

Nuernberg Fall Imminent; British Nearing Hamburg

Germans Say Fierce Battles Raging On Approaches To City; Red Spearheads Smash Toward Capital From Three Directions; Advances In Czechoslovakia

Paris, April 20.—(AP)—Americans of the Seventh Army fought for the kill in the heart of Nuernberg today after crashing through the city walls surrounding the trapped Nazis, and British tanks struck to within a mile of the suburbs of Hamburg, within point blank artillery range.

The French First Army stabbed 50 miles southeast of Strasbourg to Rottweil, 14 miles from the Danube and 33 from Lake Constance, western limit of the Nazi national redoubt in Southern Germany. The Poles were 25 miles north of Switzerland.

The whole Allied right flank including the French and the American Seventh and Third armies was clamping down on the mountainous Nazi lair, where Hitler was believed observing a gloomy 56th birthday anniversary.

Stuttgart—like Nuernberg a Nazi pilgrimage city—was encircled on three sides.

The French advances ran up to 23 miles and carried to within 65 of Austria and 120 of Italy's northern Alpine frontier.

The Seventh Army penetrated the wall during the night and closed into the center of the city for the kill. American and French troops moving in a wide circle around Stuttgart, another Nazi rallying point, captured Reutlingen (35,000), 18 miles to the south.

Third Army elements inside Czechoslovakia, within three miles of Asch, were a bare 55 miles from the Russian lines and were threatening the last important German assembly in the Prague region, 65 to 87 miles distant.

"The decision is very near," said Hitler's propaganda chief, Paul Joseph Goebbels, declaring that Germany was on the "razor's edge" of disaster.

In happier days, Hitler would have spoken to the Nazi faithful in Nuernberg on this, his 56th birthday anniversary. The Americans, however, had captured his vast stadium where he used to rouse 500,000 listeners, and were beating down south of Nuernberg within 70 miles of Munich and 132 of Hitler's mountain home at Berchtesgaden.

Moreover, many of the 18 major cities of Germany which Hitler said rules were ablaze like candles in the grimness—and perhaps last—birthday that Hitler ever has spent. Halle (pop. 220,000) fell yesterday and it was the 40th German city of more than 100,000 persons already captured.

For all practical purposes, organized German resistance of a well defined front had ceased and the war had become a battle of pockets.

The main weight of Gen. Eisenhower's nine-army command was hurled south against the national redoubt in the Bavarian Alps, and north against another redoubt enclosing the North German ports, Berlin and Denmark.

Calls For Axe

Washington, April 20.—(AP)—Wholesale amputation of government agencies with "a bush-axe or a meat cleaver" was recommended today by Comptroller General Lind, say C. Warren.

Testifying before a senate banking and currency subcommittee in favor of a bill to bring all government corporations under the financial control of congress, Warren said:

"If the present trend of creating government corporations continues or is not curbed, we will soon have a government by government corporations."

Meanwhile a drive took form among smaller nations to write boundary guarantees into any peace-keeping organization.

It will be tossed into the hopper at San Francisco either by one of the Latin American nations—which secured similar assurances in the recent act of Chapultepec—or by the dominion, probably New Zealand.

The demand for territorial guarantees would include a definition of aggression and go hand in hand with the expected United States proposal to empower the assembly of the projected peace agency to revise treaties.

Adoption of the guarantees would change the proposed league's fundamental obligation. Instead of simply an international pledge to decide when sanctions should be imposed the organization would be obligated to use the world's armed might whenever it was decided that aggression existed.

The United States accepted the frontier-guarantee idea at Mexico City last month with the reservation that the act of Chapultepec be made to fit into the proposed world peace system.

Missourian To Be Press Secretary
Washington, April 20.—(AP)—President Truman announced today the appointment of Charles G. Ross, 56-year-old Washington correspondent, as his press secretary.

The appointment is effective May 15.

Mr. Truman called a news conference shortly before noon at which he said that J. Leonard Reish, who has been serving as his press and radio relations man, would return to his duties as managing director of the radio interests of former Governor James M. Cox of Ohio.

He said that Jonathan Daniels, President Roosevelt's press secretary, who had planned to leave tomorrow, had agreed to remain on the job until Ross can report.

Ross, a high school classmate of the President at Independence, Mo., accepted the press post last night, shortly before leaving for San Francisco to cover the United Nations conference for his newspaper, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

War spending hit a new high in March of this year, reaching \$8,245,000 daily, or approximately \$269,000,000 monthly. Expenditures for war activities alone were more than a billion dollars in excess of all government receipts, which reached a new high during the month. Non-war expenditures in March reached a monthly record of \$1,142,553,501.

Because much of the money Congress has shoveled into the war program has not been spent—although almost all of it has been obligated—war spending may continue at a high level for some time. Planes, ships and other supplies ordered in the past are being delivered steadily, and the bills are being paid out of the backlog of past appropriations.

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Asks Approval Wage Contract
Washington, April 20.—(AP)—John L. Lewis has asked the War Labor Board to approve all or nothing in his new contract with the nation's soft coal operators.

Signed April 11 after 41 days of negotiations, the contract must be passed upon by WLB as a first step before it can become effective.

The United Mine Workers' president made his position known to the board last week. He declared, it was learned today, that each of the points was agreed upon in relation to the whole contract and that if the board can not approve it all, it should reject the whole agreement.

The board has been considering the agreement—giving an increase to the average miner of \$1.07 a day for a six day week—for several days with scarcely an objection raised.

One official with ready access to WLB said in the understanding he would not be identified by name that tentative approval already has been reached on all but one paragraph. He added that he foresaw no serious objection to the remaining point.

The board will discuss the contract agreement again Saturday. A decision could be reached by Monday, a full week before the 30-day extension for the old contract lapses.

Baby's Father Was Killed On Okinawa
Pfc. Tommie C. Robinson, U. S. Marine, was killed in battle on Okinawa in the Pacific, a message from the War Department to his wife, stated, Pfc. Robinson, whose home was in Gulfport, Miss., was stationed at Camp Lejeune before going overseas last December 15. He married Miss Elizabeth Williams of near Greenville.

Mrs. Robinson and infant daughter are making their home with her mother, Mrs. J. M. Williams, Route 3, Greenville. The daughter was born after her father went overseas the last time and he never saw his child.

Pfc. Robinson was stationed at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese attacked on December 7, 1941, and was wounded. He returned to this country for a year and after recovery was sent back to the Pacific war zone.

Yanks Gain On Okinawa; Balabac Island Captured

Powerful Offensive Against Okinawa Capital of Naha Now Under Way

Guam, April 20.—(AP)—A powerful American offensive supported by terrific naval and artillery shelling was under way in full fury today against elaborate Japanese defenses across southern Okinawa.

Three U. S. divisions—possibly 45,000 troops—were hammering fiercely defended enemy positions along a four-mile battle-front before the capital city of Naha.

Breaking a 13-day virtual deadlock in the south, Yanks of the 7th and 98th army divisions launched their all-out rush early yesterday and by noon had scored gains of 500 to 800 yards on both flanks. The advance was slowed in the center.

The 10th army's big push pitted the greatest American offensive force ever employed against a single sector in the Pacific war against the best defended Japanese line ever yet encountered.

The Japanese were fighting back viciously from interlocking trench and pillbox systems, blockhouses, caves and other extensive dug-in positions typical of Japanese warfare. The extremely rough terrain was well suited for defensive tactics.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz' command today said the offensive followed "one of the largest bombardments ever made in support of amphibious troops."

Hours before the big drive started, battleships, cruisers and other fleet units, Marine and army artillery and rocket-firing Marine planes poured thousands of tons of shells and bombs into the enemy's deep line of defenses.

Despite the concentration of American power, field officers acknowledged it would be a tough and slow job to knock out enemy strong points and smash seven miles of the fortified line. They looked for no immediate breakthrough or swift advance.

Truman To Have Voice In Pacific War Plans

Washington, April 20.—(AP)—President Truman is moving cautiously into Franklin D. Roosevelt's seat on the council of highest Allied military strategy. His weight is likely to be felt in Pacific decisions.

Even before V-E day comes, Mr. Truman may be called upon to review the strategy for defeating Japan that undoubtedly was discussed at Yalta by his predecessor and Prime Minister Churchill, if not with Premier Stalin.

In this connection it would not be surprising to Washington observers if the new President summons Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz and Gen. Douglas MacArthur to his home for personal conferences before the final assault on Japan.

President Roosevelt arranged for Nimitz and MacArthur to share command for the on-to-Tokyo drive. There are no indications Mr. Truman plans to disturb this setup. Consequently he may want to have the views of the field leaders as well as those of the Allied high command members here.

Generally, two schools of thought frequently are heard in Washington about the quickest and best way of subduing the Japanese.

One of these favors a direct, all-out assault on the Japanese islands.

The other plan apparently calls for a landing on the China coast, starving Japan by blockade and reducing its cities and plants to shambles by bombing.

The high command will have to decide if it has not already done so, what method is to be used. It is in such a decision that Mr. Truman is likely to play a part.

This does not mean, the President's friends said, that he ever will overrule a decision that might be reached unanimously, or nearly so, by the military leaders. But if they disagree over methods, Mr. Truman will have to make the choice.

The chief executive has moved quickly to familiarize himself with the military situation in all sections of the world. One of his first conferences after he was sworn in was with the nation's top commanders. He has kept in constant touch since, seeing Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, yesterday.

Significantly, he also saw Dr. T. V. Soong, Chinese foreign minister, along with the secretaries of state, war and navy.

Mr. Truman is said to recognize that his chief responsibility in the role of commander in chief lies in the Pacific, since the strategy decisions which have taken Allied (Continued on Page Four)

New Allied Gains On Italian Front

British Capture Portoma In Po Valley; Americans Near Bologna

Rome, April 20.—(AP)—Eight Army troops, in an advance of three miles, have captured Portomaggiore, 12 miles southeast of the Po Valley city of Ferrara. Allied headquarters announced today.

Portomaggiore, a small town just east of Portomaggiore, was also taken as the British pushed forward after storming the Argenta Gap Nazi defenses.

Fifth Army forces were reported advancing slowly along Highway 65, between Florence and Bologna, and nearing Pianoro, just south of Bologna.

Rolling along with the momentum gained in the capture of Argenta, the Eighth Army reached the Canal Bolognese on a wide front.

The 56th London Division drove on through Portomaggiore and reached the Canale Diverzo, another of the many water barriers in this region of the Lower Po Valley.

While Portomaggiore was being cleared the British 78th Division moved along and captured Portomaggiore, where a bridge over the Bolognese Canale was taken intact.

Other Eighth Army forces driving directly along Highway 16 reached within 10 miles of Ferrara, which lies only a few thousand yards from the Po River.

Rulings Cover Variety of Subjects

Raleigh, April 20.—(AP)—Attorney General Harry McMillan ruled today that under the school machinery act, principals and teachers desiring to resign must give at least 30 days notice to the administrative head of the school.

A violation of the provision, McMillan said, may deprive the offender of the right to teach in a public school in North Carolina for a period of one year. The 30 days notice must be in writing, he added. (Continued on page three)

Bomber Plant Cutting Back

Detroit, April 20.—(AP)—Approximately 1,000 men and women were dropped from the Willow Run bomber plant payrolls yesterday as the management began cutting back production of B-24 Liberator bombers which will cease no later than next August. The plant now has approximately 20,000 employees.

The War Manpower Commission has been interviewing discharged employees in an effort to place them in other jobs in the Detroit area.

Speculation concerning the future use of the plant continued today, but there was no definite comment from the army air forces or from the Ford Motor Company. The tremendous size of the plant, covering 67 acres, is one of the difficulties in assigning it to other work. It has been hinted that some of the experimental work now being carried on at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, might be done at Willow Run.

Deal Heavy Blow To Jap Airfield

Guam, April 20.—(AP)—Japan's big Atsugi airfield 25 miles southwest of Tokyo was ripped up yesterday as P-51 Mustang fighter planes based on Iwo Jima made their first attack on the capital area.

Eighty-four Japanese aircraft were destroyed or damaged as the planes, some of them flying under high tension wires, carried out a daring strafing attack.

Mustang pilots reported they went through heavy anti aircraft and small arms fire getting to the field where 200 to 300 enemy fighters and bombers were lined up on the apron "like a pilot's dream."

The attack increased the P-51 toll over Honshu Island to 132 planes, including those destroyed on B-29 escort missions.

Astonished Japanese, some of them caught playing tennis at the airfield, watched the low-flying fighters shoot down 21 Japanese planes. Two enemy planes were listed as destroyed and 28 others destroyed or probably destroyed on the ground. Another 35 were damaged.

25 Killed

Sweetwater, Tex., April 20.—(AP)—Twenty-five officers and men were killed when an army transport plane, headed from Midland, Tex., crashed and burned three miles southeast of Sweetwater today.

Eleven officers and 14 enlisted men lost their lives. Midland army airfield reported at least eight combat officers returned from overseas were among the victims. Names were temporarily withheld.

The ship, a twin-engine C-47, took off from Midland army airfield at 6:05 a. m.

ROOSEVELTS MOVE TODAY

Family of Late President Leaves The White House

Washington, April 20.—(AP)—The Franklin D. Roosevelt family is moving out of the White House today to make way for the presidential family of Harry S. Truman.

In the four days after the burial of her distinguished husband, Mrs. Roosevelt managed to sort, pack and clear out all of their personal and historical belongings accumulated during 18 years in the executive mansion.

Packing and shipping was complicated, Mrs. Roosevelt said, by the fact that Mr. Roosevelt's will listed hundreds of objects to be given as remembrances to relatives and friends. She spent a large part of those four days telephoning to find out their choices of the gifts named.

As for her two youngest sons, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., and John Roosevelt, both naval officers on duty in the Pacific, Mrs. Roosevelt said she must choose for them as she thought her husband would have wished. Because of military security, they have been unable to communicate with her since their father's death.

Mrs. Roosevelt planned to leave today for New York City, stay in her apartment there until Sunday and then go to Hyde Park.

Meantime the Roosevelts' daughter, Anna, Mrs. John Boettiger, will move from the White House, probably to a Washington hotel. Her husband, a lieutenant colonel, is stationed here. Their five-year-old (Continued on Page Four)

This getting of German barbarities is getting hotter and hotter and more difficult to take without boiling over and losing one's perspective.

It's with applause therefore that the Allied world receives Prime Minister Churchill's announcement that a solemn warning to the Germans, against prison-camp atrocities like the current horrors in the Reich, is to be issued over the signatures of himself, President Truman and Marshal Stalin.

He had reference, among other places, to Gerdagen whose citizens today are being compelled by American troops to bury the ghastly remains of 1,170 slaves and political prisoners who were deliberately burned to death by Boche soldiers.

It is particularly satisfactory that the warning by the big three is to "bring home responsibility not only to the men at the top, who are already on other grounds war criminals in many cases, but also to the actual people who have done this foul work with their own hands."

We want to see every last man of them—big, medium and little—rounded up and given punishment to fit the crimes.

Out bitterness, of course, starts with the head men, from whose leadership flows this savagery. Probably some of the barbarian chiefs of the dim past were as evil-minded as Adolf Hitler, but certainly the magnitude of their atrocities never approached his for the simple reason that they had less opportunity among populations which were comparatively small.

In a digest of opinions—the first issued by the attorney general this year — McMullan also ruled that the proper school authorities have the right to exclude from extracurricular activities students who belong to secret societies or organizations prohibited by school regulations.

Other rulings:
"The clerk of the Superior Court is not justified in deducting any fees or commissions from amounts collected or paid into his office on fines, forfeitures or penalties."

"A physician prescribing glasses for a patient and ordering glasses from an optical company for sale to him to the patient is not justified in collecting three percent of the price charged such patient for the glasses, as the taxable transaction is the sale from the optical company to the physician."

"An officer without a warrant may forcibly enter a house, admission having been demanded and refused, if a felony or other infamous crime has been committed and there is reasonable grounds to believe that the guilty person is concealed therein."

"Marriage by proxy may not be celebrated in this state, but it is entirely possible that if such contract of marriage was celebrated in a state in which such marriage is recognized, it would be likewise recognized in North Carolina."

"A board of commissioners by proper resolution finding as a fact that present valuations throughout the county are fair and uniform may adopt the present valuations as fixed by the last quinquennial revaluations."

"In the absence of a public local act to the contrary, a county has the right to employ a county attorney and a tax attorney, and the question of consolidating the duties of the two is a matter entirely within the discretion of the board."

"The constitutional amendment permitting notaries public to hold another public office became effective as of December 1, 1944, at 4 p. m.; consequently, a notary public may now serve as solicitor of a municipal police court."

"General statutes 10-1 gives the Governor ample authority to revoke the commission of a notary public."

"A county superintendent of schools is not required to recognize an assignment of future wages by a teacher."

"Funds received by a veteran of World War One from the federal government as bonus or pension are exempt from ad valorem taxation while on deposit in a bank to the veteran's credit, but this exemption does not apply to property purchased by the veteran with such funds."

"A first offense in violation of same laws or regulations is a misdemeanor within the jurisdiction of a justice of the peace, but a second offense is not within such jurisdiction. An appeal upon a conviction and judgement involving the revocation of a hunting license has the effect of staying the revocation pending the outcome of the appeal, the revocation being a part of the judgement."

snoozing would taper off sharply. There would be outstanding contracts to be settled.

Since the so-called war activities program started on July 1, 1940, Congress has appropriated or approved contract authorizations aggregating \$374,257,170.951, exclusive of almost \$25,000,000,000 in the new navy bill.

More than \$375,000,000,000 of that was for the army and the navy, the balance for the activities of other agencies such as the Maritime Commission.

Actual war expenditures during that period, up to March 31 of this year, were \$258,358,779.204.

The War Department has accounted for \$206,832,022.786 of the appropriations and authorizations and \$146,281,877.259 of the expenditures. The navy's share of the appropriations was \$118,397,431.243 and its expenditures \$81,060,799.636.

ethics and culture of the centuries. The civilization didn't stick. He's a throw-back.

Your columnist had a grandstand seat as the abnormal Hitler started his career of crime. I saw him in action in many places and finally, after Munich, stood on the platform back of him in the square of the ancient city of Eger, Czechoslovakia, when he annexed the Sudetenland which he had forced the unhappy little country to surrender. It was in Eger that he really nailed his banner of conquest to the mast when he proclaimed:

"Never again will this land be torn away from the Reich. And so we begin our march into the great German future. Sieg heil! (Long live victory)."

Secretary of War Stimson was asked at a press conference yesterday whether American soldiers had been instructed what to do if they discovered the fuhrer—"whether to take him or stick him." The secretary laughingly replied that "You may be sure American troops will do their full duty if such circumstances arise." He said unless Hitler resists he will be held for action by higher authority.

Well, the Allied man-in-the-street isn't worried about what our troops will do when they catch Hitler or any others of his gang. The soldiers' judgment will be all right. What the average citizen of the United Nations is afraid of, however, is that squeamishness or reticence may result in Hitler and the rest of those guilty of war-crimes, escaping their just deserts.

recently demanded in the British House of Lords that "the master criminals Hitler and Himmler and their gang" should be killed on the spot when captured. A lot of other folk have expressed similar sentiment, and certainly a vast multitude will take it hard if these Nazi murderers and torturers don't get the limit of the law. Or maybe, as a colleague of mine remarks, hanging is too good for Hitler—he ought to be put in solitary confinement and be made to listen continuously, night and day, to phonograph records of his own raucous speeches.

troops to the doors of Berlin were made long ago.

In the Pacific, however, Russia's attitude toward entering the war with Japan remains publicly unknown. American military leaders who accompanied Mr. Roosevelt to Yalta naturally know of any agreements made and the strategy mapped there.

But the possibility remains that Mr. Roosevelt and Stalin came to some understandings of their own in at least two conferences they were reported to have held with none of their advisers present.

These discussions may have dealt entirely with diplomatic affairs. But such matters are closely entwined with military decisions these days.

Most persons in official Washington believe, for instance, that Russia's recent denunciation of her neutrality treaty with Japan is but the forerunner of Soviet entry into the war against the Japanese at a moment Moscow considers opportune.

However, there may have been no such understanding. If there is none then Mr. Truman certainly will want to obtain one if he believes the danger price of Russian participation—if there is a price—is not too high.

That subject is considered certain to be discussed with Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov when he stops off here this week-end on his way to the United Nations conference in San Francisco.

son, Johnny, is seriously ill with a throat infection.

The former First Lady said Mrs. Truman has been very sweet in saying that Anna may leave some of her things in the White House and return at her convenience to pack them.

Despite the task of moving and her grief, Mrs. Roosevelt found time yesterday to invite members of her news conference group to say farewell. She gave them tea for the last time in the State Dining Room of the White House.

Smilingly she said that henceforth she'll be a competitor in trying to get interviews, too. In her column published yesterday Mrs. Roosevelt said she would continue her more than nine-year-old My Day, her magazine page and perhaps write other articles.

The former President's widow told the newspaperwomen she never has aspired to public office and does not wish to start now.

However, Chairman Sabath (D-Ill.) of the House Rules Committee said he planned to call on Mr. Truman to urge that Mrs. Roosevelt be offered some high government post as a "citizen of the first value."

Fall, after we had proved to him that he was licked, it was clear that we would not be through until we had occupied all of Germany."

There are not nearly enough military government teams at hand. Civil law broke down in most towns when the Nazis departed, for they held all key jobs. The Germans left behind often try to solve the problem of law and order as did their predecessors—by force—unless Allied troops are at hand to keep them in hand.

And troops cannot be spared for this job. For instance, one combat division overran 150 small towns in one day. If it had left four men in each town to preserve order, a bat-

alion of fighting men would have been tied up. Besides, few Doughboys speak German, Russian, or Polish—virtually a prerequisite if administration problems are to be handled intelligently.

Finding it impossible to do everything, the combat troops have done their best and moved on. It may be days later before military government teams arrive.

Much difficulty has been experienced because of the lack of sufficient machinery to deal effectively with the millions of released slave laborers and prisoners of war. There is widespread looting, not only by the slave laborers but also by Germans trying to get their hands on extra food and clothing for the dark days ahead.

The aim has been to try to keep these millions in camps until they can be dealt with properly. But there is not enough food to feed them. So they forage—and wander up and down the highways.

Life is worth nothing. People die on the road, in barns, in the fields, in jails, abandoned warehouses, everywhere. No one bothers to bury them. No one knows who they are.

Every type of disease, particularly typhus, is being carried by these nomads.

All wanderers by no means are men. There are thousands of women, mostly girls brought into Germany as workers. They usually form into gangs and plunder so they can eat.

ing powers—the United States, Britain, Russia and China—have worked out formulas designed to secure a larger role in decisions of peace and war. A strong reaction has crystallized against the original Dumbarton Oaks formula which would give the league's security council power to bind all member nations to send their forces into action.

Russian Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov, secretary of State Stettinius and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden are slated to seek agreement on these and other issues this week-end, before they travel to the west coast for the United Nations conference opening next Wednesday.

Efforts will center on breaking the deadlock over formation of a more representative Polish government, a move agreed upon at Yalta but stalled after weeks of consultations in Moscow.

Russia's apparent determination to stick by its guns was seen in Moscow dispatches last night quoting the army newspaper Red Star as saying that failure to invite the provisional government "has evoked the indignation of the Polish people."

garrison once estimated at more than 60,000 troops likely has been committed to the defense of the southern sector. Naha, with a population of 60,000, is four miles from the fighting front. The nearby Naha airfield is the largest in the Ryukyu chain.
These Japanese troops must stand and fight it out in defense of the important island only 325 miles south of Japan proper. American control of Okinawa's waters and skies precludes any possibility of escape or reinforcement.
Tokyo radio said 40 or 50 American tanks were knocked out and set ablaze during the attack which it said was made by 10,000 U. S. troops the enemy broadcast asserted a "landing attempt" by 20 landing craft on southern Okinawa was "warded off" yesterday.
On little Ie Island, just off the west coast, 7th division infantrymen mopped up enemy pockets as U. S. artillery spotter planes landed on the airstrip, captured shortly after the Monday invasion.
Marines of the third amphibious corps control northern Okinawa and the Motobu peninsula but still were looking for scattered Japanese groups.

"murderous battle at the gates of Berlin," said the enemy radio accounts.
Konev's campaign southeast of Berlin broke through the Spree River defenses as well as the Neisse line farther east and outflanked the Spree Wald, a region of lakes and forests along the Spree which had promised to be the most formidable defenses of the capital in that direction.
At Calau the Russians were only about four miles from Adolf Hitler's last north-south autobahn—the one running from Berlin to

Dresden and the mountain strongholds of Bohemia and Bavaria—and only 12 miles northeast of Pilsner, a junction on one of the last two main railways running south from Berlin.

However, this line, veering southeast through Hoyerswerda and Bautzen, may already have been cut.

The second line, running through Jüterbog, Elsterwerda, and Dresden, is 15 miles farther west. Virtually turning their backs on the American forces poised along the Elbe 45 miles west of Berlin, the Germans said they were throwing remaining forces conserved for fire emergency into the "hell of fire, steel and blood" raging along the outer defenses of Eastern Berlin.

Spree River defenses southeast of Berlin also were cracked, German broadcasts said a few hours after Premier Marshal Stalin had confirmed that Soviet bridgeheads had been established on the west side of the Oder and Neisse rivers.
"The decisive battle of this war is being fought in an inferno of flames, searchlights and the most hellish noise ever heard," the German broadcast said in describing the battle.

Mulde rivers, but the Sixth Army group of Gen. Jacob L. Devers was pushing forward in the south and the 21st Army group of Field Marshal Montgomery was besieging or imperiling all the North Sea ports.
The siege of Bremen (342,306) was intensified from three sides. The British were a mile from Harburg (118,193), west of the Elbe and a southern suburb of Hamburg (1,682,220), greatest port on the continent and second city of Germany. The U-boat base of Emden was within light artillery range. Luebeck was 35 miles away and Kiel was but 57.
The Third Army fought into the outskirts of Chemnitz, Saxony rail and industrial center of 334,563. The First Army besieged Dessau (120,000), 52 miles southwest of Berlin.

The Ninth Army slightly enlarged its Elbe bridgehead five miles beyond Barby and, in the words of Gen. Eisenhower's communique "brought the situation under control" on its northern flank, where 1,000 or so Nazis tried to break through Ninth Army lines to join the main German forces.

Already 400 of the Nazis who broke into the northern flank have been captured and numerous tanks and armored vehicles have been destroyed. The Ninth Army was erasing the others swiftly, while the rest of its front remained quiet.

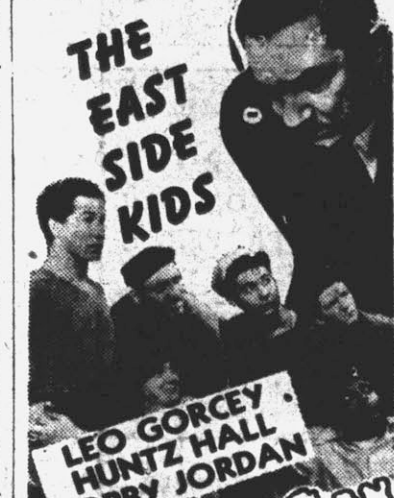
In the north one of the last national tragedies of the war was broadening over sorely tried Holland. The Germans had blasted great sections of the dikes around the Zuider Zee and let in the sea and its killing salt water. Floods still were rising, land was dying. From Utrecht to the Hague, from Amsterdam to Rotterdam, some of the oldest reclaimed farm and flower lands of Holland were drowning. Parts of all four cities were inundated.

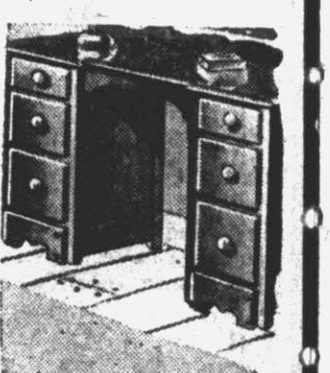
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
