

Funeral Services For Franklin D. Roosevelt At Four O'clock Today

Nation Pays Sad Farewell To Fallen Commander-In-Chief; Burial To Take Place At Hyde Park Tomorrow Morning

Washington, April 14—(AP)—The body of President Roosevelt reached a sorrowing capitol shortly before 10 a. m. today.

President Truman and members of the cabinet were at the Union Station a few minutes before the train pulled in at 9:50 a. m. (EWT), waiting to lead a mournful procession to the White House.

Members of the Roosevelt family were the first to enter the funeral train, followed by President Truman.

Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt and his wife and Mr. and Mrs. John Boettiger went aboard.

They were followed by Admiral William D. Leahy, who was President Roosevelt's military chief of staff, by Bernard Baruch, James P. Byrnes, and War Mobilization Director Fred M. Vinson.

Members of the Supreme Court and their wives, and cabinet officers and their wives also entered the train.

As the government officials, heads bared, walked slowly toward the car a Marine band softly played. Hail to the Chief and the National Anthem.

The funeral train was parked on a Union Station siding near a bustling freight depot. Crowds thronged as close as police would let them to the train.

At the rear of the President's car stood a huge Army caisson and seven white horses awaiting the body of the President.

Long before his funeral train arrived at Union Station from Warm Springs, Ga., hushed crowds swarmed into the downtown area and jammed the parks along the procession route to the White House.

Battle-clad infantrymen, bayonet fixed, stood at six-foot intervals around the streets flanking the Executive Mansion. Before the main gate there, the G. I. ranks were three deep, standing attentively at parade rest.

President Truman arrived at the White House at 8:45 a. m. (EWT), from his Connecticut Avenue apartment. He rode alone in a large black limousine and went immediately to the living quarters of the mansion.

Traffic was stilled within the White House grounds, save for an occasional floral delivery truck which came through the police guards.

It was a beautiful morning. Curious spectators slunk to statues and benches in Lafayette Park, across from the White House, to get a better glimpse of the funeral entourage.

Along historic Pennsylvania Avenue, Oldfield and "the little people" vied for vantage points on the steps and window ledges of government buildings.

War-time Washington, steeped in sorrow, offered a last sad farewell today to Franklin Delano Roosevelt—its first citizen for a dozen dramatic years.

It was a capital clad in mourning—a hushed, somber contrast to the (Continued on page four)

TRIBUTES TO DEAD LEADER

World Mourns Death Of President Roosevelt

The world mourns with the United States today as tribute is paid to Franklin Delano Roosevelt in funeral services at the White House.

In many other nations, whose high officials still were sending a stream of condolences to this country, memorial services were called for today and tomorrow.

The London Times gave notice to Britain's sorrow in an editorial declaring:

"He is mourned here as perhaps no other of another country has ever been."

Reverently, American soldiers and sailors stationed in Britain will file into churches during the day for a last tribute to their dead commander-in-chief.

The U. S. Army has scheduled protestant services at Grosvenor Chapel, Catholic mass at St. James Church and Jewish services at the West End Synagogue.

American naval personnel will attend a service at St. Marks Church.

The British will honor the late President at Sunday church services. Many clerics plan to devote sermons to his work and accomplishments.

As Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden flew to the United States to represent Britain at the funeral, the king and queen cancelled plans for a week-end trip to Glasgow and the court went into mourning.

American, British, and Canadian military forces in Northern Ireland will attend a memorial service Sunday at the famous Londonderry Cathedral.

High Russian officials were expected to attend a simple ceremony in Moscow at the home of U. S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman.

Sgt. George E. Thomas of Chicago, military pastor at Lynn, Mass., will conduct the services.

The Moscow radio said the Council of People's Commissars had ordered mourning flags flown from all Soviet state and official buildings for two days.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek invited high Chinese officials, foreign diplomats, and representatives of Allied military forces to a memorial service at the National Sun Yat-sen Memorial Hall in Nanking.

The people of Greenville will assemble at Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church this afternoon at 4:15 for a memorial service in honor of President Franklin D. Roosevelt who died at Warm Springs, Ga., Thursday afternoon, Dr. H. O. H. ne will preside. Other clergymen of the city will participate.

The memorial service will be simple, consisting of the singing of the President's favorite hymns, reading of passages of Scripture and prayer and meditation. The service will begin at 4:15 and end at 4:45. Stores and other business places will be closed from 4 until 5 o'clock during the funeral hour. The motion picture theaters will not open until after the funeral hour.

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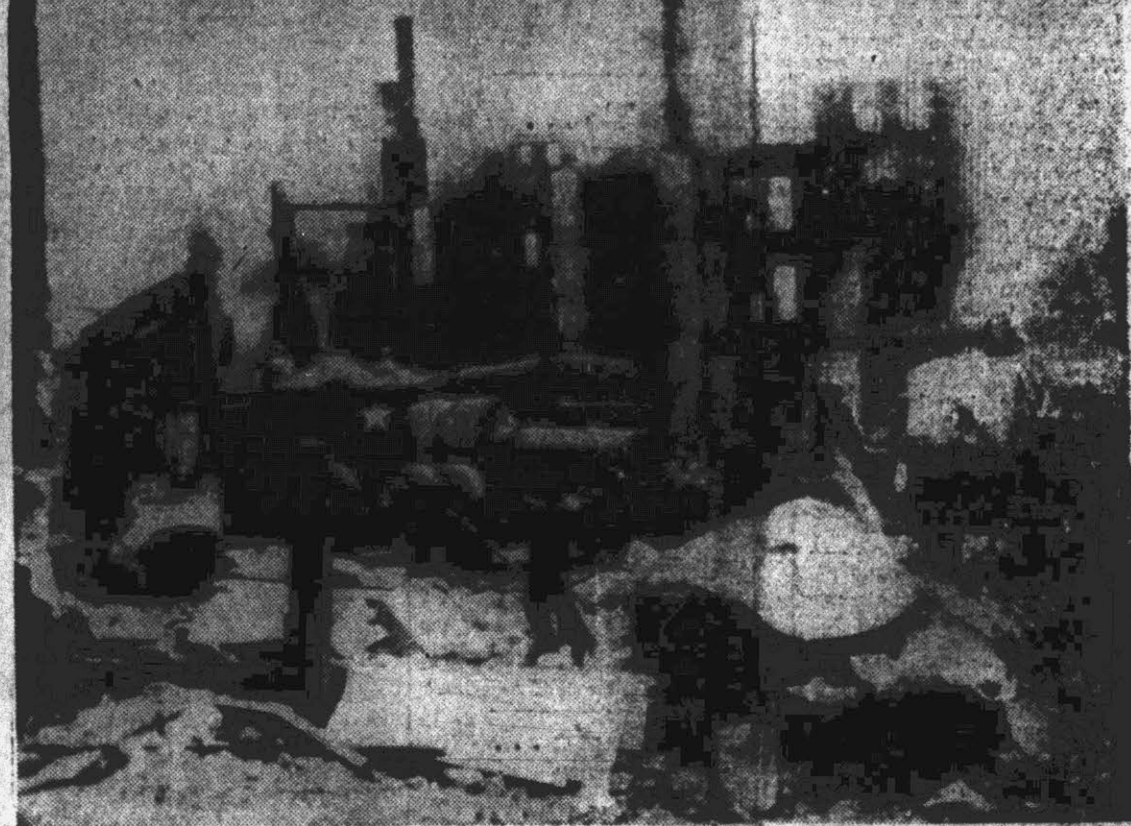

AIRMEN POUND NAZI TARGETS

Surprise Attacks On Isolated Pockets

London, April 14—(AP)—A force of 150 American heavy bombers made a surprise attack at dawn today on German strongpoints and anti-aircraft positions on both sides of the Gironde estuary north of the French Atlantic port of Bordeaux.

This is one of a half dozen isolated places along the French coast where Germans estimated to total 170,000 are still holding out.

The daybreak attack followed a blow last night by more than 750 heavily loaded RAF Lancasters and Halifax bombers on Kiel, chief refuge for what remains of the German navy.

There was speculation in London that the bombing of the Gironde pocket might be linked with some kind of land or sea action.

'Supreme headquarters in Paris described as incorrect a report which it heard had been published in London saying that the pocket was attacked by land.

It was the first time in nearly two years that Portresses and Liberators carried out a daylight operation wholly without fighter escort.

Perhaps 21,000 Germans are still sitting out the war in the Royan district around the mouth of the Gironde. Others are holding out in Dunkerque, St. Nazaire and the channel islands. Small quantities of food and other supplies have been sent to them occasionally by Nazi aircraft and submarines.

Three aircraft were reported missing from last night's RAF operation, which, in addition to the attack on Kiel, included a raid by 100 night bombers on objectives in Hamburg, and in Stralsund, another German naval base on the Baltic northwest of Stettin.

Death Toll Of Tornadoes 112

Oklahoma City, April 14—(AP)—The number of dead in Thursday's tornadoes in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri mounted today to 112. Fifteen others were listed as missing and hundreds were injured.

Deaths in Arkansas jumped to 21 with five persons unaccounted for. Six were killed in Missouri.

Oklahoma's dead totaled 85, of whom 63 were at Antlers in the southeastern section of the state. Soldiers, using bulldozers, continued to search the rubble for ten more persons reported missing.

The State Health Department announced it was ready to begin a general sanitation program in the stricken areas. This includes water treatment and injection of typhoid serum.

British Reach Imola Suburbs

Rome, April 14—(AP)—Eight army troops have driven into the outskirts of Imola, Po valley highway center less than 20 miles east of Bologna. Allied headquarters announced today.

A communique said the advance along the Bologna-Rimini highway was made against light and scattered German resistance, but that heavy fighting continued farther north in the bridgehead across the Santerno river.

Polish troops pushing directly along the highway yesterday had been reported less than four miles from Imola, while Italian troops had captured the Nazi stronghold of Tossignano, seven miles southeast of Imola.

Jap Counterattack On Okinawa Hurled Back

Jap Suicide Pilots Continue Attacks On U. S. Fleet; Superforts Set Fire To Heart Of Tokyo

Guam, April 14—(AP)—The 24th Army Corps—backed by heavy guns of the Army, Navy and Marines—hurled back a furious pre-dawn Japanese counterattack on Okinawa Friday and inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced today.

Continuing their desperate suicidal air assaults on Adm. Raymond A. Spruance's Fifth Fleet screening Okinawa Wednesday and Thursday, the Japanese lost more than 100 additional planes for a total of more than 218 planes on the two days. Lesser actions off the Ryukyus brought the two-day total to more than 256.

Attacking to the fury of the ground fighting in Southern Okinawa, Maj. Gen. John R. Hodge's 24th Army Corps failed to gain ground for the eighth straight day.

Over this congested area, the Pacific war's heaviest artillery duel went into its 11th day. It was in this sector that the Japanese counterattack, involving a battalion, probably 500 men, was hurled back.

In the north, Third Amphibious Corps' Marines continued their steady advance on both Motobu Peninsula and Ishikawa Isthmus. Resistance, reported Maj. Gen. Roy S. Geiger's headquarters, was "sporadic and ineffective."

Nimitz disclosed that in the 25 days from March 11 through April 12, Vice Adm. Marc A. Mitscher's last carrier force pilots destroyed 1,277 planes, an average of more than 49 planes daily. Of this number, 841 were destroyed by carrier pilots in air combat, 73 by ships' gunfire, and 363 on the ground.

British carrier-borne planes destroyed 16 planes in the Formosa area and one on the ground and damaged five others bringing their total in the Northern Pacific to 84 destroyed and 17 damaged in three weeks.

Army, Navy and Marine patrol bomber and fighter planes hit ships and targets from the Bonin to the Carolines and east to the by-passed Marshalls.

Guam, April 14—(AP)—The greatest B-29 raiding force yet struck the arsenal area of Tokyo early today with fire bombs, causing explosions which pilots said were heard more than 100 miles away.

Explosive blasts bounced the 60-ton Superfortresses as much as one mile upwards through the air, pilots said. They and crewmen unanimously agreed it was "a very successful raid."

Fundamentals Of Successful Investing

Babson Advises the Would-Be Investor

Babson Park, Mass., April 14—"Mr. Babson, I have sold my business, where can I invest the proceeds?" "My wife and I are getting along in years, in what can we invest our money so that we will be assured of a moderate income for the rest of our lives?" "I have just inherited \$5,000, how can I double this money quickly?" These questions are typical of the many asked me from week-to-week. Behind each lies the instinctive desire of all human beings for self-protection.

Before entering upon an important venture—and certainly before buying any stock—it is imperative that you know yourself. Self-control, patience and courage are essential to success. Have you the self-control to follow a strict investment plan? Do rumors and minor fluctuations fail to sway you? Have you the patience to hold your funds liquid until a real bargain comes your way? Do you resist jumping into a bull market in the hope of scalping a few points profit on the advances? Have you the courage to buy when the news is pessimistic and everyone about you is selling? Will you sell when stocks are on the upgrade and everybody is talking about the new highs to be reached?

If you can answer "Yes" to each of these questions and if you have some extra money to invest, you have the attributes for becoming successful. Then you can determine your own particular needs and select a diversified group of securities which will meet these requirements. After you have purchased your securities, do not be concerned over day-to-day fluctuations. Avoid jumping from one stock to another in the hope of picking a few points profit here and there. Do not follow the crowd. Always bear in mind that in finance the herd instinct is fatal.

Selecting Your Company Before buying any stock you should decide what you expect of it. In the case of the man who has sold his business, the chances are that he will want to own stocks that will appreciate in value. Therefore, he would do well to buy into a young industry—possibly television, plastics or electronics. To the elderly couple who want income, I suggest "Series" government bonds and the securities of well-established companies with a good dividend and a promising future. To the young person who has inherited the \$5,000, I say, "The stock market is no royal road to easy money. A horse race would be just as good a bet and might prove more exciting!"

The investor should carefully study the trend of the market and the outlook for the industry into which he plans to buy. This shows when to buy. He should next analyze the various companies in that industry. He will then select that company which is making the most progress. This company need not necessarily be the latest in its field nor, perhaps, the oldest, but it must be well managed and active. Pay particular attention to the personnel. Remember that the future of every company will depend upon the character of the individuals who control and manage it.

"Tips" You May Accept Approach the stock market in an intelligent manner. Follow the lead of successful institutions and buy the securities they buy. You can determine this by studying reports of insurance companies. Learn to swim before venturing into deep water and above all be wary of tips from well-meaning friends. Even in the rare instances where such a tip makes good temporarily, it usually leads to loss in the end because it is based on ephemeral rather than fundamental factors. The successful investor must know what to buy or sell, as well as when to buy or sell.

Truman Prepares For Major Tasks Ahead

Leaves Responsibility For San Francisco Conference With U. S. Delegation

Washington, April 14—(AP)—President Truman intensively preparing to take President Roosevelt's place in the Big Three, is leaving American responsibility for the San Francisco Conference with this country's delegation.

This turn of affairs developed today as the new President arranged to lead the nation in sorrowing funeral rites for his dead Commander-in-Chief.

Faced with the necessity of familiarizing himself with all the intricate details of Europe's tangled affairs, Mr. Truman has decided not to attend the United Nations meeting.

He probably will send to the delegates who tackle there the task of constructing a world peace-keeping league a strong statement of approval.

But it will be up to Secretary of State Stettinius and his seven delegation colleagues to make on-the-spot decisions on any differences that arise over the Dumbarton Oaks formula and the Big Three agreements proposing revisions.

Mr. Truman meanwhile set out on the task of acquiring the background information he must have at his command if he is to meet Premier Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill on even terms.

He began that educational process in a conference yesterday with James F. Byrnes, former War Mobilizer who attended the Yalta conference with President Roosevelt. He will continue it with Byrnes, Stettinius and others.

The cascading advances of Allied forces across Germany may precipitate a demand for another meeting of the heads of the three nations much earlier than had been anticipated.

The feeling in official circles here is that when Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declares officially that organized resistance has ended, Stalin and Churchill will want to meet with Truman almost immediately to settle problems involving the whole economy, if not political, future of Europe.

There will be an immediate request, it is said, to realign each nation's troops within the four agreed zones of occupation in Germany. French troops will occupy one of these areas and Gen. Charles DeGaulle, provisional president of that nation, will want to be in on the conference.

At this meeting there are indications the nations directly involved will want agreement on the reparations in kind which were projected at Yalta. This means they want to know how many German plants and other installations in their occupied zone they can dismantle and ship home to replace their shattered factories. (Continued on page two)

Several Killed In Train Wreck

Muskogee, Okla., April 14—(AP)—The Oklahoma highway patrol said today it was informed "seven or eight" persons were drowned when a Dallas-Kansas city passenger train plunged into a creek southeast of here.

Patrol officers said that an unidentified army sergeant who went to the scene along the M. K. T. tracks gave the first report of casualties in the early morning accident.

Rescue workers were able to reach the submerged coaches only by boat. The patrol said, and definite information was meager.

The stream into which the train toppled was said to be swollen by heavy rains.

The office in Dallas said the train was No. 4 which left Dallas at 9:40 p. m. last night.

It had three pullman coaches, two day coaches and a baggage car. There was no estimate of the passenger total.

Ninth Army Makes Second Crossing Of Elbe; Patton's Forces Near Czechoslovakia; Other Units Push Beyond Leipzig; British And Canadians Advance

Paris, April 14—(AP)—The American Ninth army won a second crossing over the Elbe river today and fought slowly forward on the outer defenses of Berlin. First and Third army tanks hurtled well past besieged Leipzig, neared the Russian lines and advanced into the Nazi mountain stronghold of Bayreuth.

The flanking sweep past Leipzig carried deep into Saxony to within ten miles of Chemnitz, 88 miles from the Russian lines and 38 from Dresden.

To all practical purposes, Germany was virtually bisected for the last direct communications from Berlin south—including the superhighway to Munich—were cut. The Third army was within 25 miles of Czechoslovakia and had bypassed the northwest tip of that republic.

Supreme headquarters did not disclose where the new Elbe crossing was made. (BBC said the crossing was 15 miles southeast of Magdeburg at Barby.)

The original bridgehead was established by the Hell on Wheels (second armored) division using assault boats near Magdeburg. The nearest Ninth army troops last were reported 45 miles from Berlin and fighting on the flat Brandenburg plain.

Nor was there fresh information on the straining Third army tank columns which drove across the Elbe river in eastern Germany to within ten miles of Chemnitz and 34 of Dresden. They were joined, however, by the First army's ninth armored division in a flanking run around the south side of Leipzig.

Among cities captured were Brunswick, Jena, Zeitz, Saalfeld, Rudolstadt, Sangerhausen, Wolfenbuttel, Gerolzhofen, Lichtenfels and Lichtenau.

The Seventh army fought into the rail center of Bamberg, 35 miles from Nuremberg, fighting flared through the cities of Magdeburg, Dortmund, Bayreuth, Gera and the Dutch centers of Arnhem, Groenningen, Zwolle and Appeldoorn.

The British besieged Bremen and outflanked Hamburg by plunging 36 miles to within 23 of the Elbe south of Hamburg.

The Ruhr pocket was stamped down to a fourth of its original size as the 114,000 prisoners streamed from the confines of Germany's greatest industrial valley. The First army took 33,887 prisoners yesterday, 19,904 from the Ruhr. More than 40,000 surrendered the day before.

The Canadians were attacking 200,000 caught in a larger trap in Holland and helping the British erase 40,000 pocketed southwest of Bremen. Already 400,000 Germans (Continued on page two)

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Substituting for Dewitt MacKenzie
President Truman and Secretary Stettinius have proclaimed "No change" in American foreign policy. There is one place where they may have a hard time making the proclamation stick.

Of all his personal diplomacy, President Roosevelt's policy regarding Russia probably depended more directly on him than any other.

Labels are likely to prove inaccurate. It may not be strictly correct to term the Roosevelt-Russian policy as "co-operation at any cost," but it was very close to that and also was probably the foreign policy which drew more criticism than any other.

Entirely aside from those who always want to "get tough" when anyone fails to adhere strictly by what Americans consider their country's ideals, there has been a more temperate expression of fear that yielding to Russia on certain points affecting small nations, we have been storing up a whirlwind.

This "No compromise on virtue" attitude probably has been held in check, to a great extent, by widespread knowledge that Roosevelt was far better informed on the subject than anyone else, that his motives were unquestionable, and that there was no course except to trust him.

Roosevelt obviously thought that the maintenance of machinery for co-operation between the Big Three was more important than anything else. He not only seemed to feel that in yielding now he could hope for enlightened changes later, but he also acted personally as a moderator between Joseph Stalin and Winston Churchill, the separator between what almost amounts to two poles.

Whether Roosevelt was right remains to be seen. He was conducting a campaign something similar to the one against isolationism to the United States. Russia's policy, at best, is self-sufficiency against any enemy. Roosevelt could hope that once she felt herself out of danger she would co-operate in eliminating danger for all and after that she might relinquish some of the hegemony over her neighbors that she now feels necessary. Those who disagree fear any compromise on principles, lest Russia, learning what she can do by flexing her muscles, become insatiable.

Truman and Stettinius cannot meet for a time at least, to enjoy the same public confidence regarding foreign affairs as did the Roosevelt-Hell team. Those who disagreed with Roosevelt, but felt incompetent to go to the mat with him and his unique store of information, may now be expected to become more insistent.

"No change" may be a dangerously guarded word. Whether it can be accomplished is another matter.

It was the fifteenth Superfort raid on Tokyo. The raiding force was officially described as "very great strength," which probably means as many as 400 planes. The largest previous B-29 assault on the enemy capital, March 10, involved probably 300 planes.

The target area, six miles north of the Imperial Palace, has a population of 30,000 or more persons to the square mile and includes the famous Itabashi arsenal. On its fringes are countless home industries doing piecework for war.

carnival atmosphere of other Roosevelt homecomings—which awaited the ten-car special train bringing Mr. Roosevelt's body here from Warm Springs, Ga., where he died Thursday.

The bustle of government was stilled for the day, closed by a proclamation of President Harry S. Truman calling the nation to prayer.

Arriving of the funeral train signalled the start of a month's memorial in the armed services. But War Production Chairman J. A. Krug asked no interruption in war industry.

"American workers and management can pay their tribute to Franklin D. Roosevelt in no better way than by staying on the job to maintain an unbroken production of war goods," he said.
President Truman—thrust with bewildering suddenness from relative obscurity into a position of world pre-eminence—headed the official delegation meeting the Roosevelt train at Washington's Union Station at 10 a. m. Eastern War Time.

He will accompany the body of his predecessor to Hyde Park, N. Y., for burial tomorrow.

Hours in advance of the funeral procession police strung guard ropes along the route from the station to the White House.

Representatives of Congress, the Judiciary and the Cabinet arranged to meet the body and accompany Mr. Roosevelt on his last trip down historic Pennsylvania Avenue to the White House.

Two non-commissioned officers each from the Army, Navy, Coast Guard and Marine Corps, commanded by Army Master Sergeant James Bowder, were designated pal bearers here. Units of all the armed forces, including WACS, WAVES and Women Marines, were assigned places in the funeral procession to accompany the caisson-borne casket.

Funeral rites impressive in their simplicity were arranged for 4 p. m. (EWT) in the gold-appointed East Room at the White House. It was there just 12 weeks ago today that Mr. Roosevelt, with bowed head, attended divine services on the inaugural day which started him on his fourth term as president.

The Episcopal order for the burial of the dead was the funeral service for the White House ceremony, attended only by the family and those associates and friends who could be accommodated in the East Room.

There will be no state funeral. "Unto God's gracious mercy and protection we commit you," reads the prayer to be offered by Bishop Angus Dun of Washington Episcopal Cathedral.

"The Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace, both now and evermore."

A few hours after the White House services the funeral party will entrain for Hyde Park. There private burial services will be held at 10 a. m. (EWT) Sunday in a hedged flower garden on the Roosevelt estate—a spot predestined to become a national shrine.

The final resting place lies near the Roosevelt mansion, overlooking the placid Hudson River which Mr. Roosevelt loved.
The usual pomp and ceremony of high-office funerals was reserved almost entirely to the processions which accompanied the dead President from one place to another. The actual funeral ceremonies were patterned in the simplicity which Mr. Roosevelt had fixed as his own way of life in war-time.

The President's widow, his daughter, one son and four daughters-in-law probably will make up the family party at the funeral.

Presidential Secretary Jonathan Daniels said Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt—the second son—is expected from London. He said Col. James Roosevelt, eldest of the Roosevelt boys, probably would be unable to reach Washington in time.

The other two sons, John and Franklin, Jr., are on naval duty and can not get here. Anna Boettiger, only daughter of the Roosevelts, has been living at the White House.

Separate Senate Committees were named to attend the services at the White House and at Hyde Park.
