaring that
the Soviet government "also in-
formed the governments of Great
Britain and China that it fully sup-
ported the statement of the provi-
sional Polish government and ex-
pected Poland would be given a
chance to take part in the San
Francisco conference."

"Holding of the conference in San
Francisco without participation of
Poland would be unfair and an
absolutely unjustified insult to the
Polish people," the Moscow radio
declared, saying it was quoting au-
thoritative sources. It made no
mention of the Polish exile govern-
ment, recognized by the United
States and Britain.

Bluntly maintaining that failure
to invite the Warsaw Poles "could
not be explained" by the absence of
diplomatic relations between that
group and Washington and London,
the Moscow broadcast declared:

"The Soviet government similarly
has no diplomatic relations with
such countries as India, Haiti, Li-
beria or Paraguay. However, it met
desires of Great Britain and the
United States and agreed to their
participation in the San Francisco
conference."

"The Soviet government suggested
that Allied governments should dis-
cuss this question and pass a cor-
responding decision," the announce-
ment said. "At present, the Soviet
government informs the government
of the United States that it ex-
pects an early reply to this proposal
concerning an invitation to Poland."

burg and Wilhelmshaven were re-
ported "good results."
Fourteen hundred of the big
planes escorted by 900 fighters, shot
down six of a fleet of 40 Nazi jet
planes attempting to break up the
attacks. Late reports said nine Am-
erican bombers and three fighters
were lost.

At least 46 German planes were
destroyed on the ground. The big-
gest haul was made by a U. S. 9th
air force Thunderbolt group which
destroyed 37 and damaged another
19 on two airfields east of Duessel-

dorf. Eighth air force fighters ac-
counted for five more and the RAF
destroyed four.
